Political Reporter Jack Fink talked to several North Texas lawmakers to get their views on some of the big issues in front of the Texas Legislature this session. He also explained how the Texas Legislature works and the unique process of passing bills compared to other states.</p>

Jack Fink talked to three of the four men who were taken hostage and survived the ordeal. Steve Pickett looked at how prevalent bilingual education is in North Texas classrooms. Caroline Vandergriff told viewers about the impact of a special scholarship program and how those grants are helping childhood cancer survivors with their education.</p>

The remainder of the program focused on medical history made at Cook Children's Medical Center. Doctors and surgeons successfully separated conjoined twin girls. There were interviews with the parents and doctors.</p>

The CBS 11 News Team looked at the issue of paper license plates, how easy it is to illegally make them and the issues the fake plates can have regarding safety on local roads. We addressed the issue of fentanyl and recent deaths of students in the Carrollton-Farmers Branch ISD. We talked to a doctor about signs parents can look for if they suspect their child may be experimenting with fentanyl.</p>
