ISSUES IN EDUCATION - President Eric Barron has stepped down from his position at Florida State University to go to Penn State. During the search for the next President of the University, there will be no "Issues in Education" program. It is expected that when a new President is chosen, the program will resume.

CAPITOL UPDATE - Sundays at 10:30AM

Capitol Update is a half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches - in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as "Budget Watch" and "Bill Track" – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action.

7/6/14 - #1718 Special edition of Capitol Update reviewing new laws that took effect July 1, including: Highlights of the state budget, the one bill the legislature is required by the Constitution to pass every year; A review of legislation designed to improve child safety and welfare; A look at the legislative debate over a new law that changes the way abortion is regulated.

7/13/14 - #1719 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: A judge rules that the Congressional maps approved by the Legislature are unconstitutional; Top teachers from across the state are honored, including Florida's Teacher of the Year; The Department of Health holds the first rulemaking meeting for the new law legalizing the medical use of a specific form of low-THC marijuana.

Topics include: Legislative leaders announce they do not plan to appeal a ruling that found the map of Florida's 27 congressional districts unconstitutional; "Step up for students" the company that administers the tax credit scholarships begins taking applications for the new program specifically for students with disabilities; A look at how the state budget provided funds to relocate Gulf County's Cape San Blas Lighthouse.

7/27/14 - #1721 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: A judge hears arguments on what should happen next now that he's ruled the Congressional map approved by the legislature unconstitutional; We ride along with state troopers to see how the Florida Highway Patrol is cracking down on aggressive drivers; The Department of Children and Families advances its summer water safety for children.

- **8/3/14 #1722** Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: A judge asked the Legislature to submit by August 15 new Congressional district maps that the judge had earlier ruled are unconstitutional; The Department of Health held a second public workshop to develop rules for the state's new medical marijuana law; The Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission held meetings throughout the Panhandle to get ideas from anglers on changes to regulations for the red snapper fishery in the Gulf.
