RE: Adult Female Abduction/Murder

On April 5, 2023, at about 7:22 a.m., State Police in Ithaca responded to a reported abduction of an adult female at 110 West Hill Circle in the Town of Ithaca. A witness reported the victim, Tatiana N. David, 34, of Ithaca, was forced into a white SUV by the suspect, Michael C. Davis, 34, of Richmond, VA, against her will. An endangered adult alert was then issued statewide by New York State Police and the New York State Intelligence Center with information about the victim, suspect and vehicle. A command post was established at State Police Ithaca and a search initiated. The victim and the suspect were in a previous relationship and have a four-year-old child together.

At approximately 9:25 p.m., the suspect vehicle was detected on I-495 crossing into the State of Virginia. Virginia State Police stopped the vehicle, at which time Davis, the operator of the vehicle, fled the scene, leading Virginia State Police on a pursuit which ended when the suspect vehicle crashed in a wooded area at approximately 10:05 p.m., Davis began firing at Virginia State Police, who returned fire. The suspect was critically wounded and was transported to Inova Fairfax Hospital and is in critical condition.

The victim, Tatiana N. David, was located deceased outside the vehicle at the crash location with an apparent gunshot wound. Her cause of death is pending investigation and an autopsy is scheduled for later today.

The investigation is ongoing.

RE: Department of Agriculture Bill

Sen. Gene Yaw (R-District 23, including Bradford and Tioga counties), a member of the Senate Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee, recently signed a letter urging the U.S. Department of Agriculture to allow whole and 2% milk to again be offered in school cafeterias. In 2010, Congress passed a bill prohibiting whole milk from being served in schools, and former President Obama signed it into law.

The letter, signed by Yaw and other members of the Senate Republican Caucus, was sent in accordance with the unanimous passage last month of Senate Resolution 48.

"Prohibiting certain milk from being served in schools is not only harmful to Pennsylvania's dairy farmers and agricultural economy, but it also prevents our students from accessing the nutrients necessary to support cell growth, lower blood pressure, and improve bone, heart, and brain health," Yaw said.

Yaw also urged constituents to participate in the <u>USDA's open public comment</u> <u>period</u> for their proposed rule regarding Child Nutrition Programs, which closes on Wednesday, May 10.

RE: OASC recognized as Best Communities for Music Education designation

Owego Apalachin Central School District has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education for the fifth year.

In its 24th year, the Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. To qualify for the Best Communities designation, OACSD answered detailed questions about music class participation, performance opportunities, collaborative projects, instruction time, facilities, and support for the music programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

"Our district-wide approach and the support from the entire Owego Apalachin community are among the contributing factors to receiving this designation. It is wonderful that our music education program is being recognized and celebrated again for the vast opportunities our student's experience during their time with us. These opportunities and this award would not be possible without our excellent music staff, talented students, supportive administrators, and continued community support," said Dr. Corey Green, OACSD superintendent

Research into music education continues to demonstrate educational/cognitive and social skill benefits for children who make music: After two years of music education, researchers found that participants showed more substantial improvements in how the brain processes speech and reading scores than their less-involved peers and that students who are involved in music are not only more likely to graduate high school but

also to attend college as well. In addition, everyday listening skills are stronger in musically trained children than those without music training. Significantly, listening skills are closely tied to perceiving speech in a noisy background, paying attention, and keeping sounds in memory.

Later in life, individuals who took music lessons as children show stronger neural processing of sound: young adults and even older adults who have not played an instrument for up to 50 years show enhanced neural processing compared to their peers. Social benefits include conflict resolution, teamwork skills, and giving and receiving constructive criticism.

RE: Congressman Dan Meuser visits local manufacturing facility

U.S. Congressman Dan Meuser, whose 9th District includes Bradford County, recently participated in a series of events in Sayre, which became a part of the 9th Congressional District at beginning of this year. Meuser met with business and community leaders, toured the Cabinetworks manufacturing plant, and heard from officials and staff of the Guthrie Clinic.

"I am impressed with the vision of those who took the time to meet with my team and me and share their ideas," Meuser commented. "I met so many people who are incredibly devoted to what they do and are excited to call Sayre their home. I look forward to working on their behalf in Washington on the many suggestions that were offered at these productive meetings."

At the invitation of Linet McLinko, owner of Kisak Fair Trade, and Melanie Stratton, proprietor of Doggy Doos Boutique and Bakery, a small business listening session was held at Angry Burrito Company Bar and Grill on Lehigh Street. Attendees included Christopher Desrochers, vice president of Community Development; Henry Farley, mayor of Sayre Borough; David Jarrett, manager of Sayre Borough, and Timothy Hickey, South Waverly Borough Mayor. Business leaders joined with the Central Bradford Chamber of Commerce, the Central Bradford Progress Authority, the Sayre Business Association, and the Greater Valley Chamber of Commerce to discuss the challenges faced during covid, the recent addition of a community-driven trail project to enhance the area's quality of life, a survey conducted to determine what residents want, and ideas they would like to see Meuser bring to Washington.

Meuser also toured Cabinetworks, a manufacturer that produces 10 million cabinets nationwide each year, with an estimated 550,000 of them installed in the homes of consumers across the country. Included in the tour were Tom Woods, plant manager; Jeff Counts, plant superintendent; Marla Zwas, chief legal officer; David Weathers, vice president of manufacturing, and Erin Smith, human resources manager. Headquartered in Ann Arbor, Mich., the company generates \$2.2 billion in revenue a year and is the country's largest independently owned manufacturer and distributor of kitchen and bath cabinetry. The plant in Sayre manufactures high-end components and employs 300 people. The company is the largest purchaser of green lumber in the cabinetry industry. The business manufactures the brands KraftMaid, Medallion, and Merillat.

The tour's final stop was at the Guthrie Clinic, where Meuser met with Dr. Ed Sabanegh, president and CEO; Attorney Ken Levitsky, chair, and Henry Dunn, broker, Henry Dunn Inc. Representatives from the hospital described its rural comprehensive delivery systems, emphasizing the goal of keeping patients close to home while optimizing resources. The staff discussed teaching the next generation of physicians, their participation in clinical trials, and the use of cutting-edge procedures that allow patients to be treated with shorter hospitalizations, leading to quicker recoveries. Meuser was given a demonstration of the hospital's DaVinci XI Robot by Dr. Nicholas Serniak. The surgical device shortens hospital stays and helps patients return to a normal routine in a shorter time frame.

"Those who live in Sayre are fortunate enough to have excellent and forward-thinking leaders," Meuser emphasized. "Their focus on revitalization, education, hospitality, and recreation makes it a great place to live, work, and raise a family."

RE: Guthrie Clinic opens new specialty and rehabilitation services facility

Guthrie Clinic has unveiled a new, innovative care delivery system which incorporates people, process, structure and technology. The Guthrie Pulse Center, in the Guthrie Big Flats Specialty and Rehabilitation Services building in Horseheads, is a first-of-its-kind in the region and offers centralized operational and patient care functions, and greater access to clinical expertise, regardless of where the patient is being treated.

The Pulse Center incorporates the use of a virtual care team to support the bedside nurses and providers. In-room computers, high quality video cameras and audio monitors transmit data including vital signs, test results and imaging exams from patients' bedsides to the Guthrie Pulse Center. Additionally, high-definition televisions and video cameras allow Pulse Center staff to communicate with bedside staff, patients and their families.

Re: Route 199 construction project

Dave Radigan interviewed Kevin Smith, project manager of the Route 199 construction project.

A four-year reconstruction project continues this week on Route 199 in Sayre and Athens, Bradford County. The 2.6-mile project is located .44 miles north of the intersection with Route 1056 (Front Street) in Athens Borough to the intersection with Interstate 17 (Southern Tier Expressway) at the New York state line in Sayre Borough. The project begins at the New York state line and works south.

Detour to Begin Monday

On Monday, June 12, Route 199 (Main Street) will be closed to northbound traffic between Chemung Street and Woodworth Street, while the contractor, Kriger Construction, continues work on this full depth pavement reconstruction project. Work includes drainage improvements, utility relocation, sidewalk and curb improvements, ADA curb ramp installations, traffic signal upgrades, driveway adjustments, signing and pavement markings and other miscellaneous construction.

Detour information:

- Northbound cars will follow a 1.24-mile detour using Chemung Street, South Elmer Avenue, and West Lockhart Street.
- Southbound cars will be maintained in the work zone. Truck traffic will follow a 7.7-mile detour using Route 220 and Interstate 17 (Southern Tier Expressway).

Motorists should be alert, slow down, expect delays, watch for changing traffic patterns and drive with caution through the work zone.

Kriger Construction, Inc., is the prime contractor on this \$16.5 million, four-year roadway reconstruction project. The project is expected to be completed in the Fall of 2024.

RE: Legislation establishes Independent Energy Office in Pennsylvania

Sen. Gene Yaw (R-23) has introduced legislation to establish an Independent Energy Office (IEO) in the Commonwealth.

"Pennsylvania has one of the most diverse energy portfolios in the United States," Yaw said. "There is no question we can capitalize on our state's energy richness, but first we must stop apologizing for it. I believe an Independent Energy Office can provide impartial, timely, and data driven analysis to guide our state in determining and meeting future energy needs."

According to an analysis conducted in November by the U.S. Energy Information Administration (EIA):

- Pennsylvania's marketed natural gas production, primarily from the Marcellus Shale, reached a record 7.6 trillion cubic feet in 2021, and the state is the nation's second-largest natural gas producer after Texas.
- Pennsylvania is the third-largest coal-producing state in the nation after Wyoming and West Virginia, and it is the second-largest coal exporter to foreign markets after West Virginia.
- In 2021, Pennsylvania ranked second in the nation after Illinois in electricity generation from nuclear power.
- Over half of Pennsylvania households use natural gas as their primary home heating fuel, and the state's 48 underground gas storage sites—the most for any state—help meet regional heating demand in winter.
- Pennsylvania is the second-largest net supplier of total energy to other states, after Texas.

Yaw noted the IEO would be modeled after Pennsylvania's Independent Fiscal Office (IFO), which was created by **Act 120 of 2010** and **Act 100 of 2016**. The IFO does not support or oppose any policy it analyzes, and discloses the methodologies, data sources and assumptions used in published reports and estimates.
