===== **ORGANS FOR SALE /PROPOSAL (20 secs.)**

THE SHORTAGE OF DONOR ORGANS. BY FAR THE GREATEST DEMAND IS FOR KIDNEYS...MORE THAN 70-THOUSAND PEOPLE NEED ONE. BUT ONLY ABOUT 17-THOUSAND RECEIVED A DONOR KIDNEY LAST YEAR. AND MORE THAN SIX THOUSAND PEOPLE DIED WAITING. ONE PROMINENT SURGEON IS PROPOSING A CONTROVERSIAL REMEDY TO ALLOW VOLUNTEERS TO SELL ONE OF THEIR KIDNEYS.

===== **RECOMMENDED WEIGHT GAINS IN PREGNANCY (18 SECS.)**

OVERWEIGHT PREGNANT WOMEN CAN CAUSE OVERWEIGHT BABIES. A RECENT STUDY INFORMS THAT CHILDREN FROM PREGNANT WOMEN WHO INCREASE IN THEIR SUGGESTED WEIGHT DURING PREGNANCY HAVE 4 TIMES MORE PROBABILITY OF BECOMING OBESE AT THE AGE OF 3 COMPARED TO THOSE WHO COME FROM WOMEN LESS OVERWEIGHTED.

===== **FL-MYSPACE BEATING/SUSPECT RELEASE (20 sec)**

A FLORIDA TEEN IS OUT OF JAIL AND AGAIN AFTER SHE SPENT SEVERAL DAYS IN CUSTODY FOR ASSAULTING A FRIEND DURING A SLEEPOVER. IF CONVICTED, THE TEEN COULD BE BACK BEHIND BARS AND THIS TIME FOR LIFE. THE TEEN WAS CAUGHT ON TAPE HITTING ANOTHER GIRL SEVERAL TIMES AT A SLUMBER PARTY, AND SHE NOW FACES FELONY CHARGES.

===== **BRITISH SAILORS RELEASED (1 MIN)**

THE 15 BRITISH SAILORS AND MARINES HELD IN IRAN WERE FREED AFTER DAYS OF ACCUSATIONS BACK AND FORTH, AND THREATS THAT THE TROOPS WOULD BE PUT ON TRIAL. THEY WERE CAPTURED MARCH 23RD ON A CARGO SHIP THEY HAD BOARDED TO SEARCH FOR SMUGGLED GOODS NEAR THE MOUTH OF THE SHATT AL-ARAB, A WATERWAY THAT HAS LONG BEEN A DISPUTED DIVIDING LINE BETWEEN IRAQ AND IRAN. THE IRANIAN GOVERNMENT CLAIMS THEY WERE IN IRAN'S TERRITORIAL WATERS. BRITAIN SAYS THEY WERE IN IRAQI WATERS WORKING UNDER A UN MANDATE.

===== **PHILIPPINES-FLAGELLATION (18 SEC)**

THE LENT TRADITION OF RE-ENACTING JESUS' PASSION WAS HELD IN PAMPANGA, NORTH OF MANILA. SOME PLAYED THE ROLE OF THE JEWS, WHILE OTHERS CARRIED LIFE SIZE CROSSES ALONG A TRAFFIC-LINED HIGHWAY. FLAGELLATING IS ALSO A POPULAR PRACTICE, WITH THE USE OF WHIPS TIPPED WITH SHARP OBJECTS. OTHERS TIED CHAINS ON THEIR ANKLES, TO MAKE THE ORDEAL OF CARRYING THE CROSS EVEN MORE DIFFICULT. MEN WITH CLOTHS OVER THEIR FACES CARRIED CROSSES TIED ON THEIR BACKS. OTHERS LAY ON THE GROUND, EXPOSING THEIR WOUNDED BACKS.

===== GLOBAL WARMING NEW REPORT (20 SEC)

THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL PANEL ON CLIMATE CHANGE RELEASED A NEW REPORT IN WHERE IT WARNS OF WORLDWIDE CALAMITY UNLESS GOVERNMENTS WORK TOGETHER TO STEM THE RISE IN GLOBAL WARMING-- WHICH IT BLAMES MAINLY ON CARBON DIOXIDE POLLUTION CAUSED BY HUMAN BEINGS. THE WORLD IS ALREADY SEEING THE EFFECTS OF GLOBAL WARMING...FROM MELTING GLACIERS, MORE SEVERE STORMS TO STEADILY RISING TEMPERATURES. SCIENTISTS SAY IF LEFT UNCHECKED, CONDITIONS WILL GET WORSE.

===== CA-HPV VACCINE/MAN USING IT

YOU'VE PROBABLY HEARD OF WOMEN AND GIRLS GETTING THE HPV VACCINE TO PROTECT THEMSELVES FROM A VIRUS THAT CAN CAUSE CERVICAL CANCER. NOW, MEN ARE TAKING IT. THEY DON'T KNOW IF IT WILL WORK. BUT GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN IN SAN FRANCISCO ARE TAKING A VACCINE MEANT TO PREVENT CANCER IN FEMALES. GARDASIL IS THE CONTROVERSIAL VACCINE THAT PROTECTS AGAINST HPV WHICH IS THE VIRUS WHICH CAN CAUSE CERVICAL CANCER. SO GARDASIL IS BEING RECOMMENDED FOR YOUNG GIRLS. BUT GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN ARE HOPING IT WILL WARD OFF ANAL AND PENILE CANCER AS WELL BECAUSE THOSE CANCERS ARE CAUSED BY HPV TOO. ANAL CANCER IN GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN OCCURS AT A RATE 35 TIMES HIGHER THAN THAT OF THE GENERAL POPULATION. IT'S EVEN HIGHER AMONG THOSE WHO ARE HIV POSITIVE . A CLINIC RUN BY THE CITY'S HEALTH DEPARTMENT IS NOW OFFERING GARDASIL. AND SOME MEN HAVE BEEN PAYING 350 DOLLARS FOR THE STANDARD THREE DOSES. THERE'S JUST ONE CONCERN. JEFF KLAUSNER IS THE WELL KNOWN DR. K OF INTERNET FAME. HE IS ALSO IN CHARGE OF PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES IN THE CITY. HE CAN UNDERSTAND GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN TURNING TO GARDASIL, BUT URGES CAUTION. SOME DOCTORS IN SAN FRANCISCO ARE PRESCRIBING THE VACCINE ANYWAY SINCE GARDASIL IS CONSIDERED SAFE TO USE.

===== EXCERCISE HELPS MENOPAUSE (20 SECS.)

WOMEN INVOLVED IN A REGULAR EXERCISE PROGRAM REPORTED BETTER QUALITY OF LIFE DURING MENOPAUSE COMPARED WITH THOSE WHO DID NOT EXERCISE, ACCORDING TO A PENN STATE UNIVERSITY STUDY. THE 164 VOLUNTEERS WERE PRIMARILY SEDENTARY BEFORE THE FOUR-MONTH STUDY LED BY STERIANI ELAVSKY, A PENN STATE KINESIOLOGY PROFESSOR. THEY WERE DIVIDED INTO THREE GROUPS. ONE GROUP MET THREE TIMES A WEEK TO WALK FOR AN HOUR, ANOTHER GROUP GATHERED FOR 90-MINUTE YOGA SESSIONS TWICE A WEEK, AND A THIRD GROUP DIDN'T EXERCISE. RESULTS WERE PUBLISHED IN A RECENT ISSUE OF ANNALS OF BEHAVIORAL MEDICINE. MENOPAUSE, WHICH TYPICALLY OCCURS BETWEEN THE AGES OF 45 AND 55, IS WHEN A WOMAN STOPS MENSTRUATING. ROUGHLY 1.5 MILLION WOMEN REACH MENOPAUSE EACH YEAR IN THE UNITED STATES, AND 80 TO 85 PERCENT TYPICALLY EXPERIENCE SYMPTOMS SUCH AS IRRITABILITY, MOOD SWINGS, HOT FLASHES AND NIGHT SWEATS. WHILE MOOD AND OUTLOOK IMPROVED FOR THE EXERCISERS, THE STUDY FOUND MIXED RESULTS WHEN IT CAME TO THE LATTER TWO SYMPTOMS. HALF OF ALL THE WOMEN IN THE STUDY REPORTED IMPROVEMENT IN HOT FLASHES AND NIGHT SWEATS, ELAVSKY SAID, AND MOST OF THOSE WERE IN THE EXERCISE GROUPS. HOWEVER, THE STUDY DIDN'T ACCOUNT FOR WHAT STAGE OF MENOPAUSE THE WOMEN MAY HAVE BEEN EXPERIENCING, WHICH SUGGESTS SOME WOMEN'S SYMPTOMS MAY HAVE LESSENED ON THEIR OWN.

===== BLOOD CELLS HELP TREAT DIABETES PATIENTS (16 SEC)

STEM CELLS TAKEN FROM THE BLOOD OF A FEW DIABETES PATIENTS HAVE "RE-SET" THEIR IMMUNE SYSTEMS, HELPING 14 OUT OF 15 LIVE FOR MONTHS AND EVEN YEARS WITHOUT INSULIN,

RESEARCHERS REPORTED. WHILE THEY ARE NOT CLAIMING TO HAVE CURED THE PATIENTS, THEY SAID THEIR EXPERIMENT SHOWS IT MAY BE POSSIBLE TO AT LEAST INTERRUPT THE MISTAKEN IMMUNE RESPONSE THAT DESTROYS INSULIN-PRODUCING CELLS IN TYPE-1 DIABETES.

===== **CHOCOLATE BETTER THAN TEA/REDUCE BLOOD PRESSURE (16 SEC)**

FOODS RICH IN COCOA APPEAR TO REDUCE BLOOD PRESSURE BUT DRINKING GREEN AND BLACK TEA MAY NOT, ACCORDING TO AN ANALYSIS OF PREVIOUSLY PUBLISHED RESEARCH IN THE ARCHIVES OF INTERNAL MEDICINE, PUBLISHED BY THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION. THE DROP IN BLOOD PRESSURE AMONG PARTICIPANTS WHO CONSUMED COCOA PRODUCTS FOR AT LEAST TWO WEEKS WAS IN THE SAME RANGE AS ACHIEVED BY SOMEONE TAKING DRUGS COMMONLY PRESCRIBED TO CONTROL HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE. THE FALL IN BLOOD PRESSURE CREDITED TO COCOA COULD BE EXPECTED TO REDUCE THE RISK OF STROKES AND HEART ATTACKS BY 10-20 PERCENT.

===== **AFGHANISTAN-HOSTAGE VIDEO (18 sec)**

THE ITALIAN STATE BROADCASTER RAI HAS AIRED A DRAMATIC VIDEO SHOWING FORMER HOSTAGE DANIELE MASTROGIACOMO ALMOST IMMEDIATELY AFTER HIS ABDUCTION BY TALIBAN FORCES IN AFGHANISTAN LAST MONTH. IT SHOWS JOURNALIST MASTROGIACOMO AND HIS TRANSLATOR ADJMAL NAQSHBANDI SITTING ON THE GROUND BLINDFOLDED AND SURROUNDED BY GUN-CARRYING TALIBAN FIGHTERS WITH THEIR FACES COVERED. TO ONE SIDE, MASTROGIACOMO'S DRIVER SAID AGHA SITS MOTIONLESS AS A VOICE READS A DEATH SENTENCE VERDICT TO HIM IN PASHTUN .

===== **LISTERINE RE-CALL (19 sec)**

THE MAKER OF LISTERINE IS RECALLING ONE OF ITS RINSES AFTER TESTS SHOWED IT WAS CONTAMINATED WITH MICROORGANISMS. A JOHNSON AND JOHNSON SPOKESWOMAN SAYS A COMPANY UNIT IS RECALLING FOUR MILLION BOTTLES OF THE RECENTLY LAUNCHED LISTERINE AGENT COOL BLUE PLAQUE-DETECTING RINSE, MARKETED PRIMARILY FOR USE BY CHILDREN. THE RECALL AFFECTS THE GLACIER MINT AND BUBBLE BLAST FLAVORS. THE COMPANY SAYS TESTS SHOWED CONTAMINATION, DESPITE THE USE OF PRESERVATIVES.

===== **SCIENTISTS HAVE FOUND A NEW FAT GENE (16 SEC)**

ACCORDING TO NEW FINDINGS BY BRITISH SCIENTISTS, THEY CLAIM THEY HAVE FOUND A NEW FAT GENE, BUT THEY DO NOT KNOW WHAT IT DOES. THIS GENE IS CALLED F-T-O, AND RESEARCHERS SAY PEOPLE WHO HAVE TWO COPIES OF A VARIATION OF THE GENE ARE, ON AVERAGE, SEVEN POUNDS HEAVIER THAN PEOPLE WHO DON'T HAVE IT.

===== **MEXICO QUAKE (20 secs.)**

MEXICO ESCAPED WITH NO DEATHS OR WIDESPREAD STRUCTURAL DAMAGE FROM A JARRING MAGNITUDE-6 EARTHQUAKE ON FRIDAY, MEXICAN OFFICIALS SAID. AT THE QUAKE'S EPICENTRE IN ATOYAC DE ALVAREZ, WHICH IS ABOUT 60 KILOMETRES (37 MILES) NORTHWEST OF THE PACIFIC RESORT CITY OF ACAPULCO, SEVERAL HOUSES WERE SERIOUSLY DAMAGED. ONE RESIDENT AP TELEVISION SPOKE TO TOLD HOW THE BUILDING SHE WAS IN COLLAPSED. MEANWHILE, IN THE

CAPITAL, MEXICO CITY, OFFICIALS HAVE EVACUATED SEVERAL APARTMENT BUILDINGS THAT HAD POSSIBLE STRUCTURAL DAMAGE. THE STRONG QUAKE ROCKED MUCH OF SOUTHERN MEXICO EARLY ON FRIDAY, KNOCKING OUT POWER TO 20 PER CENT OF MEXICO CITY'S CENTRE, PROVOKING SCATTERED WATER AND GAS LEAKS, AND SENDING FISSURES THROUGH BUILDING FACADES, ACCORDING TO

OFFICIALS. THE QUAKE, WHICH HIT AT 12:42 LOCAL TIME (0542 GMT), WAS FELT STRONGLY FROM THE PACIFIC COAST RESORT OF ACAPULCO TO THE MOUNTAIN CAPITAL OF MEXICO CITY BECAUSE IT WAS CENTERED INLAND AND JUST 29 KILOMETRES (18 MILES) BELOW THE EARTH'S SURFACE, THE US GEOLOGICAL SURVEY SAID. MANY OF MEXICO'S EARTHQUAKES ARE CENTERED OUT IN THE PACIFIC.

===== CRYOTHERAPY (15 SECS.)

EVEN WHEN THE FRO THERAPY (ALSO KNOWN AS CRIOTHERAPY) IS NOT NEW, IT IS USED CLINICALLY TO REMOVE PATHOLOGICAL TISSUES AND CANCEROUS CELLS FROM HUMAN BODY. THIS CONSISTS IN SUPPORTING A TEMPERATURE OF 256 DEGRESS BELOW ZERO DURING A FEW MINUTES TO IMPROVE THE INMUNOLOGICAL SYSTEM. THIS TECHNIQUE HAS BECOME VERY POPULAR IN SPAIN.

===== VA-UNIVERSITY SHOOTING

A GUNMAN OPENED FIRE IN A DORM AND CLASSROOM AT VIRGINIA TECH ON MONDAY, KILLING AT LEAST 30 PEOPLE IN THE DEADLIEST SHOOTING RAMPAGE IN U.S. HISTORY, GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS TOLD THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. THE GUNMAN WAS KILLED, BRINGING TO DEATH TOLL TO 31.

===== VA TECH SHOOTING-SUSPECT IDENTITY RELEASED (30 SEC)

THE GUNMAN SUSPECTED OF CARRYING OUT THE VIRGINIA TECH MASSACRE THAT LEFT 33 PEOPLE DEAD CHO SEUNG-HU WAS AN ENGLISH MAJOR WHOSE CREATIVE WRITING WAS SO DISTURBING HE WAS REFERRED TO THE SCHOOL'S COUNSELING SERVICE. A PORTRAIT BEGINS TO EMERGE OF THE SOUTH KOREAN IMMIGRANT: A 23-YEAR-OLD MAN ON MEDICATION FOR DEPRESSION WHO WAS BECOMING INCREASINGLY ERRATIC, AND LEFT A NOTE RAILING AGAINST "RICH KIDS," "DEBAUCHERY" AND "DECEITFUL CHARLATANS.

===== OMEGA-3 FATTY ACID SLOWS ALZHEIMER'S (21 SEC)

A RECENT STUDY REVEALS AN OMEGA-3 FATTY ACID PRESENT IN FISH, EGGS, ORGAN MEATS, MICRO-ALGAE, FORTIFIED FOODS AND CERTAIN NUTRITIONAL SUPPLEMENTS COULD DELAY THE ONSET OF ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE WHEN CONSUMED AS PART OF A NORMAL DIET. AFTER CONDUCTING RESEARCH ON GENETICALLY-ALTERED RODENTS, RESEARCHERS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, IRVINE, FOUND A SPECIFIC TYPE OF OMEGA-3 FATTY ACID CALLED DOCOSAHEXAENOIC ACID (DHA) EFFECTIVELY SLOWS THE PROGRESSION OF THE BRAIN TANGLES ASSOCIATED WITH ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE.

===== VIRGINIA TECH KILLER VIDEO REVEALED (50 SEC)

VIRGINIA TECH STUDENTS REACTED WITH DISGUST, ANGER, SHOCK AND FEAR TO THE PARANOID MULTIMEDIA MANIFESTO THAT STUDENT GUNMAN CHO SEUNG-HUI MAILED THE MORNING OF HIS MONDAY KILLING SPREE. NBC NEWS ANNOUNCED WEDNESDAY NIGHT THAT IT HAD RECEIVED A PACKAGE FROM CHO CONTAINING PHOTOS, 27 VIDEOS AND AN 1,800-WORD DIATRIBE. THE PACKAGE WAS MAILED AFTER TWO PEOPLE WERE KILLED AT A DORMITORY EARLY MONDAY AND BEFORE CHO ENTERED THE UNIVERSITY'S NORRIS HALL AND EXACTED THE WORST MASS SHOOTING BY A LONE

GUNMAN IN U.S. HISTORY. CHO DISCUSSES RELIGION, PAINTS HIMSELF AS A PERSECUTED MARTYR AND RAILS AGAINST UNNAMED ENEMIES IN SOME OF THE 27 VIDEOS HE MAILED TO THE NETWORK. THE PACKAGE ALSO CONTAINED SEVERAL PHOTOS OF CHO POINTING GUNS, A HAMMER AND A KNIFE AT THE CAMERA, OTHERS IN WHICH HE HOLDS A GUN TO HIS HEAD AND A KNIFE TO HIS THROAT AND A FEW IN WHICH HE LOOKS LIKE AN ORDINARY COLLEGE STUDENT.

 ===== **NASA - EVACUATION IN BUILDING (40 SEC)**

PERSONNEL AT JOHNSON SPACE CENTER WERE EVACUATED AFTER REPORTS CAME IN ABOUT A GUNMAN INSIDE BUILDING 44. HOUSTON POLICE AND SECURITY OFFICIALS FROM NASA ARE SECURING THE CAMPUS. THE GUNMAN HAS BOARDED HIMSELF ON THE SECOND FLOOR OF THE ENGINEERING/COMMUNICATIONS BUILDING. THE GUNMAN THEN KILLED A HOSTAGE AND COMMITTED SUICIDE.

 ===== **FIDEL CASTRO REAPPEARS (16 secs.)**

HAVANA (AP) -- FIDEL CASTRO IS REPORTEDLY DOING BUSINESS AGAIN. CUBA'S OFFICIAL MEDIA REPORT CASTRO HAS MET WITH THE HEAD OF A VISITING DELEGATION OF COMMUNISTS FROM CHINA. THERE ARE NO NEW VIDEOS OR PHOTOS, BUT IT'S THE LATEST IN A STRING OF INCREASINGLY POSITIVE REPORTS ABOUT THE CUBAN LEADER'S RECOVERY FROM AN APPARENTLY VERY SERIOUS ILLNESS AND SURGERY LAST SUMMER. CUBA'S NEWS AGENCY REPORTS SEPARATE MEETINGS BY THE DELEGATION CHIEF WITH BOTH CASTRO AND HIS YOUNGER BROTHER RAUL, WHO HAS BEEN FILLING IN SINCE JULY. FIDEL CASTRO'S CONDITION AND EXACT AILMENT ARE STATE SECRETS, BUT HE'S BELIEVED BY MANY TO SUFFER FROM A DISEASE WHICH CAN CAUSE INFLAMMATION AND BLEEDING IN THE COLON. THE 80-YEAR-OLD CASTRO HAS NOT BEEN SEEN IN PUBLIC SINCE BEFORE JULY 31ST, WHEN HE ANNOUNCED HE HAD UNDERGONE SURGERY AND WAS PROVISIONALLY CEDING POWER TO HIS BROTHER.

 ===== **HANDCUFFS FOR KIDS?**

Authorities say Cho Seung-Hui had been taken to a psychiatric hospital in 2005. Officials say Cho was put under psychiatric evaluation after an acquaintance reported he might have been suicidal. A magistrate ruled that Cho might be a danger to himself or others. It's unclear how long Cho remained at the facility, though documents indicate that he was free to go a day after he was ordered to be evaluated. Earlier in the day, authorities disclosed that more than a year before the massacre, Cho was accused of sending unwanted messages to two women and was taken to a psychiatric hospital on a magistrate's orders and was pronounced a danger to himself. But he was released with orders to undergo outpatient treatment. The disclosure added to the rapidly growing list of warning signs that appeared well before the student opened fire. Among other things, Cho's twisted, violence-filled writings and sullen, vacant-eyed demeanor had disturbed professors and students so much that he was removed from one English class and was repeatedly urged to get counseling.

**MINNESOTA ALERT

A bomb threat has prompted the evacuation of seven buildings at the University of Minnesota's Minneapolis campus. The university says a professor found a note that included a bomb threat against several campus buildings. All classes and meetings in the evacuated buildings were canceled for the day. Yesterday, campus threats forced lock-downs and evacuations at universities, high schools and middle schools in at least ten states -- a day after the Virginia Tech shootings.

**FIRES DESTROY GEORGIA HOMES
VO: 21**

A swift wildfire destroyed 14 houses Wednesday in southeastern Georgia, where more than 1,000 people had been forced from their homes earlier in the week, officials said. No injuries were reported.

The blaze, which had burned about 40 square miles, or 25,000 acres, ignited Monday near Waycross when a tree fell on a power line, then raced through tinder-dry forest to the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, one of the nation's best-preserved wetland areas, officials said. Many of those evacuated from the area went to a shelter or moved in with relatives, officials said. Classes at Waycross schools were canceled after buses were unable to run on some routes because of smoky conditions.

With a backlash developing against the media for airing sickening pictures from Virginia Tech shooter Cho Seung-Hui, Fox News Channel said Thursday it would stop and other networks said they would severely limit their use. NBC News was the recipient Wednesday of Cho's package of rambling, hate-filled video and written messages, with several pictures of him posing with a gun. Contents began airing on "Nightly News," and its rivals quickly used them, too. Family members of victims canceled plans to appear on NBC's "Today" show Thursday because they "were very upset" with the network for showing the pictures. Virginia State Police Col. Steve Flaherty said he was disappointed with what the network showed. Meanwhile, university officials also announced that Cho's 32 victims would be awarded degrees posthumously, and that other students terrorized by the shootings might be allowed to end the semester immediately without consequences.

**CA YUBA CITY LOCKDOWN

Scores of schools across the country shut down or evacuated students Thursday and at least a dozen people were arrested or under investigation as the wave of campus threats that started soon after the Virginia Tech shootings spread in the time it takes to make a phone call or post a message on the Internet. A 12,000-student school district in Yuba City, Calif., about 35 miles north of Sacramento, was locked down Thursday as authorities searched for a man they say threatened to dwarf the Virginia Tech attacks, in which gunman Cho Seung-Hui killed 32 people and himself. Police said they arrested a former Kalamazoo Valley, Mich., community college student who posted Internet messages praising the Virginia Tech shooting. Officials closed the college's two campuses through the weekend.

In St. Augustine, Fla., a 14-year-old high school student was charged with threatening in an e-mail between friends to top the Virginia Tech massacre by killing 100 people, a sheriff's spokesman said.

**MIAMI AIRPORT DRUG BUST

Miami International Airport was the hub of a cocaine and heroin trafficking ring that used cargo workers to smuggle drugs, federal authorities said Thursday in announcing an indictment charging 29 people. The 12 airport employees worked for various cargo airlines that operate internationally and were not employees of the airport itself. But the smuggling operation that began in 2002 raised questions about how easily terrorists or other criminals could use similar means.

His job in jeopardy, Attorney General Alberto Gonzales insisted Thursday he played only a minor role in the dismissal of eight federal prosecutors. Skeptical senators reacted with disbelief. In a long turn in the witness chair, Gonzales said that despite initial administration claims that the prosecutors had been fired for inadequate performance, he approved their dismissals without looking at their job evaluations. Offering an apology to the eight and their families for their treatment, he said he had "never sought to mislead or deceive the Congress or the American people" on that or any other matter. Gonzales sat alone at the witness table in a crowded hearing room for the widely anticipated hearing.

Federal authorities said Wednesday that 22 people have been charged with participating in a conspiracy to make false identification documents. The bogus documents include driver's licenses from various states; immigration papers such as Resident Alien Cards, commonly referred to as Green Cards; and other government-issued documents, authorities said at a news conference. The ring produces as many as 15,000 fake identification papers annually and generates millions of dollars in illegal proceeds, U.S. Attorney Patrick Fitzgerald said. Officials said 12 of the defendants were arrested Tuesday in Chicago. Ten others are fugitives, including four believed to be in Mexico, officials said. According to the complaint affidavit, the fraudulent document organization originated in Mexico and also is thought to be active in Los Angeles and Denver.

IRAQ VOTE

The vote was defiant, narrow and mainly along partisan lines. The House has approved a 124 (b) billion dollar Iraq spending bill that would order President Bush to start pulling troops out of Iraq by October first. The measure was approved 218 to 208. Two Republican congressman Wayne Gilchrest of Maryland and Walter Jones of North Carolina -- joined 216 Democrats in voting "yes." Thirteen Democrats voted against the bill, siding with 195 Republicans. Passage came just hours after the top U-S military commander in Iraq told lawmakers that there are signs of progress there, though violence continues to grip the country. The Senate is expected to take up the measure and approve it this week. But President Bush has promised to veto the legislation as soon as it reaches his desk.

U.S. HOUSING SLUMP HITS HOME

With U.S. home building in the dumps, a lot of immigrants are working sporadically and sending little money to their native countries. Remittances are the financial lifeblood for millions of hispanic families and a crucial source of foreign exchange for their governments. After increasing an average of just over 23% a year since 2000, remittances for the first two months of 2007 were just 5.5% ahead of the same period last year, according to Mexico's central bank. The figure peaked in May at \$2.3 billion and has drifted downward ever since. Analysts say tougher border enforcement and workplace crackdowns by U.S. immigration authorities may be playing a role.

It's a march many immigration activists were not happy about making. They hoped there would be immigration reform by now. Instead, an estimated 150,000 protesters, including hundreds from Lake County, marched through downtown Chicago Tuesday and to a rally at Grant Park to again call attention to the issue. People gather for a rally at Union Park in Chicago before the start of an immigration rights march. They carried with them American, Polish, Russian, Irish and Mexican flags, but also disappointment that the Democratic-controlled Congress voted into office last November has not approved legislation sympathetic to their cause.

The so-called May Day rally and march, the second in as many years, began at Seattle Center's Fisher Pavilion at 3 p.m. Organizers were anticipating a crowd of up to 10,000 but it appeared smaller -- about 5,000, by some estimates. Last year's demonstration was considerably bigger, with crowd estimates varying greatly but some as high as 65,000. Among the first speakers at the rally preceding the march was Jorge Quiroga, president of Comite por Amnistia General & Justicia Social, a Seattle-based network of community groups that support immigrants' rights. The network organized today's events.

**DALLAS RALLY

Some protesters chanted, "no human being is illegal" during marches Tuesday in Texas to push for immigration reform. Events were scheduled in Dallas, Houston, Austin and El Paso. . The demonstrators, many with children in tow, carried signs calling for an end to the raids and urging an "America for All." Some protesters in Dallas focused on an ordinance before voters in nearby Farmers Branch that would make it illegal for landlords to rent apartments to illegal immigrants.

**BOSTON RALLY

Several hundred people gathered in Central Square in East Boston on Tuesday to ask the government America to reform its immigration policies. Across the nation, thousands of people took to the streets demanding a better path to citizenship for an estimated 12 million illegal immigrants.

**PHOENIX RALLY

Thousands of demonstrators waving U.S. flags marched through the streets of Phoenix Tuesday demanding immigration reform. The march re-electrified debate about President Bush's proposal to grant legal status and eventual citizenship to millions of illegal immigrants living in the United States. Phoenix Police Detective Stacie Derge estimated the size of the crowd at 15,000 to 20,000, which seemed conservative for a group of people that stretched for more than a mile along Grand and Washington avenues.

News images showed police hitting a television cameraman to the ground, shoving people who were walking away from officers and injuries from the rubber bullets, including a Hispanic man with welts on his abdomen and back. Lines of officers moved through the park firing the rubber rounds. Rally organizers denounced the police action as brutal.

Governor Richardson believes a comprehensive investigation should be handled by the US Justice Department, not the LAPD.

The previous record was \$3.03 per gallon on Aug. 11, 2006. But despite inventory fears that have sent prices higher, there are signs that the rising prices at the pump may be peaking. Just two weeks ago, the U.S. average for a gallon of regular gas was \$2.87, but the Lundberg Survey of 7,000 stations nationwide on Friday showed an increase of about 19.5 cents to \$3.07. That's up 88.4 cents since Jan. 19, Lundberg said. The nationwide average for midgrade gasoline was \$3.18 and premium was \$3.28.

Some of America's lowest-paid workers will get a pay raise this summer. Congress has approved the first increase in the federal minimum wage in almost a decade. Workers who now make five-dollars-15-cents an hour will get a two-dollar-ten cents raise. But it won't come all at once. They'll see a 70-cent raise by the end of the summer. Another 70 cents will be added next year, and by summer 2009,

all minimum-wage jobs will pay no less than seven-dollars-25-cents an hour. A boost in the minimum wage has been held hostage for years by a partisan standoff. But Democrats attached the provision to the 120 (b) billion dollars Iraq war spending bill. President Bush is expected to sign the legislation tomorrow.

The Colorado State University hurricane research team renewed its forecast for an "above average" 2007 Atlantic storm season Thursday and predicted 17 tropical storms, with nine growing to hurricane strength. Of those, five would grow into major hurricanes of Category 3 or higher with winds over 110 mph, the team founded by forecast pioneer William Gray said in its revised forecast. The updated forecast issued on Thursday was unchanged from the team's April 3 forecast for the six-month storm season that starts on Friday. The researchers said there was a 74 percent chance that at least one major hurricane would hit the U.S. coastline in 2007, with a 50 percent chance that would happen on the U.S. Atlantic Coast and a 49 percent chance on the Gulf of Mexico coast. Nevertheless, 44 percent of people who live within 30 miles of the shore in 18 Atlantic and Gulf Coast states say they feel "not too" vulnerable or "not at all" vulnerable to a hurricane or to related tornadoes and flooding.

The Los Angeles Police Department's landmark Special Order 40, which prohibits officers from inquiring about the immigration status of suspects, has come under an aggressive assault by anti-illegal immigrant activists who argue that it ties the hands of police. The nearly 30-year-old policy has long been controversial, but the current national debate about illegal immigration has prompted lawsuits that are aimed at overturning Special Order 40 and similar rules across the country. Los Angeles was the first major city to enact the "don't ask, don't tell" policy on illegal immigration, though most other police agencies have followed suit. So the outcome of the legal challenges could have a widespread effect. The latest challenge would come this week, with a lawsuit that would ask a judge to require that the LAPD inform federal immigration officials when illegal immigrants are arrested on drug charges.

N-B-C says Virginia Tech gunman Cho Seung-Hui mailed a package to its headquarters that arrived today. It's said to contain a rambling and often-incoherent, 18-hundred-word "video manifesto" on C-D, plus 43 photos, eleven showing him aiming handguns at the camera. Cho Seung-Hui said in one excerpt aired on N-B-C Nightly News, "You had a hundred billion chances and ways to avoid today." He also ranted about rich "brats" and their "hedonistic needs." N-B-C says the package was received in this morning's mail. It was apparently sent between the first and second shootings Monday that left 32 people dead. As part of the investigation, authorities say Cho Seung-Hui had been taken to a psychiatric hospital in 2005. Officials say Cho was put under psychiatric evaluation after an acquaintance reported he might have been suicidal. A magistrate ruled that Cho might be a danger to himself or others. It's unclear how long Cho remained at the facility, though documents indicate that he was free to go a day after he was ordered to be evaluated.
