The solution? Get them out of the life they know...the woods of dark impulses...and into the real one...a wilderness of hardcore survival. The trip begins with a strip search for drugs and weapons. Isolated in a room every day from the time they returned home from school until bedtime. They were subject to beatings and sadistic punishment. Regardless of allegations of the abuse, Jacqueline was allowed to keep the children for five years. Finally, the police took them away from Jacqueline. All six children have been adopted by a loving couple Kathy and Rod Rodriquez.</i>

Veronica Roselli started the trend. She was once obese and started the trend of stomach stapling amongst her family and friends. She went from 230 pounds to 135 pounds. Veronica's mother, aunt, uncle, caterer and friend all followed suit. They lost 800 pounds between them. The once radical surgery is becoming a lifesaver for the obese.</i>
<i>Health & Safety</i>	<i>20/20</i>	<i>April 12</i>	<i>9 p.m.</i>	<i>60 Min.</i>	<i>"Fake Nails" – Arnold Diaz reports. Many nail salons are using a chemical called Methelmacrarate (MMA). The adhesive is strong but can cause damage and allergy. The FDA has been warning that MMA is highly dangerous. Many salons deny using it, Arnold Diaz proved otherwise.</i>
<i>Health & Safety</i>	<i>20/20</i>	<i>April 19</i>	<i>9 p.m.</i>	<i>60 Min.</i>	<i>"Pill Camera" Dr. Tim reports. The pill camera is not much bigger than a large capsule and can travel through the body. Dr. Blair Lewis is one of the first people to test the tiny pill camera. The camera can go where fiber optics can't and transmits to a pack that records the images taken by camera. In using the pill camera, Dr. Lewis has been able to find 60 – 70 % of medical problems that could not be detected otherwise.</i>

She is happy with her life!</i>

Father Marciel Maciel is one of Pope John Paul 11's closet advisers, despite repeated allegations he was a longtime pedophile. He allegedly molested several boys when he was the leader of a Catholic order that recruited young boys to study and become priests. Eight former students, now in their 60's have signed sworn affidavits that they were molested by Maciel. Some of the boys had complained before but were ignored.</i>
