When COVID-19 forced<br>shutdowns, foodstuffs no longer flowed easily and<br>inexpensively from farms to factories and stores to your<br>kitchen. This global disruption, combined with federal<br>fiscal policies to fight economic slowdown, nearly<br>guaranteed that Americans would feel checkout sticker<br>shock. Food prices are especially vulnerable to pressures<br>of the pandemic, says Joe Balagtas, Associate Professor of<br>Agricultural Economics at Purdue University. "Higher<br>farming costs, like fertilizer, fuel," make basic ingredients<br>more expensive. Even the Russian invasion of Ukraine in<br>early-2022 "created uncertainty" as both nations had<br>previously been major exporters of global wheat. The tight<br>labor market in the U.S. also affects your total at the<br>register. "Labor along the food supply chain accounts for<br>something like half of the cost of our food," he says, so<br>"while good for individual worker, rising wages increase<br>the price of food we purchase because the cost of<br>delivering those goods to us in the grocery stores and<br>restaurants is rising." While our grocery bills are<br>undeniably afflicted by global factors, lifestyle<br>blogger Jordan Page challenges us to focus less on prices<br>and more on waste. Page, herself a mother of 8 hungry<br>children, recommends Shelf Cooking, defined as planning<br>your meals around what you already have in the fridge,<br>freezer and pantry. "Do you have half a thing of spinach<br>kind of wilting in the back of the fridge?" she asks. Plan<br>around what you have!
