Issues: A new study: indicates that people are not as vocal or specific about affiliating with a particular religion. Brennanman explains that people still believe in God and are still involved in religious practices but are more often unaffiliated with a particular church. They consider themselves spiritual and in some cases still religious but do not self-identify as Christian or Protestant. Moreover, some churches have seen big declines in numbers. Brennanmen says that the survey results don't provide a clear reason for these changes but there are indications that to many, the politics of American religion is disturbing.

He said that early settlers didn't make a big day out of Christmas because they would be very isolated, with no stores and few neighbors. At best, they might have had a special meal. Once the trains and catalogs started moving into the area, there was some present giving. Around the end of the 19th century, people from the North started to bring Christmas traditions to Florida.

There are many new exhibits to enjoy at the History Center. Perkins said that the Peanuts Naturally exhibit is one not to miss. The exhibit shows how artist Charles Schulz drew attention to environmental challenges. Perkins said that something else people should see is the soon to open exhibit that will focus on four seasons at Universal Studios. Issues: UCF Researcher David Metcalf and his son Adam have become the first people to drive a Tesla Model S production over 400 miles on a single charge. Tesla Motors' CEO Elon Musk announced a challenge to do this on Twitter last May. Metcalf explained that others had tried but Florida's flat geography worked to his advantage, allowing him and his son to drive 423.5 miles in just under 17 hours. The two enjoyed the remotest parts of the Florida environment, traveling from Merritt Island to Lake Okeechobee, through the Florida Panther Preserve, across Alligator Alley and back north. Adam said he had never seen some of these parts of Florida but liked that he was helping to preserve nature by driving an electric car.
