Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

LOCAL POLITICS

WJZ News

1/1: With the New Year comes new laws... and that includes a big change here in Baltimore. The city will no longer be allowed to prevent anyone who has won a settlement against the city from speaking about that settlement. WJZ explains why some people are still upset at the mayor... even as this bill goes into effect.

1/2: Keeping the door open... Governor Hogan says Maryland will continue to welcome refugees. The announcement comes after President Trump issued an executive order back in September... that allowed states to block refugees. WJZ explains what this means for our state.

1/8: The 2020 Maryland General Assembly is officially underway... and this year—it was an historic start. For the first time in decades, leadership in the House and Senate has changed... and both are from the Baltimore region. WJZ's political reporter breaks down what's on the agenda this session.

1/8: Governor Hogan could take a drastic step... when it comes to making sure the Chesapeake Bay gets the clean-up it needs. He wants to sue the state of Pennsylvania and the EPA. WJZ explains—the Governor feels they aren't doing their part to protect the Bay.

1/21: A Baltimore Mayoral candidate is pulled over for a traffic violation. The hour-long encounter is all caught on police body camera video... but it's what Thiru Vignarajah asked an officer to do... that's leading to questions. WJZ is live with the video and how the candidate is reacting.

1/22: A former state Delegate pleads guilty to federal bribery and wire fraud charges. Cheryl Glenn admitted she sponsored several bills in exchange for nearly \$34,000 in bribes. WJZ reports on how long she could spend behind bars.

2/2: A final push for the many candidates who want to fill the Congressional seat of the late Elijah Cummings. A pool of 32 candidates and the thousands of Marylanders casting votes—will head to the polls for in this special primary election. It will determine who will be on the ballot to fill Cummings' seat. WJZ got the chance to speak with several of the candidates.

2/3: Some of you are getting ready to head to the polls tomorrow—to vote in the special election primary to fill the seat of the late Congressman Elijah Cummings. It's been empty since his sudden passing this past October... the 7th District includes parts of Baltimore City, Baltimore County and Howard Counties. There will be 24 Democrats and eight Republicans vying for the nomination ahead of April's election... and the winner of that election will go on to serve the remainder of Cummings' term. WJZ is live with more on the candidates' final push before voters head to the polls.

2/4: Today is the day many Marylanders will head to the polls, to vote on who they want to see have a chance to fill the seat of the late Congressman Elijah Cummings. WJZ has team coverage of the special primary election—from the moment the polls opened and when the results started to come in.

2/5: Governor Larry Hogan laid out his vision for our state... in his 6th State of the State address. His priorities include education, transportation and crime-fighting in Baltimore. WJZ explains what he wants to get done.

2/6: It's straight tobacco or nothing under a bill currently making its way through the General Assembly. That means any flavored tobacco products—including menthol cigarettes—would be banned. WJZ breaks down the bill and the impact it could have statewide.

2/13: Nearly five years in prison. That's how long prosecutors want to see former mayor Catherine Pugh spend in prison. It's all connected to the scandal involving her self-published children's books. Nearly three months after Pugh pled guilty to federal conspiracy and tax evasion charges, prosecutors are pushing for a tougher sentence. WJZ has the new developments.

2/17: It was a crowded afternoon at the State House... as hundreds of students, parents and teachers rallied together—demanding state lawmakers pour more money into education. They want lawmakers to approve the Kirwan Commission's recommendations which would mean billions more for our schools. WJZ tells you what happened in Annapolis and what comes next.

2/20: Questions tonight about millions of dollars meant for the city's youth fund... that money has been slow to getting to the programs that need it most. WJZ was at the hearing tonight and is keeping tabs on the fund's progress.

2/27: Former Baltimore Mayor Catherine Pugh is sentenced for her involvement in her "Healthy Holly" books scheme. A judge sentenced her to three years in federal prison, followed by three years probation. WJZ has team coverage—with Pugh's comments and reaction inside the courtroom after learning her fate.

3/2: It's a proposal that has many Marylanders upset. A sweeping tax increase on services in Maryland drew hundreds to Annapolis. WJZ was there and listened to those who say their industries would be disproportionately affected.

EDUCATION

WJZ News

1/14: Shocking allegations... now, teachers at Aberdeen High School are under investigation. The group is accused of making negative and public posts about a former student on social media. That student's mother spoke exclusively to WJZ.

1/23: State lawmakers are considering pouring more money into building schools. Known as the Built-to-Learn Act... the bill would invest more than \$2 billion into school construction over several years. It would be financed by bonds through the Maryland Stadium Authority and would be paid for with casino revenue money.

1/27: Students and teachers are demanding more money be invested in Baltimore City schools. They took those demands straight to lawmakers in Annapolis... but this is a hot button issue... that has many asking—where is the money coming from? WJZ is live with one group's message and the legislation being considered.

2/11: A Baltimore basketball legend is fighting to protect his reputation. Keith Booth is speaking with WJZ, after he was fired as head coach at Dunbar High School. WJZ's sports director has more on what happened and what Booth has to say.

2/11: Hundreds of Baltimore County school teachers are coming together... demanding change. They want better pay and resources for their students... amid contract negotiations for the next school year. WJZ explains—they went right to the school board.

2/13: Concern in Baltimore County... among parents at Halethorpe Elementary. They got a letter from the school, letting them know about a substitute teacher accused of unprofessional behavior in the classroom. WJZ spoke to parents who say more than anything, they want some answers.

2/14: A disturbing alert has students at Johns Hopkins on edge. The school's investigating reports of a peeping tom. A man with a camera was reportedly seen inside women's bathrooms... in two academic buildings on campus. WJZ has what students are saying about all this.

2/15: Current UMD College Park president Wallace Loh is retiring in a few months. Darryll Pines will take over with more than 20 years as professor and Dean of the College of Engineering. WJZ reports, Pines takes over as the university recovers from some devastating events.

2/17: A peeping tom suspect at Johns Hopkins University is under arrest tonight. And the suspect—may have done this before. We searched through court records and found a man with the same name and birthday has been charged in similar incidents in the past. WJZ is on campus with the new details.

2/26: Sickened and suing. A former University of Maryland student, with a severe case of Celiac Disease, says workers in the dining hall repeatedly served her food with gluten—that incapacitated her—even sending her to the hospital. She sat down with WJZ's investigator to tell her story—which is the subject of a new lawsuit against the school.

3/6: A major overhaul of the state's public schools takes a big step forward. During a late night session, the bill promising billions of dollars in education funding passed the House of Delegates. WJZ's political reporter has details on the groundbreaking vote.
