We begin tonight with news out of the Upper Valley, as a fire earlier Saturday morning at a Dartmouth College dormitory left dozens of students displaced and two firefighters with minor injuries. The Hanover Fire Department was alerted to the blaze shortly after midnight Saturday morning, and arrived on the scene to find the roof of the East Wheelock Street building engulfed in flames. According to a press release, students were already evacuating the building as crews arrived, though firefighters made rounds to all of Morton Hall's rooms to ensure nobody was left behind. It took crews from more than 10 towns from both New Hampshire and Vermont several hours to extinguish the blaze, which left two firefighter with minor injuries. The building remains uninhabitable according to the Dartmouth College student newspaper, leaving officials scrambling to find temporary housing for the approximately 70 students who resided in the dorm. Investigators believe the blaze began as the result of an unattended hibachi-style grill.

Here in Claremont, a 25-year-old man shot and killed by a police officer last weekend was honored by his peers during a ceremony Friday evening at Claremont Speedway. Cody LaFont was killed last Sunday following an encounter with police stemming from a 911 call at his Congress Street residence. LaFont, who was shot three times in the chest according to an autopsy, was honored through a parade of race cars at the local speedway, led by his blue Mini-Cooper driven by his mother, Tracy McEachern. The parade was followed by a moment of silence, in front of family and friend's sporting LaFont's No. 24 car number. Earlier Friday, the attorney general's office identified the police officer who shot LaFont as Cpl. Ian Kibble. Kibble, a two-and-a-half year veteran of the Claremont Police Department, has been removed from duty as per protocol while the shooting is being investigated. Kibble was the only officer on the scene when the shooting took place. LaFont's funeral was also held Friday.

Residents of Claremont, Newport and Charlestown will once again be able to count on public transportation to get to-and-from work, shopping centers and medical appointments when public bus service resumes next week. Keene-based Southwestern Community Services will begin offering its services in the area next Tuesday, nearly one month after Community Alliance of Transportation Services shut down its similar operation due to financial reasons. The *Valley News* reports that Southwestern Community Services will utilize six drivers and a dispatcher who formerly worked for the Community Alliance to staff

the additional workload. The previous service was shut down Sept. 9, with the company's annual operating losses over the last three years averaging nearly \$100,000. Officials from Claremont, Newport and Charlestown have all agreed to help fund the new service, though Claremont has not yet proposed a specific dollar amount. The New Hampshire Department of Transportation and Southwestern Community Services agreed on a contract that will expire in June of 2017.

Crossing into Vermont now, classes were canceled today at the Twin Valley Elementary school in Wilmington after the unexpected death of a veteran teacher on Sunday. The school, located about 15 miles west of Brattleboro, will resume classes tomorrow. Karen Chase, a kindergarten and first grade math and literacy coach, had been employed at the school for 17 years, according to a press release. Her death is not being deemed as suspicious, and instead was the result of a medical incident. Wilmington Superintendent Chris Pratt wrote in a statement that "TVES lost a dear friend and colleague on Sunday," and that the school would be closed "so that the faculty, staff and school community can grieve and mourn the passing of a dear friend." The *Brattleboro Reformer* reports that Chase was a member of the school's leadership team, which oversees the vision of the school and its multi-tiered system of support.

We begin tonight with an update on our top story from last night as Dartmouth College officials announced Monday that a dorm damaged early Saturday morning in a four-alarm fire will stay closed for the remainder of the fall. School officials say they've successfully relocated the approximately 70 students displaced by the fire at Morton Hall, located along East Wheelock Street, and that work is still being done to determine the extent and cost of the damage which destroyed the building's roof. According to the *Valley News*, town records indicate the total replacement cost of the building at about \$4.2 million. State fire officials announced the blaze, which began shortly after midnight Saturday morning and was deemed under control by 6:30 a.m., was sparked by an unattended hibachi-style grill. The college has not public identified the student or students who owned the grill, or whether or not they will face repercussions as a result of the fire.

And now an update on a story we've been following for some time as a 50-year-old former Meriden postal worker has pleaded guilty to opening mail and stealing cash and gift cards. Hartland resident Kim Smith pleaded guilty to the felony charge Monday in Sullivan County Superior Court, almost a year after her arrest. According to police reports at the time, surveillance footage from within the Meriden post office located on the campus of Kimball Union Academy show her opening mail, taking out cash, and putting it her pocket before re-sealing the envelopes. Police say Smith stole 17 gift cards with a total value of \$920, as well as \$200 in cash. Smith will be sentenced at a later date, and faces up to seven years in prison and a \$4,000 fine. Smith, who also pleaded guilty to having an unlicensed, loaded pistol in her vehicle, has also worked at post offices in Hartland, Lebanon and Weathersfield according to the *Valley News*.

Staying in the Upper Valley, a former Hanover principal voluntarily surrendered his education credentials Monday after a judge found him guilty of soliciting prostitution. 48-year-old Matthew Laramie was arrested this past spring after a prostitution sting conducted by the Canaan Police Department and was subsequently charged with a Class B misdemeanor. Prosecutors agreed to a plea deal, however, to which Laramie pleaded no

contest Monday in Lebanon District Court, resulting in a \$500 fine. Laramie resigned from his role as principal of the Bernice A. Ray School prior to the arrest, and about a month before administrators announced an investigation into more than \$30,000 in unapproved spending on the man's school-issued credit card. According to the *Valley News*, the Hanover school board announced this summer they would not press charges in connection with the funds. Prior to working in Hanover, Laramie also held jobs at Kearsarge Regional High School, Stevens High School and Lebanon High School.

Well in an extremely tight vote Monday night, the Claremont Zoning Board of Adjustment approved a variance that will allow for camping on property owned by Claremont Speedway on Thrasher Road. The board voted 3-2 in favor of creating 149 seasonal campground sites for recreational vehicles on the 66-acre property. The variance was needed as a campground is not a permitted use in a residential zone - where the speedway sits - though the board's approval is not the final hurdle the speedway must clear. Monday night's decision can still be appealed within the next 30 days, and speedway officials also need to submit a plan for approval to the city's planning board. Speedway officials have been exploring the possibility of adding a campground since June, and have held public hearings and site visits to help diminish concerns. Those who oppose the plan argue a campground would diminish surrounding property values. *YCN News* will continue to update this story as additional steps are taken.

Well on the heels of Dartmouth-Hitchcock's announcement that several hundred employees would be laid off by year's end due to financial struggles within the medical system, one high-ranking executive has resigned. John Birkmeyer, executive vice president for integrated delivery systems and chief academic officer, will leave his post Oct. 14 according to a statement released by CEO James Weinstein on Tuesday. Weinstein said in the statement that "as our health system continues to evolve to meet the health and health care needs of the people and communities we serve, change is an inevitable part of that process." Birkmeyer has served in the position for two years, and was a key player during Dartmouth-Hitchcock's transfer of hundreds of jobs from Dartmouth College's Geisel School of Medicine in both clinical research and psychiatry. Dartmouth-Hitchcock announced last month it would be laying off as many as 460 employees by the end of 2016, though there was no indication Birkmeyer's resignation is correlated.

\*\*\*

Well despite what was a relatively wet weekend for a change, town officials over in Newport have escalated their original voluntary water restrictions to mandatory. The decision was made during Monday night's select board meeting and is effective immediately according to a press release. Newport Public Works Director Larry Wiggins says Newport's main water supply of Gilman Pond in nearby Unity has dropped considerably. The restrictions are for customers of town water only - not well owners - and include all non-essential water use, watering of lawns or gardens, washing vehicles, and filling swimming pools. The Eagle Times reports the town has already taken one major money to conserve water in canceling one of two annual flushing of its fire hydrant systems. According to Newport officials, the town uses approximately 500,000 gallons of water per day. Despite the new mandatory restrictions, town officials have said no penalties are yet in place for violators.

Over in Vermont, a 21-year-old accused of hitting two pedestrians, including one who later died, in Springfield this summer has pleaded not guilty to three additional counts. James Ribeiro answered the charges Tuesday in Windsor Superior Court of two felony counts of leaving the scene of a crash with serious bodily injury, and a misdemeanor count of driving under the influence. Ribeiro already pleaded not guilty to two felony counts of leaving the scene of a crash with a fatality resulting in June. According to Springfield police, Ribeiro

struck and killed 37-year-old Steven Lapre and seriously injured 31-year-old Pamela Runnels while they were crossing the street near McDonalds on June 9. Ribeiro told police after later turning himself in that he had glanced down at his cell phone and when he looked back up "it was too late." The new misdemeanor count comes as a result of Ribeiro allegedly telling police he had smoked marijuana prior to turning himself in. Ribeiro is currently free on \$25,000 bail and is scheduled to appear back in court Jan. 3.

And now in what's becoming a strange trend of sorts over in Cornish, a motorist is being blamed for damaging a notorious covered bridge for the third time this year. According to a press release issued by the Cornish Police Department, the Dingleton Hill Bridge was damaged around 1:30 Monday afternoon on the Townhouse Road side. Witnesses to the incident described the vehicle as a full-size, white pick-up truck with landscaping company markings on the side. They told police the truck, which was traveling from Root Hill toward Townhouse Road, was towing a trailer holding what looked like a generator. The bridge was damaged in February of this year by a passing school bus, and again in June. It was built in 1882 and restored in 1983, and was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. Anyone with information is encouraged to call the Cornish Police Department at 543-0535.

We begin tonight with news on what was a drama-filled school board meeting Wednesday night here in Claremont following the abrupt resignation of one of its members days earlier. Becky Ferland, chairwoman of SAU 6 and an elected member of the Claremont School Board, announced her resignation in an email to the school district and media Monday night after a heated dialogue with members of the SAU board hours earlier. Ferland's email was vague as to which role she was resigning from, however, and when the representative attempted to sit at the board table during Wednesday night's meeting, she was told she was no longer a member. Ferland's son Brent Ferland, who is also a member of both boards, attempted to explain that his mother intended to resign as chairwoman of the SAU 6 board only, but eventually walked out of the meeting after more tenuous exchanges with board members Brian Rapp and Chris Irish. Becky Ferland accused SAU board members of verbal bullying in her emailed resignation.

\*\*\*

Well in another school-related story, Lebanon Middle School students and staff were evacuated Wednesday afternoon after smoke was detected in the building around 1 p.m. After a brief investigation by area fire departments, it was determined that smoke from the school's pellet boiler had drifted back into the building through its air-intake system. Lebanon Assistant fire Chief Jeff Libbey told the *Valley News* that no one was in danger and that there was no damage to the building built in 2012. A similar incident occurred at the school last fall, though that situation did not call for an evacuation. Students and staff were allowed back in the school in about an hour. School officials told the *Valley News* the boiler has been running since last week, and is typically switched to ideal by late morning.

Members of the Lebanon, Hanover and Hartford fire departments responded to the scene.

Over in Vermont, the Bellows Falls Historical Society is now one step closer to beginning work on a heritage center within the TLR Mill Complex. The Rockingham Select Board voted unanimously Tuesday night to approve the historical society's two-year lease, leaving just one more step before keys can be handed over to the property. The historical society will now have to sign a \$2-million insurance policy, which is expected to happen in the coming days according to the *Eagle Times*. BFHS plans to fully restore and revitalize the complex, and make it welcoming to member of the community and beyond. The group says the community will play a key role in deciding how to best use the renovated building. The

Historians have accused Italian explorer Christopher Columbus of harsh treatment of Native Americans, prompting some to suggest renaming the second Monday in October to "Indigenous People's Day." The matter was first discussed by the Hartford Select Board back in August when members voted 4-2 to redact holiday names from the town calendar. According to the *Valley News*, members then asked that the idea of changing Columbus Day to Indigenous People's Day could be explored, to which two members immediately argued against the motion. Opponents say Columbus's alleged acts pale in comparison to those committed by the federal government during Westward Expansion. Town Manager Leo Pullar told the newspaper he plans to present a report on the controversial holiday's potential name change at an upcoming select board meeting.

This past Sunday around 6pm a multiple vehicle crash occurred on US Route 202 in Henniker, NH. Prior to the collision one of the vehicles involved was observed by a NH Trooper travelling at an excessively high rate of speed in the Town of Stoddard. He attempted to catch up, however almost immediately lost sight of the it due to its speed. The vehicle was spotted a short time later by Hillsboro Police, officers noted that it was traveling over 100 miles per hour. Officers pursued the vehicle for a short time before terminating the pursuit due to the excessive speed and reckless nature of the vehicle's operation. Shortly after stopping the pursuit several 911 calls were received regarding a motor vehicle crash on US Route 202 in Henniker. It was determined that the crash involved not only the previously mentioned Toyota Rav4 but also 3 other vehicles. The operator has been identified as Kevin Morong, age 59 of Keene, New Hampshire was ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene, he was not wearing a seatbelt at the time. None of the other victims sustained life threatening injuries. US Route 202/NH Route 9 was closed in both directions for several hours while the scene investigation was conducted. Today marks day 6 since 17-year-old Autumn Sanville of Weathersville, Vermont went missing from a family friend's home. It was the morning of Thursday October 6th around 7:10am when she was last seen and did not go to school that day. According to state police her car was later found near the Springfield, Vermont boat launch, but she was not in her vehicle, her cell phone is no longer receiving signal as well. A construction worker who was at the boat launch did report seeing her, but no further information was given. Autumn was last seen wearing a black and white plaid shirt, black hooded jacket, jeans, and dark brown boots. Sanville's family started a Facebook page called, Help Find Autumn Sanville, which has received over fourteen hundred likes in the four days since it was started. Autumn's mother told YCN exclusively 'The search [for Autumn] is going slow, there's not much to go on and little to no leads. We just want her to return home safely. She has not been on social media or her phone and this is so unlike her.' If anyone has information, you are urged to call Vermont State Police at 1.802.722.4600, anonymous tips are encouraged.

Over in Lebanon, Police Arrested two individuals for selling Heroin out of their Eastman Gill Road. On October 6th Lebanon Police Along with The New Hampshire Attorney General's Drug Task Force arrested 32 year old Shawn Pixley along with 30 year old Mallory Roberts on Charges of selling a Controlled Substance, a class B Felony. Police executed a search warrant on the suspects Eastman hill road as well as their vehicle and recovered over 300 bags of heroin, as well as 2000 Dollars in cash. The arrests were part of an larger ongoing investigation of drug sales in the region. Pixley and Roberts and were arraigned last week in Lebanon District court, and police say additional charges are likely.

A Salem New Hampshire man has been arrested after he led state police on a high-speed car chase late last night from Manchester to Enfield. Police say 42 year old Christopher O'Dwyer was seen speeding through a construction zone in Londonderry in a stolen GMC Sierra pickup truck with Massachusetts license plates. Police attempted to pull O'Dwyer over, but refused - reaching speeds of up to 115 miles per hour heading north on I-93 and later turned onto I-89. The police following him tried twice to flatten his tires and was able to successfully deploy spike strips near Exit 2 in Concord. The chase continued on for about 46 more miles before O'Dwyer was unable to drive any further and came to a stop in Enfield. He was arrested and charged with receiving stolen property, reckless conduct, disobeying an officer, and conduct after an accident. O'Dwyer refused bail and was arraigned in court earlier today.

\*\*\*

And now an update on a story we've been following for some time, as Dartmouth College officials are now saying that contamination from a former dumping ground has spread from the original site, to a well nearly a mile to the North. *The Valley News* reports that officials were caught off guard by the distance of this new contamination from the original site. The contamination was first revealed when owners of the Rennie Farm were informed that their well contained more than twice the state standard of 1-4 Dioxane, classified as a probable human carcinogen. This new well reportedly tested about Point 3 parts per billion of 1-4 Dioxane or about a tenth of the state standard. The contamination stems from a dumping ground for laboratory animals, as well as chemical solvents that were used by Dartmouth in the 60s and 70s. Hundreds of animal carcass that had been the subject of radiological tests by researchers as well as Barrels of scintillation fluid, thought to be the cause of the 1-4 Dioxane contamination were buried at the site off Rennie rd just south of Lyme. Dartmouth College continues to work with the owners of the Rennie Farm and neighboring home owners in an effort to clean up the site, and recently the revised cleanup plan has been approved by state nuclear regulators.

\*\*\*

New Hampshire Technologies has expanded and brought their headquarters right here to Claremont. On Tuesday the official ribbon cutting ceremony took place at their new location at 10 River Bend Industrial Park after they moved from a much smaller facility in Lebanon. New Hampshire Technologies is a factory is a leading supplier of stock and custom pulley assemblies, spindle, and pulley-like products. The new facility is 137,970 square feet, moving from their 42,000 square foot factory in Lebanon. Last November the Claremont Planning Board approved the site plan and in January the company purchased the building for \$3.5 million dollars and made a number of changes and improvements for their machines. The building was built back in 2008 by Ice River Springs as a bottling plant, but soon after closed due to the

We start tonight in Vermont, where state police arrested a Westminster man on possession of a number of illegal narcotics. Yesterday at around 10:30pm 24 year old Jesse Morey was arrested after Police pulled over a vehicle in the parking lot of the 99 restaurant in Brattleboro. During the stop police observed drug paraphernalia in the car, and after searching the vehicle, troopers found Morey to be in possession of Heroin, cocaine, marijuana, and a controlled substance. He was arrested and transported to the Westminster State Police Barracks, where he was processed and cited to appear in the Windham County Superior Court, Criminal Division, on November 22, 2016.

New Hampshire State Police have concluded a two month investigation into a road rage incident that happened in Henniker back in August. Chris Bonollo, 51 of Henniker was arrested on Monday October 10th and charged with criminal threatening and carrying a handgun without a license. On August 19th troopers received a report of a man allegedly pointing a firearm at another driver on the road. The driver who called in the incident told dispatch that the man was heading north on I-89 and troopers were able to locate the car and stopped Bonollo. Bonollo said he did have a firearm in the car but denied to officers that he displayed the weapon to another vehicle and was released. But troopers continued the investigation and found a probable cause to arrest Bonollo and applied for an arrest warrant, leading to his arrest his week. He was released on \$7,000 personal recognizance bail and is due in court on December 2nd.

Here in Claremont the City Council met Wednesday night and moved forward in raising water rates an estimated 15 percent over the next 5 years. The council approved the motion with a 8-0 vote, but still requiring a second reading and a public hearing before another vote can be made. Mayor Charlene Lovett said in a statement that she is in favor of the increased rate over the next year to help cover operating costs and any debt payments. Compared to other communities the size of Claremont, the water and sewer fee would still be below average. The increase would also allowed the city to complete a majority of needed projects, including the replacement of meters with lead in them. Since 1988 water rates in the city from conservation and loss of industry has dropped nearly 40 percent, but the cost to run and repair the water system continue to increase.

We begin tonight with an update on a story we brought you last year as a Unity man accused of killing a pedestrian while driving under the Influence of drugs, has had his bail revoked. The Valley News reports that on Monday Sullivan county Superior Court Judge Brian Tucker revoked 24 year old Aaron Moeller's probation after prosecutors presented evidence that he had violated conditions of his probation twice last month. In September of last year Moeller is accused of hitting 44-year-old Christa Osgood of Claremont, and 45-year-old Kenneth Lavigne of Newport. Osgood was pronounced dead at the scene while Lavigne was transported to Dartmouth Hitchcock. Moeller was on probation for a separate arrest that occurred after the fatal accident last September, but before he was to be indicted by a grand jury on homicide, and manslaughter charges. He had been released on twenty thousand dollars personal recognizance bail, however following Monday's hearing, Judge Tucker deemed Moeller to be a danger to the public. The case is set to go to trial in February of next year

Lake Sunapee Bank will officially merge with Maine-based Bar Harbor Bank in January, but an undisclosed amount of bank employees were handed pink slips last week. The employment cuts include both upper management, operations, and support staff positions and the layoffs are expected to be permanent. About 25% of the job cuts will take place in January and the rest will take place in May, but all employees who are impacted will be offered severance packages and outplacement services. Lake Sunapee Bank was founded in 1868 and currently has 38 branches in both New Hampshire and Vermont. Bar Harbor Bank was founded in 1887 and has 14 branches in Maine.

He was taken to Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center with non-life-threatening injuries.

\*\*\*

And now an update on a story we've followed for some time, as the Hanover planning board may delay their decision on whether or not to allow Dartmouth College to go forward with construction on a new athletic facility. According to The Valley News the planning board is likely to ask Dartmouth for an extension on the November tenth deadline for a decision on the permit. The project has faced significant backlash from nearby neighbors who say that among a number of other issues, the new facility will only add to a growing noise problem. The director of the Hanover planning board Robert Houseman has said that Dartmouth officials have already okayed the extension ahead of the final planning meeting before the current deadline on November first. At that meeting board members are set to review a noise study requested by neighbors, a counterpoint to a similar study conducted by Dartmouth College which has been roundly criticized by neighbors to the site.

New Hampshire Secretary of State Bill Garner called the app, "a neat, uniquely New Hampshire source for election-related information." and he encourages all voters to get out and vote on November 8th. Corporal Ian Kibbe was placed on leave until the investigation was completed by the Attorney General's office and The New Hampshire State Police Major Crime Unit. In a 23 page report released Wednesday by Attorney General Joseph A Foster it was determined Kibbe had been cleared of any wrongdoing following a full investigation of the September 25th shooting. Claremont police Chief Alex Scott say Kibbe will remain off of line-duty assignments until an internal review of the situation takes

place and until the officer is cleared by a police psychologist that he is ready to report back to duty. This is part of department policy and procedures. Family and friends of Lafont said he was a kind and gentle guy that sometimes suffered from bouts of depression. The report states Kibbe fired three shots at LaFont fearing his life was in immediate danger after LaFont had called the Claremont Police Station 8 times in 45 minutes, and met Kibbe at his front door with a gun. The shooting was later ruled a homicide by the New Hampshire Medical Examiner.

It’s unclear exactly how much impact this endorsement will have on the results of the campaign, however support from the Troopers Association, may help Ayotte to garner the coveted swing vote, that could decide this election.

An investigation revealed that Clair had threatened the witness several times via text message, and had also stolen property and demanded payment for its return. Clair was arrested on Monday and charged with Tampering with Witnesses, Theft by Unauthorized Taking and Breach of Bail Conditions. He was held on ten thousand dollars cash bail and is set to be arraigned on October 27 in the Lebanon District Division, New Hampshire Second Circuit Court.

The Claremont Reservoir is closer to making necessary improvements. The City's public works department is seeking a \$20,000 state grant to make needed improvements including replacing the fence around Dole Reservoir. The city council will vote Wednesday night to apply for the grant and send in the application before the November 1st deadline, if voted in favor to move forward. If the grant is given to Claremont the work would begin as early as March and the city would add an additional \$5,000 to the grant. The money would also be used to make repairs and install windows and doors to the aging brick building at the site as well as a digital water meter. The reservoir is the site where more than 40 million gallons of water is housed from the white water reservoir for treatment for the city's water supply.

We begin tonight in Springfield Vermont where the Royal Diner was broken into early Monday morning. Springfield Police say that the back door of the diner had been pried open, and that a safe in the diner's office had been stolen. Police say that they are reviewing surveillance footage provided by the diner, and a \$500 reward is being offered by the owners of the diner for information leading to the arrest of the perpetrator. Staying in Vermont VTrans is planning to hold a public forum on ideas to for suicide prevention around the Quechee Gorge. According to The Valley News, Officials plan to gather opinions on the topic at a meeting at the Hartford Town Hall on November 16th. The information will be used to draft a report on Suicides at the bridge for the Vermont State Legislature Due in January. At least 8 people have taken their lives at the site since 2008, leaping from the bridge which towers 165 feet above the river. Ideas have ranged from adding fencing, and security cameras to the bridge, to signs advising any person in crisis of the resources available to them.

The brand new Newport Health Center opened its doors for business on October 14th. Building for Health, is a \$9-million project including a \$2.2-million fundraising campaign. New London Hospital President and CEO, Bruce King said at the inception the project, "It is time to provide Newport area patients and staff with a modern medical facility, where we can continue to provide high quality health care that meets the current and future needs of the community." The resulting health center now provides 28,000 square feet of specially designed space, over 75% more than the facility it replaced. In 2015 the health center facilitated over 21,000 annual patient visits for primary care for all ages, women's health, in addition to laboratory, radiology and rehabilitation visits. It includes an onsite pharmacy and a community room for public use. Also, with the increased space will come room to grow. Even though the new facility is functioning, there remains the completion of several exterior projects including the demolition of the old building, the installation of large tanks to hold parking lot rainwater runoff, the completion of parking lot paving over the site of the old structure then the completion of the canopy over the main entrance. The center plans for a November 29th ribbon cutting and Grand Opening. The New London Hospital is still seeking donations for the project. LaClair was laid to rest earlier today at the Pine Grove Cemetery in Newport prior to the service at the Grace River Church where he worked.

The results are in for the New Hampshire Statewide standardized testing, and the overall scores are up 3%. Students in grades 3rd through 8th and 11th grade took the standardized tests last spring and the results were released Wednesday by the Education Commission. Virginia Barry, Education Commissioner for New Hampshire said she believes the improvement is thanks to the local educators and the hard work of students in the state's school system. Biggest statewide increases were seen in 11th grade English, 3rd grade math, and 8th grade English. Girls in grades 3 through 8 did much better in English than boys the previous year, but boys were 51 percent better than girls in math. The statement released by the education commission said an increase is an increase and it is not a bad thing for students in New Hampshire.
