In addition, December and November were both revised to show stronger spending. December sales were revised to down only 0.1 percent, compared with the previously reported fall of 0.3 percent, while November sales were revised to up 2 percent from up 1.8 percent.

### **EXTREMELY PREMATURE BABIES SHOW HIGHER AUTISM RISK**

**VO: 23**

Children born extremely preterm may face a much higher-than-average risk of developing autism later in childhood, a new study suggests. Researchers found that of 219 children born before the 26th week of pregnancy, 8 percent met the criteria for an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) at age 11. That compared with none of 153 classmates who were born full-term and included in a comparison group.

### **EXCESS WEIGHT RAISES PREGNANCY**

**VO: 13**

Being overweight or obese increases a woman's chances of having an extra-big baby, even after the effects of pregnancy-related, or "gestational," diabetes are taken into account, new research shows. Excess weight in and of itself also sharply increased a woman's risk of pre-eclampsia, a potentially deadly pregnancy complication, Dr. Boyd E. Metzger of Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine in Chicago and his colleagues found.

### **TOYOTA RECALL**

**VO :26**

Toyota says it still hasn't decided whether its president will appear before the U.S. Congress. But it's promising to again look into possible electronic problems with its vehicles. Toyota has been criticized as being slow in responding to reports of problems with gas pedals, floor mats and brakes. The unfolding recall crisis has ballooned over the past four months to 8.5 million vehicles globally.

### **IMMIGRATION SWEEPS**

**VO :26**

A federal judge has found grounds for sanctioning an Arizona sheriff's office for destroying records involved in a racial profiling lawsuit. The case accuses deputies of basing some traffic stops on the race of Hispanics riding in vehicles. Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio has repeatedly denied the allegations. The sheriff's office has said the document destruction was an honest error.

### **MIGRAINE DRUGS DON'T UP BIRTH DEFECT RISK**

**VO :23**

A study in nearly 70,000 pregnant women has found no link between migraine drugs called triptans and the risk of birth defects. However, the researchers did find a "slight increase" in the risk of excessive bleeding during labor, and the failure of the uterus to contract normally after delivery, for women who used the drugs while pregnant.

### **57 MILLION AMERICANS INFECTED WITH H1N1**

**VO :26**

Although cases of influenza H1N1 in the united states are less, the civil servants of health in the united states informed that 57 million people in all the country got infected with this virus, of which 257,000 were hospitalized and 11,690 died. This is according to new calculations of the prevention and control centers of diseases. The cases of the disease reached their greater level in october and are less since then.

### **ARIZONA SENATE APPROVES SWEEPING IMMIGRATION BILL**

**VO :29**

The Arizona Senate has approved a sweeping bill to strengthen immigration enforcement laws. The measure passed the Senate 17-13. Scottsdale Republican Carolyn Allen joined Democrats in opposing the measure sponsored by Mesa Republican Sen. Russell Pearce. It now goes to the House. Pearce's bill would ban police departments from adopting policies that prevent officers from asking people about their immigration status. The bill also would make it a state crime to be in Arizona illegally or to transport or conceal an illegal immigrant.

### **OBAMA NUCLEAR PLANT**

**VO :19**

The Obama administration, advancing nuclear power use to help cut greenhouse gas emissions, will announce Tuesday an \$8.3 billion loan guarantee to help Southern Co build two reactors, a government official told Reuters. The reactors are in line to be among the first nuclear generating facilities to win U.S. government approval in three decades. The official said Monday that President Barack Obama would announce the loan guarantee after he tours a jobs training center in Lanham, Maryland, where he will discuss new government investments to create energy jobs and develop a low carbon economy.

### **BILL AIMS TO END IN-STATE TUITION FEES FOR ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS**

**VO :23**

The days of taxpayer-subsidized college tuition could be coming to an end for tens of thousands of illegal immigrants. Republicans in the House of Representatives have introduced a bill to close a loophole that California and nine other states have used to provide lower-cost college tuition to illegal immigrants. Supporters of the legislation say it's wrong for illegal immigrants to pay the same tuition as legal immigrants and U.S. citizens to attend public colleges and universities.

### **52 PERCENT OF VOTERS TEXANOS FAVOR VISAS OR WAY**

**VO :30**

A poll in Texas, indicated that more than half of the voters of that state, considers that an opportunity is due to give the undocumented immigrants so that they remain in the United States, with a visa of work or the american citizenship. According to the survey the 29 percent is in favor of which to the undocumented people it is allowed them to become citizen americans, and the 23 percent supports the work visa granting. only the 38 percent favors the deportation.

### **HISPANICS FLEE LAW, JOB LOSS**

**VO :20**

Latinos are leaving their once-thriving neighborhoods in Gwinnett and Cobb counties in search of friendlier alternatives. It shows in business closures, arrest statistics, church attendance and something as simple as a busy highway turned deserted at night. A shortage of jobs is behind this exodus. Stepped-up immigration enforcement also is a factor.

### **MORE LATINO STUDENTS ARE GOING AWAY TO COLLEGE**

**VO :23**

Since 1975, the share of Latino freshmen at four-year colleges who choose schools more than 50 miles from home has risen to nearly 59% from about 46%, and the share who attend such colleges within 10 miles of home dropped to 15% from 30%, according to a study by UCLA's Higher Education Research

Institute. At the same time, the proportion of white freshmen who went away to school stayed unchanged, at about 66%. The researchers say the change is partly the result of growth of the Latino middle class and a rising educational confidence among children and grandchildren of immigrants.

The Federal Reserve is poised to turn off a major money spigot that has helped sustain the ailing real estate sector, as an extraordinary program under which the Fed has pumped \$1.25 trillion into the mortgage market is slated to end March 31.

### **HEALTH BEAT COLON CANCER**

**VO :29**

A panel of experts is looking to a cheap, at-home test kit as a way to increase the number of people who get screened for the nation's No. 2 cancer killer. The specialists, convened by the National Institutes of Health, pointed to California health care giant Kaiser Permanente's program to track down those due for colon cancer screening and mail them the \$20 kits that test stool for problems.

### **QUARTER OF STROKE PATIENTS DIE WITHIN A YEAR: U.S. STUDY**

**VO :21**

One in four people who have a stroke will likely die within one year from any cause and 8 percent who have a stroke will have another one soon, U.S. researchers said on Monday. The risks were higher for African-Americans compared to whites and increased with age and the number of other ailments stroke patients had, the researchers wrote in the journal Neurology.

### **DIABETES DRUG STINKS, DOCTORS FIND**

**VO :18**

The commonly used diabetes drug metformin stinks, literally, and this may explain why many patients stop taking it, U.S. doctors reported on Monday. The drug smells like fish or dirty socks to some people and this could account for the well-known side effects of the drug, which can make people nauseated, they said.

### **MOM'S EXERCISE HAS LITTLE IMPACT ON NEWBORN WEIGHT**

**VO :19**

Exercise during pregnancy, while healthy for both mother and baby, has only a minor impact on an infant's birth weight, suggest findings from a large study from Norway. On the other hand, the findings confirm a strong association between being heavy prior to becoming pregnant and having a heavier baby, Caroline Fleten of the Norwegian Institute of Public Health in Oslo, and colleagues report.

### **WANTED: VOLUNTEERS, ALL PREGNANT**

**VO :21**

Researchers would collect and analyze volunteer's vaginal fluid, toenail clippings, breast milk and other things, and ask about everything from possible drug use to depression. At the birth, specimen collectors would scoop up volunteer's placenta and even her baby's first feces for scientific posterity.

### **WANT KIDS' VACCINATIONS UP TO DATE? KEEP THE RECORD**

**VO :19**

Taking charge of your toddler's vaccination record may be the best way to ensure he or she doesn't miss any shots, a new study suggests. "In our country, we think the doctor should have all the medical records," said Dr. James McElligott, a pediatrician at the Medical University of South Carolina who worked on the study. "I like the idea of putting the ownership back in Mom's hands and empowering her a little bit."

### **3D VISION**

**VO :17**

A U.C. Berkeley vision scientist reports there is such a thing as 3-d fatigue. His research shows if 3-d movies or tv are done badly, it strains our eyes. In the real world our eyes converge when we look at nearby objects and diverge when we look into the distance. at the same time our eyes have to focus. he says 3-d violates the normal rules of perception. That leads to headaches, blurry vision, a tired feeling.

**TOYOTA RECALL COROLLA****VO: 23**

Toyota is considering a recall of its hot-selling Corolla subcompact after complaints about power steering problems -- another blow to the world's largest automaker already reeling from a string of recalls for safety problems. Company President Akio Toyoda, meanwhile, said he won't be attending the U.S. congressional hearing on the automaker's safety lapses, entrusting the job to U.S.-based executives -- though he did say he would appear if summoned. He said he wanted to focus his energies on improving quality worldwide.

**OBAMA ECONOMY****VO: 20**

President Barack Obama says the emergency legislation he signed a year ago to help the struggling economy has saved at least 2 million jobs and avoided a deeper recession. Speaking on the first anniversary of the American Recovery and Investment Act, Obama said that embracing the \$787 billion measure "wasn't a politically easy decision," but said he had no choice. He conceded that too many people still are in need of work and many more are struggling to pay bills. But Obama also chided critics. He said that many of the same lawmakers who assailed the stimulus bill "showed up at ribbon-cutting ceremonies in their districts." But Obama also acknowledged that current economic conditions don't "feel much like a recovery" to those who are still hurting.

**PROPOSED CUTS WOULD END CALIFORNIA ASSISTANCE FOR MOST NEW LEGAL IMMIGRANTS****VO: 22**

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's latest proposals to close California's budget shortfall would end public assistance for most new legal immigrants, eliminating emergency cash, food and medical aid for those who don't yet qualify for federal welfare. The proposal would represent an about-face for the state. In 1996, Congress denied access to welfare for most legal immigrants who weren't citizens. California and other states established programs to fill the gap. Now, officials say the state can't afford the price tag. Schwarzenegger's plan would save \$304 million but leave tens of thousands of elderly, disabled and impoverished people with no safety net in a deep recession.

**DUI CHECKPOINTS****JAIME GARCIA - LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA****PKG 2:05**

A California investigation has found that sobriety checkpoints have caught more unlicensed motorists than drunks, creating a cash cow for local police departments that impound vehicles - mostly from minority drivers and often from illegal immigrants. But the 30-day seizures may be illegal. In mounting such operations, police officers also racked up tens of millions of dollars in overtime pay. The investigation, by California Watch and the Investigative Reporting Program at the University of California-Berkeley, says that last year, local police earned about \$40 million from fines and towing fees, which cities split with tow companies. And cops collected \$30 million in overtime -- paid for by the federal government -- for staffing the DUI checkpoints.

**ASPIRIN MIGHT REDUCE RECURRENCE RISK FOR BREAST CANCER SURVIVORS, STUDY**

**FINDS****VO: 19**

Women who take aspirin regularly after their breast cancer goes into remission are about 50% less likely to suffer a recurrence or to die from the disease, according to new findings from the ongoing Nurses' Health Study. The results, reported Tuesday in the Journal of Clinical Oncology, are surprising because at least five large studies have shown that taking aspirin regularly has no effect on the risk of developing breast cancer in the first place. The study's authors described the findings as surprising and worthy of follow-up, but even they cautioned that survivors shouldn't yet begin prophylactic aspirin use. The new results could be because the process of metastasis of breast cancer is different than that of initiation and could thus be susceptible to influence by aspirin. Or it could be simply that there is some other shared characteristic of women who took aspirin that produced the beneficial effect.

**MANY U.S. KIDS HAVE CHRONIC HEALTH PROBLEMS: STUDY****VO:19**

More than a quarter of American children have a chronic health condition such as obesity or asthma, but many children overcome these problems with time, U.S. researchers said on Tuesday. They said the findings make clear that chronic health conditions are rising among children, and access to healthcare is essential to diagnose and treat them. A lot of kids will have chronic conditions over the course of their childhood," said Dr. Jeanne Van Cleave of Massachusetts General Hospital for Children in Boston, who worked on the study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. "It is very important for children to have continuous access to high-quality healthcare, especially primary care, where a lot of these conditions are picked up and treated," she said in a telephone interview. Van Cleave and colleagues used data from a government survey of three groups of children -- each group with about 1,000 or more children -- aged 2 through 8 between 1988 and 2006.

**GENE TESTING****VO: 27**

Genetic testing appears to be making a dent in some inherited diseases. A review by The Associated Press finds that births of babies with cystic fibrosis, Tay-Sachs and other less familiar disorders have dropped since testing came into wider use. A professor at the University of California at San Diego who tracks Tay-Sachs says there have been only about a dozen new cases a year for the past decade. Genetic testing has become a routine part of prenatal care for many women, helped by lower cost and stiffer competition in the testing industry. When defects are found, the pregnancies are often terminated.

**US GOVT TO INVESTIGATE TOYOTA COROLLA****VO: 25**

A Transportation Department official says the department plans to open a formal investigation into the 2009-2010 Toyota Corolla over potential problems with the car's power steering. The preliminary investigation is expected to be opened on Thursday. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the department had not yet notified Toyota of the probe. Toyota Motor Corp. said earlier Wednesday it was looking into complaints of power steering problems with the Corolla and was considering a recall. Toyota said there have been fewer than 100 complaints. Drivers have complained they feel they were losing control over the steering, particularly at highway speeds. Toyota sold nearly 300,000 Corollas in the United States last year.

**ATTACKS-HEALTH TRIALS - 9/11****VO: 29**

Lawyers defending New York City against thousands of lawsuits filed by Sept. 11 emergency responders say many of the claims are baseless. They asked a judge late Tuesday in a series of court filings to dismiss some of the first cases headed toward trial. The city's legal team has detailed several

instances in which people who claimed to have been sickened by World Trade Center ash were in poor health before the attacks. One of the plaintiffs is a former Fire Department battalion chief who was granted a disability pension for breathing ailments in 1999. Another is a 400-pound utility worker now blaming shortness of breath and other respiratory problems on dust from the trade center. The lead lawyer for more than 9,000 ground zero workers is dismissing the city's motions as posturing.

## **PENSION SHORTFALL-STUDY**

### **VO: 22**

States may be forced to reduce benefits, raise taxes or slash government services to address a \$1 trillion funding shortfall in public sector retirement benefits, according to a new study that warns of even more debilitating costs if immediate action isn't taken. The Pew Center on the States released a survey Thursday of state-administered pension plans, retiree health care and other post-employment benefits in all 50 states that blamed a decade's worth of policy decisions for leaving them shortchanged. The result for some states will be "high annual costs that come with significant unfunded liabilities, lower bond ratings, less money available for services, higher taxes and the specter of worsening problems in the future," the study said.

## **AIRLINE CRASHES**

### **VO: 23**

An airline industry group counts fewer airline crashes last year compared to 2008. But, the International Air Transport Association says there were nearly 700 deaths in 2009, compared to about 500 the year before. There were 18 fatal airline accidents last year, five fewer than in 2008. Two-thousand nine's major accident rate was the second lowest ever. The Air France crash over the Atlantic, the Yemeni Airways crash in the Indian Ocean and

## **AIRPORT SECURITY**

### **VO: 21**

An Obama administration official says more air travelers may have their hands swabbed as part of a stepped-up effort to screen passengers for explosives. The official says added security measures may begin as early as Wednesday. The official requested anonymity to speak about security plans. The official said airports were told Wednesday that more passengers should be randomly screened for explosives before, during and after they go through metal detectors. The screening could include swabbing travelers' hands or their carry-on luggage to check for traces of explosives.

## **HEALTH INSURANCE RATES**

### **VO: 24**

Eye-popping health insurance premium increases of up to 39 percent are not an exception but a worrisome sign of the times, the Obama administration said in a report Thursday. Proposed premium increases by Anthem Blue Cross for Californians purchasing their own coverage set off a wave of criticism and forced the company last week to announce a postponement. Now, the Health and Human Services Department says similar pressure on premiums is being felt in at least six other states.

## **FLU VACCINE**

### **VO: 22**

World Health Organization advisers will announce the make-up of this coming year's seasonal flu vaccine Thursday. Flu vaccine makers anxiously await the decision, scheduled to be announced at 5 a.m. EST, because they need this guidance to start formulating vaccines for the Northern Hemisphere's fall vaccine mix. The decision is more complicated this year because of the pandemic of H1N1 swine flu. Although the pandemic is on the wane, the virus is still infecting and killing people. Other strains of flu are still circulating but at far lower levels than usually seen in February.

**TOYOTA LATEST****VO: 24**

Toyota Motor Corp President Akio Toyoda, under pressure after a series of safety recalls, agreed Thursday to appear before U.S. lawmakers investigating the crisis. Toyoda, grandson of the founder of the world's top automaker, accepted an invitation to testify next Wednesday before a congressional panel. His decision ended days of uncertainty about how the embattled automaker would respond to growing calls for a fuller response to safety complaints.

**OBAMA HOUSING****VO :20**

U.S. President Barack Obama announced on Friday a 1.5-billion-dollar fund to help homeowners in five states hit hardest by the country's housing crisis. Obama said the fund will support local housing finance agencies in California, Florida, Nevada, Arizona and Michigan, which have seen home prices decline more than 20 percent from their peaks.

**FEDERAL RESERVE MOVE RATTLES STOCKS****VO :26**

The Federal Reserve's decision to raise the interest rate it charges on short-term loans to banks reverberated in the financial markets Friday, sending overseas stock indexes lower and giving fresh momentum to a recent rise in the dollar. The Fed took the move to normalize lending after holding interest rates to extraordinary lows for more than a year to prop up the financial system. But the move, announced after the close of U.S. equities markets, sent Asian stocks lower, with the Nikkei 225 index in Tokyo dropping over 2 percent, and both the Kospi index in Seoul and the Hong Kong's Hang Seng indexes showing similar declines.

**OBAMA ON HEALTHCARE****VO :25**

President Barack Obama says Washington can't squander the opportunity to overhaul the health care system. Addressing a town hall in Nevada, Obama defended the Democratic bills that have passed in Congress and argued that the nation's economic woes require immediate action. The president spoke just days before his bipartisan health summit set for Thursday. He said he was awaiting the Republican proposal to address the increasing number of uninsured and rising medical costs and dared them to put it on the table.

**NEW DRUG CLASS OFFERS HOPE AGAINST SUPERBUGS****VO :17**

Researchers from a privately held Swiss biotech company Polyphor and the University of Zurich said the potential medicines are effective against a type of bacteria known as "gram-negative," and offer hope for new treatments for serious and often life-threatening infections. The antibiotics work by deactivating a protein vital for the formation of the bacteria's outer cell membrane. Polyphor's chief financial officer said the firm was in talks with pharmaceutical firms about possible licensing deals on the most advanced drug candidate, called POL7080, which selectively kills the dangerous pseudomonas aeruginosa, a common bacteria that can cause lung infections.

**FDA REQUIRES NEW WARNINGS FOR ASTHMA DRUGS****VO :19**

U.S. health officials said Thursday they were taking steps to reduce the use of certain asthma drugs because of serious risks, including death. Inhaled medicines known as long-acting beta-agonists, or LABAs, must carry warnings saying they should never be used alone to treat asthma, the Food and Drug Administration said. LABAs are sold as Glaxo's Serevent and Novartis AG's Foradil, which Merck & Co Inc markets in the United States. Two more widely used blockbuster medicines -- GlaxoSmithKline Plc's Symbicort -- combine a LABA with an inhaled corticosteroid.

**GENE TEST CAN IDENTIFY BITS OF CANCER IN BLOOD****VO :23**

A personalized blood test can tell whether a patient's cancer has spread or come back, offering a better way to see if treatments are working, U.S. researchers said on Thursday. Having a test that can detect tumors in the blood could help doctors customize cancer treatments, offering more aggressive therapy to some patients while sparing others from unneeded chemotherapy or radiation. The gene-based test takes advantage of rapid advances in the technology to sequence whole genomes -- all of a person's genetic code -- once a very costly and time-consuming task.

### **VAGINAL BIRTH CAN BE OK AFTER MULTIPLE C-SECTIONS**

Women who attempt vaginal childbirth after having several babies by cesarean section may not have a greater risk of complications than women who've had only one prior C-section, a new study suggests. At one time, doctors believed that once a woman had a C-section, she would have to have one for all subsequent pregnancies -- mainly out of concern that the scar on the uterus could rupture during vaginal childbirth. That thinking has changed, and vaginal delivery is now considered a safe option for many women who have had a past C-section.

### **AVERAGE BIRTH WEIGHT DECREASES IN THE US**

**VO :20**

Reversing a trend of nearly five decades, birth weight in the U.S. may be on the decline, according to a new study. From 1990 to 2005, birth weight decreased by 52 grams (1.83 oz) on average. The drop - from 3441 to 3389 grams - leaves the vast majority of babies in the safe range, and the overall health consequences of this development are unclear. Small babies (usually defined as lighter than 2500 grams, or 5.5 pounds) may face problems such as low blood sugar, lower body temperatures, or an increase in red blood cells, which can cause the blood to thicken and clot. To track trends in birth weights, Donahue and her colleagues examined birth records for nearly 37 million newborns in the US, excluding California.

### **CREDIT CARDS NEW RULES**

A sweeping credit card law that takes effect Monday has been widely anticipated by consumers who believe banks have been taking advantage of them for too long. ### **OBAMA HEALTH REFORM**

**VO :19**

President Barack Obama is trying to revive his stalled health care overhaul by taking the fight to insurance companies. As part of a new blueprint for remaking the health care system the White House will unveil Monday, Obama will propose giving federal authorities the power to limit rate hikes by health insurers. Coming days before a health care summit with congressional leaders of both parties, it may be the president's last chance to salvage his signature issue.

### **TOYOTA RECALL LATEST**

**VO :28**

Just days before Toyota's president faces U.S. lawmakers, internal documents from the automaker suggest the company put profits ahead of safety. Jeff Kingston of Japan's Temple University calls the papers handed over to congressional investigators "damning." In the 2009 document, Toyota officials boasted a \$100 million savings by getting the U.S. government to agree to a limited recall of floor mats in some Toyota and Lexus vehicles. It also cites millions of dollars in other savings by delaying safety regulations, avoiding defect investigations and slowing down other industry requirements.

### **OBAMA GOVERNORS EDUCATION**

#### **VO :20**

President Barack Obama says he wants academic standards for America's high school students raised, and he's applauding a program from the nation's governors that works toward those goals. The White House, in a statement issued Sunday, says the initiative will develop new reading and math standards that prepare high schoolers for college and careers. The governors will meet with the president on Monday to discuss education. They're wrapping up their National Governor's Association meeting. The governors have been working on Obama's Race to the Top program, which rewards school systems that raise standards.

### **SCHWARZENEGGER STIMULUS JOBS**

#### **VO :27**

California's Republican Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger is hitting back at members of his party for attacking President Barack Obama's economic recovery plan. Schwarzenegger says last year's \$862 billion stimulus plan is "terrific" and has created 150,000 jobs in his state and says that Republicans who criticize the recovery measure while seeking stimulus dollars for their states and congressional districts are playing politics.

### **SENATE REPORT LINKS DIABETES DRUG AVANDIA TO HEART ATTACKS**

The diabetes drug Avandia is linked with tens of thousands of heart attacks, and drugmaker GlaxoSmithKline knew of the risks for years but worked to keep them from the public, according to a Senate committee report released Saturday. The 334-page report by the Senate Finance Committee also criticized the Food and Drug Administration, saying that the federal agency that regulates food, tobacco and medications overlooked or overrode safety concerns found by its staff.

### **WARNING ON FOUR MEDICATIONS AGAINST ASTHMA**

#### **VO :22**

The federal agency of medicines and foods (FDA) adopts restrictions to the use of four drugs against asthma to reduce the risk of death caused by surprise attacks of the disease. The medications are Advair, Symbicort, Foradil and Serevent, that according to the FDA only must be used by patients who cannot control their asthma with other medicines and in the smaller time possible.

### **VITAMIN D & CANCER**

#### **VO :17**

Doctors have known that low levels of vitamin D are linked to certain kinds of cancers as well as to diabetes and asthma, but new research also shows that the vitamin can kill human cancer cells.

### **FUTURE OF AIDS GELS MAY LIE IN DRUGS, EXPERTS SAY**

#### **VO :24**

The quest for a cream or gel to prevent AIDS infection has narrowed to using powerful HIV pills that are already on the market, scientists say. AIDS experts have long been searching for a microbicide, a cream, gel or vaginal ring that women or men could use as a chemical shield to protect themselves from sexual transmission of the deadly and incurable virus.

### **SHOULD HOT DOGS CARRY WARNING LABEL FOR KIDS?**

#### **VO :12**

In the United States, approximately one child dies every five days by choking on food, a rate that the

American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) is trying to change. The AAP released a policy statement today that calls for choking hazard labels on foods that kids might choke on, making a special case for a mandatory warning label on all hot dog packages.

### **TOYOTA RECALL BRAKE OVERRIDE**

Toyota says it's installing a brake override system in three more models. The carmaker says that now 2005-2010 Tacomas, 2009-2010 Venzas and 2008-2010 Sequoias will get the backup safety system that overrides the accelerator if the gas and brake pedals are pressed at the same time. It previously said it was installing the systems in five other existing models. The Tacomas and Venzas are being recalled for problems with gas pedals getting stuck under floor mats and will have the brake override installed at the same time that problem is fixed. Sequoias are being recalled for sticky gas pedals and owners will be notified separately about the override installation, Toyota says.

### **USA ECONOMY JOBS POLL**

Nearly 20 percent of the U.S. workforce lacked adequate employment in January and struggled to make ends meet with reduced resources and bleak job prospects, according to a Gallup poll released Tuesday. In findings that appear to paint a darker employment picture than official U.S. data, Gallup estimated that about 30 million Americans are underemployed, meaning either jobless or able to find only part-time work. Underemployed people spent 36 percent less on household purchases than their fully employed neighbors in January, while six out of 10 were not hopeful about their chances of finding adequate work in the coming month, the poll said.

### **TRAINING FOR PROSECUTORS AND INVESTIGATORS VICTOR HUGO RODRIGUEZ / PHOENIX, ARIZONA PKG 1:27**

Arizona Attorney General Terry Goddard will host a program of criminal justice training for 60 prosecutors and investigators from Mexico on Monday. In 2008, Mexico passed constitutional reforms paving the way for a transition from the Country's traditional judicial written trials to an oral system similar to the United States' judicial system.

### **TENNESSEE TENNCARE LEGISLATION VO :26**

The Avon survey of more than 150 breast cancer health educators and providers from 48 states and Washington, D.C. found a quarter of the states have either cut or eliminated screening mammography and other early detection services for women under 50.

### **HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IN U.S. A "NEGLECTED DISEASE" VO :26**

High blood pressure is a "neglected disease" and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention must do more to fight it by helping Americans eat better and encouraging doctors to treat it more aggressively, an expert panel said on Monday. The report by the Institute of Medicine, one of the National Academies of Sciences, urges the CDC to promote policies that make it easier for people to be more physically active, cut calories and reduce their salt intake.

### **NEWER HEART CTS DELIVER FAR LESS RADIATION VO :15**

Newer CT technology that can capture an image of a beating heart in a single beat may offer one way of reducing a patient's exposure to excess radiation, U.S. researchers said on Tuesday. They said patients who got a type of heart scan called coronary angiography using the newer CT scanner technology received 91 percent less radiation than those who were scanned the traditional way using a computed tomography or CT scanner.

### **FLEXIBLE WORK SCHEDULES VO :21**

An investigation suggests to have a flexible schedule is mental and physically healthful for a person. The report concludes that certain labor conditions that allow the employee to handle its schedules or to retire gradually from work are related to health benefits. The advantages of a flexible schedule can be translated in better blood pressure and stable heart rate and better quality of dream.

### **HOSPITAL INFECTIONS VO :24**

A report reveals that blood infections and pneumonia cathed in hospitals caused the death of 48 thousand patients in 2006 and cost more of eight billions of dollars. The report adds that 20% of those deaths happened by infection in the blood after the patients were put under surgeries.

A House Republican says lawmakers want to hear solutions when Toyota's president testifies before his committee today about the company's safety problems. Rep. Darrell Issa told CBS lawmakers expect Akio Toyoda to explain what he's learned from the issues that have forced the automaker to recall more than 8 million vehicles.

### **TOYOTA RECALL**

**VO :20**

Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood says the government will pursue questions about the electronics on Toyotas that could potentially have sudden and dangerous acceleration. LaHood told lawmakers that federal officials will "go into the weeds" looking for answers. The head of Toyota sales in the U.S. told a congressional hearing that his company's big recalls may "not totally" solve unintended acceleration problems.

### **U.N. NARCOTICS BOARD WARNS OF PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE**

Abuse of prescription drugs is growing rapidly around the world, with more people abusing legal narcotics than heroin, cocaine and ecstasy combined, the United Nations global drugs watchdog said

on Wednesday. The International Narcotics Control Board (INCB) also pointed to a rise in the use of so-called "date rape drugs," as sexual abusers try to get around more rigorous controls with substances not banned by international drugs laws.

### **FDA WARNS OF HEART PROBLEMS WITH**

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration said on Tuesday that HIV drugs Invirase and Norvir might lead to an abnormal heart rhythm when used in combination, according to preliminary data the agency is reviewing. Medicines to treat HIV -- the virus that causes AIDS -- are typically given in multi-drug combinations.

### **VISION PROBLEMS LINKED TO HIGHER**

**VO :19**

Elderly adults with poor vision, particularly untreated vision problems, may have a higher risk of developing dementia than those with better vision, a new study suggests. Researchers found that among 625 older Americans with initially normal cognition, those who said they had poor vision even with corrective lenses were more likely to develop dementia over the next 8.5 years.

### **BIRTHPLACE WEIGHT HEAVELY ON IMMIGRATION**

Where a US immigrant was born could play a significant role in how many pounds they pack on after arriving in America, according to a new study. What's more, birthplace may alter how heavily body weight influences an immigrant's risk of developing diabetes.

### **OBAMA HEALTHCARE**

**VO: 17**

A consensus on how to rein in spiraling health care costs seems to be emerging at President Barack Obama's health care summit. Obama agreed with assertions by Oklahoma Republican Sen. Tom Coburn that such waste and abuse now account for up to a third of the cost of entitlement programs like Medicare and Medicaid and is a major barrier to more widespread insurance coverage. Coburn said cost is the chief reason millions of people don't have health insurance. House Democratic Leader Steny Hoyer of Maryland said he believed Coburn had a point. But he also said the proposals advanced by his fellow Democrats would accomplish just the kind of cost-containment the GOP says it supports.

### **US PATRIOT ACT**

**VO :25**

Democrats have retreated from adding new privacy protections to the nation's primary counterterrorism law, stymied by Senate Republicans who argued the changes would weaken terror investigations. The proposed protections were cast aside when Senate Democrats lacked the necessary 60-vote supermajority to pass them. Dashing the hopes of liberals, the Senate Wednesday night instead passed -- by voice vote without debate -- a one-year extension of key parts of the USA Patriot Act that would have expired on Sunday.

### **IMMIGRATION E-VERIFY**

**VO :24**

A study says an online program some employers use to weed out illegal workers misses more than half the people it's supposed to identify. The research company that evaluated the E-Verify system for the Homeland Security Department found 54 percent of the illegal immigrants checked through E-Verify are cleared to work because they are using stolen or borrowed identities. E-Verify allows employers to run a worker's information against Homeland Security Department and Social Security databases to check whether the person is permitted to work in the U.S. Congress and the Obama administration are urging

employers to use E-Verify voluntarily to help curb illegal immigration.

## **US ABORTION**

### **VO :26**

A group of lawmakers is pushing to make Nebraska the first state to outlaw most abortions after 20 weeks of pregnancy based on the argument that the fetus might feel pain during the procedure. The legislators are seeking to ban all late-term abortions except when the mother's life is threatened. They're emboldened by the Supreme Court's 2007 decision on what abortion rights opponents call partial-birth procedures, in which it for the first time upheld a ban on a specific method of abortion. If the Nebraska bill were to pass -- and it's unclear that it would -- it would surely face a court challenge and could end up at the Supreme Court.

## **TOYOTA LATEST**

### **VO :27**

Toyota Motor Corp President Akio Toyoda apologized to U.S. lawmakers probing the automaker's safety record but ended the day in tears, worried his message went lost in translation. Toyoda, peppered with questions about the recall debacle that has rocked Toyota's reputation, told lawmakers he was "deeply sorry" for accidents and injuries involving Toyota cars. He said the company had lost its way during a period of fast growth but vowed to steer it back to the values that made it a watchword for quality.

## **CHRYSLER MINIVANS**

### **VO :31**

Chrysler Group LLC is asking the owners of more than 355,000 minivans to take them to dealers to replace crash sensors that help to control the airbags. Chrysler says the sensors can crack and fail in 2005 and 2006 Town & Country and Dodge Grand Caravan models. The automaker is calling the move a safety improvement campaign and says it is not a recall. But National Highway Traffic Safety Administration spokeswoman Olivia Alair says the agency is monitoring the repairs like a recall.

## **CONGRESS BILL**

### **BLANCA ROSA VILCHEZ. NEW YORK**

#### **PKG 2:06**

The Senate has passed a bill aimed at boosting job growth by giving tax breaks to businesses that hire the unemployed. The jobs legislation would also extend highway and mass transit programs through the end of the year and pump \$20 billion into them in time for the construction season. Economists say the tax breaks could create perhaps 250,000 jobs.

## **EVERYONE IN US SHOULD GET A FLU VACCINE**

### **VO :17**

Everyone in the United States over the age of six months should get seasonal influenza vaccines every year, federal vaccine advisers said on Wednesday. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices made the long-awaited vote to recommend virtually universal flu vaccination -- something public health experts have long recommended.

## **TRAVELERS TEND TO GET DIFFERENT ILLNESSES**

### **VO :15**

World travel can make anyone sick but men and women tend to suffer different illnesses with women more prone to stomach problems and men at higher risk of fevers and sexually transmitted diseases, Swiss researchers found. A study of almost 59,000 international travelers by the University of Zurich found women were more likely than men to come down with bouts of diarrhea or other gastrointestinal problems, colds, urinary tract infections and adverse reactions to medications, such as those taken to prevent malaria.

## **WOMAN HAS 2 BABIES IN FIRST FOR OVARIAN TRANSPLANT**

**VO :29**

A woman has given birth to two children after her fertility was restored using transplants of ovarian tissue, the first time the complex treatment has produced two babies from separate pregnancies. Claus Yding Andersen, the Danish doctor who treated the woman, said the case showed how this method of storing ovarian tissue was a valid way of preserving fertility and should encourage the technique to be used more in girls and young women facing treatment that may damage their ovaries.

Alameda County Superior Court Judge Frank Roesch on Thursday ordered the state to pay all employees who work in nearly 70 departments their full salaries. He also ordered an end to the three-day-a-month furloughs. The order applies only to workers in departments that are not funded through the state's general fund.

**US ECONOMY  
VO :26**

The economy grew at a blistering 5.7 percent pace in the final quarter of last year, according to a preliminary government estimate. And an updated estimate due out Friday is expected to produce the same figure, according to Wall Street economists surveyed by Thomson Reuters. Roughly two-thirds of last quarter's growth came from a burst of manufacturing -- but not because consumer demand was especially strong.

**GULF WAR ILLINESS

The Veterans Affairs Department says it's preparing to re-examine the disability claims of what could be thousands of Gulf War veterans suffering from ailments they blame on their war service. The review could result in more veterans receiving compensation nearly two decades after the Gulf War ended. General Motors Co. says it will reinstate about 600 dealerships that were slated to be cut from the automaker's network. GM executives say that about 600 dealerships out of the 1,100 seeking to stay with GM will receive letters giving them the option to remain with the company. GM last year told 2,000 dealerships it would revoke their franchise agreements in October 2010 as part of its restructuring. The company has said it needs to make the cuts to keep the remaining showrooms healthy. The dealerships say they have been treated unfairly and have been appealing the decision.

**POSTAL SERVICES SEEKING 5 DAYS DELIVERY****JAIME GARCIA-LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA****PKG: 2:05**

Recent news that the U.S. Postal Service might eliminate Saturday mail delivery hadn't caused much of a stir among locals passing through the Church Street post office Wednesday. "I think it's probably a good idea," said Larry Ball, of Newark. "I'd rather see that than see the price of mail go up." Several other customers expressed a lack of concern, some noting e-mail and online bill-pay systems have reduced the need for traditional mail delivery. In an effort to ward off a projected \$238 billion shortfall during the next decade, the Postal Service this week announced its intent to cut down its weekly delivery from six days to five, saving a potential \$3.3 billion a year, Postmaster General John Potter said.

This census, the NALEO hopes to give the Hispanic community a go-between for those getting registered. "The Latino community will rather go to an agency that's not a government agency," Ortega said. "We want to reduce the fears; we want to be trusted messengers," she said.

Hispanic and black businesses are receiving a disproportionately small number of federal stimulus contracts, creating a rising chorus of demands for the Obama administration to be more inclusive and more closely track who receives government-financed work. Latinos and blacks have faced obstacles to winning government contracts long before the stimulus. They own 6.8 and 5.2 percent of all

businesses, respectively, according to census figures. Yet Latino-owned business have received only 1.7 percent of \$46 billion in federal stimulus contracts recorded in U.S. government data, and black-owned businesses have received just 1.1 percent.

## **US REPORT-DRUG TRAFFIKING**

Drug traffickers are adjusting to law enforcement pressures in Mexico by shifting their operations to smuggling corridors in Central America and the Caribbean, the State Department said Monday. "There is growing evidence that Mexico's drug trafficking organizations are already establishing a presence in these regions, particularly in some Central American states," the department said. In a 2009 survey of global counter-narcotics efforts, the department singled out Bolivia and Venezuela for not doing enough to stop drug trafficking. It cited Bolivia for creating conditions favorable to expanded drug production. And it said Venezuela is doing too little to stop shipments of illegal drugs from clandestine airstrips on its territory, though it credited Venezuela with increased seizures of illicit drugs in 2009. The flow of drugs from Venezuela to the United States, Europe and West Africa increased sharply in 2009, the report said. "A permissive and corrupt environment in Venezuela, coupled with increased drug interdiction efforts in the Caribbean, Central America and Mexico, has made Venezuela one of the preferred routes for trafficking illicit narcotics out of South America," the report said.

Foreclosure filings are up 120% more in the second quarter of this year than what they were this time last year. It really should come at no surprise to anybody. Right now a lot of people that took out adjustable rate mortgages are starting to see their interest rates finally adjust on them and are trying to deal with the increased payments. Many of these same people that took out an adjustable rate mortgage also took a home equity line of credit when their property was increasing in value. They also took out their home equity loan right up to 100% of the value of the home more than likely to pay off credit card debt or other things they did not need. Now they have two loans combined and owe around 125% of what the home is worth.

**ARIZONA SENATE APPROVES SWEEPING IMMIGRATION BILL

The Arizona Senate has approved a sweeping bill to strengthen immigration enforcement laws. The measure passed the Senate 17-13. Scottsdale Republican Carolyn Allen joined Democrats in opposing the measure sponsored by Mesa Republican Sen. Russell Pearce. It now goes to the House. Pearce's bill would ban police departments from adopting policies that prevent officers from asking people about their immigration status. The bill also would make it a state crime to be in Arizona illegally or to transport or conceal an illegal immigrant. And it seeks to curb day-labor employment by making it a crime for an illegal immigrant to solicit work in a public place or for anyone to hire someone from a vehicle.

**FORECLOSURES ERODES LATINO FAMILIES

As the first anniversary of President Obama's Homeowner Affordability and Stability Plan is recognized this week, NCLR (National Council of La Raza), the largest national Hispanic civil rights and advocacy organization in the United States, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Center for Community Capital today released The Foreclosure Generation: The Long-Term Impact of the Housing Crisis on Latino Children and Families, a study which uses interviews with Latino families who have suffered a foreclosure to shed light on the damage inflicted by the loss of their home. The report is the first to provide a glimpse into the far-reaching impact that record-high foreclosures are likely to have on the millions of American families and children expected to lose their home in the coming years, and it calls for a bold response from federal policymakers. "An estimated 1.3 million Latino families will lose their homes to foreclosure between 2009 and 2012.

The investigation, by California Watch and the Investigative Reporting Program at the University of California-Berkeley, says that last year, local police earned about \$40 million from fines and towing fees, which cities split with tow companies. And cops collected \$30 million in overtime -- paid for by the federal government -- for staffing the DUI checkpoints.

Toyota will shut down production at two of its U.S. assembly plants for a total of at least 11 days as it grapples with slower sales after a wave of safety recalls. The shutdowns, announced on Tuesday, will affect Toyota's San Antonio, Texas, and Georgetown, Kentucky, plants and represent the second time the world's largest automaker has had to cut North American output because of a product safety crisis that has cost it sales and damaged its reputation. Toyota Motor Corp faces a sales decline in the United States, its biggest and usually most profitable market, after the recall of more than 8.5 million cars worldwide since late 2009 for three separate defects.

**U.S. URGES GLAXO TO PULL AVANDIA ON HEART RISKS**

The studies, released as part of a report on Avandia by staff of Senate Finance Committee members Chuck Grassley (R., Iowa) and Max Baucus (D., Mont.), also say any head-to-head trial where patients get Avandia and Takeda Pharmaceutical Co.'s diabetes medicine Actos would be "unethical and exploitative." GlaxoSmithKline is currently sponsoring a study, called TIDE, where patients get either Avandia, Actos or other medicines. GlaxoSmithKline said in a prepared statement that it has extensively studied Avandia in more than 52,000 patients and none of its reports shows a statistically significant association between Avandia and heart attacks. The company said the TIDE study was mandated by the FDA and "has been approved by an independent review board and appropriate safety boards that are responsible for assessing the safety of conducting the trial."

A privacy group says the Transportation Security Administration is misleading the public with claims that full-body scanners at airports cannot store or send their graphic images. The TSA specified in 2008 documents that the machines must have image storage and sending abilities, the Washington-based Electronic Privacy Information Center (EPIC) said. In the documents, TSA specifies that the body scanners it purchases must have the ability to store and send images when in "test mode." That requirement leaves open the possibility the machines -- which can see beneath people's clothing -- can be abused by TSA insiders and hacked by outsiders, said EPIC Executive Director Marc Rotenberg.

EPIC, a public-interest group focused on privacy and civil rights, obtained the technical specifications and vendor contracts through a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit. The written requirements also appear to contradict numerous assurances the TSA has given the public about the machines' privacy protections.

Ford Motor Co. plans to fix 17,600 Mercury Milan and Ford Fusion gas-electric hybrids because of a software problem that can give drivers the impression that the brakes have failed. The automaker says the problem occurs in transition between two braking systems and at no time are drivers without brakes. The decision to fix the 2010 model cars came after a test driver for Consumer Reports magazine experienced the problem as he was driving a Fusion Hybrid. Ford spokesman Said Deep says braking power seems to drop away as the car makes a transition from regenerative brakes to the conventional system.

The mayor of Los Angeles has ordered the immediate layoff of 1,000 city employees to help to balance the city's budget. A federal judge has found grounds for sanctioning an Arizona sheriff's office for its acknowledged destruction of records in a lawsuit that accuses deputies of racially profiling countless Hispanics in immigration patrols. U.S. District Judge Murray Snow held off on imposing the sanctions against the office of Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio in the Friday ruling, but indicted he would do so at a later date once related issues were ironed out.

Since early 2008, Arpaio has run 13 immigration and crimes sweeps consisting of deputies and posse volunteers who flood an area of a city - in some cases heavily Latino areas - to seek out traffic violators and arrest other offenders. The handful of Latinos who filed the lawsuit against Arpaio's office alleged that officers based some traffic stops on the race of Hispanics who were in vehicles, had no probable cause to pull them over and made the stops so they could inquire about their immigration status.

The government has received new complaints that bring to 34 the total number of alleged deaths in Toyota vehicles due to sudden acceleration since 2000, according to government data posted Monday. From 2000 to 2009, complaints alleging 21 deaths in Toyota

vehicles had been filed with the government. Toyota Motor Corp. has recalled 8.5 million vehicles globally during the past four months because of problems with gas pedals, floor mats and brakes, threatening the safety and quality reputation of the world's No. 1 automaker. The government typically receives a surge in complaints following a recall. None has yet been verified.

The investigation, by California Watch and the Investigative Reporting Program at the University of California-Berkeley, says that last year, local police earned about \$40 million from fines and towing fees, which cities split with tow companies. And cops collected \$30 million in overtime -- paid for by the federal government -- for staffing the DUI checkpoints.

The studies, released as part of a report on Avandia by staff of Senate Finance Committee members Chuck Grassley (R., Iowa) and Max Baucus (D., Mont.), also say any head-to-head trial where patients get Avandia and Takeda Pharmaceutical Co.'s diabetes medicine Actos would

be "unethical and exploitative." GlaxoSmithKline is currently sponsoring a study, called TIDE, where patients get either Avandia, Actos or other medicines. GlaxoSmithKline said in a prepared statement that it has extensively studied Avandia in more than 52,000 patients and none of its reports shows a statistically significant association between Avandia and heart attacks. The company said the TIDE study was mandated by the FDA and "has been approved by an independent review board and appropriate safety boards that are responsible for assessing the safety of conducting the trial."

**PROTEINS AND OVARIAN CANCER (:26)**

EXPERTS PERFORMED VARIOUS TESTS AND FOUND THAT THERE ISN'T A CONTROL MECANISM THAT IS REALIALE TO EVALUATE THE RISK OF OVARIAN CANCER IN WOMEN WHO DO NOT HAVE ANY SYMPTOMS.

**AUTISM DIETS (:18)**

EVIDENCE LACKING FOR SPECIAL DIETS IN AUTISM. AUTISM IS A SPECTRUM OF DISORDERS AFFECTING A PERSON'S ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE AND INTERACT WITH OTHERS. MORE THAN 25 EXPERTS MET IN BOSTON IN 2008 TO WRITE THE CONSENSUS REPORT AFTER REVIEWING MEDICAL RESEARCH. THE AUTISM SOCIETY AND OTHER AUTISM GROUPS FUNDED THE EFFORT, BUT GAVE NO INPUT.

===== **OBAMA NATIONAL SECURITY ADDRESS: (1:20)** =====

PRESIDENT BARACK OBAMA ASSERTED ON TUESDAY THE GOVERNMENT HAD ENOUGH INFORMATION TO FOIL THE ATTEMPTED BOMBING ON A CHRISTMAS DAY AIRLINE FLIGHT BUT INTELLIGENCE AGENCIES "FAILED TO CONNECT THOSE DOTS" AND LEFT NEARLY 300 PASSENGERS AND CREW IN PERIL. OBAMA CALLED THAT UNACCEPTABLE. "I WILL NOT TOLERATE IT," HE SAID. THE ACCUSED ATTACKER, 23-YEAR-OLD NIGERIAN UMAR FAROUK ABDULMUTALLAB, HAS CLAIMED TIES TO AL-QAIDA. WITNESSES SAID HE IGNITED AN EXPLOSIVE MIXTURE BUT IT FAILED TO DO SERIOUS DAMAGE TO THE NORTHWEST JETLINER OR ITS PASSENGERS, AND HE WAS SUBDUED BY OTHER PASSENGERS AND AIRLINE CREW MEMBERS ON THE DETROIT-BOUND NORTHWEST AIRLINES FLIGHT. OBAMA, SPEAKING AFTER MEETING WITH HIS CABINET AND NATIONAL SECURITY TEAM, DECLARED, "WE HAVE TO DO BETTER, AND WE WILL DO BETTER. AND WE WILL DO IT QUICKLY." ===== **TEXAS STUDY CONFIRMS LOWER AUTISM RATE IN HISPANICS (0:18)** =====

HISPANIC KIDS ARE LESS LIKELY THAN THEIR NON-HISPANIC WHITE COUNTERPARTS TO BE

DIAGNOSED WITH AUTISM, AND SOCIOECONOMIC FACTORS DON'T SEEM TO EXPLAIN THE DIFFERENCE, ACCORDING TO A NEW STUDY IN TEXAS SCHOOLCHILDREN.

OTHER RESEARCH HAS SHOWN A LOWER RISK OF AUTISM AMONG HISPANIC INDIVIDUALS, WHILE ONE STUDY FOUND THAT HISPANICS WITH AUTISM WERE TYPICALLY DIAGNOSED LATER THAN AUTISTIC CHILDREN OF OTHER ETHNIC BACKGROUNDS.

AUTISM COULD BE UNDER DIAGNOSED AMONG HISPANICS, GIVEN THAT THESE CHILDREN ARE LESS LIKELY TO HAVE HEALTH INSURANCE AND MORE LIKELY TO HAVE TROUBLE ACCESSING MEDICAL CARE. WHETHER LOWER AUTISM PREVALENCE IN HISPANICS IS ATTRIBUTABLE TO OTHER, STILL-UNEXAMINED SOCIOECONOMIC, HEALTH CARE DELIVERY OR BIOLOGICAL FACTORS "REMAINS A CRUCIAL AREA FOR FURTHER RESEARCH," PALMER AND COLLEAGUES CONCLUDE.

##### **CELL PHONES MAY PROTECT BRAIN FROM ALZHEIMER'S (0:17)**

A STUDY IN MICE SUGGESTS USING CELL PHONES MAY HELP PREVENT SOME OF THE BRAIN-WASTING EFFECTS OF ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE, U.S. RESEARCHERS SAID. AFTER LONG-TERM EXPOSURE TO ELECTROMAGNETIC WAVES SUCH AS THOSE USED IN CELL PHONES, MICE GENETICALLY ALTERED TO DEVELOP ALZHEIMER'S PERFORMED AS WELL ON MEMORY AND THINKING SKILL TESTS AS HEALTHY MICE, THE RESEARCHERS WROTE IN THE JOURNAL OF ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE. THE RESULTS WERE A MAJOR SURPRISE AND OPEN THE POSSIBILITY OF DEVELOPING A NONINVASIVE, DRUG-FREE TREATMENT FOR ALZHEIMER'S, SAID LEAD AUTHOR GARY ARENDASH OF THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH FLORIDA.

DESPITE DECADES OF RESEARCH, THERE ARE FEW EFFECTIVE TREATMENTS AND NO CURE FOR ALZHEIMER'S, THE MOST COMMON FORM OF DEMENTIA. MANY TREATMENTS THAT HAVE SHOWN PROMISE IN MICE HAVE HAD LITTLE EFFECT ON HUMANS. MORE THAN 35 MILLION PEOPLE GLOBALLY WILL SUFFER FROM ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE OR OTHER FORMS OF DEMENTIA IN 2010, ACCORDING TO THE ALZHEIMER'S ASSOCIATION. GROUPS SUCH AS THE WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, THE AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY, AND THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH, HAVE ALL CONCLUDED THAT SCIENTIFIC EVIDENCE TO DATE DOES NOT SUPPORT ANY ADVERSE HEALTH EFFECTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE USE OF CELL PHONES.

##### **TX-ORGAN DONOR SAVES TWO LIVES (0:19)**
