KVCR FM News Issues and Programs from August 16 2016 through September 15 2016

In August, 91.9 KVCR sadly said goodbye to our long-time weekly news review segment with Press-Enterprise columnist Cassie MacDuff. Cassie was a reliable staple of Friday mornings on 91.9 KVCR for nearly a decade. While KVCR listeners will miss Cassie on the air, we're delighted to know that she's still here in the IE contributing to the community in another way: Cassie is the new Director of Marketing for Ontario International Airport, as it transitions from Los Angeles ownership back to local control.

Also, 91.9 KVCR said goodbye to our stalwart reporter and local All Things Considered host, Matt Guilhem, who's now the new local "Morning Edition" host at public radio station KBSX in Boise, Idaho. Matt was born and raised in San Bernardino and - other than a couple of years of graduate school in London - has never lived or worked outside of California, and is looking forward to a new professional and life adventure. We at KVCR, of course, will miss Matt's cheery onair style, his droll humor during pledge drives, and his important contributions to our news effort – not the least of which was his stellar reporting for KVCR and NPR on the December 2 terror attack in San Bernardino. We look forward to hearing him – our native son - report from the Pacific Northwest on NPR newscasts and programs.

Fittingly, Matt's last major contribution to 91.9 KVCR News was a 5-part series of feature reports on the mental health after-affects of the San Bernardino mass shooting on victims, survivors, and their families, as well as local police and first responders, local school children, and the Inland Empire muslim community. Matt produced the series as a project for the California Health Journalism Fellowship, a program of the Center for Health Journalism at the USC Annenberg School for Communication and Journalism. Each segment of the series is detailed below in this month's report.

8/16/16 LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY; SAN BERNARDINO MASS SHOOTING "The Mental Health Aftermath Of The Dec. 2 San Bernardino Terror Attack, Part 1: An Overview" The December 2 attack on San Bernardino County employees brought ISIS-inspired terrorism to the Inland Empire. No longer the province of global cities like London, Paris, or Brussels, the attack reaffirmed that anywhere can be a target. KVCR's Matt Guilhem begins a series of stories on mental health in the wake of the shooting.

San Bernardino, Corona" Local firefighters made relatively short work of a couple of potentially-destructive brush fires in two Inland Empire communities.

9/17/16 LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY; WILDFIRES ""Blue Cut" Wildfire Explodes In Mountains Above San Bernardino" The Blue Cut Fire burning in the mountains above San Bernardino is expected to consume some 50 square miles of dry brush, trees - and anything else in its way - less than 24 hours after it ignited yesterday. 91.9 KVCR provided a wrap-up of information about the fire that was updated at a news conference held by Unified Fire Command authorities in San Bernardino.

9/17/16 LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY; SAN BERNARDINO MASS SHOOTING "Mental Health After The Dec. 2 San Bernardino Terror Attack, Part 2: First Responders" Minutes after gunfire erupted at the Inland Regional Center on December 2, emergency personnel from a host of local agencies were on the scene. As of Thursday afternoon, mandatory evacuation orders remained in effect for more than 82,000 residents in the vicinity of the fire zone north of San Bernardino.

8/19/16 LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY; WILDFIRES "Blue Cut Fire Friday A.M. Update: 37,000 Acres Burned, 26% Contained; More Evacuations Lifted" Blue Cut Fire Incident Command authorities held a news conference in Victorville this morning estimated that 96 homes have been destroyed by the wildfire burning in the mountains north of San Bernardino. The blaze has burned 37,002 acres and is 26 percent contained.

8/22/16 LOCAL UNEMPLOYMENT "Unemployment Up In CA -- Including IE -- for First Time In Months" The unemployment rate in the Inland Empire - and in the state as a whole - ticked upward for the first time in years.

8/22/16 LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY; WILDFIRES "Blue Cut Fire Now 89% Contained At 37,020 Acres; All Evacuation Orders Lifted" The Blue Cut Fire is now 89% contained at 37, 020 acres.

8/22/16 LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY; SAN BERNARDINO MASS SHOOTING "Local Mental Health After The San Bernardino Terror Attack, Part 4: A Survivor's Story" On December 2, 2015, those in the conference hall at the Inland Regional Center dove for cover, were deafened by gunfire, and watched friends and colleagues die. Environmental Health Specialist Julie Paez was shot twice that morning. As part of our series on mental health in the aftermath of the terror attack, KVCR's Matt Guilhem spoke to Paez about her recovery and determination to move forward from a few moments of her life.
