**ISSUE: CRIME & VIOLENCE**

Description: A Cape Girardeau man has offered to donate a building to the city, with the intent to create more police presence in midtown and the south of the city. Scott Blank made the offer at tonight's City Council meeting, so that the building could be converted into a new police substation on Good Hope Street. Mr. Blank says that it would be helpful to have more of a presence in the area; and that it would show residents that the officers aren't just driving around, but are actually engaged in the community. If approved, Blank hopes that construction could be completed by the end of 2032. The proposal awaits approval by the City Council and the City Attorney.

Description: A rash of break-ins and car thefts has the Cape Girardeau Police Department on the hunt. Two more vehicles were stolen Saturday night in the northwest portion of the city. Police Sergeant Joey Hann offered viewers some tips to help avoid becoming a victim. He advices installing security and Ring cameras around the home and vehicle. He also suggests motion lights which will kick on whenever someone enters your property at night. Plus, park your vehicle in a secure, well-lit area; and don't leave your keys or valuables in your vehicle overnight.

Description: The city of Perryville, Mo., believes it has a new way to recruit new police officers. A new program's goal is to hire new police academy students and have them work as city employees in exchange of paying for their schooling. Perryville Police Chief, Derek Hunt, says this program will give the students a chance for hands-on training, while learning what it takes to be in law enforcement. Chief Hunt says they can learn more about how to communicate and work with people; which is something that can only be learned in the field, not from a book. Chief Hunt adds that the department is currently short by three people, and he hopes the new program will help fill those positions.

Description: Last week's tornadoes didn't leave much behind for some people, now Kentucky police at working to keep looters from stealing what is left. Kentucky State Police Sergeant, Bernie Napier, says looting is often a problem after events like this; and they are working with law enforcement from surrounding counties, along with the National Guard, in patrolling the area. Sgt. Napier says the number of calls are high, so they are busy watching the storm damaged area, while also maintaining patrols in their normal areas. Sgt. Napier adds that if you suspect there is someone trying to loot, please report it to law enforcement immediately.

Description: Interview with Michelle Johnson, representing the American Red Cross, to discuss the emergency need for blood donations. According to Ms. Johnson, typically eight percent of the population would donate blood; but following the Covid pandemic, the percentage has dropped to less than three percent. Because of the drop in donations, available blood stores have fallen to dangerous levels. For people who have never donated, she discusses the procedure. Also discussed is the Red Cross donor app, where people can make an appointment to donate, plus afterward, it will allow the donator to track where there blood was used. Ms. Johnson also talks about the requirements to be able to donate, including how Coved and vaccines can affect a person's ability to donate.

Description: Earbuds and headphones are sometimes common presents during the holidays; but experts say these gifts can lead to hearing loss. Hearing instrument specialist, Kyle Griffin, says long term use of earbuds can cause hearing damage; and it's very possible people are damaging their hearing at a younger age. Griffin says that as damage is caused to the inner ear, we lose certain sounds and speech becomes muffled, making it harder to understand people. Griffin adds that if you believe your hearing is damaged, to contact your doctor.

Description: Interview with Dr. Gloria Green, Chairperson for the Department of Nursing at Southeast Missouri State University. Dr. Green discusses the various programs offered by the university, ranging from a pre-licensing program, up to Bachelor and Masters degrees. She discusses some of the various training labs provided by the school, which includes learning through computer simulations as well as working with live persons. Dr. Green also cites how several of the more advanced students recently worked with the Cape Girardeau County Health Department and the National Guard, assisting at Covid-19 vaccination clinics.

Description: The CDC has issued a warning about flu outbreaks this year. Last year, the flu was dampened by mask wearing and social distancing; but the flu virus is expected to return this winter. Health care professionals are urging people to get flu shots; to keep the flu at a minimum and to avoid a hospital stay. Jessica Baire, a nurse practitioner at Shawnee Health Care, says the same measures that were used against Covid also apply to the flu. She says this will also be a benefit to hospitals and health care workers who are already busy taking care of Covid patients. While flu activity is minimal at this time locally, there is concern that it may pick up as families gather together for the holidays.

Description: Images from Friday night's tornadoes may be difficult for some children. Health experts say it may be helpful to limit how much they see. Dr. Sharon Braun, from the Community Couseling Center in Cape Girardeau, says it could be traumatizing for younger children to see images of the aftermath. She suggests instead turning off the TV and finding something else to distract them and help them relax. Dr. Braun says it may help to get out some paper and crayons and draw a picture of what they are feeling, then have them tell the story of what they drew. Dr. Braun adds to pay attention to your child; and if you become concerned, to contact a counselor for help.

Description: Americares, a mental health counseling organization, has set up a mobile wellness trailer in Mayfield, Ky., to help those in need of crisis support. Team leader, Sambhavi Cheemalapati, says it's important for tornado survivors to value the status of mental health. Cheemalapati says feeling grief, feeling lost and feeling frustrated is very normal under these circumstances; and the best way to overcome these feelings is to accept that these are natural responses, reach out to others for comfort and support; and remember that this is just a temporary situation.

Description: The demand for at-home Covid tests has increased over the holidays, and it may be difficult to get your hands on one at this time. Park Pharmacy Manager, Elizabeth Pham, says the tests flew off the shelves as Christmas approached, and she doesn't see the demand for the tests ending any time soon. Pham says the tests are a great way to privately do their own test to see if they need to change any plans, rather than having to set up an appointment and having to wait for the results. Pham adds that they are expecting more tests at the pharmacy later this week.

Description: Signs of the Omicron variant have been detected in Cape Girardeau and Perryville, as the virus has been discovered in the wastewater from both cities, although for now it's still a small amount. Marc Johnson, Professor from the University of Missouri, says the virus so far has only appeared in less than ten percent of the wastewater that was tested; but he expects that will change during the coming weeks. Professor Johnson says the Omicron variant is still rather new in the area; but as it continues to spread, he expects it to become the dominant strain. Professor Johnson's lab samples wastewater from about 150 locations around the state each week.

Description: Interview with Kristi Booth, representing Recover Out Loud, to discuss how her group attempts to end the stigma surrounding substance abuse, which may discourage people from seeking help. A former addict, Ms. Booth, talks about how she has been able to turn her life around so that she is now able to take the prescribed medication she needs in her everyday life. She also discusses how Recover Out Loud works with users to find how to help them break the cycle of substance abuse and be able to participate in recovery services. Ms. Booth also describes how they work with other local recovery treatment centers to lend support to people who need help overcoming their addictions.

Description: Drugs laced with fentanyl has been a growing cause of death, and some people are pushing for the use of test strips to reduce the number of fatalities. Kristi Booth, Executive Director of Recover Out Loud Harm Reduction and Recovery Services, says we need to find ways to make it possible to reduce potential overdoses. She adds that there will always be people who are going to use substances until they decide to quit. Booth's organization works with the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services to provide Narcan and fentanyl test strips in the southeast Missouri area.

Description: If you've been thinking about making changes for the new year, one idea to consider is giving up alcohol for the first month of the year, also called a "Dry January." Shonda Hemphill, Chief Behavioral Health Officer for the Gibson Recovery Center, says a Dry January can have numerous benefits, especially for your overall health. Ms. Hemphill says the main benefit of staying sober for the month, is that the person will avoid feeling hungover or sick; plus they'll save the money that they won't be spending on alcohol.

Some local drivers say they don't mind paying more as long as it means roads are safer. Motorist Connie Damron says it can be frightening when you hit a deep pothole, especially if you can't see it because it's raining or dark. Cape Girardeau resident, Karisa Gillespie, says she knows a few roads that definitely need some work. Missouri drivers can get an exception and refund for the fuel tax; but they will need to keep accurate records each time they fill up.

Ms. Mills adds that they have anticipated the wage increase, in face, they have already been paying many of their employees more than the minimum. The goal for the state of Illinois is that the minimum wage will eventually reach \$15 an hour by 2025. Other new Illinois laws that will soon go in effect next year will allow students to receive a limited number of mental health days and the deregulation of childrens' lemonade stands.

Rick Cuba, representing Catholic Charities, says the area has one of the highest rates of infant mortality, so the need is there. He adds there are few similar homes that are able to take on a homeless, pregnant woman and helping her become a productive member of society, with a healthy baby.

Description: Profile of the newly renovated St. John Henry Newman Center, the Catholic Campus Ministries at Southeast Missouri State University. In 2019, a fundraising campaign for a new chapel was begun, with a goal of over five-million dollars. The new center replaces the previous chapel and two other buildings. Along with the chapel, the new building also houses the Aquinas Institute for Catholic Studies, which offers Catholic based courses, for which students can receive school credit.
