But one day, the punks and the jocks clashed resulting in an all-week fight. And, eventually ending with the death of Brian Denehy who was crushed beneath the wheels of Dustin Camp's car.

"THE TROUBLE WITH MANKIND" (MANKIND)

Chris Cuomo looks at what is being done to Mike Foley, a professional wrestler who, due to his job, has the body of an eighty-year-old man. Foley has gotten the nickname of "Mankind" because of his very dangerous and crazy wrestling. With two kids now, Mike Foley has decided to retire from the sport and has recently written a book about his career and the behind the scenes of the matches.

"FREE FALL FROM FAME" (JAN MICHAEL VINCENT)

“VANISHED—THE POWER OF FORGIVENESS” (FORGIVENESS HOUR)

Robin Roberts with a special story of forgiveness. Marietta Jaegar and her family were on what was supposed to be their dream vacation, camping in Montana, when her youngest child, 7-year old Susie Jaegar, was kidnapped. A year later, the kidnapper called Marietta with a taunting call saying that he had little Susie. FBI profilers say the conversation was perfectly conducted by Marietta who kept the kidnapper on the phone for over an hour asking him a line of questions. After reviewing the conversation tapes, police concluded that the man on the tape had probably been questioned at one point and then released. David Meierhoffer was questioned in Susie’s kidnapping, but was released before being named as a prime suspect. After an intense investigation, Meierhoffer was arrested and confessed to kidnapping and killing Susie in addition to committing other murders. Now Marietta Jaegar had to learn to forgive what this serial killer had done to her daughter and why his psychological problems fell out of his control.

“WHAT A DEAL!” (TOBACCO UPDATES)
