They also talked about what you can do to help CASA bring these kids into a better life through donating to CASA. CASA provides meals, clothes, and more to these children so that their life does not skip a beat when their parents may not be there for them.</p>
<p>Conservation agents Ben Pursley and Todd Wright come in monthly to talk about everything going on in the outdoors. Restaurant owners often ask UMS when the craft fair is so that they can stock up on supplies for the large influx of people that come into Union for the fair. Some of the items sold at the fair include roasted nuts, pottery, soaps, wood items, and much more.</p>

The FCHS hosts many adoption events throughout the year so that they can help these local stray dogs and cats.</p>

Buddies Not Bullies is a not-for-profit organization that looks to reduce bullying by providing prevention education in area schools. This education was made due to a rise in bullying in area schools. Over 10,000 children have received services through the program since 2005.</p>

Glenda Volmert is the Franklin County CASA Director. She joins the show on a monthly basis for updates on the program.</p>	Dec. 2nd	7:45	15 minutes	<p>There are children in foster care who have no one in their lives to speak for them about their future. A CASA volunteer does that and more by being a stable and guiding person in their lives. Training for Advocates begins in October and Glenda joins the show to promote and encourage people to the program.</p>

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<p>The Franklin County Literacy Council came in this month to talk about how they help adults to improve their literacy skills. The help does not stop there, they also help adults who need to study for their GED, or adults preparing for college.
