In anticipation of Stroke Awareness month, Dr. Clint Wood with Sparks Regional Medical Center spoke with Karen Pharis at 7:40am on Wednesday, April 6th regarding strokes. He discussed the possible causes, (genetics, lifestyle), preventions, (diet, exercise, quit smoking) and treatments. Statistics show that the Fort Smith area is one of the top cities with the highest incidence of strokes. Sparks will be sponsoring their third annual Heart Expo from 9am-2pm at the Fort Smith Convention Center. In addition to free screenings for the first 200 attendees, tours will be offered in the MEGA Heart inflatable exhibit. It's the world's only portable, inflatable walk-through heart exhibit. Dr. Wood also emphasized the need for individuals to have a primary care physician that can become familiar with a patient and their health to catch potential problems before they soar out of control.

Tuesday, April 12th at 7:40am Alice Alt with the U.S. Marshal Museum discussed progress on the museum. The board is meeting with architects to finalize plans for the facility on the Arkansas River. CDI Contractors of Little Rock has been selected as construction consultant for the 50,000 square-foot facility. On Sunday June 19 and Monday, June 20, there will be three walks beginning at 11am, 2pm and led by Center Manager Dennis Petersen.
