===== DC-UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS RAN OUT (15 SEC)

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS STARTED RUNNING OUT YESTERDAY FOR APPROXIMATELY 2 MILLION PEOPLE, ACCORDING TO THE LABOR DEPARTMENT. 6 MILLION MORE COULD LOSE THEM BY JAN 1 IF CONGRESS DOES NOT EXTEND THEM. DEMOCRATS WANT EXTENSION, REPUBLICANS AGREE BUT ONLY IF THEY CAN BE PAID FOR WITHOUT ADDING TO DEFICIT.

THE LATEST RECALL IS FOR 12 MILLION BOTTLES OF MYLANTA AND 85-THOUSAND BOTTLES OF ALTERNA-GEL. THE PRODUCTS MAY CONTAIN ALCOHOL. THEY WERE MADE AT THE SAME PLANT THAT HAD TO SHUT DOWN EARLIER THIS YEAR DUE TO HYGIENE PROBLEMS.THE COMPANY IS ALREADY UNDER CRIMINAL AND CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATION DUE TO QUALITY CONTROL ISSUES.

=====BARBIE CAM CONCERN (19 sec)

THE F-B-I IS CONCERNED THAT VIDEO GIRL BARBIE COULD BE USED TO MAKE CHILD PORNOGRAPHY. THE DOLL HAS A DIGITAL VIDEO CAMERA INSTALLED IN THE MIDDLE OF HER CHEST. IT CAN RECORD 30-MINUTES OF VIDEO AN AUDIO THAT CAN BE STREAMED TO A COMPUTER. THE DOLL HAS SOME PARENTS WORRIED AS WELL. A STATEMENT BY THE DOLL'S COMPANY MATTEL, SAID "MATTEL PRODUCTS ARE DESIGNED WITH CHILDREN AND THEIR BEST INTERESTS IN MIND. MANY OF MATTEL'S EMPLOYEES ARE PARENTS THEMSELVES AND WE UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE OF CHILD SAFETY - IT IS OUR NUMBER ONE PRIORITY." THE F-B-I SAYS THERE HAVE BEEN 'NO' INCIDENTS INVOLVING THE DOLL. IT HAS BEEN ON STORE SHELVES SINCE JULY.

=====BEATING HEART TRANSPLANTS (17 SEC)

THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, LOS ANGELES IS HEADING AN EXPERIMENT THAT COMPARES THE SAFETY AND EFFECTIVENESS OF THE "BEATING HEART" TRANSPLANT TO THE STANDARD METHOD OF STOPPING THE HEART AND PLACING IT IN A COOLER TO GET IT TO THE RECIPIENT. ENROLLED IN THE BEATING HEART PILOT STUDY IN THE U.S. WILL BE 128 PATIENTS RANDOMLY CHOSEN NATIONWIDE. INSTEAD OF STOPPING THE HEART AND PUTTING IT ON ICE IN A \$35 COOLER, THE NEW TECHNOLOGY CALLS FOR PLACING THE ORGAN IN A SPECIAL \$200,000 BOX THAT FEEDS IT BLOOD AND KEEPS IT WARM AND TICKING OUTSIDE THE BODY.

=====Low Dose Aspirin May Help Fight Certain Types of Cancer (20 SEC)

A MAJOR NEW STUDY JUST OUT SHOWS ONE LOW-DOSE ASPIRIN A DAY -- THE KIND MILLIONS OF PEOPLE TAKE FOR HEART HEALTH -- COULD ALSO SIGNIFICANTLY CUT THE RISK OF DEATH FROM SOME OF THE MOST COMMON FORMS OF CANCER. THE STUNNING FINDING CAME WHILE RESEARCHERS WERE STUDYING 25,000 PEOPLE TAKING DAILY ASPIRIN TO PREVENT HEART DISEASE. IT TURNS OUT ASPIRIN WAS DOING SOMETHING ELSE: REDUCING THE DEATH RATE FROM CANCER AS WELL. THE MOST DRAMATIC DECREASE WAS IN GASTROINTESTINAL CANCER. FOR EVERY 46 PEOPLE WHO TOOK ASPIRIN EVERY DAY FOR 5 YEARS, ONE LIFE WAS SAVED.

=====TALIBAN HOSTAGE VIDEO (19 sec)

MANBA AL-JIHAD, A GROUP ASSOCIATED WITH THE AFGHAN TALIBAN, RELEASED A 45 MINUTE VIDEO SHOWING WHAT THEY SAID WAS NEW FOOTAGE OF CAPTURED US SOLDIER BOWE BERGDAHL. A THIRTY SECOND SECTION OF THE VIDEO SHOWED A MAN WEARING U.S. MILITARY-STYLE UNIFORM SPEAKING TO THE CAMERA. REUTERS WAS UNABLE TO VERIFY THE ACCURACY OR DATE THE FOOTAGE WAS TAKEN. THE TALIBAN HAVE PREVIOUSLY ISSUED VIDEO OF IDAHO NATIONAL GUARD PRIVATE BOWE BERGDAHL ON CHRISTMAS DAY 2009 AND ON APRIL 7, 2010.

=====Just one cigarette can harm DNA (17 sec)

SURGEON GENERAL SAYS EVEN BRIEF EXPOSURE TO TOBACCO SMOKE CAUSES IMMEDIATE HARM TO THE BODY, DAMAGING CELLS AND INFLAMING TISSUE IN WAYS THAT CAN LEAD TO SERIOUS ILLNESS AND DEATH, ACCORDING TO THE U.S. SURGEON GENERAL'S NEW REPORT ON TOBACCO, THE FIRST SUCH REPORT IN FOUR YEARS. WHILE THE REPORT, OUT TODAY, FOCUSES ON THE MEDICAL EFFECTS OF SMOKE ON THE BODY, IT ALSO SHEDS LIGHT ON WHY CIGARETTES ARE SO ADDICTIVE: THEY ARE DESIGNED TO DELIVER NICOTINE MORE QUICKLY AND MORE EFFICIENTLY THAN CIGARETTES DID DECADES AGO. EVERY EXPOSURE TO TOBACCO, FROM OCCASIONAL SMOKING OR SECONDHAND SMOKE, CAN DAMAGE DNA IN WAYS THAT LEAD TO CANCER.

=====FAA MISSING AIRCRAFTS (22 sec)

THE FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION'S AIRCRAFT REGISTRY IS MISSING KEY INFORMATION ON ABOUT ONE-THIRD OF THE PRIVATE AND COMMERCIAL PLANES IN THE US - A GAP THE AGENCY FEARS COULD BE EXPLOITED BY EXTREMIST MILITANTS AND DRUG TRAFFICKERS. THE RECORDS ARE IN SUCH DISARRAY THAT THE FAA SAYS IT IS WORRIED THAT CRIMINALS COULD BUY PLANES WITHOUT THE GOVERNMENT'S KNOWLEDGE, OR USE THE REGISTRATION NUMBERS OF OTHER AIRCRAFT TO EVADE NEW COMPUTER SYSTEMS DESIGNED TO TRACK SUSPICIOUS FLIGHTS. IT HAS ORDERED ALL AIRCRAFT OWNERS TO RE-REGISTER THEIR PLANES IN AN EFFORT TO CLEAN UP ITS FILES. ABOUT 119,000 OF THE 357,000 PLANES ON THE US REGISTRY HAVE "QUESTIONABLE REGISTRATION" BECAUSE OF MISSING FORMS, INVALID ADDRESSES, UNREPORTED SALES OR OTHER PAPERWORK PROBLEMS, ACCORDING TO THE FAA. IN MANY CASES, THE FAA CANNOT SAY WHO OWNS A PLANE OR EVEN WHETHER IT IS STILL FLYING OR HAS BEEN JUNKED.

=====SUGARY KIDS CEREAL STUDY (20 SEC)

SUGARY-SWEET CEREALS AREN'T NECESSARILY WHAT KIDS CRAVE IN THE MORNING. A STUDY

CONDUCTED BY YALE UNIVERSITY FOUND THAT MANY CHILDREN-- WHEN GIVEN LOW-SUGAR CEREALS-- ENJOYED THEM AND ATE A BETTER BREAKFAST WHEN THEY DIDN'T EAT A SUGARY ALTERNATIVE. SCIENTISTS MEASURED 91 CHILDREN AT A DAY CAMP. THE KIDS WERE OFFERED EITHER THREE KINDS OF HIGH-SUGAR CEREALS OR THREE BRANDS OF LOW-SUGAR CEREALS. THEY WERE ALSO GIVEN MILK, ORANGE JUICE, A FRUIT CUP AND SUGAR PACKETS. INVESTIGATORS FOUND ALTHOUGH BOTH GROUPS OF CHILDREN SAID THEY LIKED THE TASTE OF THEIR CEREAL, THOSE WHO ATE THE HIGH SUGAR PRODUCTS, ATE LARGER PORTIONS OF CEREAL. THE AUTHORS OF THE STUDY CONCLUDED THAT PARENTS SHOULD OFFER THEIR KIDS HEALTHY CEREAL CHOICES- - AND MAKE THEM MORE APPEALING BY ADDING FRESH FRUIT OR A SMALL AMOUNT OF TABLE SUGAR.

=====BREAST MILK FDA WARNING (:22)  
FEDERAL HEALTH OFFICIALS ISSUE A WARNING FOR NEW MOTHERS. WOMEN WHO CAN'T BREAST-FEED ARE TURNING TO THE INTERNET AND GETTING BREAST MILK FROM MOTHERS WHO HAVE A SURPLUS --BUT, THE FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION WARNS IT'S NOT A GOOD IDEA. THE F-D-A SAYS "THE DONOR IS UNLIKELY TO HAVE BEEN ADEQUATELY SCREENED FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASE OR CONTAMINATION RISK." AND THAT WOMEN SHOULD USE BREAST MILK FROM SOURCES SUCH AS THE HUMAN MILK BANKING ASSOCIATION OF NORTH AMERICA, WHERE MILK DONORS HAVE BEEN SCREENED.

=====DROP SIDE CRIBS RECALLED :21  
TRAGICALLY, 32 INFANTS DIED IN SO-CALLED "DROP-SIDE CRIBS" OVER THE LAST 9 YEARS ACCORDING TO THE U.S. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY COMMISSION. THE AGENCY ALSO SAID ANOTHER 14 INFANTS WERE STRANGLING IN RELATED "CRIB ENTRAPMENT" ACCIDENTS. BUT BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE WEDNESDAY MORNING IN WASHINGTON, THE AGENCY ENACTED THE TOUGHEST RULES EVER TO BAN SO-CALLED DROP SIDE CRIBS AND MAKE SURE NEW MODELS ARE A LOT SAFER THAN THE OLDER ONES. THE RULE MUST STILL BE PUBLISHED IN THE FEDERAL REGISTER, AND WILL GO INTO EFFECT 6 MONTHS AFTER THE FORMAL NOTICE.

=====STAYING ACTIVE REALLY DOES BEAT MIDDLE-AGE SPREAD :18

PEOPLE WHO KEEP UP AN ACTIVE LIFESTYLE INTO MIDDLE-AGE GAIN FEWER POUNDS AND INCHES OVER TIME -- AND THE BENEFIT MAY BE EVEN GREATER FOR WOMEN THAN MEN, A NEW STUDY FINDS. THE FACT THAT CONSISTENTLY ACTIVE PEOPLE GAIN LESS WEIGHT OVER THE YEARS MAY NOT COME AS A SURPRISE. BUT LITTLE IN THE WAY OF RESEARCH EVIDENCE ACTUALLY SUPPORTED THAT NOTION.

=====FDA: Avastin should not be used for breast cancer (20 sec)

FEDERAL HEALTH AUTHORITIES ARE RECOMMENDING THE BLOCKBUSTER DRUG AVASTIN NO LONGER BE USED TO TREAT BREAST CANCER, SAYING RECENT STUDIES FAILED TO SHOW THE DRUG'S ORIGINAL PROMISE TO HELP SLOW THE DISEASE. THE FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION'S DECISION IS SUPPORTED BY MANY CANCER EXPERTS BUT IS SURE TO DRAW RESISTANCE FROM CANCER PATIENTS AND SOME DOCTORS WHO FIERCELY DEFEND THE DRUG AND SAY IT SHOULD REMAIN AVAILABLE. THE FDA APPROVED AVASTIN FOR BREAST CANCER IN 2008 BASED ON STUDIES SUGGESTING IT HALTED THE SPREAD OF BREAST CANCER FOR MORE THAN FIVE MONTHS. A NEW STUDY FINDS THAT MORE BABIES DIE OF SUDDEN INFANT DEATH SYNDROME (SIDS) IN THE UNITED STATES ON NEW YEAR'S DAY THAN ANY OTHER DAY OF THE YEAR. IT'S NOT CLEAR WHY, BUT RESEARCHERS SUSPECT IT HAS SOMETHING TO DO WITH PARENTS WHO DRINK HEAVILY THE NIGHT BEFORE AND PUT THEIR CHILDREN IN JEOPARDY. RESEARCHERS ANALYZED A DATABASE OF 129,090 DEATHS FROM SIDS FROM 1973 TO 2006 AND 295,151 OTHER INFANT DEATHS DURING THAT TIME PERIOD. THEY FOUND THAT THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF DEATHS FROM SIDS OCCUR ON NEW YEAR'S DAY: THEY SPIKE BY ALMOST A THIRD ABOVE THE NUMBER OF DEATHS THAT WOULD BE EXPECTED ON A WINTER DAY. THE STUDY DOESN'T PROVE THAT ANYTHING IS THE CAUSE OF THE SIDS DEATHS. (THE NUMBER OF OTHER KINDS OF INFANT DEATHS DIDN'T SPIKE SIGNIFICANTLY ON NEW YEAR'S DAY.) HOWEVER, THE RESEARCHERS POINT OUT THAT THERE'S PLENTY OF DRINKING ON NEW YEAR'S EVE. THEY POINT TO RESEARCH THAT SAYS THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE INVOLVED IN ALCOHOL-RELATED CAR CRASHES SKYROCKETS ON NEW YEAR'S EVE, WELL BEYOND ANY OTHER DAY OF THE YEAR.

TAXI DRIVERS ABANDONED THEIR CABS IN THE MIDDLE OF NEW YORK'S SNOW-CLOGGED STREETS. EVEN THE NEW YORK CITY SUBWAY SYSTEM --USUALLY DEPENDABLE DURING A SNOWSTORM -- BROKE DOWN IN SPOTS, TRAPPING RIDERS FOR HOURS. FULL-TERM BABIES BORN BETWEEN 1994 AND 2004 WHO WERE DIAGNOSED WITH JAUNDICE WERE 67 PERCENT MORE LIKELY TO DEVELOP AUTISM THAN THOSE WITHOUT JAUNDICE, ACCORDING TO THE STUDY PUBLISHED IN THE LATEST ISSUE OF THE JOURNAL PEDIATRICS. OUT OF THE 503 BABIES, ONLY ABOUT 140 BABIES HAD A STRONG SENSITIVITY TO PEANUTS. THE RESEARCHERS FOUND THAT THE BABIES OF MOTHERS WHO CONSUMED PEANUT PRODUCTS AT LEAST TWICE A WEEK HAD STRONGER SENSITIVITY TO PEANUTS, COMPARED TO BABIES WHOSE MOTHERS DID NOT EAT PEANUTS. TO SIMPLIFY, THIS MEANS THAT THE BABIES OF MOTHERS WHO CONSUMED PEANUTS DURING PREGNANCY ARE MORE LIKELY TO DEVELOP A POTENTIALLY DEADLY PEANUT ALLERGY ONCE THEY GET OLDER.

THE 952-FOOT SHIP HAS AUXILIARY POWER, BUT AIR CONDITIONING, HOT FOOD SERVICE, HOT WATER AND TELEPHONES WERE KNOCKED OUT. TOILETS AND COLD RUNNING WATER WERE RESTORED LAST NIGHT.

BUT OREGON OSHA REVERSED THAT FINDING WHEN ANOTHER ROUND OF TESTS SHOWED GAS LEVELS WERE ACTUALLY BELOW STATE STANDARDS.

### **PREVIEW DEBATE CA GOVERNOR CANDIDATES LUIS MEGID / SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA PKG 2:25**

While many California voters were looking forward to the first debate between Jerry Brown and Meg Whitman today at UC Davis, Spanish-language media are anticipating another first -- the first-ever Spanish-language gubernatorial debate in California, to be held October 2 at CSU Fresno. The debate, hosted by KFTV Univision 21 Fresno, will be moderated by national Univision anchor María Elena Salinas. Univision reports that more than 21 percent of all California registered voters are Latino, and the numbers are growing: more than 46 percent of registered Latino voters in California have registered to vote in the past eight years. The latest Field Poll shows that Whitman has closed Jerry Brown's lead among Latinos to just 3 percentage points.

### **WHITMAN CONTROVERSY JAIME GARCIA / LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA PKG 2:16**

Republican Meg Whitman struggled to steady her campaign for California governor after disclosures about her former housekeeper -- an illegal immigrant -- threatened to cut into her support among Latinos just weeks before election day. The campaign that for months was dominated by talk of schools, the state's \$19 billion deficit and jobs has become a swirl of accusations pitting the word of Whitman, the billionaire former eBay chief executive, against a 39-year-old maid who worked in her home for nearly a decade.

### **CA DREAM ACT VETO VO :42**

Senator Gilbert Cedillo (D-Los Angeles) issues the following statement on Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger's veto of the California Dream Act (SB 1460): "On behalf of all the AB 504 students in California I am deeply disappointed in the Governor's veto of the California Dream Act, especially after all the time we have spent working to address his concerns. I introduced this bill five years ago and since that time we have created a coalition of supporters which includes the

LA Chamber of Commerce, the University of California, the California State University and the California Community Colleges. It saddens me that the governor has chosen to further limit access to higher education for these exceptional students who have worked so hard to achieve the dream of a college degree and a better life. This is why we must elect Jerry Brown as our next Governor, a person who understands the complexities of immigration and the residents of California."

Toyota says it has fixed about 3.7 million vehicles in the United States that have been part of the company's massive safety recalls. Toyota says in a progress update Monday that customer complaints about unintended acceleration made to its consumer hotline have fallen considerably since April. Toyota has been working to rebuild its reputation for safety in the wake of more than 10 million recalls worldwide. Company officials say they have completed 5 million fixes in the U.S. to recalled vehicles. About 1.3 million vehicles have received fixes for issues with sticking gas pedals and floor mat problems. Toyota says it is expanding the role of engineering teams created to investigate problems with unintended acceleration to include other problems as well.

The FBI and Homeland Security Department say they have no indication that terrorists are targeting the U.S. or its citizens as part of a new threat against Europe but they warn law enforcement authorities to be on the lookout for suspicious activity, as it's more difficult to detect terror plots carried out by individuals or small groups. On Sunday, the U.S. issued an alert to Americans living in or traveling to Europe to be vigilant because of the terror plots there.

**VERIZON PLANS \$50 MILLION REFUND TO CUSTOMERS****VO: 25**

Verizon Wireless admitted on Sunday it had erroneously charged customers for data services they didn't want and said it would refund more than \$50 million to those cellphone users. The announcement, among the largest customer refunds by a telecom service, comes amid complaints that users were unintentionally accessing the Web and using other data services, only to find those mistakes through extra charges on their monthly service bills. The Federal Communications Commission had been investigating the alleged practice and said Sunday it would continue its formal probe, which could lead to additional penalties on the nation's largest wireless firm. Verizon said that over several years, 15 million customers were charged from \$2 to \$6 for data services they didn't initiate. A source close to the company said Verizon Wireless will pay refunds to current and past customers for the error.

The Treasury Department says the \$700 billion financial bailout will cost far less than previously thought. A report on the program Tuesday says it will cost taxpayers about \$50 billion. Tuesday's report comes after two years of criticism about the programs that rescued banks, automakers and other failing companies. It says the programs achieved many of their goals despite being deeply unpopular. It says they prevented a deeper crisis and stabilized the financial system. **11 LATIN AMERICAN COUNTRIES AGAINST SB 1070****VO: 20**

Eleven Latin American countries want permission to urge the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals to strike down SB 1070, Arizona's anti-immigrant law. Mexico and a host of other countries petitioned the court on Monday in order to file friend of the court briefs that restate their opposition to the law. In its original language, SB 1070 would have allowed officers enforcing state, local and even civil code to pull over anyone they had "reasonable suspicion" to believe was in the country without papers. It also created a new class of state crimes and punishments for federal civil immigration violations. The law was met with international outrage and organizing. Seven lawsuits were filed challenging the law, including one by the Department of Justice.

However, the fun won't come easy with the state facing a projected \$230 million budget deficit going into the next year. Martinez said balancing the budget will be her very first priority.

**SB1070, IMMIGRATION ANGLE****JAIME GARCIA/ PHOENIX, ARIZONA****PKG 1:58**

Tuesday, Jan Brewer was able to ride Arizona's controversial immigration law all the way to victory and defeat Democratic Opponent Terry Goddard by a significant margin, but Arizona has bigger and more immediate problems than immigration despite what her campaign had voters believing. With all the coverage and excitement over Senate Bill 1070, it should come as no surprise that Brewer won the election, but if you take a look at her dismal campaign as recently as March, you'd see a completely different race. Before signing SB 1070, Brewer's election was unlikely. Opponents like Goddard had predicted that concerns over immigration would subside over the summer, but when the Department of Justice filed a lawsuit against SB 1070, it kept it on voters' minds throughout the campaign season as it was constantly in the news. "Nothing is

more important than getting our economy back on track, and yet usually what I'm asked about is my opinion of (SB) 1070 and whether the court's going to find it illegal or not," a frustrated Goddard said. "I think it's imperative that Arizona get down to the business of fixing what ails our state economy."

A coalition of 13 states has asked the U.S. Supreme Court to uphold an Arizona law penalizing employers of illegal immigrants. The Supreme Court is to hear arguments next month on a 2007 Arizona law that allows business licenses to be suspended or revoked when employers knowingly hiring illegal immigrants. The Missouri attorney general's office is leading the coalition supporting the Arizona law. The group argues in court documents released Thursday that states have long had the authority to license and regulate businesses.

## **ECONOMY AND UNEMPLOYMENT LUIS MEGID, SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA PKG 1:55**

The number of people seeking unemployment aid jumped sharply last week to 457,000. The increase undermines hopes that, after falling four times in the previous five weeks, unemployment claims were on a sustained downward trend. On Friday, the government releases its monthly unemployment figures. The jobless rate is forecast to remain 9.6 percent for the third straight month.

## **LUNG CANCER TOMOGRAPHY VO :23**

Dr. Claudia Henschke was delighted with the news -- a trial of 53,000 people had shown that screening smokers and ex-smokers for lung cancer can save lives, something she has been trying to prove for 10 years. The trial, sponsored by the National Cancer Institute and conducted with the utmost care, showed that the three-dimensional X-rays called spiral CT scans reduced deaths from lung cancer by 20 percent over just five years.

The final rule will increase overall fees by a weighted average of about 10 percent but will not increase the fee for the naturalization application. Diabetes mellitus is one of the most serious health challenges facing the estimated 27 millions Hispanics and Latinos in the United States. It is the 6th leading cause of death within this community and the 4th leading cause of death among Hispanic women and Hispanic elderly. Hispanics and Latinos are at a higher risk of developing and dying from diabetes, and twice as likely as other populations to experience complications such as heart disease , high blood pressure , kidney disease and nerve Diabetes has an earlier onset in Latinos than in other populations. Among Puerto Ricans and Mexican Americans, the age of onset is 30 to 50 years old. On average, Hispanics and Latinos are almost

twice as likely to have diabetes as non-Hispanic whites of similar age, while diabetes is two to three times more common in Mexican-American and Puerto Rican adults than in whites. Cuban Americans have a lower rate of diabetes than Mexican Americans and Puerto Ricans, but still higher than that of non-Hispanic whites. The rates of type 2 diabetes are 110% higher among Mexican Americans and 120% higher among Puerto Ricans than among non-Hispanic whites. More than 10% of all Mexican Americans 20 years or older have diabetes.

**BED BUGS IN NY SCHOOLS**

School children are now learning a very tough lesson about bed bugs as the blood sucking insects have now become a way of life in many classrooms. Peter Cohen has been teaching kindergarten for 23 years and has never seen it this bad. In the first two months of this year, we're told there were 336 confirmed cases of bed bugs in New York City public schools. Last year there were 135 cases. While bed bugs have been spreading, officials say the city has been cutting back on exterminators. Nine years ago, the city used to have 77 exterminators on hand and 149 pest control aides. Right now there are only 33 exterminators and only 28 pest control aides. We're told if school employees spot the bug, they have to capture the nasty insect first, put it in an envelope and mail it to the Department of Education. Only after experts confirm it is a bed bug will someone be sent to the school. By then the bugs will have had free reign to multiply and burrow into the building. Already, bed bugs have crashed Lincoln Center, stores, and even movie theatres. So it was only a matter of time before schools were invaded. But some officials say city response can be greatly improved.

Synopsis: In 2008, the Bush administration announced an ambitious new program to help federal officials detain and deport illegal immigrants held on criminal charges by using fingerprints collected by local police departments. But two years later, as the program is being put into effect state by state, confusion abounds in New York and elsewhere, among officials and immigrant advocates alike, about how it works and whether local participation is required. Several counties around the nation have voted to opt out of the program, called Secure Communities because of concerns that it could ensnare immigrants who have committed low-level offenses or chill crime-fighting cooperation between immigrants and the police. As recently as last week, the spokesman for New York State's criminal justice agency maintained that the program was optional for local governments. But federal officials now say that participation was never voluntary. The program, they say, will be up and running nationwide by 2013.

Synopsis: A provocative new study finds that teens who text a lot are more likely to have had sex or used alcohol and drugs than kids who don't send as many messages. The study's lead author says it's a startling to see an apparent link between excessive messaging and that kind of risky behavior. The study focused on high school students who send and receive texts at least 120 times a day or who spend at least three hours a day on Facebook or other social networking Web sites. Not a single one of the many women CHIRLA has talked to has been charged with lewd conduct; instead, many have been charged with possessing forged documents or identity theft. In addition, some are being held by the LAPD at the request of Department of Homeland Security's Immigration and Customs Enforcement (DHS-ICE) while others were served a document requesting that they come to an appointment at DHS-ICE later this month. The following are comments by Angelica Salas, executive director for the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights of Los Angeles (CHIRLA), a regional, human and immigrant rights, not-for-profit organization based in Los Angeles.

### **ARIZONA SMUGGLING RING BUST**

Arizona authorities say they've dismantled a major cell of a human smuggling ring that may be responsible for the transportation of thousands of illegal immigrants from Mexico to Phoenix and other parts of the country. Nine people are accused of picking up illegal immigrants after they crossed the border by foot, and taking them to what are known as drop houses in Phoenix before they were distributed to other parts of the country. The group also has been connected to a June 2009 vehicle rollover near the Arizona town of Sonoita that killed 11 illegal immigrants. Arizona Department of Public Safety Capt. Fred Zumbo says the group displayed a "total disregard" for human life and that law enforcement has put a "huge dent in the human smuggling arena."

### **IMMIGRATION POLL**

Today a bipartisan coalition of major immigration reform leaders gathered on a national telephonic press conference to discuss the decisive political impact of the Latino and immigrant vote in the mid-term elections. More prominent warnings on cigarette packages, including larger text labels, were mandated in a June 2009 law putting the multibillion-dollar tobacco industry under the control of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi wants to push for a vote during the lame-duck session on a bill that would legalize young, undocumented immigrants if they attend college or serve in the military, according to Democratic sources familiar with a leadership conference call Wednesday. A vote on the bill, known as the DREAM Act, could come as early as next week, the sources said. Pelosi asked Rep. George Miller (D-Calif.) and Rep. Xavier Becerra (D-Calif.) to assess the mood of the caucus, according to one source. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) had previously announced that he plans to bring up the DREAM Act during the lame duck session. His spokesman said Wednesday that Reid still hopes to call a vote. The move by Democratic leaders to put immigration back on the legislative calendar will win support from Latinos, whose strong turnout numbers in the West last week were credited with helping the party hold on to control of the Senate. Immigration advocates have pressed Democrats to move on the DREAM Act as a "down-payment" on their promise to push for a comprehensive immigration reform bill in the future. But Democrats also risk appearing out of sync with voters, who sent a message during the midterm election that they want lawmakers to focus on job creation.

**FLORIDA IMMIGRATION LAW PROPOSAL

Florida's immigration bill exempts Canadians, Europeans & 4 Asian countries from enforcement Arizona's controversial and litigated immigration law aka S.B. 1070, as amended by H.B. 2162, expressly prohibits illegal racial profiling. Several state legislatures have moved to copy the law despite its legal uncertainty due to pending litigation in the appellate courts. Florida in one of those states where the legislature is pushing hard to enact a similar law except with one small caveat. It allows for selective enforcement. Florida state Rep. William Snyder, an ex-Miami Dade Police officer who has drafted Tallahassee's version of the hotly debated Arizona immigration bill, is adamant that his bill would not lead to racial profiling. Snyder is Vice Chair of the Florida legislature's Committee on Homeland Security & Public Safety. "Race, ethnicity, and national origin cannot be used in making arrests. It's immoral, illegal, and unconstitutional," Snyder said in a recent radio interview.

E-Verify is a system jointly operated by DHS and the Social Security Administration. Employers submit prospective employees' Social Security numbers to verify the employees' eligibility to work. If there is a match, the employee is deemed eligible. If there is no match, there are detailed procedures for adjudication. For the 10 percent of the prospective employees who provide U.S. passports or U.S. passport cards as proof of their identity, E-Verify will now scan the passport photo to determine if it matches the photo on record at State, Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano announced Nov. 10.

**PIDEN APRUEBE "ACT JOB"**

Area "99ers" who have used up 99 weeks of unemployment insurance rally for congressional passage of the Americans Want to Work Act. Smith of Texas and Steve King of Iowa filed a so-called friends of the court brief urging that illegal immigrants be denied the reduced rate. The lawsuit considered by the court was part of a broader legal assault led by the immigration legal scholar Kris Kobach, who has filed numerous cases across the country seeking to restrict the rights of illegal immigrants.

**MEXICAN ID IN NORTH CAROLINA**

Durham's city council is getting an earful over a controversial plan to allow Mexican immigrants to use a special Mexican ID card for Mexican citizens living outside Mexico. The card is accepted as ID by many police departments nationwide, and many banks accept it for financial transactions. According to an opinion from the Durham City Attorney, "the official purpose of the card is to demonstrate that the holder is a Mexican citizen living outside of Mexico. It includes an official Government of Mexico issued ID number and bears a photograph and address of the Mexican National to whom it is issued." If Durham approves the resolution, city officials would accept it as a legal form of ID for business conducted with the city. Police officers would also accept it for identification purposes.

Lawmakers returned to the Capitol on Monday in a "lame duck" session after Democrats were routed in the Nov. 2 elections, with time short to enact a 2011 budget and a New Year's Eve deadline on whether to extend tax cuts enacted under former President George W. Bush. The parties agree on an extension of lower rates for individuals earning less than

\$200,000 but disagree whether to extend those rates for the highest earners. Republicans say the economy cannot stomach higher taxes; Democrats say the nation cannot afford the cost of lower rates for the wealthiest taxpayers.

### **HISPANIC CAUCUS MEETING LOURDES MELUZA- WASHINGTON, DC PKG 1:49**

President Barack Obama has called on the Senate to pass legislation this year that would allow certain foreign-born young people who entered the United States as children without documents to become legal U.S. residents. Obama urged action during a meeting Tuesday with leaders of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus . The legislation, known as the DREAM Act, failed to pass the Senate in September. It would permit young people to become U.S. residents after spending two years in college or the military. It would apply to immigrants who were under 16 when they arrived in the U.S., have been in the country at least five years and have a diploma from a U.S. high school or the equivalent. Obama also called for Congress to act on comprehensive changes to immigration law "at the earliest opportunity."

### **CONSULAR IDENTIFICATION CARD LOURDES DEL RIO- DURHAM, NORTH CAROLINA PKG 2:18**

Durham's city council voted 5-2 to tell city employees to treat the Matricula Consular de Alta Seguridad (MCAS) Consular Identification Card the same as other official identification. It's an identification card issued by the Government of Mexico through its consulate offices to Mexican citizens residing outside of Mexico regardless of their emigration status. The card is accepted as ID by many police departments nationwide, and many banks accept it for financial transactions. Police Chief Jose Lopez says officers have been accepting the Mexican IDs for the three years he's held his job. He said the city council's move would build support among the city's Hispanic residents, who have grown more willing to cooperate with police. U.S. cities began accepting the ID card issued to Mexicans living abroad a decade ago. The policy has spread to nearly 400 U.S. cities and almost 1,200 police departments.

The Food and Drug Administration has issued warning letters to four manufacturers of alcoholic energy drinks, saying the caffeine added to their beverages is an "unsafe food additive." FDA Deputy Commissioner Joshua Sharfstein said Wednesday that the agency has decided the combinations of caffeine and alcohol in the drinks is a public health concern after a yearlong review of the beverages. The FDA said the government could seize the products if the companies continue to make them. The agency said experts have raised concerns that the caffeine in the drinks can mask a person's feeling of intoxication, leading to risky behavior. One of the companies, Phusion Projects, has already said they will remove the caffeine from their alcoholic drinks.

**STUDENT LEADER IMMIGRATION**

The parents of popular Cal State Fresno Student Body President Pedro Ramirez always talked a lot about *el sueño Americano* - the American Dream. He was to study hard, get good grades and claim the prize, but it wasn't until that night in their kitchen when the high school valedictorian was filling out university applications that they told him a missing detail - he wasn't a United States citizen. He was born in Mexico. He came to this country when he was 3 years old. Now, an anonymous tip to the college newspaper has forced Ramirez to publicly expose his secret and has put this son of a maid and a restaurant worker into the

thick of a debate on immigration and education that has reached a boiling point in recent weeks. Some have called for his resignation while others have rallied to his defense.

## **US SECURITY FENCE**

The U.S. government has opted to continue development of a problematic "virtual fence" meant to secure stretches of the Mexican border for an additional 30 days, authorities said Wednesday. The Department of Homeland Security said it has exercised a contract extension through Dec. 18 with Boeing Co which has been developing the ill-starred SBInet program on parts of the southern Arizona border since 2006. "DHS is currently reviewing the independent, quantitative, science-based reassessment of the SBInet program," DHS spokesman Matt Chandler said in a statement.

## **TSA CHIEF ON PATDOWNS**

The head of the Transportation Security Administration acknowledges that the new pat-downs are more invasive than what travelers were used to. John Pistole says he has received the new pat-down, as has his boss, Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano. Some travelers complain that the new inspections target sensitive body areas. Pistole says he understands those concerns, but he tells a Senate panel that the government must provide the best possible security for air travelers.

**ECONOMY LOSTS FOR SB-1070 IN ARIZONA**

A new report shows the boycott of Arizona in the wake of a controversial immigration law has cost the state more than \$140 million. The analysis commissioned by the Center for American Progress says lost hotel revenue in the first four months after the bill signing was about \$45 million. The study released on Thursday says meetings and conventions will probably continue to be lost for more than a year. That will multiply the impact of a boycott called by immigrant-rights groups after Republican Gov. Jan Brewer signed the state's new law in April. The study was paid for by the group, a liberal-leaning think tank, but conducted by the respected Scottsdale-based economic firm Elliott D. Pollack & Co. He will talk to businesses affected by it, analyst and will get reactions of people that are in favor of the law.

**CHARLES RANGEL SENTENCING**

The House ethics committee's chief counsel recommended Thursday that veteran Rep. Charles Rangel be censured for financial and fundraising misconduct as lawmakers neared closure on an embarrassing 2 1/2-year-long scandal. Chief counsel Blake Chisam called for the punishment despite the veteran New York congressman's plea, in a prepared statement in advance of the hearing, for "a drop of fairness and mercy." If Chisam's recommendation is carried out, it would be the most serious punishment short of expulsion that could be meted out by the House. Chisam and Rangel argued their positions at a public hearing on sanctions, where the 80-year-old congressman acknowledged making mistakes in handling his finances and said he wasn't there to "retry this case."

**GM STOCK MARKET/OBAMA**

General Motors stock began trading on Wall Street again Thursday, signaling the rebirth of an American corporate icon that collapsed into bankruptcy and was rescued with a \$50 billion infusion from taxpayers. The stock rose sharply in its first minutes of buying and selling, going for nearly \$36 per share -- almost \$3 more than the price GM set for the initial public offering. The stock pulled back

slightly by early afternoon. It had traded for less than a dollar when the old company filed for bankruptcy last year. On the floor of the New York Stock Exchange, a crowd eight deep jostled around the company's trading post, adorned with its familiar blue-square logo with an underlined "GM." CEO Dan Akerson rang the opening bell as raucous cheers went up and the sound of a Chevrolet Camaro's revving engine echoed through the room.

**MIAMI BAGGAGE SCAM**

Dozens of curbside baggage handlers at Miami International Airport accepted cash payoffs from travelers to check in extra or overweight bags or boxes -- creating a possible security risk and adding extra, unrecorded pounds to airliners, authorities said. Miami-Dade police on Wednesday arrested 15 baggage handlers employed by Eulen America, the company contracted to check in luggage for American Airlines. More will likely be arrested in coming days, police said, and others could be fired without facing charges. Most of the baggage handlers -- known as skycaps -- are charged with participating in an organized scheme to defraud and grand theft. With 1,400 workers, Eulen is the second-largest employer at MIA. Its skycaps weigh bags and collect fees for American, all of which are supposed to be paid with credit cards, not cash. Lourdes will talk to the police about the arrest and how they discover the scam also about the security issue, she will also have passengers and the company involved.

**MARRIAGE OBSOLETE**

Marriage is increasingly optional and could be on its way to obsolescence, according to a survey of more than 2,600 Americans that examines changing attitudes about relationships today. Among the 2,691 adults surveyed by the Pew Research Center last month, 39% say marriage is becoming obsolete, up from 28% who responded to the same question posed by *Time* magazine in 1978. "If four in 10 are saying it's becoming obsolete, they're registering an awareness of a very important social change," says Paul Taylor of Pew. "It doesn't necessarily mean marriage is about to disappear or has disappeared." Census data reflect a declining percentage of married adults: 54% in 2010, down from 57% in 2000 and 72% in 1960. At the same time, the median age at first marriage increased in 2010 to its highest ever - 28.2 for men and 26.1 for women, according to Census. That's up from 26.8 and 25.1 in 2000.

For some travelers, thanksgiving will be their first taste of this - new measures some call intrusive, others ineffective. But, TSA officials say it's working. Body scanners have already captured passengers trying to smuggle marijuana, whiskey, even knives. The head of the Transportation Security Administration says the close-quarter body inspections causing a furor among some passengers and pilots are unavoidable in a time of terrorist threats.

## **GROUND ZERO SETTLEMENT**

### **VO**

- More than 10,000 workers suffering health problems stemming from the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks on the World Trade Center have agreed to a \$712 million settlement with New York City, officials said Friday. More than 95 percent of the 10,563 workers had to agree to the deal for it to go ahead. The Garretson Resolution Group, which has been assessing the claims, said in a letter to the federal judge overseeing the case that 95.1 percent of the workers -- 10,043 -- had submitted documents agreeing to the settlement. The money will come from a federally financed insurance fund, the WTC Captive Insurance Company, created in 2004 with a \$1 billion grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The firefighters, police, contractors and others who worked at "Ground Zero" in the ruins of the World Trade Center sued the city and its contractors for claims of injuries associated with their rescue and clean-up work.

## **NYPD INTERPRETERS**

When Esther Jimenez called the police to her Staten Island home last year, she showed them the scratches on her arm. She told them that her husband had attacked her in front of their children. He had pushed her into a wall, she said, and knocked their youngest child from her arms. Esther Jimenez said police officers did not get her an interpreter after they responded to a 911 call to her Staten Island apartment. A federal review has found the Police Department to be inconsistent in dealings with non-English speakers, like Esther Jimenez. But the officers could not understand: She spoke only Spanish. They spoke English.

## **LAME DUCK CONGRESS**

Jobless benefits will run out for 2 million people during the holiday season unless

they are renewed by a Congress that's focusing more attention on a quarrel over preserving tax cuts for people making more than \$200,000 a year. It's looking iffy at best whether Congress will renew jobless benefits averaging \$310 per week nationwide that are presently claimed by almost 5 million people who have been out of work for more than six months. An extension of jobless benefits enacted this summer expires Dec. 1, and on Thursday, a bill to extend them for three months failed in the House. Democrats brought the bill to the floor under fast-track rules that required a two-thirds vote to pass. Republicans opposed the legislation because they were denied a chance to attach spending cuts, so the measure fell despite winning a 258-154 majority. In Thursday's vote, 21 Republicans joined with Democrats in favor. Eleven moderate-to-conservative Democrats opposed the bill.

**TPS BENEFITS PROBLEMS

During the past year, DHS and the Department of State have reviewed the conditions. Based on this review, Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano has determined that an 18-month extension is necessary because conditions that prompted the 2001 TPS re-designation of Somalia continue, and the return of individuals with TPS to Somalia would pose a serious threat to their personal safety. Under the extension, individuals who have been granted TPS are eligible to re-register and maintain their status for an additional 18 months. There are approximately 300 nationals of Somalia (and people having no nationality who last habitually resided in Somalia) who may be eligible for re-registration. TPS does not apply to Somali nationals who first entered the United States after Sept. 4, 2001.

**OBAMA DEFENSA ANTIMISILES

U.S. President Barack Obama used the international stage Saturday to press his Republican opponents in Congress to ratify a new nuclear arms deal with Russia. Russian President Dmitry Medvedev also urged U.S. lawmakers to approve the START treaty swiftly and six European foreign ministers echoed the appeal in a joint appearance at a NATO summit in Lisbon. The treaty, signed by Obama and Medvedev in April, commits the United States and Russia to cutting deployed nuclear weapons by about 30 percent -- to no more than 1,550 -- within seven years. It also includes verification measures. Obama says the treaty is vital because it allows U.S. inspectors to gather accurate intelligence about the

state of Russia's nuclear stockpile. "There is a time element to do this. We don't have any mechanism to verify what is going on right now on the ground in Russia," he told a news conference.

## **OBAMA AIRPORT SECURITY VO: 22**

President Barack Obama says he understands the frustrations of U.S. airline passengers who are subject to intrusive security screenings. He says he's asked security officials whether there's a less intrusive approach. But Obama says that security officials have told him that the current procedures are the only ones considered effective enough right now to guard against terrorist threats. Obama doesn't have to pass through normal airport security himself, so he says he hasn't experienced the new patdowns and imaging devices now in use. Obama spoke at a news conference during the NATO summit in Portugal.

## **OBAMA AFGHANISTAN VO: 24**

On Afghanistan, a main topic of the NATO sessions, Obama said for the first time that his goal is to end the type of U.S. combat missions now under way in Afghanistan by the end of 2014, although it's "hard to anticipate" the exact American role by then -- and beyond. Obama met with Afghan President Hamid Karzai, with whom the U.S. has engaged in a series of public disputes. Obama said his partnership with the Afghan leader is a "two-way street." He acknowledged concerns voiced by Karzai about the continued U.S. military presence and civilian casualties. "I don't fault President Karzai for raising those issues. On the other hand, he's got to understand that I've got a bunch of young men and women ... being shot at and having to traverse terrain filled with IEDs (improvised explosive devices) and they need to protect themselves. "And so if we're setting things up where they're just sitting ducks for the Taliban, that's not an acceptable answer either.

**HILLARY ON PATDOWNS****VO: 22**

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said she would not want to submit to an airport security pat-down, one of the new "enhanced" measures instituted by the Transportation Safety Administration ahead of the holiday season to screen airline passengers. "Not if I could avoid it. No, I mean, who would?" Clinton said during an interview aired on Sunday's "Face the Nation." Clearly, as Secretary Napolitano has said, we're doing this because the terrorists keep getting more creative about what they do to hide explosives. You know, crazy things like underwear," Clinton told host Bob Schieffer. "So clearly, there is a need."

**WOMEN STRESSFUL JOB ATTACKS****VO: 22**

Working women are equal to men in a way they'll wish they weren't. Female workers with stressful jobs were more likely than women with less job strain to suffer a heart attack or a stroke or to have clogged arteries, a big U.S. government-funded study found. Worrying about losing a job can raise heart risks too, researchers found. The results seem sure to resonate in a weak economy with plenty of stress about jobs - or lack of them. The mere fact this study was done is a sign of the times: Past studies focused on men, the traditional breadwinners, and found that higher job stress raised heart risks. This is the longest major one to look at stress in women, who now make up nearly half

of the U.S. workforce.

## **ALZHEIMERS & LATINOS**

Alzheimer's exacts a heavy toll among Latino Americans, who tend to get the condition almost seven years earlier than white Americans, according to research from the University of Pennsylvania and UC San Francisco. Limited access to medical care and health insurance, lower levels of education and income, and higher rates of high blood pressure and diabetes contribute to above-average risks for Alzheimer's among Latino seniors, experts say. The Alzheimer's Assn. calls the situation "a looming but unrecognized public health crisis" and predicts that Alzheimer's and related dementias could afflict 1.3 million older Latinos by 2050, up from about 200,000 currently.

USCIS published the new fee schedule in the Federal Register on Sept. 24, following a comprehensive review of public comments received after publication of the proposed rule this summer. The new fee schedule increases application and petition fees by an average of about 10 percent but does not increase the naturalization application fee.

## **SECURITY PATDOWNS**

Half of Americans say the enhanced passenger security patdowns at U.S. airports go too far, according to a poll published Tuesday just before the busy holiday travel season. But nearly two-thirds of those surveyed in the Washington Post-ABC News poll support the new full-body security-screening machines at the airports, as most say they put higher priority on preventing terrorism than protecting personal privacy. The poll found that 50 percent said the new patdown searches were unjustified, while 48 percent supported them and 2 percent had no opinion. The recently adopted screening methods that have drawn complaints from passengers and lawmakers in Congress rely on highly revealing full-body imaging scanners and physical patdowns for travelers who choose to opt out of the scans. Airlines expect 24 million people to travel over the Thanksgiving holiday period. Airlines say they have passed along passenger concerns to the Transportation Security Administration, the agency responsible for the new procedures.

## **MIGRANTS TRAVELING TO MEXICO**

The Mexican government is telling migrants driving home for the holidays that they should form convoys for their own safety while traveling through Mexico. The Interior Department said the government could even provide escorts for such convoys to get them through dangerous areas. It said the Mexican army would assist in the program to help migrants return safely from the United States. Mexico is experiencing unprecedented levels of drug cartel violence in some border areas, making it dangerous to travel on some highways, particularly those in the Gulf coast state of Tamaulipas and some leading to the northern city of Monterrey. In the past, those routes have been heavily used by migrants returning to their hometowns. Migrants have also been targeted in the past by common criminals for robberies or extortion because they often bring new vehicles, cash or appliances with them.

**HIV PREVENTION****LUIS MEGID- SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA****PKG 1:47**

A major study shows for the first time that a drug duo widely used to treat the AIDS virus can block HIV infection, researchers said today. The drugs tenofovir and emtricitabine, packaged as a once-daily pill and sold in drugstores as Truvada, reduced HIV infections by an average of 44% among gay and bisexual men who took the drug, compared with those taking a placebo. Men who reported being the most diligent about taking their pill each day reaped an even bigger benefit, reducing their risk by 73%.

The fact that U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) granted you authorization to work legally in the U.S. while your adjustment of status (AOS) application is pending does not mean that it is safe for you to travel abroad just yet. You did not specify your status before you married a U.S. citizen, but we assume, since you have not been home in a while, that you currently are undocumented. If you have been unlawfully present in the U.S. for 180 days to a year and you travel abroad (including even a day trip to Canada or Mexico) before you are granted legal permanent resident status, you face a three-year bar from reentering the U.S. Unlawful presence for a year or more triggers a ten-year bar. These bars would apply to you despite your marriage to a U.S. citizen and pending AOS application. Likewise, the fact that you may have U.S. citizen children who were born here does not alter the situation. Therefore, it is crucial that you remain in the U.S. until you are granted legal permanent resident status at or after your green card interview in the USCIS offices here. Then you will be able to travel abroad for periods of up to six months and return to the U.S. with no problem and no need to apply for permission. Note: a green card holder who travels abroad for more than six months is in a different situation and should obtain legal advice before such a trip.

With home buying season over and no tax credit to boost sales, Ocala sales fell 21 percent in October, on pace with the state slump, but foreclosures and short sales pushed median prices below \$80,000 for the first time in more than seven years. Florida Realtors reported 252 sales for the Ocala metro area, down 21 percent from 317 in October 2009 and the lowest total since 203 sales in January. It marked the second straight month of year-over-year declines after a year and a half of gains. Nationwide, foreclosures and short sales accounted for 34 percent of sales in October, but Ocala's housing market was particularly hard hit by the bust after years of new construction. One of every 251 Marion County homes was in the foreclosure process in October, according to RealtyTrac.

**DREAM ACT PRESSURE**

The DREAM Act is a narrowly tailored legislative remedy for a specific population: undocumented students who were brought to the United States as minors, and have attended and completed elementary and secondary education in the US. The Supreme Court ruled in *Plyer v. Doe* (1982) that these students are not to be held liable for their immigration status and therefore are entitled to public elementary and secondary education. However, current law does not provide clear paths to citizenship or higher education for these students following

high school graduation. The DREAM Act would provide those paths, and would return to the states the right to determine whether qualified undocumented students should be eligible for in-state tuition. The DREAM Act does **not** require states to provide any benefits to undocumented students, nor does it make these students eligible for federal financial aid. NACAC supports the DREAM Act as a college access initiative, and has been working on its passage since 2001.

A Northern California city is moving forward with plans for a municipal identification card that is being touted as the first in the nation that would double as a full-fledged debit card. Card holders would also be able to load money onto their cards and use them wherever ATM cards are welcome. The two-year freeze would apply to all civilian federal employees, including those working at the Department of Defense, but would not affect military personnel. The freeze, which requires congressional approval, is expected to save more than \$5 billion in savings over two years, \$28 billion over five years and more than \$60 billion over 10 years, White House officials said.

Supporters say passage is critical after widespread outbreaks in peanuts, eggs and produce. #### **DREAM ACT, WHAT'S GOING ON LOURDES MELUZA/ WASHINGTON, DC PKG 2:30**

Late last night, Majority Leader Reid (D-NV) filed a new version of the DREAM Act with the aim of attracting broader support for DREAM to get the requisite 60 votes to pass the Senate. With the filing of this new bill, the anticipated date for bringing DREAM to a vote will be delayed. The earliest Reid could file a cloture motion on the new bill would be this coming Thursday. After waiting out the requisite 30 hours post-cloture, it could "ripen" over the weekend, and effectively come up for a vote on Monday at the earliest. The new version addresses many of the concerns raised by Republicans and tightens the restrictions on eligibility in several respects. Among other changes, the new version does the following: Excludes from eligibility those with certain criminal convictions, such as for offenses punishable by a maximum term of more than 1 year (felony) or 3 misdemeanors.

#### **DREAM ACT SIDEBAR JAIME GARCIA / LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA PKG 2:08**

A new report from the Center for Immigration Studies examines the costs and likely impact of the DREAM Act currently being considered by Congress. The act offers permanent legal status to illegal immigrants up to age 35, who arrived in the United States before age 16, provided they complete two years of college. Under the act, beneficiaries would receive in-state tuition. Given the low income of illegal immigrants, most can be expected to attend state schools, with a cost to taxpayers in the billions of dollars. As both funds and slots are limited at state universities and community colleges, the act may reduce the educational opportunities available to U.S. citizens.

#### **FLORIDA LAW SIMILAR TO SB1070 VO: 24**

A port security initiative has led to the indictment of 10 people in an international drug smuggling ring, including six Miami longshoremen who used their access to



unload the cocaine, heroin and marijuana, federal officials said Wednesday. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Director John Morton said the case serves to highlight the work of 21 multi-agency task forces around the country, led by ICE, focused on disrupting large-scale criminal activity at seaports and border entry points nationwide. It's particularly important, he said, to root out corrupt employees and government officials who help smugglers, illicit arms dealers, money launderers and possibly even terrorists move around the world. "The system must have integrity. Internal corruption of any kind cannot be tolerated," Morton said at a news conference with other South Florida law enforcement officials. "Our ports are open for business, but only for legitimate business."

**UNEMPLOYMENT EXT IN STALEMATE**

Members of the president's deficit commission will begin weighing in on a controversial plan being presented by the panel's co-chairmen today. ## **OBAMA USA-TAXES/SENATE VO: 32**

Democratic measures to extend tax cuts for most Americans, but not additional low rates for the wealthiest, failed in the U.S. Senate Saturday, as Republicans and some Democrats blocked the plans. The two Democratic plans to renew low tax rates for individual income up to \$200,000 and up to \$1 million both failed in procedural votes, as Republicans argued that low tax rates for the wealthiest should also be extended. "It's not that we want to punish wealthy people," said Democratic Senator Charles Schumer, who had proposed extending the tax rates for those earning up to \$1 million. "But they are doing fine and they are not going to spend the money and stimulate the economy." No Republicans backed the Democratic proposals, and a few Democrats voted against them. The rare Saturday votes were expected to fail, but Democrats wanted to show that they didn't support an extension of the lower rates for higher-income individuals.

## **KIDS EATING DISORDERS BLANCA ROSA VÍLCHEZ/ NEW YORK, NY PKG 1:58**

At the same time that obesity rates are on the rise, a growing number of children in the US under the age of 12 are also struggling with eating disorders, according to research released Monday by the American Academy of Pediatrics. Between 1999 and 2006, the number of youngsters hospitalized with eating disorders increased by 119 percent, according to the research, authored by Dr. David Rosen, a professor of pediatrics, internal medicine and psychiatry at University of Michigan. The research also showed that the long-held belief that patients suffering from severe anorexia or bulimia are affluent, white and female is changing. Both boys and minorities are experiencing eating disorders at increasing rates. "We are seeing a lot more eating disorders than we used to and we are seeing it in people we didn't associate with eating disorders in the past -- a lot of boys, little kids, people of color and those with lower socioeconomic backgrounds," said report Rosen. "We wanted people to understand eating disorders are equal-opportunity disorders."

### **TAX CUTS McCONNELL**

### **AIRPORT SECURITY BILL**

A New York senator wants to make it illegal for anyone to distribute or record images produced by full-body scanners at airports. U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer introduced a bill Sunday that calls for punishing anyone who misuses full-body scan images by up to a year in prison. They could also face fines of up to \$100,000. Privacy advocates say there are insufficient safeguards to ensure that the revealing images produced by the machines remain private. The X-ray scans from the machines can see through people's clothing. The Transportation Security Administration says the images cannot be stored, transmitted or printed and they are deleted after use. Passengers can opt instead for a pat-down that includes the crotch and chest.

Questions remained about how many concessions Obama could extract from Republicans in exchange for extending current tax rates for high earners, a proposal he opposed. But without action, lawmakers face the prospect of delivering a tax hike to all taxpayers at the end of the year, when the current rates expire and revert to higher pre-2001 and 2003 levels. Negotiations between the Obama administration and a bipartisan group of lawmakers centered on a two-year extension of current rates.

The fight over California's same-sex marriage ban reached the next legal level Monday when it went Before a federal appeals court during a nationally televised hearing in San Francisco. A line of questioning at an appeals court hearing over California's gay marriage ban suggested the three judges could issue a decision that would legalize same-sex marriage in that state but leave intact bans in other western states under the court's jurisdiction. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals heard nearly three hours of arguments Monday during a televised hearing that reached a nationwide audience anxious for a final decision

on whether voter-approved Proposition 8 and similar same-sex marriage bans violate the U.S. Constitution. The judges appeared troubled over whether they could recognize marriage as a civil right for all same-sex couples or only those in states that already grant gays the rights of marriage without the title.

Oakland will soon be following in San Francisco's footsteps by offering a new municipal identification card to homeless people, immigrants and other residents who might have trouble obtaining a state identification card. But Oakland's ID card will double as an ATM debit card, the first of its kind in the country. The ATM debit card can be used to buy groceries or goods and services wherever ATM cards are welcome, allowing people without bank accounts to avoid high check-cashing fees or walking around with large amounts of cash. Councilmember Ignacio De La Fuente has been trying to get an ID card system for Oakland residents since the state rejected efforts to issue drivers licenses to illegal immigrants in 2004. The City Council voted in June 2009 to issue municipal identification cards and issued a request for proposals. On Nov. 9, the council voted to accept the bid of SF Mexico Services LLC to administer the program and issue the ID/debit cards at no cost to the city.

LAPD Chief Charlie Beck is expected to present a written response to Bershon's report to the commission Tuesday. After completing sweeping reforms ordered by federal officials, the LAPD still remains under federal supervision on a handful of issues, including racial profiling, and must persuade the Justice Department that it can adequately police itself before federal scrutiny can be withdrawn.

Toyota Motor Corp said Monday it would recall about 110,000 of the 2011 Sienna minivans due to a risk that drivers could damage the brake system as they use the parking brake. The Sienna is an all-new model. Toyota said it was not aware of any accidents or injuries related to this issue, and that it would notify owners in January of the problem. But the fix will be delayed until replacement parts are available in February, Toyota said, when it will ask owners to bring the minivans to dealers for installation of new parts. Toyota said that in some cases drivers had damaged a bracket connected to the brake lights by pressing on the parking brake. That could cause the brake lights to stay on, or in some cases cause the vehicle's regular brake to be partially engaged at all times, causing noise and vibration.

## **HEALTH CARE RULING LUIS MEGID- SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA PKG 1:55**

A U.S. judge in Virginia Monday declared a key part of President Barack Obama's landmark healthcare law unconstitutional in the first major setback on an issue that will likely end up at the Supreme Court. U.S. District Judge Henry Hudson, appointed to the bench by President George W. Bush in 2002, backed the state of Virginia's argument that Congress exceeded its authority by requiring Americans to start buying health insurance in 2014 or face a fine. But he declined to invalidate the entire healthcare law, a small victory for Obama, whose administration will appeal the decision. The law is a cornerstone of Obama's presidency, aiming to expand health insurance to cover millions of uninsured Americans while trying to curb costs. Obama told the Tampa television station WFLA he was confident the courts would uphold the healthcare act. Healthcare insurers, which include companies such as Aetna Inc and WellPoint Inc, largely opposed Obama's reforms but say the individual mandate is critical so additional customers can offset greater industry costs.

## **USA HEALTH CARE APPEAL VO: 24**

The Justice Department said Tuesday it intends to appeal to a U.S. appeals court a ruling by a judge in Virginia declaring a key part of President Barack Obama's landmark healthcare law unconstitutional. Department spokeswoman Tracy Schmalzer said the Virginia lawsuit at issue was one of a number of cases concerning the law pending before courts around the country, including four in which challenges were unsuccessful. "Virginia's suit is based on a state statute that is not applicable nationwide, and the department believes this case should follow the ordinary course of allowing the courts of appeals to hear it first so the issues and arguments can be fully developed before the Supreme Court decides whether to consider it," she said in a statement. Some Republican opponents

have said the case should go next to the Supreme Court, bypassing the appeals court. By going through the appeals court, it could take more than a year for the issue to end up at the Supreme Court.

President Barack Obama's tax plan got a boost on Tuesday when a top Democrat in the House , where the plan faces its stiffest resistance, said there were "compelling reasons" to back it. The bullish comments from Democratic Majority Leader Steny Hoyer signaled opposition is dissipating among Democrats who believe that Obama's \$858 billion tax deal, brokered with the opposition Republicans, is too generous to the wealthy. The Senate cleared a key procedural hurdle on Monday, with a bipartisan group of 83 of the 100 members voting in favor of moving the bill forward. A vote in the Senate was expected late on Tuesday or shortly after midnight on Wednesday, with the House taking up the measure during the day Wednesday. Obama and most of his fellow Democrats had pushed for extension of the tax cuts enacted by former President George W. Bush only on household income of up to \$250,000. But Democrats lost control of the House and saw their margins shrink in the Senate in the Nov. 2 elections, pushing Obama to strike the deal before the bolstered Republicans take more power in January.

The House has voted to repeal the "don't ask, don't tell" policy that has stifled the service of gays in the military. The strong House vote to end the policy that since 1993 has barred openly gay people from military service shifts the debate to the Senate. There, Democratic leaders are trying to squeeze in a vote in the final hours of this session of Congress. President Barack Obama and others trying to repeal the policy are anxious to get a vote this year. Their concern is that Republicans, who take over the House and gain strength in the Senate next year, will move the issue to the legislative back burner.

## **DREAM ACT MOMENTUM**

Last night, leaders of the Reform Immigration FOR America campaign, the United We Dream Coalition, their partners and their congressional champions joined on a massive telephone call of more than 10,000 to discuss the prospects for DREAM in the U.S. Senate. ## **US SUES BP & 7 OTHERS**

The U.S. Justice Department on Wednesday sued BP and eight other companies in the Gulf oil spill disaster in an effort to recover (b) billions of dollars from the largest offshore spill in US history. The Obama administration's lawsuit asks that the companies be held liable without limitation under the Oil Pollution Act for all removal costs and damages caused by the oil spill, including damages to natural resources. The lawsuit also seeks civil penalties under the Clean Water Act. "We intend to prove these violations caused or contributed to the massive oil spill," Attorney General Eric Holder told a news conference in Washington. The amount of damages and the extent of injuries sustained by the United States as a result

of the Deepwater Horizon Spill are not yet fully known, the lawsuit states. An explosion that killed 11 workers at BP's Macondo well last April led to oil spewing from the company's undersea well - more than 200 (m) million gallons in all by the government's estimate. BP disputes the figure.

**STEM CELL BREAKTHROUGH**

Doctors in Berlin, working with an American patient with both HIV and leukemia, have declared in a peer-reviewed journal that they believe they have cured both illnesses. It would be the first time an HIV patient has been cured. The procedure is creating a buzz in the HIV academic community in the United States. Experts here call the development encouraging, but warn that years of work remain before the treatment could lead to a general therapy against HIV. 'Cured' is a strong word. But this is very encouraging," said Dr. David Scadden, co-director of the Harvard University Stem Cell Institute. "From all indications, there was no residual virus. It's as good an outcome as one could hope."

### **BANK OF AMERICA FRAUD**

Bank of America Corp. violated Arizona's consumer fraud law by misleading consumers who tried to reduce their mortgage payments so they could keep their homes, state Attorney General Terry Goddard said Friday as he filed a civil lawsuit against the bank. The bank also violated the terms of a 2009 consent agreement requiring the bank's Countrywide mortgage subsidiary to implement a loan modification program, the lawsuit alleges. Hundreds of homeowners kept making their mortgage payments because Bank of America repeatedly assured them their loan was being modified, he said. Instead, many lost their homes anyway.

### **NEBRASKA IMMIGRANT TUITION**

A Nebraska judge on Friday threw out a lawsuit challenging a state law that allows some illegal immigrants to pay in-state college tuition. The lawsuit filed in January on behalf of six Nebraska residents claimed their taxes were being used to support the state's immigration-tuition law in violation of federal law. The lawsuit named the University of Nebraska Board of Regents and other state college boards as defendants and asked the judge to prevent schools officials from following the law. Jefferson County District Judge Paul Korslund said in his ruling that the Nebraska residents who filed the suit should have first gone to the federal government to ask it to challenge the law before such a case could be heard in the state courts.

### **TAX CUT EXTENSION**

The debate over gays in the military has been settled with a historic decision to allow them to serve openly, but big questions lie ahead about how and when the change will take place, how troops will accept it and whether it will hamper the U.S. military effort in Afghanistan and Iraq. President Barack Obama is expected to sign into law this week the legislation that passed the Senate on Saturday, an act some believe will carry social implications as profound as President Harry S. Truman's 1948 executive order on racial equality in the military. The new law probably won't go into practice for months. The term "holiday heart syndrome" was coined in 1978 when researchers detected heart rhythm abnormalities in 24 study participants, none of whom had a history of heart disease. What they all did have was too much to drink, too fast. Since then, several studies have confirmed alcohol's heart rhythm-disturbing effects. The most common abnormal heart rhythm, atrial fibrillation, occurs when the upper heart chambers quiver instead of contracting regularly. Although it's often asymptomatic, it can lead to congestive heart failure or stroke. As the moniker suggests, holiday heart syndrome peaks on weekends and at holidays. Although alcohol alone can derail normal heart rhythms, its effects are exaggerated when mixed with caffeine. Rimmerman warned against the popular practice of mixing alcohol with energy drinks, calling it a "very bad combination."

The alert stressed that there is no intelligence about an active terror plot, but travelers may notice airport screeners taking a closer look at empty insulated containers. The Transportation Security Administration "is carefully monitoring information related to terrorist tactics" in coordination with other nations, TSA spokeswoman Sterling Payne said in a statement Thursday. "The possible tactics terrorists might use include the concealment of explosives inside insulated beverage containers, so in the coming days, passengers flying within and to the U.S. may notice additional security measures related to insulated beverage containers."

## **ONLINE HOLIDAY SHOPPING JUMPS 15 PERCENT**

Online spending rose 15 percent during the holidays, new data shows, as more Americans responded to online sales and free shipping offers and shifted more of their dollars online. Total online sales between Oct. 31 and Thursday rose 15.4 percent to a record \$36.4 billion, compared with \$31.5 billion a year ago, according to figures released Thursday from MasterCard Advisors' SpendingPulse, which tracks spending across all transactions including cash. Several categories, including clothing and electronics, gained share of overall category sales as well. ## **US FLIGHT CANCELATIONS**

A rare white Christmas is complicating life for some travelers after airlines canceled hundreds of flights, while snow is predicted for the nation's Capital and travel authorities are warning of potentially dangerous roads. The National Weather Service said the storm could bring more than 5 inches of snow to the Washington region. Meteorologist Stephen Konarik said the storm could hit the area Sunday morning and end Sunday night or early Monday, with the peak snowfall Sunday afternoon and early evening. Brian Korty at the National Weather Service said travelers in the northern Mid-Atlantic region New England may want to rethink Sunday travel plans. ## **HEALTH INSURANCE RULES**

California will create an Internet-based insurance exchange to let consumers comparison-shop for affordable health insurance coverage under two of the many laws taking effect with the new year. Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger signed bills in September making California the first state to authorize an oversight

board for an insurance exchange marketplace since the federal health care overhaul was enacted earlier this year. Massachusetts implemented its exchange before the federal reforms. The Republican governor and Democratic legislative leaders who carried SB900 and AB1602 said the companion bills will drive down costs and give consumers more options by promoting competition between health insurance companies. Republican lawmakers countered that the measures create an expensive new health care bureaucracy even before the federal law takes effect in 2014. Supporters said the five-member board overseeing the California Health Benefit Exchange will need those three years to hire staff, set up the program, select health plans to participate and enroll Californians needing health insurance.

## **JANET NAPOLITANO SECURITY**

The use of full-body scanners and invasive pat-downs at airports around the country will not change for the "foreseeable future," Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano said in an interview broadcast Sunday. While saying that she is always looking to improve the security systems in place, Napolitano added that the new technology and the pat-downs were "objectively safer for our traveling public." Napolitano dismissed a recent news report about major airports failing secrets tests designed to get contraband such as guns and knives past security screeners. The report said some airports had a 70 percent failure rate. "Many of them are very old and out of date and there were all kinds of methodology issues with them. Let's set those aside," she said on "State of the Union" on CNN. "We pick up more contraband with the new procedures and the new machinery." Napolitano defended the director of national intelligence, James Clapper, who didn't know about a roundup of terrorist suspects in Britain when asked about the arrests on ABC News earlier this week. The gaffe created an awkward moment for the man in charge of the nation's intelligence community.

## **BRAIN SOCIAL STUDY**

If you spend time with a lot of friends, a part of your brain may be unusually large. That part is called the amygdala (uh-MIG'-duh-luh), and it's deep in your brain. Researchers found that among volunteers who got brain scans, those with a bigger amygdala tended to report seeing more friends and family regularly. Lisa Feldman Barrett of Northeastern University reports the work in a paper published online Sunday by the journal Nature Neuroscience. She says the result makes sense because the amygdala is at the center of a brain network that's important for socializing. The study couldn't show whether a bigger amygdala leads to more friends, or vice versa. Barrett says the influence might run in both directions.

The number of people applying for unemployment benefits last week fell to its lowest level since July 2008. New jobless claims dropped 34,000 to 388,000, the fewest since July 2008, the Labor Department said Thursday. The level of applications has either fallen or remained unchanged in five of the past six weeks. Unemployment applications below 425,000 signal modest job growth. But economists say applications need to fall consistently to 375,000 or below to indicate a significant decline in unemployment. Applications for unemployment benefits peaked during the recession at 651,000 in March 2009. The level of applications can be particularly volatile during the holidays. But a department analyst said no unusual factors affected the report. Analysts said what matters most is the downward trend. "If we can continue this improving trend, we'll likely see stronger job growth in 2011," said Benjamin Reitzes, an economist at BMO Capital Markets. Applications are the closest thing to a real-time snapshot of the job market. They reflect the level of layoffs but can also indicate whether companies are willing to add workers. The four-week average, a less-volatile measure, dropped 12,500 to 414,000 in the week ending Dec. 25. That's the lowest level since late July 2008.
