WJMN provides its listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Education and Community: Talked about the work of the Bay State Model Railroad Museum, the layouts they have on display, and their efforts to connect with their community. Many model railroad lovers have setups in their basement, a bedroom, or the garage, but in Roslindale, MA, model train enthusiasts have spent decades creating a museum dedicated to the craft of creating intricate train layouts. The members of the Bay State Model Railroad Museum love to lay track, paint, build, and create, and the public can get a chance to see their work up close and personal.
- Environment: All activities planned for the winter months at the New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill, including an "Orchids After Dark" event. The Garden has opportunities for everyone to embrace nature all year long, no matter what the weather, on their 170+ acres of manicured grounds.
- Environment / Climate: Talked about the New England Forestry Foundation's work and "30 Percent Solution" to mitigate the impacts of our changing climate on the land we love. Millions of lush, healthy trees make up New England's forests, and those trees could end up being a major player in the fight against climate change. For nearly a century, the New England Forestry Foundation has made it their duty to conserve and cultivate our woodlands, and as we look ahead to an uncertain future, the Foundation is embarking on a new five-year pilot program, hoping to utilize the very trees we enjoy to help reduce our carbon emissions.
- Family/Community: How Big Brothers Big Sisters of Eastern Massachusetts serves the community and is in need of mentors. They talked about their mission and the benefits of volunteering for both "Bigs" and "Littles".
- Gender / Armed Forces Service: Talked about U.S.S. Constitution Commander Billie J. Farrell's journey through the Navy, what it's like living as a transplant in New England, the legacy she wants to leave behind to women in the service, and an upcoming award ceremony. In April, Farrell receives the "Third Lantern" award from Old North Illuminated at the "Lanterns & amp; Luminaries" event.
- Genealogy: Talked about American Ancestors' 10 Million Names project and how genealogical work can be especially difficult for people directly related to some of the millions of men, women, and children who were enslaved in pre-and-post colonial America through chattel slavery. 10 Million Names is a collaborative project dedicated to recovering the names of the estimated 10 million men, women, and children of African descent who were enslaved in pre- and post-colonial America between the 1500s and 1865 and seeks to amplify the voices of people who have been telling their family stories for centuries, connect researchers and data partners with people seeking answers to family history questions, and expand access to data, resources, and information about enslaved African Americans.
- Government: Boston City Councilor At-Large Ruthzee Louijeune talked about her work as the first Haitian-American to serve on the council, her inauguration and path to the Council's presidency, current events, her plans to bring integrity and accountability to the Council, and what her priorities are for her term.
- Health: Talked about why oral health is so important and how the UMass Chan Medical School in Worcester, MA, is utilizing new grant to help restore dental health and develop more self-confidence in recovering addicts. Many people who are struggling with addiction are also dealing with a major hurdle to recovery: poor dental health that's caused by the use of substances like drugs or alcohol.
- Health / Family / Charity: Talked about Zebra Crossings' work and special programs that not just help boost confidence and self-love in children with chronic health conditions, but also give families some respite in a safe, understanding environment. Kids are incredibly resilient, but it can be hard to be strong all the time when you're suffering from a chronic condition like asthma, epilepsy, or heart problems. The same goes for their parents. Managing health conditions and trying to provide as "normal" a childhood as possible can take a toll on families. Zebra Crossings in Dover, NH is always around to help.
- Race Relations: Talked about a recent "Harm Report," a comprehensive look at how slavery and centuries of systemic racism against Black Bostonians has impacted seven key aspects of life, including housing, transportation, healthcare, and income. The report also outlined suggestions from the team at Embrace Boston on how the city can move forward in a more equitable manner and address the harms against the Black
