The city will add fifty fire department jobs to staff the vehicles with the department saying it can make the changes without a budget increase. The Phoenix Fire Department says they are still working out the details on where those new full-time emergency vehicles will be based. The city needed more emergency service vehicles after transporting nearly sixteen percent more people to the hospital last year. That came on the heels of a new state law that prevents paramedics and EMTs from dissuading people from taking an ambulance to the hospital.

Parents have to opt in, and it cannot be taught before fifth grade.

Research shows: an increase in diversity in the classroom also helps kids. The Institute of Education Sciences says: black students perform better when they have diverse teachers.
