October is Breast Cancer Awareness month. According to the National Breast Cancer Foundation, one in eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. Other than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women. Men also get breast cancer, less than 1% of breast cancers occur in men.

Although the first stages of breast cancer may not show any symptoms here are something to look out for; Breast lump that feels different than surrounding tissue, Breast pain, Red pitted skin on the breast, discharge other than breast milk, Unexplained change in size or shape of the breast, A lump or swelling under arm. If you find these symptoms visit your doctor.

When breast cancer is detected early, and is in the localized stage, the 5-year relative survival rate is 100%. Early detection includes doing monthly breast self-exams, and scheduling regular clinical breast exams and mammograms.

Each type of bullying may have similar effects on the targeted person. They may withdraw even from their family or become mysteriously ill often.

Flu Season Precautions

With cold and flu season around us, here are some tips to help prevent catching the flu and reduce the spread of viruses that cause it. Get vaccinated. Vaccination is the first step to flu prevention. In general, all healthy people should get vaccinated. The CDC now recommends that, in addition to other high risk groups, all healthy children get a flu vaccination.

Wash your hands. Cold and flu viruses may be spread by indirect contact. Do the elbow cough. Since viruses cling to your bare hands, you can reduce the spread of viruses by coughing into your elbow. When you cough, simply cover your face with your entire elbow. Disinfect common surfaces. Viruses that cause colds and flu can survive on common surfaces for up to 72 hours. That includes: phones, doorknobs, light switches, and remote controls. Drink Water.

Water can help strengthen your immune system, keeping the flu at bay. And if you do get sick, water flushes your system, rehydrates you and washes out the toxins. An adult should drink eight 8-ounce glasses of fluids each day. If the color of your urine is close to clear, then you are getting enough. If it's deep yellow, drink more water.
