Jerry Brown on Wednesday signed a pack of bills that will raise the smoking age in California from 18 to 21, restrict the use of electronic cigarettes in public places and expand no-smoking areas at public schools.</p> <p>However, Brown vetoed a bill that would have allowed counties to seek voter approval of local tobacco taxes to pay for healthcare expenses for those with tobacco-related illnesses.</p> <p>“Although California has one of the lowest cigarette tax rates in the nation, I am reluctant to approve this measure in view of all the taxes being proposed for the 2016 ballot,” Brown wrote in his veto message for a bill authored by Assemblyman Richard Bloom (D-Santa Monica).</p> <p>Brown did not comment on the other bills that he signed, but state Sen. Ed Hernandez (D-West Covina) said approval of his bill raising the smoking age will save lives.</p>

Jerry Brown on Friday could help undocumented immigrants in California obtain health insurance through the Covered California health insurance exchange, part of the Affordable Care Act. While the Affordable Care Act currently excludes undocumented immigrants from federal coverage options, the bill — officially termed Senate Bill 10 — allows the state to apply for a waiver from the federal government that would enable Covered California to sell insurance plans to undocumented Californians. A UC Berkeley report revealed last year that as many as 1.5 million undocumented Californians are projected to stay uninsured by 2019. While many undocumented immigrants have health insurance through other means such as a job or through the private market, the report found most of these immigrants are uninsured.

The US Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit upheld the injunction by a 2-1 vote on November 9, 2015. The Obama Administration asked the Supreme Court to review this decision, and the court will be taking it up tomorrow. Millions of Latinos anxiously await the ruling.</p>
