COMMUNITY ISSUES IN THE 3RD QUARTER OF 2015

What were some of the issues in our community? Read on.

ADAM HOME RAID REVEALS PLANNED TERROR ATTACK:

The estranged son of a respected Boston police captain was arrested July 4th by FBI agents as part of a counter-terrorism operation against alleged ISIS-inspired domestic terrorists. 23 year old Alexander Ciccolo, of Adams, was taken into custody on gun charges after buying two pistols and two rifles from an undercover FBI confidential informant. It was later revealed that Ciccolo was planning an attack at an unnamed University, and wanted to broadcast student execution over the internet.

FOURTH TRIAL FOR WILLIAM DEMAGAL:

The Mayoral Race started off as a three-candidate race between Incumbent Mayor Richard Alcombright, former long-time mayor John Barrett III, and local artist and developer Eric Rudd. Barrett served 26 years as mayor before being defeated by Alcombright. The preliminary election on September 22nd whittled the race down to two candidates – Alcombright and Barrett III, setting up a contentions run-up the November 3rd general election. Eric Rudd had dismal support at the polls during the preliminary. Barret actually beat Alcombright in every Ward. Voter turnout was however very low.

BMC NORTH CONTINUES TO EXPAND SERVICES:

Berkshire Health Systems announced in September the creation of a community-focused Neighborhood for Health at its Northern Berkshire campus, an expansion of services there that includes mental health, addiction and chronic illness treatment. The new services, under the Neighborhood for Health umbrella, will provide treatment for those with long-term physical health issues, as well as underscore prevention and the overall quality of life for those in the community.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE SCHOOL DISTRICT LOOKS TO BRING LANESBOROUGH IN:

The town of Lanesborough could save \$1.6 million a year by joining the Adams-Cheshire Regional School District according to officials. That possibility is gaining momentum as 4th quarter begins to get underway.

BERKSHIRE DA SAYS PAIR ARE PART OF A LARGER INVESTIGATION (AII)

Two Springfield men are both being held on significant bail following arraignments in Berkshire Superior Court Wednesday on narcotics and conspiracy charges. Berkshire District Attorney David Capeless declined to provide details about the men's arrests and their cases. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 39 year old Rashaan Bryant pleaded not guilty to charges of trafficking in heroin, trafficking in cocaine, and two counts of conspiracy to violate drug laws. He was ordered held on \$50,000 bail by Judge Mary-Lou Rup. 26 year old Rafael Santos pleaded not guilty to three counts of conspiracy to violate drug laws and was ordered held on \$20,000 bail. Both men are accused of conspiring with others to sell cocaine and heroin in Berkshire County between December of last year and April this year, and Bryant is accused of selling cocaine and heroin during that same period of time. Both men are due back in court for pre-trial hearings in November.

VILLAGE AMBULANCE ADDS WHEELCHAIR LIFTS (NA)

Village Ambulance Service is now transporting mobility-impaired clients as part of a new non-emergency medical transport service. IBerkshires.com reports that the service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is available for medical and non-medical travel. The service grew out of a partnership between Village Ambulance and Williams College, which saw an increased need for transportation to the hospital, especially after nearby North Adams Regional Hospital closed in 2014.

BERKSHIRE EAGLE PARENT COMPANY, DIGITAL FIRST, CUTS NEW ENGLAND STAFF (All)

The subsidiary of a media giant that generates around \$1.4 billion in revenues from its 800-plus digital and online platforms swooped through *The Berkshire Eagle*, the only daily newspaper left in the Berkshires, and its other regional newspapers last Friday and wiped out numerous positions. The Berkshire Edge.com reports that according to anonymous sources at *The Eagle*, New England Newspapers, Inc., subsidiary of Denver-based Digital First Media, also "released" employees on Monday at *The Eagle*, *The Brattleboro Reformer*, *The Bennington Banner* and *The Manchester Journal*. Digital First controls 160 weekly and 76 daily newspapers, including the *San Jose Mercury News* and *The Denver Post*. Of the five employees laid off from *The Eagle*, one was the editor of Berkshires Week, Kate Abbott, leading to speculation that the weekly magazine will no longer be published. Others laid off were a security guard, a marketing employee and an IT systems worker.

BIG Y DONATES 50,000 POUNDS OF PET FOOD TO LOCAL SHELTERS (AII)

Big Y Foods has donated more than 50,000 pounds of pet food and supplies to more than 50 different local animal shelters. The food and supplies were compiled during Big Y's "May is Pet Month" initiative, which ran in all 61 Big Y stores from April 30th-May 31st. Shoppers were encouraged to purchase food and other supplies for a local shelter during that time period. Each Big Y chose a local pet shelter to donate items to. Big Y operates Berkshire markets in Adams, Great Barrington, Lee, North Adams and Pittsfield.

FOX FOUND TO BE RABID (NA)

The State Lab in Jamaica Plain has confirmed that the fox killed on Sunday in North Adams was positive for rabies. Police are asking residents in the immediate areas around Chantilly and Versaille avenues to be on the lookout for any animals acting irregular. The signs can range from disoriented, to falling over, to coming too close to humans. Pet owners should confirm their pets are up to date on their rabies vaccine because the disease can be easily spread through saliva contact. You may not realize your pet has come into contact with a rabid animal. Anyone who had contact with this rabid fox should call 617-983-6800 for the rabies control program at the state Department of Agriculture.

VICTIM OF PITTSFIELD SHOOTING UPGRADED TO STABLE CONDITION (P - interest)

The most seriously wounded victim in Saturday's shooting in Pittsfield continues to improve at Baystate Medical Center in Springfield, according to officials there. The 20-year-old man, who has not been identified, was upgraded from critical to stable condition. Five people were shot – one fatally, in the incident that occurred in a vacant lot on Linden Street about 11pm Saturday.

BAIL REDUCED FOR NORTH ADAMS MAN WHO ALLEGEDLY RECEIVED DRUGS BY MAIL (NA)

Bail has been reduced for a North Adams man accused of receiving methamphetamine in the mail with plans to distribute it. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 53 year old Mark Ring was being held on \$15,000 bail following May arraignment in Berkshire Superior Court on a lone count of possession of crystal methamphetamine with intent to distribute (second offense). That bail was reduced to \$7,000 cash or \$70,000 surety by agreement between prosecutors and Ring's attorney, Ring was arrested on April 7th after picking up the package from the Post Office. He is due back in court on August 19th for a pre-trial hearing.

NORTH ADAMS, FREIGHT YARD PUB SETTLE PARKING LAWSUIT (NA)

The North Adams Redevelopment Authority and its tenant Freight Yard Pub have reached a settlement after having "exhausted every appeal" over a lawsuit initiated by FYP in 2011. IBerkshires.com reports that the authority on Monday voted unanimously to pay the restaurant, operating as Bay State Hospitality Group Inc., a sum of \$287,574. The restaurant has agreed to place a sum of \$42,416 in escrow to secure one year's payment of rent.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE SETS OVERRIDE INFORMATIONAL MEETINGS (NA)

The Selectmen and members of the Adams-Cheshire Regional School Committee on Tuesday set dates and procedures to better inform the public of the need for a Proposition 2 1/2 override to fund the school budget. IBerkshires.com reports that School Committee Chairman Paul Butler said there will be meetings Thursday, July 23rd, and Monday, July 27th, in the Cheshire Elementary School auditorium. Both meetings will be at 6:30.

FBI, LOCAL OFFICIALS MUM ON ADAMS RAID (NA)

Nearly a week after the FBI, local police and firefighters descended on an Adams home on the Fourth of July, officials remain tight-lipped about the nature of the operation — and residents remain concerned. Local first responders and members of an FBI Emergency Response Team were seen repeatedly entering and leaving the house at 10 Murray St. on Saturday evening. The Berkshire Eagle reports that a spokeswoman for the FBI in Boston confirmed that the bureau had conducted "court-authorized activity" at that address. She declined to elaborate. Local police and fire officials also have declined to comment on the investigation. Residents reported seeing authorities remove many boxes from the home.

NORTH ADAMS BEACH PARTY SET FOR THIS AFTERNOON (NA)

The 17th annual North Adams Eagle Street Beach Party will be held today night beginning at 3:30. About 125 tons of sand donated by Specialty Minerals is being spread by the Department of Public Works along the historic one-way street to create a community sculpture. The sand will later be stored for use at Fish Pond's beach. The beach event has become a summer staple in the city after it was started by artist Eric Rudd in 1999. It starts with the family friendly event from 3:30 to 5:30pm, followed by 6th annual Evening Fiesta for adults from 7 to 10pm.

MCLA SETS 'AGGRESSIVE' SCHEDULE FOR 2ND PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH (NA)

Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts is hoping to a have a new president in place by winter. IBerkshires.com reports that the trustees yesterday approved a new search committee with the goal of having candidates on campus by late fall. Cynthia Brown, vice president of academic affairs, has been serving as interim president since the departure of President Mary Grant last year to become chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Asheville. The college's choice to replace her, Greg Summers of the University of Wisconsin, declined the post for personal reasons after a months- long search.

PLANNED REVICED TO WRECK WORN DOWN MILL HOUSES (NA)

A row of dilapidated houses on Houghton Street in North Adams again is facing the wrecking ball. The Berkshire Eagle reports that at the request of Mayor Richard Alcombright, the Historical Commission voted on Wednesday to lift a one-year stay of demolition, which was set to expire August 21st. The buildings had been scheduled for demolition last summer, but commission member Alan Horbal and others fought to save the homes, once used to house workers in local mills, to convert them into a walk-through museum.

CLARKSBURG BRIDGE PROJECT BIDS OVER BUDGET (NA)

Clarksburg Town officials are hoping the third time's a charm for Gates Avenue, IBerkshires.com is reporting that the town's select board on Wednesday night voted to rebid the project after last week's bids once again came in too high. Town Administrator Carl McKinney said last week's bid came in at \$525,000, not significantly lower than the bids received in the first round. A second bid could not be considered because the contractor is not currently on the state-certified list. The town has been trying to replace the old culvert for several years.

ADAMS TERROR SUSPECT ORDERED HELD UNTIL TRIAL (AII)

The Adams man the federal government suspects of hatching a terror plot will be imprisoned until his trial. 23 year old Alexander Ciccolo was in federal court yesterday afternoon for a detention hearing. Ciccolo was ordered to remain behind bars while he awaits trial due to him being a flight risk and a danger to the community. Ciccolo was plotting to commit an act of domestic terrorism by detonating a bomb at a university. Prosecutors say Alexander Ciccolo also received four guns from a person cooperating with the FBI. He was arrested July 4th. His father, a veteran police Captain in Boston, alerted the FBI after his son said he wanted to join the Islamic State group. The police captain was not in court for his son's detention hearing yesterday.

ADAMS PARKS COMMISSION ASKS BART FOR FIELD COMPENSATION (NA)

The Adams Parks Commission wants the Berkshire Arts and Technology Charter Public School to provide compensation for the use of town sports fields. IBerkshires.com reports that BArT Assistant Principal Miles Wheat on Monday night asked for field use for the school's various sports practice and physical education classes. The commissioners however felt there should some compensation for the use of Valley Street and Russell fields. BArT, located near the busy Commercial Street corner with Park and Center streets, has no fields of its own. The commission tabled the request and asked Wheat to find a contract or agreement that exists between the town and the school.

MULTIMILLION PROJECT ENVISIONED FOR CARIDDI MILL IN NORTH ADAMS (NA)

A proposed multi-million dollar project could transform the Cariddi in Mill North Adams into a commercial, hospitality and retail center located directly between two of the biggest cultural attractions in New England — Mass MoCA and The Clark. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Greylock Works, a limited liability company, is seeking to purchase and reclaim the 342,000-square-foot mill at 508 State St. and the 7.8 acres it sits on, according to a public notice posted in The Berkshire Eagle by the Cain, Hibbard & Myers law firm. The mill was put up for sale, with an asking price of \$1.2 million, in October 2013. North Adams Mayor Richard Alcombright says the plans for the building are creative and hold a lot of potential.

CITY COUNCIL OK'S END OF YEAT TRANSFERS (NA)

The North Adams City Council last night approved the transfer of just over \$488,548 in available funds to balance overspent accounts in the fiscal 2015 budget. Iberkshires.com reports that monies were taken from salary and expense accounts in General Government, Public Safety, Public Services and unclassified. The largest account transfer was to snow & ice for \$127,058.12 and the smallest \$112.27 to the retirement of debt. Mayor Richard Alcombright and City Auditor David Fierro briefly reviewed the numbers, noting that battling the winter weather had accrued the most overages in terms of expenses and salaries.

NO BAIL FOR CICCOL (AII)

After his arrest on July 4, an Adams man suspected of plotting a terrorist attack told investigators the Islamic State terror group is doing "good work," and people who are executed by the organization are "criminals; the lowest of the low." The Berkshire Eagle reports that a recording of those statements, made by Alexander Ciccolo during his interrogation, was played during a detention hearing on Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Springfield. The 23 year old Adams man was ordered held without bail pending his trial on a charge of illegal possession of a firearm by a felon. He is also expected to face further charges. He was arrested near his home on Murray Street in Adams after accepting four weapons — two Glock handguns and a pair of automatic rifles — from an FBI informant.

CHESHIRE SELECTMEN EYE OPTIONS FOR CLOSED SAND MILL BRIDGE (NA)

The Cheshire Selectmen have agreed upon a solution for the Sand Mill Road Bridge but will wait to secure the funds before making an official decision. IBerkshires.com reports that Town Administrator Mark Webber told the board on Tuesday night that he received estimates on three scenarios for the bridge, which received a failing grade from the state in early spring and was shut down. Webber suggested the second option, which calls for a partial reconstruction of the bridge. The third option would be too completely repair the bridge at a cost of nearly \$500,000, which the town cannot afford. Residents near the bridge have been forced to take a four-mile detour.

SANDRA THOMAS BRINGS NEW DIRECTION FOR WILLIAMSTOWN FILM FESTIVAL (NA)

Big changes are coming to the Williamstown Film Festival for its 17th year. The Berkshire Eagle is reporting that new leadership, a new name and a new focus will grace the event, slated to run from October 15th to the 18th, in various Northern Berkshire venues. Sandra Thomas, the organization's new managing director, replaces longtime executive director Steve Lawson. A complete lineup and schedule of events will be announced around Labor Day, according to Thomas.

CLARK COMMUNITTY CELEBRATION PLANNED (NA)

The Clark Art Institute is inviting the community to a free celebration honoring Felda and Dena Hardymon Director Michael Conforti on Tuesday, July 21st at 6 pm, in conjunction with the free performance by fifties band Daddy-O! on the hill adjacent to the Clark Center. Free ice cream will be served. Visitors may bring a picnic or purchase barbecue fare. Conforti, who has served as director since November 1994, has been widely credited for his transformational leadership of the Institute and is recognized as a leading innovator and advocate in the museum community.

NORTH ADAMS AND ADAMS GET SHARE OF \$26M IN BLOCK GRANT FUNDS (NA)

Governor Baker's administration has awarded \$26 million in federally-funded grants to fund housing, transportation and other initiatives in dozens of smaller cities and towns around the state. The Community Development Block Grants are awarded to municipalities on a competitive basis to supplement local aid in the state budget. Baker handed out 33 block grants covering 65 cities and towns. The city of North Adams and the town of Adams are among the grant recipients. North Adams has been awarded \$825,000 and the town of Adams is receiving nearly \$581,000. The governor says the grant money will help communities "solve local problems with local solutions."

KEY QUESTIONED UNASWERED IN TERRORISM CASE (NA - interest)

After this week's court proceedings in Springfield, we know a lot more about the FBI investigation that had residents of Adams asking questions for more than a week. IBerkshires.com reports that there is much we still do not know about the United States v. Alexander Ciccolo. The biggest unknown at this point may be the charges that Ciccolo ultimately will face. The only count against the 23-year-old Adams man and estranged son of a Boston Police captain so far is possession of a firearm by a felon.

NEW BERKSHIRE COUNTY EDUCATION TASK FORCE TO MEET SATURDAY (NA, P)

As a response to a combination of challenges facing Berkshire County school districts, a series of summit meetings involving educational and municipal leaders begins this weekend to seek a range of possible solutions. The Berkshire Eagle reports that according to John Hockridge, Berkshire Division chairman of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees and a member of the North Adams School Committee – the newly formed Berkshire County Education Task Force will explore options, from doing nothing to sharing services and even realigning school district boundaries. Hockridge will lead the first public meeting of the group at 9 a.m. Saturday at Nessacus Regional Middle School in Dalton. In North Berkshire, the Adams-Cheshire, North Adams and Mount Greylock districts have been hard hit by the budget squeeze.

WEST NILE VIRUS FOUND IN SHEFFIELD MOSQUITO (GB - All Interest)

Health officials say West Nile virus has been found in a mosquito in Massachusetts for the first time this year. The state Department of Public Health announced yesterday that the infected mosquito was collected July 8th in the southern Berkshire town of Sheffield. There have been no human or animal cases of West Nile virus in the state this year. There were six human cases of West Nile virus in the state last year.

UNEMPLOYMENT REMAIN AT 4.6 PERCENT IN JUNE (AII)

The state's total unemployment rate remained at 4.6 percent in June, according to the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development. The new preliminary job estimates from the Bureau of Labor Statistics indicate Massachusetts gained 10,500 jobs in June, marking the tenth consecutive month of jobs gains. During the past four months, Massachusetts has added 38,900 jobs. Over the year, the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell 1.1 percent from 5.7 percent in June 2014. The unemployment rate in Massachusetts peaked in September 2009 at 8.8 percent.

NORTH ADAMS MAYORS FITNESS CHALLENGED DEEMED SUCCESS (NA)

Although losing to Pittsfield by nearly 100 points, the North Adams Mayor's Fitness Challenge was still deemed a success. IBerkshires.com reports that Mass in Motion Project Coordinator Amanda Chilson announced the results of the 10-week long fitness challenge over the weekend. In its second year, the challenge took on a bigger scope with Pittsfield joining in on the competition. Pittsfield won the challenge with an average of 1,237 points, but North Adams was right behind with 1,134. North Adams Mayor Richard Alcombright said that even though North Adams trailed by 100 points, the challenge still accomplished what it was supposed to do: get people thinking more about their health.

MEETINGS SET TO DISCUSS SUSTAINABLE MT. GREYLOCK SCHOOL PROJECT (NA) (Charrette is pronounced – Shuh-RETT)

The Williamstown Mount Greylock School Building Committee is inviting the public to share its ideas on how to incorporate sustainable elements into the design of the school building project. IBerkshires.com reports that the committee, which currently is choosing between two renovation/addition plans and one new construction design to advance to the Massachusetts School Building Authority, will host a "green building charrette" on Wednesday and Thursday at the school. The charrette will be facilitated by members of the architectural design team from Design Partnership of Cambridge. Attendees at Wednesday's meeting will work in groups to brainstorm strategies that will contribute to building and site sustainability and efficiency.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS, SOLAR INDUSTRY PUSH FOR NET METERING INCREASE (AII)

Utility companies have nearly hit the statewide net-metering cap and now environmentalists and the solar industry are pushing to raise it again. IBerkshires.com reports that Net Metering is a program that requires utility companies to buy unused energy produced by alternative or sustainable energy. The cap limits the amount the utility is required to buy from the sources and is currently around 5 percent of the total generation. With utility companies buying all that they are required to now, the financial incentive to build a large array has all but disappeared, leaving many proposed solar projects in limbo. Utility companies no longer need to buy the excess energy produced from large solar arrays, making the projects less financially feasible.

CHESHIRE SETS INFORMATIONAL MEETINGS ON OVERRIDE (NA)

The town and school officials in Cheshire are hosting two informational meetings on the upcoming override vote. Residents are encouraged to attend, IBerkshires.com reports that the meetings about the upcoming Proposition 2 1/2 override vote will take place this Thursday this week and on Monday next week in Cheshire. Both meetings will take place at 6:30 p.m. in the Cheshire Elementary School cafeteria. The forums are for the public to ask town and Adams-Cheshire Regional School District officials about the school budget and consequences of a rejected override.

JUDGE WON'T MOVE TRIALS OF 2 MEN IN UMASS DORM RAPE CASE (AII)

A judge has refused to move the trials of the last two defendants accused of raping a University of Massachusetts Amherst student almost three years ago. Attorneys for 21-year-old Adam Liccardi of Pittsfield and 20-year-old Caleb Womack of Windsor Locks, Connecticut, say they can't get fair trials in Hampshire County because of extensive media coverage. Liccardi's trial is to begin August 24th. Two other men have been convicted and sentenced to prison for raping the student in her dorm room in October 2012. Liccardi and the two previously convicted men said the sex was consensual. Womack denies having sex with the woman. None of the men were UMass students, but all knew the woman.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE WELCOMES NEW TECHNOLOGY DIRECTOR (NA)

Superintendent Kristen Gordon introduced the Adams-Cheshire Regional School Committee to new Director of Technology, Mark Kline on Monday. IBerkshires.com reports that Kline presented some of the changes he would like to make this fall. Gordon said that when the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education evaluated the district, it urged the district to bring someone in who could help unify the district's technology. Gordon said Kline has been on the job two weeks and, being a teacher in the past, has a great knowledge of how to implement technology in the classroom for both teachers and students.

COLGROVE PROJECT ON BUSGET BUT NOT ON TIME (NA)

The new elementary school in North Adams continues to stay on budget, but not on time. The new Colegrove Park Elementary School was expected to be "substantially complete" by today, but officials say it's actually months from being ready. IBerkshires.com reports that the city was told in May that the \$29.7 million renovation of the old Drury High School would likely not be ready for opening this fall. General contractor PDS Engineering & Construction Inc. had initially set a new date of August 16th, but that date is no longer viable. School officials are still planning to begin the school year with the new redistricting in place with Colegrove pupils starting the year at Sullivan School.

LONG TIME BERKSHIRE EAGLE SPORTS EDITOR DIES (AII)

Former longtime sports editor at The Berkshire Eagle, Brian Sullivan, has died. The Eagle reports that according to Sullivan's family, he died at home on Monday night at the age of 62. Sullivan began his award-winning career at The Berkshire Eagle in June 1984, also serving as a copy editor and columnist during his 27-year tenure. Sullivan also served as a paraprofessional in Pittsfield Public Schools, and more recently in Central Berkshire Regional Schools.

WILLIAMSTOWN ELEMENTARY TO ADD ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL (NA)

The Williamstown School Committee has approved the creation of an assistant principal's position at the K-through-6 school. IBerkshires.com reports that according to School Committee Chairman Dan Caplinger, the change was prompted by a suggestion from the school's new superintendent. The school has been bucking the declining regional trend the last couple of years with increased enrollment — partly because of recent early retirement packages offered the town's largest employer, Williams College, and the influx of younger faculty and staff that has brought.

FIRST RESPONDERS RECEIVE TACTICAL TRAINING AT DRURY HIGH SCHOOL (NA)

Dozens of police, fire and emergency medical services personnel from around the county were at Drury High School on Saturday morning for an emergency response training exercise. IBerkshires.com is reporting that Trooper Sean Barry, a member of the state police STOP Team conducted the "Tactical EMS" exercise along with Amalio Jusino of North Adams Ambulance Service, the vice chairman of the Northern Berkshire Regional Emergency Planning Committee. The first responders were led through a series of scenarios based on the premise that a shooting had taken place in the school building. The specific drills on Saturday dealt with a shooter on scene, but Barry said the skills taught could be applied in a number of different situations.

NORTHERN BERKSHIRE COMMUNITY COALITION NAMES NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (NA, P)

The board of the Northern Berkshire Community Coalition has named Adam Hinds as executive director of the coalition beginning September 1st. Hinds comes from the directorship of Pittsfield Community Connection. He says that he will remain centrally involved as chair of the Pittsfield programs Steering Committee. Hinds is replacing long-time director and founder Alan Bashevkin, who resigned after 29 years.

STAKES HIGH FOR CHESHIRE OVERRIDE VOTE; OFFICIALS WARY OF APATHY (NA)

When Cheshire rejected a Proposition 2 1/2 override vote on school funding In June, only 18 percent of residents turned out to the polls. The Berkshire Eagle reports that this week, the town again will ask voters to approve an override to appropriate \$2.59 million to fund the Adams-Cheshire Regional School District next year. But despite efforts to raise awareness in the town about the importance approving the override, officials remain concerned that residents don't appreciate the consequences of another rejection. Should the second override fail, the budget will go to a districtwide vote.

FALL FOLIAGE FESTIVAL CALLING ON ALL GRAND MARSHALS (NA)

The annual North Adams Fall Foliage Festival Parade will celebrate its own history as the theme of its 60th anniversary. IBerkshires.com reports that the festival, the Berkshire Chamber of Commerce, and the city of North Adams are celebrating the hard work that has gone into the parade over the years by inviting all past parade grand marshals to lead the parade which is scheduled to take place on Sunday, October 4th. The 60th anniversary theme will emphasize the rich history of the parade and focus on the amazing community that continues to be dedicated to the success of the annual event.

VOLUNTEERS CLEAN UP AT NORTH ADAMS' FIRST ANNUAL APPALACHIAN TRAIL DAY (NA)

After cleaning up parts of the Appalachian Trail that run through the city of North Adams, volunteers enjoyed food and music at the first annual North Adams Appalachian Trail Celebration. Iberkshires.com reports that City Councilor Joshua Moran, who spearheaded the project, said the group of nine started early in the morning and later met at Greylock School for a cookout with volunteers and hikers coming down from the trail. Moran is pushing for the city to become designated as an Appalachian Trail Community. The Appalachian Trail Conservancy is expected to rule on the city's application in November.

NO BAIL FOR ADAMS MAN WHO ALLEGEDLY ASSAULTED DALTON OFFICERS (NA)

An Adams man was ordered held without bail for allegedly assaulting Dalton Police officers following drunken driving stop last month. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 33 year old Jason Smith, of First Street, made suicidal statements and injured two officers in a violent struggle while he was in custody. One officer called it, "the most violent behavior," he'd seen in a 13-year career. According to court document, Smith, who also is facing assault and other charges stemming from an Adams incident in June, is a veteran who served two tours of duty in Iraq and possibly suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder.

MCLA CHANGES LEADERS; BROWN'S NAME IN PRESIDENTIAL POOL (NA)

The leadership at Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts will switch this month to allow Cynthia Brown, the current interim president, to become a candidate for the college's 12th president. IBerkshires.com reports that the board of trustees yesterday named Trustee James Clemmer as interim beginning on August 14th. Brown will resume her duties as vice president of academic affairs. She joined the college in that post in 2009. Brown has been leading the college since the departure of Mary Grant last year to become chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Asheville.

BRPC SEEKING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT STATUS (AII)

The Berkshire Regional Planning Commission is hoping to make the entire county the state's ninth "economic development district." IBerkshires.com is reporting that the designation through the U.S. Economic Development Agency and would increase the odds of projects in the county to receive grant funding. Many districts receive annual funds to implement the countywide economic development strategy and, while there is a waiting list for the funding each year, a new board would oversee that activity.

MASS MOCA FALL SEASON INCLUDES FREE DAYS, FRESHGRASS (NA)

Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Art will be kicking off the next in its series of free days for North Adams residents by partnering with the Fall Foliage Festival. The museum will have free admission — and serve up thousands of hot dogs — on Sunday, October 4th, which is parade day in the city. IBerkshires.com reports that beginning in October and through next spring, every 4th of the month, "Mass MoCA will be free to all our neighbors in North Adams." The first of the free days happens to fall on the Fall Foliage Festival, creating an opportunity to introduce to the museum to the wider community. The free days going forward will be a continuation of the popular program instituted earlier this year for local residents.

COURT STRIKES DOWN MASSACHUSETTS LAW BARRING FALSE CAMPAIGN STATEMENTS (AII)

A Massachusetts law that makes it a crime to publish false statements about political candidates is unconstitutional, the state's highest court ruled yesterday. The justices, in a unanimous 31-page decision, said the 1946 law was "inconsistent with the fundamental right of free speech." In striking down the law, the court also dismissed a criminal complaint that was filed against Melissa Lucas, the treasurer of the Jobs First PAC.

HADLEY OVERPASS RECONSTRUCTION OFFICIALLY COMPLETE (NA)

It's finally finished. After eight years, two mayors, three governors, seven secretaries of transportation, at least three missed deadlines and \$35 million, the Hadley Overpass reconstruction came officially to an end at 1 p.m. on Wednesday. IBerkshires.com reports that there was no ribbon cutting but a few officials and representatives from the state Department of Transportation and contractors gathered under a tent with Mayor Richard Alcombright and MassDOT Secretary Stephanie Pollack to mark the bridge's completion. J.H. Maxymillian Inc. was the contractor and Ryan-Biggs Associates PC the structural engineering firm contractor.

JOHN BARRETT III TAKES OUT NOMINATION PAPERS FOR NORTH ADAMS MAYOR (NA)

Former North Adams Mayor John Barrett III quietly took the first step toward a potential run for mayor on Wednesday by pulling nomination papers. Barrett, who served as the city's mayor for 26 consecutive years, lost the post to current Mayor Richard Alcombright in the 2009 general election. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Alcombright has already announced his intentions to run for a fourth term this year. With a week left before the deadline, a total of five potential candidates have now taken out papers: Alcombright, Barrett, artist and real estate developer Eric Rudd, Richard David Greene, and Nik Lareau. Papers must be returned to the city clerk with 50 signatures by 5 p.m. on Aug. 20; thus far, Rudd is the only certified mayoral candidate. Barrett is expected to make a formal announcement sometime in the weeks ahead.

NORTHERN BERKSHIRE PAIR SENT TO STATE PRISON FOR 'HORRIFIC BEATING' (NA)

Three men who took part in what the victim's father called a "horrific beating" in Adams last December, each pleaded guilty to their charges in Berkshire Superior Court yesterday. 39 year old Daniel Chao of Adams and 25 year old Thomas Barrett of Savoy were each sentenced to up to four years in state prison followed by probation for their roles in the attack. A third defendant, 25 year old Dean St. Jacques of North Adams intervened in the assault — though still participated in it — and cooperated with authorities, including leading them to a weapon used during the beating. He received a sentence of one year of probation. The three men admitted that on December 27th, the victim had gotten involved in a fight with Barrett in the parking lot of The Grille on Summer Street in Adams. Barrett and Chao will serve their sentences at the Massachusetts Correctional Institution in Walpole.

MOTHER, SON FROM NORTH ADAMS FACE DRUG CHARGES (NA)

A mother and son were arrested Tuesday after police seized several grams of raw heroin during a search of their North Adams Franklin Street home. The Berkshire Eagle reports that members of the Berkshire County Drug Task Force found approximately two grams of loose heroin powder in the bedroom of 26 year old Wyatt Demo along with unused wax baggies ready for packaging. His mother, 57 year old Kim Laflamme was allegedly holding heroin, Suboxone, and marijuana in her purse atop the living room recliner. The two had been under investigation by the task force since July.

ADAMS-ANTHONY CENTER DISCUSS ECONOMIC PROSPECTS (NA)

The Adams-Anthony Center for Political, Economic & Social Discourse held its first meeting focusing on economic prospects for the town of Adams. IBerkshires.com reports that Adams native and president of the center William Kolis told the full GAR Memorial Hall on Tuesday that he hopes the free speech forum can grow to be a premier forum in the state and perhaps country and can instill some forward momentum in Adams. The next meeting the center will hold will focus on promoting the arts in Adams.

WILLIAMSTOWN PLANNING BOARD DISCUSSES IDEAS FOR LESS RESTRICTIVE ZONING (NA)

The Williamstown Planning Board on Tuesday continued to discuss whether and how it should propose easing the town's residential development regulations. IBerkshires.com reports that one of the areas the board is eyeing: new rules that would allow for more multifamily housing units. Planning Board Chairwoman Amy Jeschawitz noted that the last conventional multifamily development allowed in Williamstown was the Hemlock Brook complex in 1984. In the last year alone, three multifamily developments have been permitted, but each was a special case: the Cable Mills overlay district on Water Street, the subsidized housing at Highland Woods and the mixed-use Mather House apartments on North Street.

VOTERS IN POWNAL TO DECIDE FATE OF CONTROVERSIAL SOLAR ARRAY (NA)

A meeting slated for Monday will determine the fate of a controversial solar array on land owned by a local water system in Pownal, Vermont. The Berkshire Eagle reports that residents within the Pownal Fire District No. 2 will be asked to approve entering into a contract with a solar developer for the array, which would be sited on land next to Route 346. The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. in the lower level meeting room of the Pownal American Legion Post 90.

SELECTMEN TOUR VISTORS CENTER (NA)

Selectmen in Adams toured the Visitors Center on Wednesday to look at problems and potential improvements to the building. IBerkshires.com reports that the board has been reviewing town facilities during its workshop meetings this summer at the behest of Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco. The main concern the Selectmen had on Wednesday was a request from Police Chief Richard Tarsa to post "No Trespassing" from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. to discourage people from loitering and to give the police more authority when dealing with loiterers.

WINDSOR LAKE SHUT DOWN FOR E. COLI (NA)

Windsor Lake in North Adams was closed to the public yesterday due to a positive test for E. coli in the water. The test results by the Health Department showed E. coli levels that were unacceptable. The lake has been immediately shut down and Mayor Richard Alcombright has been notified of the test results. Lake staff, lifeguards, and park police will be preventing visitors from swimming and explaining that the lake has been closed until further testing can be made. The playground, fields and picnic areas remain open. There will be no charge for parking if visitors wish to use those amenities. According to the Health Department, the lake will remain closed until readings taken from multiple locations around the lake determine that the levels of E. coli have returned to an acceptable level.

WILD OATS MARKET EMPLOYEE ALLEGEDLY USED BOMB THREAT TO GET OUT OF WORK (NA)

A Wild Oats Market employee and a friend are facing charges they concocted a bomb threat at the Williamstown store on June 4th so the worker could get out of work early. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 21 year old Emily Sziribik, who works at the Route 2 grocery store, and 21 year old Jacob Shea, both of Bennington, Vermont, allegedly cooked up the plan so they could hang out together, according to police. Sziribik and Shea pleaded not guilty in Northern Berkshire District Court yesterday to single counts of making a bomb threat. They were each released on their personal recognizance and scheduled to appear in court on September 30th for a pre-trial hearing.

PRESSURE PUT ON CONTRACTOR TO FINISH SCHOOL PROJECT (NA)

With unexpected delays and expenditures mounting on the Colegrove Park Elementary School project, the city of North Adams is ramping up the pressure on the general contractor to ensure the renovation is completed in time for the second half of the school year. The Berkshire Eagle reports that while the contractor says the delays were unavoidable, school officials and the project manager insist the company should have planned for such unforeseen problems. The renovation of the former Silvio O. Conte Middle School initially was scheduled to be done July 23rd and open for the upcoming school year. But workers have encountered a series of problems that have pushed that completion date back to October, forcing the district to temporarily find space for students at other schools.

RESIDENTS EXPRESS CONCERN OVER NORTH ADAMS SKATEBOARD PARK (NA)

Some neighbors in the State Street area of North Adams have an opinion on the proposed skateboard park at the Noel Field Athletic Complex. They say – great idea, but not in my neighborhood. Iberkshires.com reports that Robert Davis, who owns property across from where the BMX/skateboard park is planned, delivered a letter on behalf nearly two dozen residents to the Parks and Recreation Commission on Monday. He said he and his neighbors were not against the city developing a skateboard park, but did not think the Noel Field parking lot was the most suitable place for safety and other reasons. The City Council in June approved applying for a state Parkland Acquisitions and Renovations for Communities Program grant for the nearly \$700,000 project.

NORTH ADAMS LIBRARY FACING MAINTENANCE ISSUES (NA)

The North Adams public library needs a generator and new environmental controls to keep its circulation and archival materials in shape. IBerkshires.com reports that the items are on a list of maintenance projects that library officials say they cannot afford and are hoping the city can help with. Library Director Mindy Hackner told the library trustees on Monday that City Hall sent her a loss-control spreadsheet, used as an insurance tool, with maintenance suggestions on it. Some of the items have been completed, but after speaking with the city electrician, she said the trustees should consider the purchase a battery-operated generator to prevent the sprinklers from turning on when the power goes out is critical.

TRIAL BEGINS FOR 3RD OF 4 ACCUSED OF 2012 UMASS DORM RAPE (AII)

The trial of the third of four men charged with raping a student in a University of Massachusetts dorm is beginning. Jury selection is scheduled to take place today for 20-year-old Adam Liccardi. He has pleaded not guilty to four counts of rape. The student told police she was raped in October 2012 by Liccardi and his three friends from Pittsfield. The woman said she told them not to visit. Another student let them in. The other three were charged with three counts of rape. Emmanuel Bile (BEE-Lay) and Justin King, both 21, were convicted and are serving prison sentences. Twenty-year-old Caleb Womack still faces trial. The woman said she drank alcohol and smoked marijuana with them but didn't consent to sex. The case led UMass to tighten dorm security.

WILLIAMSTOWN PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE MOVES AHEAD WITH STATION REPAIRS (NA)

The Williamstown Fire District on Wednesday decided to move forward with two projects to repair its outdated facility. Iberkshires.com reports that the three-person Prudential Committee, which oversees the district, voted unanimously to repair the front wall and driveway of the Water Street station. The district two years ago was stymied when it twice attempted to buy a Main Street parcel to build a new fire station. Left with a facility that the department believes is too small and inadequate to meet its needs the Prudential Committee finds itself in the position of having to put more money into the station.

MCLA'S BOWMAN HALL TO OPEN IN SEPTEMBER (NA)

Students and faculty returning to the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts this fall semester will be in for a big surprise. IBerkshires.com reports that with final-hour projects being finished up in Bowman Hall, the newly renovated building will be open for the first day of the term. According to officials, the \$15 million renovation project houses a reimagining of the building that still will be used primarily as a classroom building.

ADAMS, MOUNT GREYLOCK DISTRICT TAXPAYERS INVITED TO THREE SCHOOL FORUM (NA)

North county taxpayers are invited to a forum. While most of the kids may have another week to enjoy the waning days of summer vacation, their parents and other voters are invited to three public forums focused on the present and possible future state of education in North Berkshire. IBerkerkshries.com reports that the first forum is Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. at the Berkshire Arts and Technology Charter Public School in Adams.

BTRA TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARING ON SERVICE EFFICIENCIES (All)

The Berkshire Regional Transit Authority is planning on holding a public hearing on Wednesday. The focus of the hearing will be service efficiencies recommended in the Regional Transportation Plan. The general public is invited to attend the one day presentation, which will be the final opportunity to submit comments to be included in the document's addendum. The BRTA will display a power point presentation and will also make printed copies available upon request. The hearing will take place Wednesday from 11:30am to 1:30pm in the second floor BRTA board room.

COURT ADJOURNED AFTER PANIC ATTACK IN RAPE TRIAL (AII)

Jurors heard from two witness's yesterday morning at the trial of 21 year old Adam Liccardi of Pittsfield, but adjourned after the defendant was taken to Cooley Dickinson Hospital, suffering from a reported panic attack. The Springfield Republican is reporting that the attack did not occur while in the courtroom. Liccardi appeared briefly before court adjourned at 3 p.m., and a hospital spokeswoman confirmed at 4:20 p.m. that he was being evaluated in the Emergency Department. His condition was not available. Two other men involved in the rape case have already been convicted. 21 year old Emmanuel Bile and 21 year old Justin King, both of Pittsfield, are serving terms of eight to 10 years and eight and 12 years respectively. 20 year old Caleb Womack, of Windsor Locks, Connecticut, is scheduled to be tried next.

WOMAN, 83, ESCAPES SERIOUS HARM AFTER NORTH ADAMS WRECK (NA)

A Chicopee woman escaped serious injuries on Saturday evening after her car struck a utility pole on the Mohawk Trail. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 83 year old Olivette Beaudoin was heading west on Route 2 (Mohawk Trail) in the area of Stryker Road near the Florida town line about 7:20 p.m. when she veered off of the road and struck a utility pole, according to North Adams Police. The impact caused significant damage to the pole and brought down wires across the road. Beaudoin was transported to Berkshire Medical Center in Pittsfield, where she was treated for her injuries and released.

CHESHIRE BARRACKS COMMANDER HONORED AT RETIREMENT (NA, P)

State Police Lt. William Blackmer Jr. of North Adams was honored on Saturday night for his nearly 40 years of service in law enforcement to the state and its citizens. IBerkshires.com reports that Blackmer had led the Cheshire Barracks since 2008, capping 31 years with the state police. He retired at the end of June. Dozens of emergency responders, family and friends were on hand at the Bounti-Fare to usher the lieutenant into his retirement.

OUTGOING CLARK DIRECTOR MICHAEL CONFORTI CURATED ERA OF PROGRESS (NA)

Michael Conforti retires as director of the Clark Art Institute in Williamstown praised by colleagues for transforming a regional museum for a rich man's art collection into a global visual-studies center whose exhibitions nudge art history into new directions. The Berkshire Eagle reports that in appreciation, trustees, benefactors and staff have donated \$6.5 million to have the west pavilion of the new visitor center he saw built named after him. Conforti plans to remain in Williamstown, which, he often quips, has more art scholars per capita than anyplace else. Former trustees chairman Francis Oakley will act as interim director.

NEW ENGLAND PUBLIC RADIO OPENS BERKSHIRE BUREAU (AII)

New England Public Radio opened its first Berkshire County bureau y yesterday. IBerkshires.com reports that the radio station opened offices in the Central Station Business Center in Pittsfield, the same building that houses 1Berkshire, in a partnership with Berkshire Community College. Station and BCC officials were joined yesterday with employees from the Berkshire Chamber of Commerce to cut the ribbon on the new office space. The non-profit covers Western and Central Massachusetts and operates nine stations that reach Berkshire County but has never had a reporting presence here.

LICCARDI ADMITTED TO SEX ACT (AII)

A University of Massachusetts police detective described to jurors in Adam Liccardi's rape trial yesterday how the defendant's account of what happened in a dorm room on October 13, 2012, evolved over the course of a one-hour interview. Liccardi, Emmanuel T. Bile Jr., Justin A. King, all 21, and Caleb Womack, 20, have been accused of raping an 18-year-old woman, whom they knew, while she was intoxicated and was sometimes unconscious. Bile and King have been tried and convicted; Womack has not been tried yet. The Berkshire eagle reports that UMass Police Detective Kevin Shaw said that during an unrecorded interview in October of 2012, Liccardi at first did not mention his involvement in sexual activity with the woman. But when asked directly which of the four men participated, Liccardi described taking part in a sex act himself.

ADAMS INVITING RESIDENTS TO GET INVOLVED IN STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS (NA)

Adams Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco said the town will call for community input during upcoming strategic planning sessions. IBerkshires.com reports that Mazzucco said the town will hold open strategic planning starting this September that will allow the community to share their vision of the town for the upcoming years. Meetings will take place at Hoosac Valley High School and will be facilitated by the Collins Center for Public Management out of the University of Massachusetts at Boston. The Collins Center representatives will explain the process, help the town find a mission statement for the plan, and help pinpoint the community's vision and goals of the town over the next five years.

BARRETT LAYS OUT MAYORAL PLATFORM (NA)

Nearly six years after he left the corner office, John Barrett III says he is seeking a 14th mayoral term to get North Adams "headed back in the right direction." The Berkshire Eagle reports that Barrett, who served as the city's mayor for 26 years from 1984 until 2010, will challenge incumbent Mayor Richard Alcombright and local developer and artist Eric Rudd for a two-year term this fall. Barrett stresses that he is not running against Alcombright as a person, but the priorities and policies of his administration. Since he left office, Barrett said that the average homeowner's tax bill has increased sizably while property values have dropped, though precious little funding has been poured into the city's decaying infrastructure.

NORTH ADAMS HOSTS FIFTH ANNUAL MOTORAMA ON SUNDAY (NA)

The city of North Adams will host its fifth annual Motorama on Sunday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Main, Holden and Eagle streets will all be closed to all but pedestrian traffic as downtown North Adams fills with cars, trucks, motorcycles, snowmobiles, tractors and more. Anything with a motor is welcome. In addition to looking at meticulously restored and maintained vehicles, attendees can enjoy live music, 50/50 raffles, food, and shopping. Last year's Motorama brought more than 400 vehicles to the streets of North Adams, and this year the city hopes to draw closer to 500. In the case of extreme inclement weather, the rain date is Saturday, September 5th.

JURORS IN UMASS RAPE TRIAL SET TO BEGIN DELIBERATIONS (AII)

Jurors in the rape trial of Adam Liccardi begin deliberations today after hearing the defendant deny yesterday his role in the alleged gang rape of a student at the UMass Amherst in 2012. Liccardi testified yesterday that the woman he is accused of raping initiated sex with him and one of his co-defendants, but was then raped by Emmanuel Bile, a third co-efendant in the case. Bile and King have been tried and convicted, and are serving state prison sentences. Jurors in Bile's trial deliberated for 10 hours over two days, while a jury convicted King after deliberating for less than six hours.

BEST BUY LEAVING BERKSHIRE MALL (All)

Best Buy has announced that it will be closing its store in the Berkshire Mall in Lanesborough at the end of October. According to company spokeswoman Carly Charlson, the national electronics chain has decided not to renew its lease with the owners of the mall. The store will close its doors when the current lease expires at the close of business on October 31st. The Best Buy store in the mall has 63 total employees, and 28 of them are full-time. Charlson says the employees have been notified and will be given the opportunity to seek employment at another Best Buy store, or be given a severance package. JC Penney, Macy's, Sears and Target are the malls remaining anchor retailers.

WARM SPELL AS STUDENTS RETURN (All)

As students begin to return to school in the Berkshires, forecasters are predicting another warm spell. The Berkshire Eagle reports that as the calendar flips to September, daylight is two hours shorter than in late June, but the lazy, hazy days of summer are rolling out for a weeklong encore. Forecasters at the National Weather Service predict that the most persistent warm spell of the season will linger through the Labor Day weekend. The long-range outlook from Accuweather.com calls for above-normal warmth and limited rainfall right through September and beyond.

TRACTOR-TRAILERS STUCK UNDER NORTH ADAMS TRESTLE TWICE IN ONE MONTH (NA)

A section of Church Street North Adams was blocked off for nearly three hours yesterday afternoon after yet another tractor-trailer got stuck under the railroad trestle. IBerkshires.com reports that a trailer hauling 25,000 pounds of machined metal, reportedly for a Disney ride, became wedged under the trestle at about 4:15 p.m. after leaving Morrison Berkshire on Church Street. The delivery was on its way to Minneapolis. Traffic was blocked between Davenport Street and Ashland Street. The truck was pulled out from under the trestle shortly before 7pm.

FREIGHT YARD ATTORNEYS FILE MOTION TO BEGIN COLLECTIONS (NA)

The Freight Yard Pub in North Adams is asking a judge to allow it to make collections efforts for nearly \$300,000 against the Redevelopment Authority. IBerkshires.com reports that the request comes in the wake of the City Council's rejection on August 11th to help pay for the judgement against the authority. The restaurant, operating as Bay State Hospitality Group Inc., won a Superior Court case last fall against the authority, a semi-independent governmental body that oversees Western Gateway Heritage State Park and certain sections of the downtown.

3RD MAN CONVICTED IN 2012 UMASS DORM RAPE CASE (AII)

A Pittsfield man has been convicted of raping a University of Massachusetts freshman in her Amherst dorm room nearly three years ago. A jury yesterday found 21-year-old Adam Liccardi guilty of two counts of aggravated rape and one count of rape. He was acquitted of one count of aggravated rape. Liccardi's lawyer has said the sex was consensual. Liccardi will be held without bail until his sentencing October 6th. He is the third to be convicted in the case. 21 year old Emmanuel Bile Jr. and 21 year old Justin King — both of Pittsfield — were convicted earlier this year. A fourth man, 20 year old Caleb Womack of Windsor Locks, Connecticut, is still facing trial. The four defendants, then all either 17 or 18, were charged with raping the woman in October 2012.

BMC NORTH EXPANDS SERVICES WITH OUT-PATIENT PREVENTION AND TREATRMENT (NA)

Berkshire Health Systems has announced the creation of a community-focused Neighborhood for Health at its Northern Berkshire campus, an expansion of services there that includes mental health, addiction and chronic illness treatment. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the new services, under the Neighborhood for Health umbrella, will provide treatment for those with long-term physical health issues, as well as underscore prevention and the overall quality of life for those in the community. The Neighborhood for Health will not only look to help those with physical illnesses, but have a focus on behavioral health needs as well, in a collaboration with the Brien Center.

WILLIAMSTOWN PLANNING BOARD ENCOURAGES WAUBEEKA HOTEL PROPOSAL (NA)

The Williamstown Planning Board on Tuesday encouraged the owner of Waubeeka Golf Links to continue looking at whether he could situate a hotel on his Route 7 property. IBerkshires.com reports that Michael Deep went to the board to ask whether it would be in favor of creating a zoning change that would allow a developer to operate a hotel on the site, currently zoned in the Rural Residential District. While the board stopped short of taking a vote in favor of the proposition, several members expressed their support in principle for the project.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE HOPES FOR LANESBOROUGH REFERENDUM BY WINTER (NA)

Adams Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco says he thinks Lanesborough could decide by early December if it would want begin the process of combining school districts with Adams-Cheshire Regional School District. IBerkshires.com reports that Mazzucco told the Selectmen yesterday that he recently met with officials from Lanesborough and Mount Greylock Regional School District to discuss ways to provide information to the public. After sending letters to Lanesborough and Williamstown asking to begin conversations on reorganizing school districts, last week Adams-Cheshire presented to Lanesborough residents the financial and educational benefits of joining the district.

ADAMS BOARD OF HEALTH HEARS OF SEWAGE, LEAD COMPLAINTS (NA)

Adams Code Enforcement Officer Scott Koczela said the 10 Murray property that housed alleged terrorist Alexander Ciccolo this summer is still giving the town trouble. IBerkshires.com reports that Koczela told the Board of Health last week that a broken sewer pipe that spewed sewage into the sidewalk was repaired, but it needs to be replaced. Koczela said the property owner had until the end of August to respond to the town's demands and clean up the contaminated basement and replace the broken line. He said the owner has only called Town Hall to complain and will be brought back to court.

NEW MT. GREYLOCK SCHOOL DESIGN BEGINS (NA)

Plans for a renovated Mount Greylock Regional High School will take shape this fall as officials work to meet a December deadline. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the School Building Committee on Thursday last week gave Design Partnership of Cambridge the green light to create schematic designs for a renovation of its aging 1960s building. The project sent to the MSBA for consideration calls for a new, three-story academic wing on the front, or east side, of the existing building. Much of the existing school would be torn down. Early estimates peg the total cost to the district at roughly \$42.7 million.

ADAMS BOARD OF HEALTH CONSIDERING COMMUNICATION EFFORTS (NA)

The Board of Health in Adams wants to hold a workshop to focus on better communication after cuts were made to the department. Iberkshires.com reports that board member Bruce Shepley urged his counterparts last week to hold the workshop to combat the miscommunication among the board members and administration. According to Shepley, there are huge gaps, huge misunderstandings, and a high level of lack of communication. He pointed to last month's meeting that had to be canceled because there were issues posting the agenda.

BERKSHIRE MALL OWNERS SEE BEST BUY CLOSING AS AN OPPORTUNITY (AII)

The owners of the Berkshire Mall say they have no plans to sell the county's largest retail shopping complex, and see Best Buy's pending departure October 31st as an "opportunity" to add new retail clients. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Best Buy also declined to renew its lease on its store in the Hampshire Mall in Hadley, which will be closing on the same day as the Berkshire Mall outlet. The owners of the Berkshire Mall say they are "in discussions with several retailers at the moment who have expressed strong interest in the Best Buy space.

NET ZERO HOUSING COMMUNITY POROPOSED (NA)

A net zero co-housing community focused on recreating the close neighborhood experience of the past is being planned in the city of North Adams. IBerkshires.com reports that Jane Shiyah, a retired school counselor and founder of the Northern Berkshire Co-housing Community explained that co-housing could be a new way to live in North County. She said co-housing homes are clustered around shared common areas and buildings that allow people to live together in economically and environmentally sustainable homes in a traditional, tight-knit, diverse community.

REDEVELOPMENT PLANS RELEASED FOR NORTH ADAMS' MOTEL (NA)

A development group that includes a member of the band Wilco is planning to transform the dated Redwood Motel on Route 2 in North Adams into "destination lodging." IBerkshires.com reports that the plans are to demolish the west wing of the motel and a garage. The office and innkeeper's residence and an 11-room wing will be gutted and/or renovated with updates to the interior and exterior. A rear deck will be built along the length of the buildings and the office and garage space will be converted into a lobby and lounge. Three new lodging buildings will constructed for a total number of 40 rooms on the north side of the property.

RALLY, WALK AND VIGIL TO ADDRESS OPIOID ADDICTION AND RECOVERY (NA)

Two local organizations are joining together with the City of North Adams on Saturday to raise awareness about addiction, substance abuse and recovery resources in the region. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Josh Bressette Commit to Save A Life and the Rx/Heroin Work Group of the Northern Berkshire Community Coalition will hold the Voices for Recovery rally, walk and vigil from 4 to 8 p.m. The rally and vigil will be centered at Noel Field, with a Recovery Walk through downtown North Adams at 5:30 p.m. The rally will include live music, food, and family friendly activities as well as informational tables and resources.

NORTH ADAMS COUNCIL REVIEWS ZONING CHANGE (NA)

The North Adams City Council will meet with the Planning Board in two weeks to move forward a zoning ordinance that will allow homeowners to rebuild on nonconforming lots. IBerkshires.com reports that the issue had been brought forward by City Councilor Wayne Wilkinson, a professional appraiser, some months ago and was recommended by the General Government Committee in June. The changes would allow a homeowner — within limits, to rebuild on a nonconforming lot — one that did meet the regulated dimensions and frontage for construction.

MACY'S PLANS TO CLOSE UP TO 40 STORES; FATE OF BERKSHIRE MALL STORE UNCLEAR (All)

The Macy's department store chain has announced that it plans to close between 35 and 40 underperforming stores nationwide by early 2016. The fate of the Macy's store in the Berkshire mall was unclear as of yesterday. A statement from the company says that it will announce the individual store closures at a "later date" following a "careful analysis" that is already underway. The uncertainly about the local Macy's store comes amid the recent announcement that Best Buy is closing its store in the mall on October 31st.

ENERGY COALITION LAUNCHES IN BERKSHIRES (AII)

Mass Power Forward, a new statewide energy coalition, launched its local efforts in the city on Wednesday, advocating clean energy and conservation projects and opposing new fossil fuel infrastructure. The Berkshire eagle reports that a Pittsfield press conference outside Kinder Morgan's offices at 137 North St. was one of five similar events the group hosted around the state yesterday. Others occurred in Boston, Fall River, Holyoke, West Peabody and Weymouth.

NORTH ADAMS ANODIZING PLANT TO CLOSE (NA)

Colonial Anodizing in North Adams is expected to close its doors by the end of the month, putting about 35 people out of work. IBerkshires.com reports that employees were informed on August 25th of the closure, according to Keith Gros, director of human resources for parent company Keymark Corporation. Gros said the company had made "significant investment" in the plant at 59 Hodges Cross Road since assuming the operations last year but sales have failed to develop as expected. The anodizing plant has struggled for nearly a decade.

LONG TIME SPORTS COACH DIES (NA)

Dennis George Strizzi was remembered yesterday as a "straight shooter" and a "really, really good person" by the high school coaches who benefited from his contributions to youth sports in Northern Berkshire County. IBerkshires.com reports that Strizzi died at his Williamstown home at the age of 67. For more than 25 years, he was a coach for the Lanesborough Tigers youth football team, helping lay the foundation for successful seasons for the Mount Greylock Regional School team. He also was a supporter of youth baseball in Williamstown and Lanesborough.

COALITION FORUM BRAINSTORMS TOPICS, CHANGE OF PROCESS (NA)

Every September, the Northern Berkshire Community Coalition meets to discuss what topics to focus on over the next nine months. This year, a lot of conversation revolved around the process of the meetings in addition to the topics themselves. IBerkshires.com reports that in his first monthly forum as NBCC's executive director, Adam Hinds asked the room of more than 100 representatives of human and social services agencies, educational institutions and other nonprofits to offer suggestions for future meeting topics. NORTH ADAMS MAYORAL CANDIDATES DEBATE HOSPITAL CLOSURE, FUTURE OF HEALTH CARE (NA)

The city of North Adam's three mayoral candidates sparred last night over how the closure of North Adams Regional Hospital was handled in 2014 and over the future of health care in the Northern Berkshires. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the exchange came during a candidate forum sponsored by the North County Cares Coalition, a local organization backed by the Massachusetts Nurses Association that advocates for the restoration of in-patient services in North Adams. Residents packed American Legion Post 125 to hear the candidates answer questions prepared by the organization and a few from the crowd. Mayor Richard Alcombright, former Mayor John Barrett III, and local artist and developer Eric Rudd discussed the months leading up to the March 2014 closure of North Adams Regional Hospital through the present-day services provided by Berkshire Health Systems.

DIALYSIS UNIT TO OPEN AT BMC NORTH (NA)

Renal Dialysis care soon will be available closer to home for Northern Berkshire residents. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Berkshire Health Systems announced yesterday that it intends to open a nine-chair dialysis care center at its Northern Berkshire Campus by the summer 2016, giving North County patients easy access to the treatment for the first time. BHS, parent of Berkshire Medical Center, intends to invest \$2 million on the dialysis center, which will be housed in the ground floor of the Ambulatory Care Center. Dialysis — an hours-long treatment that helps remove toxins from the body for patients whose kidneys are no longer able to do so — was not available at the former North Adams Regional Hospital.

NORTH ADAMS PLANNERS OK REDWOOD REDO, NEW STATE ROAD GAS STATION (NA)

Plans to transform the North Adams Redwood Motel into a contemporary motor court was approved by the Planning Board on Monday. IBerkshires.com reports that the motel concept was one of several applications that brought out abuttors for an unusually well-attended meeting. Two other projects, however, ran into more vocal complaints from abuttors: Ernest Perry's plans to open "Odds & Ends," a secondhand store at the former LaValley Oil Co. at 118 Eagle Street and Summit Distributing LLC's to demolish the old Gibb's station at 330 State Road for a new convenience store and gas station.

CHAPTER 90 FUNDS NOT MEETING ADAMS' NEEDS (NA)

Adams Director of Public Works Joe Bettis says Chapter 90 funds are not keeping up with the town's roads and infrastructure needs. IBerkshires.com reports that he used for example the south section of Route 8, which could cost \$600,000, about double what the town gets each year in state road funds. Bettis made his presentation last Wednesday, during the Selectmen's workshop at the town garage. He would like to add the south section of Route 8 to the town's list of projects and begin paying for engineering. Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco said that the next phase of the Ashuwillticook Rail Trail to Lime Street will cost the town between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

PLANS FOR REGIONAL EMERGENCY MASS SHELTERING SITES UNDERWAY (AII)

Plans for large shelters to be created for emergency situations are underway and Berkshire Regional Planning Commission needs qualified volunteers to man them. IBerkshires.com reports that planner Eammon Coughlin is in the process of developing mass sheltering plans for South, central, and North counties. The issue so far is that there doesn't seem to be enough qualified volunteers to staff each with at least four people. Coughlin told the Central Berkshire Regional Emergency Planning Committee yesterday that they are severely lacking on getting a minimum of four volunteers per shelter.

COLEGROVE PARK SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION WOES IRONED OUT (NA)

After months at loggerheads with the general contractor renovating Colegrove Park Elementary School, North Adams officials on Monday said significant progress has been made in recent weeks. The Berkshire Eagle reports that although the current completion date of October 26th is three months past the initial July target, Mayor Richard Alcombright signaled to the School Building Committee that there has been a breakthrough with the contractor, Connecticut-based general contractor PDS Engineering and Construction. Over two previous committee meetings this summer, PDS has clashed with city officials and the project manager over project delays.

ADAMS CEMETERY COMMISSION MAY LIMIT SATURDAY BURIALS (NA)

The Adams Cemetery Commission may limit Saturday burials at the cemetery per workers' request. IBerkshires.com reports that Deputy Director of Public Works David Nuvallie told the commission last week that some workers had asked if there was a cut off for weekend burials. Nuvallie said there was an influx of Saturday burials over the Sept. 12-13 weekend, with one starting at 2:30. The commission decided to go back to its regulations and discuss adding a time limit at the next meeting.

MOUNT GREYLOCK BUILDING COMMITTEE WEIGHS HVAC OPTIONS (NA)

While the Mount Greylock Regional School Committee tries to hold the district together, the School Building Committee continues to put together plans for a renovated junior-senior high school. IBerkshires.com reports that at its most recent meeting, the committee focused largely on the mechanical systems for the addition/renovation project the district has proposed to the Massachusetts School Building Authority. Michael Walsh of Canton's Consulting Engineering Services took the committee members through a number of options for heating, ventilation and air conditioning. The committee is expected to revisit the important decision at its September 24th meeting.

MCLA DORM EVACUATED AFTER DETECTED ODOR (NA)

More than two dozen students were evacuated on Saturday night from a Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts dormitory after a strong, unknown odor was detected in the building. The Berkshire Eagle reports that according to college spokeswoman Bernadette Alden, the North Adams Fire Department was alerted at about 5:30 p.m. in connection with the smell, which emanated from the Berkshire Towers residence hall. Students were immediately evacuated to the Venable Hall Gymnasium, assisted by members of the campus public safety department and North Adams Ambulance Service. The odor was not immediately identified, so the Regional Hazardous Materials team was contacted. A total of 27 students exhibiting symptoms of throat irritation were transported to Berkshire Health Systems North or the college's Wellness Center for evaluation. All students have since returned to campus.

MCLA AND NORTH ADAMS POLICE URGE STUDENTS TO TAKE STEPS FOR SAFETY (NA)

A series of reported assaults and other crimes near the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts campus have the school increasing efforts to educate students on safety. The Berkshire Eagle reports that last month marked the beginning of the new school year, and the college has since issued three public safety alerts — including two so far this month — to students regarding alleged assaults, burglaries and robberies in the campus area. In each of the alerts, the alleged crimes were not detailed and exact locations were not given. It is unclear what injuries, if any, were suffered in the alleged assaults, or what was stolen in the burglaries. The college has passed the investigations into the string of incidents over to the North Adams Police Department.

ADAMS SELECTMEN APPROVE RESERVE FUND TRANSFERS (NA)

The Adams Selectmen approved the transfer of funds for increased insurance at the Memorial Building, blight removal, and other projects. IBerkshires.com reports that Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco asked the Selectmen on Wednesday for a \$3,200 transfer from the reserve fund, which is used for unforeseen expenses, to the Property and Casualty Insurance fund for an increase insurance after an adjuster toured the building. Chairman Richard Blanchard asked if Mazzucco could gather insurance quotes for closing the building down. Mazzucco said he anticipates it would cost substantially more but he would look into it.

MOUNT GREYLOCK, LANESBOROUGH SCHOOL DISTRICTS SEEK PARTNERSHIP PROPOSAL (NA)

Mount Greylock and Lanesborough school districts want a proposal for collaboration from the Adams-Cheshire Regional School District by October 1st. The Berkshire Eagle reports that a letter sent Monday and signed by the two school committees' chairwomen and the districts' shared superintendent states they "see no educational benefit" to dissolving the Mount Greylock Regional School District and sending Lanesborough students to Hoosac Valley Middle and High School in Cheshire. The letter was sent to Adams Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco and Adams-Cheshire Regional School Committee Chairman Paul Butler, and was signed by Greene, Lanesborough School Committee Chairwoman Regina DiLego and Williamstown-Lanesborough Public Schools Superintendent Douglas Dias.
