More than 4-million teenagers are homeless every year, though not always by choice. “Whether it’s that they don’t feel safe in their own home, or whether they’ve been kicked out, this is not something young people generally want.” Whatever drove them to the streets, hunger inevitably awaits. Traffickers spot runaways as easy prey and sometimes offer food to bait the trap.</p>

Matthew Belwood knows how that feels. At 16, Matt lost most of hearing and now, as the National Director of Youth for Christ's Deaf Teen Quest, his heart is for young people to know their worth in Christ. Matt says growing up, his church youth group surrounded him with love, but when they explained his deafness to others, it felt like they were saying, "He's awesome, but he has something that may be a little bit broken inside of him...these great people that are really trying to help me and protect me and love me and cherish me in my youth group kind of planted the seed inside my head that ' he's amazing, except for one thing.'" Matt emphasizes that the deaf teen isn't broken, but part of the body of Christ with great potential. Often deaf teens feel disconnected and alone during a time when there are so many mental, emotional and spiritual changes going on. More than 80 percent of deaf and hard-of-hearing teens don't have a parent who can sign or communicate with them in a direct way. Matt says with Deaf Teen Quest, "caring Christian adults</p>

Often laced with fentanyl, these deadly drugs can be 100x stronger than morphine. "It's terrifying," says Pat Aussem of the Partnership to End Addiction. Ed Ternan, co-founder of Song for Charlie lost his college-aged son to one pill and now helps other parents warn their children. "We still say 'just say no' but we spell it K. N. O. W. because many of these young victims are dying from taking a substance they didn't ask for." Hook spent years counseling foster children as a mental health professional. “We’re not always looking at it from the adoptee’s side,” she warns, for example, repeatedly calling one’s adoption a ‘gift’ can unintentionally hurt your child. Vanessa Joy Walker is an author and lifecoach who was herself adopted as a baby. “The issues of identity and abandonment are interwoven into who I am, they are part of what I call my emotional DNA.” Billie Branham reports.</p>

You're ordered to evacuate as of 7am tomorrow morning ahead of Hurricane Nicole if you live in zones A and B, which includes barrier islands, low-lying areas and mobile home communities. To check your evacuation zone, visit pbcgov.com. Again, the evacuations are effective at 7am tomorrow morning and they apply to about 52,000 residents of mobile homeowners throughout Palm Beach County and just under 70,000 coastal residents. Palm Beach County has the biggest chance of getting hit with hurricane force winds east of 95 Wednesday night into Thursday before dawn. For a list of shelters, visit pbcgov.org.</p>

It is still forecast to become a Category 1 Hurricane as it moves across the NW Bahamas today and is expected to make landfall along the East coast of Florida tonight. Expect heavy rain, flooding and gusty winds. Tri-Rail and Brightline in South Florida are going to suspend services ahead of the storm. Many school districts have canceled classes today and tomorrow. Three Florida counties, Flagler, Palm Beach and Volusia, have been ordered to evacuate from barrier islands, low-lying areas and mobile homes. To check your evacuation zone, visit pbcgov.com. New warnings and watches were issued for many parts of Florida, including the southwestern Gulf coastline, which was devastated by Hurricane Ian in September. Nicole is a large tropical storm. Tropical-storm-force winds extend 460 miles, especially to the north of the center of circulation.</p> <p>Please be safe.</p>

Ron DeSantis said that winds were the biggest concern and residents should be aware of possible power outages, that 16,000 utility workers are on standby to restore power if necessary. Gov. Ron DeSantis also said he activated at least 600 Florida national guardsmen to assist with search and rescue efforts if necessary.
