## **GAS PRICES**

**VO :20**

Oil prices are falling on reports that Britain and the United States will release oil from government-controlled emergency reserves. News organizations reported Thursday that the two countries will try to knock down oil prices by releasing spare supply on the market. High oil prices have helped push gasoline in the U.S. to the highest price ever for this time of year, \$3.82 per gallon. Experts predict the national average could reach as high as \$4.25 per gallon by late next month. The U.S. released oil from its Strategic Petroleum Reserve in August with only limited success. Prices dipped for just a few days.

## **UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

**VO : 20**

A resurgent U.S. job market that has lifted the economy appears to be enduring. Factories in the Northeast kept hiring in early March. And the number of people applying for unemployment aid fell back to a four-year low. The economy is adding jobs at a time when inflation remains relatively mild outside of higher gas prices. The upbeat government reports Thursday reinforced the message sent by last week's encouraging job figures. Applications for unemployment aid dropped to a seasonally adjusted 351,000, the Labor Department said Thursday. That matched a four-year low reached last month. The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, was unchanged at 355,750, also a four-year low. Applications have declined 14 percent since October. When applications drop consistently below 375,000, it usually signals that hiring is strong enough to lower the unemployment rate. The steady decline has coincided with the best three months of hiring in two years. From December through February, employers added an average of 245,000 jobs a month. The unemployment rate has fallen to

8.3 percent, the lowest in three years.

**NEW ANTI SMOKING ADDS

The government has revamped its strategy for getting people to kick the smoking habit, and the new campaign is about to hit TV and radio air waves and billboards, magazines and newspapers. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will run ads containing graphic, eye-catching images of health problems that can come from cigarette smoking, such as heart surgery, a tracheotomy, lost limbs or paralysis. The \$54 million campaign is the largest and starkest anti-smoking push by the CDC. After aggressive anti-smoking campaigns in the past succeeded in substantially cutting back the percentage of people who smoke, the smoking rate has now stalled at about 20 percent. The CDC hopes the ads will get as many as 50,000 Americans to kick the habit.

**IDENTITY THEFT

Nineteen people were arrested in Nevada and eight other states in a Las Vegas-based identity theft and trafficking ring that a federal prosecutor characterized as a sophisticated racketeering organization involving 50 people nationwide. The scheme revolved around the buying and selling of pilfered debit and credit card information on an Internet site called "Carder.su," U.S. Attorney Daniel Bogden said Friday in Las Vegas. "The extent of the theft and sale of personal information uncovered by this investigation is astonishing," Bogden said in a statement dubbing the case "Operation Open Market." Secret Service and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement homeland security agents arrested five people Thursday in Las Vegas and 14 more in California, Florida, New York, Georgia, Michigan, New Jersey, Ohio, and West Virginia, according to the statement. Court appearance information was not made public.

Gas prices are continuing their climb. The auto club AAA says the national average price for regular grade gasoline reached \$3.83 per gallon Friday, up 7 cents in the last week. Prices remain 31 cents higher than a month ago prices, 28 cents higher than a year ago and within 28 cents of the all-time record high of \$4.11 per gallon set in July 2008.

**GENDER GAP PERSISTS IN COST OF HEALTH INSURANCE****VO :20**

Women still pay more than men for the same health insurance coverage, according to new research and data from online brokers. The new health care law will prohibit such "gender rating," starting in 2014. But gaps persist in most states, with no evidence that insurers have taken steps to reduce them.

The 10 states with the largest Hispanic populations are California, Texas, Florida, New York, Illinois, Arizona, New Jersey, Colorado, New Mexico and Georgia. The 10 states in which the Hispanic share of the population is highest are New Mexico, Texas, California, Arizona, Nevada, Florida, Colorado, New Jersey, New York and Illinois. Nearly half (47%) of all Hispanics live in California (14.1 million) or Texas (9.5 million), down from 50% in 2000. California has 5.4 million Hispanic immigrants, more than any other state. California is followed by Texas, with 2.9 million Hispanics immigrants, and Florida with 2.1 million Hispanic immigrants.

**PEW HISPANIC CENTER TO RELEASE REPORT ON THE DEMOGRAPHICS OF THE JOBS RECOVERY**

Two years after the U.S. labor market hit bottom in 2009, the economic recovery has yielded slow but steady gains in overall employment. However, the pace of the jobs recovery varies across demographic groups. Hispanics and Asians are gaining jobs at a faster rate than blacks and whites, foreign-born workers are outpacing native-born workers, and men are faring better than women in the recovery, according to new Pew Research Center analysis of government data. For the most part, the disparate trends in the jobs recovery from 2009 to 2011 reflect the rapidly changing demographics of the American workforce. Groups whose working-age populations are growing the most have seen the biggest employment gains. But job growth has merely kept up with population growth for most groups, and their employment rates---- the share of the working-age population with jobs are still as low as they were at the end of the recession.

The Obama administration is temporarily suspending immigration court dockets in four cities while authorities review thousands of cases as part of a plan to indefinitely delay deportation proceedings for many non-criminal illegal immigrants. The dockets in Detroit, New Orleans, Orlando, and Seattle will be suspended during the review cases involving illegal immigrants not held in Immigration and Customs Enforcement custody, the Department of Homeland Security said Thursday. ICE previously reviewed 11,682 in Baltimore and Denver. Officials recommended suspending more than 1,600 cases in those two cities. The reviews are part of an Obama administration pledge to focus deportation resources on criminal immigrants and those who pose a national security or public safety threat.

**OBAMA WANTS TAX BREAKS FOR OIL COMPANIES STOPPED****PABLO SANCHEZ. WASHINGTON, DC****PKG 2:00**

President Barack Obama is renewing his call for Congress to end tax breaks to oil companies. In a Rose Garden speech Thursday, Obama will urge Congress to vote to end what the White House calls "the billions in taxpayer dollars handed out to oil companies every year." The address comes before a Senate procedural vote on a bill to repeal oil tax subsidies. Obama is also expected to suggest how the money could be spent on clean energy.

**UNEMPLOYMENT LOWEST****VO :20**

The number of people seeking U.S. unemployment benefits dropped last week to the lowest level in four years, adding to evidence that the job market is strengthening. The Labor Department said Thursday that weekly unemployment benefit applications fell by 5,000 to a seasonally adjusted 359,000. That's the smallest number of applicants since April 2008. The four-week average, a less volatile measure, declined to 365,000, the lowest since May 2008. The department also made its annual revisions to the past five years of unemployment benefit data. The revisions increased the number of unemployment benefit applicants in recent months. But the downward trend remains intact, though it is less dramatic. In the past six months, applications have fallen about 12 percent. Before the revisions, the decline was 16 percent.

**US TO INCREASE NONIMMIGRANT VISA FEE****VO :20**



The U.S. Department of State has announced it will increase non-immigrant visa processing fees in most categories starting from April 13. Under the new schedule of fees, applicants for all visas that are not petition-based, including tourist and business visitor (B1/B2) visas and all student and exchange visitor (F, M and J) visas, will pay a fee of \$160 instead of \$140.

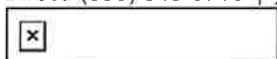

**NEW RULE FOR IMMIGRANT FAMILIES  
JUAN CARLOS GONZALEZ - LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

The Obama administration is proposing to make it easier for illegal immigrants who are immediate family members of American citizens to apply for permanent residency, a move that could affect as many as 1 million of the estimated 11 million immigrants living illegally here. The new rule, which the Department of Homeland Security will post for public comment Monday, will reduce the time illegal immigrants are separated from their American families while seeking legal status, immigration officials said. Currently, such immigrants must leave the country to apply for a legal visa, often leading to long stints away as they await resolution of their applications. The proposal is the latest move by the administration to use its executive powers to revise immigration procedures without changing the law. It reflects an effort by President Barack Obama to improve his standing among Latino voters who feel he has not met his 2008 campaign promise to pursue comprehensive immigration reform.

**NEW AIRPORT SCREENING LAW FOR TROOPS**

**VO: 25**

Those slow airport screenings may soon be fast-tracked for members of the military. President Obama signed into law today a bill to speed up the checkpoint process for service members who are in uniform and traveling on orders. The law doesn't spell how the T-S-A should make that happen -- but suggests putting service members into trusted traveler programs, where the lines are faster and people are pre-screened.

A spokesman for Minnesota Republican Congressman Chip Cravaack, who championed the bill, says the law is only meant to make the screenings faster, not reduce security.

**SMALL BUSINESSES UP**

Small businesses created 55,000 new jobs in December as a recent trend of employees working fewer hours and receiving less pay reversed, according to Intuit Inc.'s (INTU) monthly small business employment index. For the period of Nov. 24 to Dec. 23, Intuit said small business employment inched up 0.3%, equaling an annual growth rate of 3.3%. The firm also raised its estimate of jobs added in November to 70,000 from 55, 000 previously reported.

The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, declined to 373,250, the lowest level since June 2008. When applications drop below 375,000 -- consistently -- they generally signal that hiring is strong enough to reduce the unemployment rate.

## **RETAIL SALES**

Many retailers are reporting solid sales gains for December, capping a decent holiday season. But merchants relied on heavy discounting to get shoppers to buy in a challenging economy, raising concern about what it will take to get them to spend again in coming months. As retailers reported their results Thursday, Limited Brands Inc., Macy's Inc. and teen retailer The Buckle posted strong revenue gains that beat analysts' estimates.

## **KODAK PREPARES FOR CHAPTER 11 FILING**

### **VO: 28**

An uncomfortable suspicion that an icon of American business may have no future pushed investors to dump stock in Eastman Kodak Co. Wednesday. The ailing photography pioneer's shares fell to a new all-time low after the Wall Street Journal reported that Kodak is preparing for a Chapter 11 filing "in the coming weeks" should it fail to sell a trove of 1,100 digital-imaging patents. Analysts have said the patents could fetch \$2 billion to \$3 billion, but no takers have emerged since Kodak started shopping them around in July.

## **CANCER RATE DOWN**

### **VO: 35**

Death rates from cancer continue a slow but steady march downward in the United States, with a few exceptions, the American Cancer Society reported on Wednesday. The group estimates that the reduction translates to a million lives

saved since 1990. The American Cancer Society's annual report shows that between 2004 and 2008, the incidence of cancer fell by just over half a percent in men while it was stable in women. Death rates fell by 1.8 percent a year in men and 1.6 percent every year in women.

The new strategy will guide future defense budgets, including the one that Obama will submit to Congress next month. Republicans are quickly offering criticism. The chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, Buck McKeon of California, calls it a "retreat from the world in the guise of a new strategy

## **FOOD STAMPS**

Politicians normally shy away from saying they want to cut food stamps, but this year's Republican presidential candidates are using domestic food aid as an example of a welfare state gone awry. Supporters of the program say it is one of the most reliable safety nets for families who suddenly find themselves unable to pay for food, and politically the program has proved almost untouchable over many decades. More than 45 million people received the benefit last year at a \$75 billion cost to the government, a record number as the economy has flailed. Republican presidential candidate Newt Gingrich and fellow contender Rick Santorum, both heavily involved in congressional welfare reform efforts in the mid-1990s, say the government should stop promoting a welfare-like state and convert food stamp spending to block grants to states, a move that could freeze spending and cut the benefit to many who now receive it.

## **U.S. DEBT IS NOW EQUAL TO ECONOMY**

Supporters of Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney stand next to a national debt clock during a rally Sunday in Exeter, N.H. The debt is projected to surge. The amount of money the federal government owes to its creditors, combined with IOUs to government retirement and other programs, now tops \$15.23 trillion. That's roughly equal to the value of all goods and services the U.S. economy produces in one year: \$15.17 trillion as of September, the latest estimate. Private projections show the economy likely grew to about \$15.3 trillion by December - a level the debt is likely to surpass this month. "The 100% mark means that your entire debt is as big as everything you're producing in your country," says Steve Bell of the Bipartisan Policy Center, which has proposed cutting nearly \$6 trillion in red ink over 10 years. "Clearly, that can't continue." Long-term projections suggest the debt will continue to grow faster than the economy, which would have to expand by at least 6% a year to keep pace

## **GAS PRICES GOES UP**

National gas prices up 12 cents in past 3 weeks average price of a gallon of gasoline nationwide has spiked 12 cents over the past three weeks. That's according to the Lundberg Survey of fuel prices, which puts the price of a gallon of regular at \$3.36. Midgrade costs an average of \$3.51 a gallon, and premium

is at \$3.62. Diesel held steady, at \$3.90 a gallon. Of the cities surveyed, Salt Lake City, Utah, has the nation's lowest average price for gas at \$2.86. Los Angeles has the highest at \$3.69.

### **SUPREME COURT BROADCAST**

The Supreme Court is considering whether government regulators may still police the airwaves for curse words and other coarse content at a time when so many Americans have unregulated cable television, and the Internet is awash in easily accessible adult material. The justices are hearing arguments Tuesday in a First Amendment case that pits the Obama administration against the nation's television networks. The material at issue includes the isolated use of expletives as well as fines against broadcasters who showed a woman's nude buttocks on a 2003 episode of ABC's "NYPD Blue." A federal appeals court struck down the Federal Communications Commission's regulation of so-called indecent material.

### **TPS FOR SALVADOREANS**

San Salvador, Jan 9 (Prensa Latina) Hugo Martinez, El Salvador's Foreign Minister, will discuss an extension of the Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for immigrants in the United States with the secretary of National Security Janet Napolitano. The TPS was adopted after the earthquakes of 2001 and expires on March 8 this year. Up to now it covers the stay in that country of about 215 thousand Salvadorans. In the announcement of his trip, Martinez said that the U.S. government could announce the extension of the program for another 18 months on Monday. We have always said that we have great expectations that the announcement will be positive, but the U.S. authorities have to do it and they know on what terms they will, he said. The Foreign Minister met in Washington last November with Napolitano, demanding the extension of the TPS. The U.S. authorities estimate that some 2.5 million Salvadorans, mostly undocumented, live there, and Martinez said that the Foreign Ministry is ready to help their compatriots to register with the TPS.

### **TUCSON SCHOOLS SUSPEND MEXICAN AMERICAN STUDIES CLASS**

**VO: 31**

The Tucson Unified School District voted late Tuesday to suspend its controversial Mexican American studies program rather than lose more than \$14 million in funding after the state schools chief ruled the program violated the law. During a raucous session that included passionate public comments and accusations of cowardice, the board voted 4 to 1 to suspend the classes. If it had not, the district would have lost about \$5 million in state funding in February, retroactive to last August, and \$14.4 million over the fiscal year, according to the state Department of Education. The new law bans classes that are primarily designed for a particular ethnic group or that "promotes resentment toward a race or class of people." Last week, state Superintendent of Public Instruction John Huppenthal ruled the Tucson program in violation. The board could have gone to court to contest his decision, as well as his order that 10% of the district's monthly share of state aid be withheld until the program came into compliance. It decided not to do so.

## **UNEMPLOYMENT APPLICATIONS UP**

**VO: 24**

The number of people applying for weekly unemployment benefits spiked last week, largely because companies let go of thousands of workers after the holiday season. The Labor Department says applications jumped by 24,000 to a seasonally adjusted 399,000, the most in six weeks. That followed three months of steady declines that brought applications to the lowest level in more than three years. Applications typically soar in the first two weeks of the year. That's because companies are letting go of temporary workers brought on to help during the holidays. The department attempts to adjust for those patterns, but the data can be volatile. The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, also rose, to 381,750. It had fallen to a three-and-a-half-year low in the previous week.

RealtyTrac reports sharp drop in home repossessions in 2011. A firm that tracks foreclosures says they were down 34 percent last year, but are likely to bump up this year. RealtyTrac says the reason for the drop was procedural delays that artificially reduced the foreclosure rate. Spokesman Daren Bloomquist says although the rate is likely to rise this year, the worst of the crisis is over. The number of homes facing foreclosure action totaled 1.9 million in 2011, the lowest level since 2007. There have been more than four million bank repossessions in the past five years. Las Vegas was the foreclosure capital last year, and



California had 10 of the top 20 highest foreclosure rates in metropolitan areas.

## **RICH & POOR CONFLICTS**

**VO: 28**

Americans believe that there is more conflict between rich and poor than between immigrants and the native-born or between blacks and whites, according to a Pew Research Center opinion survey released on Wednesday. Researchers found 30 percent of Americans say there are "very strong conflicts" between the poor and the rich, which is the largest share expressing that opinion since the question was first asked in 1987, the Pew report said. In all, 66 percent of respondents to the Pew survey said there are either "very strong" or "strong" conflicts between rich and poor.

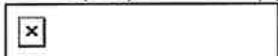

The new national strategy will be announced in weeks. A key portion is a new color-coded system that categorizes detained migrants based on their number of crossing attempts or criminal history. **CONGRESS-DEBT****VO: 29**

The House is kicking off its second session under GOP control by staging a politically-fueled vote against raising the government's borrowing limit by \$1.2 trillion as permitted under last summer's bipartisan debt and budget agreement. Under that law, supported by all of Congress' top GOP leaders, the debt ceiling is automatically raised 15 days after the president officially notifies lawmakers that the government is close to the current \$15.2 trillion cap -- unless Congress votes to deny the borrowing increase. Wednesday's measure to block the debt increase is expected to pass easily. But it's a dead issue in the Senate, and Obama's veto power serves as a final guarantee that the increase will go through as designed and that the nation won't face another debt crisis like last summer's.

The Obama administration has recommended canceling deportation proceedings for more than 1,600 illegal immigrants in Denver and Baltimore not considered a national security or public threat, a DHS official said Thursday. The recommendations come after a review of 11,682 pending cases involving illegal immigrants not jailed by federal authorities as part of an Obama administration pledge to focus deportation efforts on criminal illegal immigrants and those who pose a national security or public safety threat. According to preliminary figures shared with The Associated Press, 7,923 cases were reviewed in Denver and officials recommended closing 1,301. In Baltimore, 366 of the 3,759 cases reviewed were recommended for closure.

## **FOOD AND FARM-ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION**

### **VO :29**

It's unclear whether farmers in Georgia and Alabama will face a shortage of workers due to tough new laws targeting illegal immigration, but some producers said they have begun changing their plans for planting and harvesting this year's crops. Some farmers said they might reduce the number of acres they plant or shift to less labor-intensive crops, while others are bracing for higher labor prices and have turned to new recruiting tools to attract workers. Georgia and Alabama have approved laws that have tough enforcement provisions that farmers say are scaring migrant workers away from the states. Since the laws were approved last year, farmers in both states have reported labor shortages because migrant workers aren't showing up and they say they can't find other workers to fill the jobs. Farmers and state officials have said that some produce was left to rot in the field last year because there weren't enough workers to help with the harvest.

## **OVERWEIGHT MEN WITH PROSTATE CANCER HAVE A HIGHER RISK OF DYING**

### **VO :23**

Men who are overweight when they have locally advanced prostate cancer have almost double the risk of dying from the disease compared with men of normal weight, new research says. The study, led by a team at Massachusetts General Hospital, is the first to find that excess weight alone is associated with deaths in men whose tumors had grown beyond the prostate or spread to lymph nodes, according to the study, which appears in the journal *Cancer*. For men with a normal body mass index of 25, the death rate from prostate cancer was 6.5 percent after eight years. For overweight men, with a BMI between 25 and 30, it was 13.1 percent, and for obese men, with a BMI over 30, the death rate was 12.2 percent.

## **SEX-HEARTS**

### **VO :25**

A leading doctors group is weighing in on one of the least discussed issues facing heart attack survivors -- is it safe to have sex? In its first science-based recommendations, the American Heart Association says having sex only slightly raises the chance for a heart attack. And that's true for people with and without heart disease. The recommendation says if a person is healthy enough to walk up two flights of stairs without chest pain or gasping for breath, that individual can have a love life. The lead author of the report says many heart patients don't think twice about climbing stairs, yet many worry that sexual activity will cause another heart attack, or even sudden death. And there's no evidence heart patients have more sex-related heart attacks than people without cardiac

disease.

### **JOB DISCRIMINATION**

Federal job discrimination complaints rose to an all-time high last year, led by an increase in bias charges based on religion and national origin. The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission received nearly 100,000 charges of discrimination during the 2011 fiscal year, the most in its 46-year history. That's a slight increase over the previous year, which had 25 fewer complaints. Charges of religious discrimination jumped by 9.5 percent, the largest increase of any category. Claims of bias based on ancestry or country of origin rose 5 percent. Experts say the increase reflects the growing diversity of the nation's work force. "We're seeing a greater diversity among minority groups in America," said Ron Cooper, a former general counsel of the EEOC who now works in private practice. "We're seeing more workers from India, Pakistan and other countries that bring additional religious complexity to the work force.

### **ABORTION SAFER THAN GIVING BIRTH**

**VO: 25**

Getting a legal abortion is much safer than giving birth, suggests a new U.S. study published Monday. Researchers found that women were about 14 times more likely to die during or after giving birth to a live baby than to die from complications of an abortion. Experts say the findings, though not unexpected, contradict some state laws that suggest abortions are high-risk procedures. The message is that getting an abortion and giving birth are both safe, said Dr. Anne Davis, who studies obstetrics and gynecology at the Columbia University Medical Center in New York, and wasn't involved in the new study. "We wouldn't tell people, 'Don't have a baby because it's safer to have an abortion' -- that's ridiculous," she told Reuters Health. "We're trying to help women who are having all reproductive experiences know what to expect." An induced abortion, like any other medical procedure, requires getting informed consent from the woman, said Dr. Bryna Harwood, an ob-gyn from the University of Illinois in who also didn't participate in the new research.

**PASSPORT FEES INCREASES**

U.S. citizenship is priceless to some, worthless to others. But now the State Department has a dollar figure: U.S. citizenship is worth \$450. At least that's what it will cost you to renounce it. Under new consular fees published Thursday in the Federal Register, the cost of processing a formal renunciation of U.S. citizenship skyrocketed from \$0 to \$450. The announcement locks in fee hikes that had been proposed in 2010 and instituted on an interim basis. The State Department doesn't say how or why it calculated the cost. Citizenship is free for most Americans who are accorded the privilege at birth. The department says only that it "has decided that the renunciant should pay this fee at the visit during which he or she swears the oath of renunciation." It's also getting more expensive if you want to keep your U.S. citizenship and need a passport to prove it. The application fee for a passport is jumping by 27 percent, from \$55 to \$70 with a 100 percent increase, from \$20 to \$40, in the passport security surcharge.

Stung by election-year criticism of a program used by one in seven Americans, administrators of U.S. food stamp benefits are intensifying efforts to combat fraud and protect the \$75.3 billion plan from the budget axe. High joblessness, persistent woes in the housing market and a tepid economic recovery have driven more than 14 million people to sign up for the benefits since U.S. President Barack Obama

In particular, ICE says the advocate will address "concerns related to ICE enforcement actions involving U.S. citizens." Lorenzen-Strait is a former pro bono lawyer from Maryland. ICE says information brought back by the advocate will help the agency prioritize the "types of individuals" who should be deported.

## **STATES MORTGAGE SETTLEMENT - CA, NY ON BOARD**

Federal officials say a deal has been reached between states and the nation's biggest mortgage lenders over foreclosure abuses. The Justice Department says the settlement will be announced at a 10 a.m. EST news conference Thursday. The nationwide settlement stems from abuses that occurred after the housing bubble burst. Many companies that process foreclosures failed to verify documents. Some employees signed papers they hadn't read or used fake signatures to speed foreclosures -- an action known as robo-signing. ## **WOMEN AT WAR**

Defense officials say the Pentagon is changing its rules to allow women to serve in more jobs closer to the front lines. The Washington state Legislature has voted to legalize gay marriage, setting the stage for the state to become the seventh in the nation to allow same-sex couples to wed. The state Senate approved the proposal last week. Democratic Gov. Chris Gregoire (GREG'-wahr) is expected to sign the bill next week, and it would take effect 90 days later. But opponents have promised a challenge, which could put the law on hold pending the result of a November vote. Same-sex marriage is legal in New York, Connecticut, Iowa, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont and Washington D.C.

The four-week average, a less volatile measure, fell to 366,250, the lowest since late April 2008. The figures come a week after the government reported that employers added 243,000 net jobs last month. That pushed the unemployment rate down to 8.3 percent, the lowest in nearly three years.

## **COFFEE RECALL**

Home-brewed coffee lovers, take note: More than a million coffee makers are being recalled after dozens of reports of the brewers spraying hot liquid, coffee grounds or tea leaves onto people. The Consumer Product Safety Commission says there have been 140 reports of problems with the Tassimo single-cup brewers dousing people, including 37 cases involving second-degree burns. In one incident, a 10-year-old girl from Minnesota was hospitalized with second-degree burns to her face and neck. The coffee maker's "T-disc," the plastic disc that holds the coffee or tea, can burst while brewing, according to the commission. Congressional leaders are gauging lawmakers reactions to a tentative deal extending a 2 percentage-point payroll tax cut and added unemployment benefits for the rest of 2012. Republican and Democratic bargainers worked out the package late Tuesday. The roughly \$150 billion measure also would prevent a steep cut in Medicare reimbursements to doctors. About a third of the measure's costs would be paid for, with savings that include cuts in Medicare payments to hospitals, increased employee contributions to federal pensions and government sales of parts of the broadcast airwaves.

## **GASOLINE PRICE INCREASE MARTIN BERLANGA - MIAMI, FLORIDA**

**PKG: 1:56**

Gas prices are off to a fast start in 2012. The national average for a gallon of regular gasoline is up more than 8 percent since the end of 2011, rising from \$3.25 per gallon to \$3.52, according to new data released by the U.S. Energy Information Administration. While gas prices tend to rise through the first half of the year, this is the earliest the average price per gallon has breached the \$3.50 mark. If this pace continues, the national average should hit \$4 a gallon by May, if not sooner. The last time the average price did so in the U.S. was summer 2008, when the price of oil hit \$140 barrel/. Last year gas prices approached \$4, hitting an average of \$3.98 in April, before falling.

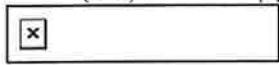
## **"BIONIC ARM" FOR STROKE PATIENTS CECILIA RAMIREZ HARRIS - MIAMI, FLORIDA**

A Navy veteran who lost an arm in Iraq in 2005 now has a new one that can do most of the things the original could. Hospital Corpsman Sharod Edwards, who was a field medic in Iraq, is the first person in the world to have the new functional arm. There were two others who had it on a trial basis, but for Edwards, it's a keeper. It's been three weeks since Edwards got the new arm, which works by muscle impulses higher in the arm that control the action of the wrist and fingers. Licensed certified prosthetist Geoffrey Hemmen, who has worked closely with Edwards at Hanger Prosthetics and Orthotics in San Marco, said he's doing great, and that's why he got into the business. Hemmen said he knew someone when he was a child who lost a leg in an accident and has pursued the field of prosthetics ever since. "They become life-long friends," Hemmen said of those who come through his door. He added he especially likes it when people enter his office in a wheelchair but eventually walk out the door.

**ARIZONA IMMIGRATION LAW**

**VO: 22**

A Christian law firm has filed an amicus brief urging the Supreme Court to uphold the constitutionality of Arizona's controversial immigration enforcement statute. The American Center for Law and Justice (ACLJ) is representing 57 members of Congress and more than 65,000 Americans in urging the Supreme Court to overturn a federal appeals court decision that declared the Arizona immigration law unconstitutional. The ACLJ amicus brief contends the decision from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit should be reversed "because it exalts administrative 'priorities and strategies' over Congress' clear and manifest intent to welcome state involvement in the enforcement of federal immigration law." Jordan Sekulow, executive director of the ACLJ, says the case has major ramifications.

**FORECLOSURE RATES**

**VO :19**

The number of Americans at risk of foreclosure is declining, as more homeowners climb out of debt and find steady work. The Mortgage Bankers Association said Thursday that 7.58 percent of homeowners missed at least one mortgage payment in the October-December quarter. In a normal market, the percentage of delinquent borrowers is about 1.1 percent, according to the trade group. Delinquent mortgages have come down from a record high of more than 10 percent of residential mortgages in 2010. Still, part of the reason for the decline is a delay in foreclosure filings, especially in backlogged state courts in Florida, New Jersey, Illinois and New York.

## **UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

### **VO : 20**

Long-term unemployed workers in states with persisting high joblessness would no longer be able to count on unemployment benefit checks for up to 99 weeks under legislation before Congress. Under this week's compromise for extending a Social Security tax cut through the rest of 2012, federal unemployment benefits for people who have been out of work more than six months are being scaled back. If Congress passes the bill Friday and President Barack Obama signs it into law, the current maximum 99 weeks of benefits will gradually fall to 73 weeks by September. For people in all but about a dozen of the highest unemployment states, the benefits will be cut off after 63 weeks.

## **CELL PHONES AND CHILDREN**

### **VO: 20**

Who is monitoring the apps that kids use on their phones? The government complained Thursday that software companies producing games, utilities and other mobile applications aren't telling parents what personal information is being collected from kids and how companies are using it. Apps could quietly be collecting a child's location, phone number, call logs and lists of friends, said a report by the Federal Trade Commission. The FTC blamed the companies that make the apps, and the stores that sell them, for failing to explain where that data might be recorded, for how long and who would have access to it. "As gatekeepers of the app marketplace, the app stores should do more," the report said. "This recommendation applies not just to Apple and Google, but also to other companies that provide a marketplace for kids' mobile apps."

## **REMOTE-CONTROLLED MICROCHIP IMPLANT DELIVERS DRUG: STUDY**

### **VO: 20**

An under-the-skin microchip device that releases drugs has been tested in humans for the first time. The study - published in the Feb. 16 issue of Science Transnational Medicine involved eight postmenopausal women with osteoporosis. The microchip-based device containing osteoporosis treatment was implanted in these women for four months and wirelessly programmed to release doses of the medicine once a day for 20 days. Did it work? Tests showed the daily releases from the device increased bone formation without any toxic or negative consequences. The women said the implant did not have an impact on their quality of life. "These data validate the microchip approach to multi-year drug delivery without the need for frequent injections, which can improve the management of many chronic diseases like osteoporosis where adherence to therapy is a significant problem," study author Robert Farra, president of the MicroChips - the company that developed the device - said in a written statement

Farra said the company looks to develop a range of products to treat diseases including osteoporosis, cardiovascular disease, multiple sclerosis, cancer, and chronic pain.

## **ANTIBIOTICS NO HELP FOR SINUSITIS**

Explain that patients with acute rhinosinusitis had no differences in symptoms or quality of life three days after starting on amoxicillin compared with patients who received a placebo. Botox is licensed to prevent headaches in adults with chronic migraine, but the National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) said on Thursday the company had not provided sufficient evidence to prove its value. Without additional information NICE said it was inclined not to recommend Botox as a migraine treatment option in the state-run health service. The agency's draft guidance is open for comments until March 8. Allergan said in a statement it was "working constructively" to address key questions raised by NICE and would be submitting a revised economic model. "Allergan believes that the revised model presents robust evidence demonstrating that treatment with BOTOX is both a cost-effective and clinically meaningful treatment option," it said.

**MORTGAGE LENDERS-LEGAL FEES****VO: 22**

A watchdog says the U.S. government regulator for Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac must do a better job limiting legal expenses paid by the two mortgage giants to their former executives facing lawsuits. A report issued by the inspector general for the Federal Housing Finance Agency says Fannie and Freddie together have paid more than \$109 million in legal expenses for former executives since 2004. Taxpayers are footing the bill: The bailouts of the two companies have so far cost about \$150 billion and that figure continues to grow.

**US ISSUE TRAVEL WARNING****VO: 20**

U.S. citizens are reminded of the dangers of traveling to Colombia despite improvements in security measures there, the U.S. State Department said. The State Department, in a travel advisory, said narco-terrorist groups continue to pose a threat to national security in Colombia. The Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia was blamed for two minor attacks on Bogota last year. The advisory stated that security has improved "significantly" in recent years but narco-terrorist groups like FARC and the National Liberation Army are lingering threats. "Terrorist activity remains a threat throughout the country," the advisory read. It added that most narco-terrorist groups routinely use kidnapping as "a political bargaining chip." "No one is immune from kidnapping on the basis of occupation, nationality, or other factors," the warning read. "Kidnapping in rural areas is of particular concern." In early February, the State Department issued a similar travel warning for Mexico. The warning said more than 12,000 deaths were linked to the Mexican drug cartels last year.

**IMMIGRATION LAW ALABAMA****VO: 23**

But as Republican legislative leaders promise only minor adjustments to the law and with an 11th Circuit Court of Appeals hearing on portions of the law set for March 1, Hispanics are still living "with one foot out of the state, ready to flee for good," Sullivan said. Evelyn Servin, director of the North Alabama Hispanic

Coalition for Equal Rights, said many of the Hispanic people who work in poultry plants around Russellville have completely changed their way of life to avoid running into police. "People are still afraid to go out," Servin said. "Many of them go grocery shopping at night when they can't be seen in their cars. A lot of them are just staying home and not going anywhere." Alabama followed Arizona's lead by passing a law last year aimed at making everyday life difficult for the state's estimated 120,000 illegal immigrants. The Alabama law, known as H.B. 56, allowed local police to check the immigration status of people stopped for other crimes, required public school officials to collect data on the number of illegal immigrants enrolling, and forbade illegal immigrants from entering into private contracts or conducting any business with the state.

**TAX FRAUD DEPORTATION

Tax fraud is an aggravated felony for immigration purposes if it costs the government more than \$10,000, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled yesterday. In a 6-3 decision, the justices affirmed a ruling by the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, upholding a deportation order against Akio Kawashima. Kawashima and his wife, Fusako Kawashima, have lived in this country since 1984 and owned Cho Cho San restaurants in Tarzana and Thousand Oaks, according to a news account of their plea. The couple entered into plea agreements in 1997. Akio Kawashima pled guilty to willfully making and subscribing a false return, and his wife to aiding and assisting in the preparation of a false return. After they were sentenced on the pleas, the Immigration and Naturalization Service served them with deportation notices. An immigration judge ruled that their crimes constituted aggravated felonies, making them removable from the country. The IJ relied on a section of the Immigration and Nationality Act that makes a crime involving "fraud or deceit" or the crime of tax evasion an aggravated felony if it results in financial loss exceeding \$10,000. The Ninth Circuit ruled that the crimes for which the Kawashimas were convicted necessarily involved fraud and deceit. In Akio Kawashima's case, the court said, his plea agreement established that the government lost more than \$10,000 so the removal order was appropriate. News accounts of the case have put the government's losses at between \$245,000 and \$1 million.

**BECK BACKS LICENSES  
CLAUDIA BOTERO - LOSANGELES, CALIFORNIA

Wading into a divisive, politically charged debate, Los Angeles Police Chief Charlie Beck said Wednesday that California should issue driver's licenses to illegal immigrants. The chief becomes one of the most prominent local figures to support the idea that state lawmakers have battled over repeatedly in the last 15 years. And Beck's stance is certain to further inflame critics who are already angry at the chief for his efforts to liberalize rules on how his officers impound the cars of unlicensed drivers. "My personal belief is that they should be able to" have licenses, Beck said in response to a question during a meeting with Times' reporters and editorial writers. "The reality is that all the things that we've done - 'we' being the state of California - over the last 14, 16 years have not reduced the problem one iota, haven't reduced undocumented aliens driving without licenses. So we have to look at what we're doing. When something doesn't work over and over and over again, my view is that you should reexamine it to see if there is another way that makes more sense."

### **USPS TO CUT 35,000 JOBS**

The U.S. Postal Service announced on Thursday new plans to consolidate or close 223 mail processing plants, putting 35,000 jobs at stake starting in late May or June. The processing plant consolidations would save \$2.1 billion and are a part of the agency's broader effort to save \$20 billion in the next three years. The Postal Service is in debt due to declining first-class mail volumes and a congressional mandate to prefund retirement health care benefits. The agency was reaching out to impacted employees on Wednesday, officials said. Not all impacted workers will lose their jobs. Many will be offered jobs at other processing plants miles away or even in other states. Some will be urged to retire.

### **BANK OF AMERICA TO FREEZE PENSION PLANS**

**VO: 26**

Bank of America announced plans Thursday to freeze pension plans, effective in

July, and increase its 401(k) contributions instead. Eligible employees will keep the pension benefits that they've earned to date but will not receive additional benefits, Bank of America spokesman Scott Silvestri said. The company will instead begin making an additional 2-3% annual contribution to employees' 401 (k) accounts, on top of the existing program that matches employee contributions up to 5%. "Making these changes simplifies our offerings, gives employees control in managing their retirement savings and ensures our retirement benefits remain competitive," Silvestri said in an email.

## **NUMBER OF DEPORTATION CASES DROPS NEARLY A THIRD**

**VO: 21**

The number of deportation cases filed by federal immigration officials dropped by nearly a third in the first three months of the fiscal year, according to a report by the Syracuse University Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse. The drop recorded in the last three months of 2011 may reflect the Obama administration's plan to focus its deportation efforts by weighing a variety of discretionary factors, including whether the person is a veteran, came to the U.S. as a child or is a college student, according to the report. But experts said it's too soon to say if deportations overall will decline.

## **MORE THAN 1.4 MILLION FAMILIES LIVE ON \$2 A DAY PER PERSON**

That's up from 636,000 households in 1996, says a new study released by researchers at the University of Michigan and Harvard University Government benefits blunt the impact of such extreme poverty, but not completely, says one of the researchers, Luke Shaefer, a professor of social work at Michigan. The number of American households with cash income of no more than \$2 a day per person doubled in 15 years: The study found that among households in extreme poverty, one in five received rent vouchers or lived in public housing. Sixty-six percent had at least one child with public health insurance. The study did not factor in how those benefits affect household income.

## **IMMIGRATION TAXES**

The COPA, (California Opportunity and Prosperity Act) initiative would require undocumented people to pay income taxes, which would generate \$325 million annually for the state. It would create a five-year pilot program, which would make it possible for the state government to begin collecting taxes from

undocumented workers who meet select criteria. It is estimated to bring up to 1,000,000 undocumented workers out of the dark to have their work and earnings decriminalized and collected for the benefit of state and local services. The money collected annually would help to pay for education, public safety and infrastructure projects.

## **CHILD SUPPORT DEBTS**

### **VO:30**

Old child support debts could cost thousands of poor men their only income next year because of a policy aimed at reducing the cost to the government of mailing paper checks to pay federal benefits. The Treasury Department will start paying benefits electronically next March. It will stop issuing the paper checks that many people rely on to safeguard a portion of their benefits from states trying to collect back child support. States can freeze the bank accounts of people who owe child support. A separate Treasury Department rule, in place since last May in a preliminary form, guarantees them the power to freeze Social Security, disability and veterans' benefits that have been deposited into those accounts. Once paper checks are eliminated, about 275,000 people could lose access to all of their income, advocates say. "It's kind of Orwellian, what's being set up here for a segment of the population," says Johnson Tyler, an attorney who represents poor and disabled people collecting federal benefits. "It's going to be a nightmare in about a year unless something changes." In many cases, the bills are decades old and the children long grown.

## **HPV VACCINES RECOMMENDED FOR BOTH BOYS AND GIRLS**

### **VO:24**

The American Academy of Pediatrics is now recommending boys as well as girls receive the H-P-V vaccine. Previously the A-A-P only backed routine vaccinations for girls. The group recommends boys 11 and 12 be immunized against human papillomavirus to help prevent cancers and genital warts. The recommendation is published in the March issue of Pediatrics . H-P-V's are the most common sexually transmitted viruses in the U-S. It's found more frequently in sexually active adolescents and young adults.

### **AUTO SAFETY-CHILDREN**

Federal transportation officials are again delaying final rules aimed at helping prevent drivers from unintentionally backing over children. The government's proposed rules would require that automakers give drivers a better view of what's behind them, effectively necessitating rearview video camera systems on most new cars and trucks. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood said in a letter to lawmakers Tuesday that his department needs more time for "research and data analysis" before it can issue final regulations. Lobbyists for automakers who met with White House officials in December urged the administration to permit manufacturers the option of meeting the proposed visibility standard through expanded mirrors on vehicles rather than cameras. The government estimated the video systems would add about \$58 to \$200 to the cost of each new vehicle.

### **NEW POLICY FOR IMPOUNDING CARS OF UNLICENSED DRIVERS**

**ANTONIO VALVERDE - LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA**

The L.A. Police Commission voted on Tuesday to amend the LAPD's impound policy for unlicensed drivers. The commission voted 4-to-1 in favor of the change, which will help unlicensed drivers avoid having their cars impounded. Under current laws, if officers stop an unlicensed driver, they tow the vehicle and impound it for 30 days. But with the new policy, drivers can get their cars back the next day with valid identification, registration and proof of insurance, even if they don't have a driver's license. Drivers who have a suspended or revoked license, or who cause an accident, would not be eligible for a shorter impound. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and Police Chief Charlie Beck favored changing the policy, offering leniency to unlicensed drivers. "The difference is that we incentivize drivers to comply with the things they can comply with... have insurance, have identification," Beck explained.

### **HONDA HYBRID SUIT**

**VO: 31**

Attorneys general in California and four other states must decide whether to oppose a class-action settlement between Honda Motor Co. and owners of its

hybrid cars over inflated claims of fuel efficiency. A judge in San Diego has set a Wednesday deadline for California, Iowa, Massachusetts, Texas and Washington to make their objections known. The five states asked the judge for more time to consider after a Los Angeles woman won nearly \$10,000 this month in small claims court. That's much more than the couple hundred dollars cash that the settlement is offering. San Diego Superior Court Judge Timothy Taylor has scheduled a hearing March 16 to decide whether to accept the settlement.

## **AIRPORT BODY SCANNERS DEEMED**

**VO: 25**

A new government report says the radiation levels from those full-body scanners in airports aren't dangerous for passengers. The report is from the Department of Homeland Security Inspector General. It looks at independent radiation studies on the new backscatter X-ray machines. According to the report, those studies found the radiation levels from the scanners are so low, a passenger would have to be screened 47 times a day, 365 days a year to reach annual radiation dose limits. The T-S-A begin installing the full-body scanners two years ago, but has faced calls to do more in-depth studies on their health risks.

## **NEW SAFETY LABELS FOR CHOLESTEROL DRUGS**

The F-D-A announced the entire class of statin drugs will get new labels that alert the public to safety concerns. Statins, used to lower high cholesterol, will now come with a warning that they can cause memory loss and confusion. The new labels will also warn doctors and patients that statins can cause an increase in blood sugar levels and increase the risk of Type 2 diabetes. Some of the products that will have these label changes include Lipitor, Crestor and Zocor. Nearly 32 million Americans are on statins.

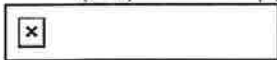

### **ALABAMA & GEORGIA IMMIGRATION LAW**

**VO: 20**

When a federal appeals court hears arguments Thursday in the legal challenges against tough new laws targeting illegal immigration in Alabama and Georgia, people outside of those two states will be paying attention. The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is scheduled to hear arguments on two separate challenges to Alabama's law, one filed by immigrant rights and civil liberties groups and the other filed by the U.S. Department of Justice. The three-judge panel will also hear arguments on a challenge to Georgia's new law filed by activist groups. In the case pitting Alabama against the federal government, the attorneys general in nine other states - Arizona, Georgia, Florida, Idaho, Kansas, Michigan, Nebraska, Oklahoma and South Carolina - have filed an amicus brief supporting the state of Alabama. They say in the brief that they "have a manifest interest in ensuring that their sovereignty is accorded proper respect.

### **ARIZONA IMMIGRATION LAW**

**VO: 25**

A federal judge blocked police in Arizona from enforcing a section of the state's 2010 immigration enforcement law that prohibited people from blocking traffic when they seek or offer day labor services on streets. U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton ruled Wednesday that groups seeking to overturn the law will likely prevail in their claim that the day labor rules violate the First Amendment. The ban was among a handful of provisions in the law that were allowed to take effect after a July 2010 decision by Bolton halted enforcement of other, more controversial elements of the law. The previously blocked portions include a requirement that police, while enforcing other laws, question people's immigration status if officers suspect they are in the country illegally.

### **BIRTH CONTROL-POLITICS**

**VO: 19**

The Senate is debating Republican legislation aimed at taking a bite out of President Barack Obama's health care law. The measure, sponsored by Missouri Sen. Roy Blunt, would allow insurers and employers to opt out of any requirements to which they object on moral or religious grounds. That includes the recently rewritten policy that shifts the cost of contraceptive coverage to insurers. Republicans say the requirement still violates freedom of religion because it forces some organizations to cover contraception even if their faiths forbid birth control. Democrats, trying this election year to hold onto support from female and independent voters, say the measure is really an effort to reduce access to women's health care.

## **HOMEOWNERS PROTECTION**

### **VO: 23**

California Attorney General Kamala Harris put her support behind a Democrat-sponsored bill Wednesday that would provide more protection for struggling homeowners. California Homeowners Bill of Rights is a group of six proposed laws that would aim at fixing serious flaws in the system. It would establish fair standards of mortgage lending, transparency for the process, more law enforcement, and more homeowner protection. "California communities and families are being devastated by the mortgage and foreclosure crisis. We must ensure the deceptive practices that caused it never happen again," Harris said. The bill could give a single point of contact instead of passing mortgage holders from one department to the next.

## **FORECLOSURE SALES**

Nearly a quarter of all U.S. homes sold in 2011 were either foreclosures or short sales, but that group accounted for the smallest slice of overall home sales in three years. Foreclosure listing firm RealtyTrac says more than 907,000 sales were made last year of foreclosed-upon homes and others that were in some stage of the process. As a percentage of all homes sold, sales of bank-owned properties and other homes on the foreclosure track last year were back down to 2008 levels. But they remained an outsize portion of total sales compared 2005, when foreclosure sales comprised less than 1 percent of all sales.

Americans' income rose 0.3 percent, the second straight monthly increase. Income barely kept pace with inflation last year. So the increases are a positive sign that consumers will have more money to spend. Consumer spending is important because it accounts for 70 percent of economic activity.

## **KIDS CONSUME MORE SUGAR FROM FOODS THAN DRINKS**

American children are consuming a lot of added sugar and most of it comes from processed foods... not sugary drinks. The Centers for Disease Control studied data

from 2005 to 2008. It found 59-percent of calories from added sugar came from foods and 41-percent from drinks. The study also found boys consumed more calories per day than girls. The C-D-C says it counted all sugars, whether they were used in food preparations or added at the table. Added sugar can contribute to weight gain and other health issues.

## **BRAIN INJURY DRUG**

**VO: 27**

Doctors have known about it for decades, but now research appears to confirm that a cheap flu medicine could be the first treatment to speed recovery from severe brain injuries caused by falls and car crashes. Severely injured patients who were given amantadine (uh-MAN'-tuh-deen) got better faster than those who received a dummy medicine. Far fewer patients who got amantadine remained in a vegetative state, 17 percent versus 32 percent. Many doctors began using amantadine for brain injuries years ago, but until now there's never been a big study to show that it works. The results appear in today's New England Journal of Medicine. But many questions remain, including whether people less severely injured would benefit, and whether amantadine improves long-term outcome or just speeds up recovery.

## **ALABAMA & GEORGIA FOLLOW**

When a federal appeals court hears arguments Thursday in the legal challenges against tough new laws targeting illegal immigration in Alabama and Georgia, people outside of those two states will be paying attention. The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is scheduled to hear arguments on two separate challenges to Alabama's law, one filed by immigrant rights and civil liberties groups and the other filed by the U.S. Department of Justice. The three-judge panel will also hear arguments on a challenge to Georgia's new law filed by activist groups. In the case pitting Alabama against the federal government, the attorneys general in nine other states - Arizona, Georgia, Florida, Idaho, Kansas, Michigan, Nebraska, Oklahoma and South Carolina - have filed an amicus brief supporting the state of Alabama. They say in the brief that they "have a manifest interest in ensuring that their sovereignty is accorded proper respect." The Atlanta appeals court has jurisdiction over Georgia, Florida and Alabama. But the opinions the court releases could also influence judges in other jurisdictions and demonstrate to lawmakers what provisions federal courts are likely to accept or reject.

The average price of regular unleaded gasoline climbed three-tenths of a cent in the latest 24-hour period, marking the 27th straight increase, AAA said. The nationwide average was \$3.475 a gallon a month ago and \$3.70 a week ago. Last year at this time, the average price stood at \$3.50. The average price is 34.7 cents, or about 8.4%, lower than the record high of \$4.11 on July 17, 2008. Average prices for regular gasoline top \$4 a gallon in California, Alaska and Hawaii. At \$4.38 a gallon, Hawaii ranks as the nation's high. Prices are within a few cents of the \$4 mark in Connecticut, Oregon and New York, according to AAA. Wyoming has the nation's lowest gas prices, averaging \$3.21 a gallon. Gas prices have been rising on the back of soaring oil prices, which have surged 10% over the past month amid fears that tension with Iran will lead to an all-out war that causes a disruption in oil supplies.

The products, usually used for lightening skin, are sold as soaps, skin creams, and lotions. In all, the FDA has identified 35 products, most of them manufactured overseas, and most sold in Latino, Middle Eastern, African-American, and Asian neighborhoods.

Mercury poisoning can cause illness and even death, and while the amounts of mercury in the cosmetics is typically low, mercury, like lead and some other poisons, accumulates in the body. Mercury is also readily absorbable through skin.

## **PRESCHOOL MOUTHS: DENTAL DISASTER ZONES**

Preschoolers across the country are increasingly getting fillings and extractions for extensive dental decay, sometimes requiring surgery and general anesthesia in an operating room, pediatric dentists report. The trend, seen in families both rich and poor, points to neglect driven by several factors. Despite decades of emphasis on eliminating tooth decay with fluoride toothpastes and frequent brushing, many parents aren't getting the message that dental care begins when a child's first tooth comes in, and that a child should be brushing with fluoride by age 2. Parents of all income levels indulge young children in too many sugary snacks and sippy cups filled with sugar-laden fruit juices, dentists say. Too often, they put toddlers to bed with a bottle of juice or milk. Saliva levels go down overnight, making the mouth even more acidic and allowing sugars in the drinks to eat into tooth enamel for hours at a time.

## **MORE PEOPLE FEAR LOSS OF MOBILE PHONE**

Do you panic or get anxious when you can't use your cell phone? You may have a condition called Nomophobia also known as "no mobile-phone phobia." An online British study of a thousand people showed that 66 percent of participants got stressed out when their phone was out of reach. That's 11 percent higher than four years ago. One adolescent psychologist says he's seen people have panic attacks over mobile phone separation. Women and 18-to-24 year olds are more prone to the condition. Experts say there are ways to tackle nomophobia.

## **ALABAMA IMMIGRATION MARCH**

Hundreds of people from across the country marched toward the state capital

Thursday, chanting in English and Spanish to make the case that the battle against Alabama's immigration law is an extension of the civil rights fight they commemorated. The annual march from Selma to Montgomery drew participants from across the country and included black, white, Latino and Asian Americans. Marchers will walk the final leg of the roughly 50-mile journey today, finishing with a rally near the state Capitol. Gloria Mills of Detroit said civil rights gains in the 1950s and '60s were "hard-fought," but Alabama's House Bill 56 and voter identification laws being implemented across the nation are chipping away at those rights. While not an immigrant herself, Mills stood in solidarity with those who came to the country illegally and are now under fire in Alabama. "Immigration is the civil rights (issue) of this particular time period," Mills said as she marched. "If someone deprives them of their rights, I'm next."

### **IRS - DELAYED REFUNDS UPSET TAXPAYERS**

The New York Times reports the bank hopes this will reduce the amount of money it owes in penalties under the settlement. Paperwork could be filed as early as Friday. Last month, 49 attorneys general announced a 26-billion dollar settlement to help homeowners who are underwater with their mortgages.

Coca-Cola and Pepsi are making some changes to its sodas so California won't put cancer warning labels on them.

The companies are changing how the drinks' caramel coloring is made, but will do it nationwide, not just for California. The state added a compound known as 4-MI or 4-MEI its list of carcinogens and the color additive has some levels of it. The American Beverage Association says the drinks don't cause any threat to people and California added the compound to its carcinogen list without any studies showing it causes cancer in humans. There was one study that showed cancer in rodents.

### **AIRFARES CLIMB, ROUTES DISAPPEAR AS FUEL PRICES RISE**

Airfares are rising, planes are packed, and carriers are abandoning less-profitable

routes. What's to blame? Climbing fuel prices. And there will be no relief in the immediate future, according to an analysis released by the Federal Aviation Administration "Planes will remain crowded," said the report released Thursday, and "shrinking capacity will further lift fares higher in 2012." The nation's airlines buy about 48 million gallons of fuel each day at a price that jumped nearly 40% in the last year. A gallon of jet fuel sold for an average of \$3 in 2011, up from \$2.15 in 2010. And although airlines are flying more energy-efficient planes, fuel represents about 35% of the industry's total operating costs.

## **SECURE COMMUNITIES NATIONWIDE**

A new report from the Center for Immigration Studies examines the outcomes of Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Secure Communities program and how those outcomes have been misleadingly described in one widely-circulated study published by the Earl Warren Institute at the University of California, Berkeley Law School. The Center's report, second in a three-part series, uses the same database of actual case histories provided by ICE as the Warren Institute report. The groups that first obtained the ICE records have claimed that they reveal a disturbing pattern of abuse of authority by ICE, including wrongful arrests of thousands of U.S. citizens, a pattern of racial profiling against Latinos, and denial of due process for aliens in removal proceedings. These allegations have been uncritically passed on by major news media outlets and repeated by members of Congress. While the database does provide an interesting and relatively rare snapshot of the ICE caseload, the Center found that the records did not support any of the racial profiling allegations.

## **SCOLARSHIP FOR IMMIGRANTS**

Among all the numbers that populate Nataly Lopez's life - including phone digits, addresses, pass codes and friends' ages - there is one that she never forgets: the cost of a semester's tuition at Baruch College, where she is a sophomore.

Ms. Lopez, 21, is an illegal immigrant from Ecuador and has struggled to make ends meet, working several jobs to be able to pay for school. "Two thousand eight hundred and five," she said. "I know that number because I have to reach it to get to the next semester." State proposals that would make government financial aid available for illegal immigrants like Ms. Lopez are pending in Albany. Frustrated with the pace of federal and state legislative action, advocacy groups, with the support of New York City officials, have developed a stopgap solution - for a small number of needy students, at least.

## **FDA CONSIDERS WAIVING PRESCRIPTIONS FOR KEY DRUGS**

Drugs used to treat some ailments could be headed over the counter. The FDA has been seeking public comment about possibly waiving the prescription requirements for drugs used for diabetes, asthma and migraines. The goal is to help give more people access to the drugs. The public comment period ends today (Friday) and the FDA will have a meeting about the proposal at the end of the month. It has already met with

drug companies to discuss ways to help people understand the risks and side effects of these medications if they were to go over the counter.

According to the report, "For both age groups, American Indian/Alaskan Native males (14.3% adolescents, 50.0% young adults) and females (16.3% adolescents, 46.1% young adults) had the highest prevalence of cigarette smoking." The report did say, "American Indian/Alaskan Native youth have experienced especially sharp declines in current cigarette smoking in recent years, which suggests that some progress has been achieved in reducing disparities in cigarette smoking in this racial/ethnic group. By adulthood, American Indian/Alaskan Native males and females will still have the highest prevalence of current cigarette smoking of all racial/ethnic groups."

**MORE YOUNGER WORKERS FINDING JOBS**

Jobs for 25-to-34-year-olds increased by 116,000 to 30.5 million in February. Their unemployment rate fell from 9% in January to 8.7%, the lowest since January 2009, according to the Labor Department. Just as important, the portion of Americans in that age bracket who were employed - known as the employment-to-population ratio - rose to 74.7% from 74.5% and is up from a 29-year low of 73.2% in July. In a normal economy, about 80% of 25-to-34-year-olds have jobs. For workers overall, the jobless

rate was unchanged at 8.3% in February. Young workers were hurt more than most in the recession and its aftermath. Many employers laid off entry-level employees first and limited the hiring of new college graduates with no experience. Faced with an unwelcoming job market, many college grads decided to hunker down and attend graduate school instead. In May 2010, the jobless rate for the 25-to-34 group was 10.5%, nearly a percentage point higher than the U.S.

**FORECLOSURE RATES

New figures out today show that foreclosure activity shot up last month across about half of the states, as banks tackled a backlog of homes with mortgages gone unpaid. The Foreclosure listing service known as RealtyTrac Inc. says the increase occurred across 26 states where the courts supervise the foreclosure process. In contrast, the 24 states where courts aren't a factor in foreclosures saw foreclosure activity decline in February. Overall, U.S. foreclosure activity dipped 2 percent from January and was down 8 percent from February last year. While uneven, the pace of foreclosures is accelerating following a \$25 billion settlement reached last month between the nation's biggest mortgage lenders and state officials over the industry's handling of foreclosures. RealtyTrac projects that foreclosures will rise 25 percent this year to 1 million homes.

**UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Fewer people sought unemployment benefits last week, adding to signs that the job market is strengthening. The Labor Department says weekly unemployment benefit applications dropped 14,000 to a seasonally adjusted 351,000. That matches a four-

year low reached last month. The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, was unchanged at 355,750. Applications have leveled off in the past few weeks after falling for six months. The average has declined 14 percent since October. The steady decline has coincided with the best three months of hiring in two years. From December through February, employers have added an average of 245,000 jobs per month.

### **APPLE'S NEW IPAD HITS STORES MARCH 16TH**

### **SEARS TO CLOSE 53 HARDWARE STORES**

**VO: 28**

Sears Holdings Corp. plans to close 53 hardware stores in the first half of 2012, the company said in its annual report filed late Wednesday. The closures include 43 Sears hometown dealer stores and 10 Sears Hardware stores. Hometown stores are small hardware stores, usually operated by independent dealers in rural areas. Sears Hardware stores are larger, corporate-owned outposts that carry Craftsman tools, DieHard car batteries and a limited selection of Kenmore appliances. The closures follow Sears' plan, announced in late December, to shutter up to 120 poor performing Sears and Kmart.

### **NEW TSA PROCEDURES FOR TRAVELING SENIORS**

Starting Monday, some airports will have changed screening procedures for the elderly. The TSA says this new procedure will allow officers to better focus on passengers who may be more likely to pose a threat and speed up the screening process.

### **CDC- IMPORTED FOOD DISEASE OUTBREAKS UP**

The CDC has some new information about the foods we eat. According to its latest study, disease outbreaks from imported foods were up in 2009 and 2010. Imported fruits and vegetables are on the list of items implicated in these outbreaks. Salmonella infection was the most common cause of disease, followed by histamine poisoning from fish. Histamine poisoning happens when fish is improperly chilled after it's caught. The CDC says it's too early to say if these numbers represent a trend, but, imported foods are more likely to cause multi-state outbreaks. About 16 percent of what we eat in the United States comes from other countries.

### **NO MORE ANNUAL PAP SMEAR: NEW CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING GUIDELINES**

**VO: 29**

CNN conditions expert Dr. Otis Webb Brawley is the chief medical officer of the American Cancer Society, a world- renowned cancer expert and a practicing oncologist. The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force is releasing new guidelines on cervical cancer screenings. What's changed? In the 1930s, cervical cancer was the deadliest women's cancer in America. At that time, it killed more women each year than breast or lung cancer. But over the past 80 years, there has been a tremendous decline in the death rate from cervical cancer because of improvements in treatment and screening. Today, death from cervical cancer is relatively rare in the U.S. In 2009, about 4,000 American women died of cancer of the cervix. A review of the medical history of these women showed that the overwhelming majority had never had cervical cancer screening, and most who did were screened more than 10 years before diagnosis.

### **VALUE OF MASS PROSTATE CANCER SCREENINGS QUESTIONED**

**VO: 22**

The New England Journal of Medicine has published more information on prostate cancer screening. Why is it so controversial? Approximately 28,200 American men will die of prostate cancer in 2012. Among cancers, only lung cancer kills more men in the U.S. each year. This week's issue of the New England Journal of Medicine has a follow-up evaluation of The European Randomized Study of Screening for Prostate Cancer (ERSPC), which analyzed data from 162,000 men. The ERSPC study concluded that screening reduced an individual's relative risk of prostate cancer death by 21%. Many will quickly interpret this to mean that prostate screening with the blood test known as PSA saves lives. But the paper deserves a deeper examination, as the findings are not that simple.

### **DIETARY FAT LINKED TO LOW SPERM COUNT**

**VO: 17**

Diets high in saturated fat are bad for waistlines, but they can also have a negative impact below the waist. They may lower sperm count and sperm concentration, according to a new study published in the journal Human Reproduction. Researchers from Massachusetts General Hospital, Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School collected semen samples from 99 mostly overweight or obese men and assessed their diets by asking them how often over the previous year they had certain foods and beverages. They found that eating a lot of saturated fat was associated with a lower total sperm count and concentration. Diets high in omega-3 polyunsaturated fats -- the fats commonly found in fish and plant oils -- were associated with better-quality semen, meaning the sperm cells were of a better size and shape. The study did not determine what particular kinds of saturated fats were linked to sperm count.

### **MOST EXPENSIVE CITIES TO RENT IN**

**VO: 32**

If you're looking for a cheap rent, don't move to San Francisco. According to a new study by the National Low Income Housing Coalition, that city has the highest rents in the country. The average for a two bedroom is 1,905 dollars a month. A renter would have to make at least 76-thousand a year to avoid spending a third of their pay on housing. A person making minimum wage would have to work 130 hours a week. The



Stamford-Norwalk metro area in Connecticut is next on the list. Honolulu, Hawaii rounds out the top three. The coalition prepared the study to show what it says is the lack of affordable housing for low income families.

That's the word from a new study that may explain why both species react that way. In Friday's issue of the journal *Science*, researchers propose a biological explanation for why "Not tonight, dear" may lead to "Gimme another beer." If it proves true in people, it may help scientists find new medications to fight alcoholism. In that case, we can thank thousands of frustrated flies. One by one, these eager Lotharios were put into a container with a female that had just mated. So she was really, really not interested in doing it again anytime soon. She would run away. She would kick the male. She would stick out her egg-laying organ to hold him at bay. The male flies went through three hour-long sessions of this every day for four days, enough rejection to discourage them from trying any more. After that experience, rejected flies were put in vials and given a choice of regular food or alcohol-laced food. They consistently went for the alcohol more than did the male flies that had just mated. In fact, they evidently got plastered. Some rejected males were moved to a different environment, where groups of guys mingled with receptive females. After the guys had sex, their yen for alcohol declined. The researchers also paired thousands of other male flies with dead virgin females, so that they didn't experience rejection but didn't have sex either. They still hit the sauce.

The IRS could be out of billions of dollars because of a scam using stolen identities. Officials say the crooks filed fake tax returns using social security numbers belonging to Puerto Rican citizens who don't pay federal income taxes. Because of that, they aren't likely to be on the IRS' radar. Prosecutors say in some cases, U-S mail carriers were paid to intercept refund checks. Some arrests and convictions have been made, but one U-S attorney says they haven't gotten the top players yet. So far, the convictions include mail carriers, tax preparers and check cashers. The scam has apparently been going on for years and the IRS may have sent out two billion dollars in checks.

### **TEMPORARY PROTECTED STATUS REBECA SUAREZ / HOUSTON, TEXAS PKG 2:07**

Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano has extended Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for eligible nationals of Honduras for an additional 18 months, beginning Jan. 6, 2012, and ending July 5, 2013. Current Honduran beneficiaries seeking to extend their TPS status must re-register during the 60-day re-registration period that runs from Nov. 4, 2011 through Jan. 5, 2012. U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) encourages beneficiaries to register as soon as possible when the 60-day re-registration period begins. Applications will not be accepted before Nov. 4, 2011. The 18-month extension also allows TPS re-registrants to apply for a new Employment Authorization Document (EAD). Eligible Honduran TPS beneficiaries who timely re-register will receive a new EAD with an expiration date of July 5, 2013. USCIS recognizes that all re-registrants may not receive their new EADs until after their current EADs expire. Therefore, USCIS is extending the current TPS Honduras EAD bearing a Jan. 5, 2012, expiration date for an additional six months, through July 5, 2012.

### **SUPREME COURT ON IMMIGRATION LAWS FERNANDO PIZARRO - WASHINGTON, DC PKG: 2:02**

The year 2011 started out as a tough year for immigrants, with five states enacting harsh anti-immigration legislation modeled after Arizona's SB 1070. But one by one, the key provisions of each of these laws - like the Arizona law that inspired them - have been blocked by federal judges. Now the U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to hear an appeal from Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer to the temporary stay of her state's law. The fate of SB 1070 - and possibly those of the copycat laws it inspired in Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama, Indiana and Utah -

hangs in the balance. A showdown in 2012 between Arizona and the federal government over SB 1070 may provide crucial guidance for other federal courts on newer state laws that are moving through the system. If Arizona's law is found to be unconstitutional, it could have a chilling effect on other state legislatures that were looking to follow Arizona's and Alabama's lead. But even without such a decision, conservative politicians may not be so quick to enact their own copycat laws. That's because the negative economic legacy of these laws in 2011 in states like Alabama, and the political price paid by their supporters in Arizona, could make conservative politicians think twice before enacting similar laws in the coming year.

### **GEORGIA LABOR HURT GEORGIA FARM**

A shortage of workers in the field caused \$10 million in crop losses for 500 Georgia farmers who responded to a study called for by Georgia's new immigration law. The tough laws Georgia passed last year as House Bill 87 likely scared some workers away, the study concluded. Figures released earlier this year said the total losses on more than 40,000 Georgia farms was \$74.9 million on seven major crops, and that 11,080 jobs in the fields went begging. State Agriculture Commissioner Gary W. Black said one in five farmers surveyed reported they had trouble finding enough workers in 2011, 40 percent said that the federal guest-worker program was so cumbersome, complex and slow that it was not usable, and farmers can expect more worker shortages this year. Black asked state Attorney General Sam Olens to consider whether Georgia could implement a state guest-worker program, and Owens told him it could not.

### **NEW YORK TIMES ON IMMIGRATION HOSPITALS**

Hundreds of patients have been languishing for months or even years in New York City hospitals, despite being well enough to be sent home or to nursing centers for less-expensive care, because they are illegal immigrants or lack sufficient insurance or appropriate housing. As a result, hospitals are absorbing the bill for millions of dollars in unreimbursed expenses annually while the patients, trapped in bureaucratic limbo, are sometimes deprived of services that could be provided elsewhere at a small fraction of the cost. "Many of those individuals no longer need that care, but because they have no resources and many have no family here, we, unfortunately, are caring for them in a much more expensive setting than necessary based on their clinical need," said LaRay Brown, a senior vice president for the city's Health and Hospitals Corporation.

Under state law, public hospitals are not allowed to discharge patients to shelters or to the street.

**CALIFORNIA DRIVERS ESTRATEGY

Thanks to a crop of new services, tens of thousands of California drivers have gotten their pricey speeding tickets either reduced or completely dismissed by courts. TicketBust paved the way back in 2004, when its founder, Steve Miller, realized a lot of drivers were ignoring the fine print on the back of their speeding tickets. The state offers drivers a special "Trial by Declaration" option, which means they can mail in their forms and don't have to show up in court. "Nobody in California was assisting people getting out of tickets by using the trial by written declaration so we developed the system and since then have done about 38,000 tickets," Miller says. The service costs \$249 but TicketBust guarantees customers will see their fines reduced or dismissed - or they get a complete refund.

**UNEMPLOYMENT INCREASE 325.000 IN DECEMBER  
VO: 18**

The number of people seeking unemployment benefits fell further in the final week of 2011, a positive sign for hiring one day ahead of Friday's December employment report. The Labor Department says weekly applications dropped 15,000 to a seasonally adjusted 372,000 last week. It was the fourth drop in five weeks. The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, declined to 373,250, the lowest level since June 2008. When applications drop below 375,000 -- consistently -- they generally signal that hiring is strong enough to reduce the unemployment rate. Applications have declined steadily over the past three months. The four-week average fell 11 percent in 2011, evidence that companies are laying off fewer workers. But many employers have been slow to add jobs.

**SUMMER JOBS PROGRAM  
VO: 15**

President Barack Obama is looking to boost summer job prospects for kids. The White House says that with help from the private sector it's gotten commitments for nearly 180,000 youth employment opportunities for next summer and is aiming for tens of thousands more. Obama says that with young people facing record unemployment the government must do everything it can to make sure they have opportunities to learn skills and a work ethic. The summer jobs plan is to be announced Thursday. It's the administration's latest "We Can't Wait" initiative to go around Congress. Many of the positions would be unpaid training opportunities. Republicans charged that the White House is taking credit for positions at places like CVS and Bank of America that were going to be created anyway.

## **MORTGAGE RATE**

### **VO: 20**

2012 looks to be another year of opportunity for the few who can afford to buy or refinance a home. The average rate on the 30-year fixed mortgage fell to 3.91 percent this week, Freddie Mac said Thursday. That matches the record low reached two weeks ago. The average on the 15-year fixed mortgage ticked down to 3.23 percent from 3.24 percent. That's up from 3.21 percent two weeks, also a record low. Mortgage rates are lower because they tend to track the yield on the 10-year Treasury note, which fell below 2 percent this week. They could fall even lower this year if the Fed launches another round of bond purchases, as some economists expect. Still, cheap mortgage rates have done little to boost the depressed housing market. For eight straight weeks at the end of 2011, the average fixed mortgage rates hovered around 4 percent. Yet many Americans either can't take advantage of the rates or have already done so.

## **GENERAL MOTORS RECALL**

General Motors on Thursday said that it would upgrade the steel structure and liquid cooling system that surround the battery in its Chevrolet Volt to address concerns that the car could catch fire after a severe crash. Company officials said they had shared their plans with the federal safety regulators who had been investigating the fire risks of the Volt, an electricity and gas-powered hybrid, since November and were "optimistic" the action would satisfy the government's concerns. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in a statement posted on its Web site, said the changes "should address the issue," though its investigation remained open. G.M. described the modifications as voluntary "enhancements" and stressed that neither the car nor the battery was being recalled, but that all Volt owners would be asked to take the car to a dealership, much as they would for a formal recall.

Judge Bolton heard arguments about whether she should freeze another part of the law, which prohibits day laborers from looking for work on the streets. A federal appeals court recently struck down a similar law in California. It's one of the things SB 1070 protesters objected to: the crackdown on day laborers. Jose is a day laborer. He says with the law the way it is right now, people are scared to look for work, afraid police will arrest them. Attorneys for the state defend the law. "It is a reasonable regulation of a real problem, not just immigrants. It applies to you and me, we cannot get in the street and obstruct traffic," says John Bouma, attorney for the State of Arizona.

**CALIFORNIA HOMELESS SHELTER**

A proposed ballot initiative could make harder for undocumented immigrants to be deported from California. The initiative, called the "California Opportunity and Prosperity Act." was filed last month. The law would decriminalize eligible undocumented immigrants and make deporting them a lower priority. Gas prices are continuing to move upward with a gallon of regular at \$3.38, up 8 cents from a week ago, The Energy Department said today. The weekly national average increased almost 30 cents from a year ago, and rose for the third consecutive week, adding to predictions that 2012 might be an uncomfortably expensive year for drivers across the country. Last year was a record year for gas prices but 2012 is forecasted to surpass its annual average. The real annual average for a gallon of regular gas last year hit \$3.56, up from \$2.90 in 2010, according to the EIA. Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy's senior petroleum analyst, forecasts that by Memorial Day, the national average will range between \$3.86 and \$4.13 per gallon. 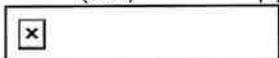

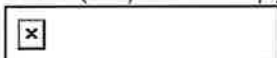

### **NEW HAMPSHIRE IMMIGRANT TUITION**

Students at New Hampshire's public colleges who are illegal immigrants would have to pay higher out-of-state tuition rates under a bill passed by the House on Wednesday. The House voted 250-88 in favor of legislation to require in-state students to prove they are also legal residents of the United States. The state would also have to establish a system to prove students are in the country legally to receive in-state tuition. The bill now goes to the Senate. In a legislative analysis written for the Republican majority on the House Education Committee, supporters of the bill said the burden would be upon the applicant to prove his or her citizenship. The rules would require the same signed affidavit and documentation process applicants use to prove state residency. Opponents, led by Democratic Rep. Mary Stuart Gile of Concord, said no one had testified during the committee's hearing on the bill to indicate this was a problem in the University System of New Hampshire. Republican Rep. Ralph Bohem, of Litchfield, disputed their logic as "faulty." "If no one checks, how would they know if there's a problem?" Bohem asked.

The State Department has revoked a company's ability to arrange visas for foreign college students to work at a Pennsylvania candy factory that packed Hershey chocolates. The students spent weeks protesting working conditions, complaining of hard labor and pay deductions for rent that left them with little money. A State Department official said Thursday the non-profit Council for Education Travel USA, known as CETUSA, lost its visa designation on Jan. 30 -- nearly six months after the workers began protesting. ## **HIGH PRICES FOR UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS IN FLORIDA MARTIN BERLANGA - MIAMI, FLORIDA**

State Rep. Reggie Fullwood remembers the girl whose face was streaked by tears of disappointment. "We had a young lady who came in to reach out to us," the Jacksonville Democrat told me. "She was born here and was raised here and had graduated from high school here [in Jacksonville]. She even had a U.S. birth certificate. "But her parents were from Nigeria, and they were undocumented, so to go to college here, she had to pay out-of-state tuition, and she couldn't afford it ... she was pretty distraught." ## **SON'S TRAGEDY INTO FIGHT TRANSPLANT ORGANS BLANCA ROSA VILCHEZ - NEW YORK**

WHEN DOCTORS told Yolany Veliz her son was brain dead after a hit-and-run car accident, she wanted to take the 16-year-old off a ventilator and donate his organs. She got unexpected grief from fellow immigrants in her Long Island neighborhood who believed myths about organ donation, like doctors selling body parts. "So many people told me not to do it," said Veliz, 38, who ignored the naysayers and let her son's organs be harvested. "But it really helps me to know that he lives on in others." Veliz, who is from Honduras and lives in Hempstead, is starting a foundation and website [oscarvelizfundation](http://oscarvelizfundation.com) - to encourage other Latin American immigrants to consider organ donation. Julia Rivera of the New York Organ Donor Network said Hispanic enrollment in the state registry of willing donors is low. "There are still a lot of misconceptions and fears," Rivera said. "We have a very high immigrant population, and unfortunately there's some confusion there."

Oklahoma announced a separate deal with the five banks. The settlement ends a painful chapter that emerged from the financial crisis, when home values sank and millions edged toward foreclosure. The number of people seeking unemployment benefits fell slightly last week to the lowest point in four years, a further sign that the U.S. job market is steadily improving. A seasonally adjusted 351,000 people sought unemployment aid, down from 353,000 the previous week, the Labor Department said Thursday. That matches the four-year low reached three weeks ago. It's the fewest since March 2008. A four-week average of claims, which smooths out weekly fluctuations in the data, also fell last week, to 354,000. That's also the lowest figure in four years. Applications have fallen steadily since October. The average has declined 14.6 percent since then. When applications drop consistently below 375,000, it usually signals that hiring is strong enough to lower the unemployment rate. Economists expect the government to report another strong month of hiring for February, similar to the average net gain of about 200,000 in the previous three months

### **TENSIONS RAISE SPECTER OF GAS AT \$5 A GALLON**

Gasoline for \$5 a gallon? The possibility is hardly far-fetched. With no clear end to tensions with Iran and Syria and rising demand from countries like China, gas prices are already at record highs for the winter months - averaging \$4.32 in California and \$3.73 a gallon nationally on Wednesday, according to AAA's Daily Fuel Gauge Report. As summer approaches, demand for gasoline rises, typically pushing prices up around 20 cents a gallon. And gas prices could rise another 50 cents a gallon or more, analysts say, if the diplomatic and economic standoff over Iran's nuclear ambitions escalates into military conflict or there is some other major supply disruption.

An appeals court has criticized the pink underwear worn by inmates in Arizona's largest county, as federal judges consider the case of a mentally ill man who mistakenly viewed officers' efforts to forcibly clothe him as an attempt at rape. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued a ruling Wednesday that questions the legal justification in one particular case for Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio's policy of dressing an inmate in pink undergarments. The court says that dressing inmate Eric Vogel in the underwear appears to be punishment without legal justification. Early on in his nearly 20-year tenure as sheriff, Arpaio won points with voters for making inmates wear pink underwear, housing them in canvas tents during Phoenix's triple-digit summer heat, and banning cigarettes.

The U.S. Postal Service said on Wednesday it would suspend a plan to close or consolidate mail processing facilities during the months leading up to the November election to alleviate concerns that voting by mail would be disrupted. The USPS, an independent agency of the U.S. government, is losing billions of dollars annually as customers switch to email and online bill payment and has been hurt by a massive payment to prefund retiree health benefits as well as other liabilities. The mail carrier's officials have warned of annual losses of more than \$18 billion by 2015. As part of a cost-cutting plan, the USPS intends to close or consolidate more than 200 mail processing sites and shutter thousands of post offices.

**"I'M GETTING ARRESTED" APP AIMS TO HELP UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS**

A group of pro-immigrant rights activists in Arizona aim to develop a smartphone application that would help immigrants notify friends, family and their attorney if they are detained and arrested during a traffic stop. Arizona was the first state to pass a law to make it a crime to be an undocumented immigrant, leading to an increased crackdown and climate of fear among immigrants. For years, the nonprofit's emergency hotline has monitored cases of possible civil rights violations against Latinos by local law enforcement, provided information about rights, and tracked down missing family members in immigration custody after undocumented drivers are detained. It was Guzman's experience with Respect/Respeto and the increased crackdown on undocumented immigrants by

local police using state laws that inspired her friend Todd Landfried, a spokesperson for Arizona Employers for Immigration Reform, to come up with an idea for a smartphone app that could do what the group does and more. The app will allow users to notify family, friends, attorneys and even their consulate when they get pulled over by law enforcement or when they are facing an emergency situation that puts their safety or civil rights at risk.

## **BANK OF AMERICA FORECLOSURE ANTONIO VALVERDE. LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA PKG 1:47**

Bank of America said Friday it would reduce by about \$100,000 the amount owed by as many as 200,000 underwater homeowners as part of the recently announced government foreclosure settlement with top mortgage servicers. BofA made the commitment as part of a \$1-billion side deal to the \$25-billion foreclosure settlement, said bank spokesman Richard Simon. The principal reductions could eliminate the entire underwater portion of some mortgages that the bank services, with the average reduction expected to be more than \$100,000, he said. By cutting the amount owed on the mortgages, Bank of America could reduce the \$3.25 billion in penalties it faces from the foreclosure settlement by \$850 million. The details of the principal-reduction agreement were first reported by the Wall Street Journal.

## **MORTGAGE SETTLEMENT VO:20**

March 9 (Reuters) - A previously announced \$25 billion settlement between five major banks accused of abusive mortgage practices and government officials will be filed in federal court on Monday, people familiar with the matter said late Friday. The pact unveiled Feb. 9 is expected to result in payments and other mortgage relief for about one million borrowers, but must first be approved by a judge. Bank of America Corp, Wells Fargo & Co, JPMorgan Chase & Co, Citigroup Inc and Ally Financial Inc agreed to the settlement after 16 months of negotiations with state attorneys general and federal agencies, including the U.S. Justice Department and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

## **OBAMA JOBS VO:20**

Raising campaign cash in Republican territory, President Barack Obama on Friday hailed a rebounding economy and accused Republicans of banking on voters having "amnesia" about the steps that led to a brutal economic collapse. Bidding for re-election, Obama bounded between a rally-style event in a sprawling Rolls-Royce manufacturing plant south of Richmond, Va., to a pair of Houston fundraisers. Framing the trip: a new monthly jobs report showing

employers 227,000 jobs in February, the latest sign that the economy is headed in the right direction. Every month's jobs report is seen as a barometer of the economy and an important factor in the presidential race. The unemployment rate held steady at 8.3 percent, the result of more Americans looking for work as job growth takes hold month by month.

The government has revamped its strategy for getting people to kick the smoking habit, and the new campaign is about to hit TV and radio air waves and billboards, magazines and newspapers. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will run ads containing graphic, eye-catching images of health problems that can come from cigarette smoking, such as heart surgery, a tracheotomy, lost limbs or paralysis. The \$54 million campaign is the largest and starkest anti-smoking push by the CDC. After aggressive anti-smoking campaigns in the past succeeded in substantially cutting back the percentage of people who smoke, the smoking rate has now stalled at about 20 percent. The CDC hopes the ads will get as many as 50,000 Americans to kick the habit.

### **SUBARU RECALL**

Subaru is recalling 275,391 Forester crossovers from the 2009-12 model years because the seat belt in the backseat's middle position may not allow secure installation of a child-safety seat, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. In the affected vehicles, which were built from Nov. 26, 2007, through March 13, 2012, the automatic locking retractor may not meet lockability requirements and may not allow proper installation of a child seat, increasing the risk of injury to a child in a crash. ### **WHITE RICE AND DIABETES**

**VO :20**

A new study, published in the British Medical Journal, shows white rice increases the risk of type two diabetes if eaten regularly. The authors of the study, from Harvard School of Public Health, wanted to determine whether the risk was dependent on the amount of rice consumed and if the Asian population was more at risk, because it tends to eat more white rice. After looking at the results from four studies--from China, Japan, the U-S and Australia, the researchers found a significant trend: the more white rice eaten, the higher the risk of type two diabetes. The authors estimated the risk of type two diabetes increased 10-percent with each increased serving of white rice. And though the risk applies to both Asian and Western cultures, scientists thought the Asian countries were at a higher risk since more rice is eaten there. The study authors recommended bigger studies and eating whole grains, which include brown rice, instead of refined carbs like white rice, in order to help slow down the global diabetes epidemic.

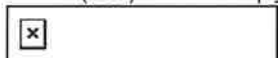

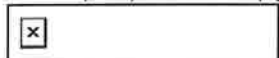
