Economy, education reform	Clear Connections	10/13/13	600	20	Paul Peterson, Harvard University professor, co-author of Endangering Prosperity. Details recent research that even adults in America have fallen way behind on education and international competitiveness.  What brought the U.S. average down was a larger-than-average gap in skills between groups, such as those with or without a college degree, and between workers whose jobs do or don't require advanced math and reading skills.
Public Health, Cancer Awareness	Clear Connections	10/13	620	10	Geri Gehr, local cancer survivor, discusses her multiple bouts with cancer, treatments, and the importance of cancer screenings this month. (Breast Cancer Awareness Month)

Goodwill representatives promoted the documentary film event explaining the challenges women face re-integrating into society, and the services which southern Oregon Goodwill provide to help with the problem.

A number of celebrities created a video critical of the surveillance state. Despite being highly critical of the government surveillance policy, the video's celebrity participants avoid any mention of the individual who is ultimately in charge of the agency, President Obama.
Obamacare, Health Reform	Clear Connections	11/10	600	20	Attorney Don Silver talks with Bill Meyer about the problems in the affordable care act. He's one of the few ObamaCare law experts in the country who has actually read, analyzed and demystified not only the ACA law but also the 15,000 pages of the regulations. And he stays current on all developments. Answers listener questions regarding the ACA. His new book is "The Best Obamacare Guide".
Building Community	Clear Connections	11/10	620	10	Guest is Maggie Stuckey, Portland, Oregon author of "Soup Night". Promotes serving soup in your neighborhood in order to build relationships. You know <i>all</i> your neighbors and they know you. Your front door is unlocked and you can't remember where you left the house key. Soup nights have transformed neighborhoods around the country.
Health Care reform, federal and state government policy.	Clear Connections	11/17	600	20	IPI resident scholar Dr. Merrill Matthews discusses how new regulations announced 11-8 mandating health insurers cover mental and behavioral health to the same extent as physical care will make the cost of health coverage even more expensive.
Health Care Reform, state government	Clear Connections	11/17	620	10	State Senator Bates continues to answer questions of many listeners who have been cancelled due to health care reform, and possible solutions.
Federal government, advise and consent power	Clear Connections	11/24	600	10	Cato's Roger Pilon discusses the recent "Nuclear Option" rule changes. He recounts the Senate Democrats' long history of blocking judicial nominees. Pilon also suggests that the real aim of this move by Reid is to have a bench that is more sympathetic to rule by presidential diktat.

Dr. and Senator Alan Bates fields listener calls with suggestions on how to deal with the insurance cancellations, and lack of ability to sign up for new coverage.

Civil Rights, government surveillance, privacy	Clear Connections	12/8/13	600	20	In his new book, <i>A Government of Wolves: The Emerging American Police State</i> constitutional attorney John W. Whitehead paints a chilling portrait of a nation in the final stages of transformation into a police state, complete with surveillance cameras, drug-sniffing dogs, SWAT team raids, roadside strip searches, blood draws at DUI checkpoints, mosquito drones, tasers, privatized prisons, GPS tracking devices, zero tolerance policies, overcriminalization, and free speech zones. Whitehead reveals the inner workings of an increasingly pervasive surveillance state, including the NSA's program to track the communications of all Americans and map the daily activities of U.S. citizens.
State and Local Government, economy, social services	Clear Connections	12/8	620	10	Senior Fellow at the Cato Institute discusses the implications of their new study indicating 35 out of 50 states typically pay welfare benefits far above the minimum wage or prevailing wage. Says it is difficult to persuade people to work when it pays more to not work. Oregon typically pays benefits worth, on average, \$35,000 per year.
County Government, timber, economy, county services	Clear Connections	12/1	600	30	Jackson County Commissioner Doug Breidenthal answers listener calls and updates the guardedly optimistic news that the deadlock against timber action on public lands may be coming to an end in the courts.
Local law enforcement, taxes, public services	Clear Connections	12/15	600	20	Medford Deputy Police Chief Randy Sparacino explains why he says the new planned police department building is needed, prudent, and a proper use of taxpayer dollars. He answered listener criticisms of the plan, and those who believed it should have gone to a vote of the people. .
