Dr. Bedford Palmer, assistant professor in the counseling department at St. Mary's college has done research around African American worldview as well as multicultural factors in psychology and behavioral training. He spoke with KCBS reporter Doug Sovern about the continued escalation of violent events around policing and racial issues in the nation, offering insights to the frustrations that communities feel over why similar narratives continues to happen.

Gentrification remains a big issue in the Bay Area as many residents, as well as businesses, are pushed out of San Francisco and Silicon Valley due to soaring rents. As they settle into more affordable areas, that in turn pushes out other residents that results in changing neighborhoods and a variety of social and economic impacts. Chris Tragery is the conceptual artist of “Oakland, I want you to know...”, a new exhibit on gentrification at Oakland Museum of California, that gives voice to the residents of Oakland to share their stories about the shifting landscape of their neighborhoods. He spoke about how the idea for the exhibit came to creation and shared some of the stories he gathered. Curator of public practice for the Oakland Museum of California, Evelyn Orantes, also shared more information about the museum that many residents may not know about.

He also discussed how these diseases affect not only the aging boomer population, but the generations that follow after them and how researchers are still looking for causes in addition to effective treatments.

He spoke on how the cycle repeated many times over from welcome, backlash, to adjustment and where we currently are in that pattern.
