It was the darkest season.” Grappling with this new solo responsibility, the divorced dad turned to his church for comfort and support. He was saddened to find very few Christian resources address the deep loneliness and doubt that many single parents endure. Out of his own need to be part of a welcoming faith community, Beeson founded the Solo Parent Society.</p>

After talking about the history, Ms. Elliott gave a virtual tour of the branch and talked their comfortable, inviting library as a hub in the Harrison community. The are seeing fewer patrons since covid and estimate about 1,500 visitors per week. Ms. Snyder told a special story about helping an older local resident put a collection of stories she had written into a book form, an example of meeting the needs of the community. She ten talked about the children’s area, her role as “Miss Caitlin” in the community, early literacy, and building a life-long habit of coming to the library. They went on to talk about special library programs like cooking, their Memory Café, staff training about Alzheimer’s and memory issues, Take and Makes, Storytime, education and training resources, and art and craft resources.
