What were some of the issues in our community? Read on.

DISPATCHERS FIGHTING PLAN (NA)

Adams' emergency dispatchers pushed back against the town's plans to eliminate their positions. Two out of three were eventually saved. Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco introduced a proposal last month to move the town's independent emergency dispatch services out of the Adams Police Station and into the Berkshire County Sheriff's Communications Center in Pittsfield. The full details were explained in a public question and answer session.

ADAMS MAN GETS LIFE IN PRISON FOR RAPE OF WOMAN IN 2012

An Adams man has been sentenced to life in prison for the 2012 rape of a woman whose young child was sleeping in a crib a few feet away. 42 year old Jeffrey Vigiard was found guilty in Berkshire Superior Court you multiple charges associated with the attack in a Pittsfield home. Jurors deliberated for about 7 1/2 hours over the course of two days in the nearly two-week trial, which began Nov. 4th.

\$815 MILLION INVESTED IN BERKSHIRE COUNTY SINCE 2012 (ALL)

There has been at least \$235 million in public monies and \$580 million in private investment in the county over the past three years in ongoing or completed projects – But those figures haven't translated to employment or wage increases. IBerkshires.com reports that the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission approved yesterday the annual Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy performance report.

ALCOMBRIGHT AND BARRET BATTLE IT OUT

Mayor Richard J. Alcombright has was re-elected for a fourth term. Alcombright bested former longtime Mayor John Barrett III, winning 2,430 votes, compared to Barrett's 2,054. Of the city's total 8,689 registered voters, 4,513 turned out for the mayoral election, representing a turnout of roughly 52 percent.

STATE BREAKS GROUND ON WAR MEMORIAL TOWER RENOVATIONS (All - interest)

The nearly two-year restoration of the Massachusetts Veterans War Memorial Tower at the summit of Mount Greylock in Adams has begun. IBerkshires.com reports that yesterday, state officials recognized the renovation that will repair water damage and upgrade the interior spaces with a ceremony. Department of Veterans Services Secretary Francisco Urena said the \$2.3 million project restores honor to the tower. The 93-foot tall tower was constructed in 1932, opening the next year, to memorialize the state's casualties in World War I, and, later, those killed in other conflicts. It was renovated in the 1973 after being closed for 11 years, and more repairs were done in the 1990s.

WILLIAMSTOWN MAN GETS 2 YEARS IN JAIL FOR ASSAULTING WOMAN (NA)

A Williamstown man has been sentenced to two years in jail for an alcohol-fueled assault that left the victim with injuries the judge called "frightening." The Berkshire Eagle reports that 54 year old James Colbert admitted that he beat a 31-year-old woman and smashed a 40-ounce beer bottle over her head after a night of drinking in March. Colbert pleaded guilty to one count each of assault and battery with a dangerous weapon and assault and battery. He was given credit for 196 days of time already served in custody.

60th ANNIVERSARY FALL FOLIAGE PARADE ON SUNDAY (NA – interest)

The Northern Berkshire Fall Foliage Parade takes place on Sunday in North Adams, and this year, it's a special one. It's the 60 Anniversary edition of the parade this year and besides celebrating the rich history of the parade, Danielle Thomas from the Berkshire Chamber of Commerce says that all the Grand Marshall's from past parades are invited back this time around...

MASS MOCA OFFERS FREE ADMISSION AFTER FALL FOLIAGE PARADE (NA)

The Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Arts is opening its galleries to the general public, free of admission, after the city's Fall Foliage Parade on Sunday — and serving free hot dogs its main courtyard. It will be the first of the museum's free days for local residents which will occur on the fourth of every month from October to June 2016.

MEDIATION PROGRAM OK'S AT ADAMS-CHESHIRE (NA)

The Adams School Committee has approved a pilot program to mediate between students, the school, and parents. IBerkshires.com reports that William Ballen, of the superintendents' roundtable and former superintendent of Mount Greylock School Union 69, explained to the committee on Monday the new program he is spearheading. He told the committee that the program has been made available through a grant received by Berkshire Housing and Mediation Services. Ballen says that he will be training independent mediators around school climate and working with staff and administration.

NORTH ADAMS PLANNERS OK EVENTS AT GREYLOCK MILL (NA)

The North Adams planning Board has approved a special permit for interim use of the Greylock Mill, which is being renovated into food production, hotel and residential space. IBerkshires.com reports that Salvatore Perry, the development director of architectural firm Latent Productions and principal in Greylock Mill LLC, told the board on Monday that the plan was to use the 34,000 square foot "sawtooth" part of the mill's Weave Shed. The 65,000 square-foot Weave Shed from the old cotton mill runs along Route 2 for about 700 feet and will eventually hold the food production, retail and event spaces.

WILLIAMS SHARES PLANS FOR FUTURE CONSTRUCTION (NA)

Williams College last week laid out its plans to dramatically change its campus and heard feedback from downtown merchants concerned about the growing pains those changes might create. IBerkshires.com reports that the school's executive director for design and construction gave an hour long presentation at Images Cinema. Rita Coppola-Wallace gave an update on the status of the college's current project and a look at what's to come, including a new bookstore on Spring Street, a new science center and a new Williams Inn.

LONGTIME VILLAGE AMBULANCE LEADER TAKES SOUTHERN BERKSHIRE POST (NA)

Shawn Godfrey, who has guided the nonprofit Village Ambulance service in Williamstown through a string of crises and successes since 2002, has resigned his position as general manager and taken a field paramedic post with the Southern Berkshire Ambulance Service in Great Barrington. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Godfrey said he was offered the position in Great Barrington, and after careful consideration of what was best for himself and his family, decided he would rather be delivering emergency medical aid first hand, rather than administrating its delivery.

ADAMS: FIRE DEPARTMENT PLANS OPEN HOUSE (NA)

The Adams Fire Department and Alert Hose Company will host its annual Fire Prevention Week open house from 1 to 4 p.m. on Saturday, at the fire house on Columbia Street. The event will feature a live Jaws of Life demonstration, hands-on activities, handouts, and more. This year's theme, "Hear the Beep Where You Sleep," promotes working smoke alarms in every bedroom.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE TRIP FUNDRAISING HALTED (NA)

The Adams-Cheshire Regional School District requested that all fundraising efforts for a high school trip stop. IBerkshires.com reports that committee member Stephen Vigna requested Monday night that Superintendent Kristen Gordon ask that any fundraising for the proposed high school 2017 Costa Rica trip halt because it has not yet been approved. Teacher Tammie Shafer came before the board last week asking for official permission for the trip. Hoosac Valley Principal Jeremiah Ames said he had yet to review the trip and could not endorse it. Shafer said some of the 25 students interested have started payments and fundraising efforts have been planned.

WILLIAMS COLLEGE SETS FUNDRAISING GOAL OF \$650 MILLION BY 2019 (NA)

Williams College has raised the bar on its fundraising efforts, announcing this week that it hopes to raise \$650 million by June 30, 2019. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the college, which has quietly raised \$374 million toward that goal since 2012, on Saturday kicked off the public portion of its campaign. The \$650 million goal is the highest in the college's 222-year history. Williams College holds an endowment totaling roughly \$2.3 billion and has already embarked on a multi-year construction and renovation effort estimated to cost more than \$278 million.

ADAMS-CHESHIRE DISTRICT PLEDGES BETTER COMMUNICATION WITH CHESHIRE (NA)

The Adams-Cheshire Regional school-district School Committee is promising stronger communications with Cheshire during the upcoming and likely challenging budget cycle. IBerkshires.com reports that Selectmen met Tuesday with Advisory Board and Cheshire representatives from the School Committee to discuss the upcoming budget and challenges facing the district and town Tuesday. Selectmen Chairwoman Carol Francesconi said she wished there were stronger communications in regards to the budget and the decision to attempt to bring Lanesborough into the district.

CLARKSBURG VOTERS TO DECIDE SCHOOL FEASIBILITY FUNDING (NA)

Voters in Clarksburg will decide this month on whether to spend up to \$250,000 on a feasibility study of school options. IBerkshires.com reports that a special town meeting is scheduled to be held on Wednesday, Oct. 21, at 7 p.m. at Clarksburg School. The last day to register to vote is Saturday, Oct. 10, by 8 p.m. \$100,000 of the funds would come from the school's stabilization account and \$150,000 from the town's stabilization account. The money would be used to hire a company to conduct a study of renovation and building options for Clarksburg School.

WILLIAMSTOWN ELEMENTARY REMAINS CLOSED (NA)

Williamstown Elementary School remains closed today to address a malfunction in the school's heating system. IBerkshires.com reports that school officials discovered an ethylene glycol spill in the school's gymnasium yesterday. Superintendent Douglas Dias emphasized that the ethylene glycol, a common component of antifreeze, was a liquid, not a gas, and that students and staff were not exposed to the chemical Wednesday. The school will reopen on Tuesday.

POLL TIMES EXTENDED IN NORTH ADAMS (NA)

City officials in North Adams have extended by two hours the window to cast a ballot during the Nov. 3 general election. The move comes after complaints from residents about short polling hours during the September preliminary election. The City Council has unanimously approved a proposal to have the polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. City Clerk Marilyn Gomeau says that Federal elections require that the polls remain open for 13 hours, but state law only requires 10 hours for a city election. During the preliminary mayoral election, the polls were open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

WOMAN IN UNIVERSITY OF MASSACHUSETTS GANG-RAPE CASE FILES MULTIPLE SUITS (AII)

The woman who has testified in three trials that she was gang-raped in her dorm room at the University of Massachusetts in 2012 has filed lawsuits against the four men she accused, as well as against the university and the people she says were responsible for Pierpont Hall security on the night in question. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the lawsuits were filed Tuesday – the last day she could file them under the three-year statute of limitations. In both suits, the woman demands a jury trial and that the court award her a "reasonable amount" of money, plus interest and costs.

MOUNT GREYLOCK COMMITTEE SENDS APPORTIONMENT PROPOSAL TO TOWNS (NA)

The Mount Greylock Regional School Committee has finalized a proposed change to the regional agreement that alters the way capital expenses are apportioned to member towns. IBerkshires.com reports that the committee also got the strongest indication to date that there will continue to be a Mount Greylock Regional School District. The future of the two-town district has been in question since Lanesborough town officials earlier this year began entertaining overtures from the Adams-Cheshire Regional School District.

ADAMS CONTINUES PUSH TO REDEVELOP MEMORIAL SCHOOL (NA)

Selectmen in Adams have reaffirmed their support for efforts to redevelop the former Adams Memorial Middle School as a community center and housing. IBerkshires.com reports that Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco discussed the future of the Memorial building with Director of Community Development Dona Cesan and the Board of Selectmen during a workshop meeting yesterday. After the former school was closed, the town was able to capture state funds to replace the roof. However, before the building can find permanent full use the building needs a new HVAC system.

APPLICATION DATE SET FOR GAS PIPELINE (AII)

Kinder Morgan's Tennessee Gas Pipeline Co. has set a date to formally file an application with federal regulators for the 412-mile, \$3.3 billion Northeast Energy Direct natural gas pipeline. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the official, 7,000-page document slated to be sent to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission on November 20th will include a 20 percent increase in the pipeline's volume capacity, a slight reversal of its move in mid-July to scale back the project. The company plans to seek approval for 1.2 billion cubic feet per day along a 30-inch pipeline, an increase from 1 billion in recent preliminary filings.

NORTH ADAMS BLAZE LEAVES FAMILIES WITHOUT HOMES, PETS (NA)

At least four people were left homeless Saturday night after a 2-alarm fire destroyed a four-unit residence on 222-224 Furnace Street in North Adams. IBerkshires.com reports that an officer on patrol downtown first noticed the smoke billowing above Furnace Street, flames were already coming through the roof when the first firefighters arrived on scene. The building was a total loss and was demolished Sunday as a precautionary measure. The state fire marshal's office is investigating the cause. Fire Director Stephan Meranti said it appears to have begun on the exterior in the back and moved quickly up into a porch roof and into the attic.

FATALITY REPORTED IN TWO-VEHICLE CRASH IN NORTH ADAMS (NA)

A head-on collision in North Adams resulted in a fatality on Friday afternoon shortly before 3:30pm near 541 Massachusetts Avenue, on Mass Avenue Extension. The Berkshire Eagle reports that police have identified the victim in the crash as 62 year old Anthony Corsi, of North Adams. Corsi was eastbound when his vehicle collided with a truck driven by 29 year old Matthew Reynolds, also of North Adams. Reynolds and three minor children who were passengers in the truck were taken by North Adams Ambulance to the Berkshire Medical Center Emergency Facility in North Adams. Their condition was not known.

WINTRY CONDITIONS DON'T CHILL FUN AT BERKSHIRE FOOD FESTIVAL (NA)

Local eateries served up a variety of cuisine on Sunday for hundreds of visitors to the Berkshire Food Festival in downtown North Adams. The previous 13 Berkshire Food Festivals had been city-sponsored events, organized this year by local radio stations: WNAW-AM in North Adams and WUPE-FM in Pittsfield. WNAW Station Manager Bob Heck was pleased with the turnout given the weather and the event being held in the fall, rather than late summer.

BERKSHIRE SCENIC'S MAIDEN VOYAGE DEEMED SUCCESS FOR ADAMS (NA)

Adams Town officials said the maiden voyage of the Berkshire Scenic Rail, launched last weekend, was deemed a success for Adams and North Adams. IBerkshires.com reports that more than 750 tickets were purchased for Hoosac Valley Service's soft opening Columbus Day weekend. The partnership between the towns and the train museum was announced in 2013 but there were delays caused by legal and operational issues. Although the track is not yet complete, Cesan said all the materials are purchased to finish the last 7/10 of a mile to Hoosac Street.

PITTSFIELD STUDEBT BRINGS GUN TO SCHOOL (All)

A small-caliber pistol and a magazine of ammunition were discovered in a Herberg Middle School locker on Friday morning, according to city officials. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the staff initiated the school's "shelter in place" protocol Friday morning after a student notified a teacher of the weapon's presence. The protocol calls for students to be held in "safe zones" — smaller-sized classrooms — with the blinds drawn. School administrators and the School Resource Officer David Orsi located the weapon, which was not loaded, and immediately turned it over to the Pittsfield Police Department.

CRASH SENDS MAN TO HOSPITAL (NA)

Police say they are investigating what caused a Pownal man to lose control of his vehicle Tuesday on Route 7 and strike a utility pole. The Bennington Banner is reporting that according to the Bennington County Sheriff's Department, the crash occurred at 8:15 a.m. near Pownal Self Storage. The vehicle involved was a Ford Focus being driven by 33 year old John Russell. He was traveling north when he lost control of the vehicle and it went into a spin and hit the pole. Russell was treated by both Pownal and Bennington Rescue Squads and taken to Southwestern Vermont Medical Center. He was then moved to Albany Medical Center. His condition was not released. The crash remains under investigation.

CLARKSBURG APPROVES FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (NA)

A special town meeting in Clarksburg on Wednesday overwhelmingly voted to fund a feasibility study of the aged elementary school. IBerkshires.com reports that the vote of 113-2 to spend up to \$250,000 to study a renovation or new building was met with applause after nearly an hour of discussion, most of it focused on assurances that the Massachusetts School Building Authority would reimburse its portion. Some voters however questioned if the town should be investing in property instead of academics and in light of talks of regionalization.

RETIRED TEACHER CELEBRATES 100TH BIRTHDAY (NA)

Retired Cheshire School teacher, Rose Graziani, celebrated her 100th birthday yesterday. And out of that century of life, more than half had been spent teaching. Graziani had spent nearly 40 years teaching in the Cheshire schools, returning to her post when her only child was ready for school. She later spent 21 years as a Lanesborough substitute teacher, retiring again at 87.

AG URGING PIPELINE REVIEW (AII)

State Attorney General Maura Healey has doubled down on her doubts about Kinder Morgan's proposed Tennessee Gas Pipeline project that would cut through parts of seven Berkshire communities. The Berkshire Eagle reports that on the last day of the extended public comment period for the \$3.3 billion, 412-mile pipeline, Healey urged the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to rigorously review the impact of the mammoth project before deciding whether to approve it. Her statement was filed with regulators last Friday, as she expanded on her previous demands for close scrutiny of the Northeast Energy Direct pipeline.

WNAW NORTH ADAMS MAYORAL DEBATE YESTERDAY (NA)

The North Adams Mayoral candidates sparred in a Berkshire News Network Debate on (our sister station) WNAW yesterday. Incumbent Mayor Richard Alcombright and former long-time Mayor, John Barrett III answered questions from a panel of local media, including representatives from IBerkshires.com, The Berkshire Eagle and The Berkshire News Network. The debate seemed to focus primarily on the city's finances... and things did get contentious at times.

NORTH ADAMS CUMBERLAND FARMS THIEF GETS 5 1/2 YEARS (NA, P)

The Pittsfield man who robbed a North Adams Cumberland Farms store at gunpoint last year has been sentenced to up to 5 1/2 years in prison. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 26 year old Geraldo Martell, of New Bedford, said through his attorney he robbed the store to get cash to purchase diapers and other child care supplies for his then-2-year-old son. Martell admitted he entered the store just before midnight September 10th, of last year, pointed a handgun at the clerk and demanded the cash in the register. He reached into the till and walked out of the store with about \$220 cash. Martell pleaded guilty to one charge of armed robbery with a dangerous weapon and assault with a dangerous weapon. Martell will serve his sentence at the Massachusetts Correctional Institution at Ceder Junction.

WILLIAMSTOWN DRUG DEALER CHARGED IN ESCAPE TRY, THREATS (NA)

A Williamstown man serving up to 17 years in prison on drug and weapons charges is facing additional time for allegedly trying to escape custody and threatening authorities. 39 year old Ernest Harvin incurred the new charges on November 10th and 14th, just days before he pleaded guilty to 13 charges including possession of heroin with intent to distribute and possession of a firearm in commission of a felony. He pleaded not guilty in Berkshire Superior Court on Monday to one count of escape from a penal institution, two counts of threatening to commit a crime (murder), three counts of threatening to commit a crime (assault and battery with a dangerous weapon) and two counts of intimidation of a witness.

GREYLOCK MILL DEVELOPERS, OFFICIALS CELEBRATE \$173,900 IN USDA GRANTS (NA)

A massive event space and a dairy production facility are coming to North Adams — all in the same building. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the developers of the Greylock Mill on Route 2 were joined by federal and local officials yesterday to celebrate two U.S. Department of Agriculture grants to the project. The total of the two grants, revised upward from an announcement last week, is \$173,900. New York City-based Latent Productions, which bought the former Cariddi Mill earlier this year, has unveiled an ambitious renovation plan for the date mill facility that includes hotel, residential, retail, food production and event spaces.

WINDS AND SOAKING RAIN FROM HURRICANE (AII)

A storm drawing on leftover tropical moisture from the remnants of Hurricane Patricia is expected to dump at least two inches of rain on the Berkshires and southern Vermont starting this morning as twin storm centers from the Great Lakes approach and merge. The Berkshire Eagle reports that a wind advisory for central and North Berkshire was issued by the National Weather Service, effective from noon to midnight on Wednesday for southeast winds 20-30 mph, gusting to 50 mph. Potential hazards include scattered damage from downed trees and utility lines, which could cause power failures.

ENROLLMENT DIPS SLIGHTLY AT MASSACHUSETTS PUBLIC COLLEGES (AII)

Public colleges in Massachusetts reported an overall 1.8 percent decrease in enrollment this year, largely fueled by a downswing at the state's community colleges. The state's fall enrollment report showed a 1.7 percent increase at the four undergraduate campuses of the University of Massachusetts, and a drop of less than 1 percent at the nine state universities. But numbers fell by 4.3 percent at community colleges, a loss of more than 4,000 students. State officials blame a shrinking pool of high school students across the state, part of what they called a natural enrollment cycle.

STUDY KNOCKS PARCC, RECOMMENDS KEEPING MCAS AND IMPROVING IT (AII)

The Board of Elementary and Education is slated to vote next month on whether the state should switch to the PARCC exam, developed by a national consortium of which Massachusetts is a member, or continue to use the MCAS test in place since the 1990s. After Gov. Charlie Baker said this month he wanted an assessment system adopted that would let Massachusetts control its own destiny, Elementary and Secondary Education Commissioner Mitchell Chester and Education Secretary Jim Peyser floated the concept of new, state-developed "MCAS 2.0." The Pioneer Institute, a critic of both PARCC and the Common Core curriculum standards on which the test is based, is recommending an updated version of the MCAS system as the test of choice.

THE BERKSHIRES TWO CITIES GO TO THE POLLS TOMORROW (NA, P)

The cities of North Adams and Pittsfield will be going to the polls tomorrow. Each city will be electing a mayor — and members of their respective city councils, and school committees. The marquee races in each city are the Mayoral races. North Adams will either re-elect Richard Alcombright or elect long-time former mayor, John Barrett III, who served the city for 26 years. In Pittsfield, voters will either elect the incumbent Mayor, Dan Bianchi or current City Clerk, Linda Tyer. The major change this election in Pittsfield is that for the very first time, voters will be electing a Mayor to a four-year term.

MASS WORKS GRANTS ANNOUNCED IN GREAT BARRINGTON FRIDAY (WNAW)

Massachusetts Assistant Secretary for Communities and Programs, Juan Vega, was in Great Barrington on Friday to announce "Mass Works" grants for 10 Berkshire towns. Vega announced the grants from the steps of the Great Barrington Town Hall, and the Berkshire News Network was there to find out what specific amounts each town would be getting. The town of Florida is among communities receiving grant money...

: 23 Vega-Florida - Cue: Florida and Savoy

This was the 6th announcement throughout the state, and it consisted of 8.6 Million dollars to 10 communities for 10 infrastructure projects. The town of New Ashford is also among towns receiving grant money.

WILLIAMSTOWN PLANNING BOARD SAYS KEEP WORKING ON LINKS (NA)

The Williamstown Planning Board continues to encourage the owner of Waubeeka Golf Links to work with town officials on a proposal for a zoning change that would allow an inn at the course. IBerkshires.com reports that at its most recent meeting, three members of the five-member board told Michael Deep and his attorney to sit down with Town Planner Andrew Groff and board member Ann McCallum to develop draft proposals for the board to consider at its November meeting. The board could put a bylaw before May's annual town meeting that would allow the additional use at Deep's property in South Williamstown.

MCLA PRESIDENT FINALISTS NAMED (NA)

The Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts Presidential Search Committee have identified five finalists for the next president of the college. The five finalists are: Mary Alexander, Ph.D., dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at Western Connecticut State University; James Birge, Ph.D., interim president at Marygrove College; Scott Furlong, Ph.D., dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay; S. Alan Ray, Ph.D. and visiting scholar at Harvard Law School; and Andrew Rogerson, Ph.D., provost and vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University.

The City of North Adams has re-elected Mayor Richard Alcombright to a fourth consecutive two-year term. The incumbent bested former long-time mayor John Barrett III by 376 votes. Alcombright collected a total of 2,430 votes, while Barrett received 2,054 total votes. The victory was a complete reversal of the preliminary election, where Barrett swept all five city wards. This time around it was Alcombright that swept the wards. Voter turnout was fairly high, and during our election night discussion with Alcombright, he thanked the voters for coming out to vote...

The North Adams City Clerk's office reported last night that there was a 52 percent turnout, or 4,485 out of the city's 8,691 registered voters.

2016 CITY COUNCIL AND SCHOOL COMMITTEE TAKES SHAPE IN NORTH ADAMS (NA)

Seven incumbents and two others won seats on the North Adams City Council. Incumbent Kate Hanley Merrigan was the top vote getter with 2,738 votes. Also re-elected were incumbents Lisa Blackmer, Keith Bona, Eric Buddington, Nancy Bullett, Joshua Moran and Benjamin Lamb. Ronald Boucher and Robert Moulton Jr. also won seats on the council. Meanwhile the North Adams school Committee has three new members. Winning election last night were Karen Bond, Nicholas Fahey, and Tara Jacobs.

THREE ARRESTED IN DRUG RAID AT NORTH ADAMS APARTMENT (NA)

Three have been arrested on drug charges, following an early morning raid of a Bracewell Avenue apartment in North Adams. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Fantasia Segar and Naim Moore, both of Brooklyn, N.Y. and Merredith Futrell, of North Adams, were taken into custody following the 2:40 a.m. execution of a search warrant, according to North Adams Police. All three have been charged with possession of a Class B drug (crack cocaine) with intent to distribute, trafficking in a Class B substance and conspiracy to violate drug laws.

POWNAL MAN HELD FOR ALLEGED ASSAULT (NA)

A Pownal man was held without bail Monday after being accused of assaulting another. 27 year old James Brown pleaded not guilty to a felony count of aggravated assault, two misdemeanor counts of reckless endangerment, and disorderly conduct. He'll be held until a bail hearing.

WILLIAMSTOWN VOTERS TO DECIDE CHANGES TO TAXES FOR MOUNT GREYLOCK (NA)

In response to Lanesborough citizen concerns over a possible bond issue to finance a construction slash renovation project at Mount Greylock Regional — and with data showing a decline in Lanesborough enrollment figures over the past few years — The Berlshire Eagle reports that some in the town wanted assurances if enrollment continues to decline. One concern is... would they be locked into paying a higher share of the construction cost when they have a shrinking number of students attending the school? At a special town meeting set for tomorrow, Williamstown voters will be asked to approve a change in the way the town tax burdens for the Mount Greylock Regional School District are calculated.

DEAL MADE TO CONSTRUCT TEMPORARY BERKSHIRE SCENIC RAILWAY PLATFORM (NA)

Landmark Federal Credit Union and the city of North Adams have reached a lease agreement for the land that will become the Berkshire Scenic Railway's northern platform. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the agreement will allow for construction of a temporary platform that abuts the rail line and sits behind the Brien Center's parking lot accessed via American Legion Drive. The Berkshire Scenic Railway Museum will be on the hook for the \$3,000 payment of the lease. According to Mayor Richard Alcombright, the city will construct the platform using its Department of Public Works and material leftover from renovating the rail line and other construction.

ST. STAN'S CLASS CONNECTING WITH ADAMS POLICE OFFICERS (NA)

Sixth-graders at St. Stan's in Adams got a visit from the police on Friday. IBerkshires.com reports that Officers Gregory Onorato and Travis Cunningham stopped the classroom to answer questions about their job and to view the student's "Hall of Heroes." Teacher Jessica Jennings said when looking for a service project for her pupils, she noted that they had born after the 2001 attacks on the World Trade Center. She thought it would be a good way for her students to learn about the heroics of New York City's emergency services and connect it to Adam's own public safety personnel.

SHELTERS AGAIN READY TO SERVE HOMELESS (GB, NA, P)

There have been a few changes since last winter's grip finally loosened, but the local response to homelessness has new funding in place to meet the expected level for need this season. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Brad Gordon, executive director at Berkshire County Regional Housing Authority, said county shelters and other programs have again received \$150,000 in state funding to deal with emergency housing issues. State funding will be provided to the Louison House in Adams and to Construct Inc. in Great Barrington. The regional housing authority received funding for its several programs aimed at preventing homelessness and attacking the root causes of the problem.

WINTER PARKING BANS ROLLING OUT (NA)

Winter Parking Bans are starting to roll out across the Berkshires. Among communities issuing early bans is the town of Adams. Adams Police have announced that the town's overnight parking ban is now in effect. Vehicles are not to be parked on any public way or Town parking lot between 12:00 am and 7:00 am. Those violating the parking ban will be fined \$25.00 and could have their vehicle towed at their expense. This ban will remain in effect until further notice.

GIRL WAS SEXUALLY ASSAULTED OVER TWO-YEAR PERIOD (P, NA)

Opening statements were heard yesterday in the sexual assault of a teenage girl over a two-year period. According to the prosecution, George Shurtleff took the trust of a teenage girl he'd known since she was young and turned it into a "broken heart," and "betrayal," by sexually assaulting her over the course of two years. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Shurtleff's attorney, Nathaniel Green, said much of the evidence in the case is disputed and suggested the girl may have had other motivations for making the accusations. The 54 year old Shurtleff, of Adams, has pleaded not guilty to charges of rape and abuse of a child aggravated by an age difference, three counts of indecent assault and battery on a child under 14 and two counts of indecent assault and battery on a person 14 or older. Assistant Berkshire District Attorney Rachael Eramo said the abuse of the victim began in February 2011 when the girl was 13 and continued "month after month," until November 2013.

AIRPORT CONSTRUCTION IS WINDING DOWN (NA)

Contractors making renovations to the airport in North Adams will shut work down for the winter. IBerkshires.com reports that Nick Ippolito of Gale Associates, the engineering firm representing the airport during renovations, told the airport commissioners on Tuesday that by next meeting, they will have to vote on the contractors request to shut down construction until spring. He said contractors still have to apply markings, take aerial photos, and properly seal new paving. Phase 2 of the airport's apron project should also begin in the spring.

\$815 MILLION INVESTED IN BERKSHIRE COUNTY SINCE 2012 (ALL)

There has been at least \$235 million in public monies and \$580 million in private investment in the county over the past three years in ongoing or completed projects — But those figures haven't translated to employment or wage increases. IBerkshires.com reports that the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission approved yesterday the annual Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy performance report. The report outlines the status of an array of economic development projects — including improvements to the Pittsfield Municipal Airport, renovations at Williams College, and the Hoosac Wind Farm.

CAPELESS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF STATE DA'S ASSOCIATION (AII)

Berkshire District Attorney David Capeless has been elected President of the Massachusetts District Attorneys Association, which is comprised of the Commonwealth's eleven elected District Attorneys. Capeless was elected President at the MDAA office in Boston on Wednesday during the Association's monthly meeting. The long-tike District Attorney says his top priority as President of the association will be to ensure that action to combat the present opioid abuse crisis will result in effective reforms of present medical prescribing practices, insurance provisions for treatment, and support for law enforcement to investigate and prosecute drug traffickers and dealers.

ADAMS SELECTMEN CONSIDER REGIONALIZING EMERGENCY DISPATCH SERVICE (NA)

The town of Adams will consider regionalizing its emergency dispatch service, the Board of Selectmen agreed on Wednesday. The Berkshire Eagle reports that a consultant's study of the issue recommends that Adams use the Berkshire County Sheriff's Communications Center to dispatch emergency and non-emergency communications for the town's police, fire and ambulance services. The Communications Center, located at the county's jail facility on Cheshire Road in Pittsfield, provides around-the-clock dispatching services for at least 26 communities in Berkshire and Hampden counties.

NORTH ADAMS EMPLOYEES COLLECT 816 POUNDS OF FOOD FOR PANTRY (NA)

North Adams's annual holiday food drive resulted in more than 800 pounds of food delivered to the Friendship Center Food Pantry on Friday morning. IBerkshires.com reports that the collection, coordinated by Ellen Sutherland, assistant to the superintendent, included all city departments and City Hall, and the schools. Sutherland said one class at Johnson School made it part of their community service project.

WILLIAMSTOWN FIRE OFFICIALS WANT ANOTHER LOOK A REPAIR PLAN (NA)

The Prudential Committee in Williamstown last week voted to put a hold on a repair project to the town's fire station. IBerkshires.com reports that the committee, which oversees the fire district, has for months been trying to address cracks that have developed in the wall at the front of the Water Street building. A contractor was set to come as early as Thursday last week to begin work on reinforcing the wall, but the committee members questioned the fact that the project's nature had changed since the contract was signed. The committee asked Fire Chief Craig Pedercini to arrange for the contractor and the engineer who originally studied the building to come and explain the new solution to the problem. Pedercini said he would try to set up such a meeting as early as today.

MCLA TO HOST TERRORISM DISCUSSION (NA)

Three professors and an international policy expert — and anyone else interested in joining them — will convene this evening for a discussion of terrorism and recent events at the MCLA Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation. On the panel will be political science faculty members David Cupery, Robert Bence, and J. Benjamin Taylor. Adam Hinds, a locally based international policy expert who worked for the United Nations in the Middle East for 10 years, also will be on the panel. Recent terror attacks across the globe also will be topics of interest. The panel convenes at 7pm in the Feigenbaum Center for Science and Innovation Auditorium on Blackinton Street in North Adams, room 121.

HOLIDAY WEATHER HOPEFUL FOR TRAVELERS NEXT WEEK (AII)

While gearing up to travel for Thanksgiving, weather and modes of transportation becomes a main concern. Fortunately, for New England, a weekend cold front should lead to a warmer day on Thursday. Dan Goodman, manager of public affairs of AAA Northern New England, says this holiday will mark the seventh consecutive year with the highest number of travelers since 2007.

COUNTY UNEMPLOYMENT TICKS UP SLIGHTLY (AII)

Following two months below the 5 percent mark, the Berkshire County unemployment rate has reached that threshold again in October. According to statistics released by the state Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development on Tuesday, the county's jobless rate ticked up slightly from 4.8 to 5.0 percent last month. October's local rate is slightly higher than the state unemployment rate of 4.5 percent. Unemployment in the Pittsfield and North Adams labor market areas rose slightly last month to 5.1 and 6.0 percent, respectively. Unemployment in the Great Barrington labor market area remained at 3.5 percent. In the Berkshire's two cities, the jobless rate rose slightly in both North Adams and Pittsfield to 7.0 percent and 5.2 percent, respectively.

FORMER NORTH ADAMS TREASURER APPOINTED AS SVC CFO (NA)

Southern Vermont College has announced the hiring of Jennifer Macksey as the college's new chief financial officer and chief administrative officer. The Bennington Banner reports that Macksey has over 20 years of experience working with financial systems in both higher education and local government. Since 2008, she worked as the director of student accounts and bursar at the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts in North Adams, and previously worked for the city of North Adams as treasurer and tax collector for eight years, and director of finance and chief procurement officer for five years.

BOARD OF NORTH ADAMS HOUSING PROGRAM VOTES TO DISSOLVE (NA)

After three years of effort, the board of nonprofit Housing Opportunities, Inc., voted Monday to dissolve and have its assets absorbed into the city's community development office. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the move, approved by a 3-to-1 vote, will be finalized pending approval from Attorney General's Office. Established in the 1980s under the auspices of the North Adams Housing Authority to administer Community Development Block Grants for first-time home buyers, HOI has not acquired new property in more than a decade.

MCLA ANNOUNCES NEW OPTION FOR NY TRANFER STUDENTS (NA)

Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts has announced a new opportunity for New York state residents who wish to transfer to the campus. The New York Transfer Program provides guaranteed admission, as well as a reduced cost of attendance for students looking to enroll at MCLA. Officials at the school say that students with an Associate's degree from a State University of New York institution may have their credits transferred directly to MCLA. The benefits include the satisfaction of most of MCLA's core curriculum requirements, for a potential 60 transfer credits. In addition, these students are guaranteed admission to the major of their choice, as well as a New York Tuition Reduction, which provides an 85 percent tuition reduction for New York students.

FINAL DEFENDANTS TRIAL IN UMASS RAPE CASE STARTS TODAY (AII)

The trial for the last of four defendants, accused of raping a UMass Amherst student in 2012, is set to begin today. 20 year old Caleb Womack was found competent to stand trial after an examination from a board-certified forensic psychologist, according to the Daily Hampshire Gazette. The trial get underway today with jury selection. Womack, formerly of Pittsfield but who now lives in Enfield, Conn., faces three counts of aggravated rape.

CORRESPONDENCE FROM ALEXANDER CICCOLO'S DETENTION MAY BE USED IN TRIAL (NA)

Letters and phone calls from Alexander Ciccolo while in custody may be used as evidence in his upcoming trial, according to court documents. The Berkshire Eagle reports that Ciccolo was living in Adams and under investigation for allegedly concocting a plot to attack a college campus using firearms and homemade explosives, but so far he hasn't been arraigned on any specific terrorism-related charges since his July 4th arrest. He has pleaded not guilty to charges of illegal weapons possession and assault and battery with a dangerous weapon. Ciccolo remains held without bail while awaiting trial. A status hearing will be held in the case on December 9th.

LANESBOROUGH FIRE ON THANKSGIVING CAUSES \$100,000 IN DAMAGE (NA)

An apparently accidental Thanksgiving evening fire in Lanesborough left no one injured but caused about \$100,000 in damage. The Berkshire Eagle reports that according to Lanesborough Fire Chief Charlie Durfee, the fire at 14 Alice Avenue began in the basement just before 7pm. A preliminary report from the state Fire Marshal's office said the fire was unintentional, but a final cause hadn't yet been determined.

FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF WILLIAMSTOWN TO DIVEST \$2.3M ENDOWMENT (NA)

The Church Council of the First Congregational Church in Williamstown has elected to divest its \$2.3 million endowment from the fossil fuel industry. The Berkshire Eagle reports that located in the center of the Williams College campus, the church's action comes two months after the college's board of trustees — in a much-debated decision among students, staff and alumni — elected not to divest its \$2.3 billion endowment, but rather to invest \$50 million in energy conservation and renewable energy sources.

WILLIAMSTOWN-LANESBOROUGH SUPERINTENDENT LOOKS AT COLLABORATION (NA)

The Tri-District school superintendent told the Williamstown Elementary School Committee that he is looking at ways to better collaborate among the three districts. IBerkshires.com reports that Douglas Dias, who serves as superintendent for Williamstown, Lanesborough Elementary and Mount Greylock Regional, said a recent incident involving a boiler replacement in Williamstown pointed to the need for the three schools to share services. Dias' remarks came up in the context of the committee's annual update on technology at the elementary school.

ADAMS MAN GETS UP TO 12 YEARS IN PRISON FOR RAPE OF TEEN GIRL (NA)

An Adams man was given a hefty prison sentence yesterday. George Shurtleff was led away in shackles to begin a 10- to 12-year prison sentence for sexually abusing a teenage girl. According to the Berkshire District Attorney's Office, the 54 year old Shurtleff, of Adams, was sentenced in Berkshire Superior Court on rape and assault charges, following his Nov. 23rd conviction by a jury. He will serve his sentence at the Massachusetts Correctional Institution at Cedar Junction.

LAST OF FOUR DEFENDENTS PLEADS GUILTY IN RAPE CASE (AII)

The last of four co-defendants accused of raping a former University of Massachusetts Amherst student pleaded guilty to reduced charges yesterday in Hampshire Superior Court and was sentenced to five years in county jail as jury selection in his trial was set to begin. The Berkshire Eagle reports that in a plea deal reached with prosecutors, 20 year old Caleb Womack pleaded guilty to one count of rape and two counts of assault and battery on a person 14 years or older after earlier being indicted and pleading not guilty to three counts of aggravated rape. The former Pittsfield resident was sentenced to 2½ years in jail on each of the assault and battery charges, waiving his right to parole, and 10-years of probation on the rape charge. The charges to which he pleaded guilty carry a combined maximum prison sentence of 30 years. Womack's three co-defendants— Emmanuel Bile Jr., Justin King and Adam Liccardi, all 21 and from Pittsfield were each sent to state prison after separate trials. Bile was sentenced to eight to 10 years, while King and Liccardi were each sentenced to 10 to 12 years.

WILLIAMSTOWN ELEMENTARY AGAIN CLOSED BY HEATING ISSUE (NA)

For the second time this fall, Williamstown Elementary School was closed for the day due to an issue with the heating system. IBerkshires.com reports that shortly before 7 a.m. yesterday, the district used its "robo-call" notification system to inform families of the closure. Superintendent Douglas Dias said later in the morning that a leak in the school's primary boiler caused it to shut down over the weekend.

NORTH ADAMS HOUSING AUTHORITY SELLS FLOOD HOUSE (NA)

The North Adams Housing Authority has transferred the Flood House property to the Louison House agency. IBerkshires.com reports that the board unanimously voted last week to sell Church Street property to Family Life Support Center Inc., a non-profit family shelter, for one-dollar. The board also voted to expand Section 8 local preference to surrounding communities.

FORMER HOOSAC HOSE CO. TREASURER ADMITS TO STEALING \$32,000 (NA)

The former treasurer of the Hoosac Hose Company has been ordered to complete 100 hours of community service for stealing more than \$32,000 from the organization. The Berkshire Eagle reports that 80 year old Everett Martin, of Windsor Road, Cheshire, admitted Nov. 20th to sufficient facts for a finding of guilt on a charge that he pilfered funds from the organization's bank account on multiple occasions dating back to 2011. The Hoosac Hose Company is the fundraising arm of the Cheshire Fire Department.

PEARL HARBOR ATTACK REMEMBERED TODAY (AII)

Today is National Pear' Harbor Remembrance Day. Events are being held today across the country today to commemorate the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor. The Dec. 7, 1941, surprise attack by Japan on the U.S. Navy base at Pearl Harbor in Hawaii claimed about 2,400 American lives and pushed the United States into World War II.

REVITALIZATION PLANS UNVEILED (NA)

What began a few years ago with a prototype in a basement may one day become an extreme model railroad museum. The Berkshire Eagle reports that on Saturday, Mass MoCA visionary Thomas Krens was flanked by city officials and former Massachusetts Governors William Weld and Michael Dukakis as he proposed transforming a section of Western Gateway Heritage State Park into a massive, multimillion dollar extreme model railroad and architecture museum. That proposal is part of a three-pronged development plan that also includes the renovation of the city's Mohawk Theater on Main Street and his previously announced vision for a 160,000-square-foot contemporary art museum on the city's Harriman-West Airport grounds.

MCLA PRESIDENTIAL SEATCH NARROWED TO TWO (NA - interest)

The field of candidates for the position of president at MCLA has been narrowed to two. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the Executive Committee of the MCLA board of trustees voted on Thursday to focus on the final two candidates: Jaimie Birge and Alan Ray. The unanimous vote followed a discussion and review of the search, which began in July, according to board Chairman Tyler Fairbank. The board will meet again at 5 p.m. Thursday in Murdock Hall to further discuss the candidates and to vote on which finalist to recommend to the Board of Higher Education as the next president of MCLA. The meeting will be open to the public. Board Vice Chairman James Clemmer is serving as interim president.

NORTH ADAMS SAYS GOODBYE TO THREE SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEMBERS (NA)

The city on North Adams bid farewell to three School Committee members last week who had a combined quarter-century of service. IBerkshires.com reports that Mary Lou Acetta, Lawrence Taft and David Lamarre were treated to a small party and tokens of appreciation at what was likely their last meeting. Mayor Richard Alcombright, chairman of the committee, praised their dedication as "strong leaders and strong professionals" during their tenures. Accetta, the committee secretary, had been on the committee the longest, being elected in 2003. Taft joined the committee in 2005 and Lamarre in 2011.

TERROR INCIDENTS RAISE FAIR TRIAL CONCERNS (NA – Interest)

The attorney for terrorism suspect Alexander Ciccolo said yesterday that recent ISIS-inspired attacks in Paris and California raise concerns about the ability to give his client a fair trial if he ends up before a jury. IBerkshires.com reports that thus far, the Adams resident is only facing only charges of weapons possession and assault on a nurse during his initial incarceration in July. A government affidavit filed for a bail hearing this summer however, alleged that Ciccolo sympathizes with the self-proclaimed Islamic State in Iraq and Syria and that he was planning an act of domestic terrorism when he was arrested by the FBI on July 4th.

ADAMS OFFICIALS REASSURE RESIDENTS ON DISPATCHING SWITCH (NA)

Public safety officials in Adams last night tried to reassure residents that using the Berkshire County Sheriff's Communications Center for dispatch was not a safety concern. IBerkshires.com reports that residents have been reluctant to eliminate the town's dispatch services — and its three dispatchers — despite the potential cost savings. Many of those in the crowd at the Visitors Center felt the voters should decide the issue, not the Board of Selectmen. Police Chief Richard Tarsa explained the logistics of the switch that would save the town more than \$150,000 annually.

CRANE SPLITS OFF STATIONERY DIVISION (NA)

The popular stationery sold under the name "Crane" will be able to keep its name, but will no longer be affiliated with the Crane Company. Crane CEO Stephen DeFalco told the Berkshire Eagle yesterday at the company's Dalton headquarters that it is turning over its stationery division to employees to run as a separate company so that it can concentrate solely on its more lucrative global currency operations. The new entity will be known as "Crane Stationery" and will remain in the Crane stationery division's current production facility on Curran Highway in North Adams. The same management team that is already in place will run the entity, but it will be owned by the employees.

BERKSHIRE COUNTY'S TEEN BIRTH RATE FALLS BY MORE THAN HALF (AII)

The birth rate among teenagers in Berkshire County declined by more than half between 2009 and 2014, according to figures released by the Massachusetts Department of Health. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the birth rate among 15- to 19-year-old females in 2014 was 12.4 births per 1,000 — a more than 54 percent reduction. The rates in Pittsfield (57 percent) and North Adams (63 percent) showed the most dramatic decreases. As for the state-wide birth-rate for teens — Massachusetts saw a 46 percent during the same period. Both the state and Berkshire County rates are below the national rate of 26.5 percent.

GREYLOCK MILL OWNERS PLAN NEW YEAR'S PARTY FEATURING DINNER, DANCING (NA)

Owners of the Greylock Mill in North Adams want a New Year's Eve dinner and dance party at the mill to open up interest in its redevelopment plan. The Berkshire Eagle reports that the party is called "Unlock" and will be hosted in the mill's former weave shed. The mill's owners have accelerated renovation efforts to make the space event-ready.

NORTH ADAMS MAN WHO ALLEGEDLY TOSSED DOG FACES CRUELTY (NA)

A North Adams man was held on \$500 cash bail yesterday for allegedly possessing a sawed-off shotgun without a license and injuring his girlfriend's Chihuahua during a domestic dispute. The Berkshire Eagle reports that according to police – 36 year old Bobby Ewing, of Bracewell Avenue, allegedly threw one of his girlfriend's two dogs after it bit him, early Saturday. While retrieving the dog, officers spotted a sawed-off shotgun in plain view on the living room couch. The 12-gauge shotgun was fully loaded with five rounds of buckshot. Ewing pleaded not guilty in Northern Berkshire District Court on Monday to charges of possession of a sawed-off shotgun, possession of a firearm without an FID card, possession of ammunition without an FID card, and cruelty to an animal.

CHESHIRE SELECTMEN CONCERNED OVER DOG WASTE (NA)

Selectmen in Cheshire are fed up with dogs fouling the Ashuwillticook Rail Trail and town property but do not know how deal with violators. IBerkshires.com reports that the board members last week read a letter from a concerned citizen urging them to contact the state Department of Conservation and Recreation and demand it place more dog-waste cleanup signs on all Cheshire entrances of the rail trail. Department of Public Works Director told the board Tuesday that the DPW actually provided the signs that cost \$30 a piece and they are scattered throughout town. He thinks the signs do little to help the situation.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPERS PLAN TO REUSE WILLIAMSTOWN MILL (NA)

A group of architects in Williamstown are looking to build an affordable housing project on town-owned property at 330 Cole Ave. IBerkshires.com reports that in spring 2014, the Board of Selectmen voted to choose a group led by Pittsfield's Berkshire Housing Development Corp. to build up to 46 units of subsidized housing on the site. Developers' early projections called for the removal of what is left of the former mill, referred to as "the cube." But last week, in a presentation in the Selectmen's Meeting Room, BHDC President Elton Ogden and architects from Springfield's Dietz & Co. explained that the current plan calls for reusing the structure.

\$40,000 GRANT TO HELP STRUGGLING STUDENTS (NA)

The Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts has received a \$40,000 grant to identify and assist students that are falling behind. The Berkshire Eagle reports that aimed at improving student retention and improving the academic standing of students, the two-year grant from Davis Educational Foundation establishes a system for school faculty to intervene when a student is struggling. "Blazing a Trail for Student Success" will utilize the school's existing online course management system to identify a student in need of help, allowing relevant faculty and advisers to step in and improving communication between the parties. The grant will allow for the testing of appropriate intervention strategies and also for a system for recording those interventions.

FIRST WINTER STORM OF SEASON (ALL)

The first winter storm of the season in the Berkshires, and the latest snow debut on record has deposited less snow and more sleet and freezing rain across the county. The National Weather Service told the Berkshire Eagle that the "springtime in December" party is definitely over. NORTH ADAMS SWEARING-IN SET FOR NEW YEAR'S DAY (NA)

North Adams city will enter the new year with a new City Council and the swearing in of Mayor Richard Alcombright for his fourth two-year term. IBerkshires.com reports that the Organization of Government takes place beginning at 11 a.m. on Friday in the City Council Chambers. The event will be telecast by Northern Berkshire Community Television. Councilor Benjamin Lamb, re-elected to his second term in November, is expected to be elected as president of this council's two-year term. Lamb said he was confident he had the five votes necessary to be elected to the post and no other candidate has so far come forward.

NORTH ADAMS WEIGHS OPTIONS FOR DECOMMISSIONED SCHOOL (NA)

The future of Sullivan Elementary School on Kemp Avenue in North Adams remains up in the air, as it is set to be replaced by the newly renovated Colegrove Park Elementary School on Monday. The Berkshire Eagle reports that as a result of a \$30 million update to the former Silvio O. Conte Middle School, Colegrove Park, will inherit Sullivan's 330 students. The project reached substantial completion this month and school staff members have been moving in to prepare the new environment. Sullivan is in the process of closing for good and the building will maintain a low-running heat to preserve the plumbing while city officials work to build a future for the school parcel. According to North Adams Public Schools Superintendent James Montepare, maintenance crews are transferring the last of the appropriate materials into Colegrove this week.

CHESHIRE MAY NOT BE ABLE TO INCREASE SELECT BOARD SIZE (NA)

The Cheshire Selectmen brought into question the legality of an article approved at town meeting to increase the Board of Selectmen from three to five members. IBerkshires.com reports that Selectwoman Carol Francesconi says that the article, which was placed on the warrant via citizen's petition, was flagged by the attorney general after the review of this summer's Cheshire town meeting results. The Selectmen had no comment on the legal determination of the article or next steps at the meeting. The next special town meeting will be held February 23rd.

ADAMS MAY INCREASE BUILDING COMMISSIONER'S SALARY (NA)

With the quick turnover of building commissioners over the past 15 years, the town of Adams will look to increase the position's salary by more than \$10,000. IBerkshires.com reports that Town Administrator Tony Mazzucco told the Selectmen yesterday that with Building Commissioner Jeff Clemons leaving last month, the town needs to look at increasing the salary to a more competitive amount. Currently the inspection post pays between \$48,000 and \$55,000 a year. Mazzucco suggested increasing this to the \$62,000 to \$67,000 range. He added this would be more in line with the salary of full-time building inspectors in towns of the same size as Adams, which run about \$70,000.

GREYLOCK FEDERAL CREDIT UNION BRANCH ROBBED AT KNIFEPOINT (P - interest)

The Greylock Federal Credit Union branch on Route 7 was robbed at knifepoint yesterday, according to Greylock CEO John Bissell. The Berkshire Eagle reports that just before 6pm, a suspect displayed a knife and demanded money. Bissell declined to say how much was stolen. No one was injured in the robbery. Several police cars were seen at the branch, which is across from Pontoosuc Lake near the Lanesborough border. The branch will be closed today and will reopen Monday.
