October 1 – December 31, 2018

Station WJZ-TV, licensed to CBS Television Licenses LLC, is responsive to the principal issues in its community of license, Baltimore, Maryland on a continuing basis. A variety of program elements, including regularly scheduled news and public affairs programming, reports on breaking news events, documentaries, specials, and public service announcements of concern to the community are included within our regular programming service. WJZ-TV's coverage of news stories, our employees' participation in community affairs, and regular interviews with community leaders have led to the determination that the issues listed are ones of importance to the Baltimore community. Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

# HEALTH

- 10/8: Thirty-eight cases of West Nile Virus are confirmed in Maryland. The state health department tells WJZ that number is higher compared to the last several years.
- 10/13: Startling new data shows the number of opioid-related overdoses in Maryland is on the rise. According to the state department of health, opioid overdoses increased by 14.8% over the first six months of 2018 compared with the same period last year.
- 10/16: There's been a spike in a rare, polio-like illness affecting children. The CDC confirmed 127 patients are under investigation for acute flaccid myelitis or AFM. WJZ has more on the patients in Maryland who have contracted this illness.
- 10/23: Johns Hopkins University is scrambling to contain an outbreak of an infectious virus. The school reports more than 100 people have contracted hand, foot and mouth disease.
- 10/29: The report about the University of Maryland football program focuses on the program's culture but will that be enough to stop another death from heatstroke? One mother is on a mission after she lost her son four years ago—and never imagined—a death so easily prevented would happen again. A number of changes have been made at both

Morgan State University and UMD College Park. Both now have on-site cooling stations and increased medical staff on hand during practices and games.

- 11/20: Never should have happened—it's what the father of one University of Maryland student is saying tonight after the university revealed she died from complications from the adenovirus. WJZ is live with more on what the student's father is saying about the tragedy and what the university is doing to stop the virus from spreading.
- 11/20: Gone forever—it's what one Virginia man was initially told by doctors after a workplace accident resulted in his left hand being cut off. But he didn't lose hope and neither did the surgeon who ended up treating him here in Baltimore. WJZ reports on this story of thanks you'll only see on WJZ.
- 11/21: The University of Maryland College Park is taking new precautions after the sudden death of a student from Howard County. She contracted a serious strain of adenovirus—which can cause a range of symptoms from sore throat to pneumonia and pink eye. WJZ's investigator has what you should know.
- 11/26: It was expected to be a growth market, but sales of medical marijuana have taken off in Maryland. WJZ runs some of the numbers, as more patients turn to cannabis for relief.
- 11/30: On the rise—tonight, University of Maryland College Park officials confirming even more cases of adenovirus on campus. Nearly two dozen cases, that's more than double the amount initially reported earlier this week. One student has died from complications caused by the virus. WJZ is live in College Park with the latest.
- 12/12: A surge in deaths leads federal prosecutors to crack down on Fentanyl traffickers. More than 2,000 people have died from overdoses in Maryland this year alone. WJZ's investigator has the push for tougher penalties.
- 12/13: The number of students infected in a viral outbreak at the University of Maryland College Park is up 37% in less than two weeks. That outbreak has already left one person dead. WJZ's investigator reports from Johns Hopkins Hospital where the student died—with some new precautions.

10/14: WJZ sponsored the American Cancer Society's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer, a 5K walk, at Stadium Place. News anchor Nicole Baker lead 5000 participants in this cancer awareness walk. WJZ's involvement saw a \$35,000 increase over last year's total bringing the amount up to \$240,000 for cancer research and patient programs in the Greater Baltimore area.

### **EDUCATION**

- 10/3: Saving lives in schools. Gunfire has erupted in schools across the country including here in Maryland. Now, the state has a new way for students to report potential threats. WJZ shows you how it works.
- 10/4: Outrage and disappointment. A school bus is caught on camera apparently speeding through a narrow neighborhood street. Tonight, one family tells WJZ this isn't the first time it's happened—and they've repeatedly contacted Baltimore County Schools about the problem. WJZ is live with more on the video that's now gone viral.
- 10/7: A huge accomplishment—a Maryland University's marching band will be featured in next year's Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Morgan State will be sending its magnificent marching band to New York City for the 2019 parade.
- 10/11: Should Baltimore City school police carry guns? That was a hot topic tonight as the school board decides whether to ask the general assembly to allow school police to carry weapons inside school buildings. WJZ is live with more on the debate.
- 10/19: For the first time, the University of Maryland's governing body has seen the independent investigation into allegations of a 'toxic culture' in the football program at College Park. It comes in the wake of the death of a

promising offensive lineman—Jordan McNair. WJZ's investigator reports from Hagerstown with new reaction from the school's president.

- 10/29: An investigation into the culture of the University of Maryland College Park football team is released today. The eight-member panel concluded the team's culture did not cause the death of football player Jordan McNair. WJZ reports, even though the panel drew that conclusion, it found that the program had major flaws including a lack of accountability under head coach DJ Durkin.
- 10/30: After sitting on the sidelines for months the head of the football team in College Park will resume coaching duties. This after the Board of Regents said he was unfairly blamed for the death of player Jordan McNair. WJZ has team coverage of today's announcement we begin in College Park where some are outraged Coach Durkin gets to keep his job. WJZ also heard from the parents of Jordan McNair after learning Durkin and the athletic director would not be losing their jobs.
- 10/31: One day after being reinstated, University of Maryland president Wallace Loh fires head football coach DJ Durkin. In the wake of the death of former player Jordan McNair, the Board of Regents' decision to keep Durkin drew a firestorm of criticism from players, students and politicians. WJZ has team coverage of the fallout from the decision including our sports director who has more on what this decision means for the team going forward.
- 11/1: The chairman of the Maryland System Board of Regents Jim Brady steps down amid the ongoing controversy surrounding the football program at the University of Maryland. It comes as students rallied in support of Jordan McNair. WJZ is live in College Park with the latest on the growing fallout.
- 11/5: The Bowie State University band is suspended tonight. The school says it's become aware of serious allegations of hazing affecting the Symphony of Soul Band. All band activity has been suspended effective immediately.
- 11/7: New video obtained by WJZ shows a student at a Baltimore City high school punching their teacher following an argument. City School officials say it happened today inside Frederick Douglass High School in West Baltimore. WJZ is live there tonight with the video that's quickly going viral.
- 11/8: The Bowie State University Marching Band has been sidelined after allegations of hazing within the organization. WJZ is live and has more on the allegations and the online campaign to get the band back on the field.
- 11/12: What went wrong? That's the question on the minds of many tonight after a school resource officer takes his own life. It happened while class was in session at Eastern Technical High in Essex. WJZ is live outside the school with the latest on the investigation and an exclusive interview with a student who says he spoke with the officer today.
- 11/16: A student rally at Goucher College this afternoon occurs two days after a racial slur appears on the wall of a dorm room threatening three African-American students. WJZ reports, police are investigating the graffiti as biasbased destruction of property but students say it's a hate crime.
- 11/28: Attack on a teacher for the third time this month as another Baltimore City school employee is on the receiving end of an attack by a student. This latest incident is at a high school. WJZ is live with details and reaction from school leaders who say they are working to end this trend in violence now.
- 11/28: Lead in schools—more than a dozen Baltimore County schools test positive for dangerous levels of lead. The revelation is leaving some parents concerned tonight. WJZ is live and explains what led to these findings.
- 11/29: Physically and emotionally hurting. Tonight, the latest Baltimore City school teacher assaulted by a student is speaking to WJZ. WJZ is live at Baltimore Polytechnic Institute with what the teacher is saying.
- 11/30: Out of the classroom and under investigation. Tonight, a substitute teacher in Anne Arundel County is off the job accused of taping a second grade student to his chair. WJZ reports on the shocking allegations.

- 12/1: Kwanzaa is being celebrated early at Morgan State University. The holiday honors African-American culture and values and takes place December 26<sup>th</sup> to January 1<sup>st</sup>. WJZ has more on the celebration.
- 12/3: The head of Baltimore City schools is finally responding to a series of recent attacks. They include three assaults on teachers and support staff last week. WJZ's investigator reports from Frederick Douglass High with the new interview.
- 12/4: The University of Maryland has hired a new head football coach and he's no stranger to College Park. WJZ reports, he comes from the top football program in the nation... finally—a bit of good news after a season of controversy.
- 12/4: More charges filed. A Goucher College student now faces hate crime charges for racist graffiti found on campus last month. WJZ is live at Baltimore County police headquarters with the details and reaction from the campus community.
- 12/4: The first star ratings for every public school in the state have now been released. Seventy percent of schools earned three or four out of five stars.
- 12/5: Back in the hot seat. Top leaders for the University of Maryland went to Capitol Hill today to answer questions about the future of the institution after a student athlete died from heat stroke. WJZ is live and explains—lawmakers were looking for reassurances that changes have been made.
- 12/6: A huge day in College Park as the University of Maryland introduced its new head football coach, Mike Locksley. He comes from Alabama, where he worked under one of the most prolific college football coaches ever. But as WJZ reports, he's now taking over a program dealing with turmoil.
- 12/7: Tonight—the former Mercy High School coach arrested and accused of sexually abusing a student is speaking only to WJZ. This comes as the family attorney representing the student says he believes there may be more victims. WJZ is live with details and the exclusive interview.
- 12/11: A music program called Orch-Kids, run by the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, was started to provide music education to students in Baltimore City. WJZ reports, music is unlocking the door to a whole new world for a number of children.
- 12/14: Baltimore teachers are taking action after several attacks on campus. For the first time, a new task force tackled the problem of school violence. WJZ's investigator explains their focus.
- 12/19: Attacked while on the job—yet another case of Baltimore City school workers being assaulted by a student. School officials say this time it was a nurse and an aide at the National Academy Foundation. WJZ is live outside City School Headquarters with details of the case which comes just days after a meeting between school officials addressing a growing trend in violence.
- 12/20: The Baltimore teachers union and the union representing school employees are speaking out after two workers were assaulted by a student this week. WJZ explains it's just the latest in a string of attacks on workers and educators.

- 10/26: Will it stay or go? The fate of a large mural depicting a Baltimore pop culture icon is up in the air. The mural itself is an image of the famous drag queen Divine, who was featured in several films by famed Baltimore director John Waters. WJZ is live in Mount Vernon and explains why the artwork has many people talking.
- 11/11: This Veterans Day honors our military members and it's also the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Armistice Day. Across Maryland, ceremonies and parades commemorated this special milestone. WJZ explains how Baltimore remembered.

- 12/31: WJZ has team coverage of New Year's Eve events across the region, including a live show at 11pm for the Baltimore New Year's Eve Spectacular.

- 10/2: New tonight—controversial posts. A council member in Anne Arundel County is facing some backlash after he shared what some are calling hateful posts about Muslims. WJZ is live with more on what those posts said and how the council member is responding.

- 11/5: The election countdown is almost over, but candidates who are on the ballot kept pushing for votes into the night and that included the two candidates running for governor. WJZ is live at a polling location in North Baltimore in these final hours before the polls open.
- 11/6: WJZ is your election connection bringing you all the latest as the election results come in... we have the winners and losers... as several reporters are live at various campaign headquarters.
- 11/7: Howard and Anne Arundel Counties both elected new county executives last night. Both will be replacing incumbents. WJZ spoke with both candidates about the upsets and their plans for their counties.
- 12/6: As crime surges in Baltimore—tonight, City Council officially began the confirmation process for the next police commissioner. It's only the first step in the process for Fort Worth police chief Joel Fitzgerald, but it comes with some controversy. WJZ is live at City Hall with details.

- 10/4: Unable to shower or drink water for about a month, that's what some living in a Baltimore City apartment complex had to do to avoid getting sick after several cases of legionnaires cases were confirmed. WJZ is live at the city health department with the details behind the scare and an update from health officials.
- 11/7: Happening now a major gas leak in Southwest Baltimore shuts down Edmondson Avenue and forces several people to evacuate their homes. WJZ is live on the scene and explains, those people still cannot go home.
- 11/14: As the weather changes, familiar but unwanted problems are starting to surface. We are talking about water main breaks. WJZ is live in downtown Baltimore at one of them where work crews and residents may be in for a long night.
- 11/26: A section of a Charles Village street is sinking. Crews are still working tonight—trying to dig out a hillside after the road underneath it began to collapse today. It's just blocks away from where another part of the street collapsed in 2014. WJZ is live on the scene with more on the second sinking on 26<sup>th</sup> Street.
- 11/27: Crews are still chipping away at a wall that supported 26<sup>th</sup> Street, near Calvert Street after the pavement started to give way. The city says this is the plan to keep the Charles Village neighborhood street from collapsing like we saw in 2014... blocks away. WJZ has more on the unanswered questions about what comes next.
- 12/10: It's been two weeks since the partial road collapse of East 26<sup>th</sup> Street in Charles Village left residents in a panic. Repair work has been underway since, but some living in the area feel they've been kept in the dark on how

officials are making sure this won't happen again. WJZ is live along East 26<sup>th</sup> Street with the details of an upcoming meeting the city has announced to address those concerns.

- 12/13: Residents in one Charles Village neighborhood are getting some answers from the city after a road in their community partially collapsed late last month. WJZ is live at the site along East 26<sup>th</sup> Street where repair work has been ongoing and explains what residents found out tonight.
- 12/27: Two deadly floods in less than two years. Today a new plan is revealed for Ellicott City and as WJZ reports, leaders in Howard County are rededicating themselves to ensure people, places, homes and retail storefronts and things are safe and sound.

- 10/3: Fleet Week 2018 gets underway at the Inner Harbor, the week-long celebration at sea and in the air includes crews from around the world. More than a dozen military vessels from three countries will be in town this year. WJZ explains the logistics for an event of this size.
- 10/6: Celebrating the legacy of Henrietta Lacks. A cancer patient who was treated at Johns Hopkins Hospital in 1951 and made major contributions to the medical field. WJZ explains why Johns Hopkins Institute is naming a building in her honor.
- 10/9: Baltimore's acting top cop no longer wants the job. Interim police commissioner Gary Tuggle announced today he's withdrawn his application.
