However as Capital Public Radio's Julia Mitric reports, the rollout of commercial marijuana sales is moving slowly.

- 1/8/18 PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY "Legal Recreational Marijuana In California Still Has Restrictions" The sale of recreational marijuana became legal on January 1. But California's pot rules don't offer the complete freedom to smoke, buy, and transport cannabis anywhere you please.

But not everybody is happy where the money is going.
