Second Quarter April 1 – June 30, 2014

Station WJZ-TV, licensed to CBS Television Licenses LLC, is responsive to the principal issues in its community of license, Baltimore, Maryland on a continuing basis. A variety of program elements, including regularly scheduled news and public affairs programming, reports on breaking news events, documentaries, specials, and public service announcements of concern to the community are included within our regular programming service. WJZ-TV's coverage of news stories, our employees' participation in community affairs, and regular interviews with community leaders have led to the determination that the issues listed are ones of importance to the Baltimore community. Our most significant programming, which dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, are set forth in this report. WJZ-TV broadcasts both locally-produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, WJZ-TV also broadcasts several network broadcasts including FACE THE NATION, 60 MINUTES, CBS REPORTS and 48 HOURS.

HEALTH

- 4/1/14 President Obama confirms more than 7 million Americans signed up for health care coverage by yesterday's deadline. The last minute rush was filled with glitches.
- 4/1/14 Scientists release a comprehensive look at the past 50 years worth of mammogram research. The study suggests we overestimate the benefits of screening but underestimate the harms of it. Researchers at Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital estimate mammograms reduce death by about 19 percent. But, they also say mammograms can lead to an over diagnosis and over treatment.
- 4/2/14 Settlements have been reached in two class-action lawsuits over unnecessary artery stents placed in patients at St. Joseph Medical Center. Former cardiologist Mark Midei performed many of the stent operations.
- 4/3/14 Maryland's health secretary admits the state made a mistake when purchasing the software for the troubled health exchange website.

- 4/6/14 All it takes is a simple swab of the cheek and you could potentially save a live! A bone marrow registry drive is held today at the University of Baltimore School of Law.
- 4/8/14 April is autism awareness month. The city is joining the international campaign 'light it up blue' to help shine a spotlight on autism. Autism affects as many as 1 in 68 children in the U.S.
- 4/11/14 According to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America this year's spring is going to be especially rough. Experts say a mix of snowfall from a colder-than-usual winter followed by warmer temperatures may increase moisture and mold counts. Tips to reduce seasonal allergies include staying indoors on dry windy days and avoiding chores like lawn mowing, weed pulling and gardening.
- 4/16/14 Calls for help are changing. First responders are adapting to fewer fires and more medical emergencies. According to the National Fire Protection Association, since 1980 the number of medical calls has increased by nearly 300% in the US.
- 4/16/14 Legalized assisted suicide is a controversial topic with passionate arguments on both sides. Now, Maryland could again be at the forefront of the debate. A candidate for governor now proposes decriminalizing the practice.
- 4/22/14 The prevalence of autism is growing in the United States. It now affects one of every sixty-eight children. Ron Matz reports some of the most important research into the social disability is being done right here in Baltimore.
- 4/28/14 healthcare advocates are calling the state's affordable care sign-up a success. With the release of the latest numbers comes a campaign to encourage those who may still qualify for part of the program to sign up.
- 5/4/14 One in three American adults is at risk for kidney disease. To raise awareness, thousands of people participated in the Greater Baltimore kidney walk.
- 5/7/14 Mending broken voices is the specialty of a new treatment center opening at GBMC. Alex DeMetrick reports, its care that takes more than just medicine.
- 5/8/14 Aspartame is an artificial sweetener found in a variety of soft drinks but some people have adverse effects to the sweetener such as headaches, insomnia, high blood pressure and heart arrhythmia. Diet soft drinks may cause you to gain weight especially the dangerous kind around the belly.
- 5/13/14 Pat Warren reports, President Clinton opened a Johns Hopkins University town hall meeting on prescription drug abuse with a disturbing story.
- 5/16/14 A warning from the health department tonight after two cases of legionnaires disease are confirmed at a local senior community.
- 5/19/14 Another health warning tonight--as an especially bad allergy season hits Maryland hard. Doctors are seeing a spike in cases and it may be a result of that polar vortex we dealt with this winter.
- 5/21/14 After her daughter lost her battle with cancer, a Baltimore County woman is channeling her sadness into a new business. Jessica Kartalija has the story of how she's keeping her daughters memory alive with jewelry for a good cause.
- 5/27/14 Research in the journal "Obesity" finds diet beverages "can" help you lose weight. In a 12-week clinical trial, one group was asked to drink at least 24-ounces of diet drinks per day. The other group drank water, but added products containing sugar substitutes to their diet... like yogurt, gum or candy. The group who drank diet soda lost about 4-pounds more.

- 6/2/14 -A key ingredient in global warming is now a key target for the Obama administration. WJZ reports, the EPA is ordering states to clean-up their power plants to reduce carbon dioxide pollution.
- 6/5/14 Taking them out before they bite. That's what's going on right now in Maryland marshes, as the state wages war on mosquitoes. WJZ reports, the first strike is all about air power.
- 6/9/14 The Department of Veterans Affairs finds thousands of vets waited months just to get an appointment to see a doctor, including vets right here in Maryland. The widespread problem also includes a widespread cover-up. WJZ is live with more on the report out today.
- 6/11/14 The day a baby is delivered is one the parents will remember forever, but for some, the day turns even more stressful because their newborn has to be rushed to Neo-natal Intensive Care. WJZ shows us how some N-I-C-U parents are giving back.
- 6/11It's been almost five months since the Columbia Mall shooting that resulted in the death of two people and the gunman. Howard County officials are now taking an initiative to combat the growing threat of mental illness. WJZ explains how a new task force plans to provide better mental health needs.
- 6/14/14 Playing hard on the field can lead to concussions for some young players. As WJZ explains, this weekend, the Ravens are making sure they understand the dangers.
- 6/14/14 Today in the city, dozens of men take steps toward a healthier lifestyle. Free screenings for prostate cancer were available at the Omega Center on Presbury Street. It's part of the "Zero Prostate Cancer Challenge".
- 6/16/14 A state of the art machine that will help patients' battle cancer comes to the University of Maryland School of Medicine today. The proton machine weighs 55 tons—it's called a cyclotron and is used in proton beam therapy, a form of radiation treatment.
- 6/18/14 One in two men and one in three women will be diagnosed with cancer in their lifetime. That startling statistic is the motivation behind an upcoming event in the Baltimore-DC area. WJZ has more on a bike ride to conquer cancer and how it can make an epic impact.
- 6/25/14 Maryland is dealing with its first heat-related death this season. According to the state department of health and mental hygiene, both people who died were adults over the age of 65.
- 6/26/14 A groundbreaking move in breast cancer detection. That's how doctors are describing a new 3-D digital mammogram test. WJZ was at Northwest Hospital in Randallstown today—it's one of the first facilities in the nation to get one.
- 6/26/14 Maryland's beaches score very high for clean water. WJZ reports, an annual survey finds the water isn't just fine for swimming, it's safe.
- 6/28/14 One national youth football program is going back to the basics when it comes to young players avoiding concussions. WJZ explains it starts with educating the coaches who teach the techniques.
- 6/29/14 A government campaign designed to help smokers quit their deadly habit is back. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are rolling out new ads to show what it's like to live every day with a disability caused by smoking. Some of the ads—are tough to watch. WJZ reports the new ads are designed to scare and disgust smokers.

4/6/14 - Gigi Barnett talks with Dr. Rebecca Landa about the newly release report from the CDC on autism – that it affects 1 in 68 children and is 5 times more prevalent in males than females. Dr. Landa discusses what parents should look for if they suspect their child may be on the autism spectrum. She stresses the need for early intervention and how this can lessen the effects of autism on the child.

- 4/13/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Yvette Mingo and Tia Timpson about the American Heart Association's Go Red for Women campaign. They discuss the importance of women knowing their cholesterol and blood sugar levels in addition to modifying their diets and incorporating physical activity. Tia Timpson shares her story on having a stroke at the age of 20 and the rehab she's undergone to return to normal.
- 4/20/13 Gigi Barnett talks with Dr. Steven Crawford, the associate director from the Center for Eating Disorders at Sheppard Pratt, about the different types of eating disorders, the symptoms and treatment options. He discusses how this mental illness has both genetic and environmental triggers and centers around unhealthy body image. He discusses how this disorder is being diagnosed in more and more people and is being found in younger children.
- 4/20/13 Unchecked kidney disease can lead to end stage renal disease which is treated by dialysis or a kidney transplant. Trish Rosenberry from the University of Maryland Shore Regional Health tells Gigi Barnett about the rigors of dialysis and steps leading up to a transplant. Lee Adams discusses how she became a kidney donor for her brother-in-law who couldn't wait the normal 5-7 years for a kidney. Both are participating in the Rappel for Kidney Health as a means to raise funds for the National Kidney Foundation of Maryland.
- 4/27/13 Gigi Barnett talks with Tray Chaney and Gwen Anderson about the PG Health Department's KISS (Keeping it Sexually Safe) Campaign and how they target 15-24 year olds with this message. Ms. Anderson explains some of the myths that young people still believe. Mr. Chaney has used his fame from the HBO Series, The Wire, to create a series of positive music videos around HIV and has a specific video for the KISS Campaign on safe sex.
- 5/4/14 Jon Sevel and Michael Greenebaum tell Gigi Barnett how these two long-term friends who had a love for running turned their passion into a major fundraiser for the University of Maryland Greenebaum Cancer Center. They explain how the Maryland Half Marathon benefits the center named in honor of Michael's parents. His mother is a 24 year breast cancer survivor who was treated at the NCI designated center.
- 5/11/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Joe DeMattos about changes to health care and how it affects patients and providers. He discusses how patients will be monitored more closely through new electronic records that can be accessed by different health care providers and how many will be referred to rehab facilities instead of remaining in the hospital for follow up care.
- 5/18/14 The University of Maryland has opened a new Center for Diabetes at their new midtown campus, formerly Maryland General Hospital. Director Dr. Kristi Silver and Angela Ginn-Meadow explain the benefits of the expanded center with many specialists from nutritionists and podiatrists now part of the integrated care.
- 5/25/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Dr. Emmanuelle Williams and Katie Ramirez about IBD Crohn's and Colitis and the differences between the two. They explain what the symptoms of the disease are and the portion of the GI tract that's affected by each disease. They discuss how surgery isn't the best option for Crohn's and that Colitis can be managed by drug therapies.
- 6/1/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Laurie Syphard and Samantha Dowd about postpartum depression and perinatal anxiety and mood disorders which affect 1-7 pregnant and new moms. They describe their symptoms and how difficult it was to get a proper diagnosis for their conditions. They stressed the need for both the medical community and new birth families to learn about the illnesses which can be treated through medication and professional therapy. Their Climb out of the Darkness event is designed to generate publicity for the illness and create a local support group for women with this condition.
- 6/1/14 The American Cancer Society's Relay for Life was started by one doctor in 1985 that walked and ran around a track for 24 hours as a means to raise money for cancer programs. Now Relay for Life events are held in every community lead by volunteers who stage a 24 hour track relay event beginning at 6pm with a survivors lap, then a caregivers lap as well as an illuminated walk with candles of hope. Sheila Staub and Jim Higbee tell Gigi Barnet how cancer affected their lives and why they are involved with Relay for Life.
- 6/1/14 The 3^{rd} Annual Shootout for Soldiers involves a 24 hour lacrosse marathon featuring multiple ages that raises funds for disabled military veterans. Tyler Steinhardt, one of the founders and SFC Brandon Sullivan from

the U.S. Army explain how this lacrosse event exposes the general public to the plight of returning injured veterans and benefits organizations that help with their recovery.

6/29/14 - Gigi Barnett talks with plastic surgeon Dr. Nia Banks about skin care. She discusses how that the skin needs to be treated differently depending on the season by using different moisturizers. For people with problem skin, over the counter products do not contain enough of the healing ingredients that professionally prescribed skin care products offer.

- 6/18/14 She's among the best in the world when it comes to her fashion sense—that's according to Vanity Fair magazine who credits Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake about being in the know—when it comes to looking good.
- 6/20/14 Those who have the gift of music spend years preparing to be a professional musician, but for everyone who makes it—there are untold others who wish they had. WJZ reports on the expansion of a program at the B.S.O. to get amateurs on stage.
- 6/21/14 A celebration of life, music and culture today at the African American Festival. The event is being held downtown at the Camden Yards sports complex and offers something for everyone—including entertainment, cultural exhibits and health screenings.
- 6/22/14 Nearly 200 years of history are being celebrated at one Baltimore city church. The congregation was founded back in 1824 by free African Americans. WJZ reports, members say they are now focused on the future of Saint James Episcopal Church.

Board members Pamela Colbert and Jenette Young explain how the choir program benefits children like both of their sons and strengthen the student's academic performance as well.
- 5/25/14 Local author Dr. Brenda Savoy tells Gigi Barnett that her current book, The Wages of Sin, about a correctional officer that falls for a prison inmate was written before the current expose involving real life correctional officers at the Baltimore facility. She explains that as an adjunct professor she taught courses at the prison and used this knowledge as the basis for her book.
- 6/8/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Tom Noonan and Vince Vaise about the Star Spangled Summer which features many events at different city venues promoting the 200th anniversary of the writing of the National Anthem. They discuss how this on-going campaign will bring in tourists and revenue. Creating awareness about Baltimore's important role in the War of 1812 is part of the marketing campaign that concludes in September with the actual anniversary of the bombing of Ft. McHenry.
- 6/8/14 Amanda Davis tells Gigi Barnett about Mary Pickersgill who was given the honor of sewing the flag that flew over Ft. McHenry during the British invasion in 1814. She describes the life of the nation's most famous seamstress and the assistance she received from Grace Wisher, an African American indentured servant. She discusses the upcoming Flag Day event honoring veterans. All veterans are encouraged to attend and bring the flag they took into combat.
- 6/15/14 Gigi Barnett talks with Shelonda Stokes at the African American Festival, the largest of its kind on the East Coast. In addition to top entertainment featuring Brandy, Monifa, Chico DeBarge, Deitrick Haddon and many others, the festival features a comprehensive wellness tent for health screenings and seminars.
- 6/15/14 Tray Chaney, famous for his portrayal of Poot on the hit HBO Series, The Wire, tells Gigi Barnett about his new video entitled Dedicated Father that debuts on MTV Jams on Father's Day. He discusses how this is the latest in a series of motivational hip hop videos that encourages men to step up and do the right thing. He reflects how both his father and grandfather were instrumental in guiding his development and now how he is doing the same thing for his daughter and son.
- 6/22/14 Gigi Barnett talks with nutritional counselor Dr. Surina Ann Jordan about her new book, "The Seven Disciplines of Wellness, the Spiritual Connection to Good Health."
- Dr. Jordan discusses how just dieting doesn't work in the long run and a commitment to wellness goes beyond what you eat.
- 6/22/14 Dr. Carla Hayden tells Gigi Barnett about the summer reading program that the Enoch Pratt Free Library is offering to children, teens and adults that rewards them with prizes based on the number of books and educational programs they participate in over an 8-week period. By reducing the summer slide, students will be academically ready for school in August.

CONSUMER: HOUSING

- **4/11/14** These new images give us a better idea of what the 43-story apartment tower will look at the site of the old McCormick factory. The ground floor will house retail stores, and the rest luxury apartments. The developer met with a review panel today and wants to break ground by the end of this year.
- 4/14/14 Baltimore's mayor has a goal to attract thousands of new families to the city. She made this vow back in 2011 but where would those new residents live? The city's vacant buildings may be the answer.
- 4/15/14 A Baltimore City attorney is cracking down on what he calls slumlords plaguing the city. The attorney says some people are living in unacceptable, unhealthy and unsafe neighborhoods because of landlords taking advantage of people living in government housing.
- 5/7/14 The Ravens team-up with Habitat for Humanity and end up changing the lives of several local families. On Ward Street in Pigtown -- Ravens Brandon Williams and Justin Tucker were there as three families were given brand new homes!
- 6/3/14 People evacuated after a slow-moving landslide started last month in Prince George's County are now returning to their homes. WJZ reports, that's despite warnings the area is still dangerous. Prince George's County is currently studying three possible fixes for the slide area. Completing the work will take months.
- 6/5/14 Residents of Charles Village are finally able to get back into their homes today. It's been a month and a half since a street collapse on 26th Street led to an evacuation of all the homes there.
- 6/13/14 The taxpayers' bill is growing for repairs to the collapsed portion of 26th Street in Baltimore and no word yet from CSX whether they plan to pay anything. WJZ is live at the reconstruction site in Charles Village with the latest figures.
- 6/20/14 Dream home on the market. It looks like a Hawaiian resort, but a 17,000 square foot mansion in Howard County is up for grabs. WJZ explains, it will go to the highest bidder this weekend.

- 4/13/14 The IConnect intergenerational expo is designed to bring all generations from the young to the old together for a day of fun at Stadium Place. GEDCO representatives Nichole Battle and Ted Gross explain to Gigi Barnett, that the activities range from the Y's Healthy Kids, free health screenings, physical activity classes like zumba and an intergenerational softball game. GEDCO which designed the multi-generational Stadium Place also operates a long-term care facility for seniors. They stressed how technology can help like home-bound seniors maintain contact with other family members and friends through programs like skype and facebook.
- 5/11/14 The Maryland Center for Veterans Education and Training provides housing, a drop in activity center and mental health counseling for homeless veterans. Organizers explain how their shelter has now expanded to offer services to women, who are now a significant part of the homeless veteran population.
- 5/18/14 Consider the Person, hopes to change how people think about the housing voucher program formerly known as Section 8 housing. Odette Ramos and Kathleen Koch tell Gigi Barnett about the program that provides housing assistance to low income Marylanders. Vouchers can be used in any Maryland county however there are a low number of landlords willing to accept renters with these vouchers. They explain the benefit to the landlord as well as to the neighborhood.
- 6/29/14 Tom Herron from the National Fenestration Rating Council explains to Gigi Barnett that his nonprofit organization rates the efficiency of windows, doors and skylights based energy efficiency. He explains the different criteria that can be used by consumers to purchase energy efficient materials.

CONSUMER: JOBS

- 4/7/14 President Obama comes to Maryland to push what he calls "jobs of the future." He spoke before high school students in Prince George's County. The president announced more than one hundred million dollars in grants for two dozen schools across the country that are helping students gain work experience in healthcare, technology and other high demand jobs.
- 4/10/14 The port's public marine terminals handled more automobiles, containers and wood pulp than ever before. Baltimore is also at the top in the US for farm and construction machinery, sugar, aluminum and imported forest products. Business at the port directly accounts for more than 14,000 jobs.
- 5/4/14 Nearly 2,000 jobs are coming to Baltimore this year courtesy of the Horseshoe Casino. Today, applicants stood in a long line for a chance at a new future in the gaming industry.
- 6/16/14 The president of a national company came to Baltimore today for a big announcement. Zip car is expanding in the city—and they say that only means good things for city residents.
- 6/19/14 -In the decades around 1900, Baltimore clothing manufacturers employed more workers than any other industry. Those jobs are long gone, most going overseas, but as WJZ reports, one survivor is still going strong.
- 6/24/14 No more poverty pay—the fight for higher wages continues at Johns Hopkins Hospital where caregivers say they can barely afford their homes or put food on the table. Now, they are giving the hospital one more chance before they strike again. WJZ is live with details of the demands.

- 4/5/14 Today the Maryland Senate voted to increase the state's minimum wage from \$7.25 an hour to \$10.10 an hour by 2018. The bill now heads to the House of Delegates, where it's expected to pass before the governor signs it.
- 4/5/14 -Nearly two thousand jobs are up for grabs at the soon to be Horseshoe Casino" in downtown Baltimore.
- 4/6/14 Maryland casinos have a record-breaking March, bringing in 78-million dollars in revenue.
- 4/6/14 Starting in January 2015 there will be incremental increases to the minimum wage. Eventually bringing it from \$7.25 cents an hour until \$10.10 cents an hour in 2018.
- 4/17/14 The State Comptroller's Office is opening a treasure chest and inviting Marylanders to dig in. Hundreds of millions of dollars in unclaimed funds are just waiting for owners to find them.
- 4/18/14 –It's been four years since the BP oil explosion. Since then the company has paid out billions of dollars in compensation. Attorney General Doug Gansler is now suing BP over money that the state retirement and pension system lost on investments, following the spill. BP has not yet commented.
- 4/23/14 The city will replace hundreds of old and worn out vehicles with newer equipment. Over a 10-year period the city will replace more than 1200 vehicles including fire police cars and fire engines. The initiative will save taxpayers an estimated 130-million dollars. The new fleet will save the department in fuel and maintenance costs.
- 5/5/14 Maryland's baby boomers might want to listen up. It turns out our state doesn't rank so high on the list of places to live out your retirement golden years. Derek Valcourt explains why Maryland is listed among the worst states for retirees.
- 5/12/14 It's a chance for fans of locally made beer to celebrate the nearly 25-hundred craft breweries all over the nation and right here in Maryland. The brewers association thinks that amounted to a retail value of more than 14-million dollars.

- 6/3/14 Baltimore's Water Taxi service is staying afloat. The Charm City Circulator Harbor Connector is awarded a federal grant to continue the all-electric operations. The Harbor Connector is free for residents, commuters and visitors to Baltimore.
- 6/8/14 Maryland has been called "America in miniature" because of the state's history and natural features. WJZ breaks down new numbers showing how more tourists are choosing Maryland for their vacation destinations.
- 6/21/14 A multi-million dollar plan to revitalize downtown Towson is well underway. A new movie theater, shops and restaurants promise to attract thousands of visitors, but will they be safe? WJZ reports, the county is taking extra steps to make sure crime doesn't come with the construction.

- 6/29/14 Expect to pay more at the pump. Conflicts in Iraq have substantially caused gas to go up and while gas prices were predicted to fall this month, right now those prices are at a six-year high for early summer.
- 6/30/14 -Round two in the state gas tax hike. Starting tomorrow, the second phase of the gas tax goes into effect. WJZ has more on what we're all going to be paying starting tomorrow.

- 5/6/14 Visitors in a Cuban jail. American government contractor Alan Gross is seen by several US congressman. The lawmakers are hoping to start negotiations to get Gross released. The Maryland native is serving a 15-year sentence accused of spying.
- 5/7/14 Tonight, for the first time the democratic candidates for Maryland governor take part in a televised debate.

- 5/15/14 John Leopold's crass behavior cost him his job as Anne Arundel County Executive, and now it's costing the county another hundred thousand dollars. Alex DeMetrick reports the payout stems from a fired employee's lawsuit.
- 5/27/14 Maryland's democratic race for governor continues to be the biggest attention-getter in the Maryland primary. Pat Warren reports, even the big draw is falling short in voter interest.
- 6/4/14 Curbing violent crime continues to be a priority in the city. Baltimore saw an eight-percent increase in the murder rate last year and there have been six homicides in the first four days of June. WJZ Political Reporter has more on how these numbers play in the primary race for Baltimore City State's Attorney.

- 4/14/14 This is an important night for Baltimore's Jewish community and Jews around the world. it's the beginning of the weeklong celebration of Passover.
- 4/25/14 This weekend, Marylanders and tourists alike are being invited to climb aboard the pride of Baltimore two! The iconic ship is currently docked in fells point and will be open for guided deck tours.
- 4/27/24 A commemoration program was held in Pikesville. It honored holocaust survivors and their families and also paid tribute to survivors the community has lost over the past year.
- 5/2/14 Honoring Maryland's fallen first responders. Police and fire department around the state remembered officers and firefighters killed in the line of duty in the last year.

- 6/1/14 Dick Gelfman's 14th annual Ride Across Maryland wraps up and tonight the preliminary numbers are in. This year, the ride raised more than \$118,000 for the fight against breast cancer.
- 6/3/14 Dozens of officers and local runners gathered for the annual Maryland police torch run. City Police Commissioner Anthony Batts kicked off the run. The run around Lake Montebello is a charitable event that supports the Special Olympics of Maryland.

They were honored at the 18th annual Carson Scholars Fund awards ceremony, held at Martin's West. The Carson Scholars fund was founded by world-renowned pediatric neurosurgeon, Dr. Ben Carson and his wife.
- 4/6/14 There are more than 900 college debate teams in the world good enough to compete in tournaments. Some of the best universities have teams. That makes it even better for two young women from Baltimore City.
- 4/13/14 It's well known to classroom teachers that kids learn more when they have a full stomach. A national non-profit is helping an Anne Arundel county school make sure more kids get breakfast.
