A variety of program elements, including regularly scheduled news and public affairs programming, reports on breaking news events, documentaries, specials, and public service announcements of concern to the community are included within our regular programming service. WJZ-TV's coverage of news stories, our employees' participation in community affairs, and regular interviews with community leaders have led to the determination that the issues listed are ones of importance to the Baltimore community. Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally-produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

10/3 Charm City residents lace up their sneakers to promote good health. It's all in an effort to get fit, physically and mentally.

10/4 Complications from diabetes is the official cause of death for beloved former Raven Orlando Brown. More Marylanders than ever are at risk for the potentially deadly disease.

10/5 An unlikely connection between critical shortages of life saving drugs and the University of Maryland women's basketball coach. Baltimore Congressman Elijah Cummings is taking action after hearing the story of Coach Brenda Freese's son who has leukemia and can't get the medicine he needs to stay alive.

12/2 In Healthwatch, is a popular movie making people sick? That's the claim tonight by Maryland based Epilepsy Foundation about the latest Twilight movie. One scene is apparently triggering seizures in certain people.

12/4 Turns out getting your head in the game may not be such a good thing. Soccer players who head the ball could be putting their brain at serious risk.

12/8 If you want to quit smoking, the task is a lot tougher here in Maryland. According to the American Lung Association, the state ranks third worst because of the lack of help it offers to smokers.

12/14 The holiday season can bring with it many moments of joy, but police also see a dark side of the stresses these times can produce so they're bringing some solutions to your attention.

12/20 If the holiday season inspires your teen to head to the tanning salon, take note. The Maryland State Medical Society is asking the General Assembly to keep people under the age of 18 out of tanning beds.

12/28 The Maryland Healthcare Commission wants the state to crack down on cardiac stent surgeries.

12/29 In tonight's Healthwatch report, more health help for Maryland children. The state is getting another \$28 million from the federal government to pay for children's health insurance.

12/30 The seasonal flu officially arrives in Maryland with the first confirmed case diagnosed in an adult in the Baltimore area.

#### ON TIME

October 2 – Gigi Barnett talks with Gloria Jetter and Penny Graf about breast cancer and health disparities. They discuss how African American and Latino women do not have the same access to care that Caucasian women do and how this increases their chances of dying from Breast Cancer.

October 2 - Gigi Barnett talks with medicine hunter and author of The Five Tibetans, Chris Kilham, about his work with native people and their use of natural plant substances to cure many different types of illnesses. He explains how he tracks down native people living off the land in places like the Amazon rainforest to South Pacific islands and researches their use of nature's products as their source of medicine.

October 9 - Kai Jackson talks with representatives from the American Heart Association about heart disease in the African American community. They discuss why businesses should encourage their employees to adopt a healthier lifestyle and how it benefits the corporate bottom line.

October 23 - Kai Jackson talks with Cass Naugle and Ernestine Jones Jolivet about advances in the diagnosis and treatment of Alzheimer's Disease. They discuss how this disease is more prevalent in the African American community and how they are partnering with urban churches to increase awareness.

October 23 & December 4 - Tom Leitzer tells Kai Jackson how his program provides healthcare services to low income families. He discusses eligibility requirements and services covered. His managed care program also provides free health seminars to community and church groups.

November 13 - HIV/AIDS has become a health issue for a new segment of the population – senior citizens. Anna Fowlkes, an HIV/AIDS prevention advocate, tells Kai Jackson how she contracted the virus while she was in her 50's after returning to the dating scene after her husband died. She stresses the need for everyone to get tested for HIV and know their status in addition to using protection to stop the spread of the disease.

November 13 - There are healthy foods that can help the heart by cleaning it of cholesterol and other toxins that lead to heart disease. Pharmacist Sherry Torkos tells Kai Jackson why she co-authored Saving Women's Lives along with a cardiologist as a tool for women to improve their heart health. Certain foods like using palm oil instead of other types of oils while cooking, tomatoes, foods with plant sterols are all beneficial for the heart.

November 20 - Kai Jackson talks with Lainy LeBow-Sachs, Bill and Courtney Toomey about the Festival of Trees and how the event's proceeds benefits the children and families in their developmental disabilities programs. Bill Toomey explains why BB&T bank is involved the community and specifically Kennedy Krieger Institute. They discuss how Kennedy Krieger has an international reputation for working with the best doctors and researches on children's developmental disabilities.

November 20 - Kent McKinney, the executive director of the Maryland Health Insurance Plan, tells Kai Jackson how this state program was set up in the early 2000's by the Maryland legislature to provide healthcare to Marylanders who have lost or been denied health coverage due to a preexisting condition. He also discusses the senior prescription program that helps the elderly afford their medications.

December 4 - Kai Jackson talks with Jessica Gilbert and Stephanie Teagle about lupus, its symptoms and treatment options. Ms. Teagle describes what it is like to live with lupus for the last 20 years. Many members of her family have this disease and several have succumbed to its complications. Lupus disproportionately affects African American women.

December 4 -Representatives from Gilchrist Hospice Care tell Kai Jackson that hospice provides palliative care to those at end of life. Their program addresses the needs of patients as well as their family members. The earlier the

family seeks help, the more they are able to take advantage of all the programs that Gilchrist has to offer. Nurse Brenda Blunt tells Kai Jackson how caring for dying children is very different than caring for terminally ill adults.

December 25 - Kai Jackson talks with Drs. Jay Perman and Yvette Rooks about the childhood obesity epidemic that affects 1 in 3 children in the nation. They discuss factors – from the lack of physical activity, lack of fresh vegetables and fruit and heredity that affect weight gain in children. They discuss a new statewide initiative to reverse this trend through the Institute for a Healthiest Maryland that uses academic research coupled with techniques to address the obesity problem.

10/20 Major cuts coming for employees of Northrop Grumman as nearly 800 people, mostly in Maryland, will lose their jobs by the end of January.

10/20 Governor O'Malley signs a new Maryland congressional district map into law setting the stage for a fight over a congressional seat long-held by a western Maryland Republican.

10/21 More people are out of a job in Maryland. The state's unemployment rate went up again in September to 7.4 percent.

10/24 Defending a prominent politician against bribery charges. Today Maryland's Lieutenant Governor testifies on behalf of State Senator Ulysses Currie.

10/25 Talk of slashing federal budgets may have the ax falling elsewhere in Maryland, but not the Coast Guard Yard in Baltimore. Workers there received some very welcome news from Uncle Sam.

10/27 Marylanders expect to vote on tuition breaks for undocumented students in next year's general election. But continuing challenges to the petition that put the law on referendum could change that.

10/30 Jurors will soon deliberate the fate of a Maryland state senator accused of taking bribes.

10/31 Short sales keep the homeowner from a foreclosure and saves the bank the costs incurred in foreclosing. But buyers, sellers and brokers think this the process is unnecessarily slow.

11/1 A civil rights champion speaks out in support of same sex marriage in Maryland. The former chairman of the NAACP is impacting the marriage equality debate.

11/4 More fallout about unpaid bills owed by Baltimore Racing Development, the company that organized the Baltimore Grand Prix and the debts appear to be mounting.

11/6 Governor Martin O'Malley hits the Sunday national talks shows defending President Obama's job plan.

11/7 A massive die off of oysters in the Chesapeake is placing livelihoods on the brinks. Some watermen are already calling it quits.

11/7 Baltimore City voters go to the polls tomorrow to elect top city officials but voter turnout is expected to be light.

11/8 It's Election Day in Baltimore City. WJZ found some voters out casting their ballots this afternoon but turnout is very low.

11/9 Desperate to free him, the family of a Maryland man imprisoned in Cuba is turning up the pressure in Washington where there are fears that Alan Gross could die behind bars.

11/27 Just hours from now, a former top aide to Republican Governor Bob Ehrlich heads to trial on charges he broke the law trying to get Ehrlich re-elected using those now infamous election night robocalls.

11/29 Maryland sends the largest ever state delegation from the US to India, with a goal of bringing jobs back home.

11/29 Opening arguments today in the case against the man who ran Bob Ehrlich's campaign for governor. He's one of two men accused in last year's robocall controversy on election night.

11/30 A key witness takes the stand in the election night robocall controversy. The woman who recorded the call talks about how everything unfolded.

12/1 Former Governor Bob Ehrlich testifies in the trial of his former campaign manager who is accused in last year's election night robocalls.

12/5 Jury deliberations are underway in the trial of Paul Schurick, the former top aide to Governor Ehrlich accused of trying to suppress the vote during last year's governor's race.

12/6 Guilty on all counts. A Baltimore jury convicts Paul Schurick for conspiring to suppress the black vote in the 201 gubernatorial election.

12/6 It's moving day for an East Baltimore family whose new home was built thanks in part to some Orioles wives. Women helping women made it possible.

12/6 The new Maryland Casino is hoping to put more than 1,500 people to work. Maryland Live Casino at Arundel Mills is opening up applications today to fill certain management positions.

12/7 One day after Paul Schurick is found guilty of election fraud, many are wondering how the case will impact Maryland politics.

12/9 The debate over medical marijuana in Maryland takes a new twist. The work group assigned to determine how to administer it cannot agree on a single plan.

12/10 Across the world more than half a million people have been able to buy homes thanks to Habitat for Humanity. Now, the Baltimore affiliate has reached a milestone of its own.

Virgie Williams discusses why they selected Eddie Brown to talk to the students at the Baltimore City Community College's author's lecture series. Eddie Brown's book, Beating the Odds: Eddie Browns Investing and Life Strategies, looks at how he overcame being born to a 13 year old unwed mother and how he was influenced to become a philanthropist from an anonymous donor who funding his college education at Howard University.

December 11 - Gigi Barnett talks with Patrick Preller about the differences between credit cards and debit cards. He explains the different legal protections for each type of card and offers guidelines on how to avoid having your credit card or debit card numbers stolen. Students who participate in the program attend school more often, get better grades and when they graduate and turn 18 have a portfolio of stocks that they've purchased through the program.

October 9 - Steve Cline from The Partnership at Drugfree.org tells Kai Jackson about his organization's recent study that finds more young people are using marijuana, ecstasy and alcohol than in previous years. He discusses how his organization has resources available for parents in how to talk with their children about underage drinking and drug use include a hotline that can help those who do not have access to his website.

October 16 - October is domestic violence prevention month and representatives from Family and Children's Services discuss how this issue cuts across all boundaries including racial, geographic, sexual, and economic status. In the two years that the program has begun none of the young men enrolled in their program have been back in jail. All are pursuing their education.

November 6 - Casey Baynes, the founder of the Casey Cares Foundation, explains to Kai Jackson how her foundation helps families with a child with terminal illness find happiness in the little things like fun pajamas for kids, special birthday parties and movies. Many children undergoing chemotherapy cannot go

to public locations because of their compromised immune systems so Casey Cares brings the events to them.

December 11 - Twenty-five years on the Baltimore City Police force has given retired cop and author Dick Ellwood many stories to document in his new book, *Cop Stories: The Few, The Proud, The Ugly*.
