It would use existing tracks directly along 100 miles of the Colorado River, including through Glenwood Canyon, the upper Colorado east of Dotsero, and Gore Canyon, to transport waxy crude oil from Utah's Uinta Basin to oil refineries in the Gulf of Mexico. They've petitioned the Department of Transportation to reconsider funding the project, as well as the Department of Agriculture to revoke the railway's approval, and the EPA to conduct a more thorough environmental analysis. They say the original analysis only considered the environmental impacts on Utah, not on Colorado.
