2/13/13 – Galax Soup Kitchen, Becky McClenden

-ISSUE: There are many people in our community that are struggling to provide meals for their families and put food on the table. The struggles stem from a downturn in the economy and unemployment. There are many poor families living in and around our community and poverty is continuing to be on the rise, with many who are homeless.

-HOW IT WAS DEALT WITH: Becky McClenden was live, on-air to talk about the Galax Soup Kitchen. The Soup Kitchen is there to assist families in need and help provide meals and food for children and those who have gone without food for days. The Soup Kitchen is also there to provide love and friendship, because some of the people that attend don't have a family of their own to look out for them. McClenden knows that unemployment is high and people are not able to pay their bills and afford groceries. She encouraged families to go to the Galax Soup Kitchen every Monday and Thursday evening from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. at Rooftop on North Main Street in downtown Galax. They are there to assist and provide meals for families that are severely in need and no questions would be asked.

2/20/13 – Lions Club – Recycled Eyeglass Collection, Kent Cox & Richard Vaughan

-ISSUE: There are many people in and around our community that are not able to afford eyeglasses due to a downturn in the economy, unemployment and not being able to afford insurance. Many of these folks need prescription eyeglasses and sunglasses due to poor sight and various eye problems and conditions. There is a growing need for eyeglasses, especially for children.

-HOW IT WAS DEALT WITH: Kent Cox and Richard Vaughan were live, on-air to talk about the Lion's Club "Lion's Recycle for Sight Program." Eyeglasses are collected and delivered to Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers to be distributed to those in need. Kent and Richard challenged and encouraged everyone to get involved, that anyone can participate. You can donate the eyeglasses of a deceased loved one or you might even have a pair of eyeglasses or sunglasses lying around at home that you don't want anymore. The glasses are cleaned, sorted by prescription strength and packaged. All types of glasses are accepted, including prescription and reading glasses, sunglasses and plastic and metal frames. This helps provide glasses to those who desperately need them and can change their life.

2/27/13 – Wellness Center, Carrie Ayers & Cindy B.

-ISSUE: There are many individuals in our community who do not live or maintain a healthy lifestyle, struggle with obesity or certain health conditions. Most are in need of exercise or healthy diet that they can control and maintain.

-HOW IT WAS DEALT WITH: Carrie and Cindy were live, on-air to talk about Twin County Wellness Center and some of the things that they offer, especially some of the upcoming programs. They talked about overweight exercises, as well as, programs and exercises for the elderly and senior citizens that can help keep them active. Carrie and Cindy also talked about upcoming running and walking events, such as 5K's that the community can get involved in to stay healthy and active. They explained that the Wellness Center is there to help you reach and maintain your optimal level of health and fitness by adopting an effective and enjoyable workout program in a safe and secure atmosphere.

3/6/13 – Twin County Hospice, Julie Rippey

-ISSUE: There are many people in our community that are dealing with the loss of a loved one. Most do not even know how to cope with the situation or have someone to counsel them or be there for them to help them through the process, especially young children. There are also many individuals in our community who cannot afford hospice care in a time of need, and these individuals include the sick, elderly and disabled. Many family members are also affected by the inability to pay for a loved one to receive the proper needs that they deserve in the most difficult of circumstances.

-HOW IT WAS DEALT WITH: Julie Rippey was live, on-air to talk about Twin County Hospice. She explained that Twin County Hospice is there to provide support and take care of families during the difficult time of losing a loved one. Rippey said that they are there to provide the necessary comfort and care to their patients at all times and they have made themselves available for everyone when you need them. They believe that quality of life is as important as the length of life. She said that Twin County Hospice provides a very special application of healthcare services at home for terminally ill patients and their families and that every situation is different, but their quality of our care is constant.

3/27/13 – Twin County Arts Council – Empty Bowls to Feed the Hungry Fundraiser, Laura Romanoski

-ISSUE: There are many people in our community that are struggling to provide meals for their families and put food on the table. The struggles stem from a downturn in the economy and unemployment. There are many poor families living in and around our community and poverty is continuing to be on the rise, with many who are homeless.

-HOW IT WAS DEALT WITH: Laura Romanoski was live, on-air to talk about the Empty Bowls to Feed the Hungry Fundraiser put on by the Arts Council of the Twin Counties that took place on March 22nd at First United Methodist Church in Hillsville, Virginia. The fundraiser was able to raise \$1,900 to go to the Carroll County Ministerial Association Food Pantry to help feed the hungry in our community. Romanoski said that for \$10, each patron received a meal consisting of made-from-scratch soup from Shoney's, bread and water, as well as a handcrafted bowl. The simple meal helped signify the millions of people who go hungry in the world each. Romanoski said that the fundraiser was a success and that 173 people were served. They also had take-out orders, with some people even donating extra to help serve those starving in our community.

Community Issues 1st Quarter 2013 WWWJ-AM

Community Issue: There are many individuals and families in our community that are not able to receive adequate health care treatments and be seen by a doctor in a timely manner. This is from an inability to pay and being uninsured with no Medicaid, Medicare, or Veteran's benefits.

How WWWJ dealt with this Community Issue: We had a public service announcement read by our DJ's from February 4th through the end of the month (February 28th, 2013). The PSA talked about the Free Clinic of the Twin Counties now being open three days each week, with a doctor available on Tuesday and Wednesday, and a nurse practitioner available 1 or 2 half days each month. This way more patients could be served if more providers were available. The PSA also mentioned a need for more volunteers willing to serve in any amount of time. There is a need for doctor's, nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, nurses, or dentist's. An email address was given for any of those willing to serve (director@galaxfreeclinic.org). The Free Clinic of the Twin Counties is a Christ-centered, vital health care provider that is community supported, fully equipped with caring and competent employees and volunteers delivering quality service to the Twin County area. They aim to provide health care, health education, and hope to the medically underserved in the Spirit of Jesus, the Great Physician.
