The World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates (WASDE) for August found that the number of acres of corn and soybeans farmers are on track to harvest this fall is more than earlier predictions, meaning the wet spring and late planting in some areas didn't have as adverse an effect as USDA initially estimated. Still, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Ohio and South Dakota are expected to have corn yields lower than last year and of the major corn-producing states, only Missouri looks poised to do better than last year.
