KNAM provides its listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the previous calendar quarter were:

- Pandemic: Stay at Home and Safer at Home public health orders continue with impacts across the state and Mesa County. Economy: Fallout from the pandemic has affected unemployment, building and other parts of the economy. The Grand Junction Economic Partnership is working to bring more businesses to the Grand Valley. Workforce Development month is also timely in September.
- Water: The Colorado River is a major source for drinking water on both the eastern and western slopes of Rockies. The Colorado River Water Conservation District is pushing a new property tax to protect western water amid climate change and population growth in Colorado and 6 other states.
- Climate Change: Many are blaming climate change for issues in our forests. That along with beetle kill has created an environment rip for massive wildfires.
- Suicide: Western Colorado has very high suicide numbers. St. Mary's Hospital working on suicide prevention.
