Program	Date	Time	Duration	Description
The 208 Segment: "Mandatory Minimums"	1/23/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 4:50	Legislature designed to add Fentanyl to the drugs in Idaho that carry a mandatory minimum sentence was moved through the Idaho House. Supporters discussed their feelings on creating a deterrent to drugs like Fentanyl. Opposers questioned the need for such strict rules for charges related to trafficking and death as a result of using the drug.
News at 10 Segment: "Union Block Closure Appeal"	1/30/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:05	The City of Boise held an appeal hearing over their closure of a historic building in November of 2023 due to safety concerns. The building owner, Ken Howell did not show up at the hearing. The City's building official said some work had been done to ensure the building's stability, but more was needed. No official decisions were made at this hearing.
News at 6 Segment: "Greenbelt Trash Clean Up"	3/1/2024	6 p.m.	Approx. 2:30	Garden City Police asked residents to help clean up a homeless encampment along the Boise River. Police arrested a homeless man in the fall of 2023 on charges of polluting a waterway and illegal dumping. Garden City police walked our reporter through the large mess and asked for help from the public to clean it up at a designated time.

The 208 Segment: "GOP Winter Meeting Rules"	1/4/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 4:10	A proposed rule change at the Idaho GOP winter meeting has some Idaho Republicans questioning their party's platform and leadership. The rule in question would punish republicans for not sticking with party platform and pull funding from major party backers. KTVB spoke to 2 Republican lawmakers that said the proposed change would restrict thinking and collaboration within the party.
News at 10p Segment: "No"	2/14/24	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:45	Idaho's first GOP presidential caucus since 2012 will be closed to all except registered republicans. A political analyst discusses the

The 208 Segment: “HB710 New Library Bill”	3/11/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 4:00	Idaho Lawmakers take another look at regulating libraries and the content available to their users. Debate and public testimony were heard in committee over changing of a few points in the legislation about relocating and complaints about pornographic materials in Idaho’s public libraries. The bill is still being debated at the Idaho statehouse.

The 208 Segment: “Concealed Carry License HB 415”	1/31/2024	5 p.m.	4:10	A bill introduced in Idaho’s House would loosen gun operation regulations on teachers and staff in school districts. KTVB talked to a Boise gun and shooting educator about the standards he sets for his courses for a concealed carry permit and compared that to the proposed legislation looking to standardize statewide regulations for school personnel.
Wake Up Idaho Segment: “Black History Museum”	2/20/2024	6 a.m.	Approx. 5:00	In honor of Black History Month, KTVB visited the Idaho Black History Museum to highlight the triumphs and trials African Americans experienced in early Idaho up to recent times. KTVB looked back at the ribbon cutting in 1999 and talked with one of the founding board members.
News at 10p Segment: “Family Summit on Fentanyl”	3/15/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:45	A first of its kind event bringing together families, educators, and law enforcement to educate kids, teens, and parents on the dangers of drug use and how to talk about the subject. Families and KTVB heard from parents and siblings of young people who have died from Fentanyl overdose.

Wake Up Idaho Segment: "7's Hero: Sweet Zola's"	1/28/2024	6 a.m.	4:10	Feature franchise piece on a local candy shop all about inclusion. Sweet Zola's hires people with special needs and gives them an opportunity to engage with the community while learning job and social skills. The owner talked about the growth of business following the Covid pandemic and why hiring more staff was necessary.
Wake Up Idaho Segment: "Growing Idaho: Micron Growth"	2/27/2024	6 a.m.	Approx. 3:45	Micron recently broke ground on a large FAB Lab in South Boise, KTVB talked to Boise's Economic Development advisor about the number of jobs the new lab will bring to the community and how those jobs will create more in the way of support and outside of tech job opportunities. Infrastructure and utility needs will increase, the advisor talks about how Micron is working with multiple entities to increase supply.
News at 5 Segment: "Big Sky Tournament Impact"	3/9/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 2:45	The Big Sky Basketball tournament returned to Boise's Grove Plaza. Each time the event is held in the City of Trees, scores of players, families, and fans book up hotels, swell restaurants and bars and shop in area shops. KTVB talked to Visit Boise's Sales Manager about how much money the tournament brings to Boise and how the group is working to seal a bid to keep the tournament coming back to Boise.

The 208 Segment: "Transgender Bill Follow"	1/2/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 4:00	A personal account of how Idaho law is harming LGBTQ+ youth in the state of Idaho. One Gem state mom created a group to help families discuss gender affirming care, and where to seek professional medical help. She discusses with KTVB the need to bring awareness to using these youth as political pawns in a very confusing fight.
News at 10p	3/18/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 3:00	A look at a couple bills introduced in the Legislature targeting LGBTQ+ youth. One

Segment: "ID High School Hate Crimes"				Boise High school teen talks about how accepting their school is to their use of their preferred pronouns and how a proposed bill would hurt that acceptance. The ACLU also spoke to the number of bills proposed and the potential harm they may cause on LGBTQ+ youth in the state.
The 208 Segment: "Point In Time Survey"	1/26/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 3:00	A conversation about the annual homeless count with one of the volunteers who talks to the homeless community in Ada County. Data collected is submitted to the federal government to regulate funding for areas seeing increases or decreases. The volunteer also explains the process, how people are counted and what factors impact the report counting.

News at 10p Segment: "UI Parma Extension Opening"	2/20/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:30	The University of Idaho opened its Center for Plant and Soil Health in Parma, Idaho. The center is expected to produce research designed to help farmers and growers' business. A local farmer and former mayor expressed the great need to look to the future of farming and how this new center will help the university and the state of Idaho agriculture community for decades.
News at 4 Segment: "Environment Northwest: Cloud Seeding Changes"	2/2/2024	4 p.m.	Approx. 3:15	This explainer piece looks at how cloud seeding helps with snow making and ultimately helps with snowpack and the water supply. Idaho Power scientists are enhancing the process by adding additional materials for precipitation to form in the atmosphere. They also discuss how different weather patterns can alter cloud seeding needs.
News at 10p Segment: "Diesel Spill Follow"	3/25/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:30	Following a diesel spill in a Nampa creek that feeds into the Boise River, EPA officials discuss the safety concerns about the fuel in the water and what is being done to stop it. Neighbors walk KTVB through the scene and show photos of wildlife they helped clean up with diesel on it.

News at 10p Segment: "EMS Capitol Day"	1/22/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. 2:30	Treasure Valley EMS leaders and county commissioners statewide gathered to discuss the need to create a more feasible funding mechanism for all Emergency Medical Services. Rural EMS techs leaving for higher paying positions in areas using a county tax district to fund is hurting smaller counties relying on fundraising. All in attendance asked state lawmakers to consider utilizing state resources to help with the growing needs and cost associated with caring for its citizens.
News at 10p Segment: "High School EMT Course"	2/27/2024	10 p.m.	Approx. :30	A school in Wilder is introducing the first high school level EMT course in the country. The COSSA Regional Technical and Education Center is launching the advanced emergency medical technician course. It gives high school students the opportunity to graduate with a certificate as an AEMT.
The 208 Segment: "Change Health Local Follow"	3/13/2024	5 p.m.	Approx. 3:30	As a cyber-attack chokes insurance and medical billing across the U.S. KTVB talks with a local counseling center about how they are making ends meet while not receiving timely reimbursements and payments from Medicaid, Medicare and insurances. The Idaho Hospital Association talks about how they are working with providers to get back up and running while making sure Idahoans receive the healthcare they need.
