Good evening, it's Friday, July 1st.

An update now in a story we brought you last week as police have arrested three for breaking a window at a historic mill in Claremont. City police have arrested three male juveniles, all around the age of 13, for breaking a window on June 19th at the Topstone Mill Building. Their identities are being withheld because of their status as minors and it appears that these suspects are not responsible for the robbery of six patio seat cushions the day before from the Time-Out All Americana Grill. The window breaking incident was reported to have happened the night of the 19th where the juveniles smashed eight window panels. Claremont Police are still investigating a string of robberies that took place on the same weekend at other parts around town, including Durham Avenue, Little Lane, and West Pleasant Street, which all appear to be unrelated to the vandalism. If you know anything in any of these cases, please contact Claremont Police at 603-542-9538.

Staying in Claremont tonight but on a different note, a popular boat launch on the Connecticut River will be closed for a short while while silt removal is completed. The Ashley Ferry public boat access launch on Route 12A will be closed starting next Tuesday, July 5th so that the ramp can be cleared of silt that has accumulated over the years. The ramp was built 16 years ago and is the only improved ramp between Cornish and Cheshire. Fortunately enough, the ramp will be reopened three days later on July 8th, next Friday, ahead of the weekend. During the silt dredging, a turbidity curtain, which is a plastic shield placed in the water, will be installed at the end of the ramp. This device catches silt and clay floating in the water as a result of the dredging, which keeps it from entering the main river and floating away or settling elsewhere. Authorities are reminding people that there will be no opportunity to launch or retrieve their boats from the Ashley Ferry launch during that time.

The tale continues tonight for a historic bridge over the Connecticut River between Walpole and Bellows Falls. Now, federal authorities are weighing in and say that actions will be taken in the near future. *The Eagle Times* reports that the US Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration says that although they have not replied to a letter regarding the future of the bridge, they certainly intend to. The letter was written by Charlene Vaughn of the Office of Federal Agency Programs to the FHWA, wondering what the NHDOT had planned for the bridge and if they had even drawn up a maintenance plan for the span. So far, authorities have replied by saying that the main issue is funding. The bridge, which is jointly owned by both states, was closed back in March of 2009 by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation after a semi-annual inspection deemed the structure unsafe due to deteriorating concrete. It is closed to traffic but currently carries sewage from Walpole to Bellows Falls for treatment, as part of an agreement.

It's going without saying that this weekend will be an exciting one for everybody here in our region and across the nation. Good evening, it's Tuesday, July 5th.

This 4th of July weekend was an enjoyable time for almost everybody in our region. I say almost everybody because one homeowner in Claremont is recovering after a fire heavily damaged an attached two-story garage. Authorities say that around 2 PM on Saturday, fire crews responded to 52 Cat Hole Road to the report of a fire in a garage attached to a home. Firefighters were faced with heavy flames and after additional personnel arrived, they used two hoses on both stories of the garage to douse the flames. They also cut a ventilation hole in the roof and with the combined efforts, were able to knock the fire down before it spread to the main home, deemed under control around 3:15 PM. An investigation yielded that an ATV battery charger inside the garage started the fire. The property was confirmed to have been insured and tanker trucks from Charlestown, Cornish, Newport, Plainfield, and Meriden all responded with water because there were no fire hydrants nearby. The garage's second floor, consisting of a family room and two other rooms, was damaged heavily and the home suffered heat, smoke, and water damage.

Up in West Lebanon now, for those thinking that the closed Pizza Hut on Route 12A is an eyesore, you've got good news coming your way. A developer based out of Maine is hoping to demolish the vacant building and set up a new building of their own. *The Valley News* reports that August Bristol Pizza LLC, owned by Dead River Properties in Portland, Maine, wants to raze the closed Pizza Hut building and construct a new building, which would be twice the size. Possible uses of the building range from retail, restaurant, to medical office space. The Lebanon Planning Board is set to hear the proposal of the site plan on July 11th at their next regularly-scheduled meeting. Pizza Hut closed the West Lebanon branch in November without warning, similar to some other businesses along the main drag in recent years. Across the street, BJ's is planning to build on the former site of Friendly's to create a gas station. Further north up 12A, consumers may expect a PetSmart building in the future for their pet needs. Meanwhile, in the Wal-Mart plaza, Michaels is looking to move into the storefront currently occupied by Books-A-Million, which would move to the K-Mart plaza. Many changes are coming to downtown West Lebanon and the Planning Board is continuing to process all requests.

Staying in West Lebanon now, looming on a hill above the city is the Lebanon Airport, which has been the discussion of the state's Supreme Court for the last decade and especially as of late. Now, the state has decreed that the City of Lebanon did not break a lease agreement with Signal Aviation Services when it increased its property assessment. *The Valley News* says that Signal Aviation Services filed a claim in 2006 when the city raised the company's property assessment by 11 times the original amount, thus raising taxes. The claims against the city stated that as part of the lease agreement, the tax rates should be the same as other airport businesses. Signal Aviation, now known as the Granite Air Center, is responsible for fuel and maintenance, among other services, to the Lebanon Airport's customers. The decision from the NH Supreme Court came last week, which finally puts to bed the ten-year-long tax dispute. The city has expressed their satisfaction with the decision that they did not break the lease agreement, which stands to confirm their statement that all city taxpayers are treated fairly and equally.

It's hard to deny the value of local goods, especially if it comes straight out of a field into your hand. Farmers' markets, of which there are so many, are a great way to experience the freshest produce and other goods offered up by the numerous farms in both twin states. New London holds theirs on Wednesdays all summer long. YCN's Noah Braun tells us more.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, July 6th.

It was thanks to the rapid and efficient work of crews from two local fire departments during a swift water rescue that a stranded person safe was deemed safe last night. According to the Hartford Fire Department, at around 10:00 last night, they responded to the Sumner Falls Boat access area in Hartland to assist the Plainfield, NH Fire Department in rescuing a person stranded on a rock in the Connecticut River. The victim was 20 years from the shore north of the falls, was not injured, and was were able to communicate with responders. He explained that he had been fishing and the water level rose suddenly, trapping him on the rock for four hours. Swift Water Teams from Hartford and Hanover arrived and entered the water, both upstream and downstream from the trapped man. They were able to toss him a line and a personal flotation device, allowing personnel to safely wade to the man and secure him and his fishing equipment. He was safely brought back to shore with no injuries and was not brought to the hospital. Fire departments from Hartford, Hanover, Lebanon, and Plainfield all responded.

Further down the river in Brattleboro, officials will be taking a look at the new site of the police department as part of a second environmental evaluation. Following the approved move of the Brattleboro Police Station from downtown to 62 Black Mountain Road, officials will be conducting a second site survey in regards to environmental suitability to ensure that the building and land are truly safe before the move begins. *The Brattleboro Reformer* reports that at the end of the first test, officials did not suggest that a second test would be required. The building houses the *Reformer*, and officials found materials in the sewers related to the printing process. Although this discovery poses no serious threat and does not deter the move altogether, a second test will be conducted in an act of caution. However, the timeframe for this second evaluation is expected to be at least three months, which further pushes the actual purchase of the property to late this year, come October or November. In the meantime, site design and permitting processes will carry on, ahead of the November 17th construction start date.

Yesterday we brought you news of the Lebanon Airport, but now tonight, we've got a look at another local airport: Claremont's. The local airport may be on track to receive a new hanger in the future, pending the approval of funds by the city council. According to *The Eagle Times*, the city council is set to vote next week on accepting \$365,000 in federal,

state, and local grant money for the new hangar project, which is part of the 10-year master plan to upgrade the entire facility. A large percentage of the grant money comes from the Federal Aviation Administration and both state and local contributions make up just shy of \$20,000 of the total. The master plan dictates that the new hangar will replace a current structure that was built in 1927 and is falling apart, with the the cost of repairs totalling more than the cost to simply build a new one. If the funds are approved and expended, the hangar will be located close to the runway and other hangars and will house five to six small planes. Other changes are on the way as part of the master plan, including a new terminal next year.

Remaining in Claremont tonight, the closed Wheelabrator incinerator plant will now have to look for another owner as a potential buyer has backed out. The plant on 145 Grisom Lane, which shut down in 2013, was set to be purchased by Recycling Technologies Solutions from Kentucky, given the incinerator's status as a trash-to-energy machine. *The Eagle Times* says that the Kentucky energy group sent an email to Mayor Charlene Lovett and City Manager Guy Santagate stating that after much consideration, they have decided not to purchase the building. Early last month, Recycling Technologies Solutions' attorney and investor, D.B. Kazee had presented his idea to the city council to create a gasification facility that would turn electricity back into the energy grid. Having placed the winning bid for over \$550,000, the group would have operated the plant as Genesis Recycling and would have employed 25 people. Both the city council and residents are still mulling possible uses for the facility, which operated for 27 years before closing just three years ago.

Yesterday we looked at the New London Farmers Market. Today, let's head across the river. Vermont has a wide variety of farms with farmers are dedicated to stewardship and committed to quality. In Southern Vermont, Windham Farm and Food created local-distribution food hubs, to deliver locally-produced food to over 50 buyers including schools and hospitals from 30 Vermont and New Hampshire food producers. Recently, Food Connects took over Windham Farm and Food to create a Farm to School Market Development Project. Funded by the Vermont Community Foundation, Food Connects is leading this project with local efforts and Vermont Statewide coordination.

In the end, new Farm to School marketing strategies will be developed and materials distributed to cafeterias statewide. Critical market data will be collected and shared with food producers, along with technical assistance to enable innovation. Food Connects will continue to connect local food production with the purchasing requirements of cafeterias, meal halls and dining rooms while staying focused on increasing sales to these and other institutions.

Good evening, it's Thursday, July 7th.

Crime news is up first tonight as Vermont State Police out of the Rockingham barracks have notched another drug arrest. Police say that this morning, they arrested 19-year old Amber French of Barre, Vermont in Rockingham. She was pulled over on Interstate 91 and police were able to detect that she was in possession of crack cocaine. Following a search of her person, officers found around two ounces of crack cocaine. She was taken into custody for charges of possession and trafficking of crack cocaine. French was arraigned in front of Windham County Court Judge Katherine Hayes and was ordered held at the Southern State Correctional Facility for lack of \$2,5000 bail. Vermont State Police and local authorities continue to fight the growing opiate crisis in the Green Mountain State. Arrests like this

morning's and a large bust last week of over 1700 bags of heroin in White River Junction are proving that their work is indeed paying off.

With other serious news, this time further North in Hartford, Vermont three people were sent to the hospital on Tuesday following an explosion. Authorities say that the explosion happened at around 4:30 PM at a business at 68 Old River Road. The Hartford Fire Department arrived promptly at 4:32 PM and an investigation determined that workers at the business were using torches to remove parts of a car when the flames ignited old gasoline in the tank of a 1970's Chevrolet Camaro that was being restored. The Hartford Fire Department was able to knock down the small fire caused by the explosion, which caused no damage to the building. However, three men who were working on the car were all injured in the blast with 52-year old Mark Kidder suffering burns to his head, face, arms, and legs. Chris Macedo suffered similar injuries and the business owner, Chuck Gordon, sustained minor flash burns. Kidder and Macedo were flown to a burn unit in Boston and Gordon received treatment at Dartmouth-Hitchcock. Fire departments from Lebanon, Hanover, Norwich, and Hartland all helped assist at the scene.

In local political news now, a politician from Claremont has announced his re-election to the New Hampshire House of Representatives. Democrat Raymond Gagnon, of Ward 3 Claremont, has announced today that he will be seeking re-election to his House seat, number 1019. In a press release, Gagnon stressed his background in government on the local, county, state, and federal level as well as his knowledge of the area and commitment to citizens of Ward 3 and Claremont. One of his goals is to address sustainable property tax relief and community/economic development in the area. In addition, Gagnon is a member of the NH Passenger Rail Authority, where he has used his role towards enhancing rail trail in to and from Claremont, a concept that Mayor Charlene Lovett is also pushing towards. Having been born in Claremont and currently residing here, he hopes to "continue to be fair, frugal, and focused on the challenges facing Claremont and New Hampshire. Gagnon is currently in his 5th term as a NH State Representative and is hoping that residents to vote for him come November.

Across the river in Brattleboro, Vermont, the town has enabled a new system of voting through a device that will make early voting a bit easier. Following the approved changes to the Town Charter this year, the town will now be using voting tabulators for any residents choosing to vote early in the town clerk's office. This allows Brattleboro voters to cast their ballots in the same way as they would have on the actual election day. Early votes through the tabulator do not skew or alter the results, as all votes, from the tabulator and from the day of, are tallied on election night. The usage of this device in this new manner will ease the process of early voting by removing the need for workers to open sealed envelopes during election day and count them. In addition, voter privacy is not only kept intact with this method, but is enhanced even further. Tabulators have been in use since 1987 in Brattleboro, but previously have only been used on election day. As a reminder, August 3rd at 5 PM is the deadline for registering to vote in the Primary Election in Brattleboro.

Good evening, it's Friday, July 8th.

A crime update is up first tonight as a Claremont woman was arrested yesterday in connection to a home invasion of an elderly Charlestown woman's home. Police say that 25-year old Sarah Carr of 12 Memorial Drive in Claremont was arrested for Conspiracy to Commit Receiving Stolen Property, related to a home invasion over a year ago. Carr is the wife of Jeffrey Buzzell, who was arrested last month on similar charges for a home invasion he took part in during May of 2015. Buzzell and another man broke into an elderly woman's home, tied her up in the basement, and stole jewelry and valuables. Almost a year later, the stolen goods were discovered when police intercepted a phone call that Buzzell made from prison to his wife, describing where they were. At that time, Buzzell was in prison for a charge unrelated to the home invasion. Carr was arraigned today and Buzzell is currently lodged at the Sullivan County House of Corrections for lack of bail. Both New Hampshire State Police and Claremont Police assisted in yesterday's arrest.

Continuing with serious news, a motorcyclist was killed over the weekend in Vermont and an online fundraiser has begun to raise money for his family. During the 4th of July Holiday Weekend on Sunday, 29-year old Gregory Nichols of Bellows Falls was traveling on Canal Street on a motorcycle when he collided with a motor vehicle. Police say they responded to the scene around 4:45 PM and found that Nichols had died as a result of the collision. Police withheld his identity until family members were notified and the driver of the car has been identified as 40-year old Noreen Woodruff of Guilford, Vermont. Since the accident, a GoFundMe page was set up to help support the family of Nichols. In just three days, 88 people have raised over \$4,000, all towards the goal of \$5000. The note describing the fundraiser says that Nichols leaves behind three children, a stepson, his wife, and other family members. Two of his children were in a car near him when the accident occurred and witnessed the crash. The accident is still under investigation by Brattleboro Police.

Another update tonight, but of a different note, as the Claremont Speedway's proposed campground is receiving a considerable amount of feedback and discussion. The city's Zoning Board of Adjustment has agreed to continue the discussion on proposal of an RV campground at the Thrasher Road location. Besides hearing more input from residents, the board also hopes to visit the actual site and gather more information on the water supply. The campground would consist of 149-sites, which means that 700 people could potentially be using the land at any given time. The plan has been in the works for more than a year now as Claremont Speedway LLC even withdraw an earlier plan last year when neighbors of the proposed site spoke against it. Because the site on 282 Thrasher Road is within a Rural Residential district, the variance would permit the vacant land to be used for a private campground with utilities such as a swimming pool and bathrooms. Abutters are concerned about noise, traffic, and water supply, and the board will analyze all these factors before moving forward.

And over in Sunapee now, if you were thinking about swimming at the Sunapee State Park Beach this weekend, well you might want to think again. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services has posted an advisory at the local beach after tests found high levels of fecal coliform bacteria. The levels detected were higher than state standards and officials are advising the water may not be safe for wading or swimming. The New Hampshire Beach Program, as part of DES, oversees roughly 190 beaches in the Granite State, monitoring them for E. coli, which is known to originate from the digestive tracts of warm-blooded mammals which can include waterfowl. The sample test was conducted on Tuesday and the advisory was issued the following day, on July 6th. The standard figure for E. coli testing is 88 counts per 100 milliliters of water in one sample. The tests done at the Sunapee State Park Beach yielded levels of 150 counts, slightly less than double the state standard. The beach is not officially closed but a warning sign advises swimmers of the risks.

We begin tonight with a quick alert for you as local authorities in Vermont are seeking the public's help in tracking down an individual responsible for theft of a television. Late last week, on officer from Chester, Vermont police force responded to Green Mountain Union High School at 716 Route 103 South for a report of a theft. Police say that when they arrived, a building coordinator told them that someone had stolen a brand new 65 inch Vizio television that they had purchased for \$1000. The suspect was captured on the school video surveillance network, where he was seen moving the television and removing it from the premises. The crime occurred at roughly 11:45 PM and the individual had entered the building when the school was closed. If you have any information or know who the person in the photos is, you are urged to contact the Chester Police Department and speak to Officer Caleb Currie. The department's phone number is 802-875-2035.

In what has become a lengthy court case, a Dartmouth professor charged with possession of child pornography was scheduled to be sentenced today after pleading guilty. Prior to today, J. Martin Favor faced prison sentences of up to ten years, but could be as low as three, which is what his attorney is requesting. He pleaded guilty in March and resigned from his job as an English professor at Dartmouth College just last week. Favor had been on paid leave since he was arrested in September after authorities discovered that he had uploaded four images of child porn through his Tumblr account. Favor, who lives in Plainfield, NH, was flagged by Tumblr when the images were detected and the New Hampshire Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force was alerted. The single felony

count of possession of child porn dictates that, besides prison time, he will be under supervised release with terms and conditions come the end of his sentence. Besides prison time, Favor also faces being flagged as a sex offender for the rest of his life.

A development now in what has been a turbulent time for Stevens High School in Claremont in regards to its scheduling. Late last week, the state's Public Employee Labor Relations Board ruled that the the school stop implementing their new A/B classroom schedule and go back to their former block schedule. The A/B schedule was adopted last year to allow students to succeed more in their core classes by offering four classes on A days and four other classes on B days throughout the year. The block schedule simply required that students take four classes per semester. However, once the A/B schedule was adopted, there was immediate feedback and following last week's ruling by the state, the school district plans to take their case to the state's Supreme Court in support of the A/B schedule, according to *The Eagle Times*. The legal battle may be lengthy and with the school year picking up again in the fall, students will use the block schedule as school administrators work out the finer details of the appeal and how the daily schedule should be set.

Returning to police news, but of a different note, the Windham County Sheriff's office is reconsidering the security they provide at courthouse hearings. At the end of August this year on the 31st, the Vermont Court Administrator's Office is expected to make a decision on increasing the pay rates to deputies who provide security to the Newfane and Brattleboro courthouses. *The Brattleboro Reformer* says that Windham County Sheriff Keith Clark revealed the fiscal contract from last year totalling in around a quarter million dollars. However, this year, his office is now asking for \$35 an hour for court security so that they don't continue to lose money for their services at the courthouses. The security detail includes screenings, managing the courtroom, patrolling inside and outside the building, as well as other responsibilities. Clark has said that two years ago, he told the courts that their contract was not sustainable and also that the Sheriff's Office relies on contracts. Both the courthouses and the Sheriff's Office now await the state's decision, with the latter considering withdrawing their services altogether if the decision rules in favor of not increasing the pay rate.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, July 12th.

Tonight's news begins with an update from yesterday's top story as former Dartmouth professor J. Martin Favor has been sentenced to prison for 5 and a half years. He was sentenced yesterday in US District Court on charges of possession of child pornography, after being arrested last fall. His arrest came after social media site Tumblr detected that he had uploaded a handful of images of child porn from his Plainfield, NH residence. This information was passed on to state authorities who executed a search warrant on his home, finding hardware that stored illicit images and videos. Prosecutors say that over 15 years, Favor had collected over 500 videos and 300 images of children being sexually abused. He had been an English professor at Dartmouth College and was on paid leave up until last week when he resigned. He pleaded guilty in late May and will appear back in court in September for a second hearing. He faces seven years of supervised release once his sentence is up.

In Vermont now, the town of Hartford has welcomed its new town manager. 51-year old Leo Pullar, a former Army colonel, conducted his first business meeting yesterday as part of a three-year contract that promises him \$130,000 a year. His hiring and appointment to the position fills the spot left by former town manager Hunter Reiseberg who abruptly resigned in August of last year. Fire Chief Steve Locke filled the gap for a spell before he moved to Burlington Vermont, causing the Selectboard to hire Pat MacQueen as the new interim

manager. *The Valley News* reports that yesterday's meeting was upbeat and Pullar promised complete transparency and nothing being held secret. He noted that he retired from his job as the deputy director of the Installation Services Directorate at the Pentagon on Friday, hoping to take his military administrative experience to a local level, allowing Hartford to meets its goals over the next three years. This week, he will be meeting with other town officials and community groups.

In Claremont again, the city's planning board has approved the use of a new parking lot by a local company on Maple Avenue. National Field Representatives will now have 71 extra parking spaces right across the street at the former site of Gary's Tire and Auto, which was demolished recently. *The Eagle Times* says that the board approved the use of the new lot by an 8-0 unanimous vote and received no opposition during the public hearing portion of the vote. Currently on the site, a portion of land has been cleared and levelled and now, NFR hopes to pave the area and install pavilions, hoping to make the lot attractive and safe. Besides the new lot, NFR hopes to construct a new building on the site of the closed Mascoma Savings Bank building right next door. Earlier this year, a portion of Maple Avenue, including NFR, was deemed an Economic Revitalization Zone by the city, making businesses in that zone eligible for tax credits. NFR is a mortgage servicing company that employs about 200 people here in Claremont and an additional 50 at its Florida location.

For so many in our region, this past weekend was a very important one as the 35th Annual Prouty was held, despite some rainy weather. This year, the fundraiser, which has become a significant event in our area every year, raised over \$3 million for cancer research. The Prouty is sponsored by the Norris Cotton Cancer Center of Dartmouth-Hitchcock, who announced that over 4300 people turned out for this year's event. The event is not limited to one sport, as you could have walked, biked, golfed, or rowed over the course of two days to complete the event. Some participants went as far as 200 miles for the cause, known as The Prouty Ultimate, starting in Manchester on Friday and ending in Hanover on Saturday. The event was created when Audrey Prouty lost her nine-year battle with ovarian cancer in August of 1982. Four of her nurses, who were inspired by her courage, cycled 100 miles through the White Mountains and raised \$4,000 for cancer research. Next year's event is scheduled for July 7th and 8th so if you're planning to take part next year, mark your calendars!

Good evening, it's Wednesday, July 13th.

We begin tonight with a scary scene here in Claremont this afternoon as a fire broke out in a large garage on Sugar River Drive. Residents in the area reported hearing explosions and saw smoke rise from Gary's Disposal and Recycling, an 8-bay pole barn. Fire crews from Claremont, Newport, and other towns responded to the 1-alarm fire, which was fully engulfed when they arrived. The flames caused a brush fire behind the buildinghe explosions that people heard reportedly came from equipment inside the garage.

The fire was deemed under control after about an hour and is still under investigation tonight.

Tonight's show begins with news of a car chase last night that began in Vermont and ended right here in Claremont. Vermont State Police say that 20-year old Jack Baker of Brattleboro was signalled by a trooper to pull over last night around 6 PM on US Route 5 in the town of Rockingham. However, Baker failed to stop when he was signalled to and he eluded troopers. Vermont State Police were able to pursue him to Exit 8 in the town of Weathersfield. During the chase, Baker reached speeds of 110 miles per hour on Interstate 91, traveling North, and eventually reached New Hampshire, where state troopers from the Granite State picked up the pursuit. The vehicle and Baker were located in Claremont and he was subsequently arrested and charged with Attempting to Elude, Negligent Operation, Excessive Speed, and Violation of Conditions of Release. Vermont State Police caught up with Baker at the Claremont Police headquarters and he was issued a citation to appear in Windham County Superior Court at a later date.

Crime news now as a local Vermont man has been ordered held without bail yesterday for charges of assault and kidnapping. Court records say that 46-year old Mark LaValley Sr. of Brattleboro was in Windham Superior Court Criminal Division to answer to charges of aggravated assault and kidnapping from a May 15th incident which left the victim with facial fractures. He was arrested on July 11th by Brattleboro PD after receiving a phone call on May 15thl saying that the caller's daughter had received Facebook messages from the victim of the kidnapping, saying he had been beat up and was being held against his will. An affidavit says that the victim was kidnapped by LaValley because the victim had allegedly hit LaValley's child on two consecutive days. He was kidnapped by LaValley and another man and was driven to Living Memorial Park, to a motel, and then to his own car, where he may have passed out. LaValley's criminal record in Vermont is extensive, having been previously convicted for escape from custody or furlough, sale of cocaine, DUI, grand larceny, burglary, and other charges. He's currently being held without bail.

The historic bridge between Walpole and Bellows Falls is still very actively in discussion on both the local, state, and federal levels. However, the newest development on the Vilas Bridge comes from the local level as the Bellows Falls Board of Trustees has voted and agreed to table the discussion of a wastewater treatment agreement, keeping it separate from the repair of the bridge. *The Eagle Times* reports that the board voted 4-1 to table any definitive action on the wastewater agreement between Walpole and Bellows Falls, with the latter treating wastewater from the former, transported underneath the Vilas Bridge. The Municipal Manager of Bellows Falls stated that he wants business to continue as usual and to keep the local wastewater agreement discussion separate from the state and federal discussion regarding the repair of the deteriorating span. This is the third attempt to resolve and sign the wastewater agreement between the two towns and won't be taking any action on it until the board adds it to their agenda for a future meeting. Meanwhile, local authorities continue to work with state and federal officials in receiving funding to repair the bridge, which closed in 2009.

Good evening, it's Thursday, July 14th.

Tonight's news begins with an update from yesterday's top story as a barn fire here in Claremont was revealed to have been started by young boys playing with a lighter. According to *The Valley News*, the fire chief of Claremont, Rick Bergeron, told the paper that three juveniles were playing with a cigarette lighter that started the blaze that destroyed a six bay barn at 165 Sugar River Drive. The barn contained equipment belonging to Picard and Son's Waste and Recycling, which was all destroyed by the blaze. The damage is estimated at \$50,000 to \$60,000 for the equipment alone. The responsible juveniles had been in the vicinity of the barn prior to the fire and they admitted to starting it. The owner of the property was initially confused as to how the blaze started, telling authorities that there was no active electricity anywhere in the building. Several explosions were observed as the fire devoured the equipment inside. Fire crews from Claremont, Newport, Cornish, and Charlestown all responded to the scene.

A court update now as a woman arrested last week for connection with a 2015 home invasion has been ordered held on bail for conspiracy. 35-year old Sarah Carr of Claremont pleaded not guilty in court on Tuesday, facing the charge of contempt of bail for prior offenses that she committed, and set is for trial later this year in August. The charge is a misdemeanor and she has waived her right to a probable cause hearing for the charge of conspiracy to receive stolen property, a felony charge, stemming from a home invasion that her husband, Jeffrey Buzzell, committed in May of 2015. Buzzell and another man had broken into a Charlestown woman's home, tied her up, and stolen a large amount of jewelry and valuables. The location of the stash of stolen goods was discovered when authorities heard a phone call from Buzzell to Carr, while Buzzell was in prison, revealing directions on how to reach the stash. Carr was out on bail for two counts of welfare fraud she committed in March and had been ordered to not commit any offenses during that time. However, the conspiracy to receive stolen property charge that was handed to her during that period led to the contempt of bail charge. Carr's bail this time was set at \$25,000 and she's set to appear in court again at a later date.

An update now in a story we brought you last week as Lebanon city officials have approved the proposal for a new building on Route 12A on the site of the closed Pizza Hut. On Monday night, the Planning Board approved a new multi-tenant building, which will be twice the size of the former Pizza Hut building. Once completed, it will have space for a dental office, a restaurant, and retail storefronts. The plot of land is owned by Dead River Properties from Maine, who owns August Bristol Pizza LLC. The board approved three waivers that were sought for the project, which were passed on a near-unanimous vote. Pizza Hut closed the West Lebanon branch in November without warning, similar to some other businesses along the main drag in recent years. Across the street, BJ's is planning to build on the former site of Friendly's to create a gas station. Further north up 12A, consumers may expect a PetSmart building in the future for their pet needs. Meanwhile, in the Wal-Mart plaza, Michaels is looking to move into the storefront formerly occupied by Books-A-Million, which has moved to the K-Mart plaza. Many changes are coming to downtown West Lebanon and the Planning Board is continuing to process all requests.

In education news tonight, one of our local colleges has launched its first graduate program. Students wanting to pursue nursing at Colby-Sawyer College are now in luck as this fall, the school is expanding its nursing education options and offering a graduate program for a Master Science of Nursing (M.S.N.) . The college sought the assistance of Dartmouth-Hitchcock, its longtime partner, in creating the 37-credit program which will meet the demand for higher education of the advanced generalist nurse. Upon completion, program graduates will be eligible to sit for the Clinical Nurse Leader certification exam. The program was co-designed by nursing leaders from the college and Dartmouth-Hitchcock and this fall, will enroll 12 part-time students from D-H to meet the demand for the new role of the Clinical Nurse Leader. Colby-Sawyer's nursing program is one of the state's top performing undergraduate nursing programs and boasts an official examination pass rate of 96% compared to the state and national averages of 89.5% and 84%. The college is currently accepting applications for the new program as well as all others.

The Hartford Police Department has posted the announcement of Major Vail's enrollment on their Facebook page and many people have commented, wishing him well and offering their congratulations. In September, Major Vail will be returning to the Hartford force with new ideas and techniques that he will have learned during his courses over the summer.

Tonight's news begins with an update in a story that has been developing since December of last year as a 19-year old Claremont man involved in two high speed chases has been sentenced to prison. Louis Gratacos III of Claremont pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three and a half years as a minimum in state prison for the charge of reckless conduct with a deadly weapon. This charge stems from two separate incidents where Gratacos led police on high speed chases in Claremont, both ending when he hit resident's homes on Maple Avenue and Citizen Street. *The Eagle Times* says that on Wednesday in court, Gratacos was handed the sentence which could keep him in prison for up to seven years. Additionally, two other charges: 2nd degree assault and a second count of reckless conduct with a deadly weapon, each carrying up to 7 and 5 years respectively, have been suspended for 10 years. He pleaded guilty to all three charges and the presiding judge explained that his age of 19 influenced the length of the sentence. Gratacos and his public

defender explained that he is trying to change his ways and learn from his mistakes. For full summaries of the high speed chase incidents he was involved in, visit YCNNow.com.

Bringing the news to Claremont now, the search for the next city manager has begun with the approval of a subcommittee to spearhead the process. On Wednesday, the city council voted to approve the creation of a three-member review subcommittee who will analyze bids from firms who want to assist in picking a new city manager for Claremont come 2017. *The Eagle Times* reports that the subcommittee consists of assistant mayor Victor Bergeron and council members Scott Pope and Carolyn Towle. Beginning today, the group has begun to review Request For Qualifications bids, of which they've received three already. This process is merely the beginning of the search, which hopes to fill the vacancy being created by the departure of longtime city manager, Guy Santagate. He has held the position longer than any other city manager before him, for 15 years, and the city council has been discussing the search process since 2013, ahead of his inevitable resignation. Officials estimate the cost to search for a new manager will cost roughly \$15,000.

Today was a big day for the Newbury Public Library, who held a party of sorts for the opening of the town's first Little Free Library. Today at 5 PM, the Newbury Public Library, in conjunction with the South Newbury Union Church, held a ribbon cutting as they unveiled their Little Free Library. Not sure what that is? It's a little outdoor book exchange box that's filled with books free for the taking. The box and all the literature inside will be available to everyone all year round and residents are encouraged to add their own books to the collection, for others to enjoy. The idea is to spark the community to share their love of books and ideas. This particular Little Library was purchased for the town by the Friends of the Newbury Public Library. What's more is that a second one has been purchased by the Newbury Beautification Committee and they will be unveiling it later this year. This idea is a widespread one that has gained traction around the country and there are nearly 40,000 of Little Free Libraries around the world. Canam Steel has entered a contract to provide heavy steel girders to that very bridge. They've done plenty of work here in New Hampshire as well, including the Memorial Bridge in Portsmouth.

An update tonight in the court case of a Newport guidance counselor charged with indecent exposure. 44-year old Thomas Mauzy, a middle school guidance counselor in Newport, will go in front of a jury as part of a trial in December. This new trial was granted as part of an appeal after being found guilty in late May on seven counts of public exposure and lewdness. Last week in Newport District Court, it was agreed that jury selection would begin in early December while Mauzy remains out on \$10,000 personal recognizance bail. The public exposure charges stem from reports by a female neighbor that he revealed himself naked in his bedroom window to her on multiple occasions late last year. Mauzy's current status with the Newport SAU is unknown for privacy reasons but he was placed on administrative leave back in January when he was arrested. He was sentenced to one year in the Sullivan County House of Corrections which was suspended for two years and will then be on probation for two more years.

More court news for you tonight as an accused child rapist from Georges Mills has withdrawn his guilty plea. 34-year old Travis Bunnell recently attempted to delay his sentencing hearing but the judge denied the request. Bunnell's request asked for more time in order to help his mother cut firewood in preparation for the cold winter months, asking for his case to be continued later in the year in August or September. In late June, Bunnell told the court through a letter that he would intend to plead guilty for the charges of sexual assault against a 9-year old girl last year. However, on the day of the sentencing last week, he said he needed more time, which was denied because he submitted this request it too late and in an untimely manner. *The Eagle Times* says that after conferring with his attorney, Bunnell announced he was withdrawing his guilty plea and sought a trial by jury. A hearing is being held on August 1st to discuss evidence and Bunnell is eligible to submit a new plea agreement.

Any watchers of our show River Valley Chronicle will be familiar with the nonprofit Headrest, who hosted the show for three weeks earlier this year. Headrest, known for combatting the opiate epidemic on a local scale, has named their new interim executive director who has taken the reins. Hilde Ojibway of White River Junction, was introduced late last month at the Lebanon nonprofit, which offers a 24-7 crisis hotline and 3-month residential program for those recovering from substance abuse. *The Valley News* says that the nonprofit underwent a transition from state funding in the form of block grants to a fee-for-service basis. This new method of sustainability added burdens to the organization's administrative structure but the appointment of Ojibway may alleviate some of these strains. She comes from a

background of experience in the same fields as Headrest, including being the executive director of Listen Community Services for 10 years.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, July 19th.

We begin tonight with two crime stories that are certainly not common. First off, a Chester, Vermont man has been arrested for assaulting a female with an axe and then fleeing. Police say that on Friday around 10:30 PM, they responded to Highland Court in Chester where they learned that a man was at the Jiffy Mart with an axe and had fled into the woods. Police officers were able to locate James McCool who was then taken into custody after resisting arrest first. He faces multiple charges: Domestic Assault, Resisting Arrest, Violations of Conditions of Release, Unlawful Mischief, Operation without Owner's Consent, Criminal Threatening, Disorderly Conduct, and Offense Committed within the Presence of a Child. He was being held at the Southern State Correctional Facility in Springfield for lack of \$2500 bail. He appeared in Windsor Criminal Court on Monday to answer to all of the above charges.

Our second crime story now as a Westminster woman has been arrested for assaulting her ex-husband by holding a gun to his head, threatening to kill him. Police say that 45-year old Brenda Barbour of Westminster, Vermont was arrested on Friday night after she pulled a gun on her ex-husband, telling him that she wanted to "blow his brains out." An investigation by Vermont State Police showed that around 7:00 PM, the ex-husband went to pick up his 12-year old son at a Bemis Hill Road residence in Westminster. A verbal fight broke out between the man and Barbour, who threatened to shoot him if he didn't leave her house. According to the man, he was leaving when Barbour approached him from behind and pushed a .22 caliber pistol up against the back his head, saying she was going to kill him. He ran away and reported the incident to Vermont State Police, who arrested Barbour for first degree aggravated domestic assault. This charge stems from her being armed with a deadly weapon and threatening to kill her ex-husband with it. She appeared in Vermont Superior Court in Windham today around noon for the charge.

Continuing with our serious news tonight, police in Brattleboro, Vermont have identified a woman struck and killed by a train on Friday. Police have released the woman's identity as 57-year old Susan Collins, with no known residence. Her body was discovered on Friday around 1:30 PM when both the Brattleboro Police Department and Fire Department received a report from Amtrak that a woman had been struck by the southbound train. The

exact location is was a quarter mile south of the North Bridge, which crosses the West River. Units who arrived on the scene found Collins' body halfway between the Veteran's Memorial Bridge and Walnut Street. Amtrak Police also responded and assisted at the scene. Amtrak says that train number 55 of the Vermonter struck a "trespasser on the tracks" Friday afternoon with 83 passengers aboard. The train stopped with emergency brakes and remained on scene for several hours after the collision. Anyone with information is being asked to call Detective Erik Johnson at 802-257-7950.

Still dreaming of owning your own fortified house and a former dentist's office? If you answered yes, you're in luck. The former properties of federal tax evaders Ed and Elaine Brown are back on the market after the buyer of the government-held auction relisted them. *The Valley News* reports that Plainfield resident James Hollander, who had purchased the properties last October in an auction, has listed both properties on ReMax Upper Valley, hoping for over \$100,000 more than what he originally purchased the Center of Town Road compound for. Hollander purchased the 103-acre property for \$205,000 during the government auction, which had been initiated multiple times after no previous bidders. Now, he's selling it for \$329,000 along with the Lebanon dentist office, previously run by Elaine Brown. Both the Browns are currently serving prison sentences for the rest of their lives after refusing to pay their taxes. They entered a standoff with federal authorities and were ultimately arrested and convicted in 2009.

Van McLeod, the longest serving commissioner in New Hampshire government died yesterday in Concord Hospital. McLeod was first confirmed to the position of commissioner in 1992. Throughout his tenure in state government, he was a tireless champion for culture in all of its forms. He was as well known for his humor and compassion as he was for his devotion to supporting culture statewide. Greg Uhrin, the COO of YCN remembers him as a fellow artist in the Artist's in the Schools program where they both participated starting in the late 1970's. He remembers him for his positive "can-do" attitude and his councillor nature which was reflected in this clip from a Capital Connections show from last year.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, July 20th.

We begin tonight with a development out of Dartmouth College that will pique the interest of any fraternity men such as myself. The former fraternity house belonging to the fraternity Sigma Alpha Epsilon may not house college students in the future after much deliberation and presentation of evidence. *The Valley News* says that on Monday, the Hanover Zoning Board reversed its previous decision in regards to the house on College Street, and ruled that the fraternity lost its residential zoning status when Dartmouth had disaffiliated the fraternity last winter. In April, the board had ruled in favor of SAE, with fraternity officials arguing that the building and group had operated independently from the college submitted new evidence that showed the fraternity has previously been under the supervision of the college, similar to other Greek groups on campus. The board voted 4-0 to deny SAE's appeal that would allow the building to house students.

Onto a brighter story now, one might say that it's more of a light-hearted story, as Claremont is moving closer and closer to having new LED lights on its streets. According to *The Eagle Times*, the city received word just recently that a \$275,000 loan for the installation of new LED lights, which will replace the current bulbs. The New Hampshire Community Development Finance Authority approved the loan with a 2% interest rate, as

part of around \$25 million that the agency provides in funding resources around the Granite State. The move to LEDs will not only extend the lifespan of the lights, but will save money on replacements and energy costs. Officials estimate that the city will save nearly \$82,000 a year and 500 lights may be installed as early as this August. There are roughly 1000 lights in town that are lit by Eversource, who bills the city. Other towns in our area have completed or are looking to complete the same type of light replacement, as it ultimately benefits town expenses and maintenance in the long run.

Staying in Claremont, ATV riders are looking for a solution in regards to usage of a portion of the rail trail along Route 11. The Sullivan County ATV Club is tossing ideas around to see if there's a way to find a solution or find a workaround for the recent state ruling that ATVs continue to be banned on the trail. On July 7th, the Federal Highway Administration New Hampshire division ruled denied the city's request for a waiver of rules, which currently prohibit off-highway vehicles on the 3 mile section of the the trail. The abandoned rail corridor, which was converted to a walking and biking trail, was acquired by the NH Department of Transportation in the late 1990s using funds from federal Transportation Enhancement. Any trails purchased and built using TE funds are only usable by bikes and pedestrians. A letter from the federal authorities to the NHDOT provided a list of recommendations for the city to pursue if they wanted to continue to push the waiver request, despite the ruling.

On Friday, we told you about an open house that was held on Saturday by Canam Steel here in Claremont. We caught up with the manufacturer's human resources manager to reflect on what visitors experienced during the tour.

Good evening, it's Thursday, July 21st.

It was a scary scene Tuesday night in Wilder, Vermont as fire crews battled a small blaze at the Wilder Motel. The Hartford Fire Department says that they responded to the building at 2495 Hartford Avenue at 11:06 PM Tuesday night for reports of a fire in Room 8 of the motel. Units found smoke coming from the building near the area of Room 8 and upon entering the room, found a heavy smoke condition and a mattress that was on fire. It was

quickly extinguished by fire crews and was deemed under control by 11:28 PM. An investigation revealed that only Room 8 was damaged by the fire and the remaining living units at the motel were deemed safe, allowing residents to return to their rooms. Room 8 was unoccupied at the time of the fire and tax records show that the structure is owned by Gate Properties, LLC of Lebanon, NH. The cause of the fire is unknown at this time and an investigation is underway to determine what started it. No firefighters or civilians were injured as a result of the blaze.

A historic community center here in Claremont finally has a new owner but its future and potential uses still hang in question. *The Eagle Times* reports that the Goodwin Community Center at 130 Broad Street, now owned by Darrell Lee who bought it in the city auction, may want to use the large swimming pool as a hydrotherapy resource. Lee tells the paper that he hopes to lease the swimming pool building, which sits behind the main building, to a tenant such as a medical group or a school who could use the 25-meter pool. He has already spoken to two different physical therapy groups who are interesting in using the pool to assist with their rehabilitation programs. Lee, who is a real estate investor out of Springfield, Vermont, purchased the former community center in March for \$60,000. This amount is only 6 percent of the nearly 1 million dollar assessment value. The building was sold during a city-run auction that paid no mind to possible uses of the building and simply accepted the highest bid. Lee has yet to come forward with a specific vision for the entire complex of three buildings.

We begin tonight with an update in the story of the Claremont Speedway and their proposed RV campground. The proposal is moving further towards fruition as city planners visited the grounds yesterday and were able to analyze its suitability and examine it through the lens of concerned abutters. *The Valley News* reports that last night, Zoning Board of Adjustment members, part of 20 people overall, visited the speedway's grounds on Thrasher Road where they hope to build a 149-spot camping site. They explored the area in groups, which included members of the Conservation Commission. The site has received some negative feedback already, with abutters being concerned about water supply. However, during yesterday's visit, some ground rules were set by the interim city planner that dictated that they receive no feedback during the site analysis and instead simply gather some facts. Public input will be accepted during the ZBA hearing on August 1st. The board must approve a zoning variance to allow the construction of the campground, considering that the site is in a rural residential zone.

Here's some food for thought: can you trust the news that's given to you? Does it depend on the source it came from and your trust level with that source? Most would argue that there are varying degrees of credibility regarding different sources of news. Even though there are newspapers, radio stations, and TV stations in our area, such as Your Local View, police in Brattleboro are warning residents not believe everything they see online, especially if it didn't come from one of those mentioned mediums. *The Brattleboro Reformer* reports that a recent story was published online on an open media website that claimed five people were murdered in Brattleboro. Police Captain Mark Carignan identified and confirmed the story as fake and is reminding residents to check in with their local police department if they see a story of that sort to confirm its credibility. Captain Carignan told the *Reformer* that nowadays, anybody can post anything they want and is up to residents to check if that information is actually correct. The website that posted the false story is ReporterCenter.com and has been known to post other factually incorrect sensational stories. Fake stories often hide malware and viruses that can infect your computer should you click on the news story.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, July 27th.

We begin tonight with court news, but not about your typical court case or trial. The assistant judge of Windham County's court system is under the microscope for allegedly violating his code of ethics required by the position. *The Brattleboro Reformer* reports that Assistant Judge Paul Kane of Westminster may or may not face criminal charges following an investigation by the Vermont Judicial Board for not fulfilling the high expectations of standards as part of his elected position. The investigation was conducted after a complaint was filed against Kane regarding real estate that he moved into during 2009. Kane had moved into the home of his uncle's second wife, Catherine Tolaro, who was 82 years old and suffering from dementia. He filed claims against Tolaro's estate, hoping to receive reimbursement of over \$720,000 for caring for Tolaro. After she died, he accepted loan payments that were given to the estate and was not truthful in court when a complaint was filed against him. He then went on to write payments from the estate to him and his wife. In 2015, he was appointed as an assistant judge and was able to write off one of the loans to the estate. No case against Kane has been filed as of yet.

This weekend in Windsor, Vermont it may look like a scene out of your favorite natural disaster movie as officials will be tested on their ability to respond to an unprecedented disaster. The exact nature of the disaster is not being disclosed at this point but residents need not be worried. *The Valley News* is reporting that this Friday and Saturday, "Operation Vigilant Guard" will be conducted in town to test the abilities of local and state first responders as they react to a large-scale emergency. The disaster, and what it will be exactly, is not being revealed to residents or first responders so that the latter will have no idea of situation they will be reacting to. Emergency officials based out of Waterbury, Vermont will be standing by to analyze and report on the readiness of various agencies as they respond to these mock disasters. Around 50 other Vermont towns will be and have been conducting similar exercises across the state in order to help prepare the entire Green Mountain State for any manner of emergency. Officials anticipate that the exercises will carry on until August 2nd.

One historic bridge in our region, despite being a landmark and a tourist attraction, continues to be a source of concern as many people have taken their lives jumping off the bridge. Officials are continuing to examine safety measures on the Quechee Bridge

following a recent suicide on July 13th, according to *The Vermont Standard*, and hopes to implement changes soon. On July 13th, police, received a call about a possible suicide around 8 PM and responded to the bridge. After blocking it off to traffic, they found a body at the bottom of the gorge, identified as 51-year old Holly Blackie of Randolph, Vermont. There was already one other suicide earlier this year, making it the fourth since 2013 and adding another tally to the bridge's death toll, which is in the double digits. The state passed Act 158 earlier this year which allows officials to install signs and other measures on the bridge in hopes of preventing people from jumping. Mental health continues to be at the forefront of discussions regarding safety at the bridge and one safety idea proposes boxes that tell people how they can get help.

Claremont's local mortgage servicing company on Maple Avenue is taking one step further towards expansion. Yesterday and today, National Field Representatives at 158 Maple Avenue destroyed the adjacent former Claremont Savings Bank building, which they had previously purchased. This demolition is part of their expansion plans, which includes an all-new parking lot across the street on the former site of Gary's Claremont Tire Company. The automotive business, which had been closed for a while, was demolished recently and a large plot of ground was cleared and levelled to provide more parking options for NFR employees. A construction firm out of Newport is handling the demolition, which is making room for NFR to add an addition to their current building. No site plan with exact details has been submitted to the city as of yet. Earlier this year, a portion of Maple Avenue, including NFR, was deemed an Economic Revitalization Zone by the city, making businesses in that zone eligible for tax credits. NFR is a mortgage servicing company that employs about 200 people here in Claremont and an additional 50 at its Florida location.

Here's an idea for late Summer in Northern New England that I can personally recommend: get out your mountain bike and head over to the new trail network at Mount Ascutney called STAB. Sounds scary but don't worry, it stands for Sport Trails of the Ascutney Basin. As part of the Vermont Mountain Bike Association, STAB benefits from trail grants, insurance coverage, administrative support, Vermont statewide advocacy, and the opportunity to readily connect with other chapters throughout the state. YCN news stopped by the Claremont Cycle Depot and spoke to Sarah Pierce about STAB, trends in mountain biking, and her favorite trail.

Good evening, it's Thursday, July 28th.

Sometimes, criminals mistakenly think that they can escape the law. However, justice has no borders and running to another state, for example, is not a solution to escape criminal charges in our home state. Springfield Police have nabbed a fugitive who was on the run from Maine, being sought there for a Class B Felony. Springfield Police say that Sergeant Jeremy Fitzgibbons found 45-year old Melissa Hatch at around 4:15 PM on Friday and arrested her for being a fugitive from justice in Maine. She had been living in Woodstock and was taken to the Southern State Correctional Facility in lieu of \$10,000 bail. She was arraigned on Monday. *The Eagle Times* says that a judge in York County Superior Court in Alfred, Maine issued a warrant for her arrest yesterday after she had been handed charges

of fraud/negotiating a worthless instrument. In court cases such as this one, the fugitive can contest an extradition and enter a court hearing in the state they were apprehended in. Or, they may waive the contest to extradition and return to the state that issued the warrant to face court there.

Two update stories now, first in Windham County. After the Windham County Sheriff's Office and the two county courthouses could not reach an agreement on security coverage of court proceedings, a national firm has entered a contract to take over security. Securitas USA has signed a 22-month contract with the Brattleboro and Newfane courthouses that will exchange their security services for roughly \$620,000. *The Brattleboro Reformer* says that six security firms were contacted to provide courthouse security, but Securitas was the only one to submit a formal bid. The search for a new security provider came after the Windham County Sheriff's Office requested a higher pay increase for the security detail, as they had reportedly been losing money as part of the previous contract. Sheriff Keith Clark told the paper that they would have needed to see a 10 to 12 percent increase and were only offered a 3 percent raise, thus causing them to not renew the contract. The State of Vermont's Judicial Branch maintained a contingency plan that would be enacted in cases such as this so that the courtrooms can receive the security they need.

Our second update tonight, as a possible water and sewer rate increase continues to loom over the heads of Claremont residents and now, it's looking more probable. City Manager Guy Santage earlier this week mentioned that a proposed increase would be presented during Wednesday night's city council meeting in order to raise funds for necessary improvement and repair projects on utilities such as the reservoirs. Last night's meeting indeed brought a presentation on a proposed increase, presented by Municipal and Financial Services Group, based out of Maryland. *The Valley News* reports that Mike Maker with the Maryland-based firm, showed a PowerPoint project that showed increases over the next 5 years. In June, the council received reports that the increase would be as much as 95 percent for water. However, the presentation proposed a roughly 6.5% increase per year for water and sewer combined for a total of a 32% come year 2021. The council did not approve any new rates last night and requested to see a more detailed plan at their next meeting.

Good evening, it's Friday, July 29th.

Crime news is up first in a court update as a man from Newport has been sentenced to prison for possession of child pornography. 49-year old Allen Langlois was sentenced in the United States District Court of the District of NEw Hampshire this week. He was handed a prison sentence of 41 months and will be under 10 years of supervised release at the end of his sentence. Last year in the fall, the FBI conducted a lengthy investigation into Langlois and found that he had hundreds of still images of child pornography on his personal computer within his Newport residence. He admitted to authorities that he downloaded the images from various sources on the internet and he later pleaded guilty in March of this year. Police from Newport, Manchester, Nashua, and NH State Police all assisted the FBI in the investigation and arrest of Langlois last year.

In other court news now, in what has been a lengthy case, the former owner of a West Lebanon nightclub has had his request for a shorter prison sentence denied. *The Valley News* reports that Louis A. Fucci Jr., the former owner of the Benning Street Bar and Grill was in court on Wednesday this week to hear the ruling on his request for a shorter prison sentence for a crime he committed in 2011. Fucci had hired a hitman to kill his former business partner and ex-girlfriend after business had begun to decline, but the hitman alerted authorities. He was arrested and pleaded guilty in 2013. Just this year, in April, he went before the judge in Windsor Superior Court to ask for his sentence of 10 to 15 years to be reduced to 6 to 15 years. The judge ruled on Wednesday to retain the original sentence as he was not convinced from April's hearing that the sentence should be reduced. Fucci had been trying to prove that he was suffering from mental illness during the time of the crime and believed that the court was overlooking that fact. He may be released in 2021.

Wanna pump some iron or break a nice workout sweat but don't have somewhere to do it? Fortunately enough for residents in the surrounding area around Claremont, the Claremont Savings Bank Community Center and the city are re-examining their membership programs to allow more people to join. In fact, they're doing more than just re-examining membership and the City Council has voted to approve a new corporate membership program. According to *The Eagle Times*, despite some disagreement, the Council voted 6-3 in favor of activating a corporate membership program that would benefit non-residents. The move to this type of membership has been in the works since this spring as the town has been speaking with Active Net, a software firm that will host the new membership system. Mayor Charlene Lovett voted against the membership, but most of the Council was in favor it. The discussion revolved around the actual cost for non-residents, but most council members

were more concerned with simply driving more members and thus, revenue, to the community center. The CSBCC opened in 2013 and is located on 152 South Street.

There's been a lot going on around the country recently, especially with both the Republican and Democratic National Conventions taking place over the past two weeks. However, the recent slew of killings of both black men and police officers in various locations around the US has sparked discussions on the local level. Community members in Brattleboro met this week to discuss race relations, hoping to shed a local light on a national issue. *The Brattleboro Reformer* reports that the event, which was a public forum, was organized after community organizer Patrina Lingard spoke with Jose Moldano, a former New York City Police Department officer. It was put on in hopes of understanding the social issues that exist across the nation and how they, in Brattleboro, could break down barriers and create an open, friendly environment. Of particular mention was how the town's police force could be both more accessible and community-minded and that how having conversations like the public forum was a step in creating a safe community. Representatives from many different parties attended, including Vermont State Police, Brattleboro Police, and Black Lives Matter Vermont.

In a case that was considered resolved earlier this year, a local official has echoed the state's ruling regarding Croydon's use of public funds for private school tuition. *WNTK Radio* says that on Friday, Sullivan County Superior Court Judge Brian Tucker ruled that students from Croydon who attend the private Newport Montessori School will not have their tuition paid for by public taxpayer money. This ruling reflects a veto by Governor Maggie Hassan of House Bill 1637 in June, which would have allowed students to attend private schools on public funds, part of school choice. The State Board of Education determined that students attending private schools on public money might not be receiving adequate education or reaching certain state education requirements. The state had filed an injunction against Croydon last year when it was found that four students were attending the Newport private school on public taxpayer money. Now, following the state and Judge Tucker's ruling, that tuition money must come out of the parents' own pockets.

In crime news now, this story may seem all too familiar if you joined us last week, as a second man from our area has been sentenced to prison for possession of child porn. Shawn Ellison, a Chester man in his young 20's, was sentenced last week in Vermont Superior Court, Windsor Criminal Division, after he pleaded guilty to three felony counts of Sexial Exploitation of a Child and one felony count of possession of child pornography. The Office of the Attorney General says that he was sentenced to seven to twelve years in prison, all suspended for two years, and was placed on probation for 15 years. During his probation period, he will be subject to certain conditions for sexual offenders, including

counseling and limited access to the internet and children under the age of 16. He will also have to register as a sex offender.

Last week, 49-year old Allen Langlois of Newport was sentenced to 42 months in prison as well as ten years of supervised release. He had been investigated by the FBI over several months and was found with hundreds of still images of child porn on his personal computer.

Staying in Vermont but further north, the Hartford Police Department looked into a report of gunshots last night but found the report to be erroneous. The Hartford PD says that last night around 8:15, officers were dispatched to a report of a family dispute in the 100 Block of Horseshoe Avenue in Wilder Village. The caller had reported that she had been disconnected from a cell phone conversation with her 26-year old son who said he had been chased from a home by gunpoint by his girlfriend's father. The caller explained that her son was hiding in the woods and had been shot at while he ran away. Police could not contact either the son or his girlfriend and responded to Horseshoe Avenue with Norwich Police and Vermont State Police. They found they home in question unoccupied and bystanders said they had heard an argument earlier in the evening but no gunshots. Afterwards, police were able to locate the son in Canaan, New Hampshire and contacted all parties involved. It was determined that the report of a shooting was false and that poor cell reception played a role. Everybody involved is unharmed and police Are still looking into the matter. Anyone with information is asked to contact Hartford Police Officer Eric Clifford at 802-295-9425.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, August 2nd.

Many town officials in our area have been busy with zoning, town management, and looking ahead to the future. All of our stories today involve area towns and future developments that are in the works. First up, in Claremont, the city's Zoning Board of Adjustment has agreed to continue looking at two developments in town: the possible reopening of BJ Bricker's and the Claremont Speedway's RV campground. *The Eagle Times* explains that the closed steak and seafood restaurant on Washington Street is hoping to reopen, but not before they

acquire a variance that would reduce the number of required parking spaces. To approve a variance for the parking, the board will need to see a professional engineer's design. Regarding the Claremont Speedway now, the board heard a two hour presentation this week about the proposed RV campground on Thrasher Road and has unanimously decided to continue to hearing. The 149 spot campsite has received both support and criticism, most notably from land abutters, and the Zoning Board visited the site last week. The board will discuss BJ Brickers' parking situation in early September and will continue to campground discussion during the same meeting.

Down in Rockingham now, the town is moving further towards creating two new development review boards that would replace the current zoning board. *The Eagle Times* reports that the Rockingham Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Adjustment are close to deciding on creating a separate Planning Commission, a PC, and Development Review Board, a DRB. While the Rockingham Planning Commission ultimately has no official capacity to create such a board, it can convince the Selectboard to either divide planning and development review into two separate boards or to retain the original ZBA. State officials told the town that most towns have no difficulty when transferring to a DRB. If all goes according to plan, the PC/DRB model's size would be determined by the Selectboard, who would dictate other facets of the groups function. The town's zoning administrator, Charles Wise Jr, would retain his role and responsibilities after the transition. The Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Adjustment will be meeting on August 17th to talk with the Selectboard regarding the split.

Back in Claremont now, the City Council has said no to a proposed Tax Increment Finance District that would have been located along Charlestown Road and Grissom Lane. *The Valley New* says that the TIF was proposed by City Manager Guy Santagate and would have sponsored economic growth along the aforementioned areas. A TIF is an economic development strategy where a city or town designates an area that looks promising for private investment, sets a minimum assessed value, and improves the area's infrastructure to promote private business. The private development would then hopefully raise the assessed value above the initial minimum amount. The council agreed that the TIF already in place in the downtown has not yielded the expected results, which caused members to be wary of creating another one in a less busy area. Santagate proposed the TIF because it was one of three options to address the drainage problems on Charlestown Road, the other two options being increased tax rates or borrowing the money. City officials hesitated at creating the TIF because of two existing TIFS and needing to focus on them before moving to another.

Across the river and a tad south, the town of Springfield is looking to garner input soon from area residents on the future of the downtown. What's more is that they hope to do it in a casual and low-key manner, allowing for honest and open discussions. Market Madness is fast approaching in late August, hosted by Springfield On The Move, and town officials, in conjunction with a national consulting group, will be asking Springfield residents what they'd like to see from the downtown and how it can be improved as part of a \$75,000 master plan. *The Rutland Herald* says that Greenman-Pedersen Inc., which has an office in White River Junction, will be having a booth at the Market Madness fair on August 20th to receive public input. Some ideas have already been put forth, including a river walk or park area along the Black River.

Springfield's Town Manager says that after the Market Madness booth, GPI and others involved with the project will have an open house in November. The money for possible improvements comes from a grant from the Vermont Agency of Transportation and the Agency of Commerce and Community Development.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, August 3rd.

Crime news is up first tonight and this particular case is very local for Claremont residents. Police say that yesterday around 8:00 in the morning, the Claremont Police Department, the DEA Clandestine Laboratory Team, and New Hampshire State Police executed a search warrant at 44 Central Street on suspicion of drug manufacturing. Authorities arrested 34year old Erica Walker and 33-year old Shaun Teeter during the search for charges of Felony Manufacturing a Controlled Drug. The search team had found evidence of methamphetamine manufacturing and deemed the scene under control and safe. Both Walker and Teeter were scheduled to be arraigned in the 5th Circuit Court, Claremont District Division earlier today. Earlier this year, another local man, 54-year old Bradley Ames, was arrested for Conspiracy to Manufacture Methamphetamine out of his 27 School Street home. He pleaded guilty and is spending one year behind bars and will be under three years probation after release.

In other police news tonight, this time as more of an alert and an inquiry to the public, police in Hartford, Vermont need your help tracking down those responsible for vandalism. The Hartford Police Department is investigating vandalism that occurred last night at the the Cumberland Farms at 1167 Hartford Avenue. The Cumberland Farms gas station is currently closed for renovations and the vandals targeted construction equipment and survey materials, including two excavators. The incident was determined to have taken place last night and into the early hours of this morning and the vandals removed markers placed by survey crews and spray-painted graffiti on the body panels of two excavators on the site. The damage is currently estimated at \$5500 and Hartford Police are actively looking into the incident to find those responsible. If you have any information or know someone who may, you are urged to contact Officer Sean Fernandes at 802-295-9425. This particular Cumberland Farms has been under renovation for some time now and is located conveniently off of Interstate 91.

The long tale of the Vilas Bridge continues tonight with news that the town of Rockingham is looking to pursue legal action against New Hampshire. *The Eagle Times* says that during yesterday's Selectboard hearing, town officials discussed reaching out to an attorney and finding out if it would be worth their while to pursue a case against the Granite State

regarding the Vilas Bridge. The paper says that a Memorandum of Understanding, an MOU, was signed in 1994 by the New Hampshire division of the Federal Highway Administration that ruled that for 22 years, New Hampshire would be responsible for maintenance of the bridge. NH has not maintained the bridge, which carries wastewater from Walpole to Bellows Falls for treatment as part of an agreement, and Rockingham hopes that legal action would spur New Hampshire to repair the old bridge. Yesterday, the board approved inquiring with legal counsel to make sure that they indeed have a case against their twin state.

In Sunapee now, the future of the Old Abbott Library is currently being discussed with one local preservation group presenting their vision of how the building can be used. *WNTK Radio* says that the Sunapee Historical Society, in conjunction with the Town of Sunapee, is moving forward with their idea to install a thrift shop in the lowest level of the building and purchase the building for a quarter million dollars. A lease purchase agreement is on the horizon and public hearings will be held to determine what the public thinks about the building's possible future under the wing of the Sunapee Historical Society. The purchase price would cover payment to the Library Trustees and the Planning Board is being brought into the discussion in September to talk about a handicap ramp to lower level of the building, which would potentially house a thrift shop. The New Abbott Library was built two years ago and since then, they have reported that there has been an 80% increase in visits and 120% increase in the number of library cards issued.

Good evening, it's Thursday, August 4th.

Tonight's news begins with a crime update regarding a story we brought you earlier this week as two Claremont residents who were arrested on Tuesday for methamphetamine manufacturing have been ordered held on bail in court. As part of a drug raid at 44 Central Street on Tuesday, 34-year old Erica Walker and 33-year old Shaun Teeter were arrested on the charge of conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. *The Eagle Times* says that both of the suspects were in court yesterday and held on a high bail amounts, with \$50,000 and \$100,000 for Walker and Teeter, respectively. The high amounts were justified by the extensive criminal records of both suspects, with Teeter having been out on parole from a July 20th release, making it the third time he has violated parole. Police revealed in court that they had witnessed Walker and Teeter purchasing Sudafed, which can be used to cook meth, from the Rite-Aid in town and a cooperating individual had revealed to authorities that they were cooking meth in the Central Street residence. The DEA also had the two on their watch list.

Sticking with crime news, police down in Brattleboro have arrested two people for a hate crime. Police say that late last week, officers from the Brattleboro PD responded to Elliot Street for a report of an assault. At the scene, they found two victims: a male who had been attacked randomly and hit with a beer bottle as well as a female passerby who had been assaulted as well. The reported suspects, a male and female, shouted racial slurs as they had assaulted the female victim. The suspects reportedly fled down the street and Vermont State Police and the Windham County Sheriff's Department assisted in tracking them down, including use of the VSP's K9 Unit. They arrested the female suspect, 20-year old Mariam Belarj for Disorderly Conduct: Hate Motivated as well as other charges. The second suspect was arrested yesterday on Elliot Street, identified as Patrick Wayne Poillon. He was treated for minor injuries sustained during the incident and pleaded not guilty in court. He faces the same hate crime charge as Belarj as well as other charges. Both of the victims have been treated for non life-threatening injuries.

Back in Claremont, it's certainly been a busy year for Stevens High School and school district administrators as they debate with the state over the class schedule. Following the state's Public Employee Labor Relations Board ruling that Stevens stop implementing their new A/B classroom schedule and revert to their former block schedule, the school board met last night to discuss moving forward. Following a heated debate, according to both *The Eagle Times* and *The Valley News*, the board decided to table the discussion for a special meeting as board members clashed on defying the state's ruling. This meeting, with the date and time to be announced, will include the public, teachers, and board members. The A/B schedule was adopted last year to allow students to a higher success rate in their core classes by offering four classes on A days and four other classes on B days throughout the year. The block schedule simply required that students take four classes per semester. With the school year picking up again shortly, students will use the block schedule as school administrators and the public work out how to proceed.

Up in Hanover now, the battle continues over a proposed large athletic facility to be built in a residential neighborhood. Dartmouth has proposed building a 70,000-square-foot athletic facility for its athletes to use year-round, but the location is raising eyebrows and even some fists. Just last week, abutters of the proposed build site off of South Park Street, through their attorney, have filed a request with Hanover's Planning Board to examine the school's application for the site. This is an effort to find a compromise with Dartmouth to adjust the design so that it is more friendly to the surrounding areas in a few different regards. *The Valley News* says that the investigation into the site plan showed many deficiencies and lacked information regarding certain factors such as sound and neighborhood impact. Communication between the college and residents is ongoing and school officials have proposed changing the shape of the roof. Residents have complained mainly about the sheer size of the building, which would resemble a large warehouse and the two sides in the argument hope to reach a compromise before anything is set in stone.

Good evening, it's Friday, August 5th.

We begin tonight with news of an ongoing investigation in the area of Newport, New Hampshire as police are looking into an untimely death. The Newport and Goshen Police Departments are investigated the death that was reported on Wednesday. Both the Sullivan County Sheriff's Department and the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office are assisting in the efforts. Newport Police were initially notified of the death but did not reveal where the body was located. The deceased was identified as a male but his name, residence, and age were have not been revealed at this time. Some type of incident occurred that resulted in the man's death and police performed CPR on him but he was later pronounced dead at Valley Regional Hospital in Claremont. An autopsy was performed yesterday but no exact cause of death has been revealed yet, but it is believed that drugs may have been a factor. Authorities anticipate to release further details as family members are notified.

On a different note now, the search for Claremont's new city manager to replace outgoing longtime manager Guy Santagate is progressing further. *The Eagle Times* says that the City Council voted 5-1 during a special meeting on Wednesday to reach out to Municipal Resources Incorporated (MRI) to help the council in finding a replacement city manager who would take office in 2017. A subcommittee, consisting of councilors Scott Pope and Carolyn Towle as well as Assistant Mayor Victor Bergeron had recommended MRI, which is based out of Meredith, NH. They chose MRI, which specializes in government consulting, over four other firms because of their extended reach and familiarity with the New England area. City Manager Guy Santagate, who is the longest serving city manager in the city's history, having served 15 years, announced his retirement in December last year, which will take place at the end of this year. The City Council has been anticipating this inevitable announcement and has been looking into filling his spot since 2013. MRI's services will cost the city more than \$15,000.

New Hampshire is a great place to live and work. However, one of the difficult conundrums for retaining our young people and even providing housing for professionals is the lack of living units at all economic levels. YCN caught up with Darryl Parker, owner of Schoodacs Coffee and Tea shop in Warner, who recently posted his thoughts on his Facebook page. He said he has a couple 20-somethings working for him and they just can't find a place to live in the area. Looking into the problem, he found that there is nothing available at the entry level in this area. He told us that around 60% of high school students that leave the state for college do not return, largely due to this problem. YCN asked him what people could do.

Good evening, it's Monday, August 8th.

It was a scary scene last night in Springfield, Vermont as a man suffered non-life threatening injuries from a single vehicle crash. Springfield Police say that at around 9:30 PM, they responded to multiple calls regarding a single vehicle rollover that had occurred on Chester Road near the area of the Church of Christ. An investigation revealed that 28-year old Travis Tyrrell of Chester, Vermont lost control of his 2015 Ford F150 and hit a ditch just west of the Church of Christ, causing the vehicle to go airborne and rolling over when it hit the ground again. It came to a rest back on its wheels and both Tyrrell and his passenger, an 18-year old male, were transported to Springfield Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Neither of the vehicle's occupants were wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident. Anyone who may have witnessed the accident or has information regarding it, you are urged to contact Officer Steven Neily of Springfield Police at 802-885-2113.

In Claremont now but on a lighter note, a local educational group has officially purchased a distinguishable and unique building on Main Street. Twin State MakerSpace, a group that promotes art and creativity in the immediate and surrounding areas, just last week purchased the Sawtooth Building at 44-46 Main Street. *The Eagle Times* says that MakerSpace purchased the building on August 1st for \$18.42 through a quitclaim deed. The Lebanon-based nonprofit was given the chance to purchase the building back in 2014 for

one dollar in hopes that once purchased, they would rehabilitate and renovate the historic building. Makerspace had been given a quarter million dollar economic development grant in the fall of last year to purchase equipment and materials needed to complete their goals. In this particular building, they will host precision machining instruments, 3-D printers, a wood shop, and other valuable resources. The Sawtooth Building is no stranger to Claremont and has been around since the early 1990's. However, part of it was demolished and turned into a parking garage, as part of an agreement. City officials have expressed enthusiasm in the downtown being revitalized in efforts such as this.

Amid multiple stories of turmoil within local school districts, including Stevens High School's controversial new schedule, residents and officials in Croydon are continuing to fight for their right to send schools to private school with public money. Following Judge Brian Tucker's recent ruling that Croydon can't use taxpayer money to fund the tuition of students attending the Newport Montessori School, which sided with an injunction filed by the state, residents and officials met last Thursday to discuss moving forward. Currently, six students attend the private school in Newport and *The Valley News* says that half of the \$8,200 annual tuition has already been paid. The School Board told around 30 residents who attended that they will be filing an appeal of Judge Tucker's ruling, and if not successful, will take their case to the NH Supreme Court. The State Board of Education and many other authorities are concerned that if students attend unapproved private schools, they may not receive adequate education that they would have received at a state-standard public school. For parents and local school administrators, school choice and allowing parents to send their kids wherever they want remains at the forefront of the discussion. No official decision on the appeal has been made yet.

On more of a grave note now, Dartmouth College has taken some initial steps in their cleanup plan for a contaminated test animal disposal site. Late last week, New Hampshire officials who specialize in water regulation, approved the revised cleanup plan for the historic Rennie Farm, which is a contaminated site. *The Valley News* says that the Rennie Farm site at Dartmouth College used to be the dump site for several tons of deceased radioactive test animals as part of tests and studies at Dartmouth's medical school. However, the radioactivity contaminated a private well and even though cleanup was undertaken in 2011, workers recently found waste that had been missed. So far, around \$5 million has been put into the cleanup efforts and the school must wait until later this week for state nuclear regulators to approve the revised clean up. The Department of Environmental Services has said that their immediate goal is to remove the extra lab animals that were recently discovered, in light of neighbors demanding a more thorough cleanup. The most recent work plan was submitted in late July and will tackle a 30 by 30 foot burial plot.

Close to 200 hundred racers competed in the 33rd annual New London Hospital Days triathlon held in New London on August 7th. Teams and individuals began by swimming a quarter mile in Little Lake Sunapee followed by a 5.7 bike ride around Little Lake Sunapee and and then a 5K run through New London finishing the race at the New London Historical Society. The top individual men's winner was Jake Parker from Stow with a time of 40:27.5. The individual women's winner was Kate Newick from New London with a time of 47:33.6. Taking second and third place for mens was Brendan Mulvey of Brighton Massachusetts and David Hollely of Belmont Massachusetts. For womens' second and third, we have Rachel Kelly-Martin of New London, sticking up for the hometown, and Morgan Ashworth of North Attleboro Massachusetts. Competitors came from all over to take part in the race, including many racers from Masschusetts but also some from Colorado and Washington DC. Congratulations to winners and to all of those who took part.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, August 9th.

We begin tonight with an ongoing investigation and a call for information as police are looking into a single-vehicle crash that occurred early this morning. Vermont State Police say that three people were injured when a 2000 Volkswagen Passat was totalled after crashing on Interstate 91 around 1:30 this morning just north of mile marker 80 near White River Junction, Vermont. The driver lost control of the vehicle and it went off of the road on the east side of the Interstate. After coming to a rest, it burst into flames and all three occupants were able to escape, but not without suffering non-life threatening injuries. 27-year old Michael Alger and 24-year old Jonathan Ruggles of Haverhill, NH and 26-year old John Winot of Woodsville were injured, including lacerations and bruising. Police are looking for two pieces of information: they are hoping to hear from anyone who may have witnessed the crash or the green Volkswagen between the hours of 1:00 and 1:30 AM on I-89 north between Lebanon, to WRJ or on I-91 north between WRJ and Norwich. If you have information on either the crash or the saw the car that was involved, you're asked to contact Trooper Pregent at the Royalton State Police Barracks between the hours of 5:00 PM and 2:00 AM. The phone number for the Barracks is 802-234-9933.

Take one look at the rivers and streams around our area and you'll no doubt notice that the water levels are much lower than usual. You don't need me to tell you that we are in a drought, having not received any significant rain for quite a while now. In light of this, the town of Newport is enacting a voluntary water reduction notice because of the statewide drought condition. The town, on their website, have posted a list of ways that residents can reduce their water consumption until we receive more water in the way of rain. Ideas include taking shorter showers and keeping drinking water in the fridge so that you use the faucet less. Other are to reduce the washing of cars, watering of lawns, filling of swimming pools,

and to wash dishes by hand. For non-residents, other ideas are being offered, such as reducing the amount of water served in restaurants, if you're a server, and to only provide water unless specifically requested by a customer. For both residents and non-residents, you're urged to adjust all water-using appliances so that you're using the minimum amount of water needed for the appliance to function. The voluntary water reduction request will remain in effect until further notice.

In medical news now, the region's largest hospital is going to be awarded a contract to provide services for New Hampshire Hospital. Executive Councilor Joe Kenney told *The Valley News* that the Executive Council is going to be asked to award Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center with a three-year contract to provide professional services at the Concord-based New Hampshire Hospital. The paper says that Kenney had been told by Health and Human Commissioner Jeffrey Meyers that he had decided on the three-year contract and will be presenting it to the Council for their approval. The contract has not received unanimous approval so far, and the 5-member Council had even signed a letter to Meyers in mid June, expressing that they wanted to see a new bidding process for the hospital contract. It was that same day that a temporary deal was enacted with DHMC and NHH, which required that psychiatrists and nurse practitioners sign letters of intent for DHMC. A handful did not and they were let go, forcing Dartmouth-Hitchcock to fill empty spots at the Concord hospital, sparking controversy. The proposed new three-year contract will be presented in the near future.

It may be just less than two months away but that does not mean that Warner is not preparing for their annual Fall Foliage Festival. At a recent meeting of the festival organizers, they made an exciting announcement.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, August 10th.

We begin tonight with three stories regarding two car accidents and a fatal fire across Lebanon, Grantham, and Brattleboro. First, in Lebanon, a rollover car crash last night has resulted in injuries and an arrest for DUI. Police say 19-year old Mykaela Simond of White River Junction, Vermont was driving at high speeds Tuesday night around 7:30pm when she flipped her car on Old Pine Cemetery Road. Also in the car was 23 year old Michael Taylor of Lebanon. During the 911 call that alerted the police about the crash, it was believed that a pedestrian was hit by a car but upon further investigation, it was determined that the driver and passenger were thrown from the car when it rolled over. Both of the victims were transported to the hospital by the Lebanon Fire Department due to the serious bodily injuries sustained by each passenger. Simond was arrested and charged with Aggravated Driving While Intoxicated, a felony and she will appear in the Lebanon District Division, NH Second Circuit Court on October 3rd.

Further down I-89 now, in Grantham, police are investigating a road rage incident that was caught on camera and are seeking the driver who damaged another vehicle. New Hampshire State Police say that they responded to a vehicle collision that took place yesterday near mile marker 48 in Grantham. Authorities discovered that a 2014 Volkswagen Jetta had been hit by a white 2003 Ford Explorer in what was determined to be a road rage incident. What's more is that the incident was caught on camera. The Ford, while travelling North on I-89, passed the Volkswagen and merged in front of the Volkwagen while braking. An impact occurred and the Volkswagen lost control and hit a bridge abutment where DOT crews had been working. The driver and a child passenger suffered non-life threatening injuries and were transported to DHMC. Meanwhile, the driver of the Ford fled the scene and an arrest warrant has been placed on the vehicle's operator. The identities of the Volkswagen's driver and passenger are being withheld at this time, given that this is an active investigation. Anyone who may have information regarding this incident is urged to contact New Hampshire State Police Trooper Michael Catalfamo at 603-223-8697.

In Brattleboro, Vermont now, a community is mourning the loss of two residents who were killed in a mobile home fire last night. The Brattleboro Fire Department say that they responded to 3 Record Drive just before midnight last night and found a mobile home engulfed in flames. The fire was deemed under control around 1:15 AM after about an hour and a half of battling the flames. Crews were finally able to enter the structure and discovered the two deceased bodies. The Brattleboro FD told *The Brattleboro Reformer* that they believe the two deceased occupants had died before they arrived on the scene. Additionally one dog died as a result of the fire and two cats are unaccounted for at this time. The mobile home was deemed a total loss and the fire is under investigation as authorities have only identified that it started in a bedroom but do not know the exact cause yet. Two occupants were able to escape the burning residence and are now under the care of the Red Cross Disaster Action Team.

Good evening, it's Thursday, August 11th.

We begin tonight with an update in the case of former Bernice A. Ray Elementary School Matthew Laramie. Tonight's update is that the Hanover School Board has regained the \$30,000 that Laramie spent through unauthorized purchases on his school-assigned credit card. Additionally, he will not be facing criminal charges. Laramie resigned in February when allegations arose that he was using his school credit card for purchases on school-related trips that were not within the allowable uses rules. An audit showed the exact purchases, which included bar tabs, gas money, food, and various other luxuries. *The Valley News* reports that the insurance company that represents the school district agreed to write a check for around \$34,000 to cover the expenses that Laramie was responsible for. No criminal investigation is currently open on Laramie and the school district does not see it as necessary to open a case. The reason mainly due to the fact that there is no victim in this case, which is needed in order to investigate a crime.

An update from a story we brought you yesterday regarding a road rage incident in Grantham, NH caught on camera. Police say that 65-year old Henry Carnevale of Newbury was arrested at his residence Tuesday afternoon for Reckless Conduct and Conduct After an Accident. He had fled the scene of a road rage incident on I-89 near mile marker 48 around 7:30 AM earlier that day. New Hampshire State Police and local authorities responded to the scene and identified that a 2014 white Volkswagen Jetta was travelling north while a 2003 white Ford Expedition was following closely behind. The Ford passed the Volkswagen and while it merged back in front of the Volkswagen, the driver applied the brakes, causing the vehicles to impact. The Volkswagen lost control and crashed, injuring both the driver and a child passenger. The driver, later identified as Carnevale, fled the

scene and was found at his Newbury residence. Carnevale was held behind bars overnight on \$5,000 cash bail and was arraigned in Newport Circuit Court yesterday. He was released on \$25,000 personal recognizance bail.

Down in Bellows Falls now, the town is considering a second police officer for all shifts. The Bellows Fall Village Board of Trustees has yet to make any sort of move on this new idea and has merely begun to discuss it in light of potential future violence and drug use. *The Eagle Times* says that town officials have expressed concern that the violence taking place in other parts of the country will eventually occur in Bellows Falls and Rockingham and that they'd like to be prepared for such an occurrence. Other concerns that helped spark the discussion about an enhanced police presence include parking and losing spaces in the downtown. The Bellows Fall Police Department does not always have more than one officer covering shifts throughout the day and the police chief has expressed enthusiasm in receiving additional staffing, provided it does not become a fiscal burden. At the board's next meeting is when they'll discuss the proposal of adding extra police officers to provide enhanced coverage or a parking enforcement official to help monitor the situation downtown. The meeting is taking place September 13th.

Who doesn't enjoy live music? It doesn't matter if it's not the particular genre that you like but it's hard not to at least tap your foot when live music permeates through the air. A seminew restaurant in Hanover, the Skinny Pancake, has had their request approved to enact a cover charge for live music at their establishment. *The Valley News* says that the Hanover Zoning Board of Adjustment, after a previous dispute, has sided in favor of the Skinny Pancake to charge customers at the door for live music, for the cause of raising money for Vital Communities. Previously, the Board had cancelled a concert when they found out that the restaurant was charging customers at the door. However, the restaurant's co-owner filed an appeal and just last week, the Zoning Board reversed their initial decision, this time unanimously approving the use of cover charges for this particular eatery. Skinny Pancake is a crepe restaurant based out of Burlington, Vermont and the co-owner told the paper that the cover charge is not unique to its Hanover location.

Good evening, it's Friday, August 12th.

Crime news is up first tonight as Vermont State Police have notched another drug arrest on Vermont's highways. A 19-year old Rhode Island man, Deven Guernon, was arrested yesterday afternoon for having having heroin, cocaine, and a regulated drug in his car during a traffic stop. Vermont State Police say they pulled over Guernon in Westminster for a traffic stop and while conducting a search of his vehicle, police found marijuana and cocaine. He was subsequently arrested and brought to the Westminster Barracks for processing there. Police then searched his clothing and body and found a felony amount of heroin and cocaine, as well as Xanax pills, a sedative used to treat anxiety disorders. He was then fingerprinted, photographed, and transported to the Southern State Correctional Facility for lack of \$15,000 bail. He was due in Windham County Superior Court today to answer to his charges. Vermont State Police, as well as local authorities, continue to not only try to mitigate the drug crisis occurring in Vermont, but also try to keep drugs from coming into the state.

It was a scary situation for one particular swimmer yesterday afternoon as he was injured while in the water, but the Hartford Fire Department was able to rescue him and deem him safe and sound. The Hartford Fire Department says that they were dispatched to a report of an injured swimmer in the Ottaquechee River near the Quechee Covered Bridge, which is known to be a popular swimming spot. First units on the scene found a 14-year old male swimmer on the water's edge, being tended to by other swimmers. Fire officials discovered that the swimmer had jumped 6-8 feet into the water from a ledge and hit a rock underwater, injuring his lower back and hip area. Because of his location and injuries, he was extricated using a stokes basket to the roadway. He was loaded onto an ambulance and transported to DHMC for treatment there. His injuries were non-life threatening and the patient remained conscious and alert during the rescue. Additional Hartford units helped respond to provide extra manpower and equipment to rescue the injured swimmer.

A quick update tonight in a story we brought you earlier this week as Dartmouth College has received full clearance to enact their revised cleanup plan of a contaminated site near campus. *The Valley News* states that following an initial approval by state water regulators last week of a revised cleanup plan of the Rennie Farm lab animal disposal site, state nuclear regulators have given their OK as well. the Rennie Farm site near Dartmouth College used to be the dump site for several tons of deceased radioactive test animals as part of tests and studies at Dartmouth's medical school. However, the radioactivity contaminated a private well and even though cleanup was undertaken in 2011, workers recently found waste that had been missed. So far, around \$5 million has been put into the cleanup efforts and the Department of Environmental Services has said that their immediate goal is to remove the extra lab animals that were recently discovered. Neighbors of the site have demanded a more thorough cleanup and this time, monitoring wells will be installed to keep on eye on the contamination of the soil and water, should there be any more. Officials anticipate this particular cleanup operation to only last a few days.

Good evening, it's Monday, August 15th.

Crime news is up first tonight as two men arrested in Lebanon last week for heroin were scheduled to answer for their crimes today in court. Last week, the Lebanon Police Department responded to a reported drug overdose at a residence on Perley Avenue. The first two officers on scene administered CPR to the overdose victim, a 32-year old male, and he was revived shortly after using Narcan provided by the Fire Department. Police investigated the source of the heroin and led them to 30-year old Brock Richardson of Oak Hill Road in Enfield. He was arrested after being identified as the supplier that caused the overdose and as the seller of heroin to 21-year old Caleb Dumont-Willey of Water Street in Leb. Richardson was charged with two counts of Sale of the Narcotic Drug Heroin as well as the Intent to Distribute. Dumont-Willey faces charges of possession of heroin and both men were held on \$5,000 and \$20,000 bail prior to their arraignment, which took place this morning. This batch of heroin was in bags marked "Game of Thrones" and appears to have a high potency level. Police are still investigating and are warning people that this batch could be lethal.

Continuing our serious news now, there were two fires that took place this weekend on both sides of the river in Westminster and Charlestown. First up, Westminster Fire and Rescue says they responded to Gage Street last night around 9:30 for a reported house fire. Units who arrived on the scene within minutes found a 2.5 story building about 75% engulfed in flames. After identifying the intensity of the blaze, a 2nd alarm was struck which subsequently called in additional units and personnel as part of mutual aid. The fire was knocked down entirely and under control by around 3 in the morning and one unit stayed overnight on fire watch. The home has been unoccupied for several years and there was no one inside at the time of the blaze. Meanwhile, in Charlestown on Saturday night, a mobile

home was struck by a fire as well around 10 AM. There were no reported injuries and the cause of the fire is under investigation, but the cause is believed to be electrical. The building has been deemed a complete loss because of smoke and water damage. Crews from the surrounding region came to assist on the scene.

On a lighter note now, the plan for the future of the site that houses the closed Pizza Hut on Route 12A in West Lebanon has received a revision. The Lebanon Planning Board will be hearing from August Bristol Pizza LLC of Maine regarding a mixed-use building that they're planning to build at 257 Plainfield Road after having revised their site plan. The Planning Board previously approved a multi-tenant building that would be twice the size of the closed Pizza Hut building and would house a dental office, a restaurant, and retail storefronts. But now, the revised plan, according to *The Valley News*, won't have retail space but will still have a dental office and a coffee shop, including a drive-thru. As a result of the revised plan, the square footage has been reduced by around a thousand feet and there will be less parking spaces than originally designed. There has been some discussion regarding the parking situation and how this new building would increase the amount of traffic along 12A, considering there would be dental office employees and patients as well as coffee shop staff and customers. The Planning Board is expected to examine the redesigned site plan on September 12th.

In municipal news in Claremont now, the city's wastewater treatment plant has received a new five-year permit following a lengthy inspection. *The Eagle Times* reports that the Environmental Protection Agency renewed the plant's permit for the next five years, explained in an 80-page document that explains that the plant on Plains Road is indeed operating under the guidelines set by the Clean Water Act. The wastewater treatment plant is capable of treating around 1.4 million gallons of water per day and is in compliance with standards that require phosphorous and nitrogen be taken out of the water. The inspection of the plant, which ultimately deemed it eligible to receive a permit renewal, took several years and officials conducted a multitude of tests on wastewater at the plant. This inspection was carried out internally and with the assistance of a hired specialist working on the city's dime. The recent talk of the town has been the proposed increases in water and sewer rates, which would fund improvements at the wastewater plant and the reservoirs. One such improvement would be increasing the size of the pipes that carry water from the reservoirs to the treatment plant, which is currently being made up for by drawing water from the Sugar River.

In medical news tonight out of the region's largest healthcare provider, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center's fourth quarter fiscal year results have revealed a large deficit. Results published on Friday on the website Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board showed that DHMC saw a \$22.6 million operating loss for the 4th quarter of the fiscal year, which ended on June 30th this year. *The Valley News* says that this loss eliminated a small positive

operating margin from the other three quarters, leaving the hospital down \$12.2 million for the year. The hospital has since expressed that they did not expect to see such results, but were aware of three problems in the past month that did serious damage to the budget. The three issues that took a toll on the budget were implementing a new federally ordained illness coding method, combining business and patient software, and outsourcing billing services. This \$12 million loss for the year extends a now 3-year streak of having negative results, with a slightly less \$9 million loss last year.

Man's best friend deserves many things, including food, tender loving care, and a nice scratch behind the ears. But how about body armor? The Lebanon Police Department's K9 named Briggs is on track to receive a bullet and stab protective vest as part of a charitable donation by an anonymous donor. The vest is coming from Vested Interest in K9s Incorporated of in Massachusetts and will be embroidered with "This gift of protection provided by Vested Interest in K9s, Inc". Briggs' handler, Officer Tracy, has been an officer with Lebanon since 2003 and has been handling the male German Shephard since 2013. The duo of Officer Tracy and K9 Briggs received a Commendation Bar for Lifesaving in January this year when they successfully tracked the victim of a motor vehicle accident who had fled into the forest in the snow. When they found him, he was suffering from hypothermia, but he was saved by responders. In October, Tracy and Briggs will be given the New Hampshire Congressional Law Enforcement Award in the "Dedication and Professionalism" category. The protective vest, which will protect Briggs from bullet and stab wounds, should arrive in eight to ten weeks.

With many popular movements taking place across the country in regards to environmental health and sustainability, one has made its way to our region and is being highlighted next month. I'm speaking about the tiny house movement which involves tiny homes, which are, as the name implies, much smaller than a regular home, and thus, much more environmentally friendly. On September 4th, Brattleboro will be hosting Tiny House Fest Vermont which will see Flat Street closed off and becoming a Tiny House village. Event goers will be able to examine tiny houses, including a transformed school bus and designs by Tiny House Crafters and Jamaica Cottage Shop. The day will focus on environmental awareness and will feature solar technology and trailers made specifically for tiny homes so that you can take your home on the go. The event is being put on with assistance from the Downtown Brattleboro Alliance.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, August 17th.

Can you hear me now? How about now? Well good because this story focuses solely on one of our five senses and how it can be used to help an argument you may be making, at least in this case. Neighbors of Dartmouth College in the area around the Alexis Boss Tennis Center are now saying that the facility is violating allowable noise levels and should have its license revoked. The reason for this sudden outcry? Hanover residents in a particular neighborhood are continuing to fight against a proposed 70,000-square foot athletic facility that would be built right off of South Park Street. The Boss Center, as it's called, was established in 1999 and *The Valley News* says that seven neighbors submitted a letter to the Hanover Planning Board on Friday about the noise level at the tennis facility. This may thwart the construction of the large athletic facility, which has yet to be approved or denied, considering that the application is not yet complete. The Board has since said that if they find a violation at the existing facility, they would try to reduce the noise rather than pull the permit entirely.

Another development is taking place in our region, but this one is moving forward without public outcry, in fact, it has only received support. The Brattleboro Central Fire Station has had their plans for construction approved by the town's Development Review Board. This renovation is part of a three-part improvement of the town's police and fire facilities. The *Brattleboro Reformer* says that the renovated facility will have three new engine bays and a space for larger vehicles, such as a big ladder truck, and part of one of the bays that faces Elliot Street will be converted to office space. Firefighters can also expect a new three-story high hose tower and new offices for the captain and lieutenant. No work on the front of the building has been proposed so far save for the idea of redoing some of the pavement to allow for a handicap parking space. Work on the West Brattleboro Fire Station is ongoing after the site plans were approved earlier this year and the police station is moving forward in their move to Black Mountain Road, in the same building as the *Reformer*. The update on that development is that officials are running a second environmental assessment to check out printing process debris that was found in the sewers.

Do you have a need for a large 15,000-square foot facility or are you part of a group that could have a use for one? Well if that's the case, you may want to check out the former Vermont National Guard Armory in Windsor, Vermont. Town officials are probing the waters to see if there is any community interest in finding a use for the large building on Route 44.

The Eagle Times says that the informal survey of community interest was proposed by one of the town's selectboard members and around 30 people toured the building today at 4 PM. The goal of the tour was to determine possible uses for the building and to see if there is a need or desire to turn the building in a recreational facility. If converted to such a resource, it would become the second in town, the first being the Windsor Recreation Center in the same building empty when they combined with other Guard contingents, which has happened in another area town: Ludlow. Town Manager Tom Marsh told the *Eagle Times* that Ludlow converted their old Guard facility into a community center. Other ideas for the Windsor facility include a bowling alley or an indoor shooting range.

In political news now, with New Hampshire's Primary Election right around the corner, Warner's MainStreet BookEnds is hosting a Community Candidates Forum featuring one of the candidates for the Governor's Executive Council. Let's find out more.

Good evening, it's Thursday, August 18th.

Crime news is up first tonight as the Lebanon Police Department's K9 Briggs was able to track down a suspect who fled from law enforcement officials. Lebanon Police say that earlier this week on Monday around 5 in the morning, officers observed 42-year old Jamie Judkins walking near an apartment complex in town. He was known to have had multiple arrest warrants out on him, including one from Belknap County for failing to appear on a burglary charge. Judkins fled when he saw police officers. However, police returned to the area later that day around 8:30 PM and it was discovered that he had fled to his residence. Officers again tried to approach him and he fled a second time, but Senior Officer Tracy and K-9 Briggs were able to track and locate Judkins in the area of Mechanic Street. He was apprehended there and was held without bail while he waits for arraignment at the Belknap Superior Court. And a quick note regarding K9 Briggs, if you saw YCN News earlier this week, you know that Briggs is receiving some body armor shortly to help save his life while he saves others.

We may all remember that dreadful day in grade school when you'd go to the nurse's office and they'd stick a scary needle in your arm telling you it'll help you. Flu shots remain ever-

important, especially for kids growing up, and a handful of local health providers are teaming up to make sure that our kids in school stay safe from influenza as they grow into healthy adults. The Greater Sullivan County Public Health Network has announced that nursing staff members from Valley Regional Hospital, New London Hospital, and the Lake Sunapee Region VNA and Hospice will be providing flu immunization clinics at area schools to help immunize thousands of our area's youngsters this fall. This effort is aided considerably by a grant received in 2013 from the NH Department of Health and Human Services and the Lake Sunapee Region VNA alone vaccinated 726 elementary school students last year. Because there will be three institutions assisting this time around, officials plan to vaccinate high school students maintain their health, which has been estimated to save families roughly \$450 per school year. For more on the group that is leading this initiative, you can visit SullivanCountyNH.gov/Public Health to learn a little extra.

Good evening, it's Friday, August 19th.

Earlier this week we told you about two men who were arrested by Lebanon Police for heroin possession after an overdose. The two men, one of which was a supplier, the other a buyer, were in possession of a new strain of heroin in the area called "Game of Thrones" and officials are warning that it is more deadly and potent than other strains. The Springfield Police Department, among other local police departments, and the Vermont Department of Health are all warning residents of this particular strain. State officials say that according to reports from emergency responders over the weekend, there were 10 reported overdoses, which all required at least one dose of Narcan to revive those affected. The bags of heroin marked "Game of Thrones", which may be laced with fentanyl, were determined to have been connected to these overdoses. Narcan, an antidote, can reverse an overdose, but must be given quickly and may need more than one dose. The Health Department has offered some tips online for those who are street drug users, including to inject less if it feels too strong and to not mix it with alcohol. For more information on this potent strain that is present across the whole state and in our region, you can visit HealthVermont.gov.

As the search for Claremont's new city manager continues, the City Council has agreed on a new salary for the incoming manager. They plan to advertise the position with the salary out in the open and on the table, hoping to attract more potential candidates that way. *The Eagle Times* says that the city council has voted on compensation of up to \$135,000, up from the roughly \$100,000 that current city manager Guy Santagate currently makes. The salary and the idea to put it out in the open as part of the listing was proposed by MRI Municipal Resources out of Meredith, NH, the firm hired by the city to help look for a new city manager. Council members looked at salaries of city managers in other towns and cities in the state and found that Santagate's current salary is on the lower end of the spectrum. Santagate, who is the longest serving city manager in the city's history, having served 15 years, announced his retirement in December last year, which will take place at the end of this year. The City Council has been anticipating this inevitable announcement and has been looking into filling his spot since 2013. MRI's services will cost the city more than \$15,000.

News for you Vermonters out there who are from the Cavendish area or who travel through it. There is an expected road closure on the schedule starting next Monday on Cavendish Gulf Road which will allow for a slope stabilization project. Casella Construction Incorporated, with a nearly \$500,000 bid will be completing the the work which will fortify the embankment along the Green Mountain Railroad Corporation's rail line. The stabilization work will be done using soil nails and shotcrete, which will also be cleaning out the stone culvert beneath the railroad bridge. The project will start August 22nd and the road will be closed from 7 AM to 6 PM every day until September 18th, which is the project end date. The road will still be worked on until October 28th, but the road will remain open during that time. The project's contract was awarded last month in July and the project manager is Kyle Wells. If you want any further information on this project and how it may affect your commute, feel free to contact the Vermont Agency of Transportation at 802-324-5522.

Anyone who's attended a college or university must remember walking back and forth relentlessly between classes, dorm rooms, dining halls, student centers etc. But for those who ever used a bicycle to make such a trip knows how useful they can be on a college campus. Dartmouth College is now the next school to look into a bike share program on campus to provide students a resource to assist in following their daily schedule and possibly reducing the number of last minute sprints to class. Beginning this fall, according to Dartmouth News, the college is partnering with Zagster, a bike-sharing company that will make 50 bikes available at eight different locations around the college, including Sachem Village. The bikes won't be available for free and instead, students will have the option to take part in a \$6 daily membership or a \$20 annual membership which provide unlimited bike rentals for up to an hour each day. Some of the rental stations include Baker-Berry Library, the Tuck School of Business, and the Leverone Field House. This pilot program will last for two years and officials hope it will improve campus life in many regards.

Good evening, it's Monday, August 22nd.

We begin tonight with tragic news out of Claremont as a Charlestown man is dead after being trapped under a car in Moody Park. Currently, there aren't many details in this case as it is under investigation, but here's what we know: Claremont Police say that a 37-year old man was pulled out from underneath a vehicle in Moody Park yesterday. Emergency crews who responded were there on reports of someone being trapped under a car near Maple Street that was off of the roadway leading into the park. Authorities found the man underneath the car, as reported, and the Claremont Fire Department assisted in lifting the car off of the victim, who was found unresponsive. He was declared deceased and it appeared that he had died before the car was lifted off of him. An initial investigation revealed that the man may have been working on his vehicle from underneath and the devices holding the car up gave way, causing the car to fall on him. After notification of family members, the victim's name was revealed as 37-year old James M Dearborn from Charlestown, New Hampshire. The case is still under investigation.

In what seems to a be trend in the past year, another one of our region's covered bridges has been struck by a motorist who then fled the scene. Newport's Corbin Bridge is the victim of this hit and run, which occurred on Saturday, prior to 1:45 PM. Around that time, the Newport Emergency Communications Center received multiple calls that someone had hit Corbin Bridge and caused extensive damage before fleeing the scene. Newport Police officers responded and found serious damage to the facade but it was deemed still structurally sound. They also found car parts on the ground, which had hit the bridge while traveling East, meaning the car was left with extensive damage to the passenger side of the

vehicle. Police are seeking information on this incident and are urging anyone with information or anyone who witnessed the hit and run to contact the Newport Police Department or the Connecticut Valley Crime Stoppers. The Corbin Bridge was built in 1845 and was destroyed by a fire in 1993, thus removing it from the National Register of Historic Places. It was since rebuilt and is one of 54 wooden covered bridges in New Hampshire.

In other crime news now, a White River Junction man is under arrest after driving the wrong way on Interstate 89 and is facing charges of DUI. Vermont State Police say that around 1:30 AM on Sunday morning, they received a call from a driver on I-89 who reported another driver traveling the wrong direction on the highway. The motorist was driving southbound in the northbound lanes and was reported around mile marker 8 in the town of Hartford. Troopers from VSP responded and intercepted the vehicle just north of Exit 1, Quechee. 46-year old Brendan Scribner of WRJ was arrested on suspicion of DUI and was processed at the Hartford Police Department. He was released on a criminal citation to appear in Vermont Superior Court Windsor Criminal Division later this year for DUI charges. Earlier this year, a Hartland man was charged with DUI after killing a Rhode Island woman while driving the wrong way on I-89. The driver, 38-year old Daniel Cowdrey, posted his \$25,000 bail and waived his probable cause hearing.

Further down I-89 now, authorities responded to a rollover crash in Warner over the weekend that left two people in the hospital. On Friday night around 4:30 PM, New Hampshire State Police say they responded to a rollover crash in Warner involving two vehicles. The Warner and Hopkinton Fire Departments responded as well and found that two vehicles had been involved in a crash ending on the side of the roadway. The two vehicles involved were a Mitsubishi and a Toyota SUV, driven by 60-year old Jeffrey Scott of Amherst, NH and 33-year old Paul Bradley of Dennis, MA, respectively. Each vehicle had rolled over and sustained extensive damage on the right side of the roadway. Scott was transported to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center with a female passenger who was trapped in the vehicle and had to be extricated. Both Scott and the passenger suffered multiple injuries and were treated at the hospital. Two dogs were in the car with them when it crashed but appeared to be uninjured and were coaxed off of the roadway by some motorists. The crash is under investigation tonight and if you have information, contact Trooper Mark Barrett at 603-271-3636.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, August 23rd.

It was an intense scene for Bellows Falls police officers on Friday as they chased a motorist who had an infant in his car and a suspended license. Bellows Falls Police, in a press release, say that Keith Tyrrell Jr. was apprehended Friday when he crashed his car following a chase that began when he failed to pull over at a traffic stop. Officers had attempted to pull Tyrrell over for a routine traffic stop on Rockingham Street, but failed to stop and drove in what was described as a "negligent manner" into North Walpole across the New Arch Bridge. Walpole Police took up the chase in New Hampshire and he crashed on Route 12. Police found both Tyrrell and an uninjured infant in the car and transported Tyrrell to a Vermont hospital where he was arrested for careless and negligent operation and violation of conditions of release for a curfew he was under. He also received charges

of cruelty to a child under the age of 16, resisting arrest, and attempted assault on a law enforcement officer by bodily fluids. He was held on \$750 bail at the Southern State Correctional Facility.

In court news now, a Quechee, Vermont man has been convicted of sharing sexually explicit videos of a woman on the internet without her consent. 39-year old Jonathan Lazarus of Quechee accepted a plea deal late last week in Windsor Superior Court and even though prosecutors had dismissed a felony human sex trafficking charge against him, he faced sentencing for three misdemeanor counts. The first two misdemeanors, to which Lazarus pleaded no contest, were related to sharing the videos on the internet, while the third charge, to which he pleaded guilty, was for physically assaulting the woman, who he knew. *The Valley News* says that the presiding judge handed him a suspended prison sentence, which could be up to three years, if he violates any one of his probation conditions, one of which includes unapproved contact with the victim. Lazarus had taken pornographic videos of the woman, including one where he coerced her into sexual contact with another woman, and distributed them online. Lazarus's actions were revealed about a year ago when the parents of the victim went to Hartford Police and mentioned that they were concerned for their daughter, who later told police that she had been abused by Lazarus. He is currently out on probation.

School officials and parents in Claremont have a resolution for now in regards to their scheduling at Stevens High School. Following an order by the state and a period of unrest, both the Claremont School Board and teachers union have agreed to go back to the former block classroom schedule instead of the A/B schedule that was used last school year. Earlier this month, the School Board, after being ruled by the NH Public Employee Labor Relations Board to revert to the block schedule, attempted a motion to not comply with the state. However, the vote failed and the discussion was tabled until last week. *The Eagle Times* says that both the board and the teachers union last week agreed that the best solution was to revert to the block schedule, which allows for flex time for students to seek extra academic help. School officials were considering an appeal with the state's Supreme Court in regards to the Labor Relations Board ruling, but last week's agreement stood to resolve most of the contention that occurred over the course of this year.

Up in Lebanon now, city officials have expressed hesitance at increasingly supporting the Lebanon Airport financially. *The Valley News* reports that last week, the City Council told Lebanon Airport officials that there is in fact a limit as to how much money they're willing to pump into the airport. The airport had asked to hire a consultant for the business, but the council was unsure on whether to spend the requested \$70,000 when the work could be done in-house instead. The paper says that the airport can't survive on its own and has required increasing amounts of money from the city the past two years. The airport will be slowly upgraded over the next 20 years as the city approved a long term plan to fix federal safety issues. The city will be paying for roughly \$2 million of those upgrades while the Federal Aviation Administration will be covering the rest at roughly \$47 million. One airline runs out of the Lebanon Airport, Cape Air, but used to be serviced by three airlines that offered a wider variety of destinations than the current ones of Boston and White Plains, New York. The city is going to look at previous reports and master plans regarding the airport to discuss a business plan.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, August 24th.

We begin tonight with a court update out of Windsor Superior Court as a Springfield, Vermont nurse's court case will be continued. Court records show that 39-year old Rebecca Parker was granted a second continuance in her case against that state, where she stands accused of sexually exploiting an inmate she was treated at the prison in Springfield. Her attorney filed a motion on Monday for the continuance, one day before she was to stand for her charge of exploiting a confined correctional facility inmate. The continuance was granted in Windsor Superior Court although it was noted that there will not be any further continuances in this case. The 31-year old victim has since been released from prison with a both a deputy state attorney and victim's advocate assisting him. Vermont State Police were contacted by the State Department of Corrections on February 9th of this year, reporting sexual misconduct between a staff member and an inmate at the Southern State Correctional Facility. Authorities launched an investigation and VSP were able to collect a large number of emails and recorded phone calls exchanged between Parker and the unidentified inmate. She is due back in court on September 6th.

News out of one of the local community colleges as the president of RVCC is stepping down at the end of this month. River Valley Community College's president, Dr. Alicia Harvey-Smith, after a three year run, had her resignation accepted Monday by Community College System of New Hampshire Chancellor Ross Gittell. In the announcement by Gittell, he mentioned several accomplishments of Harvey-Smith during her time with the school, including moving the school's fundraising efforts in a forward direction, expanding workforce training partnerships with businesses, and enhancing the overall image and visibility of the school in the community and state. Under her guidance, improvements were made to the Claremont and Keene locations and she oversaw the acquisition of the new Lebanon campus, which is holding its grand opening tomorrow. Additionally, the nursing program was reaccredited this summer thus revitalizing the program. Harvey-Smith will be moving on to Lone Star College in Houston, Texas where she will be the Executive Vice Chancellor. Harvey-Smith says, "I believe I will leave River Valley well-positioned to continue to offer life-changing opportunities to students in western NH, to support economic growth in the region, and to forward the community college mission statewide."

Medical news now out of the region's largest healthcare provider as Dartmouth-Hitchcock officials were scheduled to meet with the state's Executive Council yesterday to discuss a contract. The two parties met at Colby-Sawyer College in New London to discuss a contract that would see psychiatrists and other professional employees from DHMC to be supplied to New Hampshire Hospital in Concord. *The Valley News* says that State Health and Human Services Commissioner Jeffrey Meyers awarded the contract to Dartmouth-Hitchcock even though a letter signed by all five members of the Executive Council expressed disapproval in the offer and wanting to see a new bidding process. So far, seven professionals from DHMC have filled spots at New Hampshire Hospital and more are on the way. The contract is controversial beyond just the Executive Council opposing it, as employees of New

Hampshire Hospital are skeptical of new employment terms that would be enacted under DHMC. Dartmouth College has traditionally been the provider of additional services and NHH employees are concerned they may lose benefits if DHMC takes over as their employer. The contract was signed on August 18th by both DHMC and NHH.

Good evening, it's Thursday, August 25th.

In today's day and age, the types of crimes you can commit through technology have increased significantly. One such crime is credit card fraud, which is the topic of this crime story. Four men from New York were arrested on Tuesday for their credit card skimming and re-encoding scam that began in New York and moved to Massachusetts, Vermont, and New Hampshire. Windsor Police say that 27-year old Carl White, 26-year old Jacob Houedjissi, and 21-year old Kyle Philip of Jamaica, New York and 22-year old Shaquille Francis of Springfield Gardens, New York were all charged with Possession or use of Credit Card Skimming Devices and Re-Encoders as well as Identity Theft and Accessory Aiding Commission of Felony. Their operation was detected in New Hampshire and they were reported to be driving a BMW with New York plates. They tried to make fraudulent purchases at Windsor businesses and police pulled them over when they were spotted on Main Street in their car. Police found their credit card re-encoder machine as well as several fraudulent credit cards. The FBI is assisting in the investigation and all four were arraigned yesterday, now being held on \$25,000 cash bail.

A follow-up now in a story we brought you yesterday regarding a contract between Dartmouth-Hitchcock and New Hampshire Hospital in Concord. For now, the vote on the controversial contract is being postponed, pending further discussion by officials of both hospitals, the Executive Council, and other state officials. *The Valley News* reports that the Executive Council, while meeting with hospital officials at Colby-Sawyer College in New London, voted to delay the 32-month contract while they discuss staffing at New Hampshire Hospital and a recent suicide of a released patient. Health and Human Services Commissioner Jeffrey Meyers was against postponement, arguing that the longer it takes to

enact the contract, the harder it will be to recruit new psychiatric staff at the hospital. Two of the five members of the Executive Council are running for governor, which influences their decision making in the months leading up to the election. The contract would provide NHH with professional staff from DHMC to assist with mental health treatment, which was emphasized when a 63-year old woman jumped to her death from a building mere hours after being released from NHH. The Council will discuss the contract again on September 7th, following a motion to table the discussion.

And now, there's some monkey business going on in Bellows Falls that has people going bananas. Don't laugh! There is an actual monkey that was spotted by at least three people in town in the area of Route 121 and Back Westminster Road. Bellows Falls Police made the initial announcement on their Facebook page, where they stated that they received one of the most bizarre reports that they've ever heard. The report was from a man who said he saw a monkey cross the road right in front of him. The Facebook post garnered an incredible amount of attention and all sorts of comments that expressed both belief and disbelief. Bellows Falls Police have since removed the post and Chief Ron Lake told NBC5 that things had "gotten too out of hand". However, others have reported seeing the monkey in the area and it has not been found yet. *The Eagle Times* says that the Windham County Humane Society hasn't had anyone come in with a monkey nor has anyone reported one missing. According to online sources, it's illegal in both Vermont and New Hampshire to own a monkey, unless you have one as a service animal, which costs about \$40,000 to train. Good evening, it's Friday, August 26th.

Tonight's news begins with an update in the case against the driver of a vehicle involved in a fatal accident that killed one person. 36-year old Amber King was indicted by a grand jury on felony charges this week for a fatal crash in April that killed a female passenger and seriously injured another. The Eagle Times reports that King was indicted in Sullivan County Superior Court on charges of negligent homicide, second-degree assault, and two counts of driving while intoxicated. On April 23rd, King was behind the wheel of a 2005 Jeep Cherokee with three other passengers when the car struck an embankment on Main Street near Tractor Supply Company. The car was travelling around 118 miles per hour and the vehicle flipped after hitting a utility pole on the embankment. King and her husband, 35-year old Jacob King, were trapped inside the vehicle and had to be extricated by firefighters using hydraulic tools. 37-year old Jody Metcalf and Amanda Grasso were ejected from the vehicle, with Grasso landing in the Sugar River. She was later pronounced dead. King had allegedly used heroin, cocaine, marijuana, Suboxone, and an anti-anxiety drug in the time leading up to the accident. She is due back in court on September 7th for her arraignment. In the meantime, she remains behind bars at the Sullivan County House of Corrections on \$50,000 bail.

On a bit of a different note now, the MV Sunapee was on a routine afternoon tour of the lake yesterday when it had an unexpected stop. YCN caught up with one of the owners, Pete Fenton, to tell us about it.

This was not the first experience that the Fenton's have had with flotation collars. A year and a half ago their MV Kearsarge was refloated with the same kind of device after sinking in its winter harbor. All is good now with both boats.

And speaking of the very water that the MV Sunapee was sailing in, state officials have lifted yet another no swimming advisory in Newbury. Earlier this week, state officials posted an advisory for Mount Sunapee State Park, warning beachgoers that there were higher levels of bacteria in the water than normal. An advisory of this type encourages people to not go swimming or enter the water, which was home to a level of fecal bacteria that exceeded state standards. The advisory was lifted this morning when officials analyzed water samples and found that the fecal bacteria levels were back within normal parameters. Earlier this summer, the same advisory was posted for the same beach, but was lifted within a week. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services oversees water quality across the state. They collectively monitor 186 freshwater and saltwater beaches in the Granite State for fecal coliform, which usually originates in the intestines of warm-blooded animals including waterfowl. In addition to Mount Sunapee State Park, Todd Lake off of Route 103 in Newbury, also received a warning, this time for a cyanobacteria bloom and both lake users and pets were advised to take caution.

Got a sweet tooth? Then you may want to pay attention or turn away, depending on how bad it is, but regardless, this is some sweet news for Claremont residents. A Kentucky-based

chocolate producer has had their plan for an experimental test kitchen to be set up on Union Street. One of the many staples of our region is the delicious maple syrup and the chocolate company hopes to experiment with maple and possibly introduce new concoctions into its main product line. *The Eagle Times* reports that the city's Planning Board unanimously approved the special use permit for the 40 Union Street location that would act as a test kitchen and may have some sort of retail component, but that is not the main focus. The chocolate company, Deglace LLC, had a representative speak on behalf of the headquarters in Louisville, saying that they hope to experiment with local products for new chocolates. The building was built in 1833 and has stood vacant for a while, offering up around 10,000 feet of space. The building is part of Claremont's historic downtown and the board's approval works to further efforts to revitalize the downtown and bring businesses back to empty storefronts.

Good evening, it's Monday, August 29th.

We begin tonight with tragic news out of Vermont as a New Jersey man is dead and his wife is injured in a single vehicle crash on I-91 yesterday. Authorities say that 79-year old Alexander Romanow was driving north on I-91 in Weathersfield with his wife Jane in a 2006 Chevrolet Tahoe when the vehicle veered into the median, hit multiple trees, and caught fire. The accident occurred around 9:30 in the morning near mile marker 49. Jane was able to escape from the burning vehicle with a broken femur and chest injury. However, her husband Alexander was trapped in the driver's seat and could not escape the wreck. Fellow motorists attempted to rescue him but the fire was too large to extricate him and he was pronounced dead at the scene. Police say that Jane was transported first to Valley Regional Hospital and then to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center for treatment. The left lane of I-91 northbound was closed for around six hours for an investigation, which determined that Alexander may have fallen asleep at the wheel. Many local officials responded to the accident, including Weathersfield Police, West Weathersfield Fire, Ascutney Fire, Thetford Fire, and the Vermont Agency of Transportation.

An update now in the court case of two local men who were involved in a break-in of a Charlestown home last year. 41-year old Jeffrey Buzzell of Claremont and 32-year old Jamie Stevens of Newport were in court last week and stood in front of a grand jury for several charges related to a break-in they committed in May of last year where they stole jewelry and valuables from a Charlestown home. They answered to charges of burglary, theft, second-degree assault, and receiving stolen property. *The Valley News* reports that

these charges are on top of an existing set of three indictments of Buzzell in June, including the charge of assaulting a prisoner, having tied up one of the homeowners during the robbery. Buzzell's wife, Sarah Carr, has been charged with conspiracy to receive stolen property after authorities intercepted calls made from prison, in which Buzzell was serving on an unrelated charge. The calls instructed Carr on how to find a stash of the stolen goods, which police found. In addition, 49-year old Sherry West of Claremont was also indicted on charges of conspiracy to receive or possess stolen properties. All four are facing various sentences and so far, Carr has pleaded guilty with a 12-month sentence.

With our country having been victim to several shootings in recent history, one local school put in some effort this weekend to prepare themselves for such an event. On Saturday morning, the Sunapee Police Department, with help from Homeland Security and the Sunapee School District, held an Active Shooter Drill at the Sunapee Middle High School. Sunapee Police Chief David Cahill began planning this drill months ago which involved the officers from the Sunapee Police Department, volunteer students, teachers, administrators, and staff from the school, as well as New London dispatch. The scenario for the drill was a man with a rifle, played by New London Police Chief Edward Anderson, whose plan was to gain access to the school and try and enter a classroom. Teachers would then call 911 and police would arrive and confront the gunman. Chief Cahill and others spoke with those involved before the drill on what to expect and how they may feel during the exercise. He stressed that safety of all the participants was the top priority. After the event, which took about 20 minutes to complete, there was a discussion to talk about what went right and what could be improved on such as communication and keeping people from harm during an event like the one staged.

Are you a Claremont resident and are you sitting at home wishing you could help search for the new city manager? Now's your chance! The city council is extending an invitation to residents to become members of the city's search committee to track down the next manager for 2017 onward. *The Valley News* says that the council last week heard from Municipal Resources Incorporated, the firm hired to spearhead the search, who suggested that they should form a committee of at least five but no more than nine city residents. The firm's president, Alan Gould, explained that the committee should equally represent various facets of the city, including but not limited to Valley REgional Hospital, River Valley Community College, and SAU 6. Interested residents can submit a letter of interest and a completed application, which can be found on the city website. The deadline is September 7th. City Manager Guy Santagate is retiring at the end of this year after 15 years with the city, making him the longest standing city manager in Claremont. The city council recently agreed on a new salary for the city manager of \$135,000 compared to the \$100,000, hoping to raise the appeal of the position.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, August 30th.

News out of one of our area's courts is up first tonight as two men stood in front of a judge for an incident that happened this weekend in Putney. 41-year old Jason Robison of Bellows Falls and 36-year old Alfred Spellman were in Windham County Superior Court Criminal Division on Monday for charges of aggravated assault with a weapon and reckless endangerment. Court records show that both men pleaded not guilty to the first felony charge and were both held on bail of at least \$2,500. Vermont State Police responded to reports of a verbal argument and gunshots at 57 Hi Lo Biddy Road on Friday and spoke to witnesses who said they saw a male subject firing a gun on the road while a Subaru drove down the road at a high speed. Court documents revealed that the address is registered as Spellman's residence and Robison was questioned on the scene before being arrested. A witness told police that a Putney resident and a Brooklyn, NY resident were also involved because of a \$30 drug debt. The four men had become involved in a minor shootout at the house which ended when Robison and the Brooklyn man left the scene. The felony charge that both men face carries up to 15 years in prison.

Credit score can mean a lot nowadays, whether you're making that next big purchase of a car or new home. But for large businesses, it's important to them as well and our region's largest healthcare provider had their score downgraded recently. A major credit rating firm, Fitch Ratings, lowered Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center's grade from A+ to A in light of poor financial performance. The hospital reported significant losses in its fourth quarter of the previous fiscal year, which proved to be more than the gains from the other three quarters, making the overall loss of the year around \$13 million. *The Valley News* says that Fitch Ratings, as well as S&P Global Ratings, the other firm that rates the hospital's credit, have both placed a negative credit watch on the healthcare provider. An analyst from S&P said that she didn't expect Dartmouth-Hitchcock's rating to fall below an A-, despite the deficit that from the last two years. Representatives from Fitch Ratings will be visiting the hospital this fall to talk with members of the hospitals management and discuss financial standing.

Police news now, but not of the crime sort, as two local police chiefs travelled to the nation's capitol to learn a thing or two about policing in the 21st Century. Woodstock Police Chief Robbie Blish and Springfield Police Chief Doug Johnston attended a White House briefing earlier this month with the chiefs from Burlington and Colchester. The briefing focused on

21st Century Policing and is part of the White House's efforts to invite police chiefs from all over the country to attend six-hour briefings that include topics such as building trust and legitimacy and technology and social media. *The Vermont Standard* reports that Blish, of the Woodstock PD, found that his police force is already in line and following many of the things recommended by the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing. He learned a handful of things at the meeting, including about an online database where you can record every kind of police activity in over 150 different data sets. Blish attended the meeting on behalf of the Vermont Association of Chiefs of Police and emphasized to the *Standard* that it did not cost a penny to Woodstock residents. He hopes to take what he learned and apply it in Woodstock.

And in nonprofit news, the group that is behind many of the projects in Springfield, Vermont is saying goodbye to their executive director of the past seven years. Carol Lighthall will be leaving the group in mid-September and is becoming the new executive director of Community Capital of Vermont, a statewide alternative lender out of Barre. She's filling the vacancy left by Martin Hahn, who left the group this summer to become the housing director of the Vermont Housing and Conservation Board. Lighthall's new group was founded in 1995 and oversees a lot of work in the downtowns across the Green Mountain State. She has already served on the board of directors for the past couple of years and is familiar with the group's operating procedure as well as their mission. The executive director's position at Springfield on the Move is a part time gig, with 20 hours a week. The pay is supported by the town of Springfield as well as grants and donations. SOM is responsible for many events and programs within town, including Market Madness, which took place again two weeks ago, and overall improvements to the quality of life for Vermonters who call Springfield home. Lighthall, before she leaves, will be assisting volunteers in bringing them up to speed on projects she was working on.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, August 31st.

Crime news is up first tonight as Lebanon Police have chalked up another drug-related arrest in the city. The arrest occurred on Monday, where Lebanon Police officers conducted a motor vehicle stop at around 7:00 PM in the Upper Valley Plaza. A passenger in vehicle gave officers a fictitious name when asked to identify themselves and upon further investigation, it was discovered that his true identity was 25-year old Steffen Whitaker of Springfield, Vermont. What's more is that he had active arrest warrants out of Lebanon and Keene District Courts as well as a Capias warrant out of Grafton County Superior Court for failing to show for a scheduled court date. He was taken into custody and following a search, officers found heroin on his person and he was charged with Possession of a Narcotic Drug, which is a Class B Felony. He was held without bail at the Grafton County House of Corrections and was arraigned on Tuesday.

In Hanover now, the Big Green is going even greener with further steps to reduce its carbon footprint. Dartmouth College is planning to write up some plans this year for sustainability that can be enacted come 2017, by analyzing the many facets of energy consumption on campus. *The Valley News* reports that a task force made up of faculty, administrators, and students will look into the resources that Dartmouth consumes and find way to make the school more sustainable in those respects. Over the past ten years, despite expanding the size of the campus through new buildings, the school has cut down its energy intensity by 24 percent. Energy intensity is a measure of how much energy is used per square foot per year. School administrators say that the designs of the new buildings is a large factor in the reduction so far, which consists of more energy efficient features like heat conservation. One of the main thrusts of the task force will be to find alternatives for the school's primary source of heat, that being Number 6 fuel oil, a heavy fossil fuel. The college has been discussing the use of natural gas for over a year now to replace the current energy source. In addition, the task force will look at food and water and how they can be saved more efficiently.

Viewers of YCN will be familiar with this next story as it involves the Vilas Bridge between Walpole and Bellows Falls, which we've brought you updates on. Today's update is a little bit different and more on the creative side, which I'll explain in just a second. The ongoing debate and discussion regarding the historic and deteriorating span is taking on an artistic form as a local business is sponsoring a multimedia art contest that focuses on the bridge. The Eagle Times, in a recent story, noted that the owner of Green Mountain Traffic Control, Deb Wright, wants to fortify the relationship between Walpole and Bellows Falls to ultimately fix the bridge that is falling into disrepair. The bridge, despite closing back in 2009 to both vehicular and pedestrian traffic, is a historic landmark that was built in 1930 and supports a sewage pipe that carries sewage from Walpole to Bellows Falls. So far, the closing date of the contest may be the end of September and Green Mountain Traffic Control is accepting all sorts of entries, provided they focus on the bridge and its significance. For more info, you can check out the Open the Vilas Bridge Facebook page. And to catch anyone up to speed on the state of repairs for the bridge, Bellows Falls is currently considering legal action against New Hampshire who is obligated to maintain the bridge through a formal agreement.

It's going to sound like I'm repeating myself here, and in fact, I am when I say that our region has some of the freshest and most delicious produce and natural products around. I've said that before many a time here on YCN and I've also said frequently that our area harbors rich history. Well this story works to reinforce both of those sayings even further. This past weekend, the Muster Field Farm Museum in North Sutton held their 30th Annual Farm Days. People came from all over the area to see exhibitors spin wool and plane boards, as well as watch a blacksmith make door handles and many other exhibits that showed how people lived and worked on farms in years past. Farm Days also offered hands-on exhibits where children and adults could hand dip candles, pound on a log to make strips for baskets, walk on stilts, or the ever-popular help make and eat homemade ice cream. Musterfield Farm is a working farm museum that grows and sell vegetables in the summer and early fall. Upcoming events at the farm will be Harvest Day on October 2nd and Ice Day at the end of February in 2017.

According to police, on Tuesday around 1:00 AM, the Claremont Police Department was called to Dusty's Cafe on Pleasant Street for a report of a burglary. The initial investigation into the burglary by the Patrol and Criminal Divisions identified 35-year old Scott Berry of Claremont as the suspect, who had broken through the wall of an adjoining businesses to gain entry into Dusty's. Once inside, he allegedly stole an undisclosed amount of cash from the eatery and exited through the opening in the wall that he created during his break in. Security camera footage from both Dusty's and the adjoining business, the laundromat, helped identify Berry as the suspect in this case. He was arrested about an hour after police initially received the call and was charged with Felony Burglary and Misdemeanor Criminal Mischief. He was arraigned yesterday and here in Claremont and entered pleas of not guilty. Bail was set at \$25,000 cash only and a probable cause hearing on the felony charge is scheduled for September 8th.

Here's another crime story for you, this one being more of a warning or an alert. If you're looking for housing in Springfield, Vermont and you're using Craigslist to facilitate your search, you may want to heed this warning being issued by the town's police department. On their Facebook this week, they reiterated the warning on Craigslist that says "Avoid scams, deal locally. Do not wire funds like Western Union or buy/rent sight unseen." They explained that one of the trending scams is a housing post that uses photos of an existing, occupied house that was previously posted by a realtor. Scammers repost the photos with an inviting title and hope to have renters send them deposit money but will never actually complete the deal, considering the homes are already privately owned. What we're showing you here is the specific listing that Springfield Police are warning about. You may notice that there are only five photos for the entire 3-bedroom home and that the size of the photos is smaller than if someone had uploaded photos they took themselves into a post,

making it clear that the photos had been previously downloaded from somewhere else. On Springfield PD's Facebook, someone commented with a scam email they received regarding a similar listing in Ludlow, asking for personal information and payment. The Springfield PD reminds potential renters to do proper research before committing to any sort of deposit or money transfer

Yet more news now out of our local police departments, as Lebanon Police responded to a scene yesterday of a man who had accidentally shot himself. Lebanon Police say that around 11:54 in the morning yesterday, they received a 911 call regarding a 24-year old male subject who had accidentally shot himself in the lower torso while sitting in a vehicle at the West Lebanon Cemetery. Both Lebanon Police and Fire responded to investigate the male subject who was subsequently transported by ambulance to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center for treatment there. He was treated for a single gunshot wound to the leg, which was not considered to be life-threatening. The male was identified as 24-year old Ivan Deutsch of Lebanon and was found that he did not have a concealed carry license for the .38 caliber pistol he had in his possession. *The Valley News* reports that Deutsch was attempting to unload the pistol when it discharged in his lap and he was alone in the vehicle at the time of the incident. He was waiting for his girlfriend near the entrance of the cemetery because he isn't allowed on the premises of her apartment and they were to meet at his car. The investigation into the accident is ongoing tonight.

Vermont, the Green Mountain State, is always getting greener with state initiatives to reduce the carbon footprint and lean more towards renewable energy. Solar power has taken hold in many towns and the few cities across the state and Brattleboro is now considering their next project. Next week, two meetings are being held by the Windham Solid Waste Management District to discuss a closed and capped landfill that would host a net metering pilot project. *The Brattleboro Reformer* reports that Sky Solar owns the lease for the landfill property at 327 Old Ferry Road and Encore Renewables will take the reins on permitting and building for the solar project that will hopefully save customers more than half a million dollars over 20 years. The field will generate roughly 5 megawatts and the town will receive a credit for 19 cents every kilowatt hour generated and would pay the developer around 14 cents for every kilowatt hour generated. The meetings next week may see a turnout of business owners and local officials from both municipalities and school districts and will offer an opportunity for questions about the landfill project to be answered.

Good evening, it's Friday, September 2nd.

If you've parked in Bellows Falls recently and received a ticket, it's probably because you parked somewhere where you shouldn't, including staying in a time-sensitive spot. But it's also largely due to the presence of a new full-time parking enforcement officer. Following advice from the Rockingham Selectboard and the Bellows Falls Board of Trustees, the Bellows Falls Police Department hired another full-time officer to join their ranks, who began this week, and will be focusing his responsibilities on parking enforcement. *The Eagle Times* says that in one and a half days, starting Monday, police had issued 20 tickets to various parked vehicles in town. Despite the force now having another officer, it alleviates current staffing strains only slightly. Recent discussions with town officials deduced that having at least two full time officers on every shift throughout the day would be a definite improvement but having a designated parking officer reduces the need for other officers to cover that responsibility. The new officer is Josh Paulette and while he's certified for parking enforcement in Vermont, he's also working to achieve certification in all other policing matters. Paulette's salary comes out of the existing municipal budget.

A followup now in a story we brought you earlier this month. Town officials and residents in Windsor are continuing to look at future uses for the former Vermont National Guard armory building on Route 44 and the town's selectboard is forming a committee to spearhead the effort. This week during their regular meeting, according to video of the meeting by Windsor on Air, the selectboard agreed to form a sub-committee of two of their members plus Recreation Department members, and some of the town's residents. The committee of the various facets in town will review possible ideas for the large vacant space and find a best use for it. To date, brainstormed ideas include a recreation space for dances, performances, and activities or for commercial use. Another idea, proposed this week, was to turn the space into a home for veterans who are currently without homes. The plot of land that the

armory sits upon was granted to the town in 1928 and fourteen deeds were drafted in 1944 and given to all members of the original grantor families, the Kennedys and the Evarts. The deed claimed that the plot would only be used for an armory or recreational use so the subcommittee will try to find the best use for the building that fits within the recreational category. The town has yet to accept or decline the building as a donation from the National Guard.

In education news now, Dartmouth College has announced a record amount of a gifts and commitments during the last fiscal year. The Dartmouth news site says that under the third consecutive year under the leadership of President Phil Hanlon, the community has supported the college's priorities at record levels to keep providing opportunities to students. The fiscal year of 2016 closed at the end of June and when the total amount of gifts and commitments was tallied up, officials reported a \$318.8 million amount, which is a nearly 3 percent increase over the year before and a 74 percent increase over the previous five-year average of roughly \$184 million. Dartmouth says that their overall philanthropy reached a new high-water mark and there were several highlights throughout the year that marked major gifts that support teachers and students. Some of these highlights include a \$25 million donation towards the Thayer school of Engineering and \$40 million donated towards the groundbreaking of a renovation for the Hood Museum of Art. Additionally, gifts and commitments provided \$25 million for a new high-tech indoor practice facility, which is currently being debated by residential neighbors. The record number of gifts this year was supported by nearly 3,800 who returned to campus in June.

Another followup tonight from a story we brought you last week, as a humanitarian group from Sunapee who is sending a cargo container full of aid to Africa held an event this past weekend. The goal of the event was to raise money to ship the container and guests were treated to music and food. Let's take a quick look.

executed a search warrent at marrocco's apartment and found 74 bags of heroin, more than 5000 dollars in cash, as well as a rifle. Marrocco who had been living under conditions of release for a prior conviction for the sale of heroin was not at home at the time of the search, but was located and arrested a short time later by hartford police. He is currently being held at the southern state correctional facility on 25 thousand dollars bail.

And speaking of Hartford, Vermont state police arrested a man in hartford for driving under the influence, with a blood alcohol content of nearly 3 times the legal limit. On Sunday at around 5:45 Troopers responded to call from a concerned motorist who warned of a vehicle traveling south down I91 in Hartford. The caller believed the driver of the vehicle may have been impaired and when troopers located the vehicle they found Leyder Luque-Romero behind the wheel. Troopers immediately detected signs that Luque-Romero impaired and administered a preliminary breath sample that returned a staggering .236, nearly 3 times the legal limit of .08. He was arrested withouth incident and proccessed at the Hartford police station, he is scheduled to appear in windsor district court on september 20th to answer to DUI charges

We'll start off tonight with an update on an accidental shooting out of Lebanon, New Hampshire. On Wednesday, August 31st, at around midnight, the Lebanon police department got a call from 24 year old Ivan Deutsch who was seated in a vehicle at the West Lebanon Cemetery. He mistakenly fired a round out of his .380 caliber pistol that struck him in the leg. Lebanon police and fire units responded to investigate the scene after Deutsch was transported by ambulance to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and treated for a single gunshot wound. It was determined that Deutsch did not have a revolver license for the firearm he had in his possession. He was then arrested the following day by the Lebanon police department and charged with carrying a pistol without a license, a Class A misdemeanor offense. He was released on personal recognizance bail and will appear in the Lebanon District Division, New Hampshire Second Circuit Court on Monday, November 7.

Good evening, it's Thursday, September 8th.

We begin tonight with news of a serious accident out of Lebanon that left multiple people in the hospital with injuries. New Hampshire State Police say that around 10:30 last night, they responded to I-89 southbound near Exit 20 in Lebanon. State troopers from Troop D and the Lebanon Police Department arrived on the scene to find a black 2006 Pontiac Torrent had hit a white 2011 white BMW X3. The Pontiac's driver, 27-year old Bianca M. Williams of Illinois, became distracted for an unknown reason while driving southbound and hit the guardrail in the travel lane. Her car rolled back into the travel lane and was broadsided by the BMW, driven by 76-year old Peter Tourin of Jericho, Vermont. Him and his passenger, 75-year old Jean S. Twombly of Springfield, New Hampshire were both transported to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center for treatment. Williams was also brought to the hospital as the lone occupant in the Pontiac and was treated there as well. The interstate near Exit 20 was shut down for roughly 3 hours and southbound traffic was detoured during the cleanup and investigation. If you have any information on the incident, you're asked to call Trooper Derek Myrdek at 603-223-8944.

Remaining in Lebanon tonight, this time in crime news, a White River Junction man was arrested earlier this week for possessing a stolen handgun. At around 1:35 in the afternoon on Tuesday, Lebanon Police Officers responded to Alice Peck Day Memorial Hospital for a report of a male subject, later identified as 24-year old Robert T. Warrington, who had been walking through the parking lot and was seen entering a parked vehicle. The caller reported

that he had exited the car shortly after and did not appear to be the vehicle's owner. Officers who responded noticed the male walking on Alice Peck Day Drive and began to run behind some adjacent buildings. Officers confronted him behind 111 Mascoma Street and he pulled out a .38 caliber revolver from his waistband and tossed it on the ground. Police determined that he had just stolen the handgun from the parked vehicle that the caller had described. He was arrested on charges of Theft of a Firearm and Carrying a Loaded Handgun without a License, which is a Class A Felony and Class A Misdemeanor, respectively. He was held on \$25,000 cash bail and appeared in court for arraignment yesterday.

An update now in the court case of a Claremont woman who was the driver in a fatal accident earlier this year on Main Street. 36-year old Amber King pleaded not guilty to negligent homicide as well as charges of second-degree assault and two counts of aggravated driving under the influence. All charges are felony charges and she stood in Sullivan County Superior Court to answer to them yesterday. On April 23rd, King was behind the wheel of a 2005 Jeep Cherokee with three other passengers when the car struck an embankment on Main Street near Tractor Supply Company. The car was traveling around 91 miles per hour and the vehicle flipped after hitting a utility pole on the embankment. King and her husband, 35-year old Jacob King, were trapped inside the vehicle and had to be extricated by firefighters using hydraulic tools. 37-year old Jody Metcalf and another passenger, Amanda Grasso, were ejected from the vehicle, with Grasso landing in the Sugar River. She was later pronounced dead. King had allegedly used heroin, cocaine, marijuana, Suboxone, and an anti-anxiety drug in the weeks and days leading up to the accident and was reportedly under the influence of drugs when the accident occurred.

Another update tonight also involving speeding cars, but this time on a much lighter note. The Claremont Speedway's proposed RV campground may be moving forward after much deliberation, or not, pending a decision in early October. Claremont's Zoning Board of Adjustment announced this week that, according to *The Valley News*, they have all the information they need in order to decide on a variance request for the proposed seasonal campground on Thrasher Road. The site is located within a rural residential zone and would need a variance to allow for its installation. However, residents, mainly those who live near the proposed site, are continuing to offer their feedback opposing the development, mainly regarding water supply and the noise level. City officials visited the site in mid-summer to get the lay of the land and determine its suitability. The campsite, which will host 149 spots, will be rented on a seasonal basis, summer or winter, and short term rentals will not be accepted. If the plan is approved by the Zoning Board on October 3rd, the Planning Board will also need to approve it in order for the development to ultimately move forward.

Good evening, it's Friday, September 9th.

Tonight's news begins with an alert out of the Lebanon Police Department as they are warning of a scam that is the result of the 21st Century. A handful of residents from Lebanon have called the local police department to report scam phone calls and Internal Revenue Service scams. Residents reported receiving messages telling them that they have not filed their taxes for years and also got voicemails that threatened legal action if the person did not call back a number left in the message. One of the main ploys the scammers use is to trick you into sharing private information or sending money to them and may even claim to know information about you. The Lebanon Police Department reminds residents that the IRS will contact you by mail, not by phone, if you owe taxes, making these scam phone calls easily identifiable. Additionally, they will never ask for payment information, demand that you pay over the phone, or threaten you. If you think you're a victim of such a scam or any other scam, you're urged to contact Lebanon Police at 603-448-1212. On a quick side note, there's a Craigslist real estate scam in Springfield, Vermont going on right now. For more information on that story, visit YCNNow.com.

Croydon is in the news again and the story hasn't changed: the town is continuing to pay the tuition of students attending private school using public money. What's more is that New Hampshire state asked Sullivan County Superior Court to hold the town in contempt of court. However, Judge Brian Tucker ruled that the town was not in contempt when it sent public money to the private Newport Montessori School just a few days before an order to cease doing so was handed down. *The Valley News* says that on Tuesday, the state officials were in court in Newport, asking to find the town in contempt because of their sending of \$24,000 for tuition while a judge's order was pending in late July. The money was sent on July 25th and Judge Tucker ruled that the town cease their practices only four days later. The state Department of Education tried to ask the judge to have that money reimbursed, but to no avail, as the private school refused any refunds. Six students from Croydon will be attending the private school in Newport for the first half of the 2016-2017 school year on public money, but after that, the parents must fund the tuition on their own accord.

An update in a story we brought you late last month and into this month: Dartmouth-Hitchcock will indeed be entering a contract with New Hampshire Hospital to provide services there. On Wednesday, the state's Executive Council unanimously approved a 32month \$37 million contract between the two health institutions which hopes to provide enhance mental health care at the Concord-based New Hampshire Hospital. Dartmouth College has traditionally been the provider of additional services at NHH, where they provided professional staff for mental health treatment. However, DHMC will be the new provider, which will see nurses and psychiatric professionals assigned to Concord in light of the recent suicide of a released patient. The contract was not without dispute and was discussed in depth over the past month by the council and hospital officials. A handful of health professionals who worked at New Hampshire Hospital under the contract with Dartmouth College were concerned over their salaries and benefits and how they would change or diminish with the contract transfer and eleven employees left near the end of June. Two of the five executive councilors are running for governor and by voting yes, established their views on the importance of mental health treatment in the Granite State.

Tonight is full of updates and here we go with a third one: the closed restaurant on Claremont's Washington Street called BJ Bricker's is getting even closer to possibly reopening, following a long discussion on parking. Claremont's Zoning Board of Adjustment this week agreed to approve a parking variance that will the restaurant to operate with fewer parking spaces than initially required. *The Eagle Times* explains that during the board's regular meeting this week, it unanimously approved the variance request for the closed restaurant that is owned by the Gertrude Holl Revocable Trust. The restaurant was placed under violation of a zoning ordinance regarding parking when a 50-year easement with Claremont Plaza Associates expired in 2013. However, the restaurant closed that year in light of a familial dispute. The parking lot for the restaurant would operate within roughly 80% of its original size and the board agreed to pass the variance provided that a fence be erected between the restaurant lot and the CPA lot. Although some may hope the restaurant reopens, one of the restaurant's trustees says that he may rent or sell it before trying to open it back up.

Good evening, it's Monday, September 12th.

Crime news is up first tonight, as usual, as a Westminster man is behind bars for two counts of sexual assault at an area high school. Police say that 18-year old Jamie C.D. Deitz of Westminster was arrested yesterday afternoon for two counts of sexual assault that allegedly occurred at Bellows Falls Union High School. The 16-year old female victim in the sexual assault cases contacted Vermont State Police on Tuesday, September 6th, which is the date of the second assault by Deitz. The first assault was reported to have occurred one week prior to the second one. At around 1:00 yesterday afternoon, members of the Vermont State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation arrested Deitz at his home in Westminster. He was then transported to the Westminster Barracks and processed before he was released on conditions. He was issued a citation to appear in Windham Superior Criminal Court at 8:00 in the morning on Tuesday, October 25th. He faces two counts of sexual assault, which is a felony charge carrying a prison sentence of at least three years.

Good news for one Claremont business on Maple Avenue as they've had their expansion plan approved unanimously. National Field Representatives was given approval by the city's Planning Board last night to expand their location at 158 Maple Avenue with a new 20,000 square foot building. *The Valley News* reports that the two story addition will be located on the western side of the one story 15,000 square foot building and will cost around \$5.5 million, with a project end date of next July. NFR's president told the board that they hope to consolidate their three offices into the new building as to increase efficiency. Earlier this summer, NFR knocked down the closed Gary's Claremont Tire Company building, which made room for a new parking lot. Not very long after, they also knocked down the adjacent and vacant Claremont Savings Bank building, which they had previously purchased, giving them full control over the building's fate. The demolition made room for the new expansion, which will be supported by 200 parking spots on the main site and 70 across the road. NFR is a mortgage servicing company that employs around 200 workers locally.

This past weekend, over 200 people gathered on the grounds of the New London Historical Society to attend the the New London Electric Car Expo. Area residents had the chance to look at electric cars from the past like the 1923 Red Bug Electric to the all new Tesla electric cars from today. Electric cars and hybrids from other manufacturers included BMW, Chevy, Nissan, and BYD. Also at the expo were electric assist bicycles the people could try out for themselves. Owners and enthusiasts of all electric cars and hybrids brought their own vehicles to the show and talked about their experiences in driving electric cars in all seasons, finding charging stations, maintenance, and many other pros and cons of driving an electric vehicle. Short lectures were also given on the benefits of an electric car and the how to go about buying and installing solar panels. The free event was one of more than one hundred similar events held around the country during the fifth annual National Drive Electric Week. The event was organized by the New London Energy Committee and the Andover Energy Group.

Sunday was a day of remembrance for our nation and region as we remembered those who lost their lives 15 years ago in the 9/11 attacks. In particular, the town of Wilmot held a 15th Anniversary Memorial Program to remember all of the victims as well as one of their own, Thelma Cuccinello. Thelma was on board United Airlines Flight 11, which was the first plane to hit the World Trade Center. We caught up with Rhonda Gauthier who is the Town Clerk, Tax Collector, and Member of the 9/11 Memorial Committee.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, September 14th.

It was a tragic scene on the shore of the Connecticut River last night as an Alaska man drowned while swimming. Cornish Police say that around 6:00 last night, the Hanover Dispatch Center received a call about a reported missing swimmer off of the bank of the Blow Me Down Farm on Route 12A in Cornish. Emergency responders from every surrounding town responded, including the NH Fish and Game Department and NH State Police. Rescue workers on the scene conducted searches of the river banks and boats from Lebanon, Hanover, and Hartford searched from the water's surface. More than an hour later, around 7:18 PM, members of the Lebanon Fire Department spotted a male body in the river in about 8 to 10 feet of water. The body was recovered by the Hanover Fire Department Dive Team and the 21-year old was pronounced dead at the scene by the NH Medical Examiner's Office. The man was identified as Reed McWilliams of Bethel, Alaska, who was working at the St. Gaudens National Park as an AmeriCorps Member working with the Student Conservation Association. McWilliams and another female were swimming when he did not resurface, prompting the female to call 911. Family members were notified and his identity was released today.

An update now in the case of a Hartford, Vermont police officer who shot and killed someone else's dog while at a dog park. Hartford Police Officer Logan Scelza won't face charges, according to the Vermont Attorney General's Office, following an incident where, while off-duty, he shot someone else's dog at the Watson Upper Valley Dog Park when his dog and theirs became involved in a fight. The incident occurred on June 25th and the decision regarding whether he would face criminal charges or not was announced today. The Attorney General's Office explained that he acted within the law and had just reason to shoot the other dog that was endangering the life of his own pet.Hartford Police released a statement by Chief Phillip Kasten shortly after the incident where one of his two huskies became involved in a fight with a pit bull and while trying to break up the fight, he fired a handgun three times into the ground as warning shots. When the pit bill did not stop, he shot it once in the face and three times in the chest, say authorities. He left the park to bring his husky to vet while the pit bull was declared dead at the scene. Vermont law allows someone to kill a domestic pet if it is attacking another animal, especially one's own pet.

Yesterday was a big day for Granite Staters as it was Primary Election Day and voters went to the polls to elect Democrat and Republican candidates for the national and state elections in November. In the race for the US Senate, incumbent Republican Kelly Ayotte won with 79% of the vote over four challengers and will face Governor Maggie Hassan, who runs unopposed in the primary. United States Representative incumbent Democrat Ann Kuster will face republican Jim Lawrence who won his primary with 40% of the vote. In the race for governor, both Republicans and Democrats had a full slate of candidates for the race. On the Democratic side,

Colin Van Ostern won with 52 percent of the vote and will most likely face Chris Sununu, who had a surprisingly close race with Frank Edelblut with only a narrow 1 percentage point lead over Edelblut. In local races in Sullivan County District 6, Virginia Irwin and John Lunn, running for state representatives, took the top two spots on the Democratic side and will face Republicans Skip Rollins and Bill Schroeter in November. In Merrimack County, Dave Kidder was in a tight race with Peter Spaulding for county commissioner. All other unmentioned local races were uncontested.

Good evening, it's Thursday, September 15th.

Like most nights of the week, crime news is up first. Two men were arrested in Ludlow, Vermont yesterday on multiple drug charges. Ludlow Police say that beginning in February of this year, they began to investigate and conduct formal surveillance of 32 Soapstone Road in response to information developed from multiple sources. During the investigation, detectives observed a high amount of vehicular and foot traffic around the residence, which was indicative of drug dealing. In the spring, the Southern Vermont Drug Task Force assisted Ludlow Police in obtaining a search warrant for the residence. Just yesterday, both groups executed the warrant and recovered over 100 bags of heroin, 2 ounces of processed marijuana, narcotics without prescriptions, 2 long rifles, 1 small caliber handgun, and over 500 rounds of ammo. 37-year old Richard M. Taylor and 31-year old Kimberly H. Ashley were both arrested on multiple drug charges, including a Sale and Distribution of Heroin charge for Taylor. Both were jailed at the Southern State Correctional Facility and appeared in court today.

We've got an update now in the search for Claremont's new city manager: a committee made up of city residents has been officially formed. *The Valley News* reports that all 13 residents who applied for the search committee have been named to it, despite the original goal of only appointing nine residents. Municipal Resources Inc., the firm based out of Meredith, NH hired to spearhead the search, earlier this month suggested that they council extend an invitation to residents to apply for the community college and hospital in a cross-section that would represent the city as a whole. The Council and Municipal Resources hope to hire a new manager by November 1st so that they would be able to spend time on the job with current manager, Guy Santagate. Santagate is retiring at the end of this year after 15 years with the city, making him the longest standing city manager in Claremont. The city council recently agreed on a new salary for the city manager of \$135,000 compared to the \$100,000 currently being made by Santagate. They hope to raise the appeal of the position by doing so.

From hiring city managers to hiring town managers now, the town of Newport is examining the hiring of a new town manager and is laying out the guidelines to do so. Earlier this week, the Newport Board of Selectmen began to discuss the plans for the hiring process as well as a projected time frame. The *Argus Champion* says that Monday night saw a Town Manager Replacement Forum take place in town, including a handful of residents who offered their feedback, most notably that they'd want a new town manager to live within town lines. The new manager will be replacing Shane O'Keefe, who resigned for personal reasons after a little over a year in the position. Newport's finance director is currently taking the role of interim town officials hope is within six month's time. Gary Nichols, a former selectman, voiced that when final applicants are found, he'd like the town to send representatives to their respective communities to get a sense of their experience there. And just like Claremont in our previous story, the town hopes to create a search committee made up of a cross-section of the town, with representatives from the town's various facets.

One local fire department has received a major grant that will help them purchase a new truck to replace an outdated current rig. The Meriden, NH Fire Department recently received a grant from FEMA, that being the Federal Emergency Management Agency, to design and

customize a new fire truck to replace their Engine 1, which has been running since 1982. In an article by a Kimball Union Academy student, it is explained that the department was awarded \$320,000 following a series of proposals that have been going on since mid 2014. Engine 1, now outdated, is a tanker that transports roughly 2,500 gallons to any scene of emergency. The new machine will carry less water, but will have room for an extra firefighter and will be the first vehicle on the scene, followed by Meriden's Engine 2. After being awarded the grant by FEMA, the FD put together a "Truck Committee" to plan for the acquisition of a new truck and what exactly they wanted from it. The group traveled to nearby Ascutney to view one of their engines and identify features that they would like to see on their new Engine 1. The new truck will be ordered in special segments and may join the fleet next summer, alongside an existing second engine, ladder truck, and utility vehicle.

Good evening, it's Friday, September 16th.

No hard news for you tonight, which can be a breath of fresh air, but we've still got some exciting stories. First up, an international security firm has officially taken over providing security at three Vermont courthouses, including one in Brattleboro in Newfane. According to *The Brattleboro Reformer*, Securitas, a security group based out of Stockholm, began their 22-month contract this month, who takes over for the Windham County Sheriff's Office, who stated that it is not financially stable for them to continue providing security. The contract for around \$620,000 will cover the courthouses in Brattleboro and Newfane as well as a third in Burlington. In June, Sheriff Keith Clark requested that the Sheriff's Office see a 10 to 12 percent increase in the contract for courthouse security so that they could break even, but only a 3.5 increase was offered. The Sheriff's Office did not accept so six security firms were contacted to provide courthouse protection. Securitas was the only one to submit a formal bid.

The State of Vermont's Judicial Branch maintained a contingency plan that would be enacted in cases such as this so that the courtrooms can receive the security they need.

Visitors heading to the Saint Gaudens National Historic Site in Cornish, NH may soon have an easier time driving up the road to reach the site. The New Hampshire Department of Transportation is holding an informational meeting next Thursday, September 22nd, to garner community feedback on a proposed road reconstruction project. The stretch of road under question is the half mile segment from Route 12A up to the Saint Gaudens main site, which is an inclined road that sits on the side of a hill. The reconstruction work will see the removal of the existing pavement, improvements to the subsurface of the road, placement of new pavement, earthwork, and other miscellaneous activities. The NHDOT will also install underdrains on both sides of the roadway and will replace the existing cable guardrail on the westerly side of the roadway. A final pavement overlay will be laid down once all other work is completed. The purpose of the public meeting will be to explain the project and to receive feedback to ensure that the project decisions will meet public transportation needs. No timeline has been announced as of yet and when the project does eventually take place, the Saint Gaudens Site can still be accessed from Dingleton Hill Road. The meeting is scheduled for next Thursday at 6:00 PM at the Cornish Town Hall.

In Vermont, the new state initiative to group schools together, called Act 46, is slowly chugging along, especially in Windsor County. What's more is that the special committee formed to comply with the new state legislature has unanimously voted this week to replace their educational advisor. It has not been an easy road for the Windsor Southeast Act 46 study committee these past few months as they've discussed the state-ordained merger of Windsor, West Windsor, Hartland, and Weathersfield. Diana Watson, an advisor and consultant to the committee, was replaced on Tuesday this week by Peter Clarke, who has worked with other with other Act 46 study committees across the state. Act 46 is a new state initiative that hopes to group schools together in new administrative units in light of declining numbers in Vermont's schools statewide. School choice has been at the forefront of the discussion, as Windsor is the only town with a high school which would force the other three towns to send their students to Windsor, provided that the four towns merge. The committee expressed that they feel their options have become limited but bringing in

Clarke will hopefully allow the four towns to reach some manner of agreement before the state's deadline.

Here's some good news for any theater or art fans out there: live theater performances may be coming to Bellows Falls! In a town that's known for the arts and live music, a new agreement between Rockingham and and Main Street Arts out of Saxtons River will stand to bring live performances to the Bellows Falls Opera House. *The Eagle Times* says that just recently the Rockingham Selectboard voted unanimously to allow the arts group to rehearse and put on six live performances of "Sweeney Todd" during March of next year. The artistic director of Main Street Arts asked the board if they could rent the opera house at a reduced rate on the grounds that they are a local nonprofit group with a staff of 50 that would promote economic development in the downtown through their shows. The director also explained the stage setup for the shows and said that they would build the props and background off-site so that there wouldn't be much interruption or traffic disturbance. The normal rent for the building would be \$17,000 to use the space, but considering the special circumstances and the art group's goal to bring patrons into the downtown, the Selectboard agreed to allow the nonprofit to rent it for \$6,570. So far, some community members have even pitched in to help alleviate the reduced rental cost.

Good evening, it's Monday, September 19th.

Crime news is up first tonight on this Monday evening as two people have been arrested in Lebanon for running a methamphetamine production operation. **(B)** Lebanon Police say that at 4:00 AM on Sunday morning they conducted a welfare check on a male and female subject at the request of New London Police. While responding, officers determined that

there may have been a Violation of a Domestic Protective Order if the two subjects were found together. Officers attempted to contact the subjects at 125 Renihan Meadows but they eluded the police. **(M)** At around 6:30 AM, the male subject, 42-year old Jamie Judkins, fled the apartment but was arrested after a struggle with authorities. An investigation revealed that a meth manufacturing operation was being conducted and the DEA's Clandestine Lab Team executed a second search of the apartment and found Crystal, meth, pills, and marijuana. **(M)** They also arrested 36-year old Tristdonna Copp during the search and both individuals were charged with two counts of Possession of a Narcotic Drug, which are Class B Felony charges. Both were held on \$25,000 cash bail and were arraigned today in Lebanon.

Tragic news now out of Claremont as a priest from one of the local churches has drowned while on vacation in the Caribbean. Reverend George Majka, who presided over the St. Joseph Parish on Elm Street since 2009, drowned while he was on vacation in the Dominican Republic last week. **(B)** *The Eagle Times* reports that Reverend Shawn Therrien of the St. Mary Catholic Church delivered the tragic news of the 72-year old's death. The death was announced on Saturday at 5 PM during mass at the St. Joseph Parish and Therrian told the congregation that they could all attend the jubilee year celebration of the holy Year of Mercy to pray for Majka. The US Embassy in the Dominican Republic contacted the St. Joseph Parish late last week, informing them that Majka had drowned but no further information, including the circumstances of the incident, was revealed. He was due to return from his vacation on Saturday and his body will be returned once all the necessary paperwork is completed.

This is the second drowning that has affected the region in the past week, as an Alaskan man drowned in the Connecticut River last week.

On a lighter note, it's good news for Dartmouth College as they've announced a new energy research institute, thanks to a considerable monetary gift. A large player in the oil industry, Irving Oil, has donated a lead gift of \$80 million towards the \$160 million goal to fund the new institute. **(B)** The new school within Dartmouth will be titled the Arthur L. Irving Institute for Energy and Society and it will hope to advance the understanding and knowledge of a resource that powers modern life and is tied directly to the quality of life, says Dartmouth. Arthur Irving and his wife Sandra have been providing Dartmouth with student scholarships and faculty support for over a decade and their daughter is a Dartmouth graduate who graduated in 2010 and then from the Tuck School in 2014. The institute will examine the intersection of energy and society from four different angles: technology and science, society and the environment, business and economics, and geopolitics. Irving says that Dartmouth has been committed to the study of some of the world's most urgent problems and the Institute of Energy and Society will set the Ivy League apart as a leader in the field. Additional gifts towards the funding goal have already been contributed, bringing the running total to \$113 million.

From educational news to fire department news, the Brattleboro FD has announced some rather significant changes to their staffing. The changes are certainly positive as two new entry level firefighters have been hired, two have been promoted to lieutenant, and two more have been promoted to captain. **(B)** According to Fire Chief Michael Bucossi in an announcement he wrote for the *Reformer*, all of the candidates were subject to a written test, an oral board, and an

interview with him, a chief's interview. The two new hires are Kyle Rabideau from Hinsdale, NH and Adam Schaub from Meredith. Rabideau has been a two-year member of the Call Staff at the Brattleboro FD and Schaub has been a member of the Center Harbor Fire and Rescue in Center Harbor for 10 years. Both will begin their orientation next week and their first shift assignments begin the following week. Meanwhile, 10 and 12 year veterans Kurt Schmidt and Josh Jones have been promoted to shift lieutenants and begin their new responsibilities next week. Finally, both Lieutenants Jason Davis and David Emery Jr. have been promoted to the rank of captain. Both have been with BFD for 17 years and will be in charge of the day to day operations of their shifts, beginning next week.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, September 20th.

For the second night in a row, we've got crime news out of Lebanon, New Hampshire, as police have completed another drug bust. In late August, the Lebanon PD with the assistance of the NH Attorney General's Drug Task Force received intelligence that 32-year old Mark Churchill of Springfield was traveling to Leb with a quantity of heroin. On August 31st, police located his vehicle on Heater Road at around 3:45 in the afternoon. During a motor vehicle stop of Churchill's vehicle, 10 bags of heroin and a small amount of marijuana were found. Two other occupants were in the vehicle at the time, that being 25-year old Jessica Griswold and 22-year old Nathaniel Decamp of Springfield and Enfield, respectively. Police found 10 bags of heroin on Griswold and marijuana on Decamp.

Churchill was charged with the Class B Felony charge of Posession of a Narcotic Drug and a Griswold was arrested for the same charge as well. Both were released on \$10,000 bail and will be arraigned November 7th. Meanwhile, Decamp was released on the scene but given a summons for a court date of October 24th for marijuana possession charges.

Ever wanted to name a bridge? How about ever wanting to drive across a bridge with family or friends and tell them that you helped name it? Now's your chance, especially if you're a resident of Lebanon or West Leb. The city is currently seeking ideas and input regarding the name of the new Route 4 bridge that connects West Lebanon and Hartford, Vermont. Residents will have their chance during a public forum on Thursday night at the Mount Lebanon School. The span over the Connecticut River opened last November after a long construction period where the old deteriorating bridge was dismantled and the new one was built in its place with commuters using a temporary bridge in the meantime. However, the bridge just can't seem to find a name as multiple people and groups are proposing different ideas. Ideas include naming it after Korean War veterans, all veterans abroad, or historic West Leb families. *The Valley News* says that groups argued that the I-89 bridge further South is named after Vietnam War veterans and that Korean War vets deserve recognition of their own. The City Council has formed a task force to find a name this fall and to decide how to pay for signage once a name is agreed upon. The meeting is at 6:00 on Thursday.

As I've mentioned previously once or twice here on YCN, it doesn't need to be the 4th of July to light off some fireworks. Summer is always a common time for people to ignite some of the loud light displays that cause us to oogle and ogle, but residents of Enfield are speaking up to voice their concerns over the noise and possible pollution. According to *The Valley News*, a handful of residents were scheduled to meet with the town's selectboard yesterday to discuss the noisemakers. The residents, who live on the lake, requested a special meeting with the board to discuss not banning fireworks, but instead to look at how their effects can be mitigated to all residents in town. The concerns are stemming mainly from residents who live on the lake, given the fact that sound travels exceedingly well over bodies of water as well as the concern that firework debris is landing in the water, including plastic and traces of chemicals. The Department of of Environmental Services in NH says that fireworks debris can be poisonous to wild animals and can even affect the taste and odor of drinking water. The Mascoma Lake Association has expressed interest in the discussion but has not taken a stance on the fireworks as of yet.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, September 21st.

It was a scary scene Monday night for emergency crews in Unity, New Hampshire as they responded to the scene of a collision between a car and a telephone pole. At around 8:30 at night, the Unity Fire Department was dispatched to the 2nd NH Turnpike in the area of County Farm Road for a report of the aforementioned collision. Deputy Chief Noll was on the scene around 8.45 with Unity Engine 2 and they found that the car had sheared the telephone pole in half and had come to a rest on the upper portion of the fallen pole. The rest of the pole was suspended above the vehicle by the electrical and phone wires. The driver was uninjured and was able to make it out of the vehicle by the time crews arrived. The electrical wires were intact but were hanging low over the roadway and posed a threat to vehicles and people in the area as they were still live and strained. The road was closed and the scene was cleared. Unity crews were on the scene until 4:00 AM until traffic control arrived at the behest of the power company. Besides Unity, Golden Cross Ambulance, the Sullivan County Sheriff's Department, and New Hampshire State Police responded to the scene.

Crime news now out of Springfield, Vermont now as a police executed a search warrant at a home on Pine Street and have cited a Springfield man for growing marijuana. Police spent several hours inside a yellow home on Pine Street near a preschool as they searched the

place over. They filed no charges as of Monday evening and didn't reveal much information besides the fact that they had found something. *The Eagle Times* says that yesterday, it was revealed that authorities had found a marijuana grow operation and that 49-year old David Fuller of Springfield was issued a citation to appear in court for alleged marijuana cultivation. The search warrant was the result of a complaint from a resident that there was possibly a growing operation as well as firearms in the house in question. Springfield Police were assisted by Vermont State Police and Weathersfield Police in executing Monday's search warrant. Two rifles and a shotgun were confiscated in the search and Fuller was issued a citation to appear in Vermont Superior court in Windsor on November 8th.

This story will be familiar to those who joined us yesterday as we've got an update now in the recent discussions over fireworks in Enfield focusing around Macoma Lake. According to *The Valley News*, the town's selectboard and about a dozen residents met on Monday to discuss the noise and pollution from summer fireworks ignited by other residents and vacationers in the area. One resident from Mascoma Lake brought a bag of cardboard and plastic debris found on his property, left over from spent fireworks. Another neighbor voiced concerns that fireworks on the weekends make it hard for him to sleep and disturb his two pet dogs, which was understood by a Selectboard member who lives on the lake and said that she can also hear the fireworks that wouldn't been too restrictive nor would it ban fireworks altogether, but it would try to mitigate the negative effects that have been brought up. The idea is to find the balance between the rights of individuals to light fireworks and to address the concerns voiced on Monday. The board will continue the discussion.

Yesterday on YCN, we offered our thoughts that Autumn is definitely one of the best seasons of the year for a variety of reasons. Good evening, it's Thursday, September 22nd.

Crime news is up first tonight as Lebanon Police are at it again, bringing the guilty to justice. Today's suspects are three males who are accused of approaching a man on Taylor Street early this morning and stealing his cellphone and headphones while threatening to kill him and his family. The victim reported the call early this morning around 1:20 AM and officers responded to the scene. Based on a physical description provided by the victim, officers made contact with two residents, identified as 18-year old Antonio Callaghan and 22-year old Justin Cohn at a home on Elm Street and found out that a third suspect, the one who had made the threats and stolen the property, had fled the residence. Officers obtained a search warrant and found the SIM card from the stolen cellphone and three people were arrested. A 15-year old juvenile, the one who fled, was found with the cellphone and was found to have an active Juvenile Detention Order from the Manchester Police Department. Callaghan and Cohn were both arrested for Conspiracy to Commit Robbery. Both were transported to the Grafton County lockup on bail and were arraigned today.

Here in Claremont now, city officials are planning to examine the upcoming timber harvest at Arrowhead Recreation Area. As with any proposed timber cut in Claremont, the city council and the conservation commission meet to discuss the plan of action. *The Eagle Times* says that both groups will be meeting on Monday at 5 PM to discuss the harvest site at Arrowhead, which is home to around 190 acres of forest managed by the city's parks and rec department. The 190 acre plot includes the open ski slopes of the mountain but the wooded area is home to many different types of trees. This latest timber harvest project is part of a 10-year forest management plan that is a little less than halfway complete and has already provided the city with over half a million dollars in profit. The logging is done in a beneficial way in that it removes hazard trees and thins out dense thickets, which allows new trees to grow and prosper. Residents have voiced concerns over logging at Arrowhead,

most notably property abutters, but the public review will hope to mitigate any concerns over busy logging roads and property damage. The project won't move forward until a meeting is held with property abutters.

Two transportation related stories for you now. We'll begin with our first in West Lebanon, New Hampshire where the Lebanon Airport has dropped their airline ticket costs to meet their ticket target for the year. Cape Air, which is the only airline that flies out of Lebanon, has begun to offer discounts for their two flight destinations of Boston and White Plains, New York. The drops are \$49 from \$59 and \$99 from \$130 for Boston and New York, respectively. *The Valley News* says that officials hope that the decreased fares will inspire more people to fly through Lebanon so that the airport can reach their 10,000 annual flier goal. The airport's manager told the paper that they've had roughly 6,500 flights so far this year and is confident that they will hit the 10,000 flight goal, as they've done for the past few years since 2012. YCN spoke to Anna Gillam, a resident of Port Chester, New York who recently flew from through Lebanon Airport to White Plains. She told YCN that, "Price, as well as the length of the trip are two huge factors when choosing your mode of transportation. One hour to New Hampshire for \$99 is basically unbeatable". The sale for flights to both Boston and White Plains will be running until the end of the year, which is a great resource for visiting relatives for the various holidays coming up.

From airlines to buslines, folks who live in Brattleboro or the surrounding area will now have a much easier time getting to Boston as a new bus service will link the two. Beginning in just a week or so on October 1st, MAX Bus will be making stops at the Brattleboro Transportation Center in downtown Boston and will provide a trip from Brattleboro to Boston each way, every day. The new service will offer round trip tickets for \$29, purchased online, marked down from the normal \$60 price tag as a way of introducing commuters to the new service. *The Brattleboro Reformer* says that the Massachusetts Department of Transportation awarded federal funds to start the project after entering a bid for it. And the good news for future bus riders is that MAX buses will have 51 seats instead of the usual 56 so riders will have some extra room to stretch their legs and relax. Those seats will be reclining seats and will be complemented by power outlets and wireless internet. Handicap riders are in luck too as the buses will be wheelchair accessible and if you have a bike or extra luggage, space is provided for those as well. The MAX buses will also be making stops in Greenfield, Mass.

It's not uncommon in area towns to see old cannons or artillery pieces as a symbol of not only our region's history but our nation's involvement in several international wars and many local veterans. As a self-proclaimed history buff with a speciality in World War II, I now bring you this special look at one of Claremont's most interesting historic features.

Good evening, it's Friday, September 23rd.

First up tonight is news out of one of our local courts as two people who stand accused of meth production in Claremont have been indicted by a grand jury. 33-year old Shaun Teeter and 35-year old Erica Walker of 44 Central Street in Claremont were charged with possession of methamphetamine and attempted manufacture of meth after an arrest in early August where authorities found evidence of production at the Central Street home. Court records say that both Teether and Walker will appear for a video arraignment and bail hearing in Sullivan County Superior Court on October 6th. The next day on the 7th, they will be part of hearing for the felony charge of conspiracy to manufacture meth. Following their indictment this week by a grand jury, Teeter was ordered held on \$100,000 bail and Walker on \$50,000 bail. Teeter was arrested in early August during a parole period after being sentenced for 2 to 10 years for credit card fraud in 2010. Authorities said that an inside source told them that Walker was cooking meth in front of her daughter at the Central Street residence. Both individuals were on a watch list for suspected meth production.

The Vilas Bridge is in the headlines again and it most likely will remain that way for a while as the discussion over the bridge's maintenance continues. However, the discussion over the bridge has expanded to include what to do with the historic plaques from the span. According to *The Eagle Times*, the Rockingham Selectboard is actively looking to bring the removed plaques back to town and find them a new home within the Bellows Falls Historical Society. The exact location of the plaques is not yet known and the board discussed contacting the NHDOT to find out where they're being stored and what they can do to return

them. The plaques were once mounted on the historic bridge, which was built in 1930 and stands closed today. The engravings explain that the bridge was presented to New Hampshire and Vermont and Walpole and Rockingham by Charles Nathaniel Vilas, a native of Alstead. The Bellows Falls Historical Society on Mill Street within the Adams Grist Mill Museum has expressed interest in receiving the plaques but has no plans as of yet on how to display them or in what manner. The board will next ask the NHDOT on how they can move forward in locating the plaques and returning them to Vermont.

Further North in Hartford, Vermont now, the Maxfield Sports Complex may be going through some changes in the near future. The sports complex, on Route 5, is home to a building that has been used by multiple tenants and the town is trying to figure out what to do with it. *The Valley News* says that in February the town purchased a 3.25 acre plot of land between the sports complex and the road that encompasses the building and is now discussing how to use the property and the building. Some ideas have been broached so far, including turning it into additional parking or using it for more natural purposes like a vegetable garden or small-scale tree farm. Another idea sees the building used as a multi-purpose facility or vendor/concession hub. In February, the board had initially leaned more in the direction of using it for parking or storage space, but residents, including a soccer coach and vendor, have expressed that it would work better as a spot for vendors and that parking isn't much of an issue in the existing space. The Sports Complex is used for many different purposes, including soccer and basketball and the Upper Valley Nighthawks call it their home field.

And back in Claremont but on a much lighter note than our first Claremont story tonight, a local nonprofit has received a large grant to support their efforts. Turning Points Network, a social services group, received a nearly \$350,000 grant from the Department of Justice Office on Violence Against Women yesterday to support their transitional housing program. This considerable grant will help TPN provide housing at various residences for roughly 50 survivors of domestic violence and their families in Sullivan County. The housing will be provided through private landlord housing and TPN joins five other local organizations in providing a roof over the heads of domestic violence survivors. These groups are: Pride Center of Vermont, Community Alliance, Southwestern Community Services, TLC Family Resource Center, and LP Coleman Contracting Services. Clients will be helped for a minimum of one year and a maximum of two years and will come with a variety of optional service such as legal advocacy, financial counseling, and safety planning. Turning Points Network was founded in 1977 and has offices in both Claremont and Newport. They held a 5K walk and fun run earlier this year and fundraised a total of \$96,000.

Good evening, it's Monday, September 26th.

Big news tonight out of Claremont with a developing story regarding a fatal officer-involved shooting over the weekend. A 25-year old Claremont resident was killed early Sunday morning after an encounter with Claremont Police at around 5:00 AM. The victim was identified as Cody Lafont, who lived on Congress Street, and the state's Attorney General's Office is currently investigating the case. Police say that they encountered Lafont when they were responding to a 911 call but it was not revealed what exactly they were responding to or the identity of the officer responsible for shooting Lafont. No police officers were injured and the scene at 53 Congress Street was blocked off during the day on Sunday as investigators worked to uncover the exact details of what happened. Lafont's mother told *The Valley News* that her son had mental health issues, including depression, and he had called 911 multiple time in the past to have police assist him at his home. She also said that to her knowledge, her son owned no firearms. Investigators have determined that this case appears to be an isolated incident and that there wasn't and still isn't a perceived threat to the public.

An update from last week now as residents have made their voices heard regarding the proposed improvements for St. Gaudens Road in Cornish. A public meeting was held last Thursday at the Cornish Town Hall and about 40 residents turned out to hear from the NH Department of Transportation for their planned project for the stretch of road from 12A to the St. Gaudens main site. *The Eagle Times* reports that residents voiced several concerns regarding the removal of the current guardrail and installation of a new one as well as the removal of 14 trees on the side of the road. Additional work mainly includes the removal of the existing pavement, which is worn and cracked, and replacing it with new asphalt and eventually adding a final overlay on top. The guardrail will be replaced with a NU-Guard guardrail, considering that the existing wire rail was built in the 1930s and would not be effective in the event of a crash. However, the new fence would be an eyesore, according ot residents. NHDOT officials have expressed that if residents are not happy with the project as it is currently being presented, then it will amended and not done without the input of residents. The start and duration of the project have not been set as of yet but will cost the state roughly \$585,000 to complete.

Good evening, it's Tuesday, September 27th.

We begin tonight with an update from a story we had last week as Claremont has spoken with residents about their planned logging operation for Arrowhead Recreation Area. The consensus following a public hearing last night was that neighbors and abutters of the logging site were generally opposed to the timber harvest. *The Valley News* reports that last night, about 50 residents met at the end of Whitcomb Lane to chat with city officials about the timber harvest operation that is part of the city's 2008 forestry management plan. The city's forestry consultant explained how the process would be completed, including using specialized equipment and highly-skilled operators to reduce damage to the surrounding land and to fully reap the benefits of selective logging. However, residents have already expressed opposition to the project before it was even explained, citing that the land and roads would suffer immense damage and that water runoff would ruin lawns, considering that the trees are above the houses on a hill. Residents voiced that the cost of the damage would exceed the expected revenue of about \$47,000. The plan won't move forward for now until the City Council discusses it more and makes a decision.

It's no secret that Vermont, the Green Mountain State, is on the cutting edge of going green, well in this case, greener, especially through solar panels. One local town is now examining the option of installing a large group of solar panels on the roof of a sports arena, but it may not work out any time soon. *The Valley News* explains that the town of Hartford has applied for state permission to install a grid of solar panels on the roof of the Wendell A. Barwood Arena, but the building is owned by the school district and would have to go through the School Board first. In July this year, the Vermont Public Service Board received the application from Hartford which sought to install solar panels not just on the sports arena but on various other town buildings including the wastewater treatment plant. All applications were approved as they did not exceed the allowable cap but the actual structural integrity of the sports arena's roof is now in question as it may not be strong enough to support an entire array of panels. The idea of placing the panels on the ground was also broached, but the School Board has yet to make up their mind regarding the installation.

In education news tonight, Dartmouth College is reporting a slight decrease in their endowment for 2016. On Friday, the College announced that they've posted a 1.9 percent investment loss for the fiscal year that ended on June 30th. This brings the endowment value down to \$4.5 billion, which is an overall decrease of 4% from last year's amount of \$4.7 billion. The college's Chief Investment Officer explained that the decrease is largely due to the volatile global economy. However, just last year, the college's endowment was increased by 8.3 percent, boosted by large investment returns and gifts to the school, so the 4% decrease this year isn't as impactful had the college not seen such an increase. Dartmouth now joins two other Ivy Leagues who have reported losses on their endowment funds and investments, those being Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania with Harvard racking in a 2 percent loss on its endowment and UPenn tallying up an investment loss of 1.4 percent. Four other Ivy Leagues, including Brown and Cornell, have yet to release their investment results.

Good evening, it's Wednesday, September 28th.

A minor update tonight in the tragic story of the death of a 25-year old Claremont man who was shot and killed by police over the weekend. An autopsy released by the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office has revealed that Cody Lafont was shot three times in the chest during an encounter with police on Sunday morning around 5:00 AM. What's more is that at least one officer has been removed from the line of duty for now, pending the results of an investigation being conducted by the AG's Office. Police Chief Alex Scott did not specify to *The Eagle Times* whether the unidentified officer has been placed on paid or unpaid leave of absence or had been reassigned. In fact, authorities aren't revealing much information at this point in the investigation, besides the fact that they responded to a 911 call at Lafont's Congress Street residence and an officer shot and killed him, firing three times. His mother has since explained that he was known to have had mental issues such as depression and didn't own any firearms to her knowledge. Authorities have ruled the shooting as a homicide, which is different than murder, and the autopsy says that no crime was implied.

Staying in Claremont but on a more pleasant note, the city is set to discuss parking and traffic on one of the city's most recognizable streets. The City Council will be discussing

Pleasant Street tonight at their meeting especially in regards to the downtown parking situation and truck traffic. *The Eagle Times* says that the city's Director of Planning and Development will present a downtown parking study from 2009 so that they can address its effectiveness and find determine if parking signs are doing their jobs. One focus of the report was a look at all-day parking for both commercial and residential use. Additionally, in 2015, the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission conducted a study of truck traffic in the downtown and officials are now looking to remove the use of trucks on Pleasant Street, instead hoping to move them to Elm or Union Street. Trucks have been a source of headaches in the area of Opera House Square and Broad Street by causing traffic blockages and slow-downs as they maneuver through roadway features such as the rotary. Essentially, the city is looking to start a discussion and lay out an overview on the current traffic situation, with special regards to Pleasant Street, and find ways to improve.

Speaking of traffic, pedestrians are as much a part of downtowns as cars are and one Vermont town is about to invest in safety for those walking and biking around town. Brattleboro, Vermont, through the town's Selectboard, has agreed to take \$30,000 from the town's annual budget to buy and install pedestrian safety measures throughout town. *The Brattleboro Reformer* says that the Department of Public works is expected to chime in soon and inform the Board on how that money can best be spent. The Traffic Safety Committee in town had discussed installing four new flashing lights for pedestrians crossing the street and the Selectboard, at their previous meeting, came up with the figure of \$30,000 for new safety measures. The vote was unanimous this week following recent incidents of at two pedestrians being hit by vehicles and sent to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries. The board hopes to make the investment and improvements soon, as waiting for the next fiscal year of 2018 would mean that they wouldn't be able to pull funds until next summer.

Yesterday was a big day for the Center for the Arts in the Lake Sunapee Region as they held their annual meeting at the Nolton House in Sunapee Harbor. Good evening, it's Thursday, September 29th.

Parents of Croydon students who attend public school in Newport will have one more week to figure out new transportation plans for their children thanks to an agreement reached last night. Just one day after Croydon Superintendent Greg Vogt sent a letter to parents informing them bus service to Newport would end at the end of the week, a new agreement reached last night will extend that service for at least one more week. Currently, about 25 students take advantage of the service - which utilizes a Newport bus driver - for transportation to the Newport Montessori School and the town's public schools. Croydon, which split from Newport's school district this summer to form its own single-town school district, has been without its own bus driver since the middle of last year due to health reasons. Vogt told the *Valley News* he's been looking for a replacement driver since late August when he was told about the current agreement's pending termination. State law says school districts are required to provide bus transportation to students who live more than two miles from their school.

Crossing into Vermont now, a 50-year-old St. Johnsbury man pleaded not guilty Tuesday after firing shots at a camper in Brattleboro and telling police he was "going to blow the town up." Police say John E. Merrick threatened two victims with guns before firing shots at the canopy of their camper from a close proximity. According to the Brattleboro Reformer, Merrick then told an officer he was "going to blow the town up" and that he was "fortifying (his) position" and "loading up all (his) guns." Despite the threats, Merrick - who had access to a black powder pistol and multiple rifles - was taken into custody without incident. He now faces felony charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, reckless endangerment and firearm possession after condition of a violent crime, with each charge carrying a sentence of up to five years in prison. Merrick, who has multiple prior convictions including grand larceny and simple assault, is currently being held without bail.

Turning back into New Hampshire, a 67-year-old Enfield woman was found guilty earlier this week of assaulting the president of the Enfield Outing Club during a select board meeting back in April. According to court documents, Paulette Dunbar was sentenced to one year good behavior and not serve any prison time as a result of the incident that was caught on video tape. Dunbar was found guilty of having unprivileged contact with the club's president and grabbing his cellphone during a break from the April 18th select board meeting. The altercation was apparently triggered after Dunbar filed a court petition seeking injunctive relief, saying the outing club - which operates a shooting range - violated Enfield's zoning ordinance by expanding use of its site. Dunbar and her partner live across the street from the club. Outing club president David Stewart videotaped the altercation with his cellphone.

And finally, calling hours for a 25-year-old man shot and killed by a Claremont police officer early Sunday morning will be held tonight at a city funeral home. Family and friends are invited to the Roy Funeral Home on Sullivan street until 8 p.m. tonight to pay their respects to Cody Lafont, who was killed during an encounter with police shortly before 5 a.m. Sunday morning. A Mass of Christian burial will be held tomorrow at 3 p.m. at St. Mary's Church. Authorities have released few details regarding the incident, which remains under investigation by the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office. An autopsy released earlier this week revealed that Lafont - who is said to have struggled from depression - was shot three times in the chest. No officers were injured. Police responded to Lafont's Congress street home on a service call, and the name or names of the officers involved have not yet been released.

Good evening, it's Friday, September 30th

We begin tonight with news out of the Upper Valley as utilities firm Valley Green Natural Gas formally withdrew its proposal Thursday to build a natural gas facility in Lebanon. The news comes on the heels of an agreement between the firm and competitor Liberty Utilities, which will allow the later company to continue in its efforts to become the region's primary supplier of natural gas. Liberty Utilities will now ask the Public Utilities Commission to reopen its petition to establish a gas distribution facility in the Upper Valley, after having asked the state to suspend the process while it negotiated with Valley Green. Liberty spokesman John Shore announced in a press release that Valley Green has "withdrawn their petition for franchise rights and are supporting the Liberty Utilities petition that is now before the Public Utilities Commission." It was not immediately known when the commission will issue a response to the petition, which has been opposed by environmental groups who question the suitability of natural gas.

Over in Plainfield, town officials are contesting some \$126,000 in charges the federal government says it's owed for maintenance of the property formerly owned by notorious tax evaders Ed and Elaine Brown. The property, located on Center of Town Road, sold at auction last October for \$205,000, but is still causing headaches for officials after the Internal Revenue Service recently released invoices seeking compensation. The Valley News reports the town is arguing that much of the government's claims had either nothing to do with taking care of the property or were "exorbitant," including approximately \$40,000 for plowing and sanding the home's gravel driveway prior to its sale. Another \$27,000 dollars was paid to Dartmouth Moving and Storage for packing personal property at the Plainfield property, though the town argues that much of the Brown's personal items were sold at auction. Plainfield officials expect a response from the government on its arguments some time in the next few weeks.

Here in Claremont, city councilors are split on a proposal to spend roughly \$33,000 on a review of finances of the Parks and Recreation Department and its community center. According to the Valley News, the idea to hire an outside consultant to review the department was triggered during a spring budget review when a request was issued to hire a full-time maintenance worker at a cost of \$60,000 annually. The request was denied by the council, which instead agreed to review the department to ensure it's being run as efficiently as possible. Councilors debated Wednesday the need for the review, with some arguing the city may not even follow through with the report's recommendations. One councilor, John Simonds, went as far as to call the review a "slap in the face" to Parks and Recreation Director Mark Brislin, saying it suggests Brislin is not doing his job properly. The council is expected to reach a resolution on the matter at its Oct. 12th meeting.

And finally, drivers around the Connecticut River Valley will have a new office to visit when it comes to renewing licenses and other DMV matters according to a press release issued by the New Hampshire Division of Motor Vehicles. Today marked the last day of operations at the Claremont DMV located on Water Street, setting the stages for the grand opening of a new DMV office on Monday located at 20 North Main Street in downtown Newport. The new location will feature a larger lobby, more customer parking and offer on-site motorcycle

testing. DMV Director Elizabeth Bielecki said in a press release that her department "anticipates its customers will find (the new location) both convenient and efficient while they complete their DMV business." Hours of operation will remain the same at the Newport office, which will be open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Newport office is the only office in the immediate area, with the next closest located in Concord or Keene.
