Right after Democrat Joe Farias resigned his state representative seat in the summer of 2015 three Democrats and three Republicans raced to replace him. A face off in the January runoff election resulted in Lujan winning the seat by 171 votes, with a turnout of only 4 percent. The two men's November 8th rematch will draw more than 10 times as many voters.
