WOAY-TV airs the following programs that fulfill FCC requirements. The enclosed list provides information about programming for the months of April, May and June 2013. These are in addition to 17 hours of live, locally produced newscasts.

FORUM- A weekly, locally produced talk show. This Public Affairs program addresses varied topics of area concerns and issues. It is broadcast Sunday mornings at 10 am, and repeated as available.

Money Talks- A market exclusive 3 times weekly news feature that covers areas such as budgeting, low-rate loans and credit cards, when to get best prices on lots of products.

Peoples Court- A daily one-hour syndicated show that is broadcast weekdays 4:00-5:00pm.

The Bloomberg Report- A daily stock market synopsis.

April 7, 2013- Guest-Bob Henry Baber, Glenville College Professor. Promoting the annual Ramp Festival and the National Forest Land available in Richwood, WV.

April 14, 2013-Guests-Doris Selko, Regional Co-Ordinator, and Perry Bryant, Executive Director of the West Virginians For Affordable Healthcare Act. This non-partisan group represents consumers in West Virginia dealing with the Medicaid expansion in the Healthcare Act.

April 21, 2013-Guest-John Schultz, Executive Director of the New River Health Center. He explained the basic health and dental services they provide to un-insured citizens. This non-profit serves Fayette, Raleigh and Nicholas counties in West Virginia.

April 28, 2013- Guest- Beth Powers of the Fayette County Humane Society. She discussed animal adoption and their weekly adoption events. She also issued a plea for volunteers and supplies for the shelter.

May 5, 2013- Guest- Margaret O'Neal, Executive Director of the United Way of Southern West Virginia. She was promoting their Celebrity Night event, which is the main fund-raiser for the Women's Resource Center.

May 12, 2013- Guests- Scott Hill of the American Red Cross. He discussed the car give-away they are having to increase blood donations for the summer. Also, guests Erica Mani and Stephanie Meadows of the Ride for The Red fundraiser.

May 19, 2013-Guests- Nicholas Pugh and Abigale McQuillian, both coaches for the Special Olympics. They were promoting all the fund-raising events they were having leading up to the Olympics on June 6, 7, and 8, 2013.

May 26, 2013-Guest- Professor Bob Henry Baber of Glenville State College. He discussed a Governors Grant to document the exploits of West Virginia veterans through the years. They interviewed over 200 veterans for the project.

June 2, 2013- Guest- John Schultz of the New River Health Centers. He was promoting the expansion of their services that now include 4 Health Centers and 2 Dental Clinics throughout 3 counties. New River Health is a non-profit organization.

June 9, 2013-Guest-Leslie Baker of the Beckley Youth Museum. She talked about the events at the museum and the Exhibition Coal Mine for this summer. This included the 150th Anniversary of West Virginia's forming on June 20, and the Fathers Day Festival and the Art Festival.

June 16, 2013-Guest-Kelly Elkins, Events Director for Tamarack. She was promoting upcoming events at the Center.

June 23, 2013- Guest-Josh Jones of the Hospice of Southern West Virginia. He promoted their new facility at Cranberry, WV and the counties that they serve. He also discussed the fundraisers they do throughout the year.

June 30, 2013- Guests-Larry Prichard, National Boy Scout Jamboree Director, and Greg Duckworth of the West Virginia State Police. They talked about the upcoming Jamboree and all the changes to traffic patterns that will affect all local travel.
