Capitol Update is a half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches - in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as "Budget Watch" and "Bill Track" – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action. Please note that the 2015 Legislative Session began on Monday, March 2nd and runs through May 2, 2015. During that time, WFSU will be airing Capitol Update ever weeknight at 6pm and 11pm. The Friday airing is a recap of the week's events.

1/4/15 - #1801 A special edition of Capitol Update combines a continued review of state government action in 2014 with a look ahead to 2015. Topics included: The approval of Amendment One (Water & Land Conservation) by voters in November, and what steps the legislature is expected to take to implement it; Failure of Amendment 2 (medical marijuana), along with next steps in the rule-making process for the Charlotte's Web medical marijuana law passed in 2014; Decisions by the Public Service Commission in 2014 affecting Florida's biggest power companies, and legislation already introduced that would change the way the PSC operates.

1/11/15 - #1802 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The inauguration of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and members of the Cabinet; Same-sex marriage becomes legal in Florida; House and Senate committees meet and discuss issues including student testing and how funds from the Conservation Amendment will be allocated.

1/18/15 - #1803 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Governor Rick Scott announces his proposed education budget while some lawmakers ask how much will have to be spent on student testing; A look at a higher education and vocational training program for disabled students; The Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court holds the first of several public meetings aimed at finding ways for people who can't afford an attorney to have better access to courts in civil cases.

1/25/15 - #1804 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam discusses statewide water policy with legislative committees; Governor Rick Scott reveals some components of his upcoming budget proposal, including tax cuts and spending priorities; Lawmakers get updates on efforts by the Department of Children and Families to improve protection for children threatened by abuse or neglect.

2/1/15 - #1805 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Governor Rick Scott unveils his \$77 billion budget plan; House and Senate leaders from both parties discuss their legislative priorities for the upcoming session; The chair of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee made surprise inspections of several state prisons.

Topics include: State lawmakers say the potential loss of two billion dollars in federal money for hospitals who treat low income patients could jeopardize next year's budget; Former governor Jeb Bush joined governor Rick Scott in Tallahassee this week to talk about the future of education in Florida; Lawmakers discuss plans for a comprehensive water policy and implementing the Water and Land Amendment supported by 75% of Florida voters.

2/22/15 - #1808 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. These parks beckoned people of color to relax and unite; however, as African Americans began to experience the equalities brought about by the Civil Rights Act of 1964, many say they lost what was uniquely theirs.

Centuries before a secret network was formed to help slaves escape to Northern states and Canada, The Underground Railroad ran South. As early as 1587, Spain's La Florida was recorded to be a safe haven for freedom seekers resisting enslavement. The unique group of African descendants called "Gullah Geechee" are still fighting to preserve their identity in America today.

3/5/15 - #2736 The Restoration of Florida's Historic Capitol

Years of wear and tear almost resulted in the demolition of Florida's Old Capitol in the 1970s, but a massive restoration project returned the historic structure to the way it looked in 1902. From the trademark red and white-striped awnings to the art glass dome, architect Hershel Shephard, who was in charge of the restoration, tours through the columns, halls and doorways of Florida's Historic Capitol.

3/12/15 - #2737 Florida Remembers: The Big Bend Region Produced by Mike Licquia

Florida's journey to becoming part of the United States of America was a long one. Spain once controlled the territory, as did the British. It was more than three hundred years after Juan Ponce de Leon put it on the map in 1513 that the territory stopped changing hands. A General-turned-President claimed the territory for the US and the wars that followed and the final battle that set in stone the location of Florida's Capitol.

3/19/15 - #2738 Vanishing Beauty: Saving Florida's Endangered Butterflies Produced by Melissa Klinzing

Florida is home to two of the rarest insects in the world, both of them butterflies. The Miami Blue once flew all over the coastal parts of the state, but today only a few butterflies remain on remote islands off Key West. In 2012, only a handful of Schaus Swallowtail butterflies were spotted in the wild. State researchers are working with federal officials to understand what drove the butterflies away and have launched programs to save both species from extinction.
