The Covid 19 Pandemic continued to be the major thrust of our public service programming, with just about all of the "Issues" our listeners were facing related in some way with the spread of the illness and its effect on everyone in one way or another. We ran hundreds of announcements monthly supplied by CDC, the Arkansas Governor's Office and information from Gov. Kevin Stitt of Oklahoma. Our weekday 7a-9a-morning show, Arklahoma Today and much of this included direct segments from the daily press briefing by the governor as well as comments from local police officials, medical experts and the mayor of Fort Smith: George McGill. We also received a weekday, ten headline report on the major stories in Arklahoma which announcers used on 60-second breaks near the top of the hour from 6am to noon.

Here are some of the Coronavirus Series announcements we rotated in the quarter: "Check on Neighbors", Do Unto others: Distance", "Four Reminders," "Social Distancing," Salute Healthcare Workers," "Keep Your Head: Quarantine," "Be Kind to Healthcare Workers."

Then there came the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis and Fort Smith Police Chief Danny Baker provided an emotional Facebook message saying that he and other local police were appalled at what happened and said his officers were accountable to ALL citizens here. He said the community outreach program that has been underway for some time here will continue. There are still issues to be resolved here in Arklahoma (a statue that may be taken down, racism and equal opportunity) and these topics are being included with Gov. Hutchinson, Sen. John Boozman, Congressman Steve Womack and attorney-general Leslie Rutledge.

Phone interviews were conducted with the Mayor of Fort Smith, George McGill each week.

She told of a new location for the School and plans to modify classes due to Covid 19,

7-15am to 7:20am--It was announced on the program that "Arkansas Public School Students will finish the rest of the school year at home." State Education Secretary Johnny Key said schools will remain closed through the end of the school year with schoolwork to be completed under the state's alternative methods of instruction.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 8, 7:40am to 7:55am—Third District Congressman Steve Womack did a phone interview about how citizens can better protect themselves from the virus and what they can do apply for unemployment and businesses to apply for SBA and PPP loans.

7:15a-7:22a- Jesica Beaty interviews Jen's Kitty Rehab officials about the "Almost Home Dog Shelter in Arklahoma. Jeremy Nash from the Fort Smith Retro Market was the guest, who talked about an Easter Egg giveaway with a bunny for the Kitty Rehab and Dog Shelter.

On our newscast, we announced that "Fort Smith-based Arkbest is cutting pay, implementing a hiring freeze and taking other "cash preservation" measures. Arkbest employs about 1,600 people in the Fort Smith area.

THURSDAY, APRIL 9, 7:35A-7:45A—Eddie Lee Herndon of the United Way was interviewed on Arklahoma today by the hosts concerning the Corona Crisis Committee, which provides help to the victims and the first responders in the medical field in our area.

7:15a-7:21---Bill Pitts of the UFO organization in the area, talked about the night in 1967 when UFO's were sighted over Fort Smith. Though they were sighted near the Fort Smith Airport, no explanation was ever given as to what they were.

Prison's in Arkansas are getting hit hard by the virus and we had comments on this from Arkansas Health director, Dr. Nate Smith.

Officers of the Arkansas Highway Police Division of the Arkansas Department of Transportation (ARDOT) announced on today's program that they are distributing 100,000 masks to commercial truck drivers at weigh stations and rest areas across the state.
