WOAY TV airs the following programs that fulfill FCC requirements. The enclosed list provides information about programming for the months of October, November and December.

FORUM-A locally produced talk show. This Public Affairs program addresses various topics of community concern, both current and local issues and events. It is broadcast Sunday Mornings at 10 a.m. and repeated as needed.

In addition we air three (3) hours of live, local news casts per day Monday-Friday, and one (1) hour each on Saturday and Sunday.

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# FORUM 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 2014

April 6<sup>th</sup>- Guest Kelly Elkins PR Director for Tamarack. Tamarack is the state run marketplace for West Virginia Artisans. She gave us a complete rundown of this summer's events. She talked about the regular events as well as the special events they put on.

April 13<sup>th</sup>- Guest Dee Sizemore, Public Relations for The Women's Resource Center for battered women, and Erica Stock, Co-founder of Operation Underdog, a dog adoption support group. They wanted to promote a fund raising fashion show April 25<sup>th</sup> at the John W. Eye Center. It includes a dog show, fashion show, buffet dinner and auction.

April 20<sup>th</sup>- Guest Christy Scott, Pageant Director for the Friends of Coal Auto Fair. The Pageant will be on May 4<sup>th</sup>, and will feature a new special needs division this year. They have a children's division, a Miss and Mrs. Division and also a teen division. The entry fee is \$50 and it is held at the Raleigh County Convention Center (Armory).

April 27<sup>th</sup>- Two segments on Today's show- Segment 1 was Dee Sizemore and Twina Warner of the Women's Resource Center. They talked about the "Clothes to Home Project", which is a take home collection (especially clothes) for battered women victims to take with them. Segment 2 featured Margaret Ann O'Neal, Executive Director of the United Way. She talked about Celebrity Night on May 5<sup>th</sup>, this is when local celebrities work at area restaurants as waiters and the tips go to the United Way.

May 4<sup>th</sup>- Guest Dr. Kevin Cain, Dean of Future Education at Glenville State College in Glenville, WV. He talked about the teacher shortage in West Virginia. They started offering teaching courses through the local technical college, especially New River Community and Technical College.

May 11<sup>th</sup>- Guest Jill Moorefield of the Beckley Renaissance Committee for Downtown Beckley. She talked about all of the summer events in Beckley starting with Friday's in the Park, Kid's Classic, Taste of Appalachia, Car Shows, The Appalachian Festival up through Chili Night in late October. He talked about the advantages that Glenville State has to offer, plus their WV Veteran's Legacy Project and the growth of their Hidden Promise Scholarship Program.
