Station WJZ-TV, licensed to CBS Television Licenses LLC, is responsive to the principal issues in its community of license, Baltimore, Maryland on a continuing basis. A variety of program elements, including regularly scheduled news and public affairs programming, reports on breaking news events, documentaries, specials, and public service announcements of concern to the community are included within our regular programming service. WJZ-TV's coverage of news stories, our employees' participation in community affairs, and regular interviews with community leaders have led to the determination that the issues listed are ones of importance to the Baltimore community. Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally-produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

#### Eyewitness News did a story on...

10/2 Growing concerns tonight throughout the U.S. over the deadly Ebola virus. This, as we're learning just how many people may have been exposed to the first person diagnosed on U.S. soil. WJZ is live with the precautions being taken right here in Maryland.

10/6 October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month—it's a campaign dedicated to raising awareness for the disease through education. WJZ is live with a message from health experts.

10/10 It's the largest outbreak of Enterovirus D-68 ever recorded and new cases are coming in every day. Ten confirmed cases are confirmed in Maryland in just the last three weeks. Now, doctors want parents to be vigilant about any possible symptoms they see. WJZ is live with the very latest.

10/12 Experts say hands-free technology is safe to use behind the wheel, but a new study by AAA suggests otherwise—that these popular features may actually increase distraction. WJZ explains why.

- 10/13 Hospitals in our region are bracing and preparing in case someone with Ebola walks into a local emergency room. Complete coverage continues as WJZ is live with how state and local officials are learning lessons from what's happening in Texas.
- 10/15 WJZ has complete coverage of the Ebola crisis—WJZ spends the day with Maryland doctors working on vaccine trials for the deadly virus.
- 10/15 Cancer tumors doctors couldn't touch before may soon become fair game. WJZ reports that the University of Maryland will be the first east coast medical center to offer cutting edge proton therapy.
- 10/16 WJZ has live complete coverage of the Ebola crisis live at Dulles Airport where Ebola screening measures went into effect today.
- 10/18 Car crashes are the leading cause of death for teens in the U.S. With that in mind, a new campaign is launched at high schools across the nation to make young people better drivers. As WJZ shows one high school in Harford County is buckling up for a lesson.
- 10/20 The World Health Organization has declared Nigeria officially free of the Ebola virus but the race to find an Ebola vaccine is now lining up volunteers here in Baltimore. WJZ is live with complete coverage and what doctors and volunteers face during a vaccine trial.
- 10/22 Maryland is on the front lines in the battle against Ebola vaccine testing is underway at several research facilities. WJZ reports from Walter Reed Medical Center in Bethesda on how it would work.
- 10/24 Student health scare as several confirmed cases of viral meningitis are found on the University of Maryland College Park campus. WJZ has what school officials plan to do to stop the spread of the virus.
- 10/25 In tonight's Health Watch, targeting the flu. WJZ reports, before the season strikes, one county is taking precautions now.
- 10/26 The state of Maryland has designated three specific hospitals to care for any potential Ebola patients should the need arise. As WJZ explains, the move shifts the burden of training and preparing staff to some of the largest hospitals in the region.
- 10/27 WJZ has complete coverage as a possible new patient is tested for Ebola. WJZ is live with the new steps the state of Maryland is taking to protect the public and more on the quarantined health care worker now being released in New Jersey.
- 10/29 The numbers are growing. University of Maryland officials confirm nearly two dozen cases of viral meningitis on the College Park campus. WJZ explains what the school is telling students.
- 10/30 Some are calling it the Ebola effect. Health officials say the amount of people getting their flu shots has increased dramatically compared to recent years. WJZ is live and explains the uptick.
- 11/1 Dangerous driving. New government numbers show northeast cities including Baltimore have more crashes than anywhere else in the country. WJZ is live downtown with the surprising new information.
- 11/3 The current Ebola outbreak isn't the only fatal virus out there. WJZ reports, a Maryland company is at the forefront of combating multiple viruses with a single vaccine.
- 11/6 Texting and driving—it's dangerous, deadly, and many people are still doing it. Every day in the United States, nine people are killed and more than one-thousand are injured from distracted driving. WJZ looks at a new, surprising study about this road hazard.

- 11/14 Heroin crisis. The growing heroin epidemic leads several of Maryland's key police leaders on a fact-finding mission to Colombia, South America. WJZ is live and explains they're bringing the lessons they learned back to their communities.
- 11/14 A Baltimore wedding gown designer is using her sewing skills to save lives. She's part of a team of engineers challenged with creating an "Ebola suit" for doctors fighting the deadly virus in West Africa. WJZ has her story.
- 11/14 Ebola concerns hit closer to home. A Maryland doctor arrives in Nebraska today to receive treatment for Ebola. Surgeon Martin Salia was in the West African nation of Sierra Leone working with patients when he developed the virus.
- 11/17 Second U.S. Ebola death—Maryland doctor Martin Salia died from advanced stages of Ebola early this morning in Nebraska. Doctors say they used every treatment available but the virus had progressed too far to save him. WJZ is live with more from the doctors and his Maryland community.
- 11/17 A warning to parents tonight about energy drinks. An alarming number of young children are getting their hands on the super-caffeinated drinks and suffering heart problems, even seizures! WJZ is live and explains poison control centers are being flooded with calls.
- 11/20 It is time for Marylanders to sign up for affordable health care. The Maryland Health Connection is open for business and as WJZ reports, the newly revamped website is up and running
- 12/1 A warning to parents tonight—a new study shows injuries related to toys have increased significantly in the past decade. WJZ reports, toys like scooters are a big reason for the jump.
- 12/2 Federal health officials have certified 35 U.S. hospitals for treating Ebola patients. In Maryland, Johns Hopkins Hospital, the University of Maryland Medical Center and the National Institutes of Health are on the list.
- 12/4 This year's flu vaccine may not be that effective against the strain circulating this year. The CDC says a sampling of flu cases suggests just less than half are a good match for the current vaccine.
- 12/8 Battling painkiller abuse—a growing number of Americans with prescription drug addictions are dying. Now, a new study from Johns Hopkins shows what doctors are doing to stop overdoses.
- 12/12 The fight against Ebola takes center stage at an annual infectious disease conference right here in Baltimore. It comes as the NIH in Bethesda begins treating a nurse who contracted the disease in Sierra Leone. WJZ is live with the key role some Maryland doctors are playing in the search for an Ebola vaccine.
- 12/15 The death toll rises—42 deaths have now been positively linked to accidents involving faulty ignition switches in General Motors' cars. That's according to an attorney for the victims' compensation fund. But, auto advocates say the number is much higher. WJZ is live with more on the increase.
- 12/17 Local innovators fight back as Africa endures its worst Ebola outbreak. A WJZ report, that includes a team from Johns Hopkins focused on protecting health care workers on the front lines.
- 12/17 More than a dozen owners and employees of a Massachusetts compounding pharmacy—now charged in connection with a deadly Meningitis outbreak in 2012. It killed 64 people across the country and three right here in Maryland.
- 12/18 Winter has not yet officially started, but five people here in Maryland have already died due to the cold weather and temperatures are expected to plummet this weekend. WJZ is live with the warning tonight from health officials.
- 12/18 Today is the last day to sign up for the Maryland Exchange for Health Insurance and have coverage start January 1<sup>st</sup>.

12/18 The odds are low, but the danger is high. 'Tis the season for Christmas tree fires. They don't happen very often, but when they do, it can be devastating.

12/20 Legionnaires Disease has been reported in a local nursing home. Baltimore County's Health Department is monitoring the efforts to identify the outbreak and procedures to eradicate the germs.

12/22 A woman with depression can affect her child between the ages of 6-10. Health studies reveal that these children have shown an increase in the use of smoking, drugs and alcohol during their adolescent years.

12/24 The FDA is reversing a ban on gay and bisexual men donating blood. The ban went into place in 1983 at the height of the AIDS epidemic.

12/30 An increase in the number of Flu cases has prompted several facilities to set up a quarantine in order to prevent the spread of the air-borne illness.

12/30 Scientists have discovered that a sugar molecule in red meat causes lab rats to grow tumors at five times the normal rate.

#### ON TIME

10/5 Fitness expert Donna Lynn shows Gigi Barnett some aerobic moves designed to help tone muscles and burn fat. She is the author of two books, "101 Ways to Stay Motivated to Lose Weight" and "Lose Your Stomach Forever the Donnacize Way." She discusses ways to incorporate exercise into everyday life and use the facilities in your own home.

10/12 Alzheimer's disease is on the rise especially if you are an African American or a woman. Ernestine Jones Jolivet and Ellen Torres tell Gigi Barnett that more research needs to be done in order to find a cure and how important it is for people to be screened for early onset dementia. They discuss several awareness campaigns that are targeting the faith-based communities with messages about this disease and the toll it takes on caretakers.

10/26 Gigi Barnett talks with Andrew Pekosz about infectious diseases like Ebola, Enterovirus and the Flu. He discusses symptoms of these diseases and how individuals can protect themselves especially by getting a flu vaccine which is readily available and inexpensive.

11/16 Kidney Disease affects many Americans - many who are unaware that their kidneys are not functioning until significant damage has been done. Ben Simpkins tells Gigi Barnett about dialysis prior to getting a kidney transplant from his mother. Now he chairs the Kidney Foundation's Sante event – a culinary odyssey. Dr. Matthew Weir explains what the kidneys do, from filtering blood and removing waste product, to regulating fluids, etc.

11/23 Gigi Barnett talks with nutritionist, exercise physiologist and author of Living *Skinny in Fat Genes*, Dr. Felicia Stoler about making health eating choices over the holidays. Dr. Stoler tells Gigi about making healthy substitutions such as using whole grain pasta, multi-grain chips in place of the traditional white flour alternatives. She discusses portion control and the importance of getting more servings of fruits and vegetables over protein and grains.

11/30 Tom Bonderenko tells Gigi Barnett about the start of Moveable Feast and their mission to provide nutritious meals to AIDS patients. He explains how the program provides compassion to the homebound and now assists patients battling terminal illnesses like breast cancer. He discusses plans to educate the younger generation through programs on World AIDS Day that include the Living Red Ribbon and health fair at Morgan State University.

12/7 Gigi Barnett talks with Dr. Joshua Sharfstein and Carolyn Quattrocki about the state's healthcare marketplace where consumers can shop for healthcare insurance plans. They discuss how the website was revamped after last year's website crashed and had numerous flaws. The new website had a soft opening and enrollment in the health plans was up past 25,000 in just the first weeks. With the rollout of this year's campaign, health officials are holding enrollment workshops across the state and have counselors available by phone to help consumers.

12/7 Arthritis isn't just an old person's disease. It's the leading cause of disability in the U.S. and affects 300,000 children. Dr. Joseph Ciotola, an orthopedic surgeon describes what arthritis is and how it affects the joints and bones. Lisa Boccia, director of the Arthritis Foundation, tells Gigi Barnett how the nonprofit helps arthritis sufferers and helps to fund research into the disease. Their upcoming Jingle Bells Run/Walk helps with their fundraising goals.

12/14 Jules Shepard tells Gigi Barnett about her diagnosis with celiac disease and how she began experimenting with alternate flours that were gluten free. Her gluten free flour can be substituted in recipes with no change in taste. She explained how she struggled to get a diagnosis after suffering from the effects of the disease which causes the body to attack its small intestines.

12/21 Clinical Social Worker & Psychotherapist Lisa Ferenze tells Gigi Barnett that the holidays can be especially difficult for victims of trauma who engage in self-destructive behaviors. The stress of the season can escalate negative feelings that cause self harm including eating disorders, drinking and drugging excessively, and self mutilation. Ferenze suggests people limit themselves to situations that trigger these behaviors. She offers suggestions on how to minimize explosive family situations and replace old broken traditions with new options including supportive friends who can buffer negative situations.

- 10/7 A big day in space for Baltimore's own astronaut Reid Wiseman. After months on the International Space Station, he finally got to go out on a space walk—one of two planned for this month before he comes home.
- 10/8 Catwalks, fashion shoots and top designers—what's the future of the nation's fashion industry? First Lady Michelle Obama weighed in on that question today at the first-ever White House Fashion Workshop for high schoolers. WJZ is just back from Washington with more.
- 10/15 Sixty-three years ago today, I Love Lucy made its TV debut. It was one of the most popular CBS shows ever... and now, I Love Lucy is on stage—at the Hippodrome. Today, WJZ had the opportunity to spend the afternoon with the lead actress—and watch her turn into Lucy right before our eyes!
- 10/21 A major phase is wrapping up in the restoration of Baltimore's Washington Monument. WJZ reports, a brighter future is literally coming to light.
- 10/22 Big things are happening downtown! For the first time in years, Baltimore is getting a glimpse into the lives of the men behind the Walter's Art Gallery on the museum's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary! WJZ reports, visitors say it's incredible.
- 10/24 For everyone who dreams of publishing a novel, there are piles and piles of rejection letters crushing those hopes. But as WJZ reports, one Baltimore native is beating the odds.
- 10/27 The nation's biggest names in dance are in Baltimore for a new performance called "Shaping Sound" at the Hippodrome. Have you heard of Travis Wall? He's here and showed WJZ some of his amazing moves today.
- 10/29 Amazing discovery—a multi-million dollar restoration project at the Washington Monument reveals a rare find. WJZ is one of the first to see what's been hidden for a century.
- 10/30 The stage at the Royal Farms Arena is set on ice tonight as Disney's smash-hit "Frozen" comes to town this weekend. WJZ takes a behind-the-scenes peek at how the special effects "wow" the nearly sold-out crowd.
- 11/6 Tall ships sail into Baltimore's Inner Harbor this weekend—bringing with them years of history and nautical know-how. WJZ is live at the Inner Harbor with details.

- 11/7 It's a show with singers of all ages from all over the world. The "Women's Barbershop Harmony" is serenading people at the Baltimore Convention Center.
- 11/9 Final farewell—after almost six months aboard the International Space Station, Maryland's own Reid Wiseman is set to return home tonight. Wiseman has become a Twitter sensation while spending time in space taking daily pictures and video for everyone here at home to see.
- 11/11 In just over an hour, some of the biggest names in music and entertainment take the stage in our nation's capital to pay tribute to America's heroes on Veterans Day. WJZ is live in Washington with more on the first ever Concert for Valor.
- 11/17 The cable TV show, "Diners, Drive-ins and Dives" has featured 14 restaurants in Maryland. Now, as WJZ reports, when the show host—Guy Fieri—opened his own place at the casino downtown, he visited a few spots, including a landmark in North Baltimore.
- 11/18 Maryland's own Reid Wiseman is adjusting to life back on Earth. He returned from the ISS just over a week ago. Today, WJZ checked in with the astronaut, who shares his remarkable experience from NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.
- 11/19 Early arrival—the holiday season is underway for folks walking around parts of Baltimore. From Sky Eye Chopper 13, live over the Inner Harbor and Harbor East, where "It's a Waterfront Life" kicks off tonight. WJZ is live with a sneak peek of the returning tradition.
- 11/20 While winter weather has gripped much of the nation, there's also a focus this week on space weather. It can cause trouble here on Earth, and as WJZ reports, the source is the largest sunspot in a quarter century.
- 11/21 One of the most popular podcasts in the world is raising new questions about a Baltimore County murder case from 15 years ago. WJZ is live to explain the "Serial" podcast is casting some doubt on a crime many considered solved.
- 11/21 From soldier to singer—Baltimore's own Joey Odoms belts out the National Anthem before every Ravens home game. But how he landed his dream job is a story of destiny that begins half a world away. Tonight, WJZ tells how courage and a chance meeting with Ravens head coach John Harbaugh lead Joey to the 50-yard line.
- 11/29 Tonight the red carpet is rolled out in the city as dozens of people welcome the holiday season. For the 25<sup>th</sup> year, more than two dozen owners on West 34<sup>th</sup> Street deck their homes for Christmas.
- 12/3 WJZ is live at M&T Bank Stadium as excitement builds for the Army Navy football game.
- 12/3 Stop the presses—that's what the "Newsboys' Strike of 1899" did and crippled an entire industry. Now, there's a Broadway hit musical at the Hippodrome retelling the real-life movement.
- 12/4 The holiday season is upon us and what better way to celebrate than with the annual monument lighting in Mount Vernon. WJZ is live along Charles Street where all the action is getting underway.
- 12/10: A young man from the Towson area has just made his debut on Broadway—not as an actor, but as WJZ shows you, he designed what the audience sees on stage.
- 12/11: The Army/Navy game is coming back to Baltimore. For some families, the bitter rivalry is more personal. WJZ introduces you to the Tissler brothers.
- 12/12: WJZ is live with complete coverage—preparing for the Army/Navy football game at M&T Bank Stadium. The city is getting ready with pep rallies and the players are practicing.
- 12/16: An old German tradition during the holidays took root in Baltimore—train gardens. Now, as WJZ reports, these displays help to strengthen an area's community identity.

12/17 A large turnout comes to witness the lighting of a large Menorah in McKeldin Square. Hanukkah began yesterday. Each day another candle gets lit, one for the seven days of the Jewish celebration.

12/18: A holiday tradition that's enchanted audiences for decades comes to the Lyric Performing Arts Center this weekend. It's "The Nutcracker" and as WJZ explains, all of the performers are still "in training".

12/19 Bethel El Congregation performs at the Levindale Geriatric Center and hospital during the third night of Hanukkah.

12/26 A candle is lit during the first day of Kwanzaa, a seven day observance commemorating principles of African culture. The Reginald F. Lewis Museum celebrates Kwanzaa with several hands-on activities.

12/30 New Year's Eve preparations are underway at Baltimore's Inner Harbor. A preview of music and fireworks for the end of year celebration.

12/31 Baltimore's New Year's Eve Spectacular features live music from the Inner Harbor amphitheatre and fireworks at midnight over the skies of downtown Baltimore. WJZ's live special captures all the excitement starting at 11pm and concluding with fireworks after midnight.

# ON TIME

10/5 Reyna Grande, the author of "The Distance Between Us: A Memoir" talks with Gigi Barnett about having her book chosen as the Maryland Humanities Council's One Maryland One Book campaign. She discusses how her parents left Mexico to pursue the American Dream while leaving their children behind with grandparents. She rejoined her parents at the age of 9 and became the first person in her family to graduate from college.

10/19 The Walters Art Museum is turning 80 and the staff has created a new exhibit featuring some of the 22,000 works originally collected by the Walters, father William Thompson Walters and his son, Henry Walters. Executive Director Dr. Julia Marciari-Alexander and Curator Dr. Jo Briggs tell Gigi Barnett about the free exhibition that features original purchases by the Walters and what the collection means to the citizens of Maryland.

10/26 The Benjamin Banneker Historical Park and Museum is commemorating Maryland's 150 anniversary of Emancipation with a new exhibit: From Banneker to Douglass: The Quests for Freedom and Equality." Museum representatives Justine Schaeffer and Willa Banks tell Gigi Barnett who Benjamin Banneker was and his role in the pursuit for civil rights.

11/2 The Baltimore Museum of Art turns 100! In honor of that milestone special festivity, events and the reopening of the American Wing are planned according to the BMA's Doreen Bolger and Gamynne Guillotte. The main entrance will be the museum's original Merrick entrance, the Zaimoski entrance with the BMA shop is getting a make-over and the visitors will get a chance to add to the contents of the time capsule that is going to be buried for the next 100 years.

11/16 Downtown Baltimore will have an ice rink for the first time in 10 years. Laurie Schwartz, president of the Waterfront Partnership explains how they were able to secure the location at McKeldin Square, in the heart of the Inner Harbor. Additional activities are planned from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day to celebrate the holidays – from Santa appearances, light shows, 100 tuba players performing holiday favorites and special dollar day admissions to the National Aquarium, Maryland Science Center, Top of the World, and Christmas Village on West Shore Park.

11/30 Doris Ligon started the African Art Museum of Maryland thirty-three years ago. This museum is only one of three dedicated to African Art and is the only one founded by a person of color. She explains to Gigi Barnett how the museum began and how it continues to grow and educate new populations including school children. Their upcoming Jazz fundraiser was created by her late husband Claude Ligon and helps to maintain the museum in its new location in Maple Lawn.

11/30 With the success of the Star Spangled Banner, organizers at various Maryland museums are joining together to commemorate the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the end of World War II. From Warfront to Homefront: WWII in Maryland kicks off on Pearl Harbor Day, December 7 and continues through next September and features new exhibits at a variety of museums across the state. Organizers Alice Donahue and Debi Wynn discuss the contributions to the war effort from the Glenn L. Martin Company which made aircraft at its Middle River factory. The National Electronics Museum features exhibitions of radar which was in its infancy during the war but significantly helped the allies protect the skies over London from German bombing.

12/7 The B&O Railroad Museum is partnering with various other nonprofit charities during the holidays through their Giving Train which allows visitors to bring canned goods, coats, and books to the museum and in return they get a half-price admission. Courtney Wilson tells Gigi Barnett about their special events and holiday displays of model trains and train gardens.

12/7 Vince Vaise tells Gigi Barnett about Holidays at Hampton and how the northern most plantation in the National Park Service celebrates Christmas. He discusses this year's theme of World War II that will feature big band swing music in addition to special dance performances, African American storytelling, candlelight tours and more and it's all for free.

12/14 Gigi Barnett talks with author Patricia Montley about the rituals associated with the Winter Solstice. These rites trace back to ancient times. The Winter Solstice takes place on the darkest night of the year, December 21. Patricia Montley explains that the rituals will be performed at First Unitarian Church of Baltimore and include the turning of the wheel, the blessing of the babies and features song, and poetry.

12/14 Dr. Marco Merrick tells Gigi Barnett about the choir he founded in order to preserve the traditional spiritual music that was the hallmark of the African American church. Too often churches are not offering this music during regular worship services. The Christmas Concert is free and open to the public and features over 150 people in the choir.

12/28 Gigi Barnett talks with Sandy Richmond, president of the Lyric and Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake about the impact of the 120-year old performing arts center has had in Baltimore. They discuss the diverse programming, arts education programs and the economic impact of a vibrant arts community.

10/19 Planning for growth—right now, Baltimore ranks 8<sup>th</sup> in the country for the number of people who live in the city's downtown. With the mayor's push to have 10,000 new families call Baltimore home by 2022, people are welcoming plans for a new high rise.

10/20 The recession caused a lot of real estate projects to never get off the ground. Now, one long dormant project in Charles Village is being resurrected, as WJZ reports.

11/11 Two hundred and fifty-million dollars—one Baltimore Raven star joins in on a costly project to help revitalize the city's historic Sharp-Leadenhall neighborhood. WJZ explains—the group of investors is aiming to turn the south Baltimore area into a mix-use development.

11/14 In the city's quest to draw thousands of families to Baltimore, one incentive may do the trick. A home-buying credit could help reverse decades of population decline. WJZ explains how it works.

12/4: Thousands of Baltimore families living next to abandoned homes look for a ray of light in a plan being introduced to City Council tonight. WJZ's political reporter explains it's an early intervention for a growing problem.

12/8: It's been seven months since Fort Washington families in Prince George's County were forced from their homes after a massive mudslide. Now, those families get some good news, financial help is on the way.

## ON TIME

10/12 Gigi Barnett talks with Odetta Ramos and Jeff Mosley about new efforts to expand Community Development into additional neighborhoods. They explained how becoming part of a community development network benefits businesses to individuals and helps strengthen communities. #### ON TIME

- 10/19 What was originally a home for German orphans during the Civil War is now a comprehensive foster care program for abused and neglected 13-21 year olds. Board members Susan Brown and Dr. Antoinette Coleman tell Gigi Barnett about their home-like shelter programs that nurture young people and guide them into independence once they "age-out" of the foster care system. Many of their graduates continue their education by attending local colleges like Morgan State University.
- 11/9 The Festival of Trees is celebrating its 25 year when it returns to the Maryland State Fairgrounds. Lainy LeBow-Sachs tells Gigi Barnett how they will transform the Cow Palace into a winter wonderland with beautifully decorated trees and wreaths, Gingerbread villages, train garden, craft boutiques, children's activities and entertainment. Proceeds benefit the children at Kennedy Krieger Institute.
- 12/21 Ralph Serge tells Gigi Barnett about a new program that benefits Maryland's Community Foundations by encouraging charitable giving into sustainable program known as Endow Maryland. - 10/2 It's a big investment in little kids—75,000 dollars worth. WJZ reports, it's a grant from the federal EPA and a bet on a greener future.
- 10/10 Tonight, the state of Maryland announces its Teacher of the Year! She is Jody Zepp, from Howard County. She teaches Government and Psychology at Hammond High School.
- 10/12 In tonight's School Watch—late nights, and early school start times are leading to many Maryland classrooms full of sleep-deprived students. Now, one school district is considering a later school day, but it's looking for students and parents to weigh in first.
- 10/14 Baltimore County is stepping up efforts to get eyes into its public school buildings. WJZ is live with more on new networks of security.
- 10/16 Nationwide, millions of teens are not in school and they don't have jobs. A solution to that problem may come in a partnership between city leaders and one of the country's leading coffee companies. As WJZ explains, Baltimore is one of five cities teaming up with Starbuck's to find and hire young workers.
- 11/2 A teen shooter enters a high school—how fast can police respond and medics help victims? WJZ reports, that's the focus of a mock drill at a Baltimore County school this weekend.
- 11/12 By the end of this school year, six city schools will shut their doors for good. It's a cost-cutting plan designed to save the district millions and free up money to renovate dozens of other schools. WJZ explains some parents are outraged about the proposed move.
- 11/17 Reading, writing and robotics. That new third "R" of learning can be a door-opener for students. WJZ reports, it's got the "robo-doves" rolling.
- 11/20 In tonight's School Watch—stemming the tide of Baltimore's dropout rate. That's what one large donation from one of the nation's top telecommunications companies aims to do.
- 12/ It's among the most prestigious scholarships in the world and it's going to a student right here in Baltimore. A senior at Johns Hopkins is on his way to becoming a leader in cancer research and medical science—after being named a Rhodes Scholar.
- 12/1 Students and local lawmakers in Baltimore City attempt to set a Guinness World record—creating the largest "living red ribbon" in support of World Aids Day.
- 12/6 While many students are waiting for the holiday break, others are selecting new schools to attend next year. This weekend, Baltimore schools hosted its "School Choice Fair". WJZ reports in School Watch, this year's event featured four new schools.
- 12/9 Calendar controversy—Muslim leaders are pushing to have equal recognition for Muslim holidays on school calendars in both Howard and Frederick counties. The move follows a similar fight in Montgomery County.
- 12/11 As the holiday approaches, some Maryland schools are decked in red and green—but a handful are using blue ribbons. This week, the state unveiled its 2015 Blue Ribbon schools. As WJZ explains in tonight's School Watch, five elementary and one high school are on the list.

12/15 The state budget woes and school funding—serious concerns tonight from top Maryland educators. WJZ's political reporter looks at some of the speculations.

12/15 Baltimore city hosts a huge holiday party for students—but only if they qualify! In tonight's WJZ School Watch, students at one school who had the best attendance record—got a celebration full of surprises.

12/17 Heartache and disappointment for hundreds of college applicants—after Johns Hopkins mistakenly tells them they are accepted when they are actually rejected from admission.

12/17 The Baltimore City Public High School graduation rate is going up, an increase for the past four years. Meanwhile dropout rates have decreased by almost half.

12/17 As high school students send in college applications some students worry that their Facebook accounts could be used against them.

12/30 A Bowie State University student claims he was the victim of hazing from September –November 2013 and now he's suing both the university and the fraternaty Alpha Phi Alpha for damages.

#### ON TIME

10/5 Dr. Carla Hayden discusses new renovations to the Pratt's Central library that preserves the historic past while incorporating modern technology. She tells Gigi Barnett about structural changes that include developing areas like creation stations for teens and young adults and using audio video technology for resumes and teleconferencing.

10/12 Junior Achievement is helping K-12 and college students with entrepreneurial opportunities. School-based programs help students to understand business and give them an opportunity to explore different career options. Frank Bonsall is being honored for his work in the entrepreneurial field at Towson University by the JA board at an upcoming fundraiser featuring musician Kenny Loggins.

10/19 Gigi Barnett talks with Maryland Public School Superintendent Dr. Lillian Lowery about Common Core — from what it is to who developed the program and why there is so much controversy around the concept. Dr. Lowery recounts that the development of the program originated with input for state school superintendents with a goal of giving all students a chance to improve their education by sharing best practices from successful schools like Maryland with lesser performing schools like those in Mississippi. Dr. Lowery also discussed how Maryland needs to close the achievement gap between majority and minority students in Maryland.

11/23 Deborah Phelps tells Gigi Barnett how the Education Foundation of Baltimore County Public Schools is enriching the learning experiences of students by funding extra programs and projects that complement the core class work. She discusses how these enrichment programs are helping to broaden students' horizons and are influencing them in the post high school graduation studies.

11/23 The Baltimore Leadership School for Young Women, based in Baltimore City offers female students opportunities to mature and grow without the distractions of young males. Teacher Shardae Shipman and student Dayla Williams talk about the bonding that occurs in an all girl's school. The nurturing school environment encourages more girls to pursue STEM – science, technology, engineering and math – subjects. The school is based on a school in NY's Harlem that develops today's girls into tomorrow's leaders.

12/28 Dr. Carla Hayden tells Gigi Barnett about the impact the library has had on individuals by providing over 60 million dollars in services to their patrons – from books, ereaders, computer classes, resume writing workshops and access to the internet. All of their programs are free. To support these programs the Pratt holds several ticketed items including the Pratt Contemporaries Black and White Party, Booklovers' Breakfast and Mr. Pratt's Gala.
