

KHGG-AM Issues 1Q 2020

KHGG-AM 1230 airs a one hour daily news information program 7a-8am Monday through Friday called "Arklahoma Today" and features news reports from across the River Valley, Traffic updates, weather information, sports, and interviews with non-profit organizations as well as newsmakers in the region. This report chronicles guests appearing on the show.

Monday, January 6 – Phillip Merry with Christmas Honors visited with Bill Pharis from 7:40am until 7:50am regarding cleanup at the National Cemeter of the 19-thousasnd Christmas wreaths that have been resting on each of the cemetery's headstones. The wreaths will be removed, deconstructed, and placed in air-tight containers and stored. Merry put out the call for volunteers with trucks and trailers. Flu update: eight people have died in Oklahoma, 13 in Arkansas since September. Arkansas' department of finance says the state's revenue is above forecast for the current fiscal year thanks to higher than expected sales and corporate income tax collections in December.

Tuesday, January 7 - Bill Pharis led a discussion on how the Arkansas Highway Commission is soliciting input from residents on plans for multi-million dollar projects over the next few years. It's part of the highway improvement plan funded by a contribution of the temporary half=cent sales tax passed last year. A total of 12 meetings have been scheduled. Kitties and Canines paid a visit in studio from 7:30am-7:35. Rosilee Walker Russell with the Community School of the Arts talks with Karen Pharis from 7:40am-7:50am about the new Suzuki violin program for toddlers and other plans at the school for 2020.

Wednesday, January 8 – Chad Lowe and Danielle Simmons from the Janet Huckabee nature Center visit with Bill Pharis from 7:05 until 7:20am about events at the Center for January. Fifteen people have died from the Flu in Arkansas with 72-hundred positive flu tests in the state. Listeners encouraged to wash hands! Caroline Spier from the Fort Smith Museum of History talks with Karen Pharis about an upcoming murder-mystery dinner at the museum from 7:40a-7:46am, then Maggie Jones joined in the conversation by phone on how the "story" was developed for the event from 7:47-7:50am.

Thursday, January 9 – Arkansas Children’s Hospital says it is flooded with RSV cases and predict a record season for the virus. The respiratory virus is like a common cold in adults and older children but is highly contagious and and become serious in babies. Congressman Steve Womack joins Bill Pharis by phone at 7:40am and they discuss impeachment, Irans strike, service academy nominations, and appreciation for the families and men and women of the 82nd Airborn.

Friday, January 10 – Leslie Higgins with the U.S. Marshal’s Museum is the education director. In a recorded interview with Karen Pharis at 7:40am, they discussed the upcoming lecture series on civil discourse. The museum is also working on expanding their services and friendship base not only in northwest and central Arkansas, but across the country.

Monday, January 13 – Governor Hutchinson has declared a state of emergency following this weekend’s sever weather outbreak. Logan County additionally reported an EF-2 tornado near Prairie View, damaging 14 homes. Claude Legris with the Fort smith Visitor and Convention Bureau discussed convention sales were up in 2019 and he would have a full report later in the week. Visited from 7:35am-7:45am.

Tuesday, January 14 – Clean up continues and will for days to come in several locations in or listening areas in Logan and Franklin counties after two separate tornadoes hit over the weekend. Third District Congressman Steve Womack visited with Bill Pharis from 7:40am-7:50am praising Arkansas’ governor and telling listeners in those counties he is working on additional aid for them.

Wednesday, January 15 – The Arkansas health department confirms eight more flu deaths this season, including the first pediatric heath in the state.It brings the total number of deaths in the state from the flu to 23. January is national volunteer blood donor month and Bill encouraged listeners to stop by the Blood Center on South U Street in Fort Smith to donate. Claude Legris with the visitor and convention bureau reported on 2019 figures and the fact that tourism was up.

Thursday, January 16 – Jesica Beaty and Jesse Fenwick, chairman of the animal Services Advisory Board and vice president of Jen’s Kitty Rehab discussed upcoming fundraising events for the center from 7:15am-7:23am. Janet Dyer

with the Center for Legal Services explained how their organization works to Karen Pharis from 7:30am-7:35am. They are a United Way Agency. Throwback Thursday special: Giving the deed to Judge Parker's courthouse and the land surrounding it to President John Kennedy 7:50am-7:55am.

Friday, January 17 – While clean up continues in the Scranton area from last weekend's tornadoes, area residents have organized a fund raiser to help those who were hit. Benefit dinner and auction will be held Feb. 8 and St. Ignatius Church hall in Scranton starting at 4:30. Discussion of Dr. Martin Luther King and his speech before the southern Christian leadership conference and March in Washington. Invitation to listeners to attend the MLK Parade in Fort Smith Monday the 20th at 10am. The Fort Smith Radio Group will be in the parade. Murder -mystery dinner recap with Caroline Spier and Maggie Jones. 7:40-7:50am.

Monday January 20 – Land that was supposed to be used for a sports complex at Chaffee Crossing is going up for sale again. Fort Smith city directors rejected a 211-thousand dollar offer from one entities and will consider placing the parcel on the bid block again. Dr. Martin Luther King's speech is aired 7:35a-7:50am. Fort Smith's MLK parade promoted at 10am.

Tuesday, January 21 – Karen Pharis talks with Ruth Wisher about National School choice week which is next week. Parents are able to select from school choices in their neighborhood, city, or virtual options to best fit the learning needs of their children at no cost when there are available seats in requested places. 7:35am-7:48am

Wednesday, January 22 – Karen Pharis interviews Chris Hedrick from Bost, Inc. regarding the Grape Escapes Fundraiser for those with developmental disabilities 7:40am-7:50am.

Thursday, January 23 – The flu season in Arkansas is getting worse. The health department confirms for more flu deaths this season, bringing the total number of deaths in the state from the flu to 27. Carole Smith with Methodist Living Center talks with Karen Pharis about the candy stripe program at their facility and how it helps residents, but also gives junior and senior high students an opportunity to see if a career in health care is for them. 7:40am-7:50am.

Friday, January 24 – The number of flue deaths in Oklahoma is growing. The state health department says 21 people have now died from the flu since September and about a thousand have been hospitalized...139 this week alone. 27 have died in Arkansas. Tammie Kuhns with the Community Services Clearinghouse talks about the “Empty bowls” dinner sponsored by the Van Buren Art Department. Many of their students have benefitted from the “backpack for kids” weekend meal program and want to give back with funds raised from this event 7:40a-7:50am.

Monday, January 27 – The Van Buren school district announced City Heights elementary will close at the end of the year with teaching staff being moved to Parkview Elementary. The City Heights building will be repurposed and serve as the district’s preschool and administration offices. Claude Legris with the Fort Smith visitor and convention bureau reviews events at the convention center for the next two weeks. 7:35a-7:50am.

Tuesday, January 28 - Students in the Johnson County Westside school district have the rest of the week off. The district cancelled classes and all activities citing the high number of flu cases for students and staff. They will spend the rest of the week cleaning and disinfecting while everyone recovers. Karen Pharis interviews Jefferson Bus Lines about leaving downtown Fort Smith for the south side of Fort Smith, and now 12th and Main in Van Buren. The line is remodeling a drive through bank in the industrial park in Van Buren to serve as their new permanent location which will be open by late Spring or early Summer 2020 7L35am-7:45am.

Wednesday, January 29 The Corona-Virus is getting closer to home. Two people in Oklahoma are being tested for the deadly virus. The Oklahoma state health department won’t say where those patients are located, but say the risk to the general public is low. Stacey Jones with UAFS talks with Bill Pharis about the Season of Entertainment and the upcoming: “Finding Neverland” which is the story of how “Peter Pan” was created. 7:35am-7:45am.

Thursday, January 30 – Six more Arkansans have died due to flu-related illnexas this week. The state health department says it brings the death toll to 33 this flu season in Arkansas; one was a child. Since September 29th, more than 13-thousand positive flu tests have been reported to the A-D-H; with more thab

19-hundred positive tests just this week. Meanwhile, Arkansas may have its first case of suspected coronavirus. The State Health Department says it is investigating whether this person has the virus. It's not clear where the possibly infected person is located, or if they have recently traveled to China—the epicenter of the outbreak. Claude Legris with the Fort Smith visitor and convention bureau reports that a regional volleyball tournament will be “taking over Fort Smith” this weekend and encourages residents to be welcoming. 7:35am-7:38am. Karen Pharis interviews Stephanie Stipens with the Greater Fort Smith Association of Home Builders about their annual Home Show coming up in mid-February 7:40am-7:50am.

Friday, Jan 31 – Arkansas’ Surgeon General and church groups have launched a campaign against recreational marijuana proposals that supporters are trying to get on this November’s ballot. The campaign is focused on trying to urge people to not sign petitions circulating around the state for the two competing legalization proposals. Eddie Lee Herndon with the Greater Fort Smith Area United Way visits with Bill Pharis about “Rising in the River Valley” to be held on Valentine’s Day on the UAFS campus green. The event is to create awareness of domestic violence and sexual assault. 7:40am-7:45am.

Monday, Feb 3 – Some good news from the Arkansas health Department...the Arkansas person under investigation of novel corona virus tested “negative”. The person tested had spent time in China and began feeling symptoms associated with the virus once they returned to the United States. That person under investigation remained in isolation through testing. Caroline Spier with the Fort Smith Museum of History talks about the upcoming Pardi Gras with Karen Pharis from 7:40am-7:50am.

Tuesday, Feb 4 – The latest health data show right now, Arkansas is the “sickest” state in the country. Right now, eleven percent of the population is experiencing flu-like symptoms. The national rate is ten-percent. 33-people have died in Arkansas from the flu since September. Karen Pharis interviewed student doctor Rachel Samuel from the Arkansas college of Osteopathic Medicine on “Two-Step-CPR Training” at Central Mall on Saturday the 8th of February 7:35am-7:43am. Rosilee Walker Russell with the community School of the Arts visited with Karen from 7:45-7:55 about events at the school in January.

Wednesday, Feb 5 – Chad Lowe and Dannielle Simmons with the Janet Huckabee River Valley Nature Center talk about an upcoming “trapping” class at the center that will be free of charge. Lowe says although people no longer “trade” in fur, the pelts can make warm covers once a person learns how to do it 7:05am-7:20am. Karen Pharis interviews Barry Morrow with Pradco. The outdoor lure manufacturer will host a day-long educational seminar on how and where to fish for crappie at the University of Arkansas Fort Smith Feb 22. 7:40a-7:50am.

Thursday, Feb 6 – The flu season in Arkansas keeps getting worse. Three more Arkansans have died because of the flu this week. The state health department says it brings the death toll to 36 this flu season. Since September 29th, close to 17-thousand positive flu tests have been reported to the health department, with more than 600 positive tests this week alone. Bokose school in Oklahoma have the rest of the week off due to the high number of flu cases for students and staff. Karen Pharis interviews Tammie Kuhns with the Community Services Clearinghouse on the need to restock their community pantry 7”40am-7:50am.

Friday, Feb 7 – Hundreds of Oklahomans have been hospitalized with the flu within the last week. The Oklahoma Health Department says 206 patients have been hospitalized with the flu, bringing the total number of hospitalizations to 14-hundred-31 since September first. 23 people have died from the flu in Oklahoma in that time. Terry Carrie with the Greater Fort Smith United Way visited with Bill Pharis 7:35am-7:45am about the “Family Wize” free prescription discount card and app. Everyone is eligible, insured and uninsured, and no registration is required. The average savings on prescriptions is 45%. During 2019, 4,471 people in the Greater Fort Smith United Way service area were helped, with a community savings of \$353,210.

Monday, Feb 10 – The Fort Smith School District is doing what it can to stave off the spread of germs in schools. The district is using foggers and a chemical to disinfect classrooms and offices. Two teams fog ten elementary schools ne week, the remaining nine schools are fogged the next week. All staff have been asked to make sure soap and hand sanitizer dispensers are full. Claude Legris with the Fort Smith Visitor and Convention Bureau reviews upcoming events in the area for the next two weeks 7:35am-7:50am.

Tuesday, Feb 11 – Karen Pharis visits the Arkansas College of Osteopathic Medicine Student-Doctor Amanda TerDoest about the upcoming “Heart-ACHE” Valentine run and 5K walk at the Arkansas Colleges of Health Education campus on Saturday the 15th. 7:40am-7:48am The event is an effort by the school to engage the community in healthy activities.

Wednesday, Feb 12- Congressman Steve Womack joins Bill Pharis from 7:40am-7:50am talking about concerns in the third congressional district.

Thursday, Feb 13 - Ten more Arkansans have died from the flu this past week, bringing the total to 46 for this flu season. The Arkansas Department of Health says more than 20-thousand-500 positive flu tests have been reported since September, with about 24-hundred this week alone. The department still reports “widespread” flu activity across the state with “high” intensity. Cameron and Pocola Public school in Leflore county are closed until next week while their buildings are sanitized. Karen Pharis talks with Chris Hedrick, event chair for “Grape Escapes” to help Bost, Inc. 7:35am-7:43am. Stephanie Stippens with the Greater Fort Smith area Home Builders Association invites listeners to the Home Show 7:45am-7:50am.

Friday, Feb 14 – Hundreds of Oklahomans have been hospitalized with the flu over the last week. Oklahoma’s Health Department says 245 patients were admitted in the last week, bringing the total number of hospitalizations to about 17-hundred. Since September, 30 people have died from the flue in Oklahoma. Teresa Slaybach with the Alma Performing Arts Center visits with Bill Pharis about Spring concerts at the Alma PAC 7:40am-7:50am.

Monday, Feb 17 – Attorney General Leslie Rutledge visits with Karen Pharis about her “roundtable meetings” with Sebastian County leaders on Friday. She is going around the state visiting with leaders to learn about their concerns and determine if her office can help them 7:40am-7:50am.

Tuesday, Feb 18 – Arkansas Senator Tom Cotton is claiming china “continues to lie” about the extent of the coronavirus outbreak in the country. He says the country won’t allow expers from the C-D-C to “observe and assist.” Senator Cotton posted on Facebook saying: ...“we don’t know where the viurus originated because China won’t allow experts in to answer that question.” Fort Smith Police Chief Danny Baker visits with Bill Pharis on the Departments new

“Crisis Intervention and Mental Health Unit” this spring. It represents a new shift in law enforcement response to behavioral health and substance use disorder incidents. Last year, the Fort Smith Police Department responded to 561 suicide threat calls and 152 drug overdose calls 7:40am-7:55am.

Wednesday, Feb 19 – Starting today, Fort Smith residents could again experience that “terrible smell” similar to last year at this time. The city says he smell will come from the waste of natural foods called “organic residuals.” Specially-licensed companies collect the organic residuals and leave them to age in a lagoon. When the lagoon reaches capacity and the residuals have aged, the lagoon is emptied. A company is scheduled to start cleaning out a lagoon in the Kibler Bottoms this morning. Karen Pharis interviews Barry Morrow about this weekend’s Crappie University at UAFS and sponsored by PRADCO 7:40am-7:50am.

Thursday, Feb 20- Ten more Arkansans have died from the flu this past week, bringing the total to 56 for this flu season. The Arkansas Department of Health says more than 24-thousand-200 positive flu tests have been reported since September, with about 25-hundred this week alone. Fort Smith Mayor George McGill joins Bill Pharis for a discussion on the mayor’s “State of the City” address the mayor presented at UAFS last night. He talked about how the city pulled together to get thru historic flooding last Spring. He also says he believes there is more trust in city government than in years past. One major project he says he’d like to see done is rebuilding Towson Avenue 7:35am-7:50am.

Friday, Feb 21 – The flu continues to take a toll in Oklahoma. The state health department says 240 Oklahoma patients have been hospitalized in the last week alone bringing the total number of hospitalizations to 19-hundred-70 since September first. The death toll now stands at 36 in Oklahoma. Crawford County judge Dennis Gilstrap says the county is working quickly to repair a section of road in Crawford County that has been washed out. School buses can’t travel on it and homeowners say they’re patching it. Senator Tom Cotton with Brian Kilmead is asking for more transparency from China regarding the corona virus 7:35am-7:44am. Leslie Higgins with the US Marshal Museum talks about civil discourse lectures and Spring Break camps. 7:45am-7:50am.
