This week's storms have broken up an unseasonably long, dry period for Southern California to kick off our winter ... and this comes during an El Nino year, which we've come to understand means a REALLY wet winter. But an El Nino pattern in the Pacific Ocean does NOT automatically guarantee a wet winter for California ... it's a problem of expectations that's the fault of both us in the media ... and the unpredictability of climate change. Shang-Ping Xie is a climatologist at the Scripps Institute in San Diego ... he tells KNX News that El Nino does increase the ODDS of a wetter winter ... and that hasn't changed. Alex Tardy is a meteorologist with the National Weather Service ... he tells KNX News that in the late 1990's, after one very wet winter, the media caught onto El Nino stories ... and in the process, might have distorted our view of its meaning. So odds-making is difficult ... and then, Tardy says, climate change throws us curveballs. At least in the short-term, El Nino does look to be coming alive for California: Tardy says this week's storms could be quite powerful ... and there's another round of stormy action coming up on Christmas week.
