**CALIFORNIA DROUGHT IS WORSENER BY GLOBAL WARMING, SCIENTISTS SAY

The severe California drought that has led the state to order cutbacks in water use may not have been set off by climate change, scientists say, but global warming is making the situation worse. "The drought is made of two components: not enough rain and too much heat," said Michael Oppenheimer, a climate scientist at Princeton. "The rain deficit isn't clearly connected to climate change, but the planetary warming has made it more likely that the weather would be hotter in California." Warmer temperatures worsen drought by causing more evaporation from reservoirs, rivers and soil. Scientists say that the warming trend makes it highly likely that California and other parts of the Western United States will have more severe droughts in the future.

MCDONALD'S RAISING AVERAGE WORKER WAGE TO ABOUT \$10 AN HOUR

McDonald's Corp (MCD.N) plans to raise the average pay of about 90,000 U.S. workers to around \$10 an hour, but the increase will not benefit workers at the vast majority of the restaurants, because they are operated by franchisees, which make their own wage decisions. SAN FRANCISCO POLICE CHIEF SAYS HE DOES NOT WANT RACIST OFFICERS

SF Chief Greg Suhr called Friday for seven more officers who allegedly exchanged racist and homophobic text messages to be fired. Suhr's recommendation followed a revelation that at least 14 officers and department employees had been messaging each other with racist and homophobic comments and jokes about citizens and coworkers. The texts were exposed in a court filing during the trial of former SFPD Officer Ian Furminger, who was convicted and sentenced to 41 months in prison for corruption pending an appeal. The seven officers have been suspended, and an eighth has already resigned. The group exchanged messages "of such extreme bias" that they can no longer serve, Suhr concluded. Their cases have been forwarded to the police commission with the recommendation they be fired. Two other officers exchanged single text messages that violated department policy, but Suhr said he would let the commission hear their explanation before recommending any discipline. They have been moved to desk jobs.

STUDY LATINO TODDLERS AND LANGUAGE COMPREHENSION

Synopsis:

The UC Berkeley study found that four-fifths of the nation's Mexican American toddlers lagged three to five months behind whites in pre literacy skills, oral language and familiarity with print materials. Although earlier studies have shown that Latino children are raised with emotional warmth and develop social skills on par with others when they enter kindergarten, the new research found they are not receiving sufficient language and literacy skills at home, said Bruce Fuller, a UC Berkeley professor of education and public policy and co-author of the study. Mothers of toddlers who fell behind were more likely to be foreign-born, low-income and less educated. They were also less likely to read to their children daily or give them as much praise and encouragement as those whose children kept pace with white peers. The study found, for instance, that only 18% of Mexican American mothers who spoke Spanish at home read to their children daily, compared with 59% of white mothers. Among Mexican American mothers who spoke English at home, 28% read daily. In addition, other research has found that parents with more education limit television, ask their children more questions, give them more opportunities to articulate their feelings and have them show off their skills -- counting to 10 for grandma, for instance. Latino mothers also have been found to issue more commands -- set the table, turn off the TV -- which may stem from the need to maintain order in larger families, Fuller said. And Latino mothers tend to believe that children should wait for kindergarten to learn to read, compared with white mothers who see age 2 as the appropriate age for such learning, according to a UCLA study. Fuller said that difference may stem from the traditional Mexican respect for teachers.

RACIALLY CHARGED EMAILS RENEW CONCERNS ABOUT SOCIAL SITUATION IN FERGUSON MISSOURI

Officials in Ferguson, Missouri, have released the full content of racially charged and religiously insensitive emails, including about President Barack Obama, sent between the city's former court clerk and two ex-police supervisors. The St. Louis suburb was torn by months of unrest following the fatal shooting of an unarmed black teenager by a white police officer. The emails, although dating back years before the shooting, were among evidence presented by the Justice Department in a report in March that concluded that racism pervaded the Ferguson Police Department. The emails were released to the Washington Post late on Thursday in response to a public-records request. They were sent and received by Mary Ann Twitty, who was Ferguson's court clerk, as well as former Ferguson police Captain Rick Henke and former police Sergeant William Mudd. All three were removed from their jobs after the Department of Justice discovered the emails, which prompted an investigation by city officials. The three have made no comment since leaving their jobs. The emails were sent between 2008 and 2011 and are mainly emails forwards containing insensitive and offensive jokes. Ferguson Mayor James Knowles condemned the emails when the Justice Department report was released.

PLUMBER ADMITTED ILLEGAL WORK ON GAS PIPE THAT TRIGGERED TRAGEDY EXPLOSION IN NEW YORK

A plumber who worked at the East Village building where two people died in an explosion last month has admitted to illegally tapping into a gas line there - but said the landlord's son ordered him to do it. Authorities haven't decided whether to cut a deal with the worker in exchange for his testimony or use his statement against him, the official investigation is still in its preliminary stage, with probes trying to recover evidence from the rubble. Investigators suspect an illegal hookup in the building was removed from a gas line ahead of a Con Ed inspection on the day of the explosion, and then reinstalled before the devastating blast about 30 minutes later. The building's landlord has been identified as Maria Hrynenko, who inherited it and

several others from her late husband, Michael Sr. The husband ran the East Village's iconic 24-hour Kiev diner before his death in 2004.

FDA APPROVES VYVANSE FOR BINGE-EATING DISORDER

Synopsis:

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration on Friday approved Shire Plc's stimulant Vyvanse to treat binge-eating disorder, the first product to be approved for the condition. Vyvanse, which is currently approved to treat attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, generated sales of more than \$1 billion in the first nine months of last year. Binge-eating disorder, characterized by repeated episodes of uncontrolled eating, accompanied by guilt and shame, affects roughly 2.8 million people in the United States, according to Shire. Vyvanse is an amphetamine which, like other amphetamines, carries the potential for abuse and addiction. They also have been associated with increase blood pressure and heart rate, sudden death, stroke, heart attack, insomnia and psychiatric side effects such as hallucinations and mania. The drug is not approved for weight loss.

WALGREENS TO CLOSE 200 U.S. STORES

Synopsis:

Drugstore chain Walgreens Boots Alliance will close 200 stores as part of a plan to cut \$1.5 billion in expenses over the next three years. The store closures are part of a plan Walgreens first unveiled in August, when it said it was looking to cut costs, primarily in the company's U.S. retail pharmacy division. Walgreens now sees an opportunity to trim \$1.5 billion in expenses, \$500 million more than what the company expected last summer. Walgreens operated 8,330 stores in the U.S., Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands as of the end of November, so the store closures are fairly minimal. Walgreens is closing some U.S. stores at a time when the company is reporting stronger results for its domestic retail pharmacy business.

The issue of aggressive enforcement of traffic violations by police officers and the imposition by courts of substantial financial penalties for late payment has attracted widespread attention recently as state, county and municipal governments across the nation have increased fines, in some cases significantly, to offset budget shortfalls caused by the financial crisis.

TORNADIC FURY IN CENTRAL ILLINOIS LEAVES DEATH AND DESTRUCTION

Bruce Rauner said Friday, and identified by the county coroner's office as 69-year-old Jacklyn Klosa. The two women lived next door to each other. GARIFUNA IMMIGRANTS IN NY

Synopsis:

Garifuna churches of New York City have been assisting numerous Garifuna immigrants who have arrived since June. To date, they have assisted about 140 families, helping them with food, clothing, legal assistance and travel fare to legal and medical appointments. The Garifuna, descendants of African and indigenous Arawak people from the Caribbean, are mostly concentrated along the northern coast of Honduras, with others in Belize, New York City and other U.S. urban centers. Last spring, large numbers of Garifuna immigrated to the U.S. from Honduras to escape discrimination, urban gang violence and poverty and to find work and a more stable life. Many of the immigrants, which included some unaccompanied children and youth, came to New York City to stay with Garifuna family and friends already living there. When many of the mothers first went to immigration court, they were given tracking devices to wear on their ankles. Until the devices were removed, the women were unable to legally work and had to charge the devices every three hours.

SKYROCKETING WEST NILE VIRUS IN CALIFORNIA

California's drought isn't bad news for everyone as it turns out West Nile Virus has been thriving in the state's parched climate. The California Department of Public Health announced last week that in 2014 it recorded the most cases of the potentially deadly mosquito-borne illness since it first showed up in the Golden State more than a decade ago. With water sources continuing to shrink and warmer temperatures increasing the length of mosquito season, Californians shouldn't expect this West Nile activity to go away any time soon, especially down south. Most of the cases have shown up in the dry Central Valley and in Southern California.

BORDER PATROL AGENTS ABUSE IMMIGRANTS

Border patrol agents have used firearms and other weapons less frequently in recent months on the often-violent Southwest border after implementation of guidelines aimed at curbing abuses. The agency had logged 385 use-of-force reports since Oct. 1, the start of the federal fiscal year, which he said was nearly 30% less than a year ago. Although the rate is still about two a day, it marks a potential turning point for the long-troubled Border Patrol. The force has faced growing criticism for agents shooting unarmed people, sometimes across the border in Mexico, usually in response to rocks being thrown. Few agents have faced prosecution or other apparent accountability, even in shooting deaths. After reviewing internal files on 67 deadly force cases, a group of police experts in 2013 criticized the Border Patrol for weak internal investigations and for use-of-force guidelines that gave agents far more latitude than is allowed at most U.S. law enforcement agencies. The report suggested a pattern of abuse and little public accountability. It said agents at times fired in frustration rather than when they faced a serious threat from people trying to smuggle contraband or sneak across the border.

DETAINED MOTHERS TO RESTART HUNGER STRIKE

The detainees' Mother located at the Karnes detention center are expected to Restart Hunger Strike and Work Stoppage. If Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials do not meet the demands of mothers in the Karnes family detention center, they have pledged to restart the hunger strike and work stoppage they initiated during Holy Week to protest their and their children's mistreatment and unjust detention. That week, 80 mothers refused to work or eat to bring attention to their imprisonment and demand their immediate release. In response, authorities at the privately run facility, placed mothers, like Kenia Galeano who will join the call, in isolation. The Administration's policy of detaining asylum seeking mothers and children as part of a deterrence strategy has also come under fire in the courts recently with a class action lawsuit filed by the ACLU and the immigration clinic at the University of Texas law school. In solidarity with the women inside Karnes, supporters will deliver 4,000 signatures on a petition to ICE Director Sarah Saldaña at the ICE Headquarters in DC requesting their immediate release.

PROTEST AGAINST POLICE BRUTALITY

At least a dozen people were arrested on Tuesday when demonstrators angered by fresh cases of U.S. police violence against unarmed black men marched across New York's Brooklyn Bridge, hoping to invigorate a national discussion on the issue. Some 250 placard-bearing activists organized by the Stop Mass Incarceration Network marched from Union Square to protest the latest incidents of violent police tactics used against minorities. At least 12 people, some of whom appeared to be school-aged, were arrested following a brief scuffle with police after they crossed the bridge. Galvanizing their cause was the April 4 fatal shooting of Walter Scott, an unarmed black man shot in the back by a white police officer in North Charleston, South Carolina. The shooting was captured on video, and the officer has been charged with murder. Family members of several unarmed black or Hispanic men or boys who died in encounters with police called for more oversight.

After decades of relentless decline the push by the unions for a higher minimum wage is gaining currency. And their use of social media to rally their troops and to court public opinion is working. Meanwhile, non-union retailer Walmart was being targeted by a similar effort, called "OUR Walmart", backed by the 1.3m-member United Food and Commercial Workers union. The big pay-off for the campaigners came in February, when Walmart said it would spend \$1bn to lift its minimum wage to \$9 this year, benefiting about half a million of its workers. owned restaurants, The move, however, did not affect workers at the 90 per cent of its outlets that are owned by franchise holders.

STREET HARASSMENT IS A NATIONAL EPIDEMIC

This week marks International Anti-Street Harassment Week and new data from Hollaback and Cornell University reveals new research on street harassment in the US. The data shows that 85% of US women surveyed report experiencing street harassment before the age of 17, and 67% of women report experiencing it before age 14. Other notable statistics from the study included: 77% of US women under 40 report being followed by a man or group of men in a way that made them feel unsafe in the past year; 57% of US Women Under 40 Feel Distracted at School or Work due to Street Harassment Half of US women have been groped or fondled over the past year. Over half of respondents noted that they changed their clothing, refused a social event, chose a different transportation option, or felt distracted at school/work due to harassment; over a third of respondents noted that they were late to schools or work due to street harassment, which could have major economic effects on both business performance and on personal finance; and only 3% of US women under 40 reported finding street harassment flattering.

USE OF E-CIGARETTES TRIPLES AMONG U.S. TEENS

It is a trend that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention calls "alarming." E-cigarettes are now the most popular tobacco product among teens. High school students show the most dramatic change. From 2011 to 2014, e-cigarette use leaped from 1.5 percent to 13.4 percent, while cigarette use declined from 16 to 9 percent. A national survey confirms earlier indications that e-cigarettes are now more popular among teenage students than traditional cigarettes and other forms of tobacco, federal

health officials reported Thursday. The findings prompted strong warnings from Dr. Tom Frieden head of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about the effects of any form of nicotine on young people. The statistical findings, published in this week's issue of Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, come from the CDC's National Youth Tobacco Survey. The latest survey found that the use of e-cigarettes increased from 1.1 percent in 2013 to 3.9 percent in 2014 among middle school students, and from 4.5 percent to 13.4 percent among high school students. The Bill would make it a discriminatory practice to request or use the consumer credit history of applicants or employees by amending the City's Human Rights Law. Except as provided in this subdivision, it shall be an unlawful discriminatory practice for an employer, labor organization, employment agency or agent thereof to request or to use for employment purposes the consumer credit history of an applicant for employment or employee, or otherwise discriminate against an applicant or employee with regard to hiring compensation or the terms, conditions or privileges of employment based on the consumer history of the applicant or employee. Certain types of positions are exempted from the consumer credit history ban. For example, the ban will not apply to positions in law enforcement, positions requiring bonding under federal, state or local law or requiring a security clearance, positions requiring employers to consider credit history under federal or state law, positions allowing an employee to modify digital security systems designed to prevent unauthorized use of the employer's or client's networks or databases, and non-clerical positions with regular access to trade secrets, intelligence information or national security information.

FIREFIGHTERS BATTLE AGAINST CALIFORNIA WILDFIRES

MISTAKEN IDENTITY- DNA TESTS NEGATIVE ON MISSING GIRL

A 14-year-old Mexican girl, who was dragged screaming from her secondary school by federal agents last week and flown to Houston to be with a woman who claimed to be her mother, is being repatriated to Mexico on Wednesday. The repatriation of Alondra Luna follows DNA tests showing that she is not the daughter of Dorotea Garcia, who had obtained a judge's order to get her forcibly brought to Houston. The moment when federal agents seized Alondra in the central city of Guanajuato last Thursday was captured in a shocking video in which the girl is seen screaming and struggling as she is forced into a waiting vehicle. Núñez said she had never heard of Garcia's claim on her daughter until then. Home rental prices are soaring in San Francisco, while pockets of the Midwest and South are also posting big annual increases. Prices nationally climbed a seasonally-adjusted 3.7 percent in March from 12 months earlier, real estate data firm Zillow said Wednesday. The influx of tech money fueled San Francisco rents up 14.8 percent, while nearby San Jose jumped 12.3 percent. Rents average more than \$3,000 a month in these areas. That's roughly \$600 more than rent in the Los Angeles area, \$800 more than metro New York City, and \$1,000 more than the Washington, D.C. area. Prices are also climbing in cities without the same hype from startups and venture capital. Rents rose more than 8.5 percent over the past year in Denver, Louisville, Kansas City and Nashville, among other metro areas. In many cases, demand for apartments and rentals have outstripped the available supply of rental homes and apartments, causing prices to rise.

Manuel was detained on November of 2014 as we was driving home, only two weeks after his second daughter was born. He was sent to Dodge County Detention Center Facility in Wisconsin where he has been detained for close to six months now. Manuel has two misdemeanors involving possession but these still don't place him in priority for removal under the memorandum issued by Secretary Jeh Johnson in November of 2015. The memorandum, entitled "Policies for Apprehension, Detention and Removal of Undocumented Immigrants" announced three priorities of removal, Manuel doesn't fall under any of

them and his misdemeanors cannot be considered "significant". Aside from this, he also qualifies for the DAPA program that is currently under injunction.

Police with riot shields hurled tear gas canisters and fired pepper balls at nearly 200 protesters Tuesday night to enforce a citywide curfew that was imposed after the worst outbreak of rioting in Baltimore since 1968. Demonstrators threw bottles at police and picked up the canisters and hurled them back at authorities. However, the large crowd would rapidly disperse within a few minutes leaving about a dozen people in the streets during the night. The clash comes a days after high tension, but relative peace in Baltimore, as thousands of police officers and National Guardsmen poured into the city trying to prevent another round of looting and arson that took the city by storm Monday. It was the first time since the assassination of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr in 1968 that the National Guard was called out in Baltimore to put an end to the unrest. But the app that replaced the flight bag crashed on Tuesday, affecting multiple planes scattered throughout the entire fleet, according to passenger reports, leaving the pilots unable to take off. When the electronic flight bags were introduced, American Airlines proudly detailed the environmental and cost-savings impact of the change. The glitch in the electronic flight bags comes in the same month that a US watchdog warned of the possibility of in-flight Wi-Fi being used to hack into the avionics system of a plane.

ACLU TO IMPLEMENT CELL PHONE APPLICATION TO RECORD POLICE/CIVILIAN CONFRONTATIONS

The ACLU of California on Thursday unveiled a free smartphone app that allows users to send video of questionable police activity directly to the organization, protecting the recordings even if officers confiscate or try to tamper with the phones. "We want to multiply the number of cameras that can be trained on police officers at any time," said Hector Villagra, executive director of the ACLU of Southern California. "They need to know that anything they do could be seen by the entire world." But the idea of a civil liberties organization collecting evidence of possible police misconduct is also raising eyebrows. It's far from clear how many people will download and use the "Mobile Justice CA" app or when video sent there may become public. One benefit of uploading such videos to YouTube, Facebook and social media is that they can immediately reach the public eye. Users will have to open the app on their Android or Apple devices before filming, ACLU officials said. When the recording stops, it automatically sends a copy to the ACLU's server and keeps the video on the phone. A text report will then pop up, allowing users to explain in writing what they saw but allowing them to remain anonymous if desired. ACLU officials said their legal team would screen the reports and review any videos they believed might show problematic activity.

A spokeswoman for the governor said Tuesday Hickenlooper planned to sign the bill.

Journalist Seymour Hersh is alleging President Barack Obama and his administration lied about the circumstances surrounding the 2011 killing of Osama bin Laden, an account close followers of the raid to kill the al Qaeda leader are loudly disputing.

Citing an anonymous "major U.S. source," Hersh writes in the London Review of Books that the Obama administration cooperated with Pakistani intelligence officials to kill the al Qaeda leader, and that the chief of staff of the Pakistani army and director general of the Inter-Services Intelligence Agency knew about the mission, contrary to Obama's claim that Pakistani officials weren't aware of the raid in advance. CNN National Security Analyst Peter Bergen immediately rebutted Hersh's allegations in a post that contradicts most of the claims in his 10,000 word report. In explaining why he relied largely on the "major U.S. source," Hersh said that it's "very tough for guys still inside to get quoted extensively," and declared that he "vetted most and verified" his sourcing with further reporting in Pakistan. But Hersh, who has drawn criticism for his heavy use of anonymous sourcing before, admitted that he had gotten some things wrong in his reporting before.

VERIZON AND SPRINT TO PAY \$158 MILLION FOR CRAMMING CHARGES ON CUSTOMERS' BILLS

Verizon and Sprint are paying a combined \$158 million to settle investigations into unauthorized charges placed on their customers' phone bills. The practice is known as "cramming," and with today's announcement, the Federal Communications Commission has now made cramming settlements with all four major wireless carriers - AT&T settled in October for \$105 million, and T-Mobile settled in December for \$90 million. Of today's \$158 million, \$90 million will come from Verizon and \$68 million will come from Sprint. The majority of the money will go toward setting up refund programs to give money back to consumers who were hit with unauthorized charges. These charges came from premium text messaging services, which might send information like horoscopes or celebrity gossip, and usually ran about \$9.99 per month. Verizon would keep 30 percent of their fees, and Sprint would keep 35 percent. The trouble is, consumers quite often didn't sign up for them, and carriers wouldn't always offer refunds. The FCC says that when it asked carriers for evidence that their customers signed up for premium texting services, they "were unable to prove that these services were ever requested."

LICENSES FOR DREAMERS IN NEBRASKA

Some Nebraska conservatives on Wednesday sought to keep in place a policy that has left the state the only one in the nation that denies driver's licenses to young people protected from deportation despite being brought to the U.S. illegally as children. Most Nebraska lawmakers, including some conservatives, support authorizing licenses for the immigrants, often referred to as Dreamers, who are part of a federal program that gives them a Social Security Number and work permit for two years. But other conservatives who oppose the bill that would allow the licenses mounted a filibuster Wednesday against the measure. President Barack Obama created the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program in 2012 for young people who had been brought to the United States illegally as children. A similar program that would benefit parents of U.S.-citizen children is on hold pending a federal lawsuit. The Nebraska bill has support from prominent ranching and business groups and conservatives. The Nebraska Cattlemen Association and Nebraska Restaurant Association have argued that the state's current policy makes it harder for immigrants to find jobs in industries that need them.

Members of the Walton family, the family that founded Wal-Mart, made a large private donation to help pay for illegal aliens with DACA status to enroll in the Teach for America program. DACA instructors are not licensed teachers but they are issued an alternative license⁶ from the State of Colorado to teach. These "teachers" are enrolled in classes to attain their traditional teaching license after one year. Under Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival, illegal aliens are offered two years of amnesty, are given a social security number, and are allowed to apply for a work permit. The two-year DACA stay of deportation may be renewed on a case-by-case basis, but it does not confer lawful immigration status, provide a path to citizenship, or alter an illegal alien's existing immigration status.

DAPA'S ORIGINAL IMPLEMENTATION DATE

Six months after President Barack Obama announced his latest immigration executive action, the Deferred Action for Parental Accountability (DAPA) program's future remains unknown. The DAPA program would have allowed undocumented immigrant parents to request temporary deferred action from deportation and obtain employment authorization if the individuals lived in the U.S. since Jan. 1, 2010, and is a parent of a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident born on or before Nov. 20, 2014 -- the same day as Obama's immigration executive action address. MINIMUM WAGE RAISE IN LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles on Tuesday became the biggest U.S. city to raise its minimum wage to \$15 an hour. Following a hot debate, the city council voted 14 to 1 to approve a plan to gradually increase the required wage to \$15 an hour by July 2020. The current \$9-an-hour minimum wage was already slated to increase to \$10 in January. The pay bump will affect about 567,000 workers in the city. The move comes less than a year after the city council voted to raise hourly pay to \$15.37 for nearly 10,000 hotel workers. The debate over the new minimum wage divided the city. Business groups, including the Los Angeles

Chamber of Commerce and the Valley Industry and Commerce Association, warned that the increase would hurt small companies and lead to layoffs.

LARGEST AUTOMOBILE RECALL DUE TO DEFECTS

In the largest automotive recall in U.S. history, car makers will fix faulty air bags in nearly 34 million vehicles after Japanese parts supplier Takata Corp. bowed to pressure from regulators on Tuesday. The move doubles the number of vehicles already targeted by the recall, which is aimed at repairing malfunctioning air-bag inflators that can explode and send shrapnel flying into cars. The recalls, expected to be conducted by up to 11 auto makers, would be one of the largest actions for any industry. Some 31 million bottles of Tylenol were recalled in the early 1980s. The suspect air bags are found in everything from sport-utility vehicles made by Honda Motor Co. to autos produced by Toyota Motor Corp., General Motors Co. and Daimler AG trucks. Vehicles equipped with the faulty Takata air bags represent almost 14% of the roughly 250 million vehicles on U.S. roads.

Five global banks agreed to pay more than \$5 billion in combined penalties and plead guilty to criminal charges to resolve a long-running U.S. investigation into whether traders colluded to move foreign-currency rates for their own financial benefit. The settlements largely close the book on the latest industrywide investigation, one of a steady stream of probes into mortgage misdeeds, manipulative trading behavior and tax evasion. The biggest global banks have paid more than \$60 billion in penalties over the past two years to resolve allegations of wrongdoing. Four of the banks, Barclays PLC, Citigroup Inc., J.P. Morgan Chase & Co. and Royal Bank of Scotland Group PLC, pleaded guilty on Wednesday to conspiring to manipulate prices in the \$500 billion-a-day market for U.S. dollars and euros, authorities said.

ARIZONA SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court, over three dissents, rejected Arizona's appeal Monday of a law that would have denied bail to immigrants here illegally who were arrested for a serious felony. The measure had been adopted in 2006 by the state's voters, and it said judges may not release on bail persons who have "entered or remained in the United States illegally" and were arrested for "serious felony offenses." Last year, however, the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals struck down the law and said that the Constitution's protection for liberty applies to all persons in the United States and that people under arrest have a right to an individual hearing on whether they may be released before a trial. Lawyers for Maricopa County asked the justices to reverse that decision, arguing that immigrants who were in the country illegally were not likely to show up for a trial if they were set free. But after considering the case for several weeks, the court said it would not hear the appeal. The American Civil Liberties Union, which had fought Proposition 100, praised the court's action.

SCOTUS FACEBOOK THREATS

The Supreme Court on Monday threw out the conviction of a Pennsylvania man prosecuted for making threats on Facebook, but dodged the free-speech issues that had made the case intriguing to First Amendment advocates. Chief Justice John Roberts, writing for the court, said it was not enough for prosecutors to show that the comments of Anthony Elonis would make a reasonable person feel threatened. But the high court sent the case back to the lower court without clarifying exactly what the standard of proof should be. The ruling was a narrow victory for civil liberties groups that had urged the court to make it tougher to prosecute people who make crude comments on social media that might be viewed as threatening. Yet the high court declined to lay out broad constitutional protections for such comments. "It is not necessary to consider any First Amendment issues," Roberts wrote. Elonis, of Freemansburg, Pennsylvania, was prosecuted under a law that makes it a crime to threaten another person after he posted Facebook rants in the form of rap lyrics about killing his estranged wife, harming law enforcement officials and shooting up a school. Seven justices on the high court said it was not necessary to reach First Amendment issues in reversing Elonis' conviction. Roberts said the reasonable-person standard is "inconsistent with the conventional requirement for criminal conduct -- awareness of some wrongdoing." Justice Samuel Alito agreed with the outcome, but said he would have made clear that a person can violate the law if he disregards the risk that comments will be interpreted as a threat. Elonis said he didn't intend to threaten anyone. He claimed his posts under the pseudonym "Tone Dougie" were a form of therapy that allowed him to cope with the breakup of his marriage and being fired from his job at an amusement park.

Congress approved sweeping changes Tuesday to surveillance laws enacted after the Sept. 11 attacks, eliminating the National Security Agency's disputed bulk phone-records collection program and replacing it with a more restrictive measure to keep the records in phone companies' hands. Two days after Congress let the phone-records collection and several other anti-terror programs expire, the Senate's 67-32 vote sent the legislation to President Barack Obama, who signed it Tuesday night. The legislation will revive most of the programs the Senate had allowed to lapse in a dizzying collision of presidential politics and national security policy. But the authorization will undergo major changes, the legacy of agency contractor Edward Snowden's explosive revelations two years ago about domestic spying by the government. In an unusual shifting of alliances, the legislation passed with the support of Obama and House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, but over the strong opposition of Senate Majority Leader Mitch

McConnell. McConnell failed to persuade the Senate to extend the current law unchanged, and came up short in a last-ditch effort Tuesday to amend the House version, as nearly a dozen of his own Republicans abandoned him in a series of votes.

USA SECURITY AIRPORT

President Barack Obama still has confidence in the U.S. Transportation Security Administration after a scathing report that faulted the agency for not detecting obvious threats to airline security, the White House said on Tuesday (June 2). On Monday, Melvin Carraway, the acting administrator of the TSA, which is responsible for screening airline passengers in the United States, was reassigned after media cited a government report that checkpoint screeners failed to detect mock explosives and weapons in 95 percent of tests carried out by undercover agents. Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson, whose department oversees the TSA, was briefed last week on the trials, which were completed recently, ABC News said. In one test, the network said an undercover agent was stopped when he set off an alarm at a checkpoint but that TSA screeners then failed to find a fake explosive device taped to his back. Johnson issued a statement on Monday saying the results of the security checks were classified but that he had directed the TSA to revise screening procedures "to address specific vulnerabilities identified" in the undercover operation.

TEXAS APPROVES STUDENTS TO CARRY CONCEALED FIREARMS IN COLLEGES

Students and faculty members at public and private universities in Texas could be allowed to carry concealed handguns into classrooms, dormitories and other buildings under a bill passed over the weekend by the Republican-dominated Legislature. The measure is being hailed as a victory by gun rights advocates and criticized by many students and professors as irresponsible and unnecessary. The so-called campus-carry bill is expected to be signed into law by the Republican governor, Greg Abbott. It would take effect in August 2016 at universities and August 2017 at community colleges. Supporters say it will make college campuses safer by not preventing licensed gun owners from defending themselves and possibly saving lives should a mass shooting occur, such as the one that unfolded at Virginia Tech University in 2007.

LOS ANGELES APPROVES 15 DOLLAR PER HOUR MINIMUM WAGE

Los Angeles lawmakers Tuesday voted to boost the minimum wage to \$15 an hour by 2020, the largest city to try to help its lowest-paid workers. The action will gradually increase the guaranteed hourly wage from \$9 in the country's second largest city. Chicago, San Francisco and Seattle have enacted similar measures. The council's 14-1 vote directs the city attorney to draft an ordinance that will require final approval later this year by mayor Erick Garcetti. The first increase, to \$10.50 an hour, will come July 1, 2016, followed by annual steps until July 2020, when the minimum wage will stand at \$15 an hour. Two years later, increases will be pegged to the Consumer Price Index. For non-profit organizations with 25 or fewer employees, the scheduled raises won't begin until 2017. Organized labor backed an increase but sought \$15.25 an hour and sooner than 2020.

Since a federal judge first blocked the new programs in February, the Department of Homeland Security has suspended plans to hire up to 3,100 new employees, most of whom would be housed in an 11-story building the government has leased for \$7.8 million a year in Arlington, Va. That building, in the Crystal City area, is now sitting mostly unused, DHS employees say. Yet inside and outside the Beltway, community groups are mobilizing, educating immigrants and training volunteers to help them apply for relief, even though it remains unclear whether the program will ever begin.

POSSIBLE RENT INCREASE IN NY

VO: 25 SEC.

Synopsis:

The city's Rent Guidelines Board on Monday held the first of four expected public hearings focused on a proposed increase for rent stabilized apartments. The board is considering increases of 0 to 2 percent on one-year lease renewals, and a 0.5 to 3.5 percent on two-year renewals. If the current rent regulations expire on June 15, however, more than one million apartments in the city could start going for market rates. Inside of the meeting, several people held signs calling for a rent freeze or rollback, while landlords say that would be disastrous for them. Mayor Bill de Blasio has promised that if Albany does not strengthen rent protections before the approaching deadline, he will end all tax breaks for developers of luxury condos in the city.

CALIFORNIA TRAFFIC TICKETS

VO: 025 SEC.

Synopsis:

The governing body for California's court system Monday banned county courts from requiring people to pay traffic fines before they can contest their tickets. The Judicial Council's unanimous vote in favor of abolishing the practice comes as state officials have raised concerns that traffic fines and penalties are ensnaring minority and low-income residents. Fines have skyrocketed in California over the past two decades, and courts have grown reliant on fees as a result of budget cuts during the recession. The Judicial Council's decision takes effect immediately, and also requires courts to notify traffic defendants that they don't have to make so-called bail payments in any instructions or other materials they provide to the public. Monday's vote comes as Gov. Jerry Brown has proposed amnesty for residents who can't afford traffic fines and penalties that have resulted in 4.8 million driver's license suspensions since 2006.

A GOP-controlled Senate panel on Wednesday blocked President Barack Obama's request for \$50 million to pay for legal help for unaccompanied immigrant children coming to the United States after fleeing violence in Central America. The lawmaker responsible for the move was Republican Sen. Richard Shelby of Alabama, chief author of a spending bill funding the Justice Department's budget. The spending measure won initial approval on Wednesday but has a long way to go before becoming law. The flow of children fleeing gangs and other dangers in Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador and finding their way to the U.S. is down significantly from last year, when an influx created a humanitarian crisis, in states along the U.S.-Mexico border. Significant backlogs remain. Without lawyers, children are much more likely to be sent back to their home countries. Under federal law, immigrant children have two options to seek legal status, including requesting asylum for fear of returning home to face gang violence. Without legal help, the maze of documentation and legal requirements is far more difficult for a child to maneuver. Republicans opposed to people who are in the United States illegally have greater priorities in the \$51 billion measure, which also funds the Commerce Department and science-related agencies such as NASA. NASA and the FBI get a slight funding increase, but the measure shortchanges the Census Bureau and Obama's request for new polar weather satellites. The measure is one of 12 annual appropriations bills covering the day-to-day operations of government agencies.

LAWSUIT DUE TO LABOR CONDITIONS

Family members of two farm workers who died from suspected heat-related illnesses and a labor union have settled their lawsuits against California on the condition that the state do more to ensure laborers are safe when temperatures rise. The lawsuits, filed in 2009 and 2012, accused the state of repeatedly failing to protect farm workers being denied basic access to water and shade while working in extreme heat in California fields. The state estimates that 14 workers died from heat-related illnesses in the state between 2005 and 2013, though the United Farm Workers labor union says the figure is closer to 30. One worker who died was 17 years old. Under terms of the settlement, reached last month and obtained by The Associated Press on Wednesday, the state's Division of Occupational Safety and Health is agreeing to improve enforcement of newly enhanced safety regulations.

CARRY ON BAG SIZE

The future of your favorite carry-on bag may be precarious. At its annual summit in Miami Tuesday, the International Air Transport Association suggested a new standard for carry-on luggage to be stowed in overhead bins, and it's not getting larger. Working with aircraft manufacturers, the association has decided the best luggage size to create optimal cabin storage space for all passengers is 21.5 inches tall, 13.5 inches wide and 7.5 inches deep, according to an I.A.T.A. news release titled "Airlines to Address Carry-On Bag Dilemma." That's a few inches shy of what most airlines, international and domestic, currently allow. So, what's the dilemma? Compliance, Tom Windmuller, I.A.T.A.'s senior vice president

for airport, passenger, cargo and security, said in a video posted to the association's website. Each airline has a different idea of what size is acceptable; airline staff must quickly judge by sight which bags comply and which don't; and if passengers can't get aboard the aircraft early enough to snag limited overhead space, it's likely they will have to check it at the last minute anyway. The move to smaller luggage in-cabin will "theoretically" enable every passenger aboard an aircraft of 120 seats or more to make use of the overhead compartments, according to the I.A.T.A. To assist airline staff with spotting compliant bags, the association has been working with Okoban, a luggage security and tracking company, to create a new logo for manufacturers to attach to bags that meet the new standard. Several companies, including Samsonite, Tumi and Delsi, are working with the association to create compliant baggage, expected to be introduced later this year.

Among the 48 percent that report some retirement savings, the median amount is \$104,000 for households age 55-64, or about \$310 a month. Older households, age 65-74, have higher savings at \$148,000 or \$649 a month, which still offers little on which to live. Baby boomers are facing fewer pensions than previous generations. In 1975, most workers with pensions had a guaranteed lifetime benefit, but today, most retirement plans, like 401(k)s, are based on a worker's contributions, and offer no guarantee of lifetime income.

The oldest victim was 87; the youngest was 26. Federal law enforcement officials said Roof, who is white, declared his hatred for black people before opening fire, and the U.S. Justice Department has said it is investigating the attack as a hate crime.

CONFEDERATE FLAG CONTROVERSY

South Carolina's governor declared Monday that the Confederate flag should be removed from the Statehouse grounds as she acknowledged that its use as a symbol of hatred by the man accused of killing nine black church members has made it too divisive to display in such a public space. Gov. Nikki Haley's about-face comes just days after authorities charged Dylann Storm Roof, 21, with murder. The white man appeared in photos waving Confederate flags and burning or desecrating U.S. flags, and purportedly wrote of fomenting racial violence. Survivors told police he hurled racial insults during the attack. The massacre inside the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church has suddenly made removing the flag - long thought politically impossible in South Carolina -- the go-to position, even for conservative

Republican politicians. Haley was flanked by Republican U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham, now running for president, as well as South Carolina's junior Republican senator, Tim Scott, and Democratic Rep. Jim Clyburn, both of whom are black. Within moments, her call was echoed by the Republican Party chairman and the top GOP lawmaker, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell. The governor's declarations sparked action in other arenas as well on Monday: Mississippi House Speaker Philip Gunn called for the Confederate emblem to be removed from the state flag, becoming the first top-tier Republican to do so. In Tennessee, both Democrats and Republicans called for the removal of a bust of Confederate general and early Ku Klux Klan leader Nathan Bedford Forrest from an alcove outside the Senate's chambers. And Wal-Mart announced Monday that it is removing any items from its store shelves and website that feature the Confederate flag.

AIRLINES FEES

U.S. airlines continue to collect record fees from passengers who check suitcases or make changes to their reservations. In the first three months of this year, airlines took in \$1.6 billion in such fees, up 7.4 percent from the same period last year. That's the highest amount for the first quarter since bag fees started in 2008, according to data from the Bureau of Transportation Statistics. January through March is traditionally the slowest period for air travel. The fees climbed, in part, because more passengers flew at the start of the year -- 3.2 percent more seats were filled. The airlines also increased some fees and forced more passengers to pay them. While the standard fee for the first checked suitcase remains \$25, fees have been going up for the second or third checked bag or for overweight luggage. And more passengers are now subject to those fees, which can be as high as \$200 per bag. For instance, United Airlines recently reduced the number of bags some elite frequent fliers can check for free. And JetBlue Airways announced in November that it will soon start charging for checked baggage for its cheapest fares, although it has to disclose the amount of the fee and when it would apply to passengers. All of these add-on charges, along with falling jet fuel prices, helped the largest 26 U.S. airlines post a combined \$3.1 billion in profits during the first quarter. Their net profit margin reached 8 percent, a significant jump from the 1.3 percent margin in the year before. During the past 12 months, the airlines took in \$3.6 billion in bag fees and another \$3 billion in reservation change fees, typically \$200 for domestic tickets and as high as \$1,000 for an international itinerary.

WATER RECALL ECOLI

Bottling Company Voluntarily Recalls 14 Brands of Water Due to Possible E. Coli. A water bottling company is issuing a voluntary recall due to a possible E. coli contamination and urging people to boil their bottled water first or avoid drinking it altogether. Niagara Bottling said today that one of its spring sources has a "positive indication" of E. coli, which the company said indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. The company said it has not received any reports of illness or injury. The only affected products have codes that begin with the letter F (for Hamburg) or A (for Allentown). The first digit after the letter indicates the number of the production line. The next two numbers indicate the day, then the month in letters, the year, and then the time, based on a 24-hour clock. For example, the following code could be recalled: A610JUN15 2000 E. coli microbes can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms, the company said, and may pose a greater risk for infants, young children, some of the elderly and people with severely compromised immune systems. Shaw's supermarket, headquartered in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, said specific bottled water products sold at its locations in Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont have been recalled. The recalled products have "Best By" dates of "08DEC2016" through "16DEC2016," or Dec. 8, 2016, through Dec. 16, 2016. The company said customers should discard these products or return them for a full refund. Wegmans Food Markets, based in Rochester, New York, said it is voluntarily recalling certain 16.9-ounce packs of water with "Best By" dates of June 10 through 18, 2016.

OBESITY NEW STUDY

Based on information from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, which is conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 67.6 million Americans were obese and 65.2 million overweight as of 2012. The CDC defines obese as having a body mass index of 30 or higher, and

overweight as a body mass index of between 25 and 29.9. This marks the first time that Americans who are obese outnumber those who are overweight. Stopping Americans' propensity to supersize meals and lead sedentary lifestyles has become a national priority in recent decades with the launch of efforts like Michelle Obama's "Let's Move!" program aimed at children, state-funded interventions that have nutritionists going door-to-door to educate people about proper eating habits, and the Food and Drug Administration's move last week to ban trans fats from the food supply. Researcher Lin Yang from the Washington University School of Medicine, in a statement accompanying the research letter, called the data a "wake-up call" for more aggressive policies and practices to fight obesity. Yang, a post-doc researcher, said that the biggest increase between the most recent data and 20 years ago is an increase in the most severe obesity among non-Hispanic black women which jumped from 8 percent to 17 percent. She said there seemed to be no difference between the rising trend of obesity among younger adults vs. older adults.

TAYLOR SWIFT APPLE

Apple's abrupt about-face on paying royalties for songs during a three-month free-trial period for its new music service was a symbolic victory for superstar Taylor Swift and other artists, and a shrewd business move by Apple, at a time when the streaming phenomenon is causing major changes in the music industry. The olive branch extended by Apple comes as music is increasingly being consumed on streaming services like Spotify and Deezer -- to the detriment of album sales and iTunes downloads -- heightening tensions between artists, labels and service providers over who gets paid and how much. Apple had already agreed to share revenue from the new Apple Music service once users start paying a \$10-a-month subscription fee for the service, which it plans to launch June 30. But the technology giant wasn't planning to pay artists and labels directly for the use of their music during the free, 90-day trial period that it's offering to get fans to try the service. That changed quickly Sunday, after Swift posted an open letter to Apple opposing the lack of royalties during the free period, and declaring she'd be withholding her latest album "1989" from Apple Music because of it. Apple Senior Vice President Eddy Cue reversed the company's trial-period terms, which had gone out to thousands of independent labels, including Swift's Big Machine Label Group, after the technology giant reached a deal with major label groups Universal, Sony and Warner in early June. The company needed to avoid a "PR nightmare" and quickly extinguish the firestorm that Swift had created, said Daniel Ives, tech stocks analyst with FBR Capital Markets. Apple hasn't publicly revealed how much it will pay in royalties for the free streaming period. Cue declined to offer financial details in an interview with The Associated Press on Sunday, but he said the payments will be based on a different formula than the company had already negotiated for sharing subscription revenue, since Apple won't be collecting any revenue from the 90 days of free streaming. Instead, Cue said, royalties for the free streaming will be based on a standard amount for each time a song is streamed. Jeff Price, the CEO and founder of royalty collection firm Audiam, said the free-period royalties could amount to about \$25 million per month in the U.S. alone if Apple Music pays the same as Spotify did in December 2014, according to publishers' data. Ives noted the cost to Apple is "not even a rounding error" for a company that made \$39.5 billion in profit and \$182.8 billion in revenue for its last fiscal year. While Apple Music doesn't have any subscribers yet, compared to the 4.7 million Spotify had in the U.S. then, its global launch in 100 countries could quickly change that. Still, Price says the gesture will likely be worth it for Apple.

AN UNARMED MAN SHOT BY LOS ANGELES POLICE AFTER HE ALLEGEDLY POINTED A TOWEL-COVERED HAND IN THEIR DIRECTION

The officers thought the man, identified by police as Walter William DeLeon, was holding a gun when he pointed his hands at them and moved toward them "aggressively," LAPD officials said. The 48-year-old remained in critical condition Monday. Some question why LAPD officers handcuffed unarmed man after he was shot. When reached by phone Monday evening, DeLeon's 18-year-old son said he was shocked when he learned that his father had been shot by police. "At first, I thought it was like a random person

that did it," William DeLeon said. "Then I found out it was the cops. I didn't understand why, because I know my dad wouldn't do anything to provoke it." William DeLeon said he and his family spent part of the day at his father's bedside. The younger DeLeon said his father was a construction worker: "He just tries to get by," he said. But he declined to say more, saying his family was getting legal advice. LAPD Cmdr. Andrew Smith cautioned that the investigation into Friday evening's shooting was still in its preliminary stages but said there was no initial explanation why DeLeon would have flagged down the two officers. Investigators did not find a broken-down car nearby, Smith said, and there was no injury to the man's hand that was covered in the towel.

The two officers were sitting in heavy traffic on congested Los Feliz Boulevard when the man approached their squad car, Smith said. The officers ordered him to drop what they thought was a weapon, Smith said, but the man didn't respond to those commands. One officer then opened fire, Smith said. Both officers have been removed from the field pending the department's 72-hour briefing on the incident, when Chief Charlie Beck and other command staff will review the initial stages of the investigation. The names of the officers have not been released. The officers were assigned to the LAPD's Security Services Division, a detail that provides security to city-owned property. They were tasked with patrolling Griffith Park. Smith said investigators had identified some witnesses. He declined to say what the witnesses reported, but said they were "pretty clear about what they saw." Investigators are continuing to canvass the area for any surveillance footage and asked anyone else who may have seen the shooting to come forward, Smith said. The officers were not wearing department-issued body cameras and their cruiser didn't have a dash camera.

RENT PRICES SKYROCKETING

Home rental prices are climbing across much of the United States - with the biggest gains coming not from New York or San Francisco but Jackson, Mississippi, and Portland, Maine. Real estate data firm Zillow said Tuesday that prices nationally climbed a seasonally adjusted 4.3% in May from a year ago. Rents still are rising at double-digit rates in Denver, San Francisco and San Jose, California, with their job opportunities drawing new residents at a faster pace than construction can match. But two smaller cities led the gains in May. Houses in the Mississippi capital of Jackson are renting monthly for \$1,169, a 22.7% yearly increase. On the northeastern end of the United States, rental prices in Portland, Maine have shot up 17.4%. The steadily rising costs of renting houses and apartments are creating new financial pressures for many Americans. Rental prices have grown at roughly double the rate of wages, forcing more Americans to limit their spending elsewhere or cutting into their savings. A stunning 73% of renters say they have made financial trade-offs to pay their rents during the past three years, including taking a second job and going into credit-card debt, according to a survey released this month by the MacArthur Foundation. The greater financial pressures have led 61% of Americans to say the country is still in the middle of the housing crisis, according to the survey. Consumers are pessimistic about housing despite a clear rebound in sales. Home purchases increased 5.1% in May to annual rate of 5.35 million, putting the country on pace for the strongest sales level since 2007, according to the National Association of Realtors. But the rising rental prices are limiting how much many would-be buyers can save to buy a home, particularly in cities with a higher concentration of jobs in technology and finance. UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS PAY MORE TO MEDICARE THAN THEY WITHDRAW

Undocumented immigrants paid \$35.1 billion more into Medicare than they withdrew, extending the program's viability a year longer than predicted had they not paid into it at all. Researchers discovered that between 2000 and 2011, undocumented immigrants contributed between \$2.2 billion and \$3.8 billion

more than they withdrew from the Medicare Trust Fund each year. That created a total surplus of \$35.1 billion over the 11-year span. Had this surplus not been added to the trust fund, it would become insolvent by 2029, one year earlier than analysts currently predict.

The facility, which houses detainees for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), is operated by Corrections Corporation of America - the nation's largest for-profit prison company. Approximately 200 detainees at the Eloy facility staged a hunger strike over the weekend of June 13-14. Based on data collected by Prison Legal News, over the 11-year period from 2004 to June 2015 there have been 32 deaths reported at CCA-operated immigration detention facilities nationwide. Fourteen of those deaths occurred at Eloy, while seven were at the company's Houston Processing Center.

In a statement Friday following attacks in Tunisia, France and Kuwait, DHS Secretary Jeh Johnson said local law enforcement was being encouraged to be "vigilant and prepared" in preparation for July 4th celebrations. The FBI has admitted that there are probably hundreds - perhaps thousands - of Islamic State sympathizers in the U.S. who may have been radicalized online. Synopsis:

The Supreme Court's 6-3 decision upholding the use of federal tax credits in President Obama's health care law will have an immediate impact on consumers, insurers, doctors, hospitals - and the balance of power between the three branches of government. Of the 6.4 million people who receive tax credits to help pay for their insurance premiums, researchers from the nonprofit think tank Rand estimate 70% likely would have dropped their coverage if the court ruled the other way. That means they couldn't have gotten free physicals and other preventive treatment and there would be no caps on total out of pocket costs that are part of the law. A central tenet of Obamacare is that people who have insurance will go to the doctor more, so diseases will be caught earlier and overall health care costs will be reduced. Because the law also requires physicals and other preventive care to be fully covered at no cost to consumers -- providing they have insurance.-- it means more business for doctors. The law reduces the burden on hospitals, which have to treat every patient who shows up in their emergency rooms. Hospitals face an average of \$900 a year in costs for every uninsured person in their states, according to a new study. Hospitals still face high uncompensated-care costs for treating poor people who aren't getting Medicaid in states that chose not to expand it.

The unit will only review cases where someone who has always maintained their innocence is behind bars for a serious or violent felony. Inmates, attorneys or groups that seek to exonerate the wrongly convicted can file a claim with the district attorney's office. Michael Semanchik, staff attorney at California Innocence Project at California Western School of Law in San Diego, said the move should make it easier to present cases directly to prosecutors without having to file a case in court, which can take years to be resolved. **SCOTUS LETHAL INJECTION

The Supreme Court upheld the use of a controversial drug in lethal injection executions Monday, as two dissenting justices said for the first time that they think it's "highly likely" that the death penalty itself is unconstitutional. The justices voted 5-4 in a case from Oklahoma that the sedative midazolam can be used in executions without violating the Eighth Amendment prohibition on cruel and unusual punishment. The drug was used in executions in Arizona, Ohio and Oklahoma in 2014 that took longer than usual and raised concerns that it did not perform its intended task of putting inmates into a coma-like sleep. Justice Samuel Alito said for a conservative majority that arguments the drug could not be used effectively as a sedative in executions is speculative.

Fiat Chrysler is calling the owners of 65 Jeep Grand Cherokee and Dodge Durango SUVs to tell them to stop driving their vehicles. Fiat Chrysler said Sunday that an error in the assembly process earlier this month could cause a component in those vehicles to break, leaving the driver with "rear-end instability and/or reduced braking power," according to a press release. The company wants owners of the cars to stop driving them and arrange an on-site inspection. Another 7,690 vehicles may also be recalled because they were built during the same eight-day period, but Fiat Chrysler has only identified 65 currently on the road. (The remainder are on dealer lots or in transit to dealers.)

In the case of HIV, it's less than two children for 100 children born to women with HIV.

It can be difficult for family members and friends to reach out when they see a Veteran they love in crisis. They may think they can't understand what Veterans have gone through or find words that will be comforting to them. The truth is, asking those hard questions and showing support for Veterans matters. "Talking About It Matters" demonstrates why asking the hard questions is often the first step toward getting Veterans the support they need.

The Veterans Crisis Line is available for Veterans and their families and friends 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. It is a free source of support for Veterans and Service members of all ages, backgrounds, and service eras—as well as the people in their lives. Raising awareness of this resource among Veterans' families and friends enables them to stand by Veterans, particularly in their times of need.

Since the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs launched the Veterans Crisis Line in 2007, its responders have answered more than 890,000 calls and made more than 30,000 lifesaving rescues. In 2009, the Veterans Crisis Line added an anonymous online chat service and has engaged in more than 108,000 chats. In November 2011, the Veterans Crisis Line introduced a text-messaging service, and has since responded to more than 10,000 texts—providing another way for Veterans to connect with round-the-clock support.

We need your help to encourage everyone who cares about a Veteran to reach out; assistance is only a call, click, or text away. Please view "Talking About It Matters" today and join me in standing by our Veterans by airing it as soon—and as often—as you can. Families of those who have served in your community will thank you.
