**TEXAS IMMIGRATION BILL
JUAN JOSE RODAS- AUSTIN, TEXAS
PKG 2:00**

Amid a number of bills filed in Texas that address the issue of illegal immigration, one, proposed by Republican state Rep. Debbie Riddle, stands out. As proposed, House Bill 1202 would create tough state punishments for those who "intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly" hire an unauthorized immigrant. Violators could face up to two years in jail and a fine of up to \$10,000. But it is an exception included in the bill that is drawing attention. Those who hire unauthorized immigrants would be in violation of the law -- unless they are hiring a maid, a lawn caretaker or another houseworker. It is a tough immigration bill with a soft side that protects those who hire unauthorized immigrants "for the purpose of obtaining labor or other work to be performed exclusively or primarily at a single-family residence." Texas state Rep. Aaron Pena, a Republican, said the exception is a wise one.

**ARIZONA IMMIGRATION PROTEST
VO :20**

About 200 high school students walked out of their classes in Phoenix today. They cut class to demonstrate at the state Capitol against a proposed immigration bill. The bill would require Arizona public schools to check the immigration status of students. A state Senate committee advanced the bill late last month -- but it hasn't gone before the full state Senate yet. State Senator Steve Gallardo addressed the students, saying the bill is unconstitutional -- and nothing but political posturing.

UNEMPLOYMENT LOWEST 2 YEARS

President Barack Obama says that a slight dip in the unemployment rate to 8.9 percent is a sign of continued progress but that keeping that momentum going is important to the economic recovery. The government reported Friday that February's jobless rate had fallen to a two-year low, down from 9 percent in January. Obama says the latest numbers show that the economy has added 1.5 million private-sector jobs in the last year and, in his words, "that's progress."

IMMIGRATION PACKAGE IN UTAH

With the immigration package, passed in both chambers of the Republican-controlled Legislature late Friday, Utah made a sharp break with the hard-line trend in state immigration legislation that has been led by Arizona, which passed a strict enforcement law last April. Utah's package includes measures to tighten enforcement against illegal immigrants that echo Arizona's tough stance - like a requirement that the police check the immigration status of anyone arrested on a felony or a serious misdemeanor charge. But supporters said the hybrid package offered an alternative to states, including those controlled by Republicans, that are seeking to avoid the costly political polarization and legal challenges that followed Arizona's law and that also want to recognize the need of some businesses for immigrant labor in spite of high unemployment nationally. The guest worker bill came after intense lobbying by business and farm groups as well as by some immigrant advocates, and it enjoyed the quiet but all-important endorsement of the Mormon Church. It is likely to raise many of the same constitutional questions as the Arizona law, including whether it intrudes on areas of immigration law reserved exclusively for the federal government. Central provisions of Arizona's law, known as S. B. 1070, were suspended by federal courts pending a lawsuit by the Obama administration.

GAS PRICES

VO: 25

Gas prices continued to rise Monday, driven higher for nearly two weeks straight by the turmoil in Libya, with analysts expecting prices to keep climbing. The national average price for a gallon of regular gasoline rose six tenths of a cent to \$3.509, according to a daily survey by motorist group AAA. Prices at the pump can vary widely among states, due in large part to vastly different levels of gasoline tax. Gas prices have increased for 13 days in a row, rising nearly 34 cents in that time. The highest gas prices in the nation are in California, where drivers pay an average of \$3.897 a gallon. Prices were also above \$3.80 in Hawaii and Alaska. Montana had the lowest gas prices at \$3.186 a gallon, on average. Wyoming was a close second with an average cost per gallon of \$3.189. Gas prices vary widely from state to state based largely on local tax rates. But prices have been trending higher nationwide following a rise in the price of crude oil, the main ingredient in gasoline.

**CENSUS CALIFORNIA
ILIA CALDERON- MIAMI, FLORIDA

New census data shows Latinos and Asians accounted for virtually all of California's population growth over the last decade. Data from the 2010 U.S. Census released Tuesday shows Latinos grew by 28 percent and Asians grew by 31 percent. Non-Hispanic whites saw their numbers decrease between 2000 and 2010 by 5 percent, and the state's African-American population dipped by 1 percent. Demographers say Latinos are growing faster than other groups because most Latinos are of child-bearing age while the rest of the population tends to be older. California's population grew 10 percent over the decade to 37.3 million. But growth lagged behind other western states and California failed to pick up additional congressional seats for the first time after a census.

**MARYLAND DREAM ACT
VO :23**

The state Senate has given preliminary approval to a measure that allows illegal immigrants to qualify for in-state tuition at colleges and universities, overcoming the objections of some who said the proposal is too costly, violates federal law and will displace U.S. citizens. The bill, called the Maryland DREAM Act, passed Wednesday evening after six hours of debate that spilled into a rare evening session. The Senate is expected to vote on final passage on Monday. Wednesday's vote is a strong signal that the measure will be successful. Strong emotions flared during the debate on both sides, with proponents arguing that educating a larger pool of residents ultimately benefits the state because they will have higher-paying jobs and contribute more to the tax base.

**IMMIGRANT TUITION
VO: 20**

A panel of Maryland senators is hoping a series of nighttime tweaks will help shepherd a plan to grant in-state tuition to illegal immigrants through the Senate. The Senate Education, Health and Environmental Affairs Committee voted Tuesday night to clean up the plan to grant illegal immigrants the same tuition rates at state-run universities that Maryland residents pay. The full Senate is to begin debating the bill Wednesday morning. The committee voted last week to require that illegal immigrants attend community college before they receive the in-state break at four-year universities, but questions of county residency forced them into the last-minute work session. Although the committee sent the measure to the Senate last week, supporters opted to do the rework in committee where it faces less opposition.

Nearly 12 million people in the United States are cancer survivors, almost four times as many as 40 years ago, reflecting big strides in cancer detection and treatment and the effect of an aging U.S. population, U.S. health officials said on Thursday. But many of the survivors face a

lifetime of side effects caused by their treatments, according to figures released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Cancer Institute. The researchers found there were 11.7 million cancer survivors in 2007, up from 9.8 million in 2001 and 3 million in 1971.

But the church wants a more limited release and says disclosing the priests' confidential files violate their privacy rights and their religious freedom.

Senators also amended the bill to require a student to spend three years in high school -- instead of two -- to be eligible for in-state tuition. Currently, 10 states allow undocumented students to pay in-state tuition.

Attorneys for the U.S. Justice Department are set to meet today with at least a dozen civil and immigrant rights groups, who are asking the feds to expand an investigation of the Suffolk County Police Department on Long Island. Mark Potok, director of the Intelligence Project, Southern Poverty Law Center, published the 2009 "Climate of Fear Report" on treatment of Latino immigrants, which he says provides evidence that Suffolk County officials contributed substantially to racial tension and violence. Now, Potok says County Executive Steve Levy is

openly feuding with a top police officer in the Hate Crimes Unit, and Potok believes the Justice Department needs to step in. The long-time commander of the Hate Crimes Unit, Detective-Sergeant Robert Reecks, was demoted in January. He says that shortly after taking office in 2004 the Levy administration reclassified what qualified as a hate crime.

The California Teachers Association is reporting that school districts so far have issued nearly 19,000 layoff notices to teachers amid uncertainty over the state budget. The union announced its estimate of preliminary pink slips issued statewide as of Tuesday, the deadline for school districts to let employees know they could lose their jobs. But some districts haven't reported how many layoff warnings they have issued as they prepare for worst-case budget scenarios. The union says it expects to have a final count Friday. The second bill is Senate Bill 590. This is a 77 page proposal that is getting the most attention. It would require more stringent enforcement of federal immigration laws by state agencies. The bills most controversial aspects would permit police to verify citizenship or immigration status and detain people, institute an English only policy for public meetings, and impose sanctions for businesses hiring "unauthorized aliens". Supporters say the bill simply enforces federal immigration laws. Opponents insist it violates personal rights. 590 easily passed the Senate. 1042 hasn't had a vote yet in the House.

Four big cancer centers also will start studies using the experimental test this year. Stray cancer cells in the blood mean that a tumor has spread or is likely to, many doctors believe. A test that can capture such cells has the potential to transform care for many types of cancer, especially breast, prostate, colon and lung. Initially, doctors want to use the test to try to predict what treatments would be best for each patient's tumor and find out quickly if they are working.

The panel - which is seeking to draft a comprehensive immigration bill before the next state legislative session starts in January - also received a report comparing Georgia and Arizona's laws on the

issue. "I am not sure we will adopt Arizona's law, but we will come up with our own," said Sen. Jack Murphy, R-Cumming, co-chairman of the Joint House and Senate Study Committee on Immigration Reform. "It would probably be something similar, but I am not exactly sure how it would mirror theirs exactly. But I'm sure that some of the same language would be in there." In April, Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer signed into law the nation's toughest legislation against illegal immigration. But in July, a federal judge blocked the part of that law that requires police to check a person's immigration status while enforcing other laws. That section of the law also requires immigrants to prove they are authorized to be in Arizona or risk state charges. The judge issued the injunction after the Obama administration challenged the law. Georgia has no such laws on its books. Critics say the Arizona statute is unconstitutional and can lead to racial profiling.

U.S. District Judge Tanya Walton Pratt issued the ruling Thursday in a lawsuit filed by parents who say a state policy requiring the numbers violates their children's rights. Under the policy, paternity affidavits filed by unmarried parents must contain both parents' Social Security numbers or be sent back to county health offices unrecorded. The judge says denying parents

the ability to establish legal paternity amounts to discrimination against children who are American citizens. Pratt issued a preliminary injunction barring the policy. State health officials say the policy was meant to reflect state and federal law. State attorneys haven't decided whether they'll appeal.

INFANT FEVER TREATMENT/NEW STUDY

But, a new report from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) attempts to allay those fears by reminding parents that a fever is usually just the body's natural response against illness, and that lowering a fever may actually prolong an illness. The AAP recommends that, in general, parents only treat a fever if it's making their child feel uncomfortable. "Fever is one of the most common reasons that parents contact pediatricians and health-care providers. NEBRASKA LAWMAKERS TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARING FOR INPUT ON ARIZONA-STYLE IMMIGRATION BILL

VO: 30

State lawmakers will hear debate Wednesday over a bill that would require Nebraska law enforcement officers to confirm the residency status of suspected illegal immigrants. The bill would force suspected immigrants to prove their legal status when stopped, detained, or arrested. Legal immigrants who fail to carry an alien residency card could face a misdemeanor charge. The proposal by state Sen. Charlie Janssen, of Fremont, is modeled after a similar high-profile Arizona measure that was signed into law last year. Janssen's bill has drawn criticism

from immigration advocates that opposed the Arizona law. A hearing on the bill is scheduled before the legislature's Judiciary Committee. State Sen. Brenda Council, of Omaha, has introduced a counter-measure urging Nebraska's congressional delegation to reform the nation's immigration system at the federal level.

US CONGRESS SPENDING

VO: 27

In an early victory for Republicans, the Democratic Senate is voting to send President Barack Obama a GOP-drafted measure that cuts \$4 billion in spending as the price for keeping the government open for an additional two weeks. Sweeping bipartisan support is expected Wednesday for the measure, which passed the House on Tuesday by a 335-91 tally. More than 100 Democrats broke with Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi of California to support it. "The president is encouraged by the progress Congress is making towards a short-term agreement," White House press secretary Jay Carney said after the House vote. "Moving forward, the focus needs to be on both sides finding common ground in order to reach a long-term solution that removes the kind of uncertainty that can hurt the economy and job creation." Hours earlier, however, Carney had floated a trial balloon for a four- or five-week measure that would provide a more realistic time frame for what promises to be highly contentious negotiation on a follow-up bill to set spending levels through the end of the fiscal year, Sept. 30.

DIABETES CONTROL

VO: 25

People with diabetes in the United States and several other countries do not get effective treatment to control their disease, U.S. researchers said Tuesday, and health insurance, not personal wealth, plays a big role in determining which diabetics get good care. The findings suggest millions of people with diabetes are undiagnosed or poorly treated, putting them at risk of an early death from heart disease or significant complications of diabetes, such as blindness, chronic kidney disease and foot problems that can require amputations. "Too many people are not being properly diagnosed with diabetes and related cardiovascular risk factors. Those who are diagnosed aren't being effectively treated," Dr. Stephen Lim of The Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington in Seattle said in a statement

ALABAMA HEARINGS TODAY

VO: 24

The 2011 legislative session started today but the fireworks begin on Wednesday with several public hearings on controversial bills including Alabama's version of the Arizona immigration enforcement law that President Barack Obama is suing Arizona over in federal court. In committee are Alabama's version of Arizona's

immigration law enforcement bill, a bill to change the way education budgets are made and a bill to end the Deferred Retirement Option Plan, or DROP, that's costing the state millions. Gov. Robert Bentley, House Speaker Mike Hubbard, R-Auburn, and Senate President Pro Tem Del Marsh, R-Anniston, all say they have been working together closely on legislative matters including support for the controversial bills.

TX: HOUSE COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER IMMIGRATION BILLS

VO: 29

A House panel is debating several hot-button bills that could give police more power to enforce immigration laws. The bills are aimed in part at cracking down on so-called sanctuary cities, which Gov. Rick Perry has put on the fast track in the Texas Legislature. One version of the Republican-backed legislation would make it clear that police agencies must not be barred from asking about immigration status after arresting people. Others are tougher, requiring that police officers inquire about immigration status. Supporters say the legislation is needed to cut down on crime. Opponents say it will bog down police officers in added paperwork and negatively impact their ability to enforce state laws and respond to life-or-death emergencies.

U.S. SUPREME COURT RULING EXTENDS FEDERAL JOB DISCRIMINATION LAWS

VO: 32

The U.S. Supreme Court extended the reach of federal laws against job discrimination, ruling Tuesday that employees are protected from illegal bias not just from a top decision maker but from other supervisors as well. The justices said the crucial issue was whether illegal bias was a "motivating factor" in the decision to fire an employee. Companies and public agencies are not shielded from liability, they said, simply because the supervisor who made the decision to fire a worker did so for valid reasons. If other supervisors are biased and influence the outcome, the employer can be held at fault, they said. For at least a decade, lower courts have been split over whether the workplace civil rights laws should focus narrowly on the single supervisor who makes hiring and firing decisions, or more broadly on the many supervisors who influence the outcome. By a unanimous vote, the high court opted for the broad approach.

IA: IMMIGRANT SANCTUARY CITY DEBATE

VO: 24

Iowa City is considering becoming a "sanctuary city." If so, that means authorities would not use funds to enforce immigration laws within the city borders.

FEDS ANNOUNCE PLANS TO REBUILD BORDER FENCE(file)

VO: 28

With immigration issues heating up in Arizona, the federal government has announced that it will begin rebuilding a stretch of border fence in the southern part of our state. U.S. Customs and Border Protection announced Tuesday that construction to replace an estimated 2.8 miles of outdated primary-pedestrian fencing along the U.S.-Mexico border would begin in mid-March. This border fence is adjacent to the city of Nogales, and when rebuilt will reportedly strengthen the security of the southwest border in the Arizona Tucson Sector. According to a news release from the CBP, the new project will replace "landing mat" fence originally constructed in 1994 and will be replaced with a new 18-foot "bollard fence" on either side of the DeConcini Land Port of Entry.

SC SENATE DEBATING STRICT IMMIGRATION BILL

VO: 23

The South Carolina Senate will resume debate Thursday on a bill meant to further crack down on illegal immigration. The measure would direct officers to check the immigration status of a person they suspect is in the country illegally. The questions must follow a stop or arrest for something else. Producing a valid driver's license, passport or military ID would satisfy the query. The proposal resembles a measure passed in Arizona last year that brought a flurry of lawsuits, protests and boycotts. But South Carolina's bill differs by not holding someone on that suspicion. It directs law enforcement to call Immigrations and Customs Enforcement to alert them. If ICE agents don't respond, the suspect would be processed normally, depending on the offense that prompted the question.

MT BORDER SECURITY

VO: 28

The Government Accountability Office released a study in December, reporting that only 32 miles out of 4,000 on the northern border were at an acceptable level of security. But in hearings with government officials, the Border Patrol has made its case, maintaining that their use of new technology and other techniques, may mean the border is more secure than it appears. Newschannel 5's Stephanie Tyrpak had a chance to ride-along with the Border Patrol here in Montana to get an inside look at some of the efforts and challenges they face on a day-to-day basis. "On a normal day, if there is such a thing as a normal day up here, you know it's a lot of hours on the roads," said Supervisory Border Patrol Agent Craig Duff. This a different world from the border running along U.S. and Mexico. There's no fence - no major cities - no large exodus of immigrants. But both the Government Accountability Office and the Border Patrol Agents who work here

every day know that the threat to the northern border is real. "Both sides of the border there are individuals living there with established ties to terrorist support and extremist groups. Canada is our largest source of ecstasy that's sold illegally in the United States, 1/8it 3/8 comes south out of Canada. There's also cocaine and other drugs going north, " said Duff.

EXPANDING MEDICAID WILL COST STATES BILLIONS: STUDY

The costs to U.S. states of the Medicaid insurance program for the poor will grow by hundreds of billions of dollars under the healthcare law passed last year, according to a report released by Republicans in the Senate and House of Representatives on Tuesday. "This law, because of Medicaid expansions, has put a strain on state budgets," Senator Orrin Hatch, one of the report's sponsors, told a meeting of hospital administrators on Tuesday. "Medicaid expansions threaten to bankrupt the states."

IBUPROFEN MAY REDUCE PARKINSON'S RISK

VO: 26

A Harvard School of Public Health study indicates that adults who regularly take ibuprofen have about one-third less risk of developing Parkinson's disease than people who don't take the drug.

EXTREME FLEXIBILITY COMES WITH TRIPLE MIGRAINE RISK

VO: 20

People with severe forms of double jointedness have a greater risk of suffering from migraine headaches, a new study finds. They also tend to have more severe and more frequent migraines. Researchers say that the two conditions -- "joint hypermobility syndrome" and migraines -- may have causes rooted in the same problem.

REPORT STRESSES OPTIONS FOR COLON CANCER SCREENING

Women should be aware that they have several options for colon cancer screening, and not only the often-dreaded colonoscopy, according to a new report from the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG). The statement does not veer from guidelines from major medical groups like the American Cancer Society and the American College of Gastroenterology -- which consider colonoscopy the "preferred" screening test.

OBAMA CALDERON PROYECTS BLANCA ROSA VILCHEZ. NEW YORK PKG 2:10

U.S. President Barack Obama said Thursday the United States and Mexico had agreed on a way to solve a long-simmering cross-border trucking dispute that has hurt trade between the two neighbors. The proposal, which must be approved by U.S. lawmakers, is still being finalized and will be ready for congressional scrutiny later this month or in April. If passed, the White House said it would lift tariffs on \$2 billion worth of U.S. goods and boost hiring on both sides of the border.

ECONOMY REPORT VO :22

Economists are optimistic that today's employment report from the government will show strong job growth in February of 175,000 to 200,000 jobs. They also expect unemployment to rise to 9.1 percent from 9, an indication that some unemployed people are out job hunting again.

MAZDA RECALL VO :18

Mazda Motor Corp is recalling thousands of 2009/2010 Mazda6 vehicles over concerns that a build up of spider webs in the emissions system could lead to fuel tank cracks and possible leaks. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said in a summary of the problem that a certain type of spider may weave a web that restricts a vent line. This could cause the emissions control system to increase pressure inside the fuel tank, leading to cracks and potential fuel leaks and an increased risk of fire. Mazda is recalling 52,000 vehicles and dealers will install a spring to prevent this type of spider from entering the vent line, NHTSA said.

1 IN 3 ADULTS DON'T GET ENOUGH SLEEP VO :26

More than one-third of U.S. adults average less than 7 hours of sleep per night, according to a new report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). That lack of sleep is causing problems during the daytime, CDC surveys found. In one survey, 38% of people said they'd unintentionally dozed off during the day at least once in the previous month. Even more alarming, 5% said they'd nodded off or had actually fallen asleep while driving.

AIRLINES FARES VO :29

Airfares at major U.S. airlines are climbing again, continuing a dizzying pace of

nearly weekly increases. This time the fare hike is intended to cover higher jet fuel prices. It's boom time for the airline industry. Rising fares, combined with fewer flights and more fees for passengers, are generating the best earnings since 2007. The government estimates the country's eight largest airlines are likely to earn more than \$5 billion this year and \$5.6 billion in 2012.

MARICOPA COUNTY SEES 40% DROP IN INMATES SUSPECTED OF BEING IN U.S. ILLEGALLY

In the past three years, the number of county-jail inmates whom deputies suspect of being in the country illegally has dropped by nearly 40 percent, from 16,337 in 2008 to 9,894 in 2010. The trend in Maricopa County is at odds with a national trend that has shown an increase in deportations of undocumented immigrants in the same time frame. However, experts nationwide offered several explanations for the decrease and its seeming contradictions:-Fewer people in general are committing crimes that land them in Maricopa County jail. The average number of inmates in county custody fell by 13 percent during the same time period as the 40 percent drop in immigration holds.-The number of immigrants living in Arizona without authorization has decreased, meaning police encounter fewer "criminal aliens" - undocumented immigrants who, after crossing the border, have committed serious crimes that would land them in county jail.-Even as local police encounter fewer illegal immigrants, federal officials have stepped up immigration-law-enforcement efforts through a variety of programs that can lead to the deportation of illegal immigrants who have not committed serious crimes after crossing the border.

IN STATES, PARTIES CLASH OVER VOTING LAWS THAT CALL FOR IDS, LIMITS ON WHERE COLLEGE STUDENTS CAN CAST BALLOTS

VO: 29

New Hampshire's new Republican state House speaker is pretty clear about what he thinks of college kids and how they vote. They're "foolish," Speaker William O'Brien said in a recent speech to a tea party group. "Voting as a liberal. That's what kids do," he added, his comments taped by a state Democratic Party staffer and posted on YouTube. Students lack "life experience," and "they just vote their feelings." New Hampshire House Republicans are pushing for new laws that would prohibit many college students from voting in the state - and effectively keep some from voting at all. One bill would permit students to vote in their college towns only if they or their parents had previously established permanent residency there - requiring all others to vote in the states or other New Hampshire towns they come from. Another bill would end Election Day registration, which O'Brien said unleashes swarms of students on polling places, creating opportunities for fraud.

HAZELNUTS RECALLED DUE TO E COLI RISK**VO: 28**

Certain in-shell hazelnuts and mixed nuts made by DeFranco & Sons of Los Angeles have been recalled due to E. coli fears. The nuts were sold under the brand names, Sunripe, George Packing, Firestone Farms and Northwest Hazelnut in a variety of packages as small as one pound. Bulk bags of mixed nuts containing hazelnuts may also be affected. Seven cases of E. coli infection, possibly linked to the nuts, have been reported in Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

OBAMA GUANTÁNAMO**VO: 26**

President Barack Obama's decision to resume military trials for detainees at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, will open the door for the prosecution there of several suspected 9/11 conspirators, including alleged mastermind Khalid Sheikh Mohammed. Obama's order, which reverses his move two years ago to halt new trials, has reignited arguments over the legality of the military commissions, despite ongoing U.S. efforts to reform the hotly debated system. But fierce congressional opposition to trying Mohammed and other Guantanamo detainees in the United States left Obama with few options. And it forced him to reluctantly retreat, at least for now, from his promise to shut the prison down. A handful of detainees have been charged in connection with the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks on America, including Mohammed. But the charges were dismissed following Obama's decision to halt military commissions in January 2009.

CENSUS CALIFORNIA

VO: 24

Data for the 2010 Census was sent to Gov. Jerry Brown and other executive offices on Monday, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, for release to the public on Tuesday. The data, which is scheduled for release at 12:30 p.m., will include summaries of population totals, as well as data on race, Hispanic origin and voting age for several areas throughout the state, such as voting districts, cities, counties and school districts. By law, the Census Bureau must provide redistricting data to the 50 states no later than April 1 of the year following the census. As a result, the Census Bureau is delivering the data state-by-state on a flow basis in February and March. All states will receive their data by April 1, 2011.

BELL SALARIES RECALL

VO: 22

After months of outrage directed at a city government that made this modest Southern California suburb the national poster child for municipal corruption, Bell residents have a chance on Tuesday to begin anew. That's when they'll go to the polls to elect a new city council, replacing one whose members are facing dozens of charges of fraud and misappropriation of public funds. Authorities say they and other current and former city officials stole more than \$5.5 million from Bell, using it to pay themselves enormous salaries. When residents learned last summer that most of their part-time city council members were making \$100,000 a year and giving annual salary and compensation packages of hundreds of thousands to a handful of other employees, they immediately launched a recall campaign.

LAWMAKERS EYE IMMIGRATION BILLS

VO: 28

Georgia lawmakers were just getting started last week when the House approved major legislation targeting illegal immigrants and the people who hire them. That legislation - House Bill 87 - is the longest and most comprehensive of at least nine bills now pending in the Legislature concerning illegal immigration. HB 87 would authorize state and local police to verify the immigration status of certain suspects. It would punish certain people who knowingly transport or harbor illegal immigrants here. And it would penalize people who "willfully and fraudulently" use fake identification to get a job in Georgia. The other bills would do a number of things, including banning illegal immigrants from attending state colleges and collecting workers' compensation and jobless benefits. The chief sponsors of all of these bills are Republicans.

UTAH IMMIGRATION PLAN COULD STIR LEGAL STORM

Utah Governor Gary Herbert talks immigration with Salt Lake City radio host Tony Yapias last July. Much as Arizona discovered after passing an immigration enforcement law last year, Utah's road toward immigration changes will probably go through the courts. Advocates on both sides of the debate indicated Monday that lawsuits could soon be on the way to halt both bills.

U.S. DIABETES BELT IDENTIFIED**VO: 26**

Researchers have identified a "diabetes belt," a cluster of 644 counties in 15 mostly southeastern states that have a prevalence of diabetes of 11% or more. The belt includes portions of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, and the entire state of Mississippi.

MORNING-AFTER PILL MAY BE OK FOR NON-EMERGENCY USE**VO: 23**

The morning-after pill may be safe and effective as a regular birth control method, researchers say. In the U.S., the pill costs between \$10 and \$70 and is available over the counter for people over 17. However, it is only approved as an emergency backup after unprotected sex, and the government discourages using it as regular contraception.

MEDITERRANEAN DIET NEW STUDY**VO: 22**

New research shows that the "Mediterranean diet" is better for you than previously thought. A new study in the Journal of the American College of Cardiology says that diets rich in fish, poultry, fruits, nuts, and the occasional glass of red wine have major effects on a person's health. The diet helps raise good cholesterol levels, lower triglycerides, and help lower blood pressure. According to the World Health Organization, as of 2008, a third of the world's adults are overweight and nearly one in 10 people is obese. The numbers are even higher among children. 20 million kids under the age of five are overweight.

SPENDING SHOWDOWN -BUDGET VOTES TODAY IN SENATE**VO : 30**

The Senate will vote today on competing plans to trim the budget for the remainder of the fiscal year. The Republican plan, already approved by the House, would cut \$57 billion on top of the \$4 billion in cuts that lawmakers

approved last week. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid calls the GOP plan a non starter. The Democrats' proposal would trim an additional \$5 billion or so, which Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell calls embarrassing. With neither plan expected to get the 60 votes needed to advance, House Republicans are working on another short term spending bill to avoid a government shutdown at the end of next week.

RAUL CISNEROS ON LATINO POPULATION GREW UP ACCORDING CENSUS 2010

INTERVIEW - T: 2:30

The U.S. Census Bureau figures released Tuesday show that over the last decade, the percentage of Latinos has approached parity with non-Hispanic whites - 37.6% to 40.1%, with Asians at 12.8% and blacks at 5.8%. California grew by 3.4 million people in the last decade, a rate that was on par with the national average. The data released Tuesday showed that much of California's growth was fueled by Latinos, who saw their numbers increase nearly 28% to 14 million, and Asians, who saw a nearly 31% gain to nearly 4.8 million. The two other major demographic groups were in retreat: Non-Hispanic whites declined more than many demographers had predicted, dropping 5.4% to just under 15 million. The number of blacks declined nearly 1% to nearly 2.2 million residents.

EEUU: 4.500 SALVADORAN GETS TEMPORARY TPS

The Office of Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) has issued temporary work permits 4.500 Salvadorans awaiting a final decision on re-registration applications to temporary immigration program known as TPS, reported Tuesday chancery. The beneficiaries are enrolled Salvadoran TPS after the earthquakes of 2001 who participated in the new re-enrollment between July and September 2010. The Foreign Ministry reported that the interim work permits "allow TPS beneficiaries continue working while the USCIS finishes processing their cases." The interim document must be received by beneficiaries no later than Wednesday 9 March. USCIS reported that it has processed over 208,000 applications for TPS re-registration, which further extension expires on March 9, 2012.

"USCIS also reiterated to the recipients, that to maintain current employment authorization until 2012 must respond on time to any request they make, whether requests for additional documents of evidence to prove their eligibility or appointments for biometrics, among others. "The Foreign Ministry recommended that Salvadorans have his work permit expired and have not received a provisional approach the Embassy of El Salvador in Washington, DC or nearest consulate where they will provide free assistance.

BELL SALARIES/FRAUD HEARING FOR CALIFORNIA OFFICIALS NEARING CONCLUSION

VO: 28

Attorneys are set to begin making their closing arguments at a preliminary hearing to determine whether the ousted former city manager of Bell should stand trial on dozens of charges of bilking the blue-collar suburb out of more than \$5.5 million. Former City Manager Robert Rizzo is charged with more than 50 counts of fraud. Also facing charges are Bell's former assistant city manager, the mayor and a former councilman. Prosecutors and defense attorneys are to make their final arguments Wednesday before Superior Court Judge Henry J. Hall. The preliminary hearing in Hall's court, which lasted three weeks, is concluding just a day after residents of Bell went to the polls to elect a new city council.

ARIZONA IMMIGRATION BILLS ARE MOVING AGAIN

VO: 21

New Arizona legislation on illegal immigration will start advancing again in the Senate sooner rather than later, Senate President Russell Pearce said Tuesday. A spokesman for Pearce had said Friday that the measures were on hold pending action on the state budget, but Pearce said Tuesday that he is accelerating consideration of the measures even as majority Republicans' budget talks continue behind the scenes. Pearce had the Senate Rules Committee conduct a legal review of the measures on Tuesday, and he said after the committee meeting that he plans to have the full Senate consider them soon, possibly this week. The new immigration measures include a sweeping bill by Pearce on education, public services and other subjects ranging from driving to hiring. Other Republican senators sponsored two measures on citizenship and a bill on hospital admissions. All were put on hold after being approved by a Senate committee two weeks ago. Senate passage would send the measures to the House where Pearce said they would then be put on hold again pending budget action.

HISPANICS 24% HOMICIDES IN 2010

24% of homicide victims in New York City last year were Hispanic, according to data released by the municipal police on Tuesday. ADVERTISING A total of 536 people were classified as killed in the city, representing an increase of 13% over 2009 figures. Approximately 128 of them were Hispanic. The blacks are the group most victims of homicide: 67%. Only 6% of those killed were white and 3% Asian. The statistics of murders in the city have been declining ratably over the years and the figures for 2010 are the fourth lowest since the police department began tracking such data in 1962.

Heightened scrutiny over banks' handling of home repossessions pushed the number of U.S. homes receiving a foreclosure-related notice to a 36-month low last month. Lenders are again delaying taking action against many homeowners after state and federal officials launched investigations into foreclosure procedures last fall. Evidence surfaced that some major banks pushed through hundreds of foreclosures a day without giving many borrowers a fair shot at keeping their homes. RealtyTrac Inc. says more than 255,000 properties received at least one notice in February. That's down 14 percent from January and down 27 percent from the year before. The firm tracks notices for defaults, scheduled home auctions and home repossessions. Severe winter weather also appeared to be a contributing factor.

NEW MEXICO DREAM ACT HEARING

On Wednesday evening, she took the floor in Annapolis. But Howard County residents made their stance clear at the Feb. 23 delegation hearing in Ellicott City, two weeks before the issue came up for debate by legislators. Several residents shared their reasons for opposing the bill, which would allow students to pay in-state college tuition regardless of their immigration status. "People confuse me with an ATM machine," said Ellicott City resident Chris Oxenham. He went to the University of Maryland and paid in-state tuition, he said, a right that he earned because his parents were taxpaying citizens. "[Now] I own a business out in Glenelg....There are business people out here, and we are being taxed to death...Make [immigrants] pay the full tuition that everybody out of state has to pay."

TEXAS SPRING BRAKE WARNING TO TRAVEL MEXICO

NEW MEXICO LICENSES PROPOSAL REJECTED JOSE ANGEL AGUIRRE - SANTA FE, NEW MEXICO

The Senate has rejected a Republican-backed proposal to stop New Mexico from issuing driver's licenses to illegal immigrants.

The Senate voted 24-17 Wednesday night against a proposal that would have ended the practice of granting licenses to foreign nationals without a Social Security number. Sen. John Ryan, R-Albuquerque, said it's a public safety risk to issue licenses to those living in this country illegally. But Democrats said the move was politically motivated and targeted Mexican immigrants.

MOST PUBLIC SCHOOLS MAY MISS TARGETS, EDUCATION SECRETARY SAYS

More than 80,000 of the nation's 100,000 public schools could be labeled as failing under no child left behind the main federal law on public education, Secretary of Education Arne Duncan told Congress on Wednesday. Mr. Duncan said the estimate, based on an analysis of testing trends and the workings of the law's pass-fail school rating system, was the latest evidence of the law's shortcomings and the need to overhaul it. Even many of the nation's best-run schools are likely to fall short of the law's rapidly rising standardized testing targets, Mr. Duncan said. "This law is fundamentally broken, and we need to fix it this year," he told the House education committee.

As lawmakers shaken by the shooting of a colleague return to the health care debate, an Associated Press-GfK poll finds raw feelings over President Barack Obama's overhaul have subsided. Ahead of a vote on repeal in the GOP-led House this week, strong opposition to the law stands at 30 percent, close to the lowest level registered in AP-GfK surveys dating to September 2009. The nation is divided over the law, but the strength and intensity of the opposition appear diminished. The law expands coverage to more than 30 million uninsured, and would require, for the first time, that most people in the United States carry health insurance. The poll finds that 40 percent of those surveyed said they support the law, while 41 percent oppose it. Just after the November congressional elections, opposition stood at 47 percent and support was 38 percent.

The Internal Revenue Service today opened the 2011 tax filing season by announcing that taxpayers have until April 18 to file their tax returns. The IRS reminded taxpayers impacted by recent tax law changes that using e-file is the best way to ensure accurate tax returns and get faster refunds. Taxpayers will have until Monday, April 18 to file their 2010 tax returns and pay any tax due because Emancipation Day, a holiday observed in the District of Columbia, falls this year on Friday, April 15. Taxpayers requesting an extension will have until Oct. 17 to file their 2010 tax returns.

NEW FINANCIAL PROGRAM TO HELP TEACHERS

LOURDES DEL RIO- MIAMI, FLORIDA

A \$2.8 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education is allowing Florida International University's College of Education to offer Hispanic-American teachers in low performing schools in Miami-Dade the opportunity to earn their Master's degree, as well as provide about a dozen school leaders with the chance to seek a doctorate in educational administration. The Creating Latino Access to a Valuable Education (CLAVE) program provides support for the education of minorities seeking doctoral and master's degrees in the area of

education. A group of 13 teachers from low performing schools (grade of C or D) were accepted into the College of Education's Urban Education program, which aims at enhancing the effectiveness of teachers serving in diverse urban settings.

STUDY SHOWS TOXINS FOUND IN PREGNANT WOMEN

Pregnant women take elaborate steps to protect their babies' health, following doctors' orders to avoid alcohol, caffeine, tobacco - even soft cheeses and deli meats. In spite of these efforts, a new study shows the typical pregnant woman has dozens of potentially toxic or even cancer-causing chemicals in her body - including ingredients found in flame retardants and rocket fuel. Almost all 268 women studied had detectable levels of eight types of chemicals in their blood or urine, finds the study, published in today's Environmental Health Perspectives. It analyzed data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. These chemicals include certain pesticides, flame retardants, PFCs used in non-stick cookware, phthalates (in many fragrances and plastics), pollution from car exhaust, perchlorate (in rocket fuel) and PCBs, toxic industrial chemicals banned in 1979 that persist in the environment.

ANTIBIOTICS, BLOOD PRESSURE DRUGS CAN BE RISKY MIX

Older adults on blood pressure drugs known as calcium channel blockers could suffer dangerous drops in blood pressure if they are given certain antibiotics, according to a study out Monday. Researchers found that patients on calcium channel blockers who were given the antibiotics erythromycin (brands like E-Mycin) or clarithromycin (Biaxin) were at increased risk of being hospitalized for dangerously low blood pressure.

EXERCISE PREVENTS KNEE INJURIES IN ARMY RECRUITS

VO :20

Stretching and strengthening exercises help new military recruits avoid knee pain from hard training, UK researchers have found. Nearly a quarter of physically active people suffer from so-called anterior knee pain, researchers say, making it the most common knee problem. It's also the main reason new British soldiers drop out of the Army. To find out if the problem could be prevented, researchers from the Defense Medical Rehabilitation Center in Surrey followed more than 1,500 recruits during a grueling 14-week training program. Half were told to do eight different types of exercise during every training session, focusing on strengthening their leg muscles and making them more flexible by stretching.

SEMEN ALLERGY BLAMED FOR POST-ORGASM SICKNESS

VO :26

There's a mysterious phenomenon in which some men, immediately after having an orgasm, come down with a flu-like illness. Now Dutch scientists are saying these men may be allergic to their own semen. The condition is known as post-orgasmic illness syndrome, or POIS. Though it's been on scientists' radars for nearly 10 years, it's not commonly known by patients or doctors. Many men who experience the post-ejaculate sickness don't come forward and tell their doctor about it out of embarrassment, experts suspect. Marcel Waldinger, a professor of sexual psychopharmacology at Utrecht University in the Netherlands, and his team analyzed 45 Dutch men who had been diagnosed with POIS. A standard skin-prick allergy test using a diluted form of their own semen. Of those, 29, or 88 percent, had a positive skin reaction indicating an auto-immune response, or allergic reaction.

DO VIDEO GAMES FUEL MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS?

VO :33

A study published by The American Academy of Pediatrics suggests that games may fuel mental health problems in children. The two-year study of more than 3,000 school children in Singapore found nearly one in ten were 'addicted' to games, and recommended limiting children's time in front of computers or TVs to two hours daily, Reuters reports. On average, kids said they played for 20 hours per week, and those that qualified as addicted reported increasing symptoms of depression, anxiety and social phobia. While the addicted players were more likely to have had behavioural problems to begin with, Gentile said that unhealthy gaming habits were likely fuelling their mental problems.

HOUSE TO VOTE ON REPEALING OBAMA'S HEALTH CARE LAW

VO :26

The new Republican-led House is poised to vote to repeal President Barack Obama's landmark health care law. Republican lawmakers are expected to deliver an emphatic thumbs-down on Wednesday, though they have no ready substitute of their own for fixing the nation's health care system. The House vote could turn out to be the high-water mark for repeal, a goal that energized conservative voters in the midterm elections and helped Republicans return to power in Congress. Democrats, who hung on to the Senate, have vowed to block the GOP drive. But House Republicans warn not to underestimate their determination or their willingness to use parliamentary maneuvers to deny the Obama administration funds needed to carry out the law. The law aims to provide coverage to more than 30 million uninsured people.

TEXAS BUDGET

VO :29

A proposed Texas state budget that cuts a staggering \$5 billion from public schools has been released as the state faces a \$15 billion shortfall. Public education would bear the brunt of nearly \$14 billion in cuts. The draft generally eliminates financial aid for new college students and ends funding for four community colleges. The proposal for 2012-13 would mean the loss of 9,600 state jobs over the next two years. The reduction is smaller than the shortfall because of \$1.4 billion in savings requested by the state leaders from the current budget. Some analysts say the true shortfall could be closer to \$27 billion.

HOUSE GOP ANNOUNCES PROGRAM AGAINST ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION

A group of House Republicans announced plans Tuesday to put forward a package of at least 16 bills aimed at illegal immigrants, including bills that would revoke the driving licenses of deportees, block illegal immigrants from attending public colleges and universities, and require the state to begin tracking the number of undocumented children in public schools. Lingamfelter said state action was needed because the federal government has "completely failed" to protect its borders.

ARIZONA-STYLE IMMIGRATION LAW PASSES IN MISSISSIPPI; BARBOUR MAY FACE DECISION

An immigration law based on Arizona's has passed the Mississippi State Senate. The bill, passed Tuesday, will allow state law enforcement officers check the status of people they think might be in the United States illegally. The legislation passed by a wide margin with 34 state Senators voting in favor. Fifteen rejected

their support after nearly four hours of debate. The bill's passage makes Mississippi the first state to pass a bill similar to the one passed and signed into law in Arizona. A number of states, including Colorado, are considering bills modeled off of the one in Arizona. The bill's chief sponsor, Republican Sen. Joey Fillingane of Sumrall, said after questioning from opponents that it's impossible to know how many undocumented immigrants are living in Mississippi.

ARMY TO REPORT RISE IN NATIONAL GUARD, RESERVE SUICIDES

VO :28

The U.S. Army on Wednesday will report that while the number of suicides in the active-duty force declined in 2010, the number of suicides in the Army Reserve and National Guard increased, a senior Army official said. The increase in Reserve and National Guard suicides is among troops who are in the United States and not activated for duty. The senior Army official said more than half of those troops were never deployed to a war zone. The official said one possible explanation for the increase in suicides is economic pressure and rising unemployment, but he emphasized that the Army simply does not have answers. The official noted that for Guard and Reserve personnel who live as civilians back in their communities, the Army is not able to provide the same type of suicide awareness and prevention programs that are available to active-duty personnel.

BIG BREAKFAST WEIGHT LOSS MYTH

Research published in BioMed Central's open access Nutrition Journal found that people ate the same at lunch and dinner-- regardless of how much they ate for breakfast. Start day with a big hearty breakfast and you'll just get fatter, faster.

ANTIDEPRESSANT MAY CURE HOT FLASHES

Study shows antidepressant Lexapro may reduce severity of hot flashes in menop. A new government-funded study shows the antidepressant may reduce the frequency and severity of hot flashes. The study included more than 200 middle-aged women who were experiencing an average of 10 hot flashes per day. After eight weeks, women who took Lexapro every day were having about five hot flashes per day, while those who took placebo were averaging roughly six and a half. The study is published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

CAN CIGARETTE ADS REALLY LURE KIDS TO SMOKE?

Teenagers who frequently encounter the Marlboro man whirling his lasso in the Wild West, or other familiar tobacco icons, may be more likely to get lured into lighting up, hints a new German study. While it's not the first time researchers have tied cigarette advertisements to teen smoking, the new study makes the link more solid by showing that tobacco ads wield influence even when other advertising does not.

SKIN CREAMS MAY NOT PROTECT AGAINST ALL UV LIGHT**VO :26**

Many daily skin creams that claim to provide ultraviolet protection and anti-aging benefits may not have enough of the critical ingredients needed to block UV-A light, according to new research. That means consumers who rely on these products may be vulnerable to the effects of UV-A rays, including skin darkening, wrinkles, and skin cancer, in some cases.

INTERNET TIME TIED TO TEEN DEPRESSION SYMPTOMS**VO :22**

Spending time online is normal behavior for teenagers. But too much Internet use by teens -- or too little, for that matter -- might be related to depression, a new study finds. The findings, reported in the journal of Pediatrics, do not mean that the Internet is to blame. For one, teens in the study who spent no time online were also at increased risk of depression symptoms.

WA:DO-IT-YOURSELF GASTRIC BYPASS SURGERY**VO :26**

Do-it-yourself gastric bypass surgery kit sold online has doctors outraged. A product sold on Amazon-dot-com has some doctors outraged. It's a do-it-yourself gastric bypass surgery. And hysicians say the kit could be very dangerous, if not deadly.

WOMEN SEX AND RELATIONSHIPS STUDY**VO :20**

A new book finds career women who wait until their late 20s to find a mate-- might have a tougher time finding that special man. Two researchers at the University of Texas at Austin published a book called "Premarital Sex in America: How Young Americans Meet, Mate and Think About Marrying.' They found that since women in the 18-23 age group feel they don't need men to support them financially... Many feel they can date around during their 20s. But they will eventually want a long-term relationship. The problem is that there will still be women who will have sex readily without commitment, and since men know this, *fewer* of them are willing to go steady. The analysis is based on several national studies-- as well as interviews with people ages 18 to 23.

Nine in 10 Americans will find the maze of credits, deductions and exemptions on their tax forms so confusing and difficult that they'll hire someone or turn to special computer software to fill out their returns. Even the commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service says he pays someone to do his taxes. President Barack Obama and key lawmakers from both political parties say it's time for a serious national discussion about making the tax code simpler and fairer. It's going to be a long talk, one that could last years. Why? Because every deduction, exemption and credit, every layer of complexity, is important to somebody, in some cases millions of somebodies. "That's what the tax code is now, it's a whole set of winners and losers," said Howard Gleckman, a fellow at the Urban Institute and editor of TaxVox, a blog on tax issues. **CRACKDOWN ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS

The Obama administration plans to intensify a crackdown on employers of illegal immigrants with the establishment of an audit office designed to bolster verification of company hiring records. In an interview, John Morton, chief of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, a unit of the Department of Homeland Security, said the Employment Compliance Inspection Center would "address a need to conduct audits even of the largest employers with a very large number of employees." The office would be announced Thursday, he said. Mr. Morton said that the center would be staffed with specialists who will pore over the I-9 employee files collected from companies targeted for audits. In the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, 2010, ICE conducted audits of more than 2,740 companies, nearly twice as many as the previous year. The agency levied a record \$7 million in civil fines on businesses that employed illegal workers.

UTAH IMMIGRATION DEBATE SET AHEAD OF LEGISLATURE

The head of a conservative think tank and a GOP state lawmaker sponsoring an Arizona-style immigration bill are planning an immigration debate before the 2011 Utah Legislature begins. Sutherland Institute President Paul Mero will serve Friday as captain of a team of public figures arguing that Utah shouldn't enforce federal immigration laws.

Mero's team will include Republican Utah Attorney General Mark Shurtleff and state Sen. Luz Robles, D-Salt Lake City. Mero told The Associated Press that the debate could serve as the opening salvo in what is expected to be a contentious battle during the upcoming legislative session.

MORTGAGE GIANTS LEAVE LEGAL BILLS TO THE TAXPAYERS

Since the government took over Fannie Mae, taxpayers have spent more than \$160 million defending the mortgage finance companies and their former top executives in civil lawsuits accusing them of fraud. The cost was a closely guarded secret until last week, when the companies and their regulator produced an accounting at the request of Congress. The bulk of those expenditures - \$132 million - went to defend Fannie Mae and its officials in various securities suits and government investigations into accounting irregularities that occurred years before the subprime lending crisis erupted. The legal payments show no sign of abating.

President Barack Obama is formally launching the era of divided government tonight with his State of the Union speech to Congress. With Republicans running the House and clamoring for spending cuts, the president will agree it's time for tough fiscal choices but warn these can't prevent investments in helping companies create jobs. He's likely to seek some common ground with the GOP. The president's poll numbers are up modestly in recent weeks, as he struck bargains with the GOP in the lame-duck Congress and following his Tucson shooting memorial speech. As Obama made clear in a message to backers, it's a real balancing act which he hopes will be helped by the post-Tucson-shooting spirit of toned-down rhetoric. Some Democrats and Republicans in Congress plan to sit together for tonight's address.

US REPUBLICANS SPENDING**VO:22**

Republicans controlling the House are putting members on record in favor of cutting the day-to-day budgets for domestic Cabinet agencies back to the levels in place before President Barack Obama won the White House. Tuesday's vote comes on a nonbinding resolution that promises cuts approaching 20 percent of the budgets for agencies like the Education and Commerce departments when Congress wraps up the long-overdue budget for the current fiscal year. The White House warns that such cuts would mean furloughs of tens of thousands of federal workers.

US BUSH WHITE HOUSE VIOLATIONS**VO: 24**

The White House Office of Political Affairs during the George W. Bush administration violated the law by giving briefings to political employees, concludes a government report issued Monday. The report says the electoral success of the Republican Party and possible strategies for achieving it often were on the agenda at some 75 political briefings at 20 federal agencies from 2001 to 2007. Prohibited political activities were prevalent in the months running up to the 2006 midterm elections, according to the report.

PREVIEW STATE OF THE UNION & ECONOMY**LOURDES MELUZA/ WASHINGTON, DC****PKG 2:06**

In discussing foreign policy, Obama is expected to underscore the end-of-year deadline for all U.S. troops to leave Iraq. Regarding Afghanistan, Obama will highlight the July deadline he has set for the start of troop withdrawals, a process scheduled to unfold through 2014 at a pace to be determined by conditions on the ground. But on other subjects, what exactly the president will say remains unclear. Gun-control groups are pushing for Obama to embrace stricter gun laws

in the wake of the shooting in Tucson. Paul Helmke, president of the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence, said he wants Obama to support specific legislation, but would be satisfied if the president instead appointed a commission to look at the causes of gun violence. "A national tragedy took place, there should be a response," Helmke said. He added of the Tucson shooting, "no laws were broken until [the gunman] starting shooting." White House officials have been noncommittal on supporting any new legislation, and have not said if Obama will address gun control in his speech.

JAPAN TOYOTA RECALL

Toyota is recalling nearly 1.7 million vehicles worldwide for various defects that may cause fuel leakage and other problems -- the latest in quality control woes for the Japanese automaker. Toyota Motor Corp. said Wednesday it was recalling several models, including the IS and GS Lexus luxury models in North America and the Avensis sedan and station wagon models in Europe. It is also recalling about a dozen models in Japan. There have been no accidents suspected of being related to the defects, according to Toyota.

VA SEX OFFENDERS-CASTRATION

A Virginia legislator is proposing castrating sex offenders as an alternative to the increasing costs to detain and treat them after they've served their prison sentences. Republican Sen. Emmett Hanger's bill would require the state to study the use of physical castration as an alternative to civil commitment for sexually violent predators. A similar proposal was vetoed four years ago. The civil commitment program's budget grew from \$2.7 million in 2004 to \$24 million this year. Gov. Bob McDonnell has proposed spending nearly \$70 million over the next two years to meet the increasing demands.

LOWE'S ANNOUNCES LAYOFFS

Home-improvement chain Lowe's is cutting some of its management workforce. A report in the Charlotte Observer says about 17-hundred managers nationwide will lose their jobs. President Barack Obama's call to lower corporate tax rates is popular among business leaders and lawmakers from both parties. That support, however, won't be easy to maintain if the president ever gets specific about how to pay for the lower taxes. Obama said in his State of the Union address that he wants to close corporate tax loopholes and use the additional revenue to lower corporate tax rates for the first time in 25 years -- without adding to the budget deficit. The top corporate tax rate is 35 percent, among the highest in the industrialized world. However, federal tax laws are filled with so many credits, deductions and exemptions that few companies pay the top rate. Obama's goal is to create a simpler tax code that encourages sound business decisions rather than aggressive tax planning. As it stands now, businesses and individuals spend more than 6 billion hours a year working to comply with the tax code, according to the National Taxpayer Advocate, an independent watchdog within the Internal Revenue Service.

STUDY NAMES TOP CITIES FOR HOSPITAL CARE**VO :24**

A health care organization has released a new list ranking the nation's best cities for hospital care. Health-Grades named West Palm Beach, Florida as number-one, with nine hospitals earning top marks. The group based its scores on factors including patient death rates; the number of medical complications; and performances on medical procedures. Rounding out the top five are Brownsville, Texas; Dayton, Ohio; Minneapolis-Saint Paul, Minnesota; and Tucson, Arizona. It's worth noting Tucson is home to University Medical Center, the hospital that treated Representative Gabrielle Giffords and other victims after the shootings earlier this month.

Social Security's finances are getting worse as the economy struggles to recover and millions of baby boomers stand at the brink of retirement. New congressional projections show Social Security running deficits every year until its trust funds are eventually drained in about 2037. This year alone, Social Security is projected to collect \$45 billion less in payroll taxes than it pays out in retirement, disability and survivor benefits, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office said

Wednesday. That figure swells to \$130 billion when a new one-year cut in payroll taxes is included, though Congress has promised to repay any lost revenue from the tax cut.

FORECLOSURES CITIES

The foreclosure crisis is getting worse as high unemployment and lackluster job prospects force homeowners in an increasing number of U.S. metropolitan areas into dire financial straits. In Seattle, Houston and Chicago, a growing number of homeowners are falling behind on mortgage payments and finding themselves on the receiving end of foreclosure warnings. Others have already seen their homes repossessed by lenders. Those cities were relatively insulated from foreclosures early on in the housing bust. Foreclosure listing firm RealtyTrac says all told, foreclosure activity jumped in 149 of the country's 206 largest metropolitan areas last year.

AP ECONOMY SURVEY

A new study suggests the economic outlook for 2011 is brightening. According to an Associated Press survey, employers will hire more workers this year, and the economy will grow faster than envisioned three months ago. But the latest quarterly AP Economy Survey shows unemployment will stay chronically high -- nearly 9 percent by year's end. A majority of economists say it will be 2016 or later before unemployment drops to a historically normal rate of around 5 percent. They also say lower Social Security taxes and higher stock prices will embolden Americans to spend more and help power the economy.

MICHELLE OBAMA TO SEE ARMY FITNESS, FOOD IN SC

First lady Michelle Obama is visiting the Army's largest training post to see how the military turns couch potato recruits into strong and nutrition-minded soldiers. The first lady, who has taken on the cause of battling childhood obesity, was to speak Thursday to the latest crop of new soldiers at their graduation ceremony at Fort Jackson in central South Carolina. Her battle against children's lack of fitness intersects with the nation's need to field fit troops for the Army. Fort Jackson, which trains more than 60,000 soldiers annually and more than half the Army's female soldiers, is one of the service's five major posts for basic and advanced individual training. Lt. Gen. Mark Hertling, who recently overhauled the way the Army feeds its troops during training, also revamped the Army's physical training regimen.

HOW MUCH MONEY AZ SPENDS EDUCATING ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION VICTOR HUGO RODRIGUEZ. PHOENIX, ARIZONA

Phoenix - State Rep. Carl Seel, wants to find out how much money Arizona spends educating illegal immigrants. Seel has proposed a law that would require school districts to collect immigration data on their students. Under Seel's proposal, schools would also be required to calculate the cost of educating students who are not legal residents. School districts that fail to complete a yearly report on the subject would lose state aid.

COLLEGE FRESHMEN**VO :29**

American college freshmen are reporting record-low levels of emotional health, and an increasing number say they felt overwhelmed by work as high school seniors. That's according to a study being released Thursday by researchers at the University of California in Los Angeles. Lead author John Pryor says the emotional well-being of freshmen is at its lowest level in 25 years. Some experts say that could be because better medications and treatment are enabling more students with mental health problems to attend college. The study also found a generally positive attitude toward higher education. Nearly 58 percent of freshmen expect they'll be satisfied with their college experience. Almost 73 percent believe that college will increase their earning power.

Obesity, changes in diagnostic criteria may be behind soaring rates. Diabetes now affects nearly 26 million Americans of all ages and 79 million people have what doctors call "prediabetes," according to 2011 estimates released Wednesday by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Prediabetes, which the CDC says affects 35 percent of adults, is a condition where blood sugar levels are higher than normal but not yet high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes. Prediabetes greatly boosts a person's odds for type 2 diabetes, heart disease and stroke.

The vast majority of cases of diabetes are type 2, which develops when the body's cells gradually lose sensitivity to insulin. According to experts, there's one very big reason for type 2 diabetes' continuing rise among Americans -- weight gain.

A few hundred protestors gathered on the steps of the Nebraska capital for a Unity rally on Thursday. They are speaking out against Legislative Bill 48, the Illegal Immigration Enforcement Act. One of those protestors is Rich Hudson. "It makes me ill. It wrenches my stomach. It turns a warm state into a very cold state and today is a wonderful day for warmth." The protestors say the bill is similar to Arizona's controversial immigration law. State Senator Charlie Janssen of Fremont introduced LB-48. It would require officers to question a person's immigration status while investigating them for something else if the officer thinks that person is in the country illegally. The bill would also require non-US citizens to carry proof of their legal status. Senator Janssen says there are 40,000 illegal immigrants in Nebraska using taxpayer funded services.

A federal judge says Indiana cannot deny paternity documents for children born in the U.S. just because their parents are illegal immigrants and don't have Social Security numbers. U.S. District Judge Tanya Walton Pratt issued the ruling Thursday in a lawsuit filed by parents who say a state policy requiring the numbers violates their children's rights. Under the policy, paternity affidavits filed by unmarried parents must contain both parents' Social Security numbers or be sent back to county health offices unrecorded.

ARIZONA LEGISLATION TARGETS AUTOMATIC CITIZENSHIP

Arizona lawmakers, once again diving into the national debate over illegal immigration, proposed a bill Thursday that would challenge automatic U.S. citizenship for children of illegal immigrants.

The proposal by Rep. John Kavanagh (R) is the second time this year lawmakers in a state have targeted the U.S. Constitution's 14th Amendment. A similar proposal was filed last week in Indiana. Leaders of an effort to get proposals considered in other states hope that lawmakers in 10 to 15 states will follow suit.

FBI EXECUTES SEARCH WARRANTS IN PROBE OF PRO-WIKILEAKS CYBER ATTACKS

FBI agents have executed 40 search warrants throughout the United States as part of an investigation into recent coordinated cyber attacks targeting major companies, the agency said. The United Kingdom's Metropolitan Police Service executed additional search warrants and arrested five people for their alleged role in the attacks, the FBI said in a statement Thursday. A group calling itself "Anonymous" has claimed responsibility for the attacks, the FBI said. The attacks were allegedly carried out by people who are active supporters of WikiLeaks, but are not affiliated with the website, a federal law enforcement source said.

The Obama administration Thursday unveiled a new system to warn Americans about terrorism threats that will include specific information about the threat, scrapping the widely ignored color-coded alerts. The old approach was criticized because it lacked specifics about threats, prompting people to ignore the warnings. The new approach will tell the public whether the threat is "imminent"

or if there is an "elevated" risk of threat. The new system will be implemented over the next three months and U.S. security officials have apparently quietly tried the new alert approach. The Transportation Security Administration, responsible for airport security, issued an advisory in December that officers may closely examine insulated drink containers after learning al Qaeda operatives may try to hide explosives in them.

CREDIT CARD RATES AT RECORD HIGHS NEAR 15%

Interest rates are now hovering near record highs, at an average rate of 14.72%. And if your credit is bad enough, you could even end up with a rate as high as 59.9% APR. That's because while the CARD Act helped crack down on certain fees and requires more disclosures, it didn't cap every credit card holder's worst enemy: interest rates. Sure, the new rules prevent banks from raising most interest rates retroactively, but there's no limit on the rates they can charge new customers. APRs have climbed more than 20% over the past two years and hit an all-time high of an average 14.78% in mid-November, based on weekly data collected from 100 of the nation's top credit card issuers. And there's no end in sight. While interest rate caps have been proposed -- including a proposal earlier this month from New York Congressman Maurice Hinchey that would limit rates at 15% -- none have been passed into law so far.

SIZE MATTERS TO BABIES, TOO, A STUDY SUGGESTS

Far from being something children learn on the playground, from pop culture, or in lessons from parents, the importance of size in social hierarchies may be innate or develop very early in life, the research suggests. The study published yesterday by the journal *Science* describes an experiment in which babies watched animated cartoons in which big and small blocks bound toward one another, bump against each other, and bow deferentially. If the big block bowed to the small one, infants as young as 10 months old stared for a long time, indicating to researchers that this bit of social choreography defied their expectations. The new work adds to a growing body of research revealing the powerful social tool kit that babies use to make sense of the world and suggests that they understand some basic rules of social interaction before they have had to use them.

FIRST LADY PRESSES AHEAD WITH FITNESS CAMPAIGN

First lady Michelle Obama says her "Let's Move" physical fitness campaign isn't about telling the American people what to do. Obama tells ABC's "Good Morning America" that improving diet and exercise habits is "a national security issue." The "Let's Move" campaign will be a year old next month, and President Barack

Obama's wife has recently been taking it to military installations. She says in the interview broadcast Friday that too many young military men and women are "unable to train" because of weight, fitness and nutrition programs. Mrs. Obama says her physical fitness campaign "has never been about the government telling people what do to." Instead, she said the emphasis is on giving people information about nutrition and fitness so they can make better choices for themselves and their children.

DIETARY GUIDELINES SALT

The government is launching an assault on salt. It's telling half of the U.S. population to drastically cut their daily salt intake. That warning goes for people who are 51 and older, all African-Americans and anyone suffering from hypertension, diabetes or chronic kidney disease. It recommends reducing daily sodium intake to little more than half a teaspoon. For everyone else, the government continues to recommend about a teaspoon a day -- 2,300 milligrams, or about one-third less than the average person usually consumes.

ECONOMY CALIFORNIA - BUDGET

Governor Jerry Brown is set to press California lawmakers in his state-of-the-state address Monday to balance the state budget with \$12.5 billion in spending cuts and \$12 billion in tax hikes California, the most populous U.S. state, faces a \$25.4 billion deficit caused by the combined effects of recession, high unemployment and turmoil in financial and housing markets.

CLINTON CALLS ON U.S. AMBASSADOR TO MASS MEETING

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton is convening an unprecedented mass meeting of U.S. ambassadors. The top envoys from nearly all of America's 260 embassies, consulates and other posts in more than 180 countries will be gathering at the State Department beginning on Monday. Officials say it's the first such global conference. The gathering comes at a time of crisis in Egypt that could reshape dynamics in the Middle East, fallout from leaked diplomatic documents and congressional calls for sweeping cuts in foreign aid. Although the meeting has been called to discuss U.S. foreign policy priorities for 2011, officials say Clinton plans to meet personally with ambassadors from front-line states to hear about developments on the ground. Officials also expect that specific concerns about the WikiLeaks revelations will be raised.

The Gardasil shot made its debut years ago, but Lubbock doctors and nurses said there's still a need for more education about the vaccine in Lubbock. The shot prevents the human papilloma virus, HPV, which can cause cervical cancer.

Members of the health community have taken time out throughout the month of January, Cervical Cancer Awareness Month, to talk to patients about the importance of prevention and early detection. Cervical cancer, or cancer of the cervix, is one of the most common types of cancer that affects a woman's reproductive organs. Because HPV is the most common cause of cervical cancer, preventing this sexually transmitted disease is the best way to prevent the cancer. Darla Porter, a nurse practitioner, said patients can prevent the disease by limiting their number of sexual partners, using condoms and, of course, receiving the vaccine. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends girls receive the shot as early as age 9. Catch-up shots are available for girls and women ages 13 to 26 who haven't received the vaccine. The cervical cancer vaccine isn't recommended, however, for women older than 26.
