A variety of program elements, including regularly scheduled news and public affairs programming, reports on breaking news events, documentaries, specials, and public service announcements of concern to the community are included within our regular programming service. WJZ-TV's coverage of news stories, our employees' participation in community affairs, and regular interviews with community leaders have led to the determination that the issues listed are ones of importance to the Baltimore community. Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally-produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

10/3 The 2010 flu season is underway and health officials are stressing vaccinations to guard against illness. In tonight Flu Watch report we have more on what you need to know to be prepared.

10/4 In tonight's Healthwatch, a new vaccine appears to be extending the lives of patients with a deadly type of brain cancer.

10/5 Each day 4000 boys and girls across the nation smoke their first cigarette according to the FDA. In Healthwatch, Maryland has been more successful than other states in getting people to quit.

12/24 A young Maryland woman with Cystic Fibrosis learns the true meaning of friendship. Doctors told Kristen Jagadowski that her disease made pregnancy too dangerous for her or a child. That's when her best friend stepped in and offered to carry the baby for her.

12/30 Carbon monoxide concerns. Just this week alone, two people have died and nearly a dozen others sickened in separate incidents. Now the push is on to make people aware of the dangers.

ON TIME

October 3: Kai Jackson talks with Sen. Verna Jones about the African American Forum on Memory Loss; with Cass Naugle about Alzheimer's programs and with Dr. Marilyn Albert about research into this disease. They discuss the difference between dementia and Alzheimer's and how biomarkers (PET & MRI brain scans) may give physicians the early diagnosis tool needed to begin treatment for the disease.

October 17: The Red Devils, an eight year old non profit organization formed to help breast cancer patients and their families deal with co-pays and transportation to and from doctors' appointments was started by two families of women of who had breast cancer here in Maryland. Jan Wilson the executive director tells Kai Jackson how the program has expanded to meet the needs of needy breast cancer patients. Charmaine Gordon, a former breast cancer patient, discusses how her diagnosis led her to volunteer with the organization by helping with fundraising events.

October 24: The Believe in Tomorrow foundation provides services to families with critically ill children including housing at Johns Hopkins Hospital, respite housing at the beach and mountains and adventures for the entire family. Susan Murrow explains the importance respite housing for families that have been consumed with a medical crisis. Robby Griesmyer tells Kai Jackson how his family was able to go the beach after dealing with his cancer operation and treatment that lasted for almost one year.

November 7: Christopher Shea tells Kai Jackson that he was just appointed to direct the new Tackling Drug Addition initiative at the Open Society Institute Baltimore. This initiative plans to fund community based programs on drug and alcohol addition recovery. He discusses how this drug and alcohol addition is a health disease that is under funded and those seeking help are often turned away.

November 21: The Festival of Trees transforms the Maryland State Fairgrounds into a winter wonderland. Lainy LeBow-Sachs, and Bill and Courtney Toomey, co-chairs of the Festival of Trees tell Kai Jackson how the three-day event benefits the children at Kennedy Krieger Institute. They discuss new elements at this year's festival including raffle tickets to the Super Bowl.

November 28: Kai Jackson talks with Alison Massey and Justin Figueroa about the Dine with a Dietitian series of workshops offered at St. Joseph Medical Center. They discuss health ways to eat that don't involve fast food restaurants or prepared foods that are high in calories, fat and sodium.

December 5: Mercy Medical Center is set open the new Mary Catherine Bunting Center making it the third hospital that the Sisters of Mercy have build on the same location since the late 1890's. Sister Helen Amos

and Thomas Mullen tell Kai Jackson about the 3 rooftop gardens and private patient rooms that are distinguish the new facility from the existing fifty year old hospital.

December 19: WJLA news reporter/anchor Bruce Johnson tells Kai Jackson about having a heart attack at age 42 and how this lead to his writing a book based on his experience and others who survived a heart attack. He discusses the day he had the heart attack while covering a news story and how his life has changed since that fateful day.

EDUCATION

CASA representatives discuss situations that lead to children being removed from the home and how their volunteers are trained to address the special needs these children have while navigating the juvenile justice system.

October 17: GEDCO – the Govans Ecumenical Development Corporation – is getting ready to break ground for a new concept in senior citizen housing. Representatives tell Kai Jackson that the Green House Residences has a residential layout centered on the resident's kitchen with a resident medical staff person coordinating services for the small number of seniors assigned to the floor. These residences are designed for low to moderate income seniors in Baltimore.

October 24: Mark Gordon and Van Reiner talk with Kai Jackson about the new exhibition at the Maryland Science Center, "Odyssey's Shipwreck: Pirates and Treasure. They discuss the types of sunken treasures that have been discovered using deep sea recovery methods that are on display in this new interactive exhibit. Mark Gordon shows Kai Jackson one of the gold bars that was recovered in from the Black Swan treasure site.

October 31: Federal stimulus funds are being used in Baltimore City to help weatherize low income families' homes. Ken Strong from Baltimore Housing and Ruth Ann Norton from the National Coalition to End Childhood Lead Poisoning discuss how the weatherization program is using green technology to help make the homes safer and more healthy while at the same time saving the homeowner money.

November 7: Kai Jackson talks with Steve Cline from The Partnership for Drugfree.org about their name change (from The Partnership for a Drug Free America) and programs to help parents and adult mentors talk to children about the use of drugs and alcohol. He discusses resources available online to help facilitate discussions on drug use for all age groups.

November 7: Best Buddies is a program for developmentally and intellectually challenged individuals. They promote one on one friendships. Founded by Anthony Shriver to compliment the work of Special Olympics, this national organization has local chapters in high schools and colleges. Vince Fiduccia, the Maryland director and Hannah Saltzman, a high school participant discuss the types of activities Best Buddies participants engage in during the one on one relationships and how this improves self esteem and leads to greater independence for those with challenges.

November 14: AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps has volunteers work in low income neighborhoods to help rebuild vacant houses into vibrant livable homes for struggling families. Warren Leath and LaQuine Roberson tell Kai Jackson how the program trains young people to work as a team on a variety of projects for assisting Habitat for Humanity to helping with disaster relief programs of the American Red Cross. Participants receive housing, food and education assistance and a stipend for their work.

November 14: When her husband was killed, Shawte Wright started the David B. Wright Memorial Foundation to help other families struggling with the loss of a loved one due to a homicide or murder. She tells Kai Jackson that creating the foundation has helped her to deal with the death of her husband.

November 14: Rev. Theresa Mercer tells Kai Jackson about the upcoming event for foster care children and their caregivers. She stresses how important foster care families are in addressing the needs of children who have been removed from their biological parents due to abuse or neglect.

December 12: Kai Jackson talks with Russell Snyder about the programs of Volunteers of America. VOA works with other non profit organizations to provide volunteers to help with food kitchens, homeless shelters and other human service needs. They discuss how their holiday campaign benefits needy families year round.

December 19: Kai Jackson talks with Kathleen Dachille, director of the new regional Public Health Law Network located at the University of Maryland School of Law about the mission of the organization and how their services can assist law makers, citizens, government agencies and consumers.

December 26: The Ports America Chesapeake New Year's Eve Spectacular features free musical entertainment and fireworks at the Inner Harbor. Tracy Baskerville and Mark Montgomery tell Kai Jackson about this year's events and the importance of the port to the state's economy.

December 26: Kai Jackson talks with representatives from Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Maryland about the need for adult mentors to target several areas of the city with high juvenile crime rates.
