2 sets of parents that have dealt with tragic loss are making a positive impact on nearly a dozen schools in our community. While state data shows nearly half of students across New York receive free or reduced lunch, Rick Timbs says the number of underprivileged students may be more than reported. Rick Timbs executive director, statewide school finance consortium says, "you would want to make sure that the metrics that you're using to determine who needs the money are accurate and reliable and sustainable and so those have been lacking in the formula recently."

Timbs says part of the problem with the state's current 40 page foundation aid formula, schools are receiving funding based on poverty census data from 2000. Parents, in many cases, fail to fill out income forms if their student is attending a school that already qualifies for free lunch. Rick Timbs executive director, statewide school finance consortium says, "there's other data sets out there that could actually examine more closely areas where poverty really exists." the board of regents this week presented an option to stop using data from the free lunch program and instead use information off food stamp and medicaid programs or gather income estimates from federal data on tax returns. Another option would ask for family income forms from every student. "we have to update our definitions, we have to update our databases and we have to make sure the data is reliable, accurate and more current." "ultimately the decision to implement changes lies in the hands of the governor and legislature. Timbs says that would be wise considering there are multiple lawsuits pending, dealing with school funding. Robert Lowry, the council of school superintendents deputy communication's director told me fairness demands

Something be done, but new census data is only one piece of the complicated puzzle. In Albany Nick Perreault nc34.

Detailed Description:

The Children's Home in Hillcrest is once again offering a service for troubled youth caught up in the court system. It re-opened its non-secure detention center at the main campus located on Chenango Street. The facility can accommodate up to 6 boys and girl ages 8 to 17 years old. The kids stay there as a result of a court order and can receive counseling and other services to get them back on track. In 2014, the detention center had a 12-bed capacity, but was cut due to low numbers and participation. Juvenile Justice Director Kim Musser says when it closed, kids could only stay in Tully or Cortland. Juvenile Justice Director Kim Musser says, "We really provide a program that's more than just detention. When people think of detention, they think of it being punitive and taking the kids out of the home. But, we provided them with services within our community. Once we closed down, they were over an hour away from home." Musser says the kids aren't bad, but have been put in very difficult situations. The program is funded through the Department of Social Services. Since re-opening in May, the detention center has assisted over 20 children.

Broome County District Attorney Steve Cornwell has announced a new effort to help local schools hire police officers. Cornwell announced the Support for Students Program at Windsor High School today. By contracting with the D-A's office, local districts will be able to hire school resource officers to serve in their buildings. Many districts, including Windsor, have been without S-R-O's since 2010 when state funding for them was ended. Cornwell and school officials will choose retired police officers who will be hired by the D-A, thereby making them full-fledged officers with the ability to make arrests. The districts will cover the pay for the part-time positions. Windsor Superintendent Jason Andrews says the officers will do more than just provide security. Superintendent Jason Andrews says, "It's critical that students have someone with that type of expertise that they can develop a relationship with and feel safe in talking with and really not only issues that are occurring within the school walls but with the community as well." So far Windsor and Whitney Point plan to hire the S-R-O's but Cornwell says other districts have also expressed interest. The Support for Students Program also includes efforts by D-A investigators to address truancy issues on behalf of schools. And Cornwell plans to release a mobile app in November where students and others can make anonymous tips about drug activity.

Petition time has come for independent candidates to try and get on the November ballot. That includes Libertarian Rich Purtell of Apalachin who is running for the 52nd State Senate seat currently held by Republican Fred Akshar. Purtell favors a minimal approach to government focused on the principles of the U-S Constitution. He says Libertarians are fiscally conservative and socially tolerant. Purtell, who works in the H-V-A-C and construction industry, is especially fighting against what he calls crony capitalism and pay-to-play schemes. He opposes Start-Up New York and the Upstate Revitalization Initiative because they don't work for small businesses. Because the Libertarian Party does not have a secure ballot line in New York, Purtell must gather 3 thousand signatures from registered voters in 3 weeks. That's 3 times the number of signatures required for Democrat and Republican candidates.

The former county legislator says the parking spaces underneath Governmental plaza where county employees park during day should be made available to the public on evenings and weekends. Garnar concedes that the county does open up the underground garages for special events such as hockey games and last Friday's James Taylor concert for 4 dollars a car. Broome County Executive Debbie Preston says that 9 months ago, she held meetings with city officials and LAZ Parking, which operates the Water Street and State Street ramps, to discuss the situation. Preston says the critical time of need is during weekday business hours when the government plaza garage is already full with public employees who themselves pay a monthly charge to park there.

Ball says she supports stripping pensions from lawmakers who are convicted of felonies. She wants to bar the use of campaign funds to pay legal fees. The Democrat wants to close the LLC loophole which allows donors to exceed campaign contribution limits. And Ball opposes any pay raises for legislators unless limits are imposed on their outside income. Akshar says he supports more disclosure and transparency. However, he says Assembly Democrats package many proposed reforms with a plan for public financing of elections which is something he adamantly opposes.

A new Siena College poll shows a tight 3-way race to replace retiring Republican Congressman Richard Hanna. The 3 candidates for the 22nd District which extends from the Utica area south to Greater Binghamton, debated at SUNY Broome this morning. The poll shows Republican Assemblywoman Claudia Tenney leading with 35 percent followed by Democratic Broome County Legislator Kim Myers at 30 percent and third-party candidate businessman Martin Babinec in striking distance at 24 percent. Tenney says her familiarity with voters across the district is helping to counteract the fact that she's being grossly outspent. Republican Candidate Claudia Tenney says, "I think it's my strong name I-D and my courage in standing up to Richard Hanna in 2014 which gave me the name I-D and a lot of recognition that way. Neither one of these candidates, they claim they stand for something, but neither one of them took on Richard Hanna." Myers, whose father founded Dick's Sporting Goods, is a relative newcomer to politics. She expects her numbers to improve as more people get to know her, especially in the northern portion of the district. Democratic Candidate Kim Myers says, "One of my opponents has been a State Assemblyperson for years. So, as I get out and I get people to know me, get to present myself, I'm very, very encouraged." Babinec is a former Silicon Valley entrepreneur who is largely self-financing his campaign. He says the poll proves he's not a spoiler, but that he's in it to win it. Upstate Jobs Party Candidate Martin Babinec says, "I have drawn votes equally from both major party candidates, as well as independent voters. And I have drawn votes equally across the entire district." Today's debate covered issues from the role of government in job creation to special interest financing of campaigns.

Detailed Description:

Calling it the greatest healthcare emergency in the history of our area, Broome County's D.A. says people are dying of illegal drug overdoses at 4 times the national average. District Attorney Steve Cornwell announced the results of his own, personal investigation today and he says 53 people have died from overdose deaths so far this year. That total is in stark contrast to a tally recently released by the County Health Department which put the number at 11 over the first 6 months of the year. Cornwell says he found 48 deaths attributable to heroin or other opiods, and another 5 from other drugs such as cocaine and methamphetamine. He says, at this rate, the number is on pace for 80 O-D's this year. Cornwell says he didn't rely solely on toxicology reports, which often can take many weeks to produce. He says he worked closely with the county coroners and used information on death certificates. The D.A. also says he has requested local police agencies to forward details on all suspected overdose cases to his office. However, one local police chief, who is skeptical of Cornwell's numbers, told NewsChannel 34 that no such request was made and no such information provided to the D.A.'s office.

"That is so important to patients and their families when they're going through being newly diagnosed with cancer and all of their treatment." Lourdes cancer specialists will also have the opportunity to present especially rare or complex cases to M-D Anderson's Tumor Board.

The facility includes bedrooms, lounges, living areas along with recreation space, exercise equipment and a kitchen and dining area. It can accommodate 16 adults and 2 children. Fairview Recovery Executive Director Michele Napolitano says separating mother and baby is one of the biggest barriers for moms seeking treatment. Fairview Recovery Executive Director Michele Napolitano says, "They don't want to leave their children to come to treatment. Who could blame them? In this case, they can bring their child with them. If they're pregnant, they can give birth and still be in treatment. We're very excited about that." Also announced was an Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse State Grant worth 1 point 7 million dollars. Fairview will use the money to create a recovery center. It is not a treatment center, but rather a centrally-located one-stop-shop for people to receive information on treatment and other programs and services.

The man accused of running down and killing a New York State Trooper will be heading to trial in a few weeks. Yesterday, a pre-trial hearing was held for Almond Upton. Upton is accused of intentionally driving into Trooper Chris Skinner while the officer was conducting a traffic stop on Interstate-81 in May, 2014. Upton was originally indicted on 11 counts but now only faces first degree murder. Special Prosecutor Ben Bergman decided to drop 10 charges, including reckless driving and assault, in order to make it easier for jurors to decide the case. Judge Joe Cawley is also considering what evidence can be presented. State Police investigators allege that Upton hit Skinner while traveling 93 miles an hour, and that he never used the brakes. Public Defender Mike Baker is arguing that Upton is not mentally capable and should not be found responsible for the death. Police interviewed Upton following the

incident, during which he allegedly claimed that Jesus and the Devil told him to do it. Jury selection is scheduled to begin on July 11th.

The Vestal woman who pleaded guilty to kidnapping 2 Binghamton teens was sentenced today. Amanda Hellman was given 10 years in state prison for the kidnapping charge. Today she told her family that she was very sorry for her actions. She says she failed Kylea and Shaleen and she never meant to put them in any danger. Broome County District Attorney Steve Cornwell says Hellman was motivated by drugs. The guilty plea came as a result of an agreement between Cornwell and Hellman's attorney, Ron Benjamin. The teens' mother, Cindy Fortner, who assisted Hellman in the kidnapping, pleaded guilty to conspiracy charges last week. She faces anywhere from 2 and a half to 8 years in prison.

The City of Binghamton has reached an agreement with a social club on Chenango Street that it had threatened to lock down. The Elks Club Antler Lodge, a fraternal non-profit organization serving a mostly African-American clientele, has agreed to a series of restrictions on its operation. In order to avoid a lockdown, the lodge will no longer serve alcohol after midnight, all patrons must leave by 12:30 and all staff by 1:30 in the morning. The Antler Lodge also agreed to operate video surveillance and make those recordings available to Binghamton Police on request.

The club was first threatened with a lockdown following a murder outside the lodge in July of last year. Mayor David says there's been a lot of back and forth negotiations since then. Christina Archie is a lead officer with Elks United. She says it's not a night club but rather a social hall with a bar and banquet room to host bridal and baby showers and other receptions. Today, a memorial gathering was being held to honor the son of one of the founding members who recently passed. Archie says there's never been a disturbance inside the Elks Home. She says the Mayor is being misleading and deceitful. Mayor David says the Lodge has agreed to sell its building to STK Partners which is developing a 2 and a half million dollar housing and commercial development next door. Archie says that Elks United may reconsider the deal.

The 2 witnesses that saw Trooper Chris Skinner during his final moments of life testified in court today. 62-year old Almond Upton faces a 1st degree murder charge for intentionally driving into Skinner Minutes before the crash, Skinner noticed a black B-M-W speeding along Interstate 81. The driver of the B-M-W, Sarfaraz Prumoni of New Jersey, testified that Skinner put his lights on and proceeded to pull him over. Prumoni says he gave his license and registration to Skinner. Seconds later, he says he felt a massive impact and his airbags went off. He says he could not open the drivers-side door, and he and his passenger, Ikramuddin Mondani exited out the passenger side. Prumoni says they immediately began looking for Skinner and only found his uniform hat sitting on the shoulder near the front of his BMW. Then, State Trooper Craig Sicina was called to the stand. Sicina says he and Skinner were detecting speeders along I-81. He says Skinner picked up the B-M-W going at 83 miles per hour. Sicina says Skinner offered him the stop, but Sicina declined and said he would pull over the next one. While conducting a traffic stop moments later, Sicina heard heavy scanner traffic and drove to the scene. Upon arrival he says he noticed a large pile of mud and grass. When he approached the pile he noticed bones sticking out. He said "I knew what it was, but didn't want to know what it was." He then called for help and said "it didn't look good."

After deliberating for 7 hours, the jury in the Almond Upton murder trial has not generated a verdict. Upton is accused of killing New York State Trooper Christopher Skinner in 2014 on Interstate 81 and faces a 1st degree murder charge. The jury submitted many notes to Judge Joe Cawley regarding clarifications of definitions and requests for testimony. First, they wanted an explanation of the meaning "lack of substantial capacity to know or appreciate," a reference to Public Defender Mike Baker's insanity defense. Then, they were read the testimony of Trooper Orry Ostrander, the man who took Upton into custody. Later in the afternoon, the jury requested testimony from Upton's son Michael and wife Judy. On the stand, Judy and Michael said Upton's behavior was erratic and paranoid. Finally, they were looking to hear from Ostrander regarding the timetable between the moment Upton hit Skinner and when he was taken into custody. However, Baker and special Prosecutor Ben Bergman both debated about what the jury had requested for over 30 minutes. Deliberations continue tomorrow.

Russia's only track and field competitor has been suspended for the remainder of the Olympics. Darya Klishina is a long jumper who was allowed to compete after appealing to the international track and field governing body. She was the only 1 of 136 Russians who appealed and got the green light to compete in Rio. The track and field federation said the suspension was based on new information received by the governing body. They did not elaborate on this new information. Klishina has appealed the suspension to the court of arbitration for sport. The rest of the Russian track and field team was barred from the Rio games after a report revealed "systematic doping" among Russian athletes, by the world anti-doping agency. The report said the doping was supported by the Russian government over several years, including at the 2014 Sochi winter Olympics. To compete in the Olympics, Russian athletes had to prove they were not involved in the doping system and were subjected to drug tests outside the country.

2 local lawmakers are calling on Albany to revise its policy regarding the expiration of sex offenders from the registry. Binghamton City Councilman Conrad Taylor and Broome County Legislator Mary Kaminsky held a news conference at Cheri Lindsey Park. The Democrats say a level-one offender is removed from the database after 20 years. Level 1 offenders are considered by the courts to be the least dangerous, in comparison to levels 2 and 3. Taylor says 17 sex offenders have come off the registry since January in Broome County. He says these people are harmful and do not belong in our community. David Lindsey is a Northside resident who used to represent the neighborhood on the Broome County Legislature. As a former police officer, he's been keeping tabs on sex offenders who move into the area. He says once they're released from the registry, it makes it difficult to check up on them. Lindsey also has a tragic personal history with the threat posed by sex offenders. His 12 year-old daughter Cheri, for whom the park is named, was killed by a convicted sex offender while she was on her paper route in 1984. Taylor and Kaminsky are encouraging the State Assembly to pass 2 bills which would revise the law. Taylor says he'd like to see offenders stay on the registry for 30 years instead of 20. The 2 lawmakers are also urging residents to sign a petition about the issue.

Last week's 10-car pile up on Route 17 is getting national attention after a dash cam video from the incident showcased a heroic effort to save a woman from her burning car. On Monday, Mayor Rich David released this dash cam video that broadcasted the entire incident as it unfolded. The accident occurred when a tractor trailer's brakes failed, causing it to barrel into a number of cars on the highway. An elderly woman was trapped in her vehicle until 4 good samaritans, Ed Staff, Doug Kumpon, Albert Fiori and Chris White came to her aid. Right after the crash, they got out of their cars when they saw the woman in distress pleading for help. They worked to free her from the car and pulled her out just as her vehicle had burst into flames. While other people were passing by and taking photos of the scene. They were able to use a fire extinguisher to break the window and drag the woman out. That fire fighting tool played a big role in freeing her from the vehicle, as more flames began spitting out of her car. The woman was treated with minor injuries. Emergency responders say it was a miracle that nobody died. The driver of the tractor trailer was ticketed for inadequate breaks. All 4 met with Mayor Rich David where he recognized them as heroes. The video made national headlines and was featured on NBC and ABC news, along with CNN.

From June of 2011 to June of this year, the Mohawk Valley, southern tier and Central New York only noticed around a one percent growth in the workforce or a few thousand private sector jobs. Western New York and Finger Lakes had nearly 4 percent growth all a fraction compared to New York cities 16 percent and 535,000 jobs out of the 824,000 created under the governor. While Pokalsky says you can't deny Cuomo's attention to upstate, citing developing regional economic development councils and the state's multi-million dollar competitions, the state needs to focus on incentives, like healthcare and workers compensation to keep companies here longer. Until numbers return to pre-recession figures the business council says New York has work to do. Cuomo's office offered the following statement: while there is always more work to do, programs such as regional economic development councils, upstate revitalization initiative and the buffalo billion are continuing to build on this administration's work and unprecedented commitment of resources and energy to upstate.

The owner of a popular Binghamton business is at odds with City officials after its expansion project was forced to come to a halt. The Old Union Bar and Restaurant on Clinton Street has recently began installing a newly-expanded indoor dining area, a 2nd floor kitchen along with an outdoor patio. Owner Adam Kipp says he spoke with code enforcement officials about every detail in the project and was given the go-ahead. 7-weeks later, Kipp was told he was in violation because he needed to add a sprinkler system. The sprinklers are a state requirement, not a City mandate. Kipp says he was never told he had to add it until well after construction had started. He's says he's offered different solutions and alternatives, but code enforcement won't budge. The City's fire marshal says "Our primary goal is to make sure every project meets New York State fire safety codes to ensure public safety. These fire safety codes are stringent but important." Mayor Rich David says he has met with both sides and they are trying to resolve the issue. NewsChannel 34 reported on a similar situation at Robot City Arcade in March, which is also located on Clinton.
