07/02/18	PEIA Taskforce		AM DRIVE	N/A	The Public employees Insurance Agency Taskforce is facing a deadline to come up with a way to end the annual cycle of premium increases and benefit cuts to the insurance plan that covers more the 200-thousand West Virginians. In a hearing last week, ideas for revenue streams included raising the natural gas severance tax, but legislators say a severance tax is too volatile, and a more diversified approach is needed.

07/02/18	RISE WV Flood Rebuilding Program		AM DRIVE	N/A	West Virginia National Guard's Adjutant General, Maj. Gen. James Hoyer says there is progress being made with the RISE West Virginia flood rebuilding program. Hoyer said in a news release that there are 448 outstanding cases out of the original 451 cases reported. Of those, 128 cases require total reconstruction, 109 cases require some form of rehabilitation, 71 cases require a new mobile home unit, and 140 cases have undefined needs and are currently in the review process. RISE will focus on case management reviews now with construction assignments and quality control. Kanawha County has 91 of those outstanding cases.
07/02/18	Black Lung		AM DRIVE	N/A	A new report suggests the rules and regulations to fight black lung disease might not be enough. The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine report points to the increase in the number of black lung cases since regulations were put in place in 1969 as not doing enough to protect miners. A ten-person panel visited coal mines in West Virginia and Pennsylvania before compiling the report.

07/02/18	School Clothing Allowance		AM DRIVE	N/A	West Virginia will start taking applications for school clothing allowance today. The allowance is for eligible kids receiving WV Works cash assistance, and those in foster care will automatically receive school clothing allowance vouchers by mid-July. Families who received vouchers in 2017 and currently receive Medicaid or food stamps should have received an application in June. It's administered by the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources and applications are due by July 31.
07/03/18	National Science Camp		AM DRIVE	N/A	Many STEM students are in West Virginia this month for the 55th National Youth Science Camp. Over a hundred students from all 50 states and from some countries are in Pocahontas County for activities that relate to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. The goal is to give students a boost preparing for college, and over the next four weeks in addition to studying, they'll also have time for hiking, kayaking, and other outdoor activities. The camp is the work of the National Youth Science Foundation.
07/03/18	Long Term Flood Relief		AM DRIVE	N/A	West Virginia's contracts for long-term flood relief have expired, and state officials are trying to figure out what to do next. The contracts with firms that were helping with reconstruction efforts expired over the weekend. A legislative auditor's report released last week concluded that several contracts with construction firms were awarded unlawfully and should be terminated.

07/04/18	Cooling Stations		AM DRIVE	N/A	Cooling stations have been set up in Charleston to escape the hot weather. The cooling centers will be open again today at Aldersgate United Methodist Church on Sissonville Drive and the Tyler Mountain Volunteer Fire Department, according to a news release from the Kanawha County Commission. Hours will be noon to 9 p.m. at the cooling stations, and Charleston city pools are open today too with free admission. The excessive heat watch will continues today with the heat index expected to reach 105
07/04/18	Free Breakfast and Lunch		AM DRIVE	N/A	For the second year, all students in the Kanawha County Schools district will be able to eat breakfast and lunch at school at no cost during the upcoming academic year. Through the Community Eligibility Provision, the district is able to provide the meals at no cost to nearly 26,500 students each day. The district expects that all 65 schools in the system will take part. More than 14 percent of residents and more than 79,000 children live in food insecure households in West Virginia, according to a report from Feeding America.

07/04/18	Substance Abuse Program		AM DRIVE	N/A	West Virginia Medicaid recipients will soon receive the second phase of new services under a federal waiver as part of efforts by Gov. Jim Justice's administration to provide substance abuse treatment. The expanded coverage will add Medicaid coverage for residential treatment programs for adult substance abuse sufferers, including those with mental health disorders. It also will include peer recovery support services to extend treatment into a community and home environment, and coverage to stabilize intoxicated people through withdrawal management services. The first phase of services that started in January included screening and treatment needs for Medicaid recipients, methadone treatment and administration.
07/05/18	Smoking Ban		AM DRIVE	N/A	The housing authority in Huntington has banned smoking at all its properties, including public housing units. The Herald-Dispatch reports the Huntington Housing Authority has banned smoking at its administrative offices, company-owned vehicles, common spaces and more than 600 public housing units after a new mandate from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, which regulates public housing. Warnings will come first, and after a fourth violation the tenant will get a notice to vacate.

07/05/18	Shoes for Children		AM DRIVE	N/A	A Putnam County nonprofit wants to make sure kids have what they need when school starts. The nonprofit Putnam Shoes For Children gets its funding principally through private and corporate donations, and from events like Buffalo's Independence Day run/walk. The Gazette-Mail said in its first year of operations, Putnam Shoes for Children collected nearly 130 pairs of shoes to give to kids attending Buffalo, Conner Street, Hometown, Hurricane Town, Poca, Rock Branch and West Teays elementary schools. Donations double last year, and they're always welcome. School principals and counselors help the group decide which students might be in need
07/05/18	West Virginia College Consolidation		AM DRIVE	N/A	A new report is recommending the consolidation of West Virginia's smaller colleges. The proposal by a study group launched by Governor Justice recommends merging the governing boards of Bluefield State college and concord University, and later for Glenville State College and West Virginia State University. Justice announced his Blue Ribbon Commission on Higher Education this week. He wants it to complete its work by December.

07/06/18	Habitais for Mussel Species		AM DRIVE	N/A	The US Fish and Wildlife Service is facing a lawsuit for failing to protect critical habitats for four endangered mussel species. All four of the mussels named in the suit can be found in West Virginia rivers and streams, and they're found in seventeen other states. The suit filed by the Center for Biological Diversity aims to require the Fish and Wildlife Service to outline the critical habitat so that federal agencies funding or issuing permits for projects where they're known to live would have to work with Fish and Wildlife to make sure the habitat is not damaged.
07/06/18	DEP Water Quality		AM DRIVE	N/A	The Department of Environmental Protection is taking comments now on water quality rules as it sets limits on pollution that enters the state's streams and rivers. The rules are reviewed every three years. Among the EPA's latest recommendations are updates to the human health effects of 94 chemical pollutants, according to the Gazette-Mail. The EPA's recommendations reflect updated data on body weight, health toxicity values, among other things, and were released in 2015. Changes to the rules are usually consistent with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's water quality criteria
07/07/18	Overdoses Down		AM DRIVE	N/A	Overdoses are on a sharp decline in Cabell County. Overdoses in the first half of the year fell more than 40-percent, dropping from almost a thousand to under 600. Overdoses fell in June, and officials say they are seeing a solid trend.

07/07/18	Hepatitis A Campaign		AM DRIVE	N/A	The Cabell Huntington Health Department is planning a "Stop the Spread of Hepatitis A" campaign this month to fight the recent outbreak. A public health forum will be held on July 19 <sup>th</sup> . West Virginia has identified over 200 cases of hepatitis A in eleven counties.

The learning center will bear the name of Fred D. Thomas came to WVSU after serving in the military shortly after the end of World War II and graduated from the university with a bachelor's degree in biology. He served as a middle school science teacher and curriculum coordinator for 35 years.</p>

The Fourth of July week was hard on blood donations, with hundreds fewer blood drives than a typical week, and now blood is being distributed to hospitals faster than donations are coming in. Eligible donors are encouraged to give as soon as possible to help replenish the blood supply.
07/10/18	AG Phone Scam		AM DRIVE	N/A	Attorney General Patrick Morrisey is warning of a scam involving unsolicited calls from someone claiming to represent the Social Security Administration. Morrisey said the caller will usually ask to verify personal information like a social security number, in order to replace a social security card, fix an issue with an online account, process a cost-of-living adjustment or rectify benefits that have been underpaid and need adjustment. 07/10/18	Kroger Scam		AM DRIVE	N/A	Kroger says there's a fake coupon scam going around the internet. The fake coupon is showing up on social media and offers 250-dollars off a shopping trip to Kroger. The supermarket says it's not an actual promotion.
07/11/18	WV Population		AM DRIVE	N/A	West Virginia's population is declining faster than any other state. A study by the Pew Charitable Trust shows that West Virginia has lost 18-thousand people over the last decade. Nearly three-thousand people moved out of Kanawha County, alone, last year. The study ties the loss to slow economic growth.

07/11/18	School Board Raise Taxes		AM DRIVE	N/A	The Kanawha County Board of Education wants to raise property taxes to help fund schools. Board members voted to uncap a levy that would increase taxpayer's annual bill by over eight-dollars for every 10-thousand-dollars of assessed home value. The board says the money will be used to upgrade facilities including HVAC improvements and roofing projects, increase security and hire more staff. Taxpayers in Boone, Cabell, Putnam and Fayette counties currently pay the state maximum in property tax, and the proposed Kanawha County amount would still come in under that. The levy will be on the ballot in November.
07/12/18	Substance Abuse Treatment		AM DRIVE	N/A	Residential treatment services for substance abuse will be offered in five additional West Virginia counties. The state Department of Health and Human Resources announced the availability of \$1 million in funding to expand treatment services in Clay, Fayette, Kanawha, Nicholas and Roane counties. The DHHR says it is accepting applications from vendors for existing or newly constructed facilities with treatment beds. Secretary Bill Crouch says the expansion will help reduce overdose deaths and lower economic costs to the state. More than 30,000 West Virginians are already in drug treatment and the state has the nation's highest drug overdose death rate.

07/12/18	Meth Use in Charleston		AM DRIVE	N/A	Charleston police are concerned about the rise of meth use, and said at a public meeting in Kanawha City this week that meth is making a comeback. Meanwhile, two people were arrested Tuesday at a hotel in Pike County, Kentucky on meth charges. Local police are closely watching meth cases in the Kanawha Valley.
07/13/18	Flood Recovery Concerns		AM DRIVE	N/A	The Legislature's Joint Committee on Government and Finance met Thursday morning to get a closer look at flood recovery concerns, including odd spending and having several no-shows by state employees in former meetings. James Messick with the state auditor's office told the committee Thursday that of the \$149 million that was designated for flood recovery efforts, they found that only \$1.4 million had been spent on flood-related expenditures.

The worker was diagnosed on July 9th, and the health department says the risk to patrons is low. The restaurant is working with the health department to prevent any new cases of Hepatitis A.

The request was made after severe storms around the Memorial Day holiday. Public Assistance funding will be available in Grant, Hampshire, hardy, Jefferson, Mineral, Morgan and Pendleton counties. Initial estimates place the damage at nearly five-million dollars.

For now, the city of Dunbar and the city of South Charleston are working on the issues, but the county commission is working with the state Department of Transportation on a plan for the future.

The goal is to keep possible drug activity away from kids. Starting Aug. 8, a new ordinance goes into effect in Nitro that will keep rehab centers, addiction treatment, food distribution or homeless shelters more than 1,000 feet away from a school, playground, pool or park among other places. City leaders in Nitro looked at situations in Charleston when drafting the ordinance.

In Kentucky, the Hepatitis A vaccine is now on the list of required shots after a change in state law to add that to the list. In West Virginia, there are no changes to the required shots, but there are specific immunization requirements for specific age groups like tetanus, MMR, and meningitis vaccines, also the Hepatitis B vaccine is required. The Hepatitis A vaccine has been required for pre-k since 2008. The CDC also recommends the Hepatitis A vaccine to young children.

07/20/18	Boone County Homelessness		AM DRIVE	N/A	Community and city leaders in Boone County are raising concerns about homelessness with hopes of solving the problem that is now spreading across the county. Madison police said the drug epidemic and loss of jobs has sparked the rise of homelessness in Boone County, and Eyewitness News reported the police chief is getting more reports of thefts and people being harassed on the street, but the biggest concern is the needles that are scattered across town. Chief Burgess said there have been more stray needles in this past year than in his 30 years on the police force.

Yesterday the Cabell-Huntington Health Department hosted a town hall forum as part of the “stop the Spread” campaign. The funding will establish a Quick Response team, similar to those in place in Huntington, and other locations, to follow up with overdose victims. Wood County is eighth on the list for drug overdoses in West Virginia.

The program is already in place at elementary and middle schools, and will now be expanded to high schools. It’s being funded through a federal reimbursement program. School officials say it will help students focus on their education, and not where their next meal is coming from. The first day of classes in Roane County is August 16 <sup>th</sup> .

Secretary of State Mac Warner and Homeland Security hosted a forum in Morgantown earlier this week on voting security.

The State Department of Commerce estimates that over 50-percent of new jobs being created by 2020 will need an associate's degree or higher, and 30-percent of those jobs will need some sort of post-secondary credentials.

Jim Justice said statewide hotel occupancy grew around 16 percent in June from the same month in 2017 and state officials say the growth produced a 20 percent revenue increase from a year earlier. The growth is seen across all areas of the state. Justice announced the increase from a newly constructed luxury cabin at Chief Logan State Park last week and his office says the cabins will serve visitors to the Hatfield McCoy trail system. The news release said occupancy in the first two quarters of 2018 is up around 12 percent, producing revenue growth of nearly 15 percent.
